NORMANBY, Governor. ORDER IN COUNCIL. At the Government House, at Wellington, this eleventh day of February, 1879.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by "The Public Reserves Sale Act, 1878," it is, among other things, enacted that the lands described in the Schedule may at any time after the passing of the said Act be sold by the Governor, upon such terms as shall be regulated by Order in Council:

And whereas the lands described in the Schedule are required to be sold as town lands, and it is expedient that the terms of such sale should be defined:

Now, therefore, I, George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, and in exercise of the powers and authorities aforesaid, do hereby order and direct that the land described in the Schedule hereto shall be sold upon the following terms, that is to say,— 1. The Governor shall cause the said land to be

 The Governor shall cause the said land to be sold by public auction, as town lands, at Christchurch.
 No laud shall be sold at a less price than thirty

pounds per acre. 3. Three months' notice of the date and place of the sale shall be given by the Commissioner of Crown Lands, by advertisement in at least one newspaper circulating in Canterbury, such notice to be inserted

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at least once in each month. 4. The lands shall all be sold in sections, as shown upon the survey plan in the office of the Chief Surveyor of Canterbury, at Christchurch.

5. Sections forty-three and forty-four of "The Land Act, 1877," are hereby declared to be part of the terms upon which the said lands shall be sold, and shall take effect accordingly, so far as the same are consistent with these terms.

6. Upon full payment of the purchase-money, the purchaser will be entitled to his Crown grant, to be issued in the usual way upon payment of the fees prescribed by law.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this eleventh day of February, 1879.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the thirty-ninth section of "The Land Act, 1877," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Land Board, subject to the approval of the Governor, at any time and from time to time, to declare, by notice in the *Gazette*, that any land not already classified shall belong to either of the classes referred to in the thirty-eighth section of the said Act; and also that any land shall cease to belong to either of the said classes, provided that no land which has been declared to be town or suburban land shall cease to belong to such classes respectively, without the consent previously obtained of the Governor in Council:

And whereas the Land Board of Otago is desirous of declaring that the lands specified in the Schedule hereto, which have been heretofore classed as town lands, shall cease to belong to such class, and shall be classed as suburban lands:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the colony, and in exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by the said Act, doth hereby consent to the Land Board aforesaid declaring that the lands specified in the Schedule hereto shall cease to be classed as town lands, and doth hereby approve and consent to the said Board declaring that such lands shall be classed as suburban lands.

"Highways Act, 1871," brought into Operation within the Woodville Highway District.

NORMANBY, Governor.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Provincial Council of Hawke's Bay intituled "The Highways Act, 1871," it is, amongst other things, enacted that the Superintendent might, from time to time, on the requisition of five voters, by notification in the Provincial Government Gazette, bring that Act into operation in any district, and thereupon, but not previously, that Act should come into and remain in full operation therein ; and in such notification the day, hour, and place of meeting for the first meeting of ratepayers for such district should be appointed: And whereas, under the provisions of the said Act, a portion of the Provincial District of Hawke's Bay has been created a highway district by the name of the Woodville Highway District: And whereas the powers vested in the Superintendent by the said Act are now, by "The Abolition of Provinces Act, 1875," vested in the Governor : And whereas His Excellency the Governor has received a requisition signed by five voters of the Woodville District, in the Provincial District of Hawke's Bay, requesting him to bring the said Act into operation in the said Woodville District :

Now, therefore, I, George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of every power and authority enabling me in that behalf, do, by this notification, bring "The Highways Act, 1871," into operation within the Woodville Highway District, and do declare that the first meeting of ratepayers under the said Act shall be held at Mr. Murphy's Hotel, Woodville, on the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventynine, at two o'clock p.m.

IN pursuance of the provisions of "The Government Native Land Purchases Act, 1877," it is hereby notified that money has been paid by or on behalf of Her Majesty the Queen for the purchase or acquisition of the several blocks of Native land in the North Island which are more particularly described and mentioned in the Schedule hereto; and, further, that negotiations in respect of such purchases or acquisitions as aforesaid have been entered into by or on behalf of Her said Majesty.

PROCLAMATION.

(L.S.) A. E. KENNEDY, Governor.

By His Excellency Sir ARTHUR EDWARD KENNEDY, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commanderin-Chief of the Colony of Queensland and its Dependencies.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Queensland, passed in the thirtieth year of Her Majesty's reign, and numbered nineteen, intituled "An Act to prevent the Introduction of Diseased Animals into the Colony of Queensland, and to check the Progress of Malignant Diseases in Animals," it is, amongst other things, enacted that the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may from time to time, by Proclamation, prohibit or put restrictions on the introduction or importation of cattle, horses, sheep, goats, pigs, poultry, and other animals into the Colony of Queensland, or into any district thereof, from such places and during such time as may appear necessary; and any such Proclamation may revoke or alter by a similar Proclamation: And whereas by a Proclamation bearing date the thirteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventysix, under the hand and seal of His Excellency WILLIAM WELLINGTON CAIRNS, Esquire, the Governor of the said colony, and made under the provisions of the said recited Act, the introduction and importation of cattle, sheep, and pigs into the Colony of Queensland from all places beyond the Australian Colonies was absolutely prohibited: And whereas by another Proclamation, bearing date the twenty-third day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventyeight, under my hand and seal, and made under the provisions of the said recited Act, so much of the said first recited Proclamation as related to the importation or introduction of pigs was revoked : And whereas it is now deemed expedient to revoke the remainder of the said first recited Proclamation, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof: Now, therefore, I, the

Governor aforesaid, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, and in pursuance and execution of the powers and provisions of the said recited Act, do, by this my Proclamation, revoke the said Proclamation of the thirteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six.

PROCLAMATION.

(L.S.) A. E. Kennedy, Governor.

By His Excellency Sir ARTHUR EDWARD KENNEDY, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Queensland and its Dependencies.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Queensland, passed in the thirtieth year of Her Majesty's reign, and numbered nineteen, in-tituled "An Act to prevent the Introduction of Diseased Animals into the Colony of Queensland, and to check the Progress of Malignant Diseases in Animals," it is, amongst other things, enacted that the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may from time to time, by Proclamation, prohibit or put restrictions on the introduction or importation of cattle, horses, sheep, goats, pigs, poultry, and other animals into the Colony of Queensland, or into any district thereof, from such places and during such times as may appear neces-sary : And whereas it is deemed expedient to prohibit the importation or introduction of cattle, sheep. and pigs from any place except the countries of Great Britain, Ireland, the United States of America, the Dominion of Canada, the Australian Colonies, Tasmania, and New Zealand, and to put restrictions on the introduction and importation of cattle, sheep, and pigs from certain of the said last-mentioned countries and places: Now, therefore, I, the Go-vernor aforesaid, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance and execution of the powers and provisions of the said recited Act, do, by this my Proclamation, absolutely prohibit the introduction or importation of any cattle, sheep, or pigs into the Colony of Queensland from any place except Great Britain, Ireland, the United States of America, the Dominion of Canada, the Australian Colonies, Tasmania, and New Zealand, until this my Proclamation shall be revoked : And by and with the advice aforesaid, and in further pursuance and execution of the powers and provisions of the said recited Act, I do hereby, by this my Proclamation, prohibit the introduction or importation of any cattle, sheep, or pigs into the Colony of Queensland, from the said countries and places of Great Britain, Ireland, the United States of America, and the Dominion of Canada, except under and subject to the conditions and restrictions hereinafter stated: And I declare that cattle, sheep, and pigs may be introduced or imported into the said colony from any of the said last-mentioned countries or places, under and subject to the conditions and restrictions of this my Proclamation, which said conditions and restrictions are as follows, that is to say,-

1. No cattle, sheep, or pigs shall be introduced

or imported into the colony from any of the said countries or places at any port other than the Port of Brisbane.

2. No cattle, sheep, or pigs shall be introduced from any of the said countries or places, if at the time of shipment the infectious or contagious disease called rinderpest, or any infectious or contagious disease not known in Australia other than the disease called foot-and-mouth disease, exists in such country or place, or if there are more than one hundred centres of the last-named disease existing in such country or place at the time of shipment.

3. All cattle, sheep, or pigs intended to be shipped from any of the said countries or places to Queensland shall be conveyed direct from the place from which they start to the port of shipment, and shall not while travelling be placed in any stable, place, truck, or conveyance in which any cattle, sheep, pigs, or goats have been kept or conveyed within the sixty days then next preceding.

4. All cattle, sheep, or pigs intended to be shipped from any of the said countries or places to Queensland, and all other animals put or intended to be put on board of the ship by which such cattle, sheep, or pigs are shipped, whether for the use of the crew or passengers or otherwise, shall, before being shipped, be inspected by a duly-qualified veterinary surgeon, appointed to act for this colony in that behalf.

5. No cattle, sheep, or pigs shall be shipped from any of such countries or places for exportation to Queensland, unless—

- (1.) They have been in the country from which they are intended to be shipped for a period of not less than sixty days;
- (2.) They are free from infection;
- (3.) They have not within the sixty days then next preceding been in contact with or exposed to infection; and
- (4.) All the conditions hereinbefore specified have been duly complied with.

6. The exporter or shipper of any such cattle, sheep, or pigs shall produce to the veterinary surgeon inspecting them a certificate from the owner or seller of the same, to the effect that the foregoing conditions have been complied with.

7. If the inspecting veterinary surgeon be satisfied that all the cattle, sheep, or pigs intended to be shipped for the colony, and all other animals put on board the same ship, are free from infection, and that all the requirements of this Proclamation have, up to that time, been duly complied with, he shall grant a certificate to that effect in the form of Schedule A hereto, and shall deliver such certificate to the master of the ship.

8. The skins of all cattle, sheep, or other animals, that may die or be slaughtered on board the ship during the voyage shall either be thrown overboard or salted and securely packed in casks or cases, and shall not be landed in Queensland.

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9. The master of the ship on which any cattle, sheep, or pigs intended to be introduced or imported into Queensland are carried, and some person who shall be appointed to attend on them, shall, during the voyage, make daily entry, in a book kept for that purpose, of the state of health of each of such cattle, sheep, and pigs, and of any other cattle, sheep, or pigs on board the ship, and shall deliver such book to the officer of Customs first boarding such vessel on her arrival at the Port of Brisbane, together with a declaration in the form of Schedule B hereto, and the certificates and all other documents relating to such cattle, sheep, or pigs as hereinbefore provided.

10. On the arrival of the ship from any of the said countries or places at the Port of Brisbane, with cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals on board, the

master shall give immediate notice of their arrival to the Commissioner or Commissioners for "The Diseased Animals Act."

11. All such cattle, sheep, or pigs, or other animals shall forthwith be examined by a veterinary surgeon duly appointed in that behalf, and by the said Commissioner or Commissioners, and such veterinary surgeon and Commissioner or Commissioners shall ascertain, by inspection, inquiry, and such other means as may be necessary, whether or not such cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals, or any of them, are infected, and if it be found that none of them is infected shall grant a certificate accordingly; and no cattle, sheep, or pigs, or other animals shall be landed from the ship until such certificate shall have been granted in respect of them.

12. If any cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals on board the ship be found to be infected, they shall be forthwith destroyed, whether intended to be landed or not.

13. All cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals found on inspection to be free from infection shall be washed and disinfected as the Commissioner or Commissioners shall direct, and shall be conveyed by water at the importer's expense to the quarantine station set apart for imported stock.

14. No fodder put on board of the ship, with or for the use of any cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals, shall be landed in this colony. 15. All fittings used on board of the importing

15. All fittings used on board of the importing ship for, with, or about any cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals, and all effects belonging to their attendants, shall be disinfected as the Commissioner or Commissioners may direct.

16. Imported cattle, sheep, or pigs intended to be landed in Queensland shall remain in quarantine for a period of not less than ninety days, during which time they shall be washed and disinfected as the Commissioner or Commissioners shall direct, and such cattle, sheep, or pigs shall not be released from quarantine until they shall have been examined by a veterinary surgeon and Commissioner and declared to be free from infection, nor until the owner or importer shall have proved to the satisfaction of the Commissioner or Commissioners that all the conditions of this Proclamation have been complied with, and shall have paid all charges incurred in connection with the detention of such sheep, cattle, or pigs in quarantine.


17. All cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals put on board of any ship for the use of the crew or passengers, and removed to quarantine, shall remain there until the vessel is about to leave the port, when they may be re-shipped, on the order of the Commissioner or Commissioners, at the expense of the master of the ship.

pursuance of the Act of the Parliament of Queensland, passed in the thirtieth year of Her Majesty's reign, and numbered nineteen, intituled "An Act to prevent the Introduction of Diseased Animals into the Colony of Queensland, and to check the Progress of Malignant Diseases in Animals, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to make the following regulations for carrying into effect the provisions of the said Act :-

1. No cattle, sheep, or pigs shall be introduced or imported into the colony except by sea; nor shall any such cattle, sheep, or pigs be imported at any other port than the Port of Brisbane.

2. On the arrival of a ship at the Port of Brisbane with cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals on board, the master shall give immediate notice of their arrival to the Commissioner or Commissioners for "The Diseased Animals Act."

3. All such cattle, sheep, or pigs, or other animals shall forthwith be examined by a veterinary surgeon duly appointed in that behalf, and by the said Commissioner or Commissioners, and such veterinary surgeon and Commissioner or Commissioners shall ascertain, by inspection, inquiry, and such other means as may be necessary, whether or not such cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals, or any of them, are infected, and if it be found that none of them is infected shall grant a certificate accordingly; and no cattle, sheep, or pigs, or other animals shall be landed from the ship until such certificate shall have been granted in respect of them.

4. If any cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals on board the ship be found to be infected, they shall be forthwith destroyed, whether intended to be landed year 1878. or not.

5. All cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals found on inspection to be free from infection shall be washed and disinfected as the Commissioner or Commissioners shall direct, and shall be conveyed by | January, 1879-Robt. R. Jones.

water at the importer's expense to the quarantine station set apart for imported stock.

6. No fodder put on board of the ship, with or for the use of any cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals, shall be landed in this colony.

7. All fittings used on board of the importing ship for, with, or about any cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals, and all effects belonging to their attendants, shall be disinfected as the Commissioner or Commissioners may direct.

8. Imported cattle, sheep, or pigs intended to be landed in Queensland shall remain in quarantine for a period of not less than ninety days, during which time they shall be washed and disinfected as the Commissioner or Commissioners shall direct, and such cattle, sheep, or pigs shall not be released from quarantine until they shall have been examined by a veterinary surgeon and Commissioner and declared to be free from infection, nor until the owner or importer shall have proved to the satisfaction of the Commissioner or Commissioners that all the conditions of these regulations and of any Proclamation made under the said Act have been complied with, and shall have paid all charges incurred in connection with the detention of such sheep, cattle, or pigs in quarantine.

9. All cattle, sheep, pigs, or other animals put on board of any ship for the use of the crew or passengers, and removed to quarantine, shall remain there until the vessel is about to leave the port, when they may be re-shipped, on the order of the Commissioner or Commissioners, at the expense of the master of the ship.

10. These regulations shall not apply to any cattle, sheep, or pigs introduced or imported into the colony from the Australian Colonies, Tasmania, or New Zealand.

NOTICE is hereby given that a telegraph cable having been laid between the north part of Diamond Island and the mainland to the northward, two posts surmounted with boards, painted white, have been set up—one has been placed where the cable leaves the water, and the other inland of it, in a line with the cable.

Regulations for Surveyors under the Land Transfer Acts.

> General Survey Department, Wellington, 12th February, 1879.

THE following regulations for the guidance of Surveyors licensed with Surveyors, licensed under the Land Transfer Acts, are published for general information.

REGULATIONS FOR THE GUIDANCE OF LICENSED SURVEYORS UNDER THE LAND TRANSFER ACTS.

Surveyor

1. Any plan purporting to be a survey, resurvey, or subdivision of any land, is to be signed by the Surveyor who actually made the measurements in the field, and shall also be verified by statutory declaration of the licensed Surveyor employed to make such survey. Such declaration to be in such one of the forms appended as may be appropriate.

2. The necessity for the greatest practical accuracy cannot be too strongly impressed upon Surveyors. In many instances no means will exist by which their errors can be detected by the department. This will make it the more necessary to watch those cases in which errors can be tested; and if their discovery should show that the work of any Surveyor cannot be implicitly relied on, it will become an imperative duty to revoke his license.

3. The Surveyor will be expected to disclose all doubts, discrepancies, and difficulties, and to afford all such other information obtainable by him, relating to the property and the application for Certificate of Title or Transfer, as will aid in insuring accuracy and completeness in the business of the Land Transfer Department. In these matters he will consider himself rather an agent and adviser of the Government than of the person incidentally employing him; nor will a regard to the interests of such employer be considered as excusing in any degree the withholding of any information affecting the merits of the application, even though the description supplied may be literally and technically correct.

Trigonometrical Connections, &c.

4. In districts where triangulation exists, and where the triangulation points have not been obliterated, if a resurvey or subdivision of the whole of a rural section is made for the purposes of the Land Transfer Act, the survey must be connected by traverse or by a subsidiary triangle with the nearest trigonometrical station. If only a portion of a section is being dealt with, this will not be required, but the survey must be connected with at least two of the corners of the original sec-tion. If only part of an allotment on an already deposited plan is being dealt with, then such survey need only be connected with two or more points of thet ellotment presided ellotment the ulletment that allotment, provided always that the allotment has been previously properly connected with two or more points of the original section in such a manner definitely fix the position thereof. as to In towns and cities where permanent bench-marks have been placed, then the survey must be connected both by angular and linear measurement with such benchmarks.

Measurements and Bearings.

5. All measured lines and distances must be shown | chains to 1 inch.

in red, all observed bearings in blue, all calculated bearings or distances in black, the same being written along the lines. Included angles will only be ad-missible in such districts where minor triangulation does not exist, or where the original stations have been lost, and where the standard points for obtaining the meridian have not been re-established, or in the subdivision of small allotments.

Tie-lines in lieu of angles will only be admissible in the subdivision of very small pieces of land.

The true meridian bearing between two or more trigonometrical stations will always be obtained by reference to the survey office of the provincial district.

Irregular Boundaries.

6. Where the boundary consists of natural features they must be traversed, unless they form the boundary of the original section and have been traversed by the Government Surveyor. A re-traverse of such boundaries may, however, be re-quired in cases where the original survey appears to be faulty.

Where an irregular boundary is defined by offsets measured thereto from one or more survey lines, the Surveyor must furnish the distance along such line or lines at which offsets have been taken and the length of such offsets.

Should a property be bounded on one or more sides by natural features of which a retraverse is not required, the survey must be closed by traverse-lines or tie-lines in such a manner as will enable the work to be thoroughly checked by the draughtsman.

Reduction of Traverses.

7. All traverse-lines to be mathematically reduced on the meridian and perpendicular of the nearest trigonometrical station, or, if that is not required to be connected with in the survey, on the starting or initial point of the survey. Traverse forms can be had at the Survey Offices, price 6d. per dozen.

Maximum Error.

8. In the subdivision of small areas or town lands 4 links to the mile will be the maximum error allowed, and in the case of the survey of rural land 8 links to the mile; bearings must close to two or three minutes, according to the nature of the survey.

Instruments and Chains.

9. All bearings must be observed with a serviceable and adjusted theodolite; the chain must be tested, and corrected before survey to the Government standard.

Size of Plan.

10. Deposited plans, if not indorsed on an application or instrument, must be either on antiquarian or mounted drawing paper 30 inches by 30 inches, 20 inches by 20 inches, or 10 inches by 15 inches, cut so that due North is perpendicular to the paper, which must be the exact size named to fit the office portfolios.

For the smaller sizes protracting sheets can be obtained at the Survey Office of the provincial dis-trict, price 9s. per dozen. Plan to accompany application, transfer, lease, or mortgage when not drawn on the form, to be 15 inches by 10 inches.

Scale of Plan.

11. Plans of allotments containing 1 to 10 perches, $\frac{1}{2}$ chain to 1 inch; 10 to 20 perches, 1 chain to 1 inch; 20 perches to 1 acre, 2 chains to 1 inch; 1 acre to 10 acres, 5 chains to 1 inch; 10 acres to 320 acres, 10 chains to 1 inch; 320 acres and above, 20 achains to 1 inch; 320 acres and above, 20

Portion of Original Allotment or Section.

12. Where the land forms a part of two or more original allotments or sections, the boundaries of such allotments or sections must be shown by a distinguishing colour.

Adjoining Proprietors.

13. The sectional or allotment numbers, with the names of the owners or occupiers of adjoining lands, whenever obtainable, should be written on the plan, and inquiries, if necessary, must be made for that purpose, by the Surveyor. Names of adjoining proprietors may be dispensed with in surveys for subdivisional purposes, under section 107 of the Land Transfer Act.

Boundary Wall or Fence.

14. If a boundary is a wall it must be shown whether it is a party-wall, and whether the line runs through the centre or otherwise. The true position of all boundary fences must be shown, and the nature of the boundary of the land, whether wall, house, fence, ditch, hedge, stream, road, or undefined, should be stated.

Detail of Plan.

15. Every plan must exhibit, distinctly delineated, all roads, streets, passages, thoroughfares, squares, or reserves, appropriated or set apart for public use, and also show all allotments into which the said land may be divided, marked with distinct numbers.

The nature of the boundary, viz., roads, reserves, sections, natural features, &c., should be shown.

All measurements must be given in links.

Description.

16. An accurate description of the boundaries of the land must be furnished with each plan.

Distinctive Colours.

17. Roads and streets to be coloured with burnt sienna; rights-of-way, crimson lake; edge of land to be dealt with, green ; water, prussian blue. Where natural features, such as terraces, are shown as the boundary of an allotment or section, they should be coloured with sepia.

Field Books.

18. If required, the Licensed Surveyor must produce his actual field-book, for the inspection of the officer checking his work.

Difference in Measurements.

19. The actual measurements made in the field must be given, notwithstanding that they may not agree with the Crown grant or public map, and, should the difference be material, the measured distance and bearing to the next adjacent Crown grant boundary is to be furnished, in order to determine whether there is any real encroachment, or whether the differences arise from former defective surveys. The license of any Surveyor will be cancelled if it is found that the measurements or bearings, certified by him as correct, differ materially from those which exist on the ground. And, in dealing with this subject, the Surveyor must adhere to the principle of the unchangeableness of original lines and corners established by Government or other duly autho-rized Surveyors done in good faith: in other words where the lines and corners are originally established on the ground by a proper officer, in pursuance of the survey system ordered by the law of the time, they must be regarded as the true lines and corners which they represent, even if subsequent surveys indicate that the posts, pegs, or marks are out of line and that the corners are out of position, according to the original description thereof.

Transfer Acts, differs materially from the Crown grant or public map, the Chief Surveyor, before altering or rectifying the records of his department to enable a correct certificate of title to be issued, will, if he deem it necessary, require a verifying survey to be made by another Surveyor, to be approved of by him, to determine the correctness or otherwise of the deposited or of the original survey.

Declaration.

21. Declaration to be made on the margin of the larger, and on the margin or back of the smaller plans.

Pegging off Surveys; and Old Marks.

22. All surveys under the Land Transfer Act to be substantially pegged on the ground, such pegs to be not less than 3 in. by 2 in. scantling of the heart of totara, kowhai, blue gum, kauri, or matai (black pine), not less than 18 inches long, to be driven 15 inches into the ground, the hole having driven 15 inches into the ground, the hole having first been driven by an iron jumper; the pegs to be branded with the allotment number, with not less than 1-inch figures branded one-eighth of an inch into the wood. At frontage pegs of rural and suburban lands, when practicable, trenches at least 2 feet long, 9 inches deep, 9 inches wide, and not loss then 2 feet therefrom to be out in direction of less than 2 feet therefrom, to be cut in direction of boundary lines.

The position of the pegs to be shown on the plan by a red circle; old pegs, when found, by a black circle; the position of lockspits or other original marks to be shown on plans if necessary. In all cases in which lands are subdivided for townships exceeding 20 chains square, at least four iron pegs, not less than 1 inch square and 18 inches long, reciprocally visible from one another, should be driven in the street 25 links off the section lines, to which reference may be made in cases of dispute. Where the boundaries on the ground differ materially from the Crown grant boundaries, such Crown grant boundaries to be shown by dotted black lines.

Prior Surveys.

23. Legislative Council Standing Orders relative to Local Bills,

Legislative Council,

1st February, 1879. IN accordance with a resolution of the Legislative Council, the following Standing Order L Council, the following Standing Orders relative to Local Bills are published for general information.

L. STOWE, Clerk of the Legislative Council.

STANDING ORDERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL RELATIVE TO LOCAL BILLS.

1. Local Bills are those which not being such as require to be introduced as Private Bills, are yet Bills specially affecting local interests and dealing with private rights, or with public reserves for local and municipal purposes; also Bills altering the constitution, election, or powers of local public bodies.

2. There shall be a Standing Committee, to consist of five members, to be called the "Local Bills Committee," to which shall stand referred, after their first reading, all Bills which may appear to the Speaker to come within the description given in the preceding Order. Such Committee shall, in the case of every Bill referred to it, decide whether the same comes within the definition of a Local Bill; and, if so, whether the conditions laid down in Orders 3, 4,

and 5 have been complied with. 3. No Local Bill shall be introduced into the Legislative Council by any member later than two months after the commencement of the session.

4. The member in charge of a Local Bill shall produce to the Local Bills Committee satisfactory evidence that the intention to introduce the Bill and the purport of the same has been made public in the locality whose interests are affected, by advertisement in a local newspaper, at least four times in four successive weeks. When the Bill specially affects the interests of any private individual, evidence shall also be produced that personal notice to the effect above stated has been given to such individual.

5. When a Local Bill refers to an exchange of or other dealing with any Crown lands, or with a public reserve, the member in charge thereof shall also produce a certified map, on a scale of not less than 20 chains to an inch, showing the land or reserve in question, and the mode in which it is proposed to deal with the same. When any Schedule containing a description of any land is attached to such Bill, it shall be accompanied by a certificate of its correct-ness from an officer of the Survey Department or other duly-authorized Surveyor.
