

Lands declared to be Waste Lands of the Crown.

JAMES PRENDERGAST. (L.S.) Administrator of the Government. A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by the seventeenth section of "The Waste Lands Administration Act, 1876," it is enacted that, whenever the Governor is satisfied that any lands purchased out of the sums authorized under "The Immigration and Public Works Act, 1870," and any Act amending the same, to be issued and expended in the purchase of lands in the North Island of New Zealand, are free from Native claims and all difficulties in connection therewith, he shall, by Proclamation, declare such lands to be waste lands of the Crown. subject, except as thereafter in the said Act provided, to be sold and dealt with according to the provisions of the laws regulating the sale and disposal of waste lands of the Crown for the time being in force in the land district in which such land is situated; and thereupon such land so proclaimed shall become subject to such provisions :

And whereas the lands described in the Schedule hereto have been purchased out of the sums authorized under "The Immigration and Public Works Act, 1870," and Acts amending the same, and it is expe-dient that the said land should be declared to be waste lands of the Crown:

Now, therefore, I, James Prendergast, Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, being satisfied that the lands described in the Schedule hereto are free from Native claims and all difficulties in connection therewith, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by "The Waste Lands Administration Act, 1876," do hereby proclaim and declare the said lands to be waste lands of the Crown, subject to be sold and dealt with according to the provisions of the laws regulating the sale and disposal of waste lands of the Crown in force in the Land District of Auckland.

Regulations for the Management of Penny Savings Banks.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE GO-VERNMENT IN COUNCIL.

BY virtue of the powers and authorities vested in me by "The Education Act, 1877," I, James Prendergast, Esquire, the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, do hereby make the following regulations for the management of Penny Savings Banks established for the use of children attending public schools, that is to say,— 1. The Penny Bank shall be under the manage-

1. The Penny Bank shall be under the management of a trustee, a treasurer, and at least one other person, all of whom shall be appointed by the School Committee, and who are hereinafter termed the "managers." In all cases the headmaster, or (with the consent of the headmaster) one of the other teachers of the school, shall be one of the managers. But no Penny Bank shall be opened until the treasurer has furnished, to the satisfaction of the School Committee and the Education Board, security for his intromissions as treasurer, of such amount as shall be fixed by the Committee with the express approval of the Board, and no treasurer shall thereafter take office until he shall have furnished approved security as herein provided.

2. The deposits of the Penny Bank, excepting a balance not exceeding twenty shillings, shall be invested on the day of, or the day after, receipt, in an account to be opened in the nearest Post Office Savings Bank in the names of the trustee and treasurer of the School Penny Bank. 3. The Penny Bank shall be open for the receipt

3. The Penny Bank shall be open for the receipt and repayment of deposits on the days and during the hours to be fixed by the School Committee, when not less than two of the managers shall attend, one to enter the transactions in the depositors' books, and the other to receive the deposits, to make repayments, and to enter the transactions in the journal; or, if two managers cannot attend, one of the depositors who may be qualified shall be appointed to act along with the manager in attendance. The depositors qualified for the duty may be appointed in turn by the Managers to make the entries in the passbooks, and to post the entries from the journal into the ledger; but the money must be received and the transactions entered in the journal by the treasurer, trustee, or other manager.

4. Deposits of one penny and upwards may be received.

5. Every depositor shall be supplied, on making his first deposit, with a deposit-book free of charge, in which the depositor's name, and the number of the space in which the account will appear in the ledger, shall be written. The deposit will then be entered and the entry initialled by the officer appointed to the duty.

6. The deposit-book must be presented every time that money is deposited or withdrawn.

7. Depositors may withdraw all or any portion of their deposits on giving one week's notice any bank day, and leaving their deposit-book with the managers in attendance.

8. No depositor shall be allowed to have more than $\pounds 5$ in the bank at one time; and when his deposits amount to $\pounds 2$ he shall be recommended to open a separate account in his own name in the Post Office Savings Bank. A depositor may, if he desires to do so, open an account in his own name in the Post Office Savings Bank when his deposits amount to five shillings.

9. If a depositor loses his book he shall give immediate notice of the loss to the treasurer, and, if it should not afterwards be found, a new book shall be supplied at a charge of one penny.

10. At the close of the Savings Bank business the totals of the receipts and payments shall be entered in the journal, and the cash balanced, as shown in the specimen account given in the journal itself. The balance shall be witnessed by the two managers, or by the manager and the depositor, in attendance.

11. In the ledger a separate account shall be opened for each depositor, showing the number of the deposit-book issued to him and his name. The deposits and withdrawals shall be posted from the journal into the ledger when the transactions take place, or soon afterwards.

12. When a depositor's book has been filled up a new book shall be issued to him free of charge; and when the space allotted to an account in the ledger is filled up the account shall be closed, and the balance transferred to a new space in the ledger, and to a new deposit-book bearing a corresponding number. (The instructions in the journal show how such a transfer is to be accounted for.)

13. A monthly return of the number and amount of deposits, the number and amount of withdrawals, the number of accounts opened and closed, and the number of accounts remaining open, shall be furnished at the close of every month to the School Committee of the district.

14. The ledger shall be balanced to the 30th June and to the 31st December in each year, and on the 31st December the interest allowed (if any), together with the balance at the credit of each account, shall be inserted in the ledger, and the balance brought forward as shown in the directions for balancing the ledger; and these entries shall be initialled by the officer who makes them.

15. A copy of the general account of the Penny Bank for the year ending 31st December, together with the balance-sheet and profit and loss account, audited by the same person and in the same manner provided for the auditing of School Committees' accounts by Order in Council, 23rd January, 1878, shall be forwarded to the School Committee, and also to the Education Board of the district, in the following month of January.

16. The summary, or list of accounts prepared for the purpose of proving the ledger in accordance with the instructions given in the ledger, shall be open to the inspection of depositors at any time, for the purpose of enabling them to satisfy themselves that their deposits have been properly accounted for.

17. All the depositors' books shall be compared by one of the managers with the ledger and ledger summary after the annual balance has been completed, when the interest allowed (if any), and the balance, shall be copied from the ledger into each depositor's book. These entries in the depositor's book must be initialled by the manager who makes them.

be used hereunder shall be supplied by the Minister of Education.

19. Interest may be allowed to each depositor, at a rate to be fixed by the School Committee on the recommendation of the managers, on every complete deposit, fixed in like manner by the School Committee. Such interest shall be calculated from the first day of the month following that in which the deposits are made to the last day of the month preceding that in which they are withdrawn; but it is recommended that no interest be allowed during the first year after the establishment of the Penny Bank.

20. The operations of the bank shall not in any

way interfere with school work. 21. Strict secrecy must be observed respecting all deposits.

22. These regulations shall come into force upon the date hereof.

SIR,—I have the honor to transmit to you the accompanying copy of a letter which I have received from His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, relative to the part taken by certain of Her Majesty's colonies in the Paris Exhibition, together with a copy of the letter which I have addressed to His Royal Highness in ronly. Highness in reply.

H.R.H. THE PRINCE OF WALES TO SIR MICHAEL HICKS BEACH.

Marlborough House, Pall Mall, S.W.,

9th December, 1878. SIR,-The labours of the International Juries of the Paris Universal Exhibition having been completed, and the Exhibition brought to a close, I desire to bring under your notice the action taken by the various Colonial Governments in response to the invitation forwarded to them to take part in the Paris Universal

Exhibition of 1878. Notwithstanding the numerous calls made upon the British Colonies of late years to take part in the various International Exhibitions, the amount of zeal and energy that have been shown in their response on this occasion has not been previously

equalled, and is highly gratifying to notice. Influential local Commissions were appointed by the representatives of Her Majesty in the several colonies, the necessary funds were liberally voted by the respective Legislatures, and administrative and executive Commissioners appointed to select and arrange contributions that should be worthy of the occasion, and to carry out their other responsible duties.

thus made is shown in the satisfactory results of the collective exhibits arranged by the colonies.

The aggregate expenditure of the Colonial Commissions that has been provided for by the sums voted by the various Legislatures and Crown Colonies is estimated at £80,000. The demands made for space on the part of the colonies, especially the Dominion of Canada and Australia, were so large that great difficulty was found in providing for them, and ultimately a part of the grand vestibule, in addition to the dome, which was the post of honour allotted to the Indian Empire, was ceded to some of the smaller colonies.

The arrangements of the Dominion of Canada, which included all Her Majesty's possessions on the American Continent, were carried out by Mr. Thomas Keefer, C.E., C.M.G., on a scale far sur-passing any previous representation of British America.

The cases and fittings of native woods were most effective and striking, as were the enormous sections of Douglas pines sent from British Columbia. The woods and minerals, the products of the fisheries, of agriculture, and of manufacturing industry so successfully arranged by Mr. Selwyn, Director of the Geological Survey, were of a very important character, and received high awards from the Juries. The Educational Department, under the skilful superintendence of Dr. May and Mr. W. E. Archambault, was particularly well represented, and gained two diplomas of honor and six gold medals; and the Ministers of Public Works and of Agriculture were also honored with diplomas and gold medals.

The African Colonies were represented by the Cape of Good Hope, under the management of Mr. Spencer Todd, C.M.G., and by Lagos, under Mr. Arthur H. Porter. The unsettled position of affairs African exhibition, and prevented the Colonial Government from devoting to it so large a parlia-mentary grant as would have been necessary to secure a really perfect display of the resources of this colony, and of the great progress it has made since the date of the last Paris Exhibition. Samples of almost every South African product were, how-ever, shown. Three exhibitors of wines gained gold medals. Wool, mohair, angora hair, hides, and leather were represented by small but well-chosen specimens, and the only undressed ostrich feathers to be found in the exhibition were in the court of The success of the general and individual efforts] the Cape Colony, illustrating an industry which has developed in a most remarkable manner of recent years. Carefully-selected specimens of the diamonds found in the mines of Griqualand West were also exhibited, and the mineral wealth of South Africa was well represented by a beautiful nugget of Transvaal gold, by coal from Queenstown, copper ore from Namaqualand, manganese ore from Wellington, and cobalt ore from the Transvaal.

The Educational Class was also well filled with maps, drawings, specimens of printing and bookbinding, and interesting ethnological studies.

Perhaps one of the most striking exhibits from the colonies was the representation made by Her Majesty's dependencies at the antipodes. Australia and New Zealand have advanced with great strides since the last Exhibition in Paris. These provinces of the Empire, with a population of over two and a half millions, have an external commerce exceeding ninety millions a year, the greater part of which is with Great Britain and her dependencies. It is not, therefore, surprising that the enterprise of these colonies should have brought them prominently forward at this international competition, and that each made a creditable display of its own products and ndustry.

ndustry. New South Wales, the oldest Australian Colony, exhibited the magnitude of her natural resources in her splendid display of wool, for which she gained a grand prix; in her display of coal, with which she supplies the countries of the Pacific; for her scientific display of mineralogical and natural history collections by Professor Liversedge; and for the excellence of her varied branches of manufactures. The Hon. Edward Combes, M.P., C.M.G., late Minister for Public Works, the Executive Commissioner for New South Wales, remained in continuous care of the exhibits of this important colony during the whole period of the Exhibition.

The energy and industry of the colonists of Victoria is remarkably shown by the great number and varied character of her exhibits. Representations of the enormous wealth attained through her gold discoveries are only evidences of the future riches which will accrue to her from the encouragement of her industrial resources. Wools, woollen fabrics, silk, wines, carriages, preserved meats and provisions, and almost every branch of industry was here represented. The Hon. J. J. Casey, M.P., C.M.G., President of the Victoria Commission, superintended the arrangement of the collections sent from his colony until his return to Victoria, after which his duties were performed by Mr. G. Collins Levey, C.M.G., the Secretary to the Commission.

The great natural resources of South Australia are shown by her exhibits of wheat, wool, gold, copper, wine, and oil. South Australia, as on some former occasions, received the highest award for her magnificent collection of wheat and a gold medal for flour. The granary of Australia, she also furnishes to the mother-country some of the finest description of grain. For her merino wool, amongst other prizes, a gold medal was awarded. The exhibits of gold and of native and manufactured copper attracted considerable attention and received suitable awards, whilst the wines and oil shown give promise of a rich reward to capitalists and labour. Mr. Josiah Boothby, C.M.G., Under Secretary to the Government of South Australia, ably represented the colony throughout.

Queensland has shown the variety and magnitude of her resources in a display of wool, sugar, minerals, pearl shell, and other articles of indigenous produce, which secured a large number of awards.

Queensland was represented by Mr. A. Macalister, C.M.G., Chairman of the Commission, the Agent-General in London, and by Mr. A. Hodgson, C.M.G.

Western Australia exhibited a small collection of general products, but was exceedingly important in its splendid exhibit of Jarrah-Jarrah and other forest timber not surpassed for its imperishable qualities, and which is obtainable in great abundance. The exhibits of this colony were placed under the charge of the Secretary of the Royal Commission.

New Zealand, represented by Mr. T. P. Russell, sent only a small collection.

The International Juries have placed on record the merits of the above-mentioned colonial exhibitions by the number and importance of the medals and honorary rewards voted, which far exceed those granted at any previous exhibition.

The youngest of our British possessions, the Fiji Islands, was awarded several gold medals for the quality of its cotton.

Of the Eastern colonies, Ceylon sent the finest collection of produce, native manufactures, and jewellery ever yet exhibited. These were arranged by Sir Charles P. Layard, K.C.M.G.

The Straits Settlements, for the first time since their establishment as a separate colonial Government, made an interesting representative collection. Mauritius, with its dependencies, the Seychelles Islands, represented by Mr. Gustave Adam, Mr. Alphonse Lucas, and Mr. Edward Elias, obtained relatively the highest awards in general, and *especially* for the article upon which the industry of their populations is concentrated, and the only grand prize awarded to cane sugars was won by Mauritius, in addition to five gold medals for the same produce, and a gold medal for vanilla.

The only West India Colonies which took part in the Exhibition were Jamaica, British Guiana, and Trinidad. The principal products shown were sugar, rum, coffee, and specimens of woods. Each of these colonies gained a considerable number of medals, indicating a fair average of excellence.

British Guiana was represented by Mr. William Walker, and Trinidad by Dr. J. Court. These exhibits from Western Australia, Jamaica, the Straits Settlements, and Seychelles, with British Guiana, Trinidad, and Lagos, were placed under the charge of Sir Philip Cunliffe Owen, as Secretary of the Royal Commission. He has been mainly assisted by Captain Harris, Royal Engineers, whose valuable and efficient services to the colonies generally Sir Philip has never failed to bring specially under my notice, whilst, for the technical arrangements and immediate superintendence of the collection from these abovementioned colonies, Mr. P. L. Simmonds was well qualified, by his official services at previous Exhibitions and his thorough knowledge of colonial products, to bring these collections prominently before the International Juries.

Nearly all the colonies published and circulated valuable descriptive catalogues, which afforded most useful information to visitors, and these were freely distributed, with many other colonial publications of scientific or popular character.

Considering that the number of exhibitors was more limited, the colonies have carried away a larger proportion of medals than the mother-country.

Taking advantage of the presence in Paris of a number of gentlemen qualified by their personal experience to judge colonial produce, I secured the services of the following Colonial Commissioners upon the International Juries :---

These gentlemen at the same time gave valuable assistance to the juries of their respective classes, were watchful for the interests of the several colonies that they represented, and no less careful for the interests of the exhibitors from the mother-country.

In conclusion, I desire to bring under your notice the copy of an address from the Executive Com-missioners of the colonies which I had the pleasure of receiving at the British Embassy during my last stay in Paris. In the copy of my reply you will observe that I have expressed my satisfaction at the proposed formation of a Colonial Museum, and my readiness to co-operate in any scheme which may have received the mature consideration of the respective colonies.

5. With reference to the proposed Colonial Museum in London, referred to in the address from the Executive Commissioners of the Colonies to your Royal Highness, I have the honor to state that I shall be ready to co-operate, on the part of the Crown Colonies, so far as their means will permit, on learning that the important colonies enjoying responsible Government are prepared to deal with

the suggestion made by the gentlemen in Paris in a manner which would appear to me to promise success.

6. I shall have much pleasure in transmitting a copy of this correspondence to the Governors of all the colonies, and in including it among the papers to be presented to Parliament in relation to Her Majesty's colonial possessions.

The number of births registered in these boroughs in 1878 amounted to 3,622, equal to 43.13 per 1,000 of the aggregate mean population of the boroughs, against 3,618, or 45.0 per 1,000 of the population in 1877. The births in 1876 amounted to 3,622. There has thus been a gradual decrease in the birth-rate per 1,000 of the population. It may be of interest to compare this birth-rate with the birth-rate in England. In 1875 the birth-rate in England and Wales was 35.5 per 1,000 persons living; but in the County of Durham (this county having the highest birth-rate in the kingdom) the birth-rate was 45.5 per 1,000. In Durham the married women comprised 60 per cent. of all the women at the ages 15-45. In the New Zealand boroughs stated the married women amounted to 55.8 per cent. of all the women at the ages 15-45. The proportions may be stated as follows:—

The deaths in 1878 amounted to 1,232, against 1,329 in 1877; a decrease in 1878 of 97 deaths. Allowing for the difference in population, these numbers represent a death-rate in 1878 of 14.68 per 1,000 of population, and in 1877 of 16.53 per 1,000. There was a reduction in the death-rates in each of the boroughs except Christchurch. In that borough the death-rate was 15.50 in 1877, and 16.23 in 1878. The deaths in the boroughs of children under 1 year amounted in 1878 to 426, or 11.76 per cent. of the births, against 11.25 per cent. in 1877, and 13.77 per cent. in 1876. The deaths under 1 year amounted to 31.98 per cent. of the total deaths, against 30.62 in 1877, and 33.8 in 1876.

There were not any deaths in the boroughs during 1878 from measles or small-pox. Scarlet fever which caused so large a mortality (99 deaths) in 1877, only caused 9 deaths in 1878; these occurred in Christchurch and Dunedin. The mortality in Dunedin from dysentery and diarrhea was exceedingly low as compared with that in the other boroughs, there having been only 6 deaths from that cause out of 111 deaths, although the population of that borough amounts to considerably more than one-fourth of the aggregate population of all the boroughs. Similarly, the mortality in Dunedin from typhoid fever is low compared with that in the other large boroughs. The mortality from this cause in all the boroughs fell from 32, in 1877, to 24, in 1878.

Legislative Council Standing Orders relative to Local Bills.

Legislative Council,

1st February, 1879.

IN accordance with a resolution of the Legislative Council, the following Standing Orders relative to Local Bills are published for general information.

> L. STOWE, Clerk of the Legislative Council.

STANDING ORDERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL RELATIVE TO LOCAL BILLS.

1. Local Bills are those which not being such as require to be introduced as Private Bills, are yet Bills specially affecting local interests and dealing with private rights, or with public reserves for local and municipal purposes; also Bills altering the constitution, election, or powers of local public bodies.

2. There shall be a Standing Committee, to consist of five members, to be called the "Local Bills Committee," to which shall stand referred, after their first reading, all Bills which may appear to the Speaker to come within the description given in the preceding Order. Such Committee shall, in the case of every Bill referred to it, decide whether the same comes within the definition of a Local Bill; and, if so, whether the conditions laid down in Orders 3, 4, and 5 have been complied with.

3. No Local Bill shall be introduced into the Legislative Council by any member later than two months after the commencement of the session.

4. The member in charge of a Local Bill shall produce to the Local Bills Committee satisfactory evidence that the intention to introduce the Bill and the purport of the same has been made public in the locality whose interests are affected, by advertisement in a local newspaper, at least four times in four successive weeks. When the Bill specially affects the interests of any private individual, evidence shall also be produced that personal notice to the effect above stated has been given to such individual.

5. When a Local Bill refers to an exchange of or other dealing with any Crown lands, or with a public reserve, the member in charge thereof shall also produce a certified map, on a scale of not less than 20 chains to an inch, showing the land or reserve in question, and the mode in which it is proposed to deal with the same. When any Schedule containing a description of any land is attached to such Bill, it shall be accompanied by a certificate of its correctness from an officer of the Survey Department or other duly-authorized Surveyor.

WHEREAS by subsections four and five of the W fifty-first section of "The Mines Act, 1877," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, subject to the provisions of the said Act, from time to time to make, alter, amend, and revoke rules and regulations for regulating the depasturing of stock within any lands within mining districts for which a lease or license for depasturing purposes has not been granted, or has been cancelled or suspended, and the number of horses or cattle which may be run and the number of norses or cattle which may be run upon such lands by the holders of miner's rights and business licenses, or of mining and agricultural leases, or by other persons, and for the issue of depas-turing licenses, and to regulate the fees that shall be paid therefor, and for imposing penalties in respect to the breach of any such regulations : for imposing penalties upon the owners of cattle illegally depas-turing on such lands, and for recovering from such owners, in addition to any of the aforesaid penalties owners, in addition to any of the aforesaid penalties, all the costs and charges incident to the collecting and recovering such cattle: And whereas by the sixth section of "The Mines Act, 1877," it is enacted that, until the Governor shall otherwise order, every gold field duly proclaimed or constituted at the time of the commencement of the said Act shall be and be deemed to be a mining district under the said Act: And whereas by the one hundredth section of "The Mines Act, 1877," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor to delegate to the Chairman of the County Council in the mining district in which such county is situate all the powers vested in the Governor by subsections four and five of the fifty-first section of the said Act and in like manner to alter or revoke such delegation: And whereas the Governor hath, by delegation given under his hand and the seal of the Colony of New Zealand on the eleventh day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, and duly published in the New Zealand Gazette on the twelfth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, in exercise of the powers vested in him by the said Act, delegated unto the Chairman for the time being of the County Council of Lake all the powers vested in the Go-vernor by section fifty-one of "The Mines Act, 1877," of making, altering, amending, and revoking rules and regulations for the purposes contained in subsections four and five of the said section fifty-one, and hath declared that the powers thereby delegated shall be exercised and performed only within the said County of Lake, excepting that portion of the said county comprised within the boundaries of the Car-drona Commonage, and by and with the consent of the County Council of the said County of Lake: And whereas the County Council of the County of Lake have determined to make, proclaim, and declare the regulations hereinafter mentioned :

Now, therefore, I, John Edgar, Chairman of the County Council of Lake, by and with the consent of the County Council of the said county, and by virtue and in exercise of the power delegated to the Chairman for the time being of the County Council of Lake, do hereby make, proclaim, and declare the regulations hereinafter mentioned for the depasturing of stock on any lands (excepting that portion of the said county comprised within the boundaries of the Cardrona Commonage) within the said County of Lake, for which a lease or license for depasturing purposes has not been granted or has been cancelled or suspended.

REGULATIONS.

1. Interpretation.

In these regulations the words "great cattle" shall be construed to mean and include horned cattle, horses, mules, and asses, male and female, and the offspring thereof above six months of age; and the words "small cattle" shall be construed to mean sheep and goats, male and female, and the weaned offspring thereof; and the word "district" shall mean one of the depasturing districts described in the First Schedule hereto, and every other district which may hereafter be proclaimed within the County of Lake.

2. Miner's Right and Business License Holders may run Cattle.

Every holder of a miner's right issued within the county or any borough therein, and every holder of a business license occupying land by virtue of such license within the county, shall be entitled to run two head of great cattle free of assessment fees.

3. Agricultural Lessees.

Holders of agricultural leases within the county shall be entitled to run great cattle free of assessment fees in proportion to the acreage of their leases, as follows :---

For a lease of fifty acres, or any less quantity, one head;

For every additional fifty acres, one head.

4. Depasturing Licenses.

Holders of miners' rights or business licenses, and agricultural lessees, within the county may run great or small cattle (except bulls and entire horses as hereinafter mentioned) therein, in excess of the number which they are entitled to run free of assessment fees, on obtaining a depasturing license under these regulations; and other persons resident in such county, not being holders of miners' rights or business licenses, or such lessees as aforesaid, may run cattle within any district on obtaining a depasturing license under these regulations.

5. Application to be made.

Persons desirous of obtaining a depasturing license must lodge with the Clerk of the County Council an application in writing in the form contained in the Second Schedule hereto; and deposit therewith the assessment and registration fees payable under these Regulations. If such application is refused the assessment and registration fees shall be repaid to the applicant, but not otherwise.

6. Application how dealt with.

If the application shall be to depasture not more than five head of great cattle, exclusive of cattle running free of charge as hereinafter provided, or of other cattle for which a depasturing license has previously been granted to the applicant, the Clerk of the County Council may, with the consent and approval of the chairman, forthwith issue a depasturing license to the applicant; but, if such application shall be for depasturing any larger number of great cattle than aforesaid, or for depasturing small cattle, the Clerk shall submit the same to the County Council at the next ordinary meeting thereof, and the County Council shall determine whether such application shall be granted or refused.

7. Assessment Fees.

The assessment fees payable annually under these regulations shall be :---

For every head of great cattle ... 5s. For every head of small cattle ... 1s. And when six months or more of the annual period shall have expired, only one-half of the above fees shall be charged.

8. Duration and Form of License.

Depasturing licenses granted under these Regulations shall be signed by the Chairman of the County Council, and shall remain in force only until the 31st day of December next following the date thereof; and such licenses shall be in the form contained in the Third Schedule hereto.

9. Registration.

All cattle depastured in a district under these regulations, whether running free of assessment or by virtue of a depasturing license, must be branded, and the brands and a description of the cattle must be registered with the Clerk of the County Council. The fee for every such registration shall be one shilling, and a certificate of registration in the form of the Fourth Schedule hereto shall be given to persons entitled to run cattle free of assessment fees as aforesaid.

10. Register to be kept.

The Clerk of the County Council shall keep a register of brands and a list of depasturing licenses and registration certificates issued, with the date of issue, and the names of the licensees and certificate holders, the qualification under which any cattle are to be run free of assessment fees, and the quantity and description of stock which each person is authorized to depasture, and such register shall be kept in the Council offices, and may be inspected at any time by the public.

11. Copy of Register to be exhibited.

The Clerk shall exhibit a copy of the register of brands at the Post-office within the county in or adjoining each district.

12. Brands previously registered.

If the brand described in any application has previously been registered by any other person, the applicant shall amend his application by inserting therein some other brand not previously registered.

13. Diseased Cattle prohibited.

No diseased cattle shall be depastured upon, nor shall any pigs be allowed at large within any district; and any person or persons who shall turn out or depasture any diseased cattle or suffer any pig to be at large within any district shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for the first offence, and to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for any second or subsequent offence.

14. Bulls and Entire Horses not to be depastured.

No bull over the age of six months, or entire horse over the age of twelve months, shall be depas-tured within a district and whoever shall be guilty of a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

15. No Goats to be depastured without Consent of Council.

No goats shall be depastured within any district without the consent, in writing, of the Lake County Council, such consent to be notified by the Clerk to the Council to the person wishing to depasture such goats.

16. Removal of Cattle, &c.

Any person desirous of removing great or small cattle within, from, or to any district shall, before doing so, give notice in writing of such intention to the Clerk of the Council, or to such person as may be duly authorized by the Council, in writing, in this behalf; and such person shall also, in such notice,

give full particulars of the brands of the cattle to be removed; and the person giving such notice, or his servant, shall not drive or take away any cattle except such as shall be specified in the said notice.

17. Mustering Stock in District.

It shall be lawful for the Council to authorize a. partial or general muster of the stock within any district or part of any district, and the owner or owners of stock illegally depasturing great or small cattie thereon shall be liable for the expenses incurred in so mustering.

18. Licenses not to be issued to Minors, &c. Depasturing licenses shall not be issued to minors under the age of eighteen years.

19. Penalty for Non-registration, &c.

No person shall depasture cattle, great or small, in a district, unless the same be registered and branded in the manner provided by these regulations; and all cattle depasturing under these regulations shall be and be kept branded with the registered brand of the person authorized to depasture the same in the manner herein provided; and all cattle found in a district unregistered or without such brand shall be deemed to be illegally depastured in such district in contravention of these regulations; and the owner or owners thereof shall, upon conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings per head for every offence for every head of cattle so depastured.

20. Unregistered Cattle may be Impounded.

All pigs or unregistered cattle found in or upon a district may be impounded by any officer of the Council duly authorized in that behalf; and the owner or owners thereof shall, in addition to the penalties provided by these regulations, and to the impounding fees chargeable under any by-law of the County Council for the time being in force, be liable to a charge of five shillings per head for the costs incurred in the collecting and recovering of the same.

21. Penalty for Illegally Depasturing.

Any person depasturing cattle in or upon a dis-trict without a license authorizing the holder thereof in that behalf, and any person depasturing thereon a greater number of cattle than he is entitled to depasture by virtue of such license, or more than by these regulations he is entitled to depasture by virtue of a miner's right, business license, or agricul-tural lease shall, upon conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten shillings per head for each offence for every head of cattle so depastured.

22. Recovery of Penalties.

All fines and penalties incurred under the pro-visions of these regulations may be recovered in a summary way before any two or more Justices of the Peace in the manner provided by "The Justices of the Peace Act, 1866," and any Act or Acts amending the same.
