Land set apart on Deferred Payments in Auckland.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by the fifty-third section of "The Land Act, 1877," it is enacted that the Governor, by Proclamation in the *Gazette*, may from time to time set apart out of any suburban or rural lands such blocks or allotments of land as he shall think fit, and set the same aside for sale on deferred payments, and in such Proclamation may fix a day on which the land shall be open for application; and that he may also in like manner set apart for sale on deferred payments such blocks or allotments as may be recommended by any Land Board, and may also from time to time alter, amend, or revoke any such Proclamation:

And whereas the Land Board of Auckland did, on the twelfth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, pass a resolution recommending that the land described in the Schedule hereto annexed should be set apart for sale on deferred payments:

And whereas it is expedient to give effect to the aforesaid recommendation, and to set apart the said land accordingly:

Now, therefore, I, Sir Hercules George Robert Robinson, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by the above-named Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that the land described in the Schedule hereto is set apart for sale on deferred payments; and that Monday, the eighteenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, shall be the day on which the said land shall be open for application at the Land Office at Auckland, in allotments as surveyed and marked on the survey map in the office of the Chief Surveyor.

And, further, in pursuance of the fifth section of "The Land Act 1877 Amendment Act, 1879," I do hereby fix the price at which the land so described

shall be sold to be the price set opposite each allotment in the Schedule hereto.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by the fifty-third section of "The Land Act, 1877," it is enacted that the

Governor, by Proclamation in the *Gazette*, may from time to time set apart out of any suburban or rural lands such blocks or allotments of land as he shall think fit, and set the same aside for sale on deferred payments, and in such Proclamation may fix a day on which the land shall be open for application; and that he may also in like manner set apart for sale on deferred payments such blocks or allotments as may be recommended by any Land Board, and may also from time to time alter, amend, or revoke any such Proclamation:

Now, therefore, I, Sir Hercules George Robert Robinson, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by the above-named Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that the land described in the Schedule hereto is set apart for sale on deferred payments; and that Monday, the twenty-fifth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, shall be the day on which the said land shall be open for application at the Land Office at New Plymouth, in allotments as surveyed and marked on the survey map in the office of the Chief Surveyor.

In pursuance of section four of "The Land Act 1877 Amendment Act, 1879," I do hereby declare that subsection four of the sixty-third section of

"The Land Act, 1877," shall not apply to any of the lands described in the Schedule hereto.

And, further, in pursuance of the fifth section of "The Land Act 1877 Amendment Act, 1879," I do hereby fix the price at which the land so described shall be sold to be the price set opposite each allotment in the Schedule hereto.

Appointing Trustees under Maori Real Estate Management Acts, 1867 and 1877.

HERCULES ROBINSON, GOVERNOR.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this fourth day of September, 1880.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by "The Maori Real Estate Management Act, 1867" (hereinafter called "the said Act"), it is enacted that, if any title to or interest in any hereditaments shall accrue to any Maoris who or any of whom shall be infants, lunatics, or under legal disability, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, if he think fit, to order that such hereditaments, or any part thereof or interest therein, as shall to the Governor in Council be shown to belong to such infant, or lunatic, or other person under legal disability, shall be vested in trustees, as the Governor in Council shall think fit:

And whereas by "The Maori Real Estate Management Act Amendment Act, 1877," it is provided that in all cases in which no trustee of such estate of any infant Maori prior to the passing of the said last recited Act has been appointed, the Governor may appoint such trustee only on the recommendation of a Judge of the Native Land Court:

And whereas in pursuance of orders bearing dates as contained in the first column of the Schedule hereto, made by the Judges named in the second column thereof, the persons named in the third column were recommended to the Governor as trustees under the said Acts on behalf of the persons named and under the disability described in the fourth column, in respect of the lands described or referred to in the fifth column:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the colony, in exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by the said Acts, doth hereby order that the interests and shares of the persons under disability named in the Schedule hereto, in the several blocks of land referred to therein, shall be and remain vested in the several persons named in the third column thereof as trustees, within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Acts, for the said persons respectively during the term or terms of their minority or other disability; the said parcels of land having the areas and boundaries set forth in the Crown grants, certificates of title, and memorials of ownership affecting the same, and in the record maps in the office of the Surveyor-General.

Vesting a Reserve.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this first day of September, 1880.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS the land mentioned in the Schedule hereto was reserved in connection with the overflow of the River Eyre: And whereas, in the opinion of the Governor, it is expedient to vest the said land in the Road Board of the Eyreton District, as constituted under section ten of "The Canterbury Roads Ordinance, 1872:"

Now, therefore, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, and in exercise of the powers and authorities vested in him by the sixth section of "The Public Reserves Act Amendment Act, 1878," doth hereby declare that, from and after the day of the date hereof, the said reserve shall become vested in the said Road Board of the Eyreton District, in trust for the improvement and protection of the banks of the River Eyre, and for other purposes in connection with the overflow of the said river.

SCHEDULE.

RESERVE 1547 (in red). All that parcel of land in the Christchurch Survey District, Provincial District of Canterbury, containing 631 acres 2 roods, more or less. Bounded—Northward by Sections 8923 and 10173, and by Reserve 1330 (in red); Eastward by road-lines, 4648 links and 1006 links respectively, and by Section 4766; Southward by the River Waimakariri; and Westward by Waimakariri No. 10 Road: and numbered 1547 (in red) on the official map in the Survey Office, Christchurch.

Conditions for Trout Fishing in Maitai and Waimea Rivers, Nelson.

HERCULES ROBINSON, Governor.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby make the following regulations for the Provincial District of Nelson:—

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations shall come into force on the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty.

2. Any holder of a license, as hereinafter mentioned, may fish with rod and line for trout in the Maitai and Waimea Rivers, and their affluents, from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, until the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, but only between the hours of five o'clock in the morning and ten o'clock in the evening.

3. Licenses to fish with rod and line in the said waters will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Nelson Acclimatization Society, and for every license a fee of ten shillings will be charged.

4. No license shall authorize any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that only with rod and line.

5. Any person fishing without a license, or any person who shall on demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any police officer or constable, fail to produce and show to such person, police officer, or constable his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

6. All trout not exceeding seven inches in length taken by any person fishing as aforesaid shall be immediately returned alive to the water; and any person convicted of infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds sterling, and his license shall thereupon become void.

7. Except as aforesaid, no person shall fish or use any net or other engine, instrument, or device for taking fish in any river or stream within the Provincial District of Nelson; and all persons offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

8. Any person who puts, throws, or places, or allows to be put, thrown, or placed, into any river or stream in the said Provincial District of Nelson, any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any matter or liquid deleterious to fish, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

Conditions for Trout Fishing in Otago.

HERCULES ROBINSON, Governor.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Governor doth hereby make the following regulations for the District of Otago:—

1. Any holder of a license may fish with rod and line for trout in all the streams and lakes within and forming the boundaries of the following district (except the Water of Leith), from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, to the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, both inclusive, viz.:—

All that area in the Provincial District of Otago, bounded on the East and South by the ocean, from Shag Point to the mouth of the Mataura River; on the West, South-west, and South by the Mataura River and the Counties of Southland and Wallace; on the North-west by the ocean; and on the North, North-west, and North-east by the Counties of Westland and Waitaki.

2. Any holder of a license may fish with rod and line for trout in the Water of Leith, in the months of November, December, January, and February next ensuing.

3. Licenses to fish with rod and line in the above-described district will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Otago Acclimatization Society at Dunedin, and for every license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged.

4. No license shall authorize any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that only with rod and line.

5. Any person fishing without a license, or any person who shall on demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any ranger, police officer, or constable, fail to produce and show to such person, ranger, police officer, or constable his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

6. All trout not exceeding seven inches in length taken by any person fishing as aforesaid shall be immediately returned alive to the water, and any person convicted of infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds sterling, and his license shall thereupon become void.

7. Except as aforesaid, no person shall fish or use any net or other engine, instrument, or device for taking fish in any lake, river, or stream within the above-described district, and all persons offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

8. Any person who puts, throws, or places, or allows to be put, thrown, or placed, into any lake, river, or stream in the said district, any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any matter or liquid deleterious to fish, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

9. These regulations shall come into force as from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty.

Samoa.—H.M. ship "Danae" reports: Apolima Island is placed on Chart No. 1730 two miles too far to the north-eastward: when the vessel was one mile south of Paluale Sea Reef the right (or south) extreme of Savaii was in line with the centre of Apolima Island, S. 83° E. (magnetic).

The following shoals have been reported by various trading vessels, and the information supplied by the Pilot at Apia:—

4 to 5 fathoms, about twenty-five miles S.E. by $\frac{1}{4}$ S. from Pango Pango Harbour entrance, Tutuila Island.

Existence of these shoals probable, but position doubtful.

Saluafata Harbour is the best harbour in Upolu Island: the northerly swell which makes vessels roll considerably in Apia in the rainy season has little effect on vessels anchored in Saluafata. A plan of the harbour on a large scale has been made by the officers of H.I.G.M. ship "Bismarck."

The entrance may be recognized by the two sand-cays situated on the outer and western reefs, and by Albatross Island; the harbour reefs show plainly, but care must be taken, coming from the eastward, to avoid the dangerous Saluafata Bank. Albatross Island, about 70 feet high, does not show against the dark background. It would be of great convenience if it were marked by a white beacon or whitewashed hut, as it is well situated for giving a bearing to lead in.

Saluafata Bank is connected with the coast reef; it is full of coral knobs, the shortest of which is reported to be only $1\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms under water. Saluafata Bank breaks in a north-easterly swell, and should not be crossed by any vessel.

Suva Harbour.—Two white beacons have been erected as leading marks into Suva Harbour: the lower beacon is placed on the beach, $2\frac{1}{2}$ cables east of Nukumareko Island; the upper is about three-quarters of a mile north of the lower beacon. These beacons in line lead through the entrance, but rather close to the eastern reef. H.M.S. "Danae" found that the upper beacon, its breadth west of the lower beacon, led near midchannel. A vessel leaving Suva at night can have lights placed on the beacons by applying at Na Mbukalou. The upper beacon was blown down in the beginning of the hurricane season, and not erected until the season was over. Two white buoys mark the inner elbow of the eastern reef at the turning point, W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S., one mile and four-tenths of a mile from Na Mbukalou Store; another white buoy marks the 2-fathom patch, lying S. 88° W. one mile from Na Mbukalou. A black buoy marks the extreme of the Spit, S. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., 6 cables from Low Cliff Point. These buoys cannot always be depended on.

Keppel and Boscawen Islands.—A dangerous off-lying patch, on which the sea breaks, lies about two miles from the coast, with the S.W. peak of Keppel Island bearing S.E. by E. The width of the break was about 200 yards, but, as well as could be seen with an indifferent sun, there were several shoal patches off-lying the break one to two cables. As this reef lies right under the lee of the island, it probably does not always break. The white inhabitants live at the S.W. end of large Keppel Island, where there are two flagstuffs, flying respectively the German and English flags. Boscawen and Keppel Islands lie N. by E. and S. by W. from each other, their nearest points being five or six miles apart.

Louisiade Archipelago.—Lieutenant Bower, of H.M.S. "Conflict," reports a group of 22 islets, the same as published in Hydrographic Memorandum No. 2, of 10th May, 1879, as 18 islets, seen by H.M. ship "Comorant." The "Conflict" ran for seven miles along the northern edge of a reef, forming the southern edge of the group, one mile and a half S.W. of Imbert Island. There is a circular reef awash about three-quarters of a mile in diameter.

INDIA—WEST COAST.—DABHOL OR ANJANVEL.—
FIXED LIGHT AT TOLKESHWAR.

NOTICE is hereby given that a light will be exhibited on Tolleshwar Headland (the south shore of Dabhol Creek, known also as Anjanvel or Gopalgad Creek) from the 1st October to 1st June, commencing on the 1st October, 1880.

The light will be a fixed white light, elevated 333 feet above the level of high water, and should be visible in clear weather through an arc of 178°, or between the bearings N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. (nearly), and S. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., from a distance of about fifteen miles.

The column or post from which the light will be exhibited is constructed of iron, is 6 inches in diameter, 24 feet high, and painted white; it is enclosed at its base by a circular iron house, also painted white, and is situated about 100 yards W. by S. from Tolleshwar Temple.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses of the fifth order.

Position: Lat. 17° 33' 50" N., long. 73° 7' 45" E.
Bearings are magnetic and from seaward. Variation 1° easterly in 1880.

THE following additional regulations, made in accordance with the provisions of section 19 of "The Mount Ida Water-race Trust Act, 1878," to the regulations dated the 24th December, 1879 and published in the *New Zealand Gazette* No. 1, of the 8th January, 1880, are approved.

25. It shall be lawful for the Trust to sell water for purposes other than gold-mining, such as irrigation, the driving of machinery, wool-scouring, or such other purposes as the Trust shall think for the public good, such water to be charged for at same rate as that sold for mining purposes.

26. It shall be lawful for the Trust, in case of water being required for the purpose of driving machinery, or for any purpose other than gold-mining, if such water can be used and returned undiminished in quantity and unpolluted, to make a special bargain for the letting or supply of such water by lease or otherwise, and for such term or period and at such price as may be agreed on, anything in the foregoing regulations to the contrary notwithstanding: Provided that every such lease or agreement shall contain a condition that neither the Trust nor the Government shall be bound to supply the water for the whole term if during the currency of the lease

or agreement anything shall occur to prevent the continuance of the supply; and that every such lease or agreement shall be subject to suspension if all the water from the race is at any time required for gold-mining purposes.
