Alteration of Boundaries of Counties of Selwyn and Akaroa.

(L.S.) ARTHUR GORDON, Governor.
 A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by section thirty of "The Counties Act, 1876," it is enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation, alter the boundaries of any counties, and declare that, from and after a day to be named in such Proclamation, the new boundaries set forth in such Proclamation shall be the boundaries of such counties: And whereas a petition has been presented to His Excellency the Governor by the Council of the County of Selwyn, praying him to alter the boundaries of such county, and to declare that the boundaries of such county shall be those set forth in the First Schedule hereto; and a petition has also been presented to His Excellency the Governor by the Council of the County of Akaroa, praying him to alter the boundaries of such last-named county, and to declare that the boundaries of such county shall be those set forth in the Second Schedule hereto:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, and in exercise and pursuance of all powers and authorities enabling him in that behalf, doth hereby alter the boundaries of the County of Selwyn, and declare that, from and after the date hereof, the boundaries set forth in the First Schedule hereto shall be the boundaries of such county; and doth hereby alter the boundaries of the County of Akaroa, and declare that, from and after the date hereof, the boundaries set forth in the Second Schedule hereto shall be the boundaries of such county.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

COUNTY OF SELWYN.

BOUNDED towards the North and East by Ashley County from the saddle near the source of the Hurunui to the mouth of the Waimakariri River; towards the East by the ocean and Lyttelton Harbour to the south-west corner of the Lyttelton Municipality; thence by the western boundary of the said municipality; thence by a line due north to the summit of the Port Hills; thence towards the South-east by a line along the summit of the Port Hills to

the north-east corner of Rural Section No. 1060; thence towards the South by the northern boundaries of Sections Nos. 1060, 1452, and 1267 to the north-west corner of the latter section; thence by the western boundary of Section No. 1267, the northern and western boundaries of Section No. 1268, and the northern boundaries of Sections Nos. 1046, 18810, 13595, 13631, and 895 to the north-west corner of the latter section; thence southerly by the western boundary thereof to a point opposite the centre of the Road and Drain Reserve separating Sections Nos. 13589 and 3700; thence crossing the road and following the centre of said reserve to the River Halswell; thence along the left bank of the Halswell River to Lake Ellesmere; thence again towards the South-east by a right line to the ocean at Taumutu; thence by the ocean to the mouth of the Rakaia River; thence towards the South-west by a line along the centre of that river to its source near Whitcombe Pass; thence towards the North-west by a line to and along the summit of the Southern Alps to the saddle of the Teremakau, the starting point.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

COUNTY OF AKAROA.

BOUNDED towards the North-east and South by Lyttelton Harbour and the ocean; and towards the West by the Selwyn County, hereinbefore defined.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this nineteenth day of June, 1882.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the twenty-first section of "The Land Act 1877 Amendment Act, 1879," it is enacted that the Governor in Council may fix the terms and conditions upon which the lands comprised in any village settlement shall be disposed of, and the mode of payment for the same: And whereas His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand has, by Proclamation in the *New Zealand Gazette*, bearing date the nineteenth day of June, set apart the lands enumerated in the Schedule hereto for sale as a village settlement:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred upon him by the hereinbefore in part recited Act, and by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby fix the following terms and conditions upon which the said village settlement shall be disposed of, and the mode of payment for the same, that is to say,—

1. The lands enumerated in the First Schedule hereto shall all be submitted to public auction at the upset prices stated in the said Schedule.
2. The lands enumerated in the First Schedule shall be sold for cash at such time and place as the Land Board of Canterbury shall appoint. Three months' notice of the sale is to be given by advertisement in at least one newspaper circulating in the district at intervals of not less than a fortnight after the first publication thereof.
3. The sum stated in the First Schedule as the valuation of the improvements on Block six is to be added to the upset price thereof, to be disposed of as provided by section one hundred and fifty-five of "The Land Act, 1877."
4. The lands enumerated in the Second Schedule hereto shall be sold on deferred payments, and they shall be subject to the provisions relating to suburban lands of Part III. of "The Land Act, 1877," and to the provisions of section nine of "The Land Act 1877 Amendment Act, 1879."
5. The day upon which the lands described in the Second Schedule shall be open for application shall be Tuesday, the twelfth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, at ten a.m., at the Survey Offices, Christchurch and Timaru.
6. No person shall be allowed to acquire more than one allotment.
7. The lands described in the Second Schedule shall be open for application at the prices stated in the said Schedule.
8. If there should be on the same day more than one application for any allotment, the right to occupy the same shall be determined by public auction, the biddings to be restricted to the applicants.

9. Each applicant will be required to make the declaration prescribed by section sixty-two of "The Land Act, 1877," before making his selection, and he shall at the time of application deposit with the Receiver of Land Revenue for the Canterbury Land District one-tenth of the price of the allotment. Such payment shall be deemed to be a discharge of the license-fee for the six months due on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three.

10. In the event of the allotment applied for being put up to auction, the person who is declared the purchaser thereof shall forthwith pay to the Receiver of Land Revenue for Canterbury, in addition to the sum he has deposited, an amount equal to one-tenth of the increased price obtained therefor over the upset price thereof.

11. The purchaser of any allotment, upon the full payment of the purchase-money, and also the fulfilment of the terms and conditions prescribed by "The Land Act, 1877," and "The Land Act 1877 Amendment Act, 1879," relating to land on deferred payments, will be entitled to his Crown grant, to be issued in the usual way upon payment of the fees prescribed by law.

12. In respect of the allotment described in the First Schedule hereto upon which the value of improvements has been assessed in pursuance of the eighth section of "The Land Act 1877 Amendment Act, 1879," the amount of the value of such improvements, as stated opposite such section, shall be added to the upset price thereof; and any applicant for such allotment other than the occupant thereof shall, at the time of making his application, deposit such sum with the Receiver of Land Revenue; and if any person other than the occupant of the section shall become the purchaser thereof, the sum so deposited shall be paid over to the occupant.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this eighteenth day of May, 1882.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the seventeenth section of "The Licensing Act, 1881," it is enacted that the Governor, by Order in Council, may from time to time alter the limits of any Native licensing districts or abolish the same: And whereas it is expedient to abolish the Native Licensing District of Waiapu, and to constitute other districts in lieu thereof:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, in pursuance and exercise of all powers enabling him in this behalf, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, doth hereby abolish the said Native Licensing District of Waiapu, and doth constitute and define the several parts of the colony mentioned and described in the Schedule hereto to be Native licensing districts under "The Licensing Act, 1881," from the thirtieth day of June next.

SCHEDULE.

WAIAPU.

BOUNDED towards the North and East by the ocean from Cape Runaway to Paritu; thence towards the South by a right line to the junction of the Ruakituri and the Huangaroa Rivers, and by the centre of the said Ruakituri River to its source; thence towards the South-west by a right line to Maungapohatu; and thence towards the North-west and West by the Whakatane County to Cape Runaway, the place of commencement: excepting the Turanga Native Licensing District, hereinafter described.

WAIKAREMOANA.

LINSEED OIL.

SUGAR.

A bonus of one thousand pounds (£1,000) will be given for the production of the first 125 tons of sugar, manufactured in New Zealand, from beet or any other root or plant grown in the colony.

STARCH.

A bonus of three hundred pounds (£300) will be given on the first 50 tons of starch, manufactured in the colony, which shall be shipped to an English market, and for which a satisfactory certificate shall be given by dealers or brokers in England that the starch is of good marketable quality.

SILK.

A bonus of fifty per cent. on the value realized for the first thousand pounds' (£1,000) worth of cocoons of the silkworm, or silkworms' eggs, produced in the colony, to be paid on quantities of not less value than fifty pounds (£50) nor more than one hundred pounds (£100) produced by any one person.

SUGAR-REFINING.

A bonus of five hundred pounds (£500) will be given for three years in succession for the refining each year, by machinery established in New Zealand, of not less than 100 tons of cane sugar. The establishment by which such refining is effected must be what is ordinarily known as a sugar-refinery. The firm refining the first 100 tons of sugar, and receiving the bonus, shall be also entitled to the bonus of the two following years upon fulfilling the conditions above named.

Conditions.

1. Notice of intention to claim any of the above bonuses must be given in writing to the Colonial Secretary not later than the 30th June, 1882.
2. The claim must be made before the 31st December, 1882.
3. The other conditions as to quantity, quality, and value to be fulfilled to the satisfaction of an officer appointed for the purpose by the Government.

4. Further information and particulars may be obtained by application at the Colonial Secretary's Office.

IRON.

A bonus of one thousand pounds (£1,000) will be given for the production, in New Zealand, of 300 tons of pig-iron, of marketable quality, from ore produced in New Zealand.

Conditions.

1. The bonus not to be given for any quantity less than 100 tons.
2. Notice of the intention to erect ironworks and claim the bonus must be given to the Colonial Secretary before the 31st December, 1882.
3. The bonus must be claimed before the 31st December, 1883.
4. In the event of more than one claimant giving such notice, not more than seven-tenths of the bonus may be claimed by the first producer, and not more than three-tenths by the second producer; but if only one claimant becomes a producer on the above conditions, he may claim the whole of the bonus.
5. The iron in respect of which any bonus is claimed, and the ore from which it is manufactured, will be examined by an officer to be appointed by the Government, who may require the production of *bond fide* account sales of quantities not less than 100 tons weight, showing that such iron has been sold at a fair market price as pig-iron.

THE following rules for the management of the Wainui Cemetery, County of Waitemata, have been submitted to His Excellency the Governor in Council, and are published in accordance with "The Cemeteries Management Act, 1877."

THOMAS DICK.

RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE WAINUI CEMETERY, COUNTY OF WAITEMATA.

Cemetery divided.

1. Such portions of the Wainui Cemetery as may from time to time be fenced in shall be laid out in three sections, each section divided into burial-plots measuring 10 feet by 4 feet.

Section 1. Grants of Exclusive Right of Burial.

2. Any person desiring to have the exclusive right of burial in perpetuity in any plot or plots can have the same on the payment to the Trustees of the sum of 10s. per plot (measuring 10 feet by 4 feet), or 15s. if two plots are taken (measuring 10 feet by 8 feet).

Fences or Tombstones may be erected.

3. Persons purchasing the exclusive right of burial may, by permission of the Trustees, fence in the plots of ground allotted to them, and may erect tombstones, headstones, or other monuments thereon: Provided always that, before any such fence, tombstone, headstone, or other monument be erected, a plan thereof, and a copy of every epitaph or other inscription, be submitted to the Trustees, and be duly approved by them; and that the fences be kept within the line of pegs, and do not exceed 4 feet in height.

Section 2.

4. Section 2 will comprise that portion of the cemetery set apart for the interment of such persons as are not purchasers of, and have not acquired a right to, private ground. On these graves no fencing or other obstruction rising more than 1 foot above the surface shall be allowed; and after an expiration of not less than five years from date of last interment these graves may be reopened for new interment, unless the surviving relations purchase the exclusive right of burial in perpetuity in such plot, according to clause 2.

Section 3. Free Interments.

5. Section 3 will comprise that portion of the cemetery set apart for free interments; proof being first given to the satisfaction of the Trustees that there are no funds available for payment of fees, and that no person is to be found who is liable for the payment of the same.

Depth of Graves.

6. All graves must be not less than 6 feet deep; but, in the event of purchasers of private ground desiring a greater depth, an extra charge of 2s. shall be made for every foot more than 6 feet. No coffin to be within 3 feet of the surface.

Grants of Exclusive Right of Burial.

7. Grants of exclusive right of burial in perpetuity shall be made in the form marked A annexed to these regulations, on payment of a fee of 1s., and shall only be made out in the name of one particular person, to be named therein.

Transfer of Grants.

8. Any purchaser of exclusive right of burial in perpetuity in any particular plot of ground in the said cemetery in which no interment shall have taken place may, by permission of the Trustees, transfer his or her interest in the said plot of ground to any other person upon payment being made to the Trustees of a transfer fee of 5s. for every such transfer, and on production to the Trustees of the original grant.

Loss or Destruction of Grants.

9. If at any time a grant of exclusive right of burial should be lost or accidentally destroyed, a duplicate grant may be obtained on application in writing made to the Trustees, and on payment of a

fee of 10s. Persons applying for a duplicate grant must give satisfactory written evidence of the loss or destruction of the original grant. Should the original grant be found at any time after the issue of a duplicate, the duplicate must at once be returned to the Trustees.

Duty Stamps for Grants.

10. Parties applying for grants of exclusive right of burial, or transfer or duplicate of the same, must, at their own cost, provide all necessary duty stamps.

Sexton appointed.

11. A sexton will from time to time be appointed by the Trustees, whose duty it will be to dig all graves required in the cemetery; and no other person will be allowed to dig any grave therein without express permission in writing from the Trustees.

Records and Books to be kept.

12. The Trustees shall keep, or cause to be kept, a book in which shall be entered from time to time the number of every lot disposed of for exclusive right of burial, the name of the purchaser, and date of disposal. They shall also keep a record of every lot of ground used for the purpose of interment, the name of the person interred, and date of burial.

Plan of Cemetery to be made.

13. A complete plan of the cemetery shall be made, marked out in lots, and each lot numbered and distinguished by pegs in the ground.

Plan and Record open for Inspection.

14. The plan of cemetery and book of record shall be open for inspection to the public any day between the hours of 9 and 12 a.m., on payment of a fee of 1s. The fee for inspection to be remitted in case of persons taking out a burial-warrant.

Burial-warrants to be issued.

15. In all cases of intended interment the person having the management or control of the same shall apply to the Trustees for a burial-warrant. The warrant shall be in the form marked B annexed to these regulations, and shall be given to the party applying for the same on payment of the following fees:—

The said warrant, when received by the sexton, shall be sufficient authority to him for each interment.

Burial-warrant to be given to the Sexton at least Six Hours before Interment.

16. Orders for interment must be given to the sexton at least six working hours prior to the hour fixed for the funeral, otherwise an extra charge of 5s. will be made. No free interment will be allowed without the above previous notice of six hours.

Time of Funerals.

17. Funerals will only be allowed between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., except on Sundays, when the hours will be from 2 to 5 in the afternoon.

Fences, Headstones, &c., to be kept in repair by surviving Owners.

18. All fences, enclosures, tombstones, headstones, and other monuments must be kept in proper order and repair by the surviving holders of the grant or relatives of the deceased. All wooden or other fences left in a state of decay or broken down may at any time be removed from the cemetery by order of the Trustees.

Vaults.

19. Persons purchasing the exclusive right of burial in perpetuity in any plot of ground in the cemetery may, by permission of the Trustees, excavate the same within 1 foot of their outside boundaries for the purpose of constructing a vault. Before any work is commenced towards the construction of any vault, the plan and specification of the work connected therewith shall be submitted to the Trustees for approval, and no work shall be commenced until such approval has been obtained.

Construction of Vaults.

20. All vaults shall be lined throughout with brick-work or concrete, and covered in with arched brick-work, concrete, or stone set in cement. The depth, length, and breadth of vault shall be according to agreement with the Trustees. The entrance to the vault shall be either by a stone at the top or by an iron door. In all cases entrances shall be securely fastened, and all work done to the satisfaction of the Trustees.

Coffins for Vault.

21. Coffins for vaults must be lined with lead or other approved metal, to be firmly and securely soldered. Coffins may be laid in vaults and covered in with concrete or cement, so as to prevent the escape of any noxious vapour.

Labour, &c., to be approved by Trustees.

22. All labour, materials, and tools required for constructing vaults, or for excavating for vaults, must be provided by the parties applying for the same.

Work, &c., of reopening Vaults to be approved by Trustees.

23. All labour, materials, and tools required for reopening vaults for interments, and for reclosing the same, must be provided by the party owning the vault, and must be approved by the Trustees.

Vaults must be kept in repair by surviving Owner.

24. All vaults must be kept in proper order and repair by the surviving owner. If at any time they become out of proper order and repair, the Trustees may give the owner fourteen days' notice to repair the same, by leaving such notice at the last known place of abode of the owner or his agent; and if the owner fails to do or cause to be done the required repairs within the fourteen days above mentioned, the Trustees may at any time cause all the necessary repairs to be done, and no interment shall thereafter be allowed in such vault until all costs and charges of such repairs have been paid to the Trustees.

No Interment to take place in Vault without Warrant.

25. No interment shall be permitted in any vault until the party requiring to open such vault for interment has obtained a burial-warrant as provided for ordinary burials, which warrant shall be sufficient authority for the vault named therein to be opened.

All Charges and Fees to be paid in advance.

26. All charges made for any matter or thing connected with or relating to the cemetery shall be paid in advance.

Fences may be removed.

27. In the case of all persons interred in the Wainui Cemetery previous to the 1st day of January, 1882, and whose surviving relatives and friends have, previous to the above date, fenced in portions of land round the graves of persons so interred, it is hereby provided that, in all cases where the grant of exclusive right of burial in perpetuity is not required, it shall be lawful for the Trustees at any time to remove or alter the position of any of the said fences whenever it may be found necessary to do so.

Bodies not to be disinterred.

28. No body shall be disinterred or removed from the said cemetery, except by order of a Coroner, without express permission in writing from the Trustees.
