Altering Boundaries of Resident Magistrate's District of Tauranga.

JAMES PRENDERGAST, (L.s.) Administrator of the Government. A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by "The Resident Magistrates Act, 1867," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time, by Proclamation in the New Zealand Gazette, to constitute throughout the colony, or in any part thereof, districts to be called Resident Magistrates' districts, and such districts from time to time to abolish, and the boundaries to define and alter, and in any such Proclamation to fix a time on and from which any such district shall be constitute or abolished, as the case may be:

And whereas by a Proclamation bearing date the seventh day ... February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, His Excellency the Governor, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities so vested in him, did define the boundaries of the Resident Magistrate's District of Tauranga, as described in the said Proclamation:

And whereas it is expedient to alter the boundaries of the said district so defined as aforesaid:

Now, therefore, I, James Prendergast, the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities so vested in me as aforesaid, do hereby proclaim and declare that, from and after the twenty-seventh day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, the boundaries of the said district of Tauranga shall be altered, and that thenceforth, within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Act, the said district shall be constituted with the boundaries as defined and described in the Schedule

hereto.

TAURANGA DISTRICT.

Stream; towards the South-east by a right line from the mouth of the Wairaki Stream aforesaid to the summit of Otanewainuku Mountain; towards the South-west by a right line from the place last named to the summit of Te Aroha Range, and by the summit of that range to the southern boundary of the Aroha Survey District; and thence towards the West and North by the Hauraki Resident Magistrate's District to Nga Kuri-a-whare, the place of commencement: including also the adjacent islands.

Districts constituted under "The Marriage Act, 1880."

JAMES PRENDERGAST, (L.S.) Administrator of the Government. A PROCLAMATION.

N pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in the Governor by "The Marriage act, 1880," I, James Prendergast, the Administrator Act, 1880, of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby abolish the existing marriage district known as the New Plymouth District, and do proclaim and declare that the territory heretofore comprised within the said district is hereby divided anew into two marriage districts, the names and boundaries whereof shall be as follow:

WAITARA DISTRICT.

Bounded towards the North-east by the sea from All that area bounded towards the North and Nga Kuri-a-whare to the mouth of the Wairaki North-west by the ocean from the mouth of the

All that area in the Provincial District of Taranaki, bounded towards the East by the Waitara Registration District, before described, from the mouth of the Waiongonu River to Section No. 212, Huirangi District; towards the South by Section No. 204 of said district, and by Sections Nos. 98, 133, 42, 33, and 28 of Tarurutangi District; thence by Sections Nos. 46, 47, 49, and 52 of Hua and Waiwakaiho Hundreds to the Waiwakaiho River; again towards the East and South-east by said river to its source, and by a right line to the summit of Mount Egmont; thence by a right line to the source of the Taungatara River, and by said river to the ceean; and towards the South-west and North-west by the ocean to the starting point: as the same is delineated on the plans deposited in the Survey Office, New Plymouth.

And I hereby declare that this Proclamation shall some into operation on the fifteenth day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred

and eighty-two.

IN pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in the Governor by "The Registration of Births and Deaths Act, 1875," I, James Prendergast, the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby abolish the existing registration district known as the New Plymouth District; and do proclaim and declare

Land set apart on Deferred Payments in Otago.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by the fifty-third section of "The Land Act, 1877," it is enacted that the Governor, by Proclamation in the Gazette, may from time to time set apart out of any suburban or rural lands such blocks or allotments of land as he shall think fit, and set the same aside for sale on deferred payments, and in such Proclamation may fix a day on which the land shall be open for application; and that he may also in like manner set apart for sale on deferred payments such blocks or allotments as may be recommended by any Land Board, and may also from time to time alter, amend, or revoke any such Proclamation:

And whereas the Land Board of Otago did, on the fourteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, pass a resolution recommending that the land described in the Schedule hereto annexed should be set apart for sale on deferred payments:

And whereas it is expedient to give effect to the aforesaid recommendation, and to set apart the said

land accordingly:

Now, therefore, I, James Prendergast, Chief Justice of the Colony of New Zealand, and Administrator of the Government thereof, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by the above-named Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that the land described in the Schedule hereto is set apart for sale on deferred payments; and that Friday, the twenty-seventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, shall be the day on which the said land shall be open for application, in allotments as surveyed and marked on the selection map in the principal land office of the district.

And, further, in pursuance of the fifth section of "The Land Act 1877 Amendment Act, 1879," I do hereby fix the price at which the land so described shall be sold to be the price set opposite each allotment in the Schedule hereto.

#### Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE GOVERNMENT IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the thirty-ninth section of "The Land Act, 1877," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Land Board, subject to the approval of the Governor, and at any time and from time to time, to declare, by notice in the Gazette, that any land not already classified shall belong to either of the classes referred to in the thirty-eighth section of the said Act; and also that any land shall cease to belong to either of the said classes: Provided that no land which has been declared to be town or suburban land shall cease to belong to such classes respectively without the consent previously obtained of the Governor in Council:

And whereas the Land Board of Otago is desirous of declaring that the land specified in the Schedule hereto, which has been heretofore classed as town land, shall cease to belong to such class, and shall be

classed as suburban land:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the colony, and in exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by the said Act, doth hereby consent to the Land Board aforesaid declaring that the land specified in the Schedule hereto shall cease to be classed as town land, and doth hereby approve and consent to the said Board declaring that such land shall be classed as suburban land.

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth, by this present order, amend the said Order in Council of the twenty-ninth day of May, so far as the date of the first meeting of the Board is concerned, and doth hereby order and declare that the first meeting of the Board constituted by the Order in Council of the twenty-ninth day of May aforesaid shall be held on Wednesday, the second day of August next, at the place already appointed; and it is hereby ordered and declared that the subsequent meetings of the Board shall be held at such time and place as the Board may from time to time appoint.

Authorizing the Mercury Bay Timber Company (Limited) to construct a Boom across the Waiwawa River.

# JAMES PRENDERGAST, Administrator of the Government. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this twenty-fourth day of July, 1882.

#### Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE GOVERNMENT IN COUNCIL.

HEREAS by the sixteenth section of "The Harbours Act, 1878," it is enacted that in any harbour where no Harbour Board is in existence the Governor in Council may authorize any person to construct harbour works (other than the reclamation of land from the sea or any harbour, or the construction of any graving-dock, dock, or breakwater in any harbour or in the sea), and to use and occupy such part of the foreshore or of any tidal land or tidal waters as may be necessary for the construction or use of such harbour works in any harbour where no Harbour Board is in existence: And whereas by the seventeenth section of the said Act it is also enacted that every such Order in Council shall be made upon such terms and conditions as the Governor in Council thinks fit, and the rights thereby conferred shall only be granted for a limited period not exceeding in any case fourteen years, and may at any time be altered, modified, or revoked:

And whereas the Mercury Bay Timber Company (Limited), of Auckland (hereinafter called "the said Company"), desires to construct a boom across the Waiwawa River, Mercury Bay, a place where no Harbour Board is in existence; and the said Company has applied to the Governor in Council for the issue of an order to authorize the construction of such boom, and has deposited plans thereof (marked M.D. 648 and 649) at the office of the Marine Department, Wellington, in the manner prescribed by the one hundred and fifty-sixth section of the said Act; and, it having been made to appear to the Administrator of the Government in Council that the proposed work will not be or tend to the injury of navigation, the Administrator of the Government in Council hath this day approved of the said deposited plans without any modification or addition, and subject to the conditions set forth in this Order in Council:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in him by the said Act, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby authorize the said Company to construct a boom across the Waiwawa River, in accordance with the said plans (marked M.D. 648 and

649), and in the position shown on plan (marked M.D. 632), and to use and occupy such portion of the foreshore, or of any tidal land or tidal water, as may be necessary for the construction and use of such boom, subject to the following conditions, viz.:—

1. That the rights, powers, and privileges conferred by this Order in Council shall continue in force for fourteen years, computed from the date of this Order in Council, unless in the meantime such rights, powers, and privileges shall be altered, modified, or

revoked by competent authority.

2. That the said rights, powers, and privileges may be at any time resumed by the Governor, and the Company may be required to remove the boom from the Waiwawa River and the bed thereof at their own cost, without payment of any compensation whatever, on giving to the said Company six calendar months' previous notice in writing. Any such notice shall be sufficient if given by the Minister, and delivered at the last known address of the said Company.

3. On the master of any vessel notifying to the said Company or its agent, manager, or representative at Mercury Bay that he desires to take his vessel past the boom, the Company shall forthwith provide free of expense to the vessel a sufficient number of men to work the movable part of the boom, so that the vessel may pass through without delay.

4. Nothing contained in this Order in Council shall be deemed to prevent its revocation at any time and without any notice in case the said Com-

pany shall-

(i.) Commit or suffer a breach of the conditions hereinbefore set forth, or any of them; or

(2.) Cease to use or occupy the said boom. And publication in the New Zealand Gazette of an Order in Council containing such revocation shall be sufficient notice to the said Company, and to all persons concerned or interested in the said boom, that this Order in Council, and the rights and privileges thereby conferred, have been revoked and determined.

5. In these conditions the term "Minister" means the Minister having charge of the Marine Department, as defined by the Shipping and Seamen's Act, 1877," and includes any officer, person, or authority acting by or or under the direction of such Minister.

A bonus of five hundred pounds (£500) will be given for the production, by machinery permanently established in New Zealand, of the first 10,000 gallons of oil, of good marketable quality, from linseed grown in the colony.

#### OIL-CAKE.

A bonus of one hundred pounds (£100) will be given for the production of the first 50 tons of oilcake, of good marketable quality, from linseed grown in the colony.

#### SUGAR.

A bonus of one thousand pounds (£1,000) will be given for the production of the first 125 tons of sugar, manufactured in New Zealand, from beet or any other root or plant grown in the colony.

A bonus of fifty per cent. on the value realized for the first thousand pounds' (£1,000) worth of cocoons of the silkworm, or silkworms' eggs, produced in the colony, to be paid on quantities of not less value than fifty pounds (£50) nor more than one hundred pounds (£100) produced by any one person.

#### SUGAR-REFINING.

A bonus of five hundred pounds (£500) will be given for three years in succession for the refining each year, by machinery established in New Zealand, of not less than 100 tons of cane sugar. The establishment by which such refining is effected must be what is ordinarily known as a sugar-refinery. The firm refining the first 100 tons of sugar, and receiving the bonus, shall be also entitled to the bonus of the two following years upon fulfilling the conditions above

#### OSTRICHES.

A bonus of five pounds (£5) per head will be given for healthy ostrich chicks landed in New Zealand for

the purpose of being reared and maintained in the colony; the number of any importation to be not less than ten nor more than fifty.

#### BUTTER OR CHEESE.

A bonus of five hundred pounds (£500) will be given for the first 25 tons of butter or the first 50 tons of cheese (produced in a factory worked on the American principle, and to which factory any farmer, subject to certain conditions, may send his milk) which shall be exported from New Zealand, and sold at such prices in a foreign market as shall show that the articles are of fair quality.

Southland Land District Timber Regulations.

General Crown Lands Office. Wellington, 26th July, 1882. THE following regulations and by laws made by The Land Board of Southland, in pursuance of Part IV. of "The Land Act, 1877," as to the conditions under which licenses to cut timber may be issued, are published for general information.

#### HAND SAWYERS, WOOD-CUTTERS, ETC.

1. Applications for timber licenses shall be made

at the Land Office, Invercargill.

2. Each application shall state the particular purpose for which the license is required, and the reserve in which the timber is to be cut; and, on its being granted by the Southland Land Board, the applicant shall immediately pay the prescribed fees to the Receiver of Land Revenue, and obtain a license.

3. The area granted to any licensee shall be confined to the bush named in the application, the locality and extent being fixed by the Board, and shall extend only to lands of the Crown which have been or hereafter may be appropriated for timber reserves, in accordance with the provisions of any Waste Lands Act in force in the Southland Land District, and any Act amending the same. Any licensed person cutting timber beyond the limit of his area will be considered

as unlicensed, and prosecuted accordingly.

4. A fee of £5 will be charged for a license for twelve months for each hand sawyer, whether felling, cutting, sawing, or drawing timber for sale, and no license shall be granted for a shorter term than six months. The annual licenses to date from and after the 1st January, and the half-yearly ones from and after the 1st July, in each year, each terminating on the 31st December same year. In no case shall the charge be less than for half a year.

5. An annual fee of £2 shall be paid by any settler cutting firewood or splitting shingles for domestic

use, but not for sale.

6. Licenses may be issued to settlers and others cutting firewood for sale at £1 per twenty cords.

7. Licenses may be issued for splitting timber for fencing purposes, for private use or for sale, at £2 per 500 posts or rails; no pine or totara sapling to be cut.

8. No tree to be cut or disposed of without a special license for the purpose, the fee under such special license being £1 each tree of one foot and upwards in diameter, and 15s. for each tree below one foot in diameter; nor shall such be removed before being branded by the Conservator or Ranger of Forests. No manuka poles suitable for fencing purposes to be cut for firewood, under penalty of £10.

9. Every holder of a license to cut timber must exhibit such license to the officer appointed in that behalf whenever he may be called on to do so, or to any constable in the district, and on his refusal will be considered as unlicensed, and prosecuted accord-

ingly.
10. The Commissioner of Crown Lands may cause to be seized all timber cut on Crown lands, wherever found, which he may have cause to believe has been less than double the breadth, the Board reserving to cut by an unlicensed person; but in case a right to itself the power of determining the frontage and the

such timber shall be asserted within fourteen days after the notice hereafter mentioned, and shall be established to the satisfaction of the Waste Lands Board, it shall be restored to the claimant.

11. All timber when seized shall be marked with the broad arrow, and, after due notice of the seizure thereof in writing, to be posted up in the land office or at the police station in the district where such seizure was made, shall, in case no claimant shall appear and establish his claim within fourteen days therefrom, be sold in such manner and subject to such conditions as the Waste Lands Board may direct.

12. All timber cut under a yearly or half-yearly license must be removed within six weeks after the expiration of the license, and that cut under firewood, fencing, or special licenses within three months after date of licenses, unless an extension of time be granted by the Board, otherwise it may be declared forfeited, seized, and sold on behalf of the Crown.

13. The proceeds of the sale of timber so seized are to be accounted for and paid over to the Receiver

of Land Revenue.

- 14. If any person duly licensed shall have established a saw-pit for the purpose of sawing timber, no other person shall cut timber within one hundred yards of such pit without consent of the person first occupying such saw-pit: Provided that, if the person establishing such pit shall not use the same, and shall not cut timber within such distance as aforesaid from the pit for twenty-eight consecutive days, it shall be lawful for any other holder of a license to enter thereupon and to cut timber as though such pit had not been established; or if such person should only cut timber to such extent within the twenty-eight days as would appear to the Board to be done merely for the purpose of excluding others, and not utilizing the forest, the Board may in such case cancel the license.
- 15. If any license-holder shall, for the purpose of removing timber, have made a tramway or road upon land being waste lands of the Crown, and not being a highway, it shall not be lawful for any other person to use the same without permission of the person making the same first obtained: Provided that, if such road shall not be used at any time for ninety consecutive days for removing timber, it shall be lawful for the Waste Lands Board to determine that the constructor of the tramway has forfeited his right to the same: Provided also that, as regards tramways, the Board reserves to itself the power of deciding on the merits of each case as it arises.

16. Licenses cannot be transferred without the consent of the Board first obtained, transfer fee

being 10s.

SAW-MILLS.

Exclusive right to cut timber on waste lands of the Crown may be granted for saw-mills on the following conditions :-

17. Every application for such exclusive rights shall be made by the applicant at the Land Office, Invercargill, in a form to be prescribed by the Board, and be accompanied with a sketch as nearly as may be of the land required, and a deposit of £10, to be forfeited if the application is abandoned; and the Board may either grant or refuse the license or any part thereof, or put the application to auction at an upset price to be fixed by the Waste Lands Board, as a bonus in addition to the royalty fees.

18. The area within which exclusive right to cut timber shall be granted for the erection of any sawmills shall not exceed two hundred acres in terms of section 90 of "The Land Act, 1877;" and, as regards shape, shall be a rectangular block of a depth of not less than double the breadth, the Board reserving to extent of area to be granted, such being regulated by the size, position, &c., of the bush. Any licensee found cutting outside the boundary of his license shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20, to be recovered under clause 89 of "The Land Act, 1877," and forfeiture of his license. All trees standing close to the surveyed boundaries to be felled inwards, so as not to destroy the survey lines: any infraction of this rule to bar extension of license. It shall be lawful for the Board to grant firewood or fencing licenses within any such area, after abandonment; such licenses to authorize the cutting and removing all left timber; such licensees to pay £1 per 500 posts or rails, and 10s. per twenty cords of firewood. Saw-millers may cut firewood and fencing on their applications at the rates named in sections 6 and 7, entering the same in their monthly returns.

19. Within fourteen days the Waste Lands Board shall determine whether such application shall be granted, and the applicant shall forthwith deposit with the Treasurer of the Waste Lands Board the amount of survey fees, and a deposit in cash or properly marked banker's cheque for £50. Such deposit to be forfeited if the mill is not erected within six months from the date of granting the application, unless the time be extended by the Board. Deposits to be returned on certificate of the Inspector or Ranger of Forests that the necessary plant is on the ground within the stipulated time, when the applicant will get his license, from which date the licensee's four years will commence: Provided always that no timber shall be cut for sale before the issue of the license.

20. As soon as practicable after the payment of such deposit the Chief Surveyor shall cause the application to be surveyed, and its boundary-lines cut. The survey to be conducted in every respect in accordance with survey regulations in force at the time.

21. The fee chargeable under every such license shall be at the minimum rate of 3d. for every hundred superficial feet cut during the currency of the license, and shall be paid monthly: Provided that if any rent due remain unpaid for more than six days the license shall be deemed to be cancelled, and the bush open for application, without any notice being given to the licensee. A saw-mill licensee not to be at liberty to cut timber for any other than local saw-mill nurposes, except as per section 8.

purposes, except as per section 8.

22. A fee of £5 shall be paid to the Receiver of Land Revenue on the transfer of such license.

23. Every such license terminable within any year shall be drawn so as to terminate on the 31st day of December in each year, and may be renewed from year to year, but subject to such alterations in the regulations as may be found necessary for the better management and utilization of the forests: Provided that before the issue of any renewed license the licensee shall produce a certificate from the Inspector or Ranger of Forests, or other person duly appointed by the Waste Lands Board on that behalf,—

(1.) That the bush has been cut fairly, and that

1.) That the bush has been cut fairly, and that all available for saw-mill purposes has been

used;

(2.) That the saw-mill has been kept continuously in operation, when not stopped by causes considered unavoidable by the Board;

(3.) That no trees or saplings under one foot in diameter have been cut for sale, except as provided by section 8, or destroyed by the act of or by the neglect of the licensee or his servants, and that none of the provisions of the Land Acts in force in the Southland Land District, or any Act amending the same, or the by-laws of the Waste Lands Board, have been violated;

- (4.) And if it shall appear that these regulations have not been complied with, or that any wrongful acts have been done by the licensee, then the Waste Lands Board shall appoint a valuator to ascertain and assess the amount of damage which the forest, whether under license or not, may have sustained by such wrongful acts; and no new license shall be granted until the amount of damage so assessed shall have been paid, in addition to the sum due by way of rent and expenses of valuation;
- (5.) If at any time during the currency of the yearly license the Inspector or Ranger of Forests shall report that the timber on the licensed ground is being unfairly cut, the license may be suspended pending investigation, and cancelled if it is found that the bylaws or regulations have been infringed.
- 24. The licensee shall keep a production-book, showing the total number of superficial feet, properly classified, passing through the saw-mill each day, or logs, or hewn timber, and exhibit the same on demand of any person authorized by the Waste Lands Board, and shall furnish a correct copy of it to the Inspector or Ranger of Forests on or before the 7th day of each succeeding month, in the form prescribed in the Schedule; the penalty for omitting to make a return, or making a false return, being forfeiture of the license, and a penalty not exceeding £50, to be recoverable under clause 93 of "The Land Act, 1877."
- 25. Holders of a license to give all information whatsoever as to boundaries, position of cutting, &c., that may be required by the Inspector or Ranger of Forests, or any person authorized by the Commissioner of Crown Lands.

#### GENERAL REGULATIONS.

- 26. No person to cut down or otherwise injure any trees not required by him for local saw-mill purposes, except as per section 8; and if it shall appear to the Inspector or Ranger of Forests that any of the regulations have been infringed, or that the timber has been negligently or wilfully injured or destroyed by fire or otherwise, he shall immediately give notice of the same at the office of the Waste Lands Board, and shall temporarily suspend the license of the party offending; and if the Commissioners shall judge that such infringement has been wilful, then the license shall be forfeited, and it shall be at the discretion of the Board to refuse to allow the issue of another license to the same person or persons.
- 27. Any person who shall cut timber without a license, or who shall continue to saw or cut timber after any payment shall have become due and shall not be paid, or after the Inspector or Ranger of Forests, by reason of any alleged breach of these regulations, shall have given him notice to discontinue cutting, shall be treated as an unlicensed trespasser.
- 28. Where the terms "land," "bush," or "bush land" are used in the foregoing regulations the bush or timber only is meant.
- 29. A penalty not exceeding £20 will be inflicted for every single breach of the above by-laws, excepting those enumerated under clauses 17 to 25, both inclusive, and summary proceedings will be adopted to recover the same under Part V. of "The Land Act, 1877."

Te Makarini Scholarships.

THREE scholarships, to be held at the Native College, Te Aute, Hawke's Bay, are offered by the Trustees of the fund instituted in memory of the late Sir Donald McLean for promoting the higher education of Maori youths.

Two of these scholarships are open to any Maori or half-caste whose age on the 30th November, 1882, shall not exceed fifteen years, and who shall have attended a Native college or school for the preceding twelve months. The remaining scholarship is open to any Maori or half-caste whose age on the 30th November, 1882, shall not exceed thirteen years, and who shall have attended a Native village school for the preceding twelve months.

The scholarships are of the annual value of £35, and are tenable for two years from the 1st January, 1883.

The examination will be held at convenient centres on the 18th and 19th December, 1882. Candidates must, either directly or through their teachers, send notice to the Inspector of Native Schools, Education Department, Wellington, of their intention to present themselves for examination. Such notice must be posted not later than the 31st October.

Copies of the regulations and forms of notice may be obtained from teachers of Native schools and boarding institutions, the Secretaries to Education Boards, or the Secretary to the Education Department.
