Proclaiming the Taking and Laying-off of Roads over Lands in the Auckland Provincial District.

A PROCLAMATION.

IN pursuance and in exercise of all powers and authorities enabling me in this behalf, I, William Francis Drummond Jervois, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby proclaim that the roads described in the Schedule hereto have been duly taken and laid off through the lands specified in a warrant of the date given in the said Schedule.

SCHEDULE.

ALL those parcels of land in the Provincial District of Auckland, containing by admeasurement 31 acres, 3 acres, 2 acres, 24 acres, and 26 acres respectively, more or less, situated in Block IX., Opoti Survey District, and being road-lines 100 links wide, and varying in width, traversing the Mangaruhe East Block.

Portion containing 31 acres, 100 links wide: Commencing at a distance of 2551 links from the north-western angle of the Mangaruhe East Block; and thence continuing Southerly in the direction of Trig. Station D; again Easterly in the direction of Trig. Station b; and again Southerly in the direction of Trig. Station I; for a total distance of 31020 links or thereabouts to another road at the Wairoa River.

Portion containing 3 acres, varying in width: Commencing at Trig. Station I, and thence continuing North-easterly along the Wairoa River for a distance of 13 chains or thereabouts.

Portion containing 2 acres, 100 links wide: Commencing on the road first above described at a distance of 37 chains or thereabouts from its southern termination near Trig. Station I, and thence continuing South-easterly, for a distance of 20 chains or thereabouts, to the Wairoa River.

Portion containing 24 acres, varying in width: Commencing at a point on the road last described at a distance of 200 links or thereabouts from the Wairoa River, and thence continuing North-easterly in the direction of Trig. Station d, South-easterly in the direction of Trig. Station L, and again North-easterly to another road, for a total distance of 220 chains or thereabouts, and to a point on the last-mentioned road at a distance of 2550 links or thereabouts from the Wairoa River.

Portion containing 26 acres, varying in width: Commencing on the Wairoa River nearly opposite to the mouth of the Mangapoiki Stream; and thence continuing North-westerly to Trig. Station C; and thence generally North-easterly to the north-eastern boundary of the Mangaruhe East Block, and at

a point on the same 3899 links or thereabouts from its north-eastern angle: be all the aforesaid linkages more or less; as the same is delineated on Plan No. 3342, deposited in the Survey Office, at Auckland. Date of Governor's warrant, 13th April, 1882.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this eighteenth day of September, 1883.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

IN pursuance and in exercise of the powers vested in him by "The Electric Telegraph Act, 1875," and "The Electric Telegraph Act 1875 Amendment Act, 1880," and of all other powers enabling him in that behalf, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand doth, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, hereby prescribe the fees and charges, and doth hereby make the regulations contained in the Schedules A and B in relation to the use of the Government telephones wherever established in this colony in connection with the telephone exchanges and otherwise, and doth further order and declare that such regulations shall take effect on and after the first day of October, 1883, and shall supersede all prior regulations made in relation to charges for the use of telephones within the colony.

SCHEDULE B.
BUREAU STATIONS.

Throughout these regulations "bureau station" means any ordinary telegraph station connected by telephone with an exchange; "exchange" means any telegraph office to which a number of private telephone wires are led in for the purpose of intercommunication amongst the subscribers.

The following shall be the charges to be paid by the public for the use of Government telephones wherever established in the colony at a bureau station in connection with an exchange:—

Where the line used is not more than six miles long, a uniform charge of 6d. for the use of same for any period not exceeding five minutes, and a further charge of 6d. for every additional five minutes or portion of five minutes.

Where the line used is over six miles long, the charges will be 1s. for the use of same for any period not exceeding five minutes, and a further charge of 1s. for every additional five minutes or portion of five minutes.

Messages telephoned by subscribers through an exchange to a bureau station, or from a bureau station to a subscriber by a subscriber, will be charged half the above rates, and, when delivered by the department from a bureau station, 3d. will be charged for delivery within the ordinary circuits of delivery.

Messages outside of the limits described above will be subject to special charges for delivery, according to the extra expense thereby incurred.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this twenty-fifth day of September, 1883.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

IN exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities conferred by the thirty-first section of "The Supreme Court Act, 1882," His Excellency Sir William Francis Drummond Jervois, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, and with the concurrence of His Honour Sir James Prendergast, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of New Zealand, and His Honour Mr. Justice Richmond, a Judge of the said Court, doth hereby revoke, as from the thirtieth day of September instant, the rules number five hundred and forty-five and five hundred and forty-six in the Code of Civil Procedure printed as the Second Schedule to the said Act, and doth hereby make the following rules in lieu thereof, and doth declare that such rules shall take effect on and after the first day of October next.

545. The proper officer shall receive and take such fees as are specified in the Table D in the Schedule to this Order in Council, and wherever in the said code the Table D thereto is referred to the Table D in the Schedule hereto shall be deemed to be referred to in lieu thereof.

546. Provided that, when it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Court, or a Judge thereof, that any party is unable or ought not to be called upon to pay any of the fees in such table mentioned, or any part thereof, it shall be lawful for the Court, or a Judge thereof, to dispense with such payment subject to such terms as such Court or Judge may think fit.

Changing the Purpose of a Reserve in the West Coast (North Island) Land District.

WHEREAS by the second section of "The Special Powers and Contracts Act, 1883," it is enacted that the Governor may do, execute, and perform the several acts, deeds, matters, and things specified in the second column of the Schedule thereto:

Now, therefore, I, William Francis Drummond Jervois, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by the above-named Act, do hereby declare that the several parcels of land known as Paengaroa, Rau-o-te-Huia, Pukehina, Puketauhini, Whakapaupakihiki No. 1, Matahina, Pokohu, and Hauturu shall be hereafter deemed and taken to be lands held by the Native owners according to Native customs or usages in the manner they were severally held before any action in relation thereto was taken in any Native Land Court, and that it shall be a duty of the Native Land Court of New Zealand to investigate, according and subject to its ordinary practice, the titles to such lands, and to ascertain who may be the owners thereof according to Native customs or usages: And, in further exercise of the powers vested in me as aforesaid, I further declare applications for investigation of title heretofore made by any Natives claiming to be owners

to be good and valid applications under "The Native Land Court Act, 1880."

Conditions for Trout-fishing in North Canterbury.

Wm. F. DRUMMOND JERVOIS,
Governor.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby make the following regulations for that part of the Provincial District of Canterbury lying to the north of the Rangitata River:—

1. These regulations shall come into force on the date hereof.
2. Licenses to fish for trout in all the rivers, streams, and lakes in the Provincial District of Canterbury north of the Rangitata River will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Canterbury Acclimatisation Society at Christchurch, and for every such license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged: Provided that it shall not be obligatory upon the said Secretary to issue a license in case he shall have sufficient good reason for refusing the same.
3. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish in any of the said rivers, streams, and lakes from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, until the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, between the hours of five a.m. and ten p.m. only, but no such license shall confer any right of entry upon the land of any person without his consent.
4. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish with rod and line only, and any person who shall use any ground-bait, or any net (except a landing-net), or other engine, instrument, or device, or shall use or employ either of the methods known as "cross-line fishing," or "stroke-hauling," or any other unsportsmanlike device, or shall use as bait salmon-roe or any bait prepared with any chemical or medicated dressing whatever, for taking fish in any of the said rivers, streams, or lakes, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds; and every such net or other engine, instrument, or device used contrary to these regulations shall be forfeited.
5. Any person fishing without a license, and any person who shall, on the demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any police officer or constable, or of any officer of the said Acclimatisation Society, fail to produce and show to such person, police officer, constable, or officer his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.
6. Every trout not exceeding eight inches in length taken by any person shall be immediately returned alive into the water from which the same is taken, and any person infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.
7. Any person who shall put, throw, or place, or allow to be put, thrown, or placed, into any river, stream, or lake in the said Provincial District of Canterbury any poisonous, deleterious, or noxious material, with intent to destroy any fish therein, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.
8. If any person shall be convicted of any offence against these regulations, the convicting Magistrate or Justices may, over and above any penalty inflicted, also declare the license of the offender to be forfeited, and thereupon his license shall become void.

Conditions for Trout-fishing in the Counties of Waimate and Geraldine.

Wm. F. DRUMMOND JERVOIS,
Governor.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby make the following regulations for the Counties of Waimate and Geraldine:—

1. These regulations shall come into force on the date hereof:—
2. Any holder of a license, as hereinafter mentioned, may fish with rod and line for trout in all rivers, streams, and lakes within the Counties of Waimate and Geraldine, from the first

day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, until the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, but only between the hours of five o'clock in the morning and ten o'clock in the evening.

3. Licenses to fish with rod and line in the said waters will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the South Canterbury Acclimatisation Society, at Timaru, and for every license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged.

4. No license shall authorise any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that only with rod and line.

5. Any person fishing without a license, or any person who shall, on demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any police officer or constable, fail to produce and show to such person, police officer, or constable his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

6. All trout not exceeding seven inches in length taken by any person fishing as aforesaid shall be immediately returned alive to the water; and any person convicted of infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds sterling, and his license shall thereupon become void.

7. Except as aforesaid, no person shall fish or use any net or other engine, instrument, or device for taking fish in any river, stream, or lake within the Counties of Waimate and Geraldine; and all persons offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

8. Any person who puts, throws, or places, or allows to be put, thrown, or placed, into any river, stream, or lake in the said Counties of Waimate and Geraldine any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any matter or liquid deleterious to fish, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

Conditions for Trout-fishing in Waitaki.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby make the following regulations for the County of Waitaki:—

1. Any holder of a license may fish with rod and line for trout in all the streams and lakes within and forming the boundaries of the County of Waitaki from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, to the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, both inclusive.

2. Licenses to fish with rod and line in the above district will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Waitaki County Acclimatisation Society, at Oamaru, and for every license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged.

3. No license shall authorise any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that only with rod and line.

4. Any person fishing without a license, or any person who shall, on demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any ranger, police officer, or constable, fail to produce and show to such person, ranger, police officer, or constable his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

5. All trout not exceeding seven inches in length taken by any person fishing as aforesaid shall be immediately returned alive into the water, and any person convicted of infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds sterling, and his license shall thereupon become void.

6. Except as aforesaid no person shall fish or use any net or other engine, instrument, or device for taking fish in any lake, river, or stream within the above district; and all persons offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

7. Any person who puts, throws, or places, or allows to be put, thrown, or placed, into any lake, river, or stream in the said district any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any matter or liquid deleterious to fish, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

8. These regulations shall come into force as from the date hereof.

THE following remarks on the Auckland Islands, extracted from reports made by Captain J. B. Greig, of the Government schooner "Kekeno," are published for general information.

H. A. ATKINSON.

Carnley Harbour stands foremost among all the anchoring places in the Auckland Group as a dangerous and difficult place for sailing vessels either to enter or leave. The entrance is exposed to the swell of the Southern Ocean, with an outgoing current; the land on both sides is high and precipitous; and when the wind is not blowing either direct in or out it often comes from all quarters in violent gusts. Within the entrance there is 50 fathoms, and no anchorage for six miles. Above the Figure-of-8 Island good anchorage will be found in 4 fathoms, where firewood can easily be had, and the best water on the Islands.

Musgrave Inlet.—The land on both sides of this inlet is high, with no outlying points to break off the violence of the wind or give shelter. At the head of the inlet there are three deep gorges, which draw the wind from various directions, causing gusts and whirlwinds of great strength, and making it unsafe even for vessels at anchor.

Passage inside Ewing and Dundas Islands.—Sailing through this passage, with both leads going, found the depth to vary for the most part in the clear water from 7 to 10 fathoms. The several kelp patches were sounded in the boat, but from the density of the kelp great difficulty was experienced, and the sounding cannot be considered complete. The least water found was 1 fathom, with the westernmost point of Ewing Island, bearing East, distant 2½ cables; and on another patch, with Dundas Island bearing N. by E. ½ E., distant 6 cables, 3½ fathoms was found. While the tide runs strong the kelp runs under, leaving ripples instead; and, until further examined, this passage cannot be recommended for large vessels, and if taken by small craft care should be taken to keep clear of the kelp or ripples.

The income of each library may be stated either for the year ending 31st December, 1883, or for the year ending with that day in the year 1883 on which the annual accounts of the library were made up.

The distribution will not be in proportion to the several incomes of the libraries; but a nominal addition of £25 will be made to the amount of each income, and the vote of £6,000 will be divided in proportion to the amounts as thus augmented, but so as that no institution shall receive more than £50, and that no payment shall be made in respect of income derived from endowments or grants from Borough or County Councils, or of moneys received for building purposes and not simply for the library itself.
