WHEREAS the Hurunui-Waitaki Railway (portion of branch from main line to Upper Ashburton, Mount Somers Contract) is one of the railways specified in the First Schedule to "The Public Works Act, 1879," and which Act is, in the seventh section thereof, declared to be a special Act authorizing the construction of such railway; and such railway is unfinished, and it has been determined to construct and maintain a further portion of the same:

Now, therefore, I, William Francis Drummond Jervois, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities conferred on me by the aforesaid section seven of "The Public Works Act, 1879," and by sections one hundred and twenty-nine and one hundred and thirty of "The Public Works Act, 1882," and in exercise of every other power and authority in anywise enabling me in that behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare that the middle line of the said further portion of the said railway shall be as defined and set forth in the Schedule hereto. hereto.

Additional Regulations for the Examination of Masters and Mates.

N pursuance of the powers vested in me by the 24th and 25th sections of "The Shipping and Seamen's Act, 1877," I do hereby make the following additional regulations for the examination of masters and mates, the same being similar to additional regulations issued by the Board of Trade, and do hereby order that they shall come into force on the 1st day of November next.

CERTIFICATES FOR HOME-TRADE PASSENGER SHIPS.

THE following additions to those subjects prescribed in the Regulations "Exn. 1" will be made to the examinations for candidates for certificates of competency for home-trade passenger ships:

- (1.) A candidate for a certificate as mate will be required to understand and work out sums in the rules of compound addition, subtraction, multiplication, and
- (2.) A candidate for a certificate as master will be required, in addition to the above, to understand the use of the quadrant, to be able to observe with it, and to find the index-error by the horizon. He will also be required to find the latitude by a meridian altitude of the sun, and to give written answers to certain prac-tical questions on the subject of the deviation of the compass.

A candidate for a mate's certificate will be allowed eight hours for the completion of the whole of the papers prescribed for that grade, and a candidate for a master's certificate will be allowed ten hours.

SUMNER PROBLEM.

Candidates for examination for certificates of competency Candidates for examination for certificates of competency for foreign-going ships as masters, first mates, and only mates will no longer be furnished by the Examiners with the longitudes corresponding to the two latitudes by the second observation. The candidates will consequently be required to work out the whole of the problem for themselves (in place of the explanation now required), and must be prepared to find the sun's true bearing at the time of taking either the first or second observation, and, when necessary, to produce the lines of positions on the chart in order to make them cut one another should the position of the ship happen to be outside the parallels of the two assumed latitudes given in the question. in the question.

Half an hour additional time will be allowed for the extra

work involved in this problem.

Extra Masters' Certificates.

With the view of obtaining uniformity of practice at the different examining ports, it is hereby notified that the time allowed candidates for examination for extra masters' certificates of competency to complete the whole of the problems and writings (including the correction of all errors and oversights) must not exceed twenty-six hours. This period is not intended to include the time occupied by the vivâ voce part of the examination.

DEVIATION OF THE COMPASS.

A period not exceeding eleven hours will be allowed to candidates for the completion of the whole of the examination in the syllabus, including the correction of all errors and oversights in both the problems and writings.

Loss of Sight.

A person who has lost the sight of one eye cannot be permitted to be examined for a certificate of competency either for the foreign or home trade. If he already holds a certificate, he cannot be examined for a certificate of a higher

352. When it is intended in such Bill to take power to deal with any lands, plans or surveys of such lands, on a scale of not less than two inches to a mile, and certified by an authorized surveyor, shall be deposited with the Bill.

358. In the case of Bills authorizing the construction of

harbour works, or the raising of further loans for the completion of harbour works previously authorized, such Bill shall be accompanied by a statement of the financial position of the promoters, an estimate of the cost of construction, and the estimated increased revenue to be derived from the proposed works, together with the plans or surveys before mentioned.
