WHEREAS it is expedient that the Marlborough Sheep District, as at present constituted W HEREAS it is expedient that the Marioorough Sheep District, as at present constituted, should be altered and reconstituted, and that a new district, to be called the Amuri Sheep District, should be constituted : Now, therefore, I, William Francis Drummond Jervois, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance

By-LAW No. 1, 1885.

For the Regulation and Management of Licensed Slaughterhouses within the Peninsula Road District.

1. It is ordered and directed by the Peninsula Road District. 1. It is ordered and directed by the Peninsula Road Board, by virtue of the authority in them vested, that, from and after the day in which this by-law shall come into operation, the license-fee payable to the Board from persons authorized to slaughter great or small cattle under "The Slaughter-houses Act, 1877," shall be for a general license the sum of 20s., payable annually to the Road Board, such license to arrite the 21st days of Documber in each user.

20s., payable annually to the Road Board, such license to expire on the 31st day of December in each year.
2. No slaughterhouse shall be licensed if the same be situated within 3 chains of any main or district road.
3. All slaughterhouses, yards, and approaches thereto shall be kept clean, and free from any offensive smell.
4. At least six hours' notice, in writing, must be given to the nearest Inspector of Slaughterhouses, by the party licensed, of his intention to slaughter any great or small cattle, giving the number, brands, and description of same, and from whom purchased.
5. No cattle shall be killed by any licensed slaughtermen except between the hours of 4 a.m. and 8 p.m. in the months

and non pointset.
5. No cattle shall be killed by any licensed slaughtermen except between the hours of 4 a.m. and 8 p.m. in the months of October, November, December, January, February, and March, and between the hours of 6 a.m. and 8 p.m. in the months of April, May, June, July, August, and September.
6. The Inspectors of Skughterhouses shall, in writing, furnish a report to the Chairman of the Road Board not later than the 1st December in each year, stating generally the condition in which the slaughterhouses in the road district have been kept during the year.
7. The fee payable to Inspectors shall be ¹/₄d. for each and every head of small cattle killed for the purpose of sale, and 1d. for each and every head of great cattle so slaughtered. Where any great or small cattle are killed by licensed slaughtermen for other purpose than for sale, the fee shall be at the rate of 2s, per thousand for small cattle, and at the rate of 2s. per hourded for great cattle.
8. For any breach of this by-law a fine of not less than 10s, or more than £5 shall be made.

If any horses or any cattle of any kind shall, at any time after this by-law shall come into operation, be found de-pasturing, straying, or trespassing, or being herded, tethered, or fed, in or upon any street, main or district road, or the sides or any ditch or bank thereof, or on any road or public place within the limits of the Peninsula Road District, or under the control of the Peninsula Road Board, whether under the tendence or control of any person or not. the under the tendence or control of any person or not, the owner of every such animal shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding £10 sterling, and the onus of proof that the trespass of any such animal as aforesaid is not wilful shall lie upon the owner thereof. RETURN of the Number of Births, with the actual Mortality of Males and Females, and the Proportion of Deaths to Population, in the under-mentioned Boroughs, during the Month of July, 1885.

The deaths of persons not residents of the boroughs, occurring at hospitals, have been excluded in all cases. The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 518, against 501 in June, an increase of 17. The deaths in July were 160, an increase of 6 on the number for June. Of the above deaths, males contributed 84; females, 76. Fifty-six of the deaths were of children under 5 years of age, being 35:00 per cent. of the whole number; 38 of these were of children under 1 year of age.

THE following Table shows the Causes of the Deaths of Persons of both Sexes under 5 Years of Age and 5 Years and upwards, and the Proportions per Cent. of Deaths from each Cause, in the Boroughs of Auckland, Wellington, Christchurch, and Dunedin, that were registered during the Month of July, 1885.

The following remarks apply only to the four principal boroughs :--The births in July were 317, against 306 in June, an increase of 11. The deaths in July were 112, against 96 in June, an increase of 16. There were 12 deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: a male of 87, and three females of 78, 77, and 67, died at Auckland; four males of 78, 76, 70, and 65 at Wellington; a female of 66 at Christchurch; and a male of 68, and two females of 67 and 66, at Dunedin. *Zymotic Diseases*.-The deaths from these diseases were 11 in July, against 5 in June. Although there was an increase in July, yet the number during the month was exceptionally low. Three deaths occurred from diphtheria, two having been in Wellington. *Constitutional. Diseases*.-There was a slight increase in the number of deaths from these causes in July.

Constitutional Diseases.-There was a slight increase in the number of deaths from these causes in July. The deaths

from phthisis were the same in number (11) in each month; cancer caused 4 deaths in July, and 5 in June. Local Diseases.—There was a considerable increase in these diseases in July, as compared with June. Diseases of the nervous system were more fatal, the deaths therefrom having been 19 in July, against 7 in June; and diseases of the digestive organs caused 9 deaths in July, and 6 in June. Violent Deaths.—There were 7 deaths in this class in July, against 9 in June. Two of the deaths were self-inflicted by

means of poison.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of these four boroughs from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong, as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.
