A PROCLAMATION.

In exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in me by the "The Counties Act, 1886," I, William Francis Drummond Jervois, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby divide the new County of Otamatea, as constituted by the said Act, into seven ridings, to be called the Kaiwaka Riding, the Whakapirau Riding, the Wairau Riding, the Mareretu Riding, the Paparoa Riding, the Matakohe Riding, and the Tokatoka Riding, and that the boundaries thereof shall be those set forth under the names of the said ridings respectively in the Schedule hereto. And I do hereby declare that the number of members to be

names of the said ridings respectively in the Schedule hereto.

And I do hereby declare that the number of members to be elected for each of the said ridings shall be as follows: For the Kaiwaka Riding, two members; for the Whakapirau Riding, one member; for the Wairau Riding, one member; for the Mareretu Riding, one member; for the Paparoa Riding, one member; for the Matakohe Riding, one member; and for the Tokatoka Riding, one member.

And I do further declare that Saturday, the nineteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, shall be the day upon which the election of the first Council of the said County of Otamatea shall take place, and that Monday, the twenty-eighth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, at one o'clock in the afternoon, shall be the time, and Mr. Davis's Hall, Mangaturoto shall be the place, at which the first meeting of the said Council shall be held.

#### SCHEDULE.

OTAMATEA COUNTY.

Kaiwaka Riding.—Comprises all that area in the County of Otamatea bounded towards the North generally by the County of Whangarei, as described in the First Schedule to "The Counties Act, 1876;" towards the North-east by the ocean to the South head of the Mangawai River; thence towards the South-east by the right bank of that river to the creek at the western side of the road forming the south-western boundary of Section No. 84, Parish of Mangawai; thence by that creek to the south-western corner of Section No. 89 of the said parish, Pakiri Survey District; thence towards the South and East by Sections Nos. 90 and 92, and the western boundary-line of the latter section produced across a road; thence again towards the South and the Northeast by Section No. 93, Parish of Mangawai aforesaid, to the Parish of Oruawharo; thence towards the South-west by the said Parish of Oruawharo to the Hakaru River; thence again Kaiwaka Riding .--Comprises all that area in the County

Whakapirau Riding.—Comprises all that area in the County of Otamatea known as the Whakapirau Road District, as described in a special order in the New Zealand Gazette No. 118, 10th November, 1883.

Wairau Riding.—Comprises all that area in the County of Otamatea known as the Wairau Road District, as described in the New Zealand Gazette No. 42, 18th May, 1883.

Mareretu Riding.—Comprises all that area in the County of Otamatea bounded towards the North-west by a line along the middle of the Manganui River from a point in line with the north-eastern boundary-line of the Parish of Matakohe to a point in line with the south-eastern boundary-line of the Parish of Tauraroa; thence by a straight line to and thence by the said Parish of Tauraroa and the Parish of Waikiekie; thence towards the North-east by the Parish of Ruarangi and the Parish of Waipu; towards the South-east by the Wairau Riding, hereinbefore described; towards the South-west by the Parish of Matakohe.

South by the Parish of Paparoa; and towards the South-west by the Parish of Matakohe.

Paparoa Ridiny.—Comprises all that area in the County of Otamatea bounded towards the North by the Mareretu Riding, hereinbefore described; towards the South-east by the Wairau Riding, hereinbefore described, and Te Pahi River; towards the South-west generally by the Arapaoa and the Paparoa Rivers; and towards the West by the Matakohe River and the Parish of Matakohe.

Matakohe Riding.—Comprises all that area in the County of Otamatea bounded towards the North by the County of Whangarei, as described in the First Schedule to "The Counties Act, 1876;" towards the North-east and South-east by the Ridings of Mareretu and Paparoa, hereinbefore described, and the Matakohe and Arapaoa Rivers; towards the

Tokatoka Riding.—Comprises all that area in the County of Otamatea bounded towards the North-west by the Parishes of Whakahara and Okahu respectively, from the Wairoa River to the Mangonui River; thence towards the North-east and again towards the North-west by the County of Whangarei, as described in the First Schedule to "The Counties Act, 1876; towards the South-east generally by the

Matakohe Riding, hereinbefore described; and towards the South-west by the Wairoa River aforesaid.

SAVING LIFE AT SEA.

SAVING LIFE AT SEA.

It was hoped that, if the Merchant Shipping Bill of 1884 had been proceeded with, it would have been possible to have introduced into the Act a clause for the better protection of life on passenger-vessels by compelling the use of approved life-saving appliances on board such vessels. The Bill, however, having been abandoned, the whole question was referred to the Royal Commission on Loss of Life at Sea, and much important evidence was given in support of the supply of approved rafts and life-saving appliances, which evidence will be found extracted hereafter.

A departmental Committee of the Board of Trade have

evidence will be found extracted hereafter.

A departmental Committee of the Board of Trade have also recently made an inquiry into the best modes of securing life on board passenger-vessels, but their report, if presented, has not been made public. It is believed, however, that the Committee have recommended an increased number of boats being carried on such vessels.

It is obvious, however, from the loss of life which has occurred at sea, that boats have not been proved efficient for saving life in cases of emergency, and the experience of past casualties goes to prove that it is necessary to supplement them with approved rafts on all ocean-going vessels, and with rafts or other efficient floating appliances on coasting and river steamers.

A list has therefore been prepared showing, from published

and river steamers.

A list has therefore been prepared showing, from published reports for the last few years, a number of cases where boats have failed, from various causes, to save life.

In many instances of collisions there has not been time to lower a boat, and men have been saved by clinging to a ladder, a spar, or anything which they found floating about, showing that, if a proper supply of floating appliances had been provided, in many such cases loss of life would have been prevented, or at any rate greatly diminished.

It is claimed for rafts that they are easier to launch than boats, as they can be thrown overboard, and in many cases

boats, as they can be thrown overboard, and in many cases would float off the deck when a ship goes down. They are not so liable to be swamped or capsized, and in case of overcrowding they do not fill and become useless, as is the case with boats.

They have also the advantage of being easier stowed on deck, and in some cases only occupy the place of deck-seats. Rafts of this description are now being fitted by the Admiralty

on board all the Indian and Imperial troopships, and the

on board all the Indian and Imperial troopships, and the emigration authorities at Calcutta are contemplating making it compulsory for all vessels carrying native emigrants to have four large rafts constructed from the deek-fittings, each capable of accommodating about thirty persons.

It will be seen from the United States Regulations that American vessels are required to carry a certain number of rafts in proportion to the capacity of the boats, and also floating appliances for every one on board.

Representations have also recently been made by the Royal Humane Society of Australasia, urging our Government to co-operate with them in compelling the use of such appliances, and an extract from the report of that society will be found below. will be found below.

The Wreck Register for the years 1883-84 shows that the loss of life for twelve months was 2,245, of which 1,282 lives were lost on missing vessels, and in many of these instances

boats must have been responsible for the loss.

Out of 10,914 lives saved from shipwrecks at home and abroad during this period, only 5,430 (or less than one-half) were rescued by the ship's boats, and four persons only were saved by "life-buoys and appliances kept on board," showing how inefficiently the wrecked vessels must have been provided with such suppliances.

vided with such appliances.

The evidence above referred to is sufficient to speak for itself, but there still exists a prejudice amongst a small secitself, but there still exists a prejudice amongst a small section of nautical men against providing any means of escape if a ship goes down, as they say it is better to sink with the ship than to run the risk of prolonging suffering in an open boat or in the water. Such persons do not realize the large number of lives which might be saved by efficient floating appliances where wrecks occur from collision or other accident near the shore, or within reach of help, and possibly in fine weather and broad daylight.

The prejudice referred to is certainly not shared by the public or by the general body of seafaring people; and it is submitted that the time has gone by when such an opinion can be allowed to prevail, and every effort must now be made for the protection of human life in case of accident to the ship.

the ship.

It is not suggested that the Board of Trade should make the use of any particular invention compulsory, but it is submitted that the same precautions should be taken to test the efficiency of the different rafts and appliances which are offered to the shipowner for adoption as the Board of Trade now take with regard to brakes in railway trains, safety-lamps in mines, &c.; and that the Board should be authorized to require that every passenger-vessel should have its deck-fittings made capable of saving life in case of accident, in accordance with some of the methods which they may have approved for this purpose. Moreover, it is strongly recommended that the regulations adopted by the United States with regard to the supply of rafts in the proportion of "at least one-fourth of the aggregate capacity of the boats," or some approved modification of this rule, should be adopted in this country.

(3.) In respect to cured fish the bonus to be paid shall be respectively \( \frac{1}{2} \)d. and \( \frac{1}{2} \)d. a pound under similar conditions, as far as the same are applicable to those contained in the two last subsections.

The total tonnage upon which the Treasurer may grant bonuses as aforesaid under this Act shall not exceed 6,000

10. Every person intending to apply for the grant of a bonus shall register a special trade-mark under the laws for the time being in force in New Zealand providing for the registration of trade-marks, such trade-mark to be used for all cured and canned fish to be prepared for export by such person, and shall, within six years after the passing of this Act, give notice to the Treasurer of his intention to export canned and cured fish with a view to applying for a bonus, and shall append to such notice a copy of such trade-mark; and all cases, barrels, or cans containing fish cured and canned for export by any such person shall, before exportation, be marked with the trade-mark so registered by him, and no part of any such bonus shall be payable except in respect of cases, barrels, or cans so marked.

5. No prospecting is allowed upon Native land without the approval in writing of the Native Minister, or of some one appointed by him in that behalf.
