HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS in pursuance of a ballot taken at a meeting of the Mount Peel Road Board, held on the fifteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, George James Dennistoun and Robert Thew, two of the members of the said Board, retired therefrom: And whereas the ballot should have taken place on the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, but through misadventure was not taken till the date first above mentioned, and it is expedient to validate the said ballot:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, and in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred upon him by section one hundred and fifty-seven of "The Road Boards Act, 1882," doth hereby order and declare that the ballot held on the fifteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, for two members of the said Mount Peel Road Board to retire, shall be deemed to have been properly taken, and all proceedings consequent thereon shall

be as valid and effectual as if the irregularity hereinbefore mentioned had not taken place.

Regulations under "The Government Life Insurance Act, 1886."

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this sixth day of September, 1887.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by "The Government Life Insurance Act, 1886" (hereinafter referred to as "the said Act"), it is, among other things, enacted that on the commencement of the said Act all the provisions of "The Government Insurance and Annuities Act, 1874," and of every other Act amending the same, or that would have applied to the last-mentioned Act if such Act had remained in force, shall, notwithstanding the prior express or implied repeal thereof, and except as expressly provided by the said Act, be and the same are thereby re-enacted so far as such provisions are capable of taking effect:

And whereas by the fifth section of "The Government Insurance and Annuities Act, 1874," it is, among other things, enacted that the Governor shall have power, by Order in Council, from time to time to do the following things:—

To make rules generally for the purpose of carrying the Act into effect, and to impose penalties not exceeding twenty pounds for breach of such rules;

To make rules respecting the loan of moneys under the Act on the security of the surrender value of policies, and for the effectual recovery of principal and interest accruing on such loans:

And whereas it is expedient that certain of the holders of insurance policies issued and to be issued by the Government Insurance Commissioner should be permitted to join together to create, and continue, a Tontine Savings Fund, which will proceed from the bonuses on such of the said policies as are terminated by death, surrender, and lapse:

And whereas it is expedient that rules should be made with respect to the said Tontine Savings Fund, in manner hereinafter set forth:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by the said Act and "The Government Insurance and Annuities Act, 1874," and of all other powers and authorities in this behalf vested in him, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby make and prescribe the rules set forth hereunder; and doth hereby declare that this present Order in Council shall take effect as from the date of the publication thereof in the *New Zealand Gazette*.

RULES.

1. IN these rules, and in all policies or instruments issued or made thereunder, if not inconsistent with the context,—

"Commissioner" means the Government Insurance Commissioner holding office for the time being:

"Endowment-insurance policy" means a policy the sum assured by which is payable at a certain date, or upon the death of the person whose life is insured if it happen before such date:

"Life-insurance policy" means a policy the sum assured by which is payable upon the death of the person whose life is insured whenever that event may occur, or upon his death if it happen within a specified term:

"Policy" means an instrument in writing, or partly in writing and partly printed, containing any contract whatever upon the contingencies of human life, and entered into by the Government Insurance Commissioner, according to the law and regulations at the time in force:

"Premium" means the periodical or other payment for any policy:

"Tontine Savings Fund policy" means a policy the holder of which is permitted to join the Tontine Savings Fund system:

"Tontine Class" means the whole of the policyholders who are permitted to join together to participate in the Tontine Savings Fund, as provided in these regulations:

"Tontine period" means the period extending from the date of these rules to the 31st day of December, 1900, inclusive.

2. The amount of the Tontine Savings Fund shall be invested in the same manner as other funds of the Govern-

ment Insurance Department, and shall receive credit for interest on its accumulations proportionately to that made on the whole of the funds of the department.

3. The period of the Tontine Savings Fund shall be completed on the 31st December, 1900.

4. Any insurance policy which has been already taken out, or which may be taken out on or before the 31st day of December, 1890, may be placed in the tontine: Provided—

- (a.) That no endowment insurance policyholder the date of maturity of whose policy will occur on or before the 31st December, 1900, shall be allowed to join the Tontine Class:
- (b.) That no policyholder shall be allowed to join the Tontine Class after the 31st December, 1890:
- (c.) That, in the case of policies already issued, the policyholder must sign an application in the form prescribed in the First Schedule hereto, such application to be indorsed on the policy, and also signed by the Commissioner:
- (d.) That, in the case of a proponent who desires his policy (if issued) to be included in the Tontine Class from the date of issue, the said policy may be so included, if the said proponent sign an application in the form prescribed in the Second Schedule hereto; provided that the Commissioner indorses the said policy in the manner and form prescribed in the Third Schedule hereto.

5. No Tontine Savings Fund policyholder shall be allowed during the tontine period to surrender for cash any bonus which may have been allocated to the policy during the tontine period.

6. In the event of a Tontine Savings Fund policyholder desiring to effect a loan from the Commissioner on such policy on or before the 31st December, 1900, he shall not be allowed to borrow on the security of any bonus allocated to such policy during the tontine period.

7. In the event of the termination of a Tontine Savings Fund policy by death during the time in which it is included in the Tontine Class and while it is in full force, any reversionary bonus (including prospective bonus) allocated to it since it was placed in the said Tontine Class shall be forfeited, and be transferred from the Assurance Fund to the Tontine Savings Fund. The executors, administrators, or assigns of the deceased insured shall receive the full sum assured, together with any reversionary bonus still in force which may have been allocated to the policy prior to the date on which it was included in the Tontine Class, and such policy shall not participate in the Tontine Savings Fund.

8. In the event of a Tontine Savings Fund policy being surrendered, either for cash or for any other purpose whatsoever, or becoming lapsed and void during the time in which it is included in the Tontine Class, the cash value of any reversionary bonus which may have accrued since the policy was placed in the said Tontine Class shall be forfeited, and shall be transferred from the Assurance Fund to the Tontine Savings Fund, and such policy shall not participate in the Tontine Savings Fund.

9. In the event of a Tontine Savings Fund policy which has acquired a surrender value becoming overdue during the time in which it is included in the Tontine Class, the surrender value which shall be applied to the payment of overdue premiums and interest thereon, and other charges (if any) on such policy, shall not include the surrender value of any reversionary bonus allocated to such policy during the time it is included in the Tontine Class; and should such policy become lapsed and void on or before the 31st December, 1900, the cash value of any reversionary bonuses allocated to such policy during the time it may have been included in the Tontine Class shall be forfeited, and shall be transferred from the Assurance Fund to the Tontine Savings Fund, and such policy shall not participate in the Tontine Savings Fund.

10. If at the 31st December, 1900, the premiums on a Tontine Savings Fund policy shall be overdue, and the surrender value shall have become exhausted by the amount of the premiums overdue, and interest thereon, and other charges (if any) debited against such surrender value, but the year during which the policy may be revived (subject to proof of health to the satisfaction of the Commissioner, and to the payment of the arrears of premiums and interest thereon) has not expired, the cash surrender value of any bonuses which may have been allocated to such policy during the tontine period shall be forfeited, and shall be placed in the Tontine Savings Fund in the same manner as if the policy had lapsed, and such policy shall not participate in the Tontine Savings Fund, or in any bonus allocated in respect of the tontine period.

11. At the expiry of the tontine period policyholders participating in the tontine distribution, in addition to receiving their shares of the Tontine Savings Fund, shall have full control of the bonuses allocated to them during the time they were included in the Tontine Class.

12. The whole of the Tontine Savings Fund shall, after the termination of the tontine period, be divided amongst the surviving tontine policyholders whose policies shall be in full force on the 31st December, 1900 (either by reason of the premiums not being in arrear or by the policy being kept alive out of surrender value as aforesaid), according to the method to be determined by an Actuary or Actuaries to be appointed by His Excellency the Governor of New Zealand.

13. The shares of profit being determined as aforesaid, each Tontine Savings Fund policyholder will be allowed the following five options, on giving notice of his intention three months previous to the expiration of the Tontine Savings Fund period, viz. :—

- (a.) To terminate his assurance by receiving in cash the surrender value of his policy, and the value of his bonuses, together with his share of the Tontine Savings Fund;
- (b.) To surrender his interest for a paid-up policy of such amount as the total cash receivable under option (a) will purchase;
- (c.) To withdraw in cash the value of his bonuses and share of the Tontine Savings Fund, and continue the original policy by payment of premiums at original rate, such policy either to become an ordinary one earning a bonus at each valuation period, or to be placed in a fresh tontine, at the option of the holder;
- (d.) To continue the original policy, and convert the sum receivable in cash under the last preceding option into an annuity for the remaining currency of the assurance;
- (e.) To terminate the assurance and convert the whole of the cash receivable under option (a) into an annuity for life;
- (f.) To continue the original policy with its accrued bonuses as reversionary additions, and apply share of Tontine Savings Fund to purchase of additional assurance without additional premium.

The college will open on Tuesday, the 4th October, 1887.*

The college session will extend from the beginning of October to the beginning of July, and will be divided into three terms of about eleven weeks each, with about three weeks' vacation at Christmas and at Easter.

The charge for board, lodging, and tuition will be £30 a term, payable in advance. This charge will include all expenses except laundress, special medical attendance, fees for University examinations, and individual lessons in music, singing, or painting. Arrangements will be made to allow students whose circumstances render it necessary, and who obtain permission from the Principal, to reside in college during the vacations, under proper supervision, at a fixed weekly charge.

The staff will consist of resident women tutors and lecturers, and of visiting professors and lecturers, men and women, from London and elsewhere.

The principal subjects of instruction will be divinity, classics, mediæval and modern languages, mathematics, natural science, history and political economy, mental and moral science, and theory of music.

The curriculum will be so arranged as to prepare students for the London University degrees, for the Oxford honour examinations, and for such other examinations as the Governors may hereafter find desirable.

There will be yearly courses of instruction in hygiene, ambulance work, cookery, and needlework, as well as classes for gymnastic exercises, drawing, and vocal music, and special lessons in painting, instrumental music, and solo singing for students who desire them.

Students may select their course of study, subject to the approval of the Principal.

Those who do not wish to study for a University examination will be admitted, provided they satisfy the Principal that they are *bonâ fide* students, with some definite course in view.

No student may enter for less than one year, or reside for more than four years, without special permission from the Governors. The Principal may require the withdrawal of any student who is not profiting by the education of the college.

Candidates for admission must be over seventeen years of age, must furnish to the Principal satisfactory references, and pass an entrance examination.

The following examinations will be accepted in place of the entrance examination: The London matriculation, the Oxford women's first examination, the higher certificate examination of the Oxford and Cambridge Board, the Cambridge higher local examination in any two of the groups A, B, and C, the various senior local examinations of the Universities of England, Scotland, Ireland, and the colonies, provided two languages, or one language and mathematics, are included in the pass, and such other examinations as the Governors may from time to time deem equivalent.

An entrance examination will be held, for the convenience of students, at Queen's College, 43, Harley Street, London, W., on Thursday and Friday, the 4th and 5th August. If any students are unable to attend this examination, they may be examined at the Royal Holloway College on Thursday and Friday, the 29th and 30th September. Forms of entry may be obtained, with further information, from the Secretary, and must be returned to him filled up, if possible, not later than the 15th July. The examination will consist of—

- (1.) Obligatory subjects, viz., arithmetic, English essay, and a paper on English history and general geography;
- (2.) Optional subjects, of which not less than two nor more than four may be taken, one, at least, being a language, viz., Latin, Greek, French, German, algebra, geometry, trigonometry.

Each student will have a bedroom and sittingroom to herself, and every provision has been made in the internal arrangements of the college for the health and comfort of its inmates. The building includes chapel, dining-hall, library, reading-room, museum, and a picture gallery containing a valuable collection of modern British paintings. The grounds and gardens are extensive, and provided with tennis-courts. There is also a gymnasium.

No religious test will be imposed as a condition of admission. The domestic life of the college will be that of a Christian household, and prayers will be said daily by the Principal. Provision will be made for the conduct of Divine service in the chapel on Sundays. Students will be allowed, under proper regulations, to attend the services of any religious denomination which their parents or guardians may desire.

The founder has provided that in the third year from the opening of the college, and in all future years, twelve foundation scholarships shall be awarded.

Fifteen scholarships of £50 a year each, tenable for three years from the opening of the college, have been provided by the liberality of the following benefactors: Miss Mary Ann Driver (6); Henry Driver-Holloway, Esq. (2); Antony Gibbs,

Esq.; Walpole Greenwell, Esq. (2); George Martin-Holloway, Esq. (2); Benjamin Newgass, Esq.; Henry Tate, Esq.

The scholarships will be competed for at the entrance examination in August.

Entrance and Scholarship Examinations.

The entrance examination will be held at Queen's College, 43, Harley Street, London, on Thursday and Friday, the 4th and 5th August. Forms of entry may be obtained from the Secretary, and should be returned to him not later than the 15th July, with the examination fee of £1.* Candidates must be at Queen's College by 9.45 a.m. Luncheon will be provided for them on each day at a charge of 1s.

The examination will consist of—

1. Obligatory subjects: Arithmetic, English essay, paper on English history and general geography.

2. Optional subjects, of which not less than two nor more than four must be taken, one, at least, being a language: Latin, Greek, French, German, algebra, geometry, trigonometry.

The standard in each subject will be as follows:—

Latin and Greek: Easy passages for translation into English; easy English sentences for translation into Latin or Greek; questions on grammar.

French and German: Passages for translation into English; English sentences and prose passages for translation into French or German; questions on grammar.

Algebra: To the binomial theorem, inclusive. (A candidate will pass in this subject if she shows sound knowledge up to and including simple equations.)

Geometry: Euclid's Elements, Books i.-iv., vi., and xi. 1-21. (A candidate will pass if she knows the two first books.)

Trigonometry: So far as to include the solution of triangles.

In all the papers great importance will be attached to sound elementary work.

Students who, from residence abroad or other sufficient cause, are unable to attend the entrance examination in August, may be examined at the Royal Holloway College on Thursday and Friday, the 29th and 30th September.

Board and lodging will in this case be provided at the college at a charge of 12s. 6d. for the two days.

The following examinations will be accepted in place of the entrance examination:—

The London matriculation; the Oxford women's first examination; the higher certificate examination of the Oxford and Cambridge Board; the Cambridge Higher Local examination in any two of the groups A, B, and C; the various senior local examinations of the Universities of England, Scotland, Ireland, and the colonies, provided two languages or one language and mathematics are included in the pass; and such other examinations as the Governors may from time to time deem equivalent.

Any candidate for a scholarship who has passed one of the above examinations may omit, if she wishes, the obligatory subjects of the entrance examination.

Scholarships.

Fifteen scholarships of £50 a year each, tenable in the college for three years from its opening, will be awarded on the results of the entrance examination in August.

A scholarship may be awarded for special excellence in one or two subjects, or for a high aggregate of marks. A paper which falls below a certain standard of excellence will have no value assigned to it. The Governors do not pledge themselves to award all the scholarships if candidates of sufficient merit do not present themselves.

All scholars will be expected to work for an honour examination of Oxford or London, and will hold their scholarships subject to a yearly report from the Principal respecting their conduct and progress.

THE following by-laws, made by the Waiuku and Waipipi Road Boards, are published in accordance with "The Road Boards Act, 1882," and "The Counties Act, 1886."

By-LAWS made by the Waiuku and Waipipi Road Boards, in accordance with the Provisions of "The Road Boards Act, 1882," and "The Counties Act, 1886," by Special Order made on the 30th April, 1887, to provide for the Licensing and Numbering of all Vehicles plying for Hire for the Carriage of Goods or of Passengers either within the Waiuku and Waipipi Road Districts, or from Places beyond to Places within the said Districts, and to prevent Unlicensed Vehicles from plying for Hire, and to regulate the same.

1. For each license to use a wheeled vehicle plying for hire for the carriage of goods or of passengers as aforesaid, there shall be paid to the Clerk of the Waipipi Road Board the sum of £1, and each license so issued shall be renewable on the 1st day of January in each year.

2. In every such license so granted shall be specified the name and surname and place of abode of every owner of the vehicle in respect of which the license is granted, and also the number of the license.

3. The owner of every such licensed vehicle shall cause to be painted thereon, in a legible manner and conspicuous place, the name of the district within which he intends to ply for hire, and the number of the license issued for such vehicle.

4. If any owner of any wheeled vehicle permits the same to be used as a vehicle plying for hire within the Waiuku and Waipipi Road Districts (hereinafter termed "the said districts") without having a license in force in respect of such vehicle from the Waipipi Road Board, or without having the name and number as aforesaid painted on such vehicle as aforesaid, or if any person be found driving, standing, or in any way plying for hire within the said districts with any such vehicle for which no such license is in force, or without the names of the districts and the number of such vehicle openly displayed on such vehicle, every such person so offending shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5.

5. Every vehicle which has been duly licensed to carry passengers or goods by the county, borough, or road district to which it properly belongs shall not be liable to the license fees contained in the foregoing clauses, provided the owner or driver produces the license to the Clerk of the Waipipi Road Board; and on the payment of 1s. the Clerk shall, on being satisfied of the correctness of such license, indorse thereon a permit to ply for hire within the said districts.

6. Before issuing any license as aforesaid the Waipipi Road Board shall be satisfied that the applicant is of good repute, and also that the vehicle and horses are in good order and condition; and, if at any time during the currency of the license so granted the said Board shall be satisfied that the holder of such license is not a suitable person, or that the vehicle or horses are not in good and safe condition, such licenses may be suspended or revoked.

PORT PHILLIP BAY.

THE attention of masters of vessels, pilots, and others is directed to the following alterations in connection with the lights and fog-signal stations in Port Phillip Bay, and which will take effect from the respective dates mentioned:—

New Swan Spit Light-vessel.

Referring to notice dated the 5th January, 1882, it is now notified that, on and after the 12th September, 1887, the present Swan Spit Lightship, exhibiting two red lights, will be removed, and will be replaced by a new iron circular light-vessel, which will be moored in the same position, and from which will be exhibited one light.

The hull of the new vessel is 36ft. in diameter, painted red, and is surmounted by a round iron tower, painted white.

The light will be a fourth-order fixed red light, with a dioptric illuminating apparatus, elevated 38ft. above the sea-level, and will be visible all round in clear weather at a distance of eight nautical miles.

Fog-signals: During thick and foggy weather warning-signals will be given therefrom every five minutes, *i.e.*, by alternately sounding a gong with a bell.

South Channel Pile Light.

Adverting to notice dated the 13th May, 1874, it is hereby notified that, on and after the 8th September, 1887, a ray of white light will be exhibited from the South Channel Pile Lighthouse, and the centre of such "ray" will show over No. 15 Buoy, situate at the eastern entrance to the South Channel.

The existing red and white cuttings of the Pile Light remain unaltered, but the additional white sector will be visible, when approaching thereto, on the following bearings, *viz.*, W. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. to W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. (magnetic), and is established for the purpose of enabling pilots and masters of vessels when nearing the eastern entrance to the South Channel from Melbourne or Geelong to ascertain the position of the Pile Lighthouse earlier than heretofore, and, consequently, to proceed with greater confidence towards the eastern or shore light, until the red sector of the Pile Light is sighted.

The sailing directions for the South Channel remain unaltered.

Gellibrand Point Lightship.

Fog-signals.

Referring to notice to mariners dated the 22nd June, 1878, notice is hereby given that, on and after the 3rd September, 1887, a system of fog-signals will be established on board the Gellibrand Lightship, in lieu of those now authorised.

During thick and foggy weather warning-signals will be given therefrom at intervals of five minutes, by alternately exploding one rocket and sounding the present aurora fog-horn.

Warning.

The rockets explode at a height of about 600ft. above the sea-level, producing at the same time a sharp report, which should be heard under favourable atmospheric conditions at a distance of from five to six miles; but circumstances may arise to prevent even the most powerful sound-signal from being heard two miles distant; therefore, when the rocket-signal is heard, it should be assumed that the source of the sound is not more than from one to one and a half miles distant, and the necessary precautions taken accordingly.

Alterations in and Additions to the Scale of Charges in force on the New Zealand Railways.

IN accordance with section 144 of "The Public Works Act, 1882," I, Edward Richardson, the Minister for Public Works, do hereby make the following alterations in and additions to the scale of charges, to come into force on and after the 12th September, 1887:—

PART I.—PASSENGERS.

GENERAL FARES AND REGULATIONS.

Football, Cricket, Tennis, and Bowling Teams.

Second-class Saturday return tickets, available for first-class carriages, will be issued to football, cricket, tennis, and bowling teams of not less than fifteen members. These tickets will be available for return for a week from date of issue. Where a single journey only is to be made, second-class single tickets will be issued available for first-class carriages.

Teams will be required to give three days' notice to the District Manager before travelling.

PART IV.—LOCAL RATES.

Native brown coals from Fernhill, Walton Park, and Green Island pits to Abbotsford, Burnside, and stations and sidings on the Walton Park Branch will be charged 2s. per ton.

Bonus for Canned and Cured Fish for Export.

Treasury Department,

IT is hereby notified that bonuses under "The Fisheries Encouragement Act, 1885," as set forth in the following sections (Nos. 8, 9, and 10) of that Act, will be paid subject to the conditions named therein, and in the regulations contained in the Order in Council of even date herewith.

8. In order to encourage the production and curing of fish for export, the Colonial Treasurer shall during the next seven years after the passing of this Act, without further appropriation by Parliament, pay out of the Consolidated Fund to any person who shall prepare canned and cured fish for export, and actually export the same from the colony, a bonus or bonuses upon the quantity of canned and cured fish prepared and exported by such person as hereinafter mentioned, that is to say,—

- (1.) In respect of the first 200 tons avoirdupois of fish canned with or without oil, the sum of 1d. per pound, the weight of the cans not to be included in the tonnage upon which such bonus is paid;
- (2.) In respect of every ton avoirdupois of fish canned as aforesaid beyond the first 200 tons, the sum of $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per pound, the weight of the cans not to be included in the tonnage upon which such bonus is paid;
- (3.) In respect to cured fish the bonus to be paid shall be respectively $\frac{1}{2}$ d. and $\frac{1}{4}$ d. a pound under similar conditions, as far as the same are applicable to those contained in the two last subsections.

9. The total tonnage upon which the Treasurer may grant bonuses as aforesaid under this Act shall not exceed 6,000 tons.

10. Every person intending to apply for the grant of a bonus shall register a special trade-mark under the laws for the time being in force in New Zealand providing for the registration of trade-marks, such trade-mark to be used for all cured and canned fish to be prepared for export by such person, and shall, within six years after the passing of this Act, give notice to the Treasurer of his intention to export canned and cured fish with a view to applying for a bonus, and shall append to such notice a copy of such trade-mark; and all cases, barrels, or cans containing fish cured and canned for export by any such person shall, before exportation, be marked with the trade-mark so registered by him, and no part of any such bonus shall be payable except in respect of cases, barrels, or cans so marked.

Rewards offered for the Discovery of New Goldfields.—
Amended Conditions.

REWARDS are offered for the discovery of new goldfields, upon the conditions set forth hereunder, payable out of the parliamentary vote of £2,500.

AMENDED CONDITIONS.

1. THE maximum sum offered as a reward for any proved discovery of a new goldfield in accordance with these conditions is £500; but, if the total sum claimed as rewards in any one year exceeds the parliamentary vote, the amount available only will be divided equally.

2. The newly-discovered goldfield, if in alluvial ground, must be situated not less than ten miles from the nearest alluvial gold-workings, or, if in quartz, not less than five miles from the nearest existing quartz-mines.

3. No grant will be paid upon any application until it shall have been proved that not less than 20,000 ounces of gold have been extracted from the new goldfield within two years from the registration of the discovery, if in alluvial workings, and, if in quartz-workings, proof of a similar yield from this source within three years from such registration will be required.

4. Any person discovering new gold-workings, and being desirous of obtaining a reward, shall immediately forward a written report of such discovery, with full particulars, to the Warden or Resident Magistrate of the district within which such discovery shall be situated, and the Warden or Resident Magistrate shall forthwith register the report as an application for reward.

5. No prospecting is allowed upon Native land without the approval in writing of the Native Minister, or of some one appointed by him in that behalf.

Prospectors going upon Native land without the consent of the owners are liable to the penalties imposed by the Acts relating to goldfields, and will forfeit all claim to reward.

Additional Regulation as to Payment of Rewards for Discovery of New Goldfields.

Descriptions of Sections:

The sections in Blocks VIII., XI., and XII., Mangaone Survey District, are situated near Alfredton, between the Mangaone settlements and the Ihuraua River, and comprise hilly and flat country of fair and good quality, covered generally with light mixed bush, and on some of the Ihuraua flats with manuka. Most of the sections are well watered. Attention is directed to Sections 213 and 215, which include natural clearings.

The small-farm sections comprise portions of the land originally surveyed as the Township of Alfredton; the southern half consists of flats covered with manuka, flax, &c.; the back part is hilly light bush land; the quality of the soil is fair.

The sections in the Apiti District form part of the Otamakapua Block, situated north of the Birmingham Association Settlement, between the KIWITEA and OROUA RIVERS. The bulk of the area is hilly land of good quality, covered generally with rimu, matai, miro, kahikatea, &c., and usual undergrowth, and is as a rule well watered.
