CONDITIONS Upon which the Society will award a Bronze Medallion for Proficiency in Swimming Exercises with Reference to saving Life, and Certificates for Proficiency in the Theoretical Knowledge of the Art of saving Life from Drowning, &c., at the Public and Private Schools in all the Australasian Colonies.

1. A BRONZE medallion will be awarded by the society, in the month of April in each year, for the practical demon-stration of ability in swimming to the relief of a drowning person, and effecting his rescue and resuscitation, to each school which shall contribute the sum of £1 1s. to the

funds of the society, thereby constituting its headmaster or teacher a member thereof, and which shall send two months'

teacher a member thereof, and which shall send two months previous notice to the Secretary of its intention to compete. 2. A certificate will be awarded by the society, in the month of April in each year, for the theoretical knowledge of the society's directions for saving life in cases of drown-ing, snake-bite, choking, sunstroke, bleeding, fainting, and apoplexy, to each school which shall contribute the sum of £1 is. to the funds of the society, thereby constituting its headmaster or teacher a member thereof, and which shall send two months' previous notice to the Secretary of its in-tention to commete

tention to compete. 3. The practical demonstration shall be made in the pre-sence of the scholars and the headmaster or teacher, or of such other judge as he shall appoint, whose award shall be final.

4. Printed papers for the theoretical examination will be issued by the society to the headmasters or teachers of schools on application, and the examination will be held under their supervision. The answers must be in writing; the decision of the headmasters or teachers thereon to be final.

N.B.—The subscription of £1 1s. will include the compe-tion for both medallion and certificate.

RULES to be observed by Competitors for the Bronze Medal-lion awarded by the Royal Humane Society of Austral-asia for Proficiency in swimming Exercises at the Public and the Private Schools, with Reference to saving Life from Drowning.

1. THE competition for the medallion to be open to all pupils of the school, subject to the approval of the headmaster or teacher, and to be held at such place as he shall direct, and be carried out under his supervision or that of such umpire

be carried out under his supervision or that of such umpire as he may appoint. Each to have one trial, under the fol-lowing conditions:— 2. First Trial.—A dummy or block of wood to represent a body, to be floated at some distance from the place where the pupil has to enter the water. The competitor is to swim to it and bring it back to the starting-point.

The pupil has to enter the water. The competitor is to sum to it and bring it back to the starting-point. N.B.—In running water this rule may be modified to such extent as the headmaster or teacher may consider necessary. Second Trial.—A weighted dummy or block of wood, with rope handles, to be sunk at some distance from the place where the competitor is to enter the water. The competitor shall swim to the spot, dive, and bring the dummy to land at the place appointed. The spot where it is sunk may be indicated by a floating cork, not to be attached to the dummy (except in running water). Third Trial.—A dummy to be sunk in the water, the place not being indicated. The competitor to enter the water at a given point, then dive, find the dummy, and bring it to the shore. The weight of the dummy to be proportioned to the ages of the pupils. A certain number of marks to be awarded to every com-petitor in each of the above trials, the minimum of time occupied being an important consideration.

occupied being an important consideration. 3. Competitors to be partially clothed. 4. The medallion is to be awarded to the pupil who has obtained the greatest number of marks in the above three trials. The winner of the society's medallion is ineligible for future prizes.

It is strongly recommended that all competitors should make themselves acquainted with the rules for the restora-tion of the apparently drowned, &c., as adopted by this society.

(3.) In respect to cured fish the bonus to be paid shall be respectively ¹/₄d. and ¹/₈d. a pound under similar conditions, as far as the same are applicable to those contained in the two last subsections.

9. The total tonnage upon which the Treasurer may grant bonuses as aforesaid under this Act shall not exceed 6,000

tons. 10. Every person intending to apply for the grant of a bonus shall register a special trade-mark under the laws for the time being in force in New Zealand providing for the registration of trade-marks, such trade-mark to be used for all cured and canned fish to be prepared for export by such person, and shall, within six years after the passing of this Act, give notice to the Treasurer of his intention to export canned and cured fish with a view to applying for a bonus, and shall append to such notice a copy of such trade-mark and all cases, barrels, or cans containing fish cured and canned for export by any such person shall, before exporta-tion, be marked with the trade-mark so registered by him, and no part of any such bonus shall be payable except in respect of cases, barrels, or cans so marked.

specific,--

I disclaim so much of the invention and the plans and specifications thereof as relates to grippers, and to the method of fastening the aprons together by lacing. I desire to make the alterations hereinafter specified, and

also shown by the amended drawings filed at the Patent Office, that is to say,-

1. To alter the title by inserting the words "Accident and" immediately before the word "Collision."

2. To alter paragraph 1 of the specifications by adding at the end the words "or any other accident." 3. To alter paragraph 2 by adding after the word "Cau-vas" the following words: "or any other suitable flexible ma-terial, stitched or otherwise fastened together in a corrugated form; the corrugations to enclose scantlings, battens, or other suitable material; and, in cases where the apron is required to be applied to the lower part of the vessel, iron clamps are fastened to the battens, scantlings, or other material used, so as to clip over the keel. 4. By inserting, "That the method of working the inven-

tion is as follows :-

"Drop the bite of the two chains over the stern; this is done by cutting the rope-stops, which causes the chains to fall under the keel near midships; and the four ends of the chains are carried either fore or aft, according to the posi-tion of the leak; the two ends of the chains on the side where the leak is to be bent or hooked on to the two chains fixed on apron at its lower end; the upper ends of the apron-chains are to be fastened, temporarily, on deck; the guys or stays are bent or hooked on and the ends fixed, tem-porarily, fore and aft; the apron, which is in the form of a roll, can then be lowered or thrown overboard, and the suc-tion caused by the leak will greatly tend to place the apron in the required position over the leak; the vertical chains can now be definitely made to regulate the apron as regards height and depth, and the guys or stays are now in a posi-tion to definitely regulate the position fore and aft." 5.
