Native Lands acquired by Her Majesty declared to be Crown Lands.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by section two hundred and forty-seven of "The Land Act, 1885" (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), it is enacted that whenever the Governor is satisfied that any Native lands acquired by Her Majesty in any way, or purchased out of any sums authorised, or to be authorised, to be issued and expended in the purchase of lands in the North Island of New Zealand are free from Native claims and all difficulties in connection therewith, he shall, by Proclamation, declare such lands to be Crown lands, subject to be sold and dealt with as in the said Act is more particularly mentioned: And whereas the lands hereinafter mentioned have been purchased out of sums so authorised to be issued and expended as aforesaid:

Now, therefore, I, William Francis Drummond Jervois, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, being satisfied that the lands enumerated in the Schedule hereto are free from Native claims and all difficulties in connection therewith, do hereby, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by the said Act, proclaim and declare the lands so enumerated as aforesaid to be Crown lands, subject to be sold and dealt with according to the provisions of the laws regulating the sale and disposal of Crown lands in force in the land districts in which they are respectively situated.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this sixteenth day of August, 1888.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

IN exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Public Domains Act, 1881," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby revoke a certain Order in Council, dated the twenty-second day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, making delegation of certain powers in manner as therein appears; and doth, with the like advice and consent, by this present order, delegate, but only with respect to the piece or parcel of land described in the Schedule hereto, all the powers conferred by the Act aforesaid, except the powers under or conferred by sections five and twelve thereof, to the under-mentioned persons, who shall be known as the Dobson Public Domain Board, namely,—

(herein referred to as "the Board"), subject to the stipulations hereinafter contained, that is to say,—

- The Board shall meet for the transaction of business on the first Saturday in each month, at eight o'clock p.m., at Sweetman's Post Office Store, Dobson, or at such other time or place as may from time to time be fixed by the Board. The first meeting shall be held on Saturday, the sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.
- Special meetings may be convened by the Chairman or by any two members of the Board, provided that two days' notice of such meeting be given to each member, specifying the business to be transacted at such special meeting, and no other business than that so specified shall be transacted at such meeting.
- Any three of the said Board shall form a quorum. Any meeting may be adjourned from time to time.
- The members of the Board shall, at their first meeting, and thereafter at an annual meeting to be held on the second Saturday in January in every succeeding year thereafter, elect one of themselves to be Chairman, who may join in the discussion, and shall have an original as well as a casting vote. The Chairman shall hold office until the election of his successor.
- If at any meeting the Chairman is not present at the time appointed for holding the same, the members present shall choose some one of their number to be Chairman of such meeting.
- If, by resignation, death, or incapacity, or otherwise, the office of Chairman shall be or become vacant, the members may at any monthly or special meeting appoint a Chairman.
- All questions shall be determined by the majority of votes of the members of the Board present at a meeting.

SIR,—The Imperial German Government has declared the port of Yalint to be the only port of entry of the Marshall Islands.

The masters of those ships which come from any port outside of said islands have to enter the port of Yalint, and to report to the Imperial Commissioner at said last-mentioned port before touching any other one of the said islands.

Any violation of any of the foregoing provisions shall be punishable by fine not exceeding 6,000 marks. This fine may be enforced against the ship and cargo without regard to the owner of the same, and the forfeiture of the ship may be adjudged.

The following remarks apply only to the four principal boroughs:—
 The births in July were 239, against 234 in June, an increase of 5. The deaths in July were 103, against 89 in June, an increase of 14.
 There were 20 deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: a male of 79, and two females of 75 and 67, died at Auckland; eight males of 82 (2), 78 (2), 70, 69 (2), and 68, and six females of 90, 78, 75, 74, 72, and 66, at Wellington; two males of 74 and 70 at Christchurch; and a male of 74 at Dunedin.
Specific Febrile or Zymotic Diseases.—There were 8 deaths from this class of disease in July, including 2 from diphtheria: 1 at Wellington and 1 at Christchurch. In June, diphtheria caused 3 deaths at Wellington and 1 at Auckland. There was only one death from diarrhoeal disease in July.
Constitutional Diseases.—There were 22 deaths in this class in July, against 25 in the previous month. The deaths from phthisis were 9 in number, against 10 in June. The deaths from cancer increased in number from 4 to 6. Of these, 5 occurred in Dunedin.
Local Diseases.—These diseases caused 55 deaths in July, against 40 in June. Diseases of the respiratory system were more fatal in July than in the preceding month, the number of deaths being 20 and 12 respectively. Amongst the 20 deaths for July are found 12 from bronchitis, 5 of which occurred at Wellington.
Violent Deaths.—These were only 4 in number. An infant was suffocated at birth, and a child died from burns. There was one case of accidental drowning—an adult, and one suicidal death.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of these four boroughs from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.
