A PROCLAMATION.

A PROCLAMATION.

In exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in me by "The Counties Act, 1886," and "The Counties Act Amendment Act, 1888," I, William Francis Drummond Jervois, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby divide the new County of Pahiatua, as constituted by the said Acts, into five ridings, to be called the Mangahao Riding, the Pukemiku Riding, the Makuri Riding, the Mangaone Riding, and the Puketoi Riding, and that the boundaries thereof shall be those set forth under the names of the said ridings respectively in the Schedule hereto.

And I do hereby declare that the number of members to be elected for each of the said ridings shall be as follows: For the Mangaone Riding, two members; for the Puketoi Riding, two members; for the Mangahao Riding, one member; for the Pukemiku Riding, one member; and for the Makuri Riding, one member.

And I do further declare that Saturday, the twenty-fourth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eightyeight, shall be the day upon which the election of the first Council of the said County of Pahiatua shall take place; and that Wednesday, the twenty-eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eightyeight, at one o'clock in the afternoon, shall be the time, and the Road Board Office, Pahiatua, shall be the place, at which the first meeting of the said Council shall be held.

Regulations for Trout-, Carp, and Perch-fishing, Wanganui Acclimatisation District.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this sixteenth day of October, 1888. Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

In pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," and "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby make the following regulations for the Wanganui District, which consists of the Counties of Wanganui and Waitotara, and the Ridings of Okakapu, Porewa, Wangaehu, Makohau, and Paraekaretu, in the County of Rangitikei, and in the waters thereof; and doth hereby declare that these regulations shall, as from the date of the publication thereof in the New Zealand Gazette, supersede all regulations at variance therewith.

REGULATIONS.

REGULATIONS.

1. LICENSES to fish for trout, carp, and perch in all the waters within the Counties of Wanganui and Waitotara, and the Ridings of Okakapu, Porewa, Wangaehu, Makohau, and Paraekaretu, in the County of Rangitikei, will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Wanganui Acclimatisation Society, and for every such license a fee of ten shillings will be charged: Provided that it shall not be obligatory upon the society to issue a license.

2. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish in any of the said waters from the first day of November in any one year to the eleventh day of April in

November in any one year to the eleventh day of April in the following year inclusive, between the hours of four a.m. and ten p.m. only; but no such license shall confer any right of entry upon the land of any person without his consent. 3. No person shall fish for, take, catch, or kill, or have in | his possession, or attempt to fish for, take, catch, or kill, in | any manner whatever, any of the salmonide, trout, carp, or perch, except during the above-mentioned period.

4. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish with one rod and line only, and with the following baits: natural or artificial fly, natural or artificial minnows, silveries, bullies, grasshoppers, spiders, caterpillars,

minnows, silveries, bullies, grasshoppers, spiders, caterpillars, creepers, and worms.

5. No person shall use any other bait, or any method, device, or contrivance of any sort or kind whatever, for the purpose of fishing for, taking, catching, or killing trout, carp, or perch, except a rod and line, and a landing-net or gaff for fish taken with rod and line.

6. No cross-line fishing, stroke-hauling, or any other unsportsmanlike device shall be used for the purpose of taking, catching, or killing trout, carp, or perch; nor shall any of the baits above mentioned be used with any medicated or chemical preparation whatever.

7. No person shall fish without a license, and every person fishing shall, on demand of any ranger, constable, member of the said society, or person producing a license, produce and show to such ranger, member, constable, or person his license, and the contents of his creel or bag, and the bait used by him for taking, catching, or killing trout, carp,

his license, and the contents of his creel or bag, and the bait used by him for taking, catching, or killing trout, carp, or perch.

8. Every trout, carp, or perch, not exceeding eight inches in length, from nose to tip of tail, taken or caught by any person, shall immediately be returned alive into the water from which the same is taken.

9. No person shall put, throw, or place, or allow to be put, thrown, or placed, in any of the said waters, any sawdust or sawmill refuse, or anything of any kind or description whatever poisonous, deleterious, or noxious to fish.

10. No person shall take, fish for, catch, or kill in any manner whatever, or have in his possession, any salmon, salmon-parr, or smolts, or the ova, young, or fry of any salmon in any stage whatever; and any of the above-named taken by accident shall immediately be returned to the water from whence it was taken.

11. No person shall buy, sell, or expose or offer for sale, within the district to which these regulations relate, any of the salmonidæ, trout, carp, or perch, or take, fish for, catch, or kill any of the salmonidæ, trout, carp, or perch, in order to make sale of the same, without permission in writing under the hand of the Secretary of the said society.

12. No person shall have in his possession any of the salmonidæ, trout, carp, or perch between the twelfth day of April and the thirty-first day of October in each year, which period is appointed a close season for all such fish.

13. The penalty for the breach of any of these regulations shall not be less than forty shillings or more than fifty

pounds.

As the New Zealand Government provided these provisions in the interests of shipwrecked mariners, it will interest them to know that they have been used; and I am to suggest that a copy of the report from the Commander of "La Meurthe" should be communicated to them.

TRANSLATION of Extract from the Report of the Lieutenant Commanding the Transport "La Meurthe" to the Captain Commanding the Naval Division of the Indian Ocean.

But first of all I must inform you of the principal object of my voyage, the search for thirteen ship-wrecked Frenchmen, and inform you that I regret that I have returned without them.

have returned without them.

The shipwrecked men were no longer on the islands when I arrived. I say were "no longer," because they had lived there for seven months, and the department was not wrong in supposing that they were the crew of the "Tamaris;" but they must have perished in an attempt which they had made to go from one island to another in the group, if they have not been picked up by a vessel.

Here is now the absolutely exact particulars. I extracted them from a letter signed "Majon, Captain of the 'Tamaris,'" which I found on Hog Island on the 2nd December.

maris," which I found on Hog Island on the 2nd December.

"The 'Tamaris,' a three-masted iron vessel belonging to Bordeaux, ran on Penguin Island, in a thick fog, on the "9th March, 1887, at 2 a.m. She struck about three miles "from the south-south-west end of the island, and the crew "was saved and directed in two boats towards Hog Island." They reached it on the 11th March, having only had time "to get from the ship a little water and 300lb. of biscuits." Hog Island presents the most desolate aspect which one could imagine, so that the joy of the shipwrecked men must have been very great when they perceived on that desert land a hut, and in the hut the provisions and clothing left there by the English man-of-war "Comus" in 1880.

They lived on Hog Island from the 11th March to the 30th September. It was this island from which, on the 4th August, flew away the albatross, on the neck of which one of the shipwrecked men had hung a tin plate having these words written on it: "13 shipwrecked Frenchmen are refugees on the Crozet Islands.—4th August."

The albatross had flown to die on the shore of Freemantle (Australia), where it was seen on the 22nd September. But

The albatross had flown to die on the shore of Freemantle (Australia), where it was seen on the 22nd September. But nearly at the same time, when the presence of the ship-wrecked men was revealed in a surprising fashion, they having exhausted the means of living on Hog Island, had decided to proceed to Possession Island.

Here are exactly the last sad lines which ended the letter of Captain Majon: "Seeing food diminish, these unfortunate "men have supposed that on Possession Island they would find as much, as here, as would enable them to await the "summer, when they hope that some ships may come to "pick them up. Those who read these lines are besought to "instantly come and see on Possession Island if these unfor-

"tunates still exist, and to make known this writing to the "French Consul at the port to which they go.—Hog Island, "30th September, 1887.—Signed, P. Majon."
When I had this document I no longer doubted of the success of my enterprise. I knew that there was plenty of food on Possession Island, but what was my grief when I found intact at Possession Island the provisions left by the "Comus" in 1880, nothing having been touched.

Afterwards I visited all the islands and rocks, and on no part could I find a trace of our countrymen.

13th December.—To-day I anchored at Hog Island, where I had resolved to establish a depôt of provisions. I have placed in the hut, which is now absolutely full, 1,020 kilos. of preserved beef, 500 kilos. of biscuits, 40 kilos. of sardines, 20 blankets, 19 pairs of shoes, 15 cloth trousers; the whole well packed up in twenty-seven cases and three casks of clothing. blankets, 19 pairs of shoes, 15 cloth trousers; the whole well packed up in twenty-seven cases and three casks of clothing. I have also put in the hut two spades and two axes for use in killing albatross, penguins, and above all seals and sealelphants. In the hut will be found saucepans and certain utensils which I have naturally left at the entrance to the hut, and also, where it is conspicuous, I have hung a board on which is painted in French and English the following words: "These provisions have been left by the 'Meurthe' for the "use only of shipwrecked crews. Fishermen must not touch "them."

No tourist shall be entitled to draw more than one sectional ticket for the same journey during the same visit to the colony.

The tickets are not transferable.

Holders of sectional tickets may stop over at any intermediate station within the time for which the tickets are available.

The Minister does not guarantee the operation of the fares over the Wellington and Manawatu Company's line, except so far as may be agreed upon from time to time between said company and Messrs. Cook and Son's agent.

Coupons issued under this agreement will not be available unless used within three months from date of issue.

The deaths of persons not residents of the boroughs, occurring at hospitals, have been excluded in all cases.

The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 433, against 457 in August, a decrease of 24. The deaths in September were 159, a decrease of 11 on the number for August. Of the total deaths, males contributed 93; females, 66. Forty-seven of the deaths were of children under 5 years of age, being 29.56 per cent. of the whole number; 35 of these were under 1 year of age.

The following remarks apply only to the four principal boroughs:—
The births in September were 234, against 267 in August, a decrease of 33.
The total deaths for the four chief towns together amounted to 98, against 95 for August.
There were 15 deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: three males of 72, 67, and 65, and four females of 84, 75, 66, and 65, died at Auckland; three males of 79, 74, and 68 at Wellington; two males of 78 and 69 at Christchurch; three males of 69 and 67 (two), and a female of 89, at Dunedin.

Specific Febrile or Zymotic Diseases.—The number of deaths in September from these diseases (12) was greater by 1 than in August. In August there were 7 deaths from diphtheria, and only 1 in September, but there were 3 deaths from typhoid fever, against 1 in the previous month; of these 3 deaths, 2 occurred in Wellington.

Constitutional Diseases.—The mortality from these causes increased greatly in September, the deaths having been 12 in August, and 21 in September. Cancer caused the comparatively large number of 7 deaths in September, 1 death from this cause having occurred in August. The deaths from phthisis increased in number from 5 in August to 9 in September.

Local Diseases.—The deaths under this class were 52 in number, against 58 in August. There was a slight decrease in the number of deaths from diseases of the nervous system, the circulatory system, and the respiratory system, but an increase in the mortality from diseases of the digestive system.

Violent Deaths.—These deaths were 5 in number (of which 1 was suicidal) in September.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of these four boroughs from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.
