WHEREAS by "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884" (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), it is, among

Now, therefore, the Governor of the Colony of New Zea-Now, therefore, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in him by the said Act, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby license and permit the Council to use and occupy that part of the foreshore and of the land below low-water mark immediately contiguous thereto which is particularly shown and delineated on the plans so deposited as aforesaid for the purpose of constructing or creating thereon aforesaid, for the purpose of constructing or erecting thereon a wharf, such license to be held and enjoyed by the Council upon and subject to the following terms and conditions, that is to say,-

- 1. The concessions and privileges conferred by this Order in Council shall extend and apply only to the parts of the foreshore and of the land below low-water mark necessary for the erection of such wharf, which are shown on the plan marked M.D. 1488.
- 2. That all Her Majesty's subjects shall at all reasonable times, upon payment of the proper dues, have free and full liberty to use the wharf, and full liberty of ingress and egress thereon.
- 3. That Her Majesty, or the Governor, and all officers in the Government service, acting in the execution of their duty, shall at all times have free ingress, passage, and egress into, through, and out of the wharf without payment.
- 4. The Council shall maintain the above-mentioned wharf in good order and repair; and shall at all times exhibit thereon, and maintain at its own cost, suitable and necessary lights for the guidance of vessels: Provided that no light shall be exhibited until after it has been approved of by the Minister.
- 5. Any person authorised by the Minister may, at all reasonable times, enter upon the said wharf and view the state of repair thereof; and upon such Minister leaving at or posting to the last known address of the Council a notice in writing of any defect or want of repair in such wharf, requiring it, within a reasonable time to be therein prescribed, to repair the same, it shall with all convenient speed course such defeat to be repeated accurate. convenient speed cause such defect to be removed or such repairs to be made.
- 6. That nothing herein contained shall authorise the Council to do or cause to be done anything repugnant to or inconsistent with any law relating to the Customs, or any regulation of the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, or with any provisions of "The Harbours Act, 1878," or its amendments, or any regulations made thereunder, and that are now or may hereafter be in force.
- 7. That the ballast of all vessels loading at the said wharf shall be taken away by the Council and deposited above high-water mark, or at such place as may be approved of by the Minister or by any person appointed by the Minister for that purpose.
- 8. That the rights, powers, and privileges conferred by this Order in Council shall continue in force for fourteen years, computed from the date of this Order in Council, unless in the meantime such rights, powers, and privileges shall be altered, modified, or revoked by competent authority; and the Council shall not assign, charge, or part with any such right, power, or privilege without the previous written consent of the Minister first obtained.
- 9. That the said rights, powers, and privileges may be at any time resumed by the Governor, without payment of any compensation whatever, on giving to the Council six calendar months' previous notice in writing. Any such notice shall be sufficient if given by the Minister, and delivered at or posted to the last known address of the Council.
- 10. The Council shall be liable for any injury which the erection or maintenance of said wharf may cause any vessel or boat to sustain.
  - 11. In case the Council shall-
  - (1.) Commit or suffer a breach of the conditions herein-before set forth, or any of them; or
- (2.) Cease to use or occupy the said wharf; then and in either of the said cases this Order in Council, and every right, power, or privilege, may be revoked and determined by the Governor in Council without any notice to the Council or other proceeding whatsoever, and publication in the New Zealand Gazette of an Order in Council containing such revocation shall be sufficient notice to the Council, and to all persons concerned or interested, of the fact of such revocation
- 12. In these conditions the term "Minister" means the Minister having charge of the Marine Department, as defined by "The Shipping and Seamen's Act, 1877," and includes any officer, person, or authority acting by or under the direction of such Minister.

SUPPLY.—WATERWORKS BY-LAWS.

BY-LAWS of the body corporate called the Mount Eden District Road Board, made in pursuance of "The Road Boards Act, 1882," and "The Road Boards Act 1882 Amendment Act, 1888," on the 2nd day of November, 1888. Confirmed by special order, and stamped with the common seal of the said body corporate, on the 6th day of December, 1888.

In pursuance of sections 126 to 131 of "The Road Boards Act, 1882," and Part I. of "The Road Boards Act 1882 Amendment Act, 1888," the Mount Eden District Road Board hereby make and levy the following rates, and declare the following as the conditions upon which the said Road Board will supply water on all rateable properties within the Mount Eden Road District from the date of confirmation of these by-laws by the said Board:—

EXPLANATION OF TERMS USED.

"Ordinary supply" shall mean only water used for strictly domestic purposes, and the Board reserves the right to determine in any case what shall be considered a supply for

strictly domestic purposes.
"Extraordinary supply" shall mean water used for any other purposes of "ordinary supply," and may be charged

extra accordingly.

ORDINARY SUPPLY.

ORDINARY SUPPLY.

On properties in the Mount Eden Road District—(1) Rateable value, in terms of "The Rating Act, 1882," not exceeding £12 10s, 10s. per annum; (2) exceeding £12 10s. and not exceeding £18, 5 per cent. per annum; (3) exceeding £18 and not exceeding £30, 4 per cent per annum, but not less for any tenement than 18s. per annum; (4) exceeding £30, 3½ per cent. per annum, but not less for any tenement than 24s. per annum.

12. Applications for water shall be made at the office of the said Road Board, and all necessary forms shall be obtained there.

13. Water-rates for such supply shall be payable halfaccompanied by the tender of a sum equal to the rate for the broken period of the current half-year, commencing three days after the date of application; except the payments be made within two months prior to end of half-year, in which case payment shall be made to end of the second half-year. half-year.

A deposit of the value of the meter may, if deemed necessary, be demanded from applicants; but the Board reserve the right to refuse to supply meters to private houses.

22. Exceptional cases for supply of piping outside of streets with mains, in the manner as decided by the Water

23. Rates by meter shall be payable quarterly.24. All supplies other than to private dwellings must be

25. Any consumer using the water shall, on delivery of written notice, provide a meter to gauge his supply. Meters shall be fixed in such places as the Board may direct, and

be charged as mentioned in scale of charges.

26. Should any meter be out of repair, or cease to register, or register inaccurately, the officer duly appointed by the Board shall estimate the consumption of the average of the

Board shall estimate the consumption of the average of the previous quarter charged to the consumer, who shall be liable to pay accordingly, and such decision shall be final.

27. All water-meters must be enclosed in a wcoden box, and the keys of both meters and boxes, duly labelled with the name of the owner, must be lodged at the office of water-supply. If required by the consumer, the box may have a glass front. Locks of meters to be uniform, and supplied by the Board at the expense of meter-consumer.

#### Plumbers.

28. Competent plumbers may be licensed by the said Board to lay pipes and to do any work in connection with water-supply on payment of an annual fee of £1 Is. Every such plumber, on receiving his license and making the necessary deposit, shall sign an agreement binding himself to comply with the conditions contained in the by-laws of the licensed by the Board shall be allowed to attach or alter any service-pipe, or in any other way interfere with pipes, taps, cocks, meters, or any matters or things connected with the water supply.

tabs, cocks, meers, or any matters or things connected with the water-supply.

20. Every plumber shall forward to the water-supply office a monthly return (on forms supplied to him) of the work he has done, and, failing to do so, shall be either guilty of an offence, or his license suspended until such return is

duly forwarded.

30. No licensed plumbers shall do any work connected with the water-supply without giving at least one clear day's notice thereof and receiving written authority to do such work from the Engineer or other officer appointed by the Board.

31. Plumbers shall be responsible for all damage done or caused by them in doing any work whatever, or through bad workmanship of inferior material; and, in the event of any such damage, bad workmanship, or neglect, they shall be liable to have their licenses cancelled without any refund of

liable to have their incenses cancelled without any relund of license-fee.

32. All work shall be done to the approval and satisfaction of the Waterworks Engineer or other officer appointed by the Board, and must be passed by him before the water shall be turned on at the main.

33. All drawing-cocks used must be of the best quality, and must be those known as Fiddian's best screw-down

valves, and in exposed or public places must be enclosed with a wood or iron box under lock and key.

34. In addition to the valve-cock at the junction with the main in each service, a second valve-cock shall be placed in

main in each service, a second valve-cock shall be placed in a strong wooden box within the boundary of the property, supplied at the expense of the consumer.

35. In no case will the use of instantaneous closing-taps, valves, or cocks be permitted. Galvanised-iron piping of an approved quality only will be allowed for external services, and of the requisite sizes suitable to the requirements of the tenements, as shall be determined by the Engineer or other officer appointed by the Board.

35a. All pipes and taps required to lay on the water-service will be supplied by the Board at schedule prices, to be seen at the office of the Board.

#### REPAIRS.

36. Any person neglecting to repair any service-pipe, meter, tap, or other fixture used in the supply of water, after having received notice from any officer of the Board, shall render himself liable to have the water cut off, and shall be guilty of an offence.

#### WASTE OF WATER.

37. Any person who causes or permits any wilful, negligent, or unnecessary waste or use of water to take place, by allowing a cistern or other vessel to overflow, or the water to showing a ciscin of other vessel to overhow, or the water to run from any tap, cock, hose, valve, pipe-work, or engine, shall be guilty of an offence. 38. Overflow-pipes from baths will not be permitted un-less the water to such baths is supplied by meter.

#### RATES IN ARREAR.

39. At the expiration of fourteen days from the date of any water-rate being due, and after delivery of notice on the premises to which such water is laid on (excepting temporary supplies, which may be cut off after twenty-four hours' notice), it shall be competent for the officers of the Board to cut off any such supply in whatever manner may be deemed advisable. be deemed advisable.

#### WRONG OR FALSE INFORMATION.

40. Any person who shall give to any officer of the Board false information upon any matter pertaining to water-supply shall be guilty of an offence.

#### PENALTIES.

46. Opens the ground so as to uncover any pipe belonging to the waterworks, or connects any pipe with such pipe without giving the Board seven days' notice in writing of his intention so to do:

47. Connects any pipe with a pipe belonging to the waterworks without giving the Board two days' notice in writing of the day and hour he proposes to do so, or without having obtained the permission of some person acting under the authority of the Board in that behalf:

48. Connects any pipe with a pipe of the waterworks except in the presence of, or contrary to, the direction of the officer appointed by the Board to superintend the same, unless such officer fails to attend at the time named in the

notice:

49. Connects with a pipe of the waterworks any pipe of a strength or material not approved by the Board,
—he shall be liable to a penalty of not more than £20 for each such offence, and to a further sum equal to the cost

Description of Land: Section 2 is the old crater of Sunday Island, part of which is open and bare dried mud, somewhat stony, though the greater part is covered with pohutakawa, ngaio, and other trees. The soil in parts is very good, but generally not so. It is for the most part naturally fenced by steep cliffs. There are three small lakes in this run. Section 4 is all covered with bush, mostly pohutakawa, soil very good, a few small flats, the largest near Wilson Point.
