Volunteer Dress Regulations.

JAMES PRENDERGAST, (L.S.) Administrator of the Government. A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand intituled "The Defence Act, 1886," power is given to the Governor from time to time to make, alter, and revoke regulations respecting the enrolment, promotion, disciplinate the statement of the content of discipline, training, exercise, arms, accoutrements, clothing, equipment, conveyance, pay, rations, and lodging of the forces, or any portion thereof, and respecting the several other matters specified in the said Act, and providing generally for the more effectual carrying-out of the said Act:

And whereas by a Proclamation dated the twenty-sixth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty.

day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, certain regulations were made under "The Defence Act, 1886," for the purposes aforesaid: And whereas it is expedient now to make additional regulations regarding the clothing and dress of the Volunteer Forces:

Now, therefore, I, James Prendergast, the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, in pur-Act, do hereby, by this present order, make the rules and regulations specified in the Schedule hereinafter written, such regulations to come into force from the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

Given under the hand of His Excellency Sir James Prendergast, Knight, Chief Justice, the Adminis-trator of the Government of Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand; and issued under the Seal of the said Colony, at the Government House, at Wellington, this twenty-third day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

# SCHEDULE.

# DRESS REGULATIONS.

1. The distinctions in uniform and appointments which are prescribed in Her Majesty's Regular Service to denote the rank of the wearer will be observed strictly by Volunteers of the various grades, as far as they are applicable to the Volunteer Force, substituting silver for gold lace, except in the case of the Permanent Staff and Naval Artillery Volunteers, who will

2. Full Dress.—The same as worn by Colonels on the staff with badges according to rank.

3. Undress.—The same as Brigade-Major; or a blue-cloth patrol jacket trimmed with \$\frac{3}{4}\text{in.}\$ black-mohair lace, and with five flat-braided loops on the breast; forage cap, blue

with five flat-braided loops on the breast; forage cap, blue cloth, gold-embroidered peak and band.

4. Uniform of medical officers on the General List the same as in Her Majesty's service. Medical officers attached to corps of Volunteers to wear silver lace. Those in special corps are permitted to wear the uniform of their corps.

5. Permanent Staff Non-commissioned Officers.—Blue-cloth patrol jacket, edged with black braid; trousers, with red stripe 1\frac{3}{4}\text{in.}\text{ wide; helmet, white Imperial pattern; forage cap, black oak-leaf band 1\frac{3}{4}\text{in.}\text{ wide, and gold-embroidered drooping peak.}

Naval Artillery Volunteers.

6. Full dress is to be worn at guards of honour, funerals, balls, levées, when visiting foreign men of-war, and on other occasions of ceremony.

Undress to be worn on all other occasions.

# Lieutenant-Commanders.

7. Full Dress :-

Full Dress:—
Coat: Blue cloth, double-breasted, eight buttons in each row, with padded turn-down collar; pointed flaps with three notched holes and buttons under; round cuffs with two stripes, each stripe to be formed of two waved lines of \$\frac{1}{4}\$ in. gold braid intersecting each other so as to form bands \$\frac{1}{2}\$ in. wide, the blue cloth to show between the curves, the upper stripe to form a circle 2in. in diameter in the centre of the top sleeve. One stripe of gold braid \$\frac{3}{16}\$ in. in width is to be worn between the stripes. The spaces between the double and single stripes to be \$\frac{1}{2}\$ in.

stripes to be \$\frac{1}{4}\text{in}\$. Buttons: The buttons to be of the Royal navy pattern, with the letters N.A.V. in old English characters across an anchor surmounted by a crown. The buttons to be

Epaulettes: Two gold epaulettes, with a double row of bright loose bullions 2\frac{3}{4}in. in length and 1\frac{1}{2}in. in circumference; devices, a badge consisting of a silver anchor in the centre, surrounded with the words Naval Artillery Volunteers embroidered in gold, with a star embroidered in gold above the badge. in gold above the badge.

Trousers: Blue cloth, with 1in. gold lace down the out-

side seam.

Hat: Cocked, black. The loop on the cocked hat to be formed of two gold braids waved as on the coat-sleeve, and the tassels to be gold.

Waistcoat: White or blue, single-breasted, with small buttons of same pattern as for coat.

Necktie: Black silk. Sword: Naval pattern, brass mountings. Scabbard: Black leather, brass mountings Sword-knot: Blue and gold rope, with gold bullions. Sword-belt: Black-moroeco leather, single sword-slings. The belt and slings to have two straight lines of embroidered gold, one near each edge. The plate for the sword-belt to be gilt, of the same pattern as for officers of the Royal navy, but with the letters N.A.V. across the anchor in the centre.

8. Undress:

Flock-coat: Blue cloth, double-breasted; buttons and distinction braid on sleeves, as in full dress.

Cap: Blue cloth, Sin. across the top, with a black mohair band 1½ in. wide, with a badge in front, as follows:

A silver anchor, with the letters N.A.V. above it in silver, on a medallion of black velvet, encircled by an edging of gold lace, surrounded by a laurel wreath of gold embroidery, except at the top, where a crown embroidered in gold and silver, with a crimson-velvet centre is to be placed over the medallian. Peak of centre, is to be placed over the medallion. Peak of patent leather.

Trousers: As in full dress, but without lace.

Necktie: As in full dress. Sword: As in full dress.

Sword: As in full dress.
Sword-knot: As in full dress.
Sword-belt: As in full dress, but without embroidery, with round slings.

#### Lieutenant.

9. Full dress :-

Same as Lieutenant-Commander, with the following ex-

ceptions:—

Coat: The single stripe of  $\frac{s}{16}$  in. gold braid to be omitted. Epaulettes: The star above the badge is to be omitted. Undress:—

Same as Lieutenant-Commander, with the exception of the distinction lace round the sleeves, which is to be the same as in full dress.

#### Sub-Lieutenant.

11. Full dress :-

Same as Lieutenant, with the following exceptions:-Coat: The sleeves to have one stripe of distinction braid round them.

Trousers : Without lace.

Epaulettes: None; but, instead, two shoulder-straps of the same pattern and device as epaulettes of Lieutenant, without bullion.

12. Undress

Same as Lieutenant, except the distinction braid round the sleeves, which is to be the same as in full dress.

# Medical Officers .- Staff-Surgeons.

13. Full Dress

Coat: Blue cloth, single-breasted at angles with the skirt; oat: Blue cloth, single-breasted at angles with the skirt; nine buttons in front placed in threes; padded turndown collar; pointed flaps with three notched holes and buttons under; round cuffs with two stripes formed of two waved lines of  $\frac{1}{4}$ in. gold braid intersecting each other so as to form bands  $\frac{1}{2}$ in. wide, with a stripe of  $\frac{3}{16}$ in. gold braid between them; the spaces between the single and double stripes to be  $\frac{1}{4}$ in., and to be filled up with scarlet cloth or velvet.

up with scarlet cloth or velvet.

Hat: Cocked, same as Lieutenant-Commander.

Epaulettes: The same as for Lieutenant-Commander, except that the device will be two stars surmounted by the letters N.A.V.

Buttons: Same as Lieutenant-Commander. Trousers: Same as Lieutenant-Commander. Sword: Same as Lieutenant-Commander. Belt: Same as Lieutenant-Commander. Scabbard: Same as Lieutenant-Commander. Necktie: Same as Lieutenant-Commander.

14. Undress:

Same as for Lieutenant-Commander, except that the stripes are as laid down for full dress, and that there are two rows of buttons on each side of front placed in threes.

# Surgeons.

15. Full Dress :-

Same as fer Staff-Surgeons, omitting single stripe of  $\frac{3}{10}$  in.

16. Undress

Same as for Staff-Surgeons, omitting single stripe of  $\frac{8}{16}$  in. braid.

# Naval Cadets.

Coat: Blue cloth, single-breasted, with nine notched holes on each breast, and three on each cuff and pocket-flap, with buttons to correspond, lined with white stand-up collar, with a button-hole of white twist on each side of the collar, with a corresponding button.

Buttons: The same as Sub-Lieutenant.

Dirk: Gilt mounted, with white fishskin grip; hilt 5¼in long, and fitted to the cross-bar with oval medallion and

nnchor, and with spring to hold the blade to scabbard; blue and gold blade, embossed,  $17\frac{3}{4}$ in. long; length of dirk, when in the scabbard,  $23\frac{1}{4}$ in. abbard: Black leather, 18in. long, fitted with gilt

Scabbard: Black leather, 18in long, fitted with gilt locket at the top, with two rings to attach to slings of belt, and at bottom with a gilt-pointed shoe.

Sword-knot: Blue and gold cord, with small gold bullion

tassel.

Belt: The same as Lieutenant's undress belt, but with

slings.
Trousers: Without lace, same as for Sub-Lieutenant.

Cap: Same as Sub-Lieutenant's morning dress.

Cap: Same as Sub-Deutenant's morning dress.

18. Morning Dress:—

Jacket: Blue cloth, single-breasted, with nine buttons, and three notched holes on each cuff, with buttons to correspond; stand-up collar, with a white turn-back on each side of the collar, with notched hole and button.

Buttons: As in full dress.

Dirk: As in full dress.

Knot: As in full dress.

Belt: As in full dress.

Belt: As in full dress. Cap: As in full dress.

Petty Officers, Leading Gunners, and Gunners.

#### Chief Petty Officer.

Long Jacket: Blue cloth, double-breasted, with four gilt uniform buttons of the same pattern as those for officers on each side; three buttons only to show on each side of the jacket, and there is to be only one button-hole in the collar-flap, the fourth button being under the collar-flap; stand-and-fall collar with pocket-flaps; length from lower part of collar to bottom edge, 28in. to 30in., according to beight of weaver. An eneming on the cuff according to height of wearer. An opening on the cuff of the sleeve with the small gilt buttons. Waistcoat: Blue cloth single-breasted, no collar, with six

gilt uniform buttons.

Trousers: Made with flies, plain blue cloth, or white when ordered.

Cap: Blue cloth, Sin. in diameter, with black-leather peak and black-mohair band, surmounted by crown and anchor; device embroidered in gold and silver.

Shirt: White.

Necktie: Black.

Buttons: Same as for officers.

20. Working Dress:—
Long Jacket: Blue serge or duck, with uniform buttons as in dress, except that the duck jacket is to be single-breasted, and to show four buttons, and there is to be no button-hole in the collar-flap.

Trousers: Blue cloth or white, as in dress. Shirt: Blue check.

Petty Officers of the First or Second Class, Leading Gunners, or Gunners.

21. Dress

Round Jacket: Navy-blue cloth, double-breasted, with stand-and-fall collar; sleeves sufficiently large to go over a duck or serge frock; to reach to the hip; one inside pocket on the left side; with an opening at the cuffs on the seam with two small black buttons; and seven black-horn buttons of the same pattern as those for officers,

Tolla in diameter.

Blue Trousers: Navy-blue cloth of the ordinary navy pattern, fitting tight at the waistband, with two pockets, the best of the pattern of the best of the standard or the best of the standard or the best of the standard or the standard

and a broad flap, and stained-bone buttons; to be tied in at the back with black-silk ribbon.

White Trousers: Duck of the same pattern, with white-metal dead-eye buttons; to be tied in at the back with white tape.

White Frock: To be made of drill, with collar and wristbands of blue jean, the collar having a border of three
waved lines of \(\frac{3}{16}\)in. white tape, \(\frac{1}{2}\)in. apart, and the
wristbands to be peaked with two waved lines of white
tape along the upper margin, and one along the lower,
with one white-metal dead-eye button at each of the
wwists wrists.

Collar to White Frock: Collar for white frock to be of the dimensions herein shown:

AB. Breadth, 16in.

A C. Depth, 81 in. C CD. Depth, 9in.

Blue Frock: To be made of serge, of the same pattern, except the blue-jean collar and wristbands. No knife-pocket. Dimensions the same as for white frock.

Shirt: Check, with blue collar; to be worn only under the

blue frock.

Jumpers: Blue serge or white duck, to extend from 2in. to 3in. below the hip, with a knife-pocket on left breast. White jumpers to be bound round the bottoms and ends of sleeves with blue jean, ½in. wide. Collars to be of same pattern as those of the frocks. Serge jumpers to be of same dimensions as for white frock.

Serge Trousers: To be tied in at the back with navy-blue

Flannels: To be cut square across the breast and close up to the neck so as to afford protection to the chest, with a narrow \( \frac{1}{2} \) in. blue binding round the neck; sleeves optional.

Hat: To be made of sennet, with oval crown, 3in. high; brim to be straight, 3½in. wide, and inclined upwards to the extent of 1in., with a hat ribbon.

A chin-stay to be attached to the hat.

On occasions of ceremony hats are to be worn.

Cap: The cap to be made round, of navy-blue cloth, and partially stiffened across the crown, similar in shape to that worn by officers, without the peak. Diameter across the crown, 9in.; with a ribbon.

A chin-stay to be attached to the cap.

Woollen Comforter: Dark blue.

22. Working Suit:—

Jumper: Duck, without blue collar or binding, with a knife-pocket.
Trousers: Duck.
23. Night Suit:—

Blue serge.

Note.—White frocks and jumpers are to have a distinguishing watch-stripe of blue jean upon the outer part of one sleeve, at the junction of the sleeve and body; and blue frocks and jumpers are to have a similar stripe of red braid. Men in the starboard watch are to wear the stripe on the right arm, and these in the part watch on the left arm. those in the port watch on the left arm.

#### Marks of Distinction.

Petty Officers, Leading Gunners, and Gunners.

24. All chief and other petty officers and leading gunners are to wear on the upper part of the left sleeve of their long or round jackets the following marks of distinction:

Chief Petty Officers: Crown and anchor encircled with

oak leaves:

First Class Petty Officers: Crown and cross anchor:

Second Class Petty Officers: Crown and anchor Leading Gunners: The anchor.

On the blue frock and blue jumper and on the pea-jacket these badges are to be worked in white, and in blue upon the white jackets, frocks, and jumpers.

The tape trimmings of the white frock to be waved in the same manner as the braid on the coat-sleeves of the officers.

All badges are to be of silver embroidery on the jackets, and of silver or white on the blue serge. On the white frock they

are to be blue.

The cap- and hat-ribbons to have a crown and anchor in front, with the letters N.A.V. above.

The crown and anchor and letters to be embroidered in silver on a black-silk ribbon.

The letters to be §in. in size.

25. A badge of efficiency will be worn by men who have received a certificate of qualification, as provided for by paragraph 223:

For Efficiency as Garrison Artillery: The badge will consist of a gun embroidered in silver, worn on the right arm

above the wrist;

For Efficiency as Submarine Miners: The badge will consist of a Whitehead torpedo embroidered in silver, worn on the right arm above the wrist.

26. Men who have obtained the certificate of qualification for three consecutive years will wear a badge consisting of two crossed guns, or torpedoes, embroidered in silver on the right arm above the wrist

# Cavalry and Mounted Infantry.

# Officers.

27. Patrol Jacket: Blue cloth, stand-up collar of scarlet cloth, 2in. high, rounded in front, \( \frac{1}{2} \) in mohair lace at top and bottom of collar, figured braiding in centre, 1in. mohair braid traced with Russian braid all round, up the slits, and along the back seams. Five loops of lin. mohair braid at equal distances down the front on each side, with two olivets on each loop, the top loops extending to the shoulder-seams and the bottom to 4in. The cuffs pointed with 1in. mohair braid, traced with Russian braid and figured braiding at top and bottom; the mohair braid reaches to 5in. from bottom of cuff, and the figured braiding at top to 8in. False pockets at sides,

edged round with 1in. mohair braid; figured braiding at top of slits and at top of shoulder-seams; figured braiding at centre of back, at the bottom of collar, and bottom of jacket; figured braiding on the right, left, and between the back seams; hooks and eyes in front, black lining. Pocket inside left breast. Shoulder straps of the same material as jacket, edged with in blackmohair lace, except at bottom; black netted button at top, initial letters of corps embroidered in silver on bottom of strap, and badge of rank immediately above.

Trousers: Blue cloth, with two stripes of scarlet cloth ‡in. broad down the side seams; stripes to be ‡in. apart. When trousers are worn with boots and spurs, straps

will be worn.

Pantaloons: Blue cloth, with stripes down side seams as on trowsers, or brown bedford-cord pantaloons.

Helmet: White, staff Imperial cavalry pattern, with spike

and button.

Forage-cap: Blue cloth, Imperial cavalry pattern, with 1½in. silver-lace band, silver-purl button, and braided figure in tracing-lace on crown; patent-leather chin-strap, ≟in. broad.

Gloves: Brown dogskin, except for levées and public ceremonies, when white buck will be worn.

Sword-belts: Black patent or morocco leather, 1½in. wide,

with slings 1in. wide, plated or white-metal mountings, with snake fastening.

Pouch-belt: Black patent or morocco leather, 23 in. wide, with plated or white-metal buckles, tip, and slide.

Sword: Imperial light cavalry pattern.
Sword-knot: Black platted leather, with acorn.
Pouch: Black patent or morocco leather, 5\frac{3}{4}\text{in. long, 2\frac{3}{4}\text{in.}}

Pouch: Black patent or morocco leather, 5\frac{3}{4}\text{in. long, 2\frac{3}{4}\text{in.}} \\
deep, with plated crown on leaf.

Boots: Knee, with crane-necked jack-spurs of steel or white-metal, fastened with straps and buckles; the knee-boots must be, as regards shape, of the Imperial service pattern; the boot, which is sloped down at the back, should reach in front to about 4in. from the top of the knee, and at the back just to the top of the calf.

Corps are strongly advised against adopting full dress on account of expense, but, should they decide to do so, they must adopt the Hussar pattern, corps optional.

N.B.—The above regulations do not apply to the Contentury

N.B.—The above regulations do not apply to the Canterbury Yeomanry Cavalry, who have special permission to wear scarlet.

28. Horse furniture :--

Saddle-cloth: If worn, but is not recommended, should be of stout blue cloth, lined with moleskin or other strong material, so as not to wrinkle under the saddle, and should be 3ft. long at bottom, and 2ft. deep, laced all round with two stripes of 1½in. searlet-worsted lace, ½in. apart; at each hind corner the initial letters of the troop in silver ambroiders suprounted by a group. troop in silver embroidery, surmounted by a crown. Saddle: English hunting, plain stirrups, and white-worsted

girths, with regulation wallets.
Bridle: Brown-leather headstall, with ear bosses, hunting-bit and bridoon or pelham, double reins and whole buckles. Breastplate: Brown leather, hunting pattern. Head-rope: White, 2½in., 6ft. long, roll to be 6in. from

ring of headstall.

Troopers.

29. Patrol Jacket: Blue cloth, with scarlet-c'oth collar 2in. high, trimmed at top and bottom with ½in. mohair braid, and small figured braiding in centre; length, about 28in. from bottom of collar behind, but must not about 28in. from bottom of collar behind, but must not touch the saddle when mounted, rounded in front, and edged with \(\frac{1}{2}\) in. mohair braid all round and up the openings at the sides; on each side, in front, four double drop-loops of \(\frac{1}{4}\) in. flat plait, with eyes in the centre of each loop, the top loops extended to the shoulder-scam and the bottom ones to \(\frac{1}{4}\) in, four netted olivets on the right side to \(\frac{1}{4}\) state through the loops on the left; on each sleeve an Austrian knot of flat plait, \(\frac{1}{4}\) in. wide, \(\frac{7}{1}\)in. high from bottom of the cuff; double flat plait on each back scam, with crow's-foot at top and bottom; false pockets trimmed with \(\frac{1}{2}\) in mohair braid; books and eyes pockets trimmed with 12 in. mohair braid; hooks and eyes in front; shoulder-straps same material as jacket, edged with ½in. black-mohair braid except at base, initial letters of corps embroidered in white worsted on shoulder-

of corps embroidered in white worsted on shoulder-straps; pocket inside left breast.

Trousers: Blue cloth, with two stripes of scarlet cloth \$\frac{3}{4}\$in. broad down the side seams, stripes to be \$\frac{4}{4}\$in. apart.

When trousers are worn on parade, wellington boots and steel spurs (either boxes or fastened on with screws) will be worn with them, and foot-straps to trousers.

Pantaloons: Blue cloth, with stripes down side seams same as on trousers or bedford-cord pantaloons. Cloak: Either blue cloth or waterproof, Imperial cavalry

pattern.

Boots: Kuee-boots, and jack spurs of white metal, or ankleboots, and brown-leather leggings and hunting-spurs.

Helmet: White, staff Imperial cavalry pattern, with spike

and button.

Forage cap: Blue cloth, Imperial cavalry pattern, with 1\frac{3}{11} and searlet band, welted; scarlet-worsted purl button and braid figuring in scarlet tracing-lace on crown; patent-leather chin-strap, \frac{1}{2} in broad.

Gloves: Brown dogskin or white buck (optional to corps), to be worn on church parades, annual inspections, and public accompanies only.

public ceremonies only.

Sword-belts: Buff or brown leather.

Pouch-belt: Buff or brown leather. Pouch: Black or brown leather.

Pouch: Black or brown leather.

30. Saddlery:—
Saddle: Military or hunting pattern.
Saddle-cloth: Optional for corps, but if adopted to be of blue cloth, lined with moleskin or stout material so as not to wrinkle under the saddle; it is to be 3ft. long at bottom and 2ft. deep, laced all round with two stripes of scarlet-worsted lace 1½in. broad and ¼in. apart; at each hind corner the initial letters of the troop in white-warted ambraidery surmounted by a crown. worsted embroidery surmounted by a crown.

Bridle: Brown leather, Imperial cavalry pattern, with

Bridle: Brown leather, Imperial cavalry pattern, with hunting bit and bridoon or pelham bit.

Breastplate: Brown leather, hunting pattern.

Head-rope: White, 2½in., 6ft. long; to be fastened through the ring of the head-collar, passed round the horse's neck and rolled; roll to be 6in. from ring of collar.

# Mounted Rifles. Officers and Men.

31. Patrol Jacket: Same as for the mounted corps, except that the collar will be of the same colour as jacket. Trousers: Same as other mounted corps.

Pantaloons: Same as other mounted corps.

Cloak: Imperial cavalry pattern.
Boots: Imperial cavalry pattern.
Helmet: Imperial cavalry pattern.
Forage-cap for officers: Same as for other mounted corps,

but the band will be black-mohair lace, 2in. broad, with black button and tracing-braid figured on crown. Chinstrap, black-patent leather, \( \frac{1}{4} \)in. broad.

Forage-cap for Men: Same as officers, but the band will be of black worsted instead of mohair.

Gloves: Brown leather, to be worn on all occasions by the officers, but by the men on any selections of busch.

Glores: Brown leather, to be worn on all occasions by the officers, but by the men on annual inspections, church parades, and public ceremonies only.

Sword: Imperial light cavalry pattern, with steel or brown-leather scabbard, as approved for mounted infantry in the Imperial service.

Pouch-belt: Black patent or morocco leather, 2½ in. wide, with plated buckle, tip, and slide.

Sword-belt: Black patent or morocco leather, 1½ in. wide; slings, lin. wide, plated-metal mountings and snake fastening. If the leather scabbard is worn, then there will be a frog instead of slings.

Sword-knot: Black leather, plaited with acorn.

Pouch: Black patent leather, 5¾ in. long, 2¾ in. deep (to collapse), with a white-metal bugle on leaf.

32. Horse Furniture: Saddle-cloth same as other mounted corps, but the lace will be black worsted instead of

corps, but the lace will be black worsted instead of scarlet, and above the initial letters of the corps there will be a white embroidered bugle, 2in. high and broad in proportion, instead of the crown. Saddle: Same as for other mounted corps.

Bridle: Same as for other mounted corps. Breastplate: Same as for other mounted corps. Head-rope: Same as for other mounted corps.

# Artillery.

33. As approved by His Excellency the Governor, dated the 30th April, 1881; except that the white helmet, as worn by the Permanent Artillery, will take the place of the busby.

Engineers.

34. As in the Imperial service, substituting silver for gold.

Rifle Corps. Officers.

35. Full Dress :-

Tunic of scarlet cloth, or fine-serge patrol jacket.

Trousers: Cloth or fine serge, blue, with scarlet 4in. welt down each side seam.

Helmet: Blue, Imperial pattern. Gloves: White buck.

White shoulder- and sword-belts.

White shoulder- and sword-belts.

It is a first order dioptric flashing light, showing every half-minute bright triple flashes from N. 22° W.
