INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS OF HYGIENE AND DEMOGRAPHY, London, 1891.

#### President: H.R.H. THE PRINCE OF WALES, K.G.

My LORD,—We beg to direct your Lordship's attention to the important arrangement which has recently been con-cluded for holding the seventh International Congress of Hygiene and Demography in London in 1891, under the presidency of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. Your Lordship will doubtless be aware that the former

Congresses have been held biennially in some of the chief continental cities, the last being held in Vienna under the auspices of His late Imperial Highness Prince Rudolph, the Grown Prince of Austria, who concord the Congress Crown Prince of Austria, who opened the Congress in person.

The next Congress will be the first Congress which has The next Congress will be the first Congress which has met in Great Britain, and we entertain the confident assur-ance that it will be your Lordship's desire that that Con-gress should in all its circumstances be worthy of the great nation which stands foremost in the promotion and prac-tical application of hygienic science and statistical research. The learned and scientific societies of Great Britain and Ireland have already nominated as delegates a number of gentlemen of the highest distinction as hygienists and statisticians.

genterner of the highest distinction as hygieness and statisticians. Taking into consideration that the Congress will be at-tended by the representatives of numerous Councils and Corporations engaged in sanitary administration, and by members of several professions, we are led to anticipate that London will be visited by not fewer persons than at the time of the Medical Congress in 1881. The deliberations of the Congress will be specially directed to the consideration of subjects concerning the public health, and in the section of demography, which will be assisted by a special committee appointed by the Royal Statistical Society, the life-conditions of civilised communities will be considered in their various industrial, social, and domestic relations from statistical points of view; It is obvious that such a conference of official and professional authorities and scientists will necessarily be of the highest value in pro-moting hygiene and cognate sciences, and generally ad-vancing the welfare, not only of all classes of our fellow

moting hygiene and cognate sciences, and generally ad-vancing the welfare, not only of all classes of our fellow countrymen, but of humanity at large. We therefore venture to express the hope, should the objects and arrangements of the Congress described have met with your approval, your Lordship will allow us to communicate through the Colonial Office with the Colonial Governments, inviting them to nominate delegates and to take part in the deliberations of the Congress, and thus to insure that the sanitary condition of every one of Her Majesty's colonies shall be adequately represented at the International Congress of Hygiene and Demography which will be held in London in 1891. will be held in London in 1891. SEVENTH INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS OF HYGIENE AND DE-MOGRAPHY. - LONDON, 1891.-PRESIDENT: H.R.H. THE PRINCE OF WALES, K.G.-PRELIMINARY STATEMENT.

July, 1890. July, 1890. THE International Congress of Hygiene and Demography has been held (biennially as a rule) in each of the following cities: Brussels, Paris, Turin, Geneva, The Hague, and Vienna. The last of these—the Congress held at Vienna in 1887—was under the protection of His Imperial and Royal Highness the late Archduke Rudolph, Crown Prince of Austria, who opened the Congress in person. To this Con-gress delegates were appointed by the Governments of the following countries and states, the learned societies of many of them also sending representatives: of them also sending representatives :

of them also sending representatives:---Austria-Hungary, Belgium, Bulgaria, Denmark, France; German Empire-Prussia, Bavaria, Saxony, Wurtemberg, Mecklenburg Schwerin, Mecklenburg Strelitz, Brunswick, Saxe Coburg Gotha, Alsace-Lorraine, &c.; Italy, Norway, Netherlands, Portugal, Roumania, Russia, Servia, Spain,

Switzerland, Turkey, Egypt, Japan, Persia, Argentine Re-public, Uruguay, and also by the Governments of three of our own colonies, namely, Malta, New South Wales, and Victoria.

The Governments of the following countries did not send delegates; but representatives from various learned societies and institutions in these countries were present :

Great Britain and Ireland, Canada, United States, Greece, Mexico, Chili, Venezuela.

The total number of hygienists and statisticians present from all parts of the world was over two thousand. Before the close of that Congress a permanent inter-

national committee was appointed to decide on time and place of meeting of the next Congress of the series. On account of the fact that it had been decided to hold a Hygienic Congress in connection with the Paris Exhibition in 1889, it was resolved that the next International Congress of the series should be held in 1891, and London was chosen as its place of meeting. As England has taken the lead in sanitary science and

administration, it may be expected that her colonies and that foreign countries will send numerous representatives, both official and unofficial, and that the Congress will be of great magnitude and importance

A committee of the English members attending the Vienna Congress was formed to take preliminary steps to

Vienna Congress was formed to take preliminary steps to bring the matter before the public. They issued invitations to universities, colleges, public corporations, and learned societies, requesting them to name delegates to form a general committee. The list of delegates nominated up to the present time accompanies this, and other nominations are being received daily. The time has therefore now arrived to form a definite organization, and to raise a fund to defray the necessary expenses.

#### Objects of the Congress.

The aim of the Congress is to awaken public interest in the progress of hygiene and demography, by which latter term is understood the study of the life-conditions of com-munities from a statistical point of view, to afford persons interested in these subjects an opportunity of meeting, with the object of advancing their progress, and, by conferences and debates, to elucidate questions relating to hygiene, demography, and public health.

The Governments of all countries, municipalities, county councils, and other provincial administrations, public health authorities, universities, colleges, and all societies which are occupied in the study of the sciences more or less im-mediately connected with hygiene are invited to co-operate and appoint delegates to represent them at the Congress. An exhibition of articles of hygienic interest will be held in connection with the Congress. Excursions will be arranged to various places of especial

The deaths of persons not residents of the boroughs, occurring at hospitals, have been excluded in all cases. The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 474, against 396 in September, an increase of 78. The deaths in October were 164, a decrease of 33 on the number in September. Of the total deaths, males contributed 97; females, 67. Forty-five of the deaths were of children under 5 years of age, being 27.44 per cent. of the whole number; 26 of these were under 1 year of age.

\* It must be understood that the numbers of the population above given refer only to those within the several borough boundaries. To estimate the relative importance of the principal boroughs as centres of population it is necessary in each case to take into con-sideration the number of the population in the adjacent boroughs, some of which are included in the above table, and other districts which are practically suburbs of the central borough. This can only be done with any degree of accuracy for census years. The populations of the four principal boroughs and their suburbs in 1886 were as follows :--

The following remarks apply only to the four principal boroughs :-The births in October were 257, against 217 in September, an increase of 40. The deaths amounted to 97, against 98 in September. There were 19 deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards : 4 males of 86, 71, 69, and 68, and 2 females of 72 and 67, died at Auckland; 1 male of 65, and 1 female of 80, at Wellington; 1 female of 72 at Christchurch; 5 males of 89, 82, 71, 67, and 66, and 5 females of 82 (2), 67, 66, and 65, at Dunedin. Specific Febrile or Zymotic Diseases.—The mortality from these diseases fell from 9 deaths in September to 5 in October, the last number being the smallest on record for any month except in September, 1889, when there was only 1 death in this class. Of the 5 deaths, 4 were from miasmatic diseases, viz., 2 from scalet fever—1 at Auckland and 1 at Wellington, 1 from diphtheria, and 1 from typhoid fever—both at Dunedin. The mortality in this class of diseases is usually lowest about the month of October, after which the number of deaths increases with the increasing temperature. The largest number of deaths recorded in any one month from these diseases was 76 in March, 1887. *Constitutional Diseases.*—Twenty-four deaths were registered in October as having occurred from these diseases, the same number as in September. Phthisis was more fatal in October, with 13 deaths, against 10 in the previous month; but cancer caused only 7 deaths, against 10 in September. *Local Diseases.*—These diseases caused 52 deaths in the past month, a decrease of 2 on the number in the previous month. Of these, diseases of the nervous system caused 13 deaths, against 14 in September; diseases of the circulatory system, 7 deaths, against 6 in September; and diseases of the respiratory system caused 17, an increase of 3 on the number in the previous menth.

system, 7 deaths, against 6 in September; and diseases of the respiratory system caused 17, an increase of 3 on the number in the previous menth. *Violent Deaths.*—Nine deaths were so classified, an exceptionally large number in any month. Of these, only 2 were accidental, a child 2 years of age was killed by her father, and 6 persons committed suicide. The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of these four boroughs from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition, and climatic influence of the season on health.
