Setting apart Land for the Wanganui River Trust.

GLASGOW, Governor.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this twenty-first day of June, 1892.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by section six of "The Wanganui River Trust Act, 1891," it is, among other things, enacted that the Governor may, by Order in Council, set apart not exceeding ten thousand acres of land within that part of the Waimarino Block which is situated within the Wellington Land District as an endowment for the Wanganui River Trust, subject to certain stipulations therein expressed:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority contained in the said sixth section of the said Act, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby set apart the land described in the Schedule hereto as an endowment for the said Wanganui River Trust, subject to such lands being administered by the Land Board of the Wellington Land District, under any provisions of "The Land Act, 1885," except that none of the said land shall be disposed of absolutely in freehold, and subject also as in the said Act particularly mentioned.

SCHEDULE.

ALL that area in the Land District of Wellington, containing by admeasurement 10,000 acres, more or less, being part of the Waimarino Block. Bounded towards the north-east by the other part of Waimarino Block; towards the east generally by Native land; towards the south by Ngapopo Block; and towards the west generally by Topotea Block and Native land: as the same is delineated on the plan marked S.G. 15642, and deposited in the Head Office of the Department of Lands and Survey, Wellington.

Act"), it is, among other things, provided that the Governor, by Order in Council, may from time to time declare that any leasing authority shall be subject to the provisions of the said Act, but that no such order shall have any effect unless it be issued at the request or upon the recommendation of the leasing authority on whose behalf such order is issued:

And whereas it has been made to appear that the Gisborne High School Board, constituted under the provisions of "The Gisborne High School Act, 1885," is a leasing authority within the meaning of the said Act, and the said Board has requested that it may be brought under the provisions of the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred on him by the said Act, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby order and declare that, from and after the date hereof, the Gisborne High School Board shall be subject to the provisions of "The Public Bodies' Powers Act, 1887," as amended by "The Public Bodies' Powers Act 1887 Amendment Act, 1891."

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by section two hundred and twenty-seven of "The Licensing Act, 1881" (herein termed "the said Act"), it is provided that if, through any accidental or unavoidable impediment, misfeasance, or omission, anything required by the said Act to be done is omitted to be done, or is not done within the time fixed, the Governor in Council may take all such measures as may be necessary for removing such impediment or rectifying such misfeasance or omission, and may validate anything which may have been irregularly done in matter of form, so that the intent and purpose of the Act may have effect:

And whereas the meeting of the Licensing Committee for the District of Woolston was fixed for the sixth day of June instant: And whereas applications for renewals of licenses to be granted at the said meeting have been made by Thomas Henry Ranger, Michael Charles O'Connell, and Joseph Harrup Hopkins, all of Woolston: And whereas it appears that notices of such applications have been delivered and advertised as is provided by the said Act, but that, owing to accidental omissions on the part of the Clerk of the said Committee, notice of the holding of the meeting of the Licensing Committee was not fixed to the outer door of the building where the meetings of the Committee are held, nor to the doors of every other Courthouse in the said district, and a list of notices of the said applications were not posted inside and outside the Woolston Town Board Office, being the place where the Committee held their meeting, as required by law:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Act, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby order and declare that the applications made by the said Thomas Henry Ranger, Michael Charles O'Connell, and Joseph Harrup Hopkins as aforesaid shall not be deemed invalid by reason only that the said several notices were not fixed and posted in the manner required by the said Act and its amendments; and doth also declare that the proceedings of the said Licensing Committee held on the sixth day of June instant, or at any adjournment thereof, are hereby validated so far as the validity thereof may depend on the fixing and posting of the said notices as aforesaid.

The committee retain a grateful recollection of the sympathy displayed on that occasion, and I am desirous to express a wish that you may see fit to make it generally known.

THE PRESENT STATE OF THE INDIAN MUTINY RELIEF
FUND OF 1857-58.

To the Editor of the *Times*.

SIR,—As the proprietors of the *Times* were among the largest contributors to the above fund, the committee of management, consisting of Major-General G. B. Tremeneere, R.E., Chairman, Mr. Thomson Hankey, Surgeon-Major Alexander Grant, Q.H.S., Major-General Cave, Mr. H. D. Sandeman, Major-General Dodgson, C.B., Mr. G. C. Finnis, Major-General Baker, Lieutenant-General Holroyd, Brigade-Surgeon J. Berry White, Major-General Johnstone, C.B., Surgeon-General Cockburn, and Lieutenant-General Murray, at their meeting held on the 22nd February, considered that it might be interesting to the subscribers and to the general public to know the result of their recent inquiries into the operations and present position of the fund.

When at the request of the Committee the transactions of the fund were brought under the supervision of the High Court of Justice in Chancery in 1877, it was not thought necessary to publish any further annual reports, which the committee had done for twenty years during which they had administered the charity.

Under the order of the Court the assets then remaining at their disposal were transferred to the Paymaster-General, and the Committee continued to administer the income of the fund; but this order did not in any way interfere with the allowances granted to the several recipients, nor hinder the due consideration by the committee of any applications which from time to time might be brought before them.

On the 31st December, 1877, the securities and cash handed over to the Paymaster-General amounted to £106,000, and 308 widows and other relations of officers, soldiers, and civilians, who had been sufferers by the mutiny, were receiving annual allowances from the fund.

It may be of interest to those who remain, not only in the United Kingdom, but in all the British Colonies and Dependencies in America, in France, Austria, Germany, Russia, Holland and Belgium, Switzerland, Spain and Portugal, Italy, Turkey, the Danubian Provinces, Greece, and Egypt, who in 1857 so generously contributed to form this noble fund, to learn its present position, and how its resources continue to be applied.

The original donations in 1857-58 amounted to £440,968 13s. 10d., to which has since been added £179,169 13s. 2d., which has accrued by interest on the investments, and profit on sale of stock, making a total capital of £620,138 7s. to be accounted for. Of this sum £535,379 8s. 4d. has been expended in donations and allowances to sufferers by the mutiny, viz.: In the United Kingdom, £395,092 9s. 9d.; remitted to India in relief, £140,286 18s. 7d.; in administration, viz., salaries, stationery, rent, law-costs, and miscellaneous expenses, £26,375 13s. 4d.; balance on the 31st December last, with the Paymaster-General and Bank of England, £58,383 5s. 4d.: the cost of administration during the thirty-four years being about 5 per cent. on the above expenditure.

The annuitants on the fund having become considerably reduced in number, an actuarial valuation of its liabilities and assets was made in 1884, and it was then ascertained that the funds in hand were more than sufficient to provide life-annuities for all the recipients.

A scheme was then submitted to, and approved by the Court, for distributing a portion of the surplus to other military charities in need of assistance, which were considered to be closely allied to the original purpose of the fund, and £3,000 was so granted on the recommendation of the committee to the Royal School for Officers' Daughters at Bath, and the Cambridge Asylum for Soldiers' Widows, the amount being included in the above figures as part of the sum disbursed in the United Kingdom.

The committee has been reinforced from time to time, to fill the place of casualties by retirements or death, but it consists mainly as before of military men and civilians who have served in India, and they continue as heretofore to regulate and administer the fund under the inspection and approval of the Court of Chancery.

The number of annuitants still on the books, who are paid every quarter, is—widows and other relations of officers civil and military in the United Kingdom, 66; widows in India and the colonies, 11; widows and other relations of soldiers, seamen, and marines in the United Kingdom, 156; widows in India and the colonies, 8; invalided and wounded soldiers, 8: total, 249.

Another calculation with respect to the liabilities and assets of the fund was made in 1889 by the Actuary of the London Life Association, which satisfied the committee that, although there was no surplus, the money at their disposal was sufficient to provide the annuitants with their present allowances for the term of their natural lives.

Te Makarini Scholarships, held at Te Aute College, Hawke's Bay.

THREE scholarships of the yearly value of £35, tenable for two years, are offered for competition. One of these scholarships, to be called the senior scholarship, is open to all Maoris under sixteen years of age at the end of the month preceding the date of the examination; the other two scholarships are junior scholarships, and are open to all Maoris under fifteen years of age at the end of the month preceding the date of the examination who have not been pupils at Te Aute or St. Stephen's, and whose attendance at school during the previous year is considered by the Inspector of Native Schools to have been satisfactory. The senior scholarship is offered for competition among Maori boys on the conditions laid down in the regulations of the Trustees of the Te Makarini Scholarships Fund, as printed in the Native Schools Code, 1886, and in the supplementary regulations that have been sent out to all teachers. NOTE.—Deaths, occurring at hospitals, of persons not residents of the borough wherein the hospital is situated are allotted to the borough where the diseases were contracted, and not to that in which the deaths actually took place.

The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 394—or, exclusive of Palmerston North, which appears in this report for the first time, to 378—against 409 in April, a decrease of 31. The deaths in May were 197—or, exclusive of Palmerston North, 194—an increase of 15 on the number in April. Of the total deaths, males contributed 107; females, 90. Sixty-five of the deaths were of children under 5 years of age, being 33 per cent. of the whole number; 47 of these were under 1 year of age.

The following remarks apply only to the four principal boroughs: The births in May were 206, against 232 in April, a decrease of 26; the deaths amounted to 118, against 99 in April, an increase of 19. There were 15 deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards, 5 males of 90, 86, 84, 81, and 79, and 4 females of 83, 75, 68, and 65, died at Auckland; 1 male of 70 at Wellington; 1 male of 73, and 1 female of 77, at Christchurch; 2 males of 74 and 71, and 1 female of 65, at Dunedin.

Specific Febrile or Zymotic Diseases.—The deaths from these diseases in May, at the four principal boroughs, numbered 17, as against 21 in April. Influenza caused 1 death at each town, while in April only 1 death took place altogether. There was 1 death from whooping-cough at Christchurch. From diphtheria 3 deaths are noticed—1 at Auckland and 2 at Christchurch. Enteric fever caused 6 deaths, of which 3 were at Wellington. This last is satisfactory to note, after the reports for March and April for Wellington, which showed deaths from typhoid fever to the number of 10 and 5 for these months respectively. There was a further subsidence of mortality from diarrhoeal diseases in May, the total number of deaths being only 3, against 10 in April, 12 in March, and 38 in February.

Constitutional Diseases.—31 deaths occurred in May, against 22 in April. Phthisis caused 16 in the later month—a heavy mortality—while from cancer there were 6 deaths.

Local Diseases.—The deaths increased from 40 in April to 46 in May. Croup, bronchitis, and pneumonia caused 8 deaths at Auckland last month, 1 at Wellington, and 2 at Dunedin. There was 1 death from congestion of lungs at Dunedin, making 12 altogether from diseases of the respiratory organs, against 11 in April.

Violent Deaths.—These numbered 9, of which 8 were from accident, all of persons over 5 years of age; 2 were cases of burning. There was 1 suicide by hanging.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of these four boroughs from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.
