Royal Instructions to the Governor of New Zealand.

THE following instructions, passed under the Royal sign manual and signet, to the Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of New Zealand and its dependencies, are published for general information.

NEW ZEALAND.

INSTRUCTIONS, passed under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, to the Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies.

[Dated 26th March, 1892.]

INSTRUCTIONS to our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over our Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, or to our Lieutenant-Governor or other officer for the time being administering the Government of our said colony and its dependencies.

Given at our Court at Windsor, this twenty-sixth day of March, 1892, in the fifty-fifth year of our reign.

Preamble. Recites letters patent, constituting the office of Governor.

Whereas by certain letters patent bearing date the twenty-first day of February, 1879, We did constitute, order, and declare that there should be a Governor and Commander-in-Chief (therein and hereinafter called the Governor) in and over our Colony of New Zealand and its dependencies (which said colony and its dependencies are therein and hereinafter called the colony):

And whereas We did thereby authorise and command the Governor to do and execute all things that belong to his said office, according to the tenor of our said letters patent, and of such commission as might be issued to him under our sign manual and signet, and according to such instructions as might from time to time be given to him under our sign manual and signet, or by our order in our Privy Council, or by Us through one of our principal Secretaries of State, and to such laws as were then or should thereafter be in force in the colony:

Recites instructions of 21st February, 1879.

And whereas We did issue certain instructions under our sign manual and signet, bearing date the twenty-first day of February, 1879:

And whereas We are minded to give these further instructions to our said Governor:

Revokes aforesaid instructions.

Now know you that We do hereby revoke the aforesaid instructions, and We do, by these our instructions under our sign manual and signet, direct and enjoin and declare our will and pleasure as follows:—

Interpretation.

I. In these our instructions, unless inconsistent with the context, the term "the Governor" shall include every person for the time being administering the Government of the colony, and the term "the Executive Council" shall mean the members of our Executive Council for the colony who are for the time being the responsible advisers of the Governor.

Oaths to be administered by Governor.

II. The Governor may, whenever he thinks fit, require any person in the public service to take the oath of allegiance, together with such other oath or oaths as may from time to time be prescribed by any law in force in the colony. The Governor is to administer such oaths, or cause them to be administered by some public officer of the colony.

Governor to communicate instructions to Executive Council.

III. The Governor shall forthwith communicate these our instructions to the Executive Council, and likewise all such others, from time to time, as he shall find convenient for our service to impart to them.

Quorum.

IV. The Executive Council shall not proceed to the despatch of business unless two members at the least (exclusive of the Governor or of the member presiding) be present and assisting throughout the whole of the business at which any such business shall be despatched.

Governor to take advice of Executive Council.

V. In the execution of the powers and authorities vested in him, the Governor shall be guided by the advice of the Executive Council; but, if in any case he shall see sufficient cause to dissent from the opinion of the said Council, he may act in the exercise of his said powers and authorities in opposition to the opinion of the Council, reporting the matter to Us without delay, with the reasons for his so acting.

In any such case it shall be competent to any member of the said Council to require that there be recorded upon the minutes of the Council the grounds of any advice or opinion that he may give upon the question.

Description of Bills not to be assented to.

VI. The Governor shall not, except in the cases hereunder mentioned, assent in our name to any Bill of any of the following classes:—

1. Any Bill for the divorce of persons joined together in holy matrimony:

2. Any Bill whereby any grant of land or money, or other donation or gratuity, may be made to himself:

3. Any Bill affecting the currency of the colony:

4. Any Bill imposing differential duties (other than as allowed by "The Australian Colonies' Duties Act, 1873):

5. Any Bill the provisions of which shall appear inconsistent with obligations imposed upon Us by treaty:

6. Any Bill interfering with the discipline or control of our forces in the colony by land or sea:

7. Any Bill of an extraordinary nature and importance, whereby our prerogative, or the rights and property of our subjects not residing in the colony, or the trade and shipping of the United Kingdom and its dependencies, may be prejudiced:

8. Any Bill containing provisions to which our assent as once been refused, or which have been disallowed by Us,—

Powers in urgent cases.

unless he shall have previously obtained our instructions upon such Bill through one of our Principal Secretaries of State, or unless such Bill shall contain a clause suspending the operation of such Bill until the signification in the colony of our pleasure thereupon, or unless the Governor shall have satisfied himself that an urgent necessity exists requiring that such Bill be brought into immediate operation, in which case he is authorised to assent in our name to such Bill, unless the same shall be repugnant to the law of England, or inconsistent with any obligations imposed upon Us by treaty. But he is to transmit to Us by the earliest opportunity the Bill so assented to, together with his reasons for assenting thereto.

Regulation of power of pardon.

VII. The Governor shall not pardon or relieve any offender without first receiving in capital cases the advice of the Executive Council, and in other cases the advice of one, at least, of his Ministers; and in any case in which such pardon or relieve might directly affect the interests of our Empire, or of any country or place beyond the jurisdiction of the Government of the colony, the Governor shall, before deciding as to either pardon or relieve, take those interests specially into his own personal consideration in conjunction with such advice as aforesaid.

Judges, &c., to be appointed during pleasure.

VIII. All commissions granted by the Governor to any persons to be Judges, Justices of the Peace, or other officers shall, unless otherwise provided by law, be granted during pleasure only.

Governor's absence. Temporary leave of absence.

IX. The Governor shall not quit the colony without having first obtained leave from Us for so doing under our sign manual and signet, or through one of our Principal Secretaries of State, except for the purpose of visiting the Governor of any neighbouring colony for periods not exceeding one month at any one time, nor exceeding in the aggregate one month for every year's service in the colony.

Governor's absence and departure from the colony. Interpretation clause.

X. The temporary absence of the Governor for any period not exceeding one month shall not, if he have previously informed the Executive Council, in writing, of his intended absence, and if he have duly appointed a Deputy in accordance with our said letters patent, nor shall any extension of such period sanctioned by one of our Principal Secretaries of State and not exceeding fourteen days, be deemed a departure from the colony within the meaning of the said letters patent.

THE DISEASED ANIMALS IMPORTATION PREVENTION ACT.

By His Excellency Sir Robert George Crookshank Hamilton, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Tasmania and its Dependencies.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, I, Sir Robert George Crookshank Hamilton, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the

Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief as aforesaid, in Council, deem it probable that the importation of horses from the State of California, in the United States of America, may cause disease to be introduced into Tasmania: Now, therefore, I, Sir Robert George Crookshank Hamilton, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief as aforesaid, in Council, in pursuance of the provisions of section three of "The Diseased Animals Importation Prevention Act" (47 Vict. No. 2), do, by this Proclamation, absolutely prohibit the importation into Tasmania of any horses from the State of California aforesaid.

Bonus for the Manufacture of Salt.

Te Makarini Scholarships, held at Te Aute College, Hawke's Bay.

THREE scholarships of the yearly value of £35, tenable for two years, are offered for competition. One of these scholarships, to be called the senior scholarship, is open to all Maoris under sixteen years of age at the end of the month preceding the date of the examination; the other two scholarships are junior scholarships, and are open to all Maoris under fifteen years of age at the end of the month preceding the date of the examination who have not been pupils at Te Aute or St. Stephen's, and whose attendance at school during the previous year is considered by the Inspector of Native Schools to have been satisfactory. The senior scholarship is offered for competition among Maori boys on the conditions laid down in the regulations of the Trustees of the Te Makarini Scholarships Fund, as printed in the Native Schools Code, 1886, and in the supplementary regulations that have been sent out to all teachers. Candidates for the junior scholarships will be examined in the subjects specified for Standard IV. in the Native Schools Code, 1886. The questions set will, however, be more difficult than those given at the standard examinations. The examination will be held at convenient centres on the 19th and 20th December, 1892.

Candidates must, either directly or through their teachers, send notice to the Inspector of Native Schools, Education Department, Wellington, of their intention to present themselves for examination. Such notice must be posted not later than the 31st October next.

Copies of the regulations and forms of notice may be obtained from teachers of Native schools and boarding institutions, the Secretaries to Education Boards, or the Secretary for Education.

The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 387, against 394 in May, a decrease of 7. The deaths in June were 184, a decrease of 13 on the number in May. Of the total deaths, males contributed 103; females, 81. Forty-seven of the deaths were of children under 5 years of age, being nearly 25.55 per cent. of the whole number; 34 of these were under 1 year of age.

The following remarks apply only to the four principal boroughs: The births in June were 209, against 206 in May, an increase of 3. The deaths amounted to 105, against 118 in May, a decrease of 13. There were 21 deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: 5 males of 78, 75, 73, 68, and 67 respectively died at Auckland; 4 males of 85, 73, 72, and 71, and 3 females of 82, 78, and 70, at Wellington; 2 males of 77 and 75, and 2 females of 72 and 71, at Christchurch; 3 males of 72, 71, and 65, and 2 females of 81 and 72, at Dunedin.

Specific Febrile or Zymotic Diseases.—The deaths at the four principal boroughs in June from this class of disease were only 11 in number, against 17 in May and 21 in April. Influenza caused 1 death at Auckland; diphtheria was fatal in 1 case at the same city, and whooping-cough caused 2 deaths at Christchurch. From typhoid fever there were 5 deaths in June, against 6 in May; of the 5 for last month, 4 occurred at Wellington; the figures for that city having been 3 for May, 5 for April, and 7 for March. The deaths from diarrhoea fell to 1 in June, having been 3 in May, 10 in April, 12 in March, and 38 in February.

Constitutional Diseases.—The mortality diminished from 31 deaths in the previous month to 17 in June. The heavy mortality from phthisis in May (16 deaths) fell to 8 deaths in the later month, and deaths from cancer decreased from 6 to 3.

Local Diseases.—The comparison with May shows an increase of deaths from 46 to 57 on the total; but this is not found mainly where it might have been expected on account of the season, *i.e.*, in Order 4, diseases of the respiratory system. From croup, bronchitis, pneumonia, and asthma the deaths were 13, or only 1 in excess of those from similar causes in May. The increase is chiefly under the head of diseases of the digestive organs and of the urinary system. From Bright's disease, acute nephritis, and cystitis there were 6 deaths.

Violent Deaths.—Of 6 violent deaths, 5 were accidental, all of persons over 5 years of age. At Wellington a youth was run over by a tram-car, and 1 case of suicide by drowning was registered.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of these four boroughs from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.
