WHEREAS by "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1886," section twenty-seven, it is enacted that, if not less than one-fourth of the burgesses of a borough petition the Governor praying him to divide such borough into wards, the Governor may, by Proclamation, divide such borough into not more than six wards, and shall in such Proclamation assign such names and boundaries to each ward as he thinks fit: And whereas not less than one-fourth of the burgesses of the Borough of Sydenham have petitioned me to divide such borough into wards:

Now, therefore, I, David, Earl of Glasgow, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance of the hereinbefore recited authority, do hereby proclaim and declare that the Borough of Sydenham shall be and the same is hereby divided into four wards, with the names and boundaries set forth in the Schedule hereto.

#### SCHEDULE.

#### ADDINGTON WARD.

Bounded towards the north by the City of Christchurch; towards the east by a line along the middle of Windmill Road to Crescent Road; towards the south generally by Crescent Road and Douglas Jerrold Street; and towards the north-west by the Lower Lincoln Road.

Bounded towards the north by the City of Christchurch; towards the east by a line along the middle of Colombo Street; towards the south-west by Strickland Street; and towards the west by Addington Ward, hereinbefore described.

#### WALTHAM WARD.

A PROCLAMATION.

In pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in the Governor by "The Registration of Births and Deaths Act, 1875," I, David, Earl of Glasgow, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby abolish the existing registration district known as the Wellington District; and do proclaim and declare that the territory heretofore comprised within the said district is hereby divided anew into two registration districts, the names and boundaries whereof shall be as follows:—

Wellington District.

Bounded on the north by a line drawn due east from the coast through the highest point of the road crossing the Paikakariki Hill to where it intersects the west boundary of Section No. 391, Akatarawa Survey District; thence towards Section No. 391, Akatarawa Survey District; thence towards the south-east generally by a right line to the north-east corner of Section No. 24A, Block X., Paikakariki Survey District, by Section No. 28 of said block, and by a road-line bounding the said Section No. 28 and Sections Nos. 33 and 32, passing through Sections Nos. 6, 4, 3, 11, and bounding Sections Nos. 16 and 19, all of the said Block X., and Sections Nos. 2, 6, 10, 7, 15, and 16, Block IV., Belmont Survey District, passing through Sections Nos. 59, 57, 436, 433, 345, 342, 341, 337, 334, and 332, all of Block III., the said survey district, by Sections Nos. 328, 331, 330, 329, 322, 321, 422,

423, and 22, by a road-line bounding the said Section No. 22 423, and 22, by a road-line bounding the said Section No. 22 and Section Nos. 21, 20, 16, 15, 14, 12, 11, and 9, Block VIII., Section No. 7, Block XIII., and Section No. 5, Block XII.; thence by the said Section No. 5 and by Section No. 19 of the said Block XII., Belmont Survey District, and a line across the road to Port Nicholson; and again towards the south-east generally by Port Nicholson and the ocean; and towards the south-west and north-west by the ocean to the line first mentioned: including Mana Island.

WHEREAS by the one hundred and fourth section of "The Land Act, 1885," it is enacted that the Governor, by Proclamation in the Gazette, may from time to time set apart out of any suburban or rural lands such blocks or allotments of lands as he shall think fit, and set the same aside for sale on deferred payments, and in such Proclamation may fix a day on which the land shall be open for application; and that he may also in like manner set apart for sale on deferred payments such blocks or allotments as may be recommended by any Land Board, and may also from time to time alter, amend, or revoke any such Proclamation: And whereas the land specified in the Schedule hereto was, with other lands, by Proclamation dated the second day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, proclaimed as set apart for sale on deferred payments: And whereas it is expedient to withdraw the said land from the deferred-payment system:

Defining the Middle Line of a Further Portion of the North Island Main Trunk Railway from a Point at or near Marton to Te Awamutu, via Murimotu, Taumaranui, and the Ongaruhe River Valley (Part of Mokau Section).

WHEREAS the North Island Main Trunk Railway,

HEREAS the North Island Main Trunk Railway, from a point at or near Marton to Te Awamutu, viâ Murimotu, Taumaranui, and the Ongaruhe River Valley (hereinafter termed "the said railway"), is a railway the construction of which is authorised by "The Railways Authorisation Act, 1884:" And whereas the said railway has been partly constructed, and it has been determined to construct and maintain a further portion of the same:

Now, therefore, I, David, Earl of Glasgow, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities conferred by "The Railways Authorisation Act, 1884," and "The Public Works Act, 1882," and in exercise of every other power and authority in anywise enabling me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare that the middle line of the said further portion of the said railway shall be that defined and set forth in the Schedule hereto. #### SCHEDULE.

WHEREAS an Order in Council prohibiting the exporta-WHEREAS an Order in Council prohibiting the exportation from the colony of all oysters known as Ostrea purpurea, Ostrea glomerata, Ostrea mordax, or rock oysters, shore oysters, drift or mangrove oysters, or by whatever name they may be locally known respectively, taken or produced in the waters of the colony, was made under the powers conferred by "The Fisheries Encouragement Act, 1885" (hereinafter termed "the said Act)," on the twenty-eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, and published in the New Zealand Gazette No. 52, of the thirtieth day of the same month:

Regulations for Parcels to Queensland.

GLASGOW, Governor,

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this ninth day of August, 1892.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by Order in Council, bearing date the twenty-third day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, purporting to be made under the powers conferred by "The Post Office (Foreign Parcels) Act, 1888," and "The Post Office Act 1881 Amendment Act, 1886," (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), regulations were made for the purposes of the parcels post to Tasmania and certain of the Australian Colonies therein mentioned:

of the purposes of the parcels post to Tasmania and certain of the Australian Colonies therein mentioned:

And whereas it is now deemed expedient to extend the system of the parcels post to the Colony of Queensland:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and excreise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Acts, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth for the purposes of such extension hereby make the regulations set forth in the Schedule hereto, and doth declare that such regulations shall come into force on the ninth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, and shall be read and construed subject to the provisions of the said Acts.

#### SCHEDULE. REGULATIONS.

INTERPRETATION.

- 1. "Parcel" means any package or parcel which may be conveyed, or be intended to be conveyed, by means of the Post Veyed, or be intended to be conveyed, by means of the Post Office, under the Acts and Regulations from time to time in force relating to the Post Office; and either posted in New Zealand for transmission to any place in the Colony of Queensland, or posted at any place in the said colony for transmission to a place in New Zealand.
  - "RECEIVING" AND "DESPATCHING" POST-OFFICES.
- 2. The chief post-offices at Invercargill, Dunedin, Wellington, and Auckland, in New Zealand, shall, for the time being, be the receiving and despatching post-offices respectively, unless otherwise directed by the Postmaster-General. At the receiving post-offices the received parcels shall be examined for the purpose of assessing the Customs duty.

PREPAYMENT OF CUSTOMS AND OTHER DUTIES.

3. The Customs duty and other charges (if any) must be paid before a parcel shall be delivered.

LIMIT OF WEIGHT AND DIMENSIONS.

4. A parcel for transmission must not exceed 11lb. in weight, 3ft. 6in. in length, or 6ft. in length and girth com-

WHERE RECEIVED AND DELIVERED.

5. Parcels of the maximum size and weight will only be received at, and delivered from, New Zealand post-offices at places accessible by railway, steamer, or mail-coach.

FURTHER LIMITATION TO CERTAIN PLACES.

6. From and to places in New Zealand not served by railway, steamer, or mail-coach (list published in Postal Guide) only parcels not exceeding 51b. in weight, and not measuring more than 2ft. in length or 1ft. in breadth or depth, will be accepted.

#### CUSTOMS DECLARATION.

7. Parcels will be liable to the Customs laws, duties, and regulations of New Zealand and Queensland respectively. The sender of each parcel will be required to make a Customs declaration (on a form to be obtained at parcel postoffices), describing the contents and stating the value thereof, and also giving the name of the place to which the parcel is addressed and the sender's signature and residence. False declaration involves forfeiture of parcel, and renders sender liable to presention liable to prosecution.

#### PARCEL CONTAINING GOLD.

8. On a parcel containing gold, originating in New Zealand, the export duty must be paid before the parcel will be accepted by the Post Office. Such parcels can only be received at money-order offices. At places where there are no customhouses the duty is to be paid to the Postmaster, and at other places paid either at the customhouse or at the postoffice.

## POSTAL OFFICERS TO EXERCISE POWERS OF CUSTOMS OFFICERS.

9. For the purposes of these regulations every officer of the Postal Department having the lawful custody of any parcel shall have and may exercise all the powers of a landing-waiter appointed under any of the Acts relating to the Customs.

#### RATES OF POSTAGE.

10. To Queensland: For a parcel not exceeding 2lb. in weight, 1s. 2d.; for every additional pound or fraction thereof, 7d. extra. Postage must be fully prepaid by means of postage-stamps affixed to the parcels. Insufficiently-prepaid parcels will not be accepted.

#### PACKING OF PARCELS.

11. Parcels should be securely and substantially packed and closed by the sender. If wax is used, it should be of the and closed by the sender. special quality which resists the heat of a hot climate.

#### ADDRESSING.

12. Each parcel should be plainly directed; the direction should give name and full address of the person for whom the parcel is intended. The words "Parcel Post" should be written on the upper left-hand corner, as also the name and address of the sender.

#### Mode of Posting.

13. Parcels must not be posted in a posting-box, but should be presented at the post-office counter.

#### CERTIFICATE OF POSTING.

14. On payment of a fee of 4d. the sender can at time of posting receive a certificate of posting. The certificate imposes no liablity on the department, and is merely intended as evidence of posting.

#### NON-LIABILITY OF THE POSTMASTER-GENERAL.

15. Parcels are received and forwarded at the owner's risk, and the Postmaster-General is not liable for any loss of or damage to any parcel.

#### FORBIDDEN ARTICLES.

16. No parcel containing dangerous or offensive articles, erishable articles, articles likely to injure other parcels, perishable articles, articles likely to injure coner parcers, liquids (unless securely packed in proper cases), or any contraband articles or substances, or articles the admission of which is not authorised by the Customs or other laws and regulations of the colonies to which such parcels may be addressed, will be accepted.

Farcels found to contain forbidden articles, and parcels the contents of which have been falsely declared, will be dealt with in accordance with the Customs and other laws and regulations. A parcel must not contain a letter, neither must it contain another parcel addressed to different persons at different addresses. If such a parcel be discovered the at different addresses. If such a parcel be discovered the contents will be sent forward charged with postage at the rates applicable to such contents respectively. If a letter be discovered in a parcel the parcel will be charged with a fine of 1s.

#### GENERAL.

17. Where not otherwise provided by the foregoing regulations, the general regulations of the New Zealand inland parcel post, as far as applicable, shall apply.

Terms and Conditions of Sale or Selection of the Clifden Village Settlement, Southland Land District.

WHEREAS by the one hundred and sixty-seventh sec-tion of "The Land Act, 1885," it is enacted that the

Governor in Council may fix the terms and conditions upon which the lands comprised in any village settlement shall be disposed of, and the mode of payment for the same:

And whereas His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand has, by Proclamation issued under the provisions of section one hundred and sixty-six of the said Act and the fourteenth section of "The Land Acts Amendment" Act, 1888," set apart the lands enumerated in the Schedule

hereto as a village settlement:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred upon him by the hereinbefore in part recited Acts, and by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth, by this present order, fix the following as the terms and conditions upon which the village settlement enumerated in the First Schedule hereto shall be disposed of, and the mode of payment for the same, that is to

- 1. The day upon which the lands shall be open for sale or selection shall be Wednesday, the twenty-eighth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.
- 2. The lands enumerated in the First Schedule hereto shall be open as village allotments for sale or selection, either for cash, or on deferred payments, or on perpetual lease.
- cash, or on deferred payments, or on perpetual lease.

  3. The purchaser for cash of any of the lands enumerated in the First Schedule hereto must deposit with the Receiver of Land Revenue for the land district one-fifth of the purchasemoney at the time of application, and shall pay the whole remainder of the purchase-money within thirty days of the granting of his application; and if not paid within thirty days his deposit shall be foreited, and the lands shall be again open for sale or occupation forthwith; and upon full payment of the purchase-money he will be entitled to a Crown grant, to be issued in the usual way.

- 4. If any of the lands enumerated in the First Schedule hereto are selected upon deferred payments, the selector shall be subject to the provisions relating to suburban lands of Part III. of "The Land Act, 1885."
- 5. If any of the lands enumerated in the First Schedule hereto are selected under the perpetual-leasing system, the selector shall be subject to the provisions of Part IV. of "The Land Act, 1885."
- 6. No person shall be allowed to apply for or select more than one allotment.
- 7. The prices stated in the First Schedule hereto shall be the prices at which the lands shall be open for sale for cash, or for selection on deferred payment, or on perpetual lease.
- 8. If there should be more than one application for any allotment in the First Schedule the right to occupy the same shall be determined by auction amongst the applicants
- 9. Each applicant for a section for cash will be required to make a statutory declaration that he is applying for the land solely for his own use and benefit, and not for the use and benefit of any other person or persons whomsoever.
- 10. Each applicant for a deferred-payment section will be required to make the declaration prescribed in the Second Schedule hereto, and shall at the time of application deposit with the Receiver of Land Revenue for the land district one-tenth of the price of the allotment (such payment shall be deemed to be a discharge of the license-fee for the six months due on the next first day of January or July follow-ing the date of the license, as the case may be); and, upon fulfilment of the terms and conditions prescribed by the said Act relating to land on deferred payments, will be entitled Act relating to land on deferred payments, will be entitled to the Crown grant, to be issued in the usual way.
