Wellington, 8th March, 1893. THE under-mentioned revised regulations with reference L to the entry of naval cadets into Her Majesty's navy, received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, are republished for general information. R. J. SEDDON.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING NAVAL CADETS.—FOR THE IN-FORMATION OF CANDIDATES.

FORMATION OF CANDIDATES. 1. APPOINTMENTS to naval cadetships will be made by limited competition, with the under-mentioned exceptions :---Four cadetships given annually to sons of gentlemen in the colonies, on the recommendation of the Secretary of State for the Colonies. Service cadetships, the total number of which is not to exceed five in any one year. Service cadets will be selected by the Board of Admiralty from (a) sons of officers of the army, navy, or marines who have been killed in action, or who have been lost at sea on active service, or killed on duty, or who have died of wounds received in action or injuries received on duty within six months from the date of such action or injury; (b) sons of officers of the navy who have performed long or distinguished service, and who hold or have held rank or relative rank on the active list not lower than that of commander. Not more than two such than that of commander. Not more than two such latter service cadets will be nominated annually.

latter service cadets will be nominated annually.
Applications for service cadetships should be addressed to the Military Secretary, Horse Guards, if the candidate is the son of an officer of the army; to the Secretary of the Admiralty if the candidate is the son of an officer of the navy or marines; and to the Military Secretary, India Office, if the candidate is the son of an officer of the Indian army.
Colonial and service cadets will be entered on passing the test-examination as specified in paragraphs 9 and 10, and will in all other respects be subject to these regulations. The educational examination of all candidates will be conducted by the Civil Service Commissioners (address. Cannon)

ducted by the Civil Service Commissioners (address, Cannon Row, Westminster), who will deal with all questions con-nected with such examination and will announce the results. Row,

nected with such examination and will announce the results. A fee of 10s, will be required from each candidate. 2. Except in special circumstances, not more than one-third of the number of candidates actually presenting them-selves before the Civil Service Commissioners will be entered. 3. All nominations of candidates for naval cadetships are made by the First Lord, with the exception of a limited number which are at the disposal of individual members of the Board, and of the Secretaries to the Board of Admiralty. A flag officer or a commodore first class appointed to the chief command of a station, or to a separate command, and a captain, on first appointment as such to the command of a ship, will be allowed to nominate one candidate, provided the privilege is exercised within six months of appointment. No captain will be entitled to nominate more than one candidate during the time he holds the rank of captain, but a flag officer or a commodore first-class may claim the pri-vilege each time he is appointed to a command as above.

candidate during the time he holds the rank of captain, but a flag officer or a commodore first-class may claim the privilege each time he is appointed to a command as above. In the event of a candidate's nomination being cancelled before he has commenced the examination, the officer who nominated him will be allowed to select another candidate for the same or following examination.
4. The nominations will be made half-yearly, as soon as convenient after the report of the last examination has been received from the Civil Service Commissioners.
5. The examinations will be held in London and at Portsmouth, and will commence on the second Tuesday in June and the first Tuesday in December in each year, and the appointments will date from the 15th July and 15th January following respectively.
6. No candidate will be eligible for the June examinations whose age will not be within the following limits on the 15th July following, viz., not less than thirteen nor more than fourteen and a half years of age; nor, for the December examinations, whose age will not be within those limits on the 15th January following.
7. Every candidate must be in good health, and free from any physical defect of body, impediment of speech, defect of sight or hearing, and also from any predisposition to constitutional or hereditary disease or weakness of any kind, and in all respects well developed and active in proportion to his age. Before being examined by the Civil Service Commissioners he will be required to pass the medical examination according to the prescribed regulations, and mat have been found physically fit for the navy; rejection at have been found physically fit for the navy; amination according to the prescribed regulations, and must have been found physically fit for the navy; rejection at such examination will finally exclude him from the navy. 8. The candidate will be required to produce (1) a Regis-trar's certificate of the date of his birth, or a declaration

thereof made before a Magistrate (a certificate of baptism will not be accepted); (2) a certificate of good conduct from the masters of the school or schools at which he may have been educated during the two previous years, or, if educated at home, from his tutor or the clergyman of the parish in which he resides; and (3) proofs of good health. 9. Candidates will be tested by examination in the follow-

Colonial and service cadets will be appointed on pass-ing the test-examination; they must, however, obtain not only the proportion of marks in arithmetic and the other test-subjects required from the candidates who compete, but also an aggregate of not less than 660 marks in test-subjects. 11. A candidate who passes the test-examination, but does not succeed in the competition, will be entitled to compete at the next examination, provided he is within the limits of age at that time. No candidate will be allowed to compete more than twice. A candidate who fails to pass the test will not be entitled to another trial, but he will be allowed to compete at the next examination if he receives a fresh nomi-nation and is still within the limits of age.

nation and is still within the limits of age. 12. A candidate who, owing to illness, fails to appear at the examination for which he has obtained his nomination may receive a second nomination, provided he is still within the limits of age

For all cadets entered under these regulations the payment will be at the rate of £75 per annum for the period in the "Britannia," to be paid half-yearly in advance to the Cashier of the Bank of England, on receipt of claim from the Accountant-General of the Navy. THE New Zealand Railway Commissioners, in exercise and pursuance of the powers conferred by "The Public Works Act, 1882," and "The Government Railways Act, 1887," do hereby make the following by-laws for regulating the traffic on and over the Waitaki Bridge, which said bridge forms part of the Hurunui and Bluff Railway, and is used both for ordinary and railway traffic; and, in further pur-suance and exercise of the said powers, do revoke all by-laws and regulations in force at the date hereof authorising or regulating traffic on and over the said bridge.

(b.) Before such permit is issued, the person applying for the same shall state correctly the description, weight, number of wheels, breadth of tires, and width of the machine, together with the name and address of the owner thereof, which particulars shall be entered in the permit.
(c.) The permit is to be given to the bridge-keeper, and the machine shall not be allowed to enter upon the bridge if the description in the permit does not agree with the machine, nor unless accompanied by the bridge-keeper.
(d.) Every precaution shall be taken against fire or other damage to the bridge or railway, as required by the bridge-keeper; affd speed shall be a uniform rate not exceeding two miles per hour.
(e.) The owner of any machine shall be liable to the Railway Commissioners for any damage done to the bridge or railway during its transit.

Additional Rules of the Native Land Court.

WHEREAS by "The Native Land Court Act, 1886," as amended by "The Native Land Court Act 1886 Amendment Act, 1889," and "The Native Land Court Acts Amendment Act, 1889," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Chief Judge of the Native Land Court, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council, from time to time to make rules for regulating the sittings, practice, forms, and procedure of the Court: And whereas unnecessary trouble and expense are incurred in the preparation of notices of sittings of the Court through the retention and repetition in the list of courting with the retention and repetition in the lists, of applications which for various reasons are not proceeded with, and it is desirable to make provision in that behalf, as hereinafter mentioned, and to regulate the prac-tice of adjournment:

118. When any application has been notified to be heard at a particular time and place, and such application shall have been called on for hearing, but, by reason of non-appearance or other neglect or default on the part of the applicant, shall not have been proceeded with, the Court may either at once dismiss such application, or may direct that the same shall stand over to be dealt with at any time before the close of the sitting of the Court. For the purpose of this regulation the adjournment of the Court to another place shall be deemed the close of the sitting. At the close of the other business of the sitting, and immediately before the closing adjournment of the Court, every application which shall remain undisposed of as afore-said shall be again called on; and, if the Court shall be of opinion that sufficient notice of the intended sitting of the Court had been given, and that the applicant might reason-

opinion that sumcient notice of the intended sitting of the Court had been given, and that the applicant might reason-ably have been expected to appear and prosecute his claim, and if no sufficient cause to the contrary shall otherwise ap-pear, the Court shall dismiss such application, and shall cause such dismissal and the reason thereof to be recorded on the minutes of the proceedings of the Court, and to be notified to the Registrar for the district, who shall remove such explication from the bits of cause such application from the list of cases. If the Court shall decide not to dismiss such application,

but to adjourn the same to a future sitting, such decision, with the reasons for the same, shall be recorded on the minutes, but no such application shall, as a matter of course, be adjourned.

Applications which have been adjourned to a particular time and place, shall, for the purpose of this regulation, be deemed to have been notified for hearing at such time and Dated at Rotorua, this 23rd day of February, 1893.
