WHEREAS by the twenty-first section of "The Westland and Nelson Coalfields Administration Act, 1877," it is, among other things, enacted that the Governor may, by Order in Council, authorise any lessee under a lease granted for coal-mining purposes, and his or their servants and workmen, full and free liberty of making, and using when so made, any railways, tramways, bridges, inclines, staiths, or other means of transit over the lands described in the First, Second, and Third Schedules to the said Act, and whether the same shall be demised by any lease for coalmining purposes or not; subject, however, as therein mentioned:

And whereas the Westport Cardiff Coal Company (Limited) is a lessee from the Crown of certain lands subject to the prois a lessee from the Crown of certain lands subject to the provisions of the said Act, under a lease granted for coal-mining purposes, and has complied with the conditions set forth in sections twenty-two and twenty-three of the said Act, and is desirous of constructing a railway and tramway over the lands mentioned in the Schedule hereto, which said lands form part of the lands described in the Third Schedule to the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the above-recited power, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby authorise the Westport Cardiff Coal Company (Limited) and (subject to the company obtaining the consent of the lawful authority in that behalf) its assigns, and its or their servants and workmen, full and free liberty of making, and using when so made, a railway and tramway over the lands described in the Schedule hereto for the purpose of connecting any coalmines on lands subject to the said Act with the railway of the Mokihinui Coal Company (Limited); such railway and tramway to be constructed in accordance with the approved plans and specifications of same already deposited in the office of the Minister for Public Works at Wellington: Provided, however, that the authority hereby given shall be concurrent with the company's coal-mining lease from the Queen, dated the tenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, and being for a term of sixty-six years from the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three; and such authority shall determine without further ninety-three, and being for a term of sixty-six years from the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three; and such authority shall determine without further notice at the expiration of the said sixty-six years, or at such prior time as the term created by the said lease may expire or in any manner be determined: Provided, further, that the right is hereby reserved to Her Majesty, or any of her officers, servants, or agents on her behalf, at any time to construct and maintain for the public use roads or public highways over any portion of the lands mentioned in the Schedule hereto that is not occupied by the railway or tramway aforesaid, and to construct such roads or public highways across the said railway or tramway, if necessary, at any point or points that may be considered by Her said Majesty, or any of her officers, servants, or agents, to be convenient or suitable for the purpose; and also that the Governor, on behalf of Her said Majesty, may at any time permit the Council of the County of Buller, or any Road Board or local authority which is now or may hereafter be legally constituted in the district in which the said lands are situated, to construct and maintain for the public use roads or public highways over such lands upon the like condition: Provided also that in the event of the company or its assigns obstructing the making or use of such roads or public highways, or in any way refusing to carry out or comply with the provisions of this order, the Governor may determine the authority hereby given by serving the company or its assigns with a notice in writing in that behalf, and, upon the service of such notice upon the company at its last known registered office or at the last known place of residence or business of its assigns or any of them, as the case may require, the said authority shall absolutely determine.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement

has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such foreign State, and so long as such law continues in force there and no longer:

And whereas by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in 1886, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," provision is made for carrying into effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in

effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, it was directed that the operation of the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, should be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as the provision of the said Act of the Parliament of Canada of 1886 should continue in force and no longer:

And whereas a treaty was concluded on the twenty-second day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, between Her Majesty and the President of the Argentine Republic, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which treaty is in the terms following:—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and His Excellency the President of the Argentine Republic, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice and to the prevention of crime within the two countries and their jurisdictions, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes or offences hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up, have named as their plenipotentiaries to conclude a treaty—that is to say,—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, her Chargé d'Affaires ad interim Mr. George Jenner; and

His Excellency Doctor Don Norberto Quirno Costa, Secretary of State for the Department of Foreign Affairs;

Who, after having communicated to each other their re-

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following articles:—

#### ARTICLE I.

The high contracting parties engage to deliver up to each the high contracting parties engage to deriver up to each other, under certain circumstances and conditions stated in the present treaty, those persons who, being accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences enumerated in Article II., committed in the territory of the one party, shall be found within the territory of the other party.

#### ARTICLE II.

Extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes or offences:

crimes or offences:—

1. Murder (including assassination, parricide, infanticide poisoning), or attempt or conspiracy to murder.

2. Manslaughter.

3. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of women.

4. Rape.

5. Carnal knowledge or any attempt to have carnal knowledge of a girl under sixteen years of age, if the evidence produced justifies committal for those crimes according to the laws of both the contracting parties.

6. Indecent assault.

18. (a.) Counterfeiting or altering money, or bringing into circulation counterfeited or altered money; (b.) knowingly making, without lawful authority, any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of the coin of the realm. (c.) Forgery, or uttering what is forged.

19. Crimes against bankruptcy law.

20. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any person travelling or being upon a railway.

21. Malicious injury to property if such offence be indict-

21. Malicious injury to property, if such offence be indict-

able.

22. Piracy and other crimes or offences committed at sea against persons or things which, according to the laws of the high contracting parties, are extradition offences, and are punishable by more than one year's imprisonment.

23. Dealing in slaves in such manner as to constitute a

criminal offence against the laws of both States.

The extradition is also to be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both contracting parties.

Extradition may also be granted at the discretion of the State applied to in respect of any other crime for which, according to the laws of both the contracting parties for the time being in force the grant can be made. time being in force, the grant can be made.

#### ARTICLE III.

Either Government reserves the right to refuse or grant the surrender of its own subjects or citizens to the other Government.

#### ARTICLE IV.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of Her Majesty's Government, or the person claimed on the part of the Government of the Argentine Republic, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial, in the territory of the Argentine Republic or in the United Kingdom respectively, for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of Her Majesty's Government, or on the part of the Government of the Argentine Republic, should be under examination for any other crime in the territory of the Argentine Republic or in the United

in the territory of the Argentine Republic or in the United Kingdom respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

#### ARTICLE V.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applying or applied to.

It shall likewise not take place when, according to the laws of either country, the maximum punishment for the offence is imprisonment for less than one year.

#### ARTICLE VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

### ARTICLE VII.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison or A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison of be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made, for any other crime, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored, or has had an opportunity of returning, to the State by which he has been surrendered. This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition mitted after the extradition.

## ARTICLE VIII.

The requisition for extradition shall be made through the diplomatic agents of the high contracting parties respec-

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the

where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A sentence passed in contumaciam is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

#### ARTICLE IX.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

#### ARTICLE X.

ARTICLE X.

A fugitive criminal may be apprehended under a warrant issued by any Police Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority in either country, on such information or complaint, and such evidence, or after such proceedings, as would, in the opinion of the authority issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime had been committed or the person convicted in that part of the dominions of the two contracting parties in which the Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority exercises jurisdiction: Provided, however, that in the United Kingdom the accused shall, in such case, be sent as speedily as possible before a Police Magistrate in London. He shall, in accordance with this article, be discharged, as well in as possible before a Police Magistrate in London. He shall, in accordance with this article, be discharged, as well in the Argentine Republic as in the United Kingdom, if within the term of thirty days a requisition for extradition shall not have been made by the diplomatic agent of his country in accordance with the stipulations of this treaty. The same rule shall apply to the cases of persons accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences specified in this treaty, and committed on the high seas on board any vessel of either country which may come into a port of the other.

#### ARTICLE XI.

The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the case the crime had been committed in the territory of the same State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition, and that the crime of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to; and no criminal shall be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his committal to prison to await the warrant for his surrender.

#### ARTICLE XII.

In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or statements of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating, the fact of a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows:—

same are authenticated as follows:—

1. A warrant must purport to be signed by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State.

2. Depositions, or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified under the hand of a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State, to be the original depositions or affirmations, or to be true copies thereof, as the case may require the case may require.

3. A certificate of, or judicial document stating, the fact of a conviction must purport to be certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State.

4. In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of the other State; but any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by the law of the country when the company to the company t try where the examination is taken may be substituted for the foregoing.

#### ARTICLE XIII.

If the individual claimed by one of the high contracting parties in pursuance of the present treaty should be also claimed by one or several other Powers on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is earliest in date.

### ARTICLE XIV.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to, or the proper tribunal thereof, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

#### ARTICLE XV.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for

the extradition has ordered the delivery of such articles, be given up when the extradition takes place; and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

ARTICLE XVI.

All expenses connected with extradition shall be borne by the demanding State.

ARTICLE XVII.

ARTICLE XVII.

The stipulations of the present treaty shall be applicable to the colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, so far as the laws for the time being in force in such colonies and foreign possessions respectively will allow. The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any such colonies or foreign possessions shall be made to the Governor or chief authority of such colony or possession by the chief consular officer of the Argentine Republic in such colony or possession.

Such requisition may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such colony or foreign possession will allow, to the provisions of this treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to

Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of Argentine criminals who may take refuge within such colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis, so far as the law of such colony or foreign possession will allow, of the provisions of the present

treaty.

Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding articles of the present treaty.

#### ARTICLE XVIII.

The present treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the high contracting parties. It may be terminated by either of the high contracting parties by a notice not exceeding one year, and not less than six months.

The treaty, after receiving the approval of the Congress of the Argentine Republic, shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Buenos Avres as soon as pos-

tions shall be exchanged at Buenos Ayres as soon as pos-

sible. In witness whereof the respective plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their

EXAMINATIONS FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA. Regulations for the Open Competition of August, 1894.

[N.B.—The regulations are liable to be altered in future years.]

1. On the 1st August, 1894, and following days, an examina-1. On the 1st August, 1894, and following days, an examination, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London(a). Not fewer than 60 persons will be selected if so many shall be found duly qualified—viz., 14 for the Lower Provinces of Bengal (including Assam), 25 for the Upper Provinces of

Bengal (including the Punjab, Oudh, and the Central Provinces), 6 for Burma, 8 for Madras, and 7 for Bombay(b).

2. No person will be deemed qualified who shall not satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

That he is a natural-born subject of Her Majesty.
That his age will be above twenty-one years and under twenty-three years on the 1st April, 1894.

8. The marks obtained by each candidate in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined will be added up, and the names of the several candidates who shall have obtained, after the deduction above mentioned, a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining candidates, will be set forth in order of merit, and such candidates shall be deemed to be selected candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided they appear to be in other respects duly qualified. Should any of the selected candidates become disqualified, should any of the selected candidates become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled up or not. In the former case, the candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a selected candidate. A candidate entitled to be deemed a selected candidate, but declining to accept the nomination as such which may be offered to him, will be disqualified for any subsequent competition.
