A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS the land described in the Schedule hereto has been acquired under the provisions of "The Land for Settlements Act, 1894" (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), and the purchase thereof has been concluded as by the said Act is provided: And whereas it is enacted by the said Act that all land so acquired shall be proclaimed as Crown land subject to the provisions of the said Act:

Now, therefore, I, David, Earl of Glasgow, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of the power and authority conferred by the said Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that the land described in the Schedule hereto shall, on the date of the publication hereof in the *New Zealand Gazette*, be and be deemed to be Crown land subject to the provisions of "The Land for Settlements Act, 1894."

Regulations for the Mangaehu Special Settlement Association.

GLASGOW, Governor.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this fourteenth day of October, 1895.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the one hundred and sixty-third section of "The Land Act, 1892," it is enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make, alter, and repeal regulations fixing the terms and conditions upon which the lands in any special settlement shall be disposed of by lease in perpetuity:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred upon him by the hereinbefore in part recited Act, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby make the following regulations fixing the terms and conditions upon which the lands known as the Mangaehu Special Settlement Association Block, described in the Schedule to the said regulations, shall be disposed of, that is to say:—

REGULATIONS.

1. In the construction of these regulations, unless the context shall otherwise require, the following expressions shall have the meanings hereby assigned to them:—

"Association" means the Mangaehu Special Settlement Association, being a body of persons, not less than forty-nine in number, voluntarily associated together at Stratford, in the Provincial District of Taranaki, for the purpose of taking up the land as a special settlement of farm homesteads:

"Land" means the land described in the Schedule, set apart for a special settlement, to be dealt with under these regulations:

"Settler" means any member of the association or other person, not being a married woman, leasing land under these regulations:

"Receiver of Land Revenue" means Receiver of Land Revenue at New Plymouth, or other officer for the time being acting as such:

"Minister" means the Minister of Lands for the time being, or any member of the Executive acting for him:

"Commissioner" means the Commissioner of Crown Lands for the Land District of Taranaki:

"Secretary" means the secretary of the association for the time being, and shall include any person acting in that capacity, and, if there shall be no secretary, then the chairman of the association:

"Substantial improvements of a permanent character" mean and include reclamation from swamps, clearing of bush, gorse, broom, sweetbriar, or scrub, cultivation, planting with trees or live hedges, the laying-out and cultivation of gardens, fencing, draining, making roads, sinking wells or water-tanks, constructing water-races, in any way improving the character or fertility of the soil, or the erection of any building:

"Cultivation" means—

(1.) Fencing the land with timber or other durable materials, not being a brush fence; or

(2.) Breaking up and laying down the same in English or other cultivated grass; or

(3.) Breaking up and planting or sowing root or other crops therein:

"Lease" means a lease in perpetuity in terms of Part III. of "The Land Act, 1892."

2. The block of land to be dealt with under these regulations has been surveyed into sections of not more than 320 acres each, and the number of persons to be located thereon shall not be less than forty-nine.

3. The allotment of sections to members of the association shall be made at such time and in such manner as the association may, with the consent of the Commissioner, determine.

4. The land shall be disposed of by lease at an annual rental of 4 per cent. on the capital value fixed by the Minister.

5. One-third of the rents paid from time to time shall, for the first fifteen years, be paid to the local body of the district charged with the construction and maintenance of the roads in the district, for the expenditure on roads in or leading to the block. Such expenditure to be first sanctioned by the Land Board for the Land District of Taranaki.

6. All rents and moneys required to be paid for the land under these terms and conditions shall be paid to the Receiver of Land Revenue, and receipts given by him shall be sufficient discharge for the payment of the moneys therein respectively acknowledged to have been received.

7. The settlers shall be members of the association, and no settler shall be under seventeen years of age.

8. The secretary shall inform the Commissioner of the names of the settlers; pay a deposit of 10s. per member; and also furnish the Commissioner from time to time with minutes of proceedings of the association, if so required.

9. The original or amended list of members, signed by the secretary of the association, and sent to the Commissioner, shall be *prima facie* evidence that the persons claiming to select land are members of the association.

10. Each settler shall put on the land comprised in his lease substantial improvements as follows:—

(a.) Within one year from the date of his lease, to a value equal to ten per centum of the price of the land;

(b.) Within two years from the date of his lease, to a value equal to another ten per centum of the price of the land;

(c.) And thereafter, but within six years from the date of his lease, to a value equal to another ten per centum of the price of the land;

And in addition thereto shall, within six years from the date of his lease, put substantial improvements of a permanent character to the value of £1 per acre.

11. Residence and occupation of the land shall be in accordance with Part III. of "The Land Act, 1892."

12. No person who is the owner in fee or leasehold of any land in New Zealand which, together with the land included in his application or transfer under these regulations, would

exceed 320 acres, and no person who has made an arrangement or agreement to permit any one, save his son or daughter, to acquire by purchase or otherwise the allotment in respect of which his application is made, shall be entitled to become a settler under these regulations.

13. Any settler who shall fail to comply with these regulations in any respect shall, upon sufficient proof thereof to the satisfaction of the Land Board of the district, forfeit his interest in the land selected, and the land shall thereafter be dealt with as ordinary Crown land; and these conditions shall be sufficient authority for such forfeiture.

14. The association may make such rules and regulations from time to time as it may deem necessary, subject to the approval of the Commissioner.

15. In case any doubt shall arise as to the sufficiency of the compliance with these regulations, with reference to the selection, occupation, or improvement of any land, or otherwise arising thereunder respectively, the same shall be settled by the Land Board.

16. Excepting as expressly modified by these regulations, the provisions of "The Land Act, 1892," and its amendments shall be deemed to have full force and effect over and upon the land herein referred to, and shall, *mutatis mutandis*, be read as if these regulations formed part of the Act.

Amended Regulation for Trout-fishing in the Grey District Acclimatisation District.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this fourteenth day of October, 1895.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby make the following regulation for the Grey District Acclimatisation District—which includes the Boroughs of Brunner and Greymouth, and the County of Grey—and the waters thereof; and doth hereby declare that this regulation shall, as from the day of the date hereof, supersede regulation number two made by Order in Council dated the twenty-ninth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, and published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, No. 79, of the first day of November, in the same year.

REGULATION.

2. LICENSES, when issued as aforesaid for the whole season, shall entitle the person named therein to fish for trout in any of the said waters from the first day of October in any one year to the thirty-first day of March in the following year inclusive; but no such license shall confer any right of entry upon the land of any person without his consent.

Powers delegated to the Tinwald Domain Board under "The Public Domains Act, 1881."

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this fourteenth day of October, 1895.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

IN exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Public Domains Act, 1881," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby revoke a certain Order in Council, dated the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, making delegation of certain powers in man-

ner as therein appears; and doth, with the like advice and consent, by this present Order, delegate, but only with respect to the piece or parcel of land described in the Schedule hereto, all the powers conferred by the Act aforesaid, except the powers under or conferred by sections five and twelve thereof, to the under-mentioned persons, who shall be known as the Tinwald Public Domain Board, namely,—

EDWARD GEORGE WRIGHT,
JOHN GRIGG,
JOSEPH CLARK,
GEORGE MCLEAN BUCKLEY, and
JAMES HESELTINE

(herein referred to as "the Board"), subject to the stipulations hereinafter contained, that is to say,—

1. The Board shall meet for the transaction of business on the first Tuesday in each month, at half-past two o'clock p.m., at the County Council Office, or at such other time or place as may from time to time be fixed by the Board. The first meeting shall be held on Tuesday, the fifth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

2. Special meetings may be convened by the Chairman or by any two members of the Board, provided that two days' notice of such meeting be given to each member, specifying the business to be transacted at such special meeting; and no other business than that so specified shall be transacted at such meeting.

3. Any three of the said Board shall form a quorum. Any meeting may be adjourned from time to time.

4. The members of the Board shall, at their first meeting, and thereafter at an annual meeting to be held on the first Monday in December in every succeeding year thereafter, elect one of themselves to be Chairman, who may join in the discussion, and shall have an original as well as a casting vote. The Chairman shall hold office until the election of his successor.

5. If at any meeting the Chairman is not present at the time appointed for holding the same, the members present shall choose some one of their number to be chairman of such meeting.

6. If, by resignation, death, or incapacity, or otherwise, the office of Chairman shall be or become vacant, the members may at any monthly or special meeting appoint a Chairman.

7. All questions shall be determined by the majority of votes of the members of the Board present at a meeting.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS, in accordance with the provisions of the fifth section of "The Land Drainage Act, 1893," a majority of the ratepayers in the district described in the Schedule hereto, situated in the County of Manukau, have presented a petition to His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand praying that the land comprised in the said district be constituted a drainage district under the provisions of the said Act:

Now, therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority contained in the fifth section of "The Land Drainage Act, 1893," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby constitute and declare the block of land described in the said petition, and in the Schedule hereto, to be a district for the purposes of Part I. of the said Act, and to be called by the name of "The Aka-aka Drainage District"; and also, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority contained in the ninth section of the said Act, doth hereby declare that the Board of Trustees for the said district shall consist of five members, to be elected under and in accordance with the said Act.

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred upon him by the hereinbefore in part recited Act, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby make the following regulations fixing the terms and conditions upon which the lands known as the Llewellyn Special Settlement Association Block, described in the Schedule to the said regulations, shall be disposed of, that is to say:—

REGULATIONS.

No person who is the owner in fee or leasehold of any land in New Zealand which, together with the land included in his application or transfer under these regulations, would exceed 320 acres, and no person who has made an arrangement or agreement to permit any one, save his son or daughter, to acquire by purchase or otherwise the allotment in respect of which his application is made, shall be entitled to become a settler under these regulations.

13. Any settler who shall fail to comply with these regulations in any respect shall, upon sufficient proof thereof to the satisfaction of the Land Board of the district, forfeit his interest in the land selected, and the land shall thereafter be dealt with as ordinary Crown land; and these conditions shall be sufficient authority for such forfeiture.

14. The association may make such rules and regulations from time to time as it may deem necessary, subject to the approval of the Commissioner.

15. In case any doubt shall arise as to the sufficiency of the compliance with these regulations, with reference to the selection, occupation, or improvement of any land, or otherwise arising thereunder respectively, the same shall be settled by the Land Board.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Industrial Schools Act, 1882," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council

of the colony, doth hereby make the following regulations in respect of industrial schools within the meaning of the said Act.

1. PUNISHMENTS IN GOVERNMENT INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

Subject to the provisions of this regulation, the Manager of any Government school established or maintained under "The Industrial Schools Act, 1882," may, at his discretion, administer to any inmate of the school any corporal punishment such as may be lawfully inflicted by schoolmasters; but the Manager, if a man, shall not administer any corporal punishment to any girl with his own hands, but shall direct that it shall be administered by the Matron, or in the presence of the Matron by a female officer of the school.

A teacher, while in charge of a room or playground in which the inmates of a Government school are subject to the same kind of instruction and discipline as that which is provided in the public schools of the colony, may, at his discretion, administer such corporal punishment as may be lawfully inflicted by schoolmasters.

Except as hereinbefore provided, no officer or servant shall on any account be allowed to strike an inmate, or to inflict any corporal chastisement, and every officer or servant shall be liable to summary dismissal for any breach of this rule.

No cane, stick, or whip may be used for the chastisement of an inmate of a Government school. A leather strap may be used; provided that such strap shall be in breadth not less than one inch and a half, and shall not exceed twenty-five inches in length, a quarter of an inch in thickness, and four and three-quarter ounces in weight, and shall not be pierced with holes or cut into a fringe, and that in the punishment of girls and young boys, and in every case where severe punishment is unnecessary, a much lighter strap shall be used. Such whipping as mothers administer in private with the hand or the slipper is not forbidden. A birch may be used in the punishment of big boys when some show of ceremony appears to be called for, but no birch shall be used until it has been certified to by the medical officer of the school as suitable for the purpose.

No stroke on the head or neck can in any case be allowed under any name whatever—tap, box, cuff, or any other.

When an inmate is punished by the Manager for absconding from the school, or for any other offence coming within the terms of the 67th section of "The Industrial Schools Act, 1882," the Manager shall send to the Minister of Education a copy of the Magistrate's order under which the punishment is inflicted.

The Manager may at his discretion punish an inmate by restraint of liberty or by restriction of diet, subject, however, to the strict observance of the following rules:—

Confinement in a dark cell is forbidden.
Solitary confinement for more than three hours in one day is forbidden.

Solitary confinement at night is forbidden.

The punishment of bread-and-water diet must not last longer than twenty-four hours at one time, and must not be repeated without an interval of seven days.

The substitution of porridge for the ordinary dinner, or the deprivation of pudding or other esteemed article of diet, may not be continued in any case for more than seven days; and, after undergoing a punishment of this kind for any number of days, an inmate shall not be punished again in the same way until after the lapse of twice as many days.

In any case in which restriction of diet is imposed as a punishment care must be taken that food is supplied in sufficient quantity and in sufficient variety to satisfy a healthy and natural appetite.

Punishment by the imposition of some badge of degradation or of some special article of dress may be inflicted, but not without the special sanction of the Minister of Education.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.—“THE MAIL-SHIPS (RULES) ORDER IN
COUNCIL, 1895.”

Windsor, 11th May, 1895.

At the Court at Windsor, the 11th day of May, 1895.

Present:

THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY,
LORD PRESIDENT, LORD CHAMBERLAIN, LORD KENSINGTON,
SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS, MR. ARNOLD
MORLEY.

WHEREAS section 8 (3) of “The Mail-ships Act, 1891,” pro-
vides that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to
make rules for carrying into effect as respects British posses-
sions the provisions of that Act with respect to the
security given by mail-ships, and in particular with respect
to the commencement of a legal proceeding by service of a
writ or process in the possession, and to the notices to be
given to arresting authorities in the possession, and the
evidence to be receivable by such authorities of the
security having been given or withdrawn, and the applica-
tion of the security in discharge of any damages, fine, debt,
claim, sum, or forfeiture, where the same are or is recovered
or payable either in the British possession, or under proceed-
ings pending concurrently in that British possession and in
any other British possession or the United Kingdom:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the
advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby
ordered, as follows:—

NOTICES OF EXEMPTION.

1. Any rules of the High Court of Justice in England,
made under the provisions of “The Mail-ships Act, 1891”
(hereinafter referred to as “the Act”), shall be transmitted
by a Secretary of State to the Government of every posses-
sion to which the Act is applied for the purpose of a Con-
vention, and shall be published by such Government in the
Gazette of the possession, and also in such local official
Gazettes published in the possession as the Government of the
possession may prescribe.

2. A copy of every notice and list published by the Board of
Trade under the Act, or under any rules of Court made
under the Act, shall be transmitted by a Secretary of State
to the Government of every possession to which the Act is
applied for the purpose of a particular Convention.

3. A copy of every such notice and list, signed by a
Secretary to the Government of the possession or other pre-
scribed officer, shall be published in the official *Gazette* of
the possession, and a copy of such *Gazette* notification shall
be kept publicly exhibited in the Court-room of every
Colonial Court of Admiralty in the possession, and a copy
of the said *Gazette* containing any such notification shall be
receivable in evidence by every arresting authority in the
possession.

4. If, notwithstanding its exemption, an exempted mail-
ship is arrested in the possession, the Government of the
possession, on being informed by the owner of such arrest
and of the arresting authority, and on being satisfied that
the ship is an exempted mail-ship, shall forthwith send a
special notice to the arresting authority, informing him that
the ship is an exempted mail-ship, and as such entitled to
release.

ACTIONS AGAINST EXEMPTED SHIPS.

5. An action may be commenced against the owners of an
exempted mail-ship in the like cases, in the same manner,
and subject to the same rules, as an Admiralty action *in rem*,
and in any Colonial Court of Admiralty in the possession in
which such an action might have been brought if the ship
were not an exempted mail-ship.

ORDERS BY COURTS IN BRITISH POSSESSIONS FOR APPLICATION OF THE SECURITY.

6. Any order of a Court in a British possession directing
any security to be applied shall recite the name of the Court
and of the action or proceeding, the cause of action, and
the judgment debt, and shall comprise a certificate by the
Judge of the Court that the ship in respect of which the
judgment is given is an exempted mail-ship, and might but
for such exemption have been arrested and sold in execution
thereof, and that the judgment debt is still unsatisfied, and
is payable out of the security lodged in respect of the ship
in the High Court of Justice in England.

7. The order may require payment to be made either in
London to a named agent of the execution creditor, or in the
possession to some named officer of the Court from which
the order issues.

8. Every such order shall be sealed with the seal of the
Court, and shall be drawn up in duplicate, addressed to the
Admiralty Registrar, Royal Courts of Justice, London, and
shall be transmitted under cover to the prescribed officer of
the Government of the possession.

9. The said duplicate orders when received by the pre-
scribed officer shall be countersigned by him, and shall be
forthwith transmitted to a Secretary of State, who shall
cause one of such orders to be delivered to the Admiralty
Registrar, and the Admiralty Registrar shall, subject to any
direction of the High Court, make an order upon the Pay-
master-General for payment of the required sum out of the
security in accordance with these rules.

10. Unless the High Court shall otherwise order, and
subject to existing rights of priority of liens, orders for the
application of any security shall be paid in the order in
which they are received by the Admiralty Registrar; but
where two or more orders are received at the same time
they shall be paid in the order of their respective dates.

11. Where the order requires payment to a named agent
of the execution creditor in London, the money shall be
payable at the rates of exchange current on the day on which
the order is received by the Secretary of State.

12. If the order requires payment to be made to a named
officer of the Court from which the order issues, such an
amount shall be paid out by the Paymaster-General, to a
person nominated by the Secretary of State, as will at the
rates of exchange current on the day on which the order is
received by the Secretary of State be necessary to purchase
a draft for the amount of the order payable at sight in the
possession, and such draft shall be in favour of the said
named officer of the said Court.

13. Where any action or proceeding against the owners of
an exempted mail-ship is pending in a Court in a British
possession, involving a claim against the security lodged in
the High Court in England, the Court in the British posses-
sion shall transmit to the Admiralty Registrar notice of the
pendency of such action or proceeding, stating the nature
and amount of the claim and the proceedings taken in regard
thereto; and in case of the subsequent discontinuance or
other conclusion of such action or proceeding, whereby
the security ceases to be affected, the Court shall transmit
notice of such discontinuance or conclusion. Every such
notice shall be sealed, drawn up, addressed, and trans-
mitted to the Admiralty Registrar in like manner as an
order for the application of the security.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

14. In every British possession to which these rules apply,
the Governor in Council may, by order, prescribe any matter
directed by these rules to be prescribed, or necessary for
carrying them into effect.

15. In the application of these rules to British India, the
following provisions shall have effect:—

(a.) The Presidencies of Madras and Bombay, the lower
Provinces of Bengal, and the Province of Burmah
shall be deemed to be separate British posses-
sions.

(b.) The expressions “Government of the possession”
and “Governor in Council” respectively shall
mean the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal and the
Chief Commissioner of Burmah, with respect to
the territories administered by them respectively.

(c.) All orders made in pursuance of Rule 14 with
respect to any part of British India shall be made
with the previous sanction of the Governor-
General in Council.

16. In the application of these rules to any British pos-
session in which there is a Vice-Admiralty Court, and no
Colonial Court of Admiralty, these rules shall be read as
if “Vice-Admiralty Court” were “Colonial Court of Ad-
miralty.”

17. In these rules “judgment debt” means any damages,
fine, debt, claim, sum, or forfeiture found by any Court to be
payable by the owner of a ship, and “execution creditor”
means the person entitled to a judgment debt.

Other expressions have the same meaning as in the Act.

18. This Order may be cited as "The Mail-ships (Rules) Order in Council, 1895."

Revised Regulations with Respect to the Entry of Naval Cadets into Her Majesty's Navy.

Defence Office,

THE under-mentioned revised regulations with reference to the entry of naval cadets into Her Majesty's navy, received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, are republished for general information.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING NAVAL CADETS.—FOR THE INFORMATION OF CANDIDATES.

1. APPOINTMENTS to naval cadetships will be made by limited competition, with the under-mentioned exceptions:—

Four cadetships given annually to sons of gentlemen in the colonies, on the recommendation of the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Service cadetships, the total number of which is not to exceed five in any one year. Service cadets will be selected by the Board of Admiralty from (a) sons of officers of the army, navy, or marines who have been killed in action, or who have been lost at sea on active service, or killed on duty, or who have died of wounds received in action or injuries received on duty within six months from the date of such action or injury; (b) sons of officers of the navy who have performed long or distinguished service, and who hold or have held rank or relative rank on the active list not lower than that of commander. Not more than two such latter service cadets will be nominated annually.

Applications for service cadetships should be addressed to the Military Secretary, Horse Guards, if the candidate is the son of an officer of the army; to the Secretary of the Admiralty if the candidate is the son of an officer of the navy or marines; and to the Military Secretary, India Office, if the candidate is the son of an officer of the Indian army.

Colonial and service cadets will be entered on passing the test examination as specified in paragraphs 9 and 10, and will in all other respects be subject to these regulations.

The educational examination of all candidates will be conducted by the Civil Service Commissioners (address, Cannon Row, Westminster), who will deal with all questions connected with such examination, and will announce the results. A fee of £1 will be required from each candidate.

2. Except in special circumstances, not more than one-third of the number of candidates actually presenting themselves before the Civil Service Commissioners will be entered.

3. All nominations of candidates for naval cadetships are made by the First Lord, with the exception of a limited number which are at the disposal of individual members of the Board, and of the Secretaries to the Board of Admiralty.

A flag officer or a commodore first-class appointed to the chief command of a station, or to a separate command, and a captain, on first appointment as such to the command of a ship, will be allowed to nominate one candidate, provided the privilege is exercised within six months of appointment, and that the candidate is not less than twelve years of age when nominated. The examination of candidates will not take place until they are eligible by age under clause 6.

No captain will be entitled to nominate more than one candidate during the time he holds the rank of captain, but a flag officer or a commodore first-class may claim the privilege each time he is appointed to a command as above.

In the event of a candidate's nomination being cancelled before he has commenced the examination, the officer who nominated him will be allowed to select another candidate for the same or following examination.

4. The nominations will be made half-yearly, as soon as convenient after the report of the last examination has been received from the Civil Service Commissioners.

5. The examinations will be held in London and at Portsmouth, and will commence on the second Tuesday in June and the first Tuesday in December in each year, and the appointments will date from the 15th July and 15th January following respectively.

6. No candidate will be eligible for the June examination who is under thirteen and a half or over fourteen and a half years of age on the 15th July following; nor for the December examination who is under thirteen and a half or over fourteen and a half years of age on the 15th January following.

7. Every candidate must be in good health, and free from any physical defect of body, impediment of speech, defect of sight or hearing, and also from any predisposition to constitutional or hereditary disease or weakness of any kind, and in all respects well developed and active in proportion to his age. Before being examined by the Civil Service Commissioners he will be required to pass the medical examination according to the prescribed regulations, and must have been found physically fit for the navy; rejection at such examination will finally exclude him from the navy.

8. The candidate will be required to produce (1) a Registrar's certificate of the date of his birth, or a declaration thereof made before a Magistrate (a certificate of baptism will not be accepted); (2) a certificate of good conduct from the masters of the school or schools at which he may have been educated during the two previous years, or, if educated at home, from his tutor or the clergyman of the parish in which he resides; and (3) proofs of good health.

9. Candidates will be tested by examination in the following subjects:—

i. Arithmetic: including proportion, vulgar and decimal fractions	250
ii. Algebra: including fractions, simple equations and problems, and quadratic equations of one unknown quantity	200
iii. Geometry: Euclid, Book I., with exercises and questions	200

(No dictionary will be allowed, but the equivalents of the less usual words in either language will be given.)

Candidates will be required to obtain half marks in arithmetic, and 40 per cent. in each of the other subjects. Candidates will be further examined in—	
vii. Mathematics: harder questions in arithmetic, algebra, and geometry, as above defined	300
viii. Latin: translation, grammar, and prose composition	300
(No dictionary will be allowed, but the equivalents for the less usual words will be given.)	
ix. Geography: including the subjects treated of in Grove's Primer, and an elementary knowledge of the principal places in the British Isles and dependencies	150
x. English history: * a short selected period	150
xi. Drawing, freehand and simple rectangular model	100

The final order of merit will be determined by the sum of the marks obtained in the test and in the further examination.

10. Colonial and service cadets will be appointed on passing the test examination; they must, however, obtain

not only the proportion of marks in arithmetic and the other test subjects required from the candidates who compete, but also an aggregate of not less than 660 marks in test subjects.

11. A candidate who passes the test examination, but does not succeed in the competition, will be entitled to compete at the next examination provided he is within the limits of age at that time. No candidate will be allowed to compete more than twice. A candidate who fails to pass the test will not be entitled to another trial, but he will be allowed to compete at the next examination if he receives a fresh nomination and is still within the limits of age.

12. A candidate who, owing to illness, fails to appear at the examination for which he has obtained his nomination may receive a second nomination, provided he is still within the limits of age.

13. For all cadets entered under these regulations, the payment will be at the rate of £75 per annum for the period in the "Britannia," to be paid half-yearly in advance to the cashier of the Bank of England, on receipt of claim from the Accountant-General of the Navy. But the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty reserve the power of selecting from among the cadets entered at each half-yearly examination a number, not to exceed eight, being sons of officers of the navy, army, or marines, or of civil officers under the Board of Admiralty, with respect to whom the annual payment will be £40 only. In this selection their Lordships will have regard solely to the pecuniary circumstances of the cadet.

Applications for the reduced scale must be received at the Admiralty not later than 10th August and 10th January following the June and December examinations respectively.

14. In addition to the annual payments mentioned in the foregoing paragraph, the parent or guardian will be charged with the personal expenses incurred by the cadet for washing, repairing boots and clothes, hair-cutting, pocket-money, &c.

15. The period of training on board the "Britannia" will be four terms; there will be two terms in each year. The first term of each year will be from February to July, the second from September to December.

The vacations will be five weeks at Christmas, two weeks at Easter, and six weeks at Midsummer.

16. (a.) Examinations in seamanship and study will be held at the end of each term.

(b.) Cadets who pass an unsatisfactory examination at the end of either of the first three terms will be "warned," and they will be liable to be discharged at the end of the following or any subsequent term should they again be reported as failing to obtain the proper number of marks.

The requisite standard of marks to be 40 per cent. in the mathematical subjects, and also in the total.

(c.) Cadets who fail at the final examination to obtain 45 per cent. in the mathematical subjects, including the theory of navigation and nautical astronomy, and 40 per cent. in the technical subjects, combined with physics and French, will be ordered to be withdrawn.

(d.) Cadets reported to the Admiralty for unsatisfactory conduct, or who fail to obtain half marks in seamanship, will be "warned," and should they be again reported, or again fail to pass in seamanship, they will be discharged. Any cadet, however, who is reported for unsatisfactory conduct during his final term will be discharged without being allowed to present himself at the examination for passing out of the "Britannia."

(e.) Any cadet who shall at any time appear to their Lordships to be unfit for the naval service, for any reason whatever, will be removed from the "Britannia," and it must be understood that this rule will apply to those who are considered unfit from insufficient physical development or weakness of constitution, although no actual organic disease may have been developed.

17. It is to be distinctly understood that the period of training on board the "Britannia" is a time of probation, and the parent or guardian of every cadet will be required to sign a declaration on the admission of the cadet to the "Britannia," to the effect that he shall be immediately withdrawn on the receipt of an official intimation of his being considered unfit for the navy.

18. Cadets will, on passing out of the "Britannia," rank according to the amount of sea time (as laid down in Article 286 of the Queen's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, 1893) they obtain at their final examination, and those who obtain equal amounts of sea time will rank in the order of merit in which they pass out of the "Britannia."

19. The parent or guardian of every cadet will be required to provide outfit under the regulations in force.

20. No pay will be allowed by Government to cadets in the "Britannia." The pocket-money allowed to cadets will be charged to the parents.

* "Gardiner's Outlines of English History" (Longmans) has been selected as the present text-book for examination in English history. The subject will be divided into periods, as follows: First period, from the earliest times to A.D. 1603; second period, from A.D. 1603 to 1820. The first period being set at the examination held in December, and the second period at that held in June of each year.

21. As only cadets who are able to swim are permitted to use the boats belonging to H.M.S. "Britannia," the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty desire to impress upon parents and guardians the importance of cadets being taught to swim before they join the training-ship, so as to enable them to obtain the full benefits of use of the boats.

2. No bonus will be payable until the whole of the one hundred thousand pounds (100,000lb.) of quicksilver has been produced as stipulated to the satisfaction of an officer to be appointed by the Minister of Mines, and on whose certificate alone the bonus will be paid.

3. In the event of more than one person producing the required quantities of quicksilver before the dates named, inquiry will be made by the officer above referred to, when, if it is found that each applicant is equally entitled to a bonus, the amount will be divided in proportion to the quantities produced by each applicant, but in no case shall any bonus be paid until at least one hundred thousand pounds (100,000lb.) of quicksilver has been produced in the aggregate.

Bonus for the Manufacture of Potassium Cyanide.

Department of Industries and Commerce,
Wellington, 17th January, 1895.

NOTICE is hereby given that a bonus of £1,000 will be paid for the erection of a plant and the manufacture in New Zealand of the first 200 tons of crude cyanide of potassium from colonial produce.

1. The plant must be capable of producing at least 70 tons of crude cyanide of potassium annually.

4. On the completion of the plant, notice in writing must be sent to the Minister of Industries and Commerce, Wellington, who will appoint an officer to inspect the same, together with the raw material then available from which the cyanide of potassium is proposed to be manufactured.

5. The officer so appointed shall from time to time inspect the process of manufacture, in order that he may satisfy himself that the whole of the cyanide of potassium is being manufactured from material of New Zealand production; and before any bonus is paid such officer will be required to certify that he is satisfied the crude cyanide of potassium is the product of New Zealand material only, and that it contains the required percentage of potassium cyanide.

6. The bonus must be claimed for the first 100 tons on or before the 31st March, 1897, and for the second 100 tons on or before the 30th September, 1898.

Deaths occurring at hospitals have been omitted, except where deceased had resided before admission in one or other of the above boroughs, in which case the death is counted against the borough of residence.

The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 379, against 365 in August, an increase of 14. The deaths in September were 196, an increase of 4 on the number in August. Of the total deaths, males contributed 115, females 81. Fifty-four of the deaths were of children under 5 years of age, being 27.55 per cent. of the whole number; 42 of these were under 1 year of age. There were 37 deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: Five men of 68, 70 (two), 77, 80, and five women of 69, 75, 76, 85, 89, died at Auckland; three men of 73, 75, 88, and one woman of 66, at Wellington; five men of 65, 73, 74, 83, 88, and four women of 70, 73, 74, 78, at Christchurch; ten men of 66, 68 (two), 70, 71 (two), 72, 83, 84, 96, and four women of 75, 77, 78, 82, at Dunedin.

In the first table are given the deaths and death-rates for each of the four cities, for the suburban boroughs severally, and for each city with its suburban towns. As regards Auckland and Christchurch, the whole of the area usually recognised as suburban has not yet been brought under municipal government, and the vital statistics do not deal with such portions as still remain in road districts. But the omission is not very important, for there are in either case quite enough suburbs included within borough boundaries to give a fair idea of the death-rate of Greater Auckland and Greater Christchurch. As further boroughs are formed the vital statistics will be made to include them.

By including the suburban boroughs the death-rate for last month is lowered at Auckland and Dunedin, but raised at Wellington and Christchurch. The rates for September are,—

Including suburbs, the rate at Auckland is the highest and that at Dunedin the lowest.

Specific Febrile and Zymotic Diseases.—The total number of deaths at the four centres from these causes in September was 14, against 19 in August. Influenza caused 5 deaths: 3 at Auckland and 2 at Wellington. Two deaths from diphtheria are observed, both at Wellington. The mortality from typhoid fever comprised 3 deaths: 1 at Auckland and 2 at Wellington. The remaining deaths were: 1 from syphilis (a child), 1 from stricture of the urethra, 1 from erysipelas, and 1 from puerperal septicæmia.

Constitutional Diseases.—The deaths increased from 37 in August to 41 in September. There were 17 deaths from phthisis and 9 from cancer, the latter disease being found in the abdomen, stomach, liver, gullet, and rectum. Diabetes caused 2 deaths.

Local Diseases.—Out of a total of 114 deaths from this class of disease 47 resulted from diseases of the respiratory organs, including bronchitis, pneumonia, pleurisy, &c.; 23 deaths were attributable to heart-disease; and 20 to diseases of the nervous system, including 5 from apoplexy and 4 from meningitis, together with 4 from hemiplegia and other forms of paralysis. Diseases of the digestive organs show 17 deaths, and those of the urinary organs 3 deaths.

Violent Deaths.—These include 9 accidental deaths and 3 suicides. A labourer was killed by fracture of the spine, another run over by a 'bus; a boy was crushed by a log; there were 4 cases of accidental drowning and 1 of suffocation; and an infant died through difficult birth.

Besides the accidental deaths, a printer and a photographer poisoned themselves, and a manufacturer drowned himself, while temporarily insane.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of the four centres from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.
