GLASGOW, Governor. A PROCLAMATION.

W HEREAS the lands specified in the first column of the Schedule hereto are State forests under the control of the Commissioner of State Forests appointed under "The New Zealand State Forests Act, 1865" (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), and the said lands are now no longer required for State-forest purposes: And whereas plans showing the extent and position of the said lands, and a statement of the reasons why they are no longer required for State-forest purposes, have been laid before both Houses of Parliament for a period of thirty days, and no resolution has been passed by either of such Houses objecting to the issue of this Proclamation: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of the powers conferred by "The New Zealand State Forests Act Amendment Act, 1888," and of all other powers in anywise enabling him in this behalf, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby revoke the Warrant and Proclamation specified in the second column of the Schedule hereto, so far as they relate to the land described in the first column of the Schedule hereto, as from the date of the publication hereof in the New Zealand Gazette ; and doth hereby proclaim and declare that from and after such date the several parcels of land described in the Schedule hereto shall be no longer subject to the provisions of the said Act.

WHEREAS by the one hundred and sixty-ninth section of "The Land Act, 1892," it is enacted that the Governor in Council may fix the terms and conditions upon which the lands in any village settlement shall be disposed of, subject as in the said section is provided: And whereas by a Proclamation made under the said Act on the fourth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, and published in the New Zealand Gazette on the seventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, the land described in the First Schedule hereto has been set apart under the said Act and declared open for lease as a village settlement, and it is expedient to fix the terms and conditions upon which the said land shall be disposed of: be disposed of :

be disposed of: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Act, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby fix the terms and conditions on which the land mentioned in the First Schedule hereto shall be disposed of by way of lease in perpetuity, and which said terms and conditions are set forth in the Second Schedule hereto, and also doth direct that the land shall be leased as village-homestead allotments only. village-homestead allotments only.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF LEASE.

1. THE land enumerated in the First Schedule hereto is first-class land, and is a village-homestead allotment, open for selection on lease in perpetuity under the provisions of "The Land Act, 1892" (hereinafter referred to as "the said

Act"). 2. The day on which the land shall be open for selection shall be Wednesday, the 12th day of February, 1895.

3. The rental stated in the First Schedule hereto shall be

3. The rental stated in the First Schedule hereto shall be the price at which the land shall be open for selection. 4. Applications for leases shall be made in manner as pro-vided in Part I. of the said Act; and all such applications shall be made to the Commissioner of Crown Lands, Dunedin; and a lease will be issued in accordance with the provisions of Part I. aforesaid.

5. Each applicant shall state his or her residence, occu-pation, and condition in life (namely, whether married or single), and will be required to make the declaration pre-scribed in Schedule C of the said Act.

6. Each applicant shall also undertake to pay, imme-diately upon being declared the successful applicant, the first half-year's rent, together with the lease and registration fee.

7. All rents must be paid half-yearly, in advance, on the 1st days of January and July in each year, as provided in section 157 of the said Act; and the first half-year's rent is payable as before provided.

8. Improvements and residence on the land shall be as provided in Part III. of the said Act. The provisions of section 144, and all other provisions of the said Act with respect to substantial improvements, shall apply accordingly to lessees under these regulations. The provisions of sec-tion 141, and all other provisions of the said Act in respect of compulsory residence, shall apply accordingly to lessees under these regulations.

9. No lessee shall subdivide, sublet, or transfer the land beld by him under these regulations, except under and sub-ject to the provisions of Part I. of the said Act.

10. No lessee shall hold more than one allotment, and such

10. No lessee shall hold more than one allotment, and such allotment shall be held for his sole use and benefit, and not for the use or benefit of any other person whomsoever. No married woman shall be eligible as a selector; but this provision shall not apply to any married woman who may become a transferee under a will or by virtue of an intestacy. 11. All the provisions of the said Act, so far as applicable, shall extend and apply to the lands affected by these regula-tions, and to the applications and leases to be made and issued thereunder, and generally to the interests created, and the persons whose rights, liabilities, or interests are thereby affected; and the mention of any particular provision of the said Act shall not be deemed to exclude any other provision of the said Act applicable to the particular case. WHEREAS by the third section of "The Public Health Act 1876 Amendment Act, 1881," it is enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make such regulations as he shall think fit for the following purposes or any of them, and so that such regulations may either be of general application throughout the whole colony or may only apply to one or more districts :--(1) For the registration with the Local Board of all per-sons carrying on the trade of cowkeepers, dairy-men, or purveyors of milk: (2) For the appointment of Inspectors of Milk and

- (2.) For the appointment of Inspectors of Milk and Dairies:
- Darries:
 (3.) For the inspection of cattle in dairies, and for prescribing and regulating the lighting, ventilation, cleansing, drainage, and water supply of dairies, and cowsheds, and yards in the occupation of persons following the trade of cowkeepers or dairymen, or used by them in connection with such occupation:

 (4.) For securing the cleanliness of milk-shops, milk-stores, and of milk-vessels used for containing milk for sale by such persons :
 (5.) For prescribing precautions to be taken for protecting milk against infection or contamination, and for prohibiting the sale of milk in cases where the public health would be likely to be endangered by such sale : such sale :

(6.) For authorising Local Boards to make regulations for the purposes aforesaid, or any of them, subject to such conditions, if any, as the Governor in Council may prescribe :
And whereas it is desirable that regulations should be made for the aforesaid purposes, such regulations to be in force in the districts hereinafter mentioned :
Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and in exercise of the powers and authorities contained in the above-recited Act, and of all other powers and authorities in anywise enabling him in this behalf, and by and with the advice and consent of the regulations hereinafter set forth, and doth hereby make the regulations hereinafter set forth, and doth hereby declare that such regulations shall, on and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, apply to and be in force in the following districts, namely :--

REGULATIONS.

1. In these regulations the following words and expres-sions shall have the meaning hereby assigned to them, unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant to such construction

Interpretation.

- "Principal Board" means the Local Board of Health for the District of the City of Auckland, as con-stituted by "The Public Health Act, 1876": "Local Board" means the Local Board of Health con-stituted by "The Public Health Act, 1876":

- "District" means the area comprised within the juris-diction of the Principal Board or of a Local Board : "Inspector" means the person from time to time ap-pointed under these regulations, by the Principal Board, to act as Inspector of milk, and of dairies, cowsheds, and milk shops or stores, and includes any person to whom he may delegate his powers or any of them:
- "Contributing Board " means any Local Board herein mentioned which, on or before the 31st January, 1896, and thereafter annually on or before the 31st 1890, and thereaster annually on or before the 31st December in each year, notifies the Principal Board that it intends to contribute towards cost of inspec-tion a sum equal to ten shillings (10s.) per one hundred pounds (£100) of its revenue as at the financial year ending the 31st March preceding (but in no case a sum less than one pound), and within seven days of such notification pays to the Princi-nal Board curch contribution. pal Board such contribution :
- "Clerk" means any person appointed as Town Clerk under "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1886," or holding an analogous appointment under any body included in the term "Local Board":
 "Dairy" means any building, shed, or place used for the purpose of depositing, keeping, or storing milk or creem."
- or cream :
- Cowshed " means any building, shed, stall, or covered place used for the purpose of milking, stalling, or stabling of cattle :
- stabling of cattle :
 "Dairy premises" means any building, shed, land, or place used for stalling, grazing, feeding, or milking cattle for producing milk or cream to be sold or supplied, or any building for the deposit, keeping, or storing of milk or cream when so produced :
 "Milk shop or store" means any building, shed, or place used for the purpose of depositing, storing, or exposing milk or cream for the purpose of selling or disposing thereof:
 "Dairyman" means the occupier of any dairy premises as herein defined, or any person engaged in the production of milk for sale or supply for profit to other persons:

 "Milk-vendor" means the occupier of any milk shop or store as herein defined, or any person engaged in the distribution or storage of milk for sale or supply for
- profit to other persons: "Keep" means keep, retain, or to permit to remain, whether permanently or temporarily.

Registration.

2. It shall not be lawful for any person to carry on in any district the trade of cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk unless he is registered as such in accordance with these regulations.

a. There shall be kept at the office of the Local Board a register of all persons from time to time carrying on in the district the trade. of cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, and such register shall from time to time be revised

- (a.) The occupation of the applicant, whether cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk;
 (b.) The exact address of the place where he exercises or
- proposes to exercise such occupation; (c.) The dimensions of his dairies, cowsheds, and milk
- shops or stores; (d.) The accustomed number of cattle milked or proposed
- to be milked on his dairy premises. Such application shall be in the Form A in the Schedule

hereto. 6. Within a reasonable time after the receipt by the Local Board of such application, and upon the Inspector being satisfied that the dairy premises or milk shop or store of the applicant are in accordance with these regulations, the appli-cant shall be entitled to receive from the Local Board, free of continues a cartificate under the hand of the Clerk that he expense, a certificate under the hand of the Clerk that he has been registered in accordance with the particulars so fur-

nished. The said certificate shall be in the Form B in the Schedule hereto, and shall have attached thereto a copy of these regulations.

7. The production in any legal proceedings of any such certificate purporting to be signed by the Clerk as aforesaid shall be *primâ facie* evidence that the person described in such certificate has been registered in accordance with these regulations, without any further proof of the signature of the

regulations, without any further proof of the signature of the said Clerk, or of the fact that the person purporting to act in that capacity was validly appointed. 8. The Local Board shall from time to time give public notice by advertisement in a newspaper circulating in the district, and, if they think fit, by placard, handbills, or other-wise, of registration being required, and of the mode of registration registration.

9. A person who occupies or carries on business in or on any premises for the purpose only of selling butter or cheese, and who does not carry on the trade of milk vendor, shall not for the purposes of registration be deemed to be a person carrying on the trade of dairyman or milk-vendor, and need

not by reason thereof be registered. 10. A person who sells milk of his own cows in small quantities to his workmen shall not, for the purposes of registration, be deemed by reason only of such selling to be a person carrying on the trade of dairyman or milk-vendor, and

person carrying on the trade of dairyman or milk-vendor, and need not by reason thereof be registered. 11. Every dairyman shall keep a register, in which he shall enter without delay particulars of all large cattle brought or kept from time to time upon the dairy premises, and shall also enter in such register particulars of the manner in which such cattle are disposed of by him. Such register shall also contain such particulars as are necessary to identify such cattle individually, and shall also contain the names and addresses of the persons from whom such cattle may have been purchased or acquired, and of the persons to whom any such cattle may be sold or disposed of.

Inspection of Cattle in Dairies.

12. The Inspector shall from time to time visit the cow-shed, and as far as possible the whole of the dairy premises, of each registered dairyman, for the purpose of inspecting the

or each registered dairyman, for the purpose of inspecting the cattle milked, stalled, or kept there. 13. The Inspector shall, so far as possible, inspect each and every one of the cattle usually milked or stalled in such cowshed, or kept on such dairy premises, with a view to discovering whether or not any one of them is diseased or is in an unhealthy condition.

14. If the Inspector shall be of opinion that any one or more of the said cattle is or are diseased, or is or are in an unhealthy condition, the Inspector shall serve upon such dairyman a notice in writing, specifying or describing the cow or cows which is or are diseased or is or are in such un-healthy condition, and shall also, if in his opinion the state healthy condition, and shan also, if in his optimion the state of the cattle or any of them is such as to warrant the course, certify in such notice that the sale of the milk from the dairy premises of such dairyman or from the specified cow or cows is likely to endanger the public health. Such notice shall be in the Form C in the Schedule hereto. A copy thereof shall be immediately transmitted to the Clerk.

15. After service of such notice upon the dairyman, and thenceforth until notification to him of the cancellation of the Inspector's certificate as hereinafter mentioned, the said dairyman-

- (a.) Shall not mix any milk from the said dairy premises or from the said cow or cows, as the case may be,
- (b.) Shall not sell or use for human food any such milk;
 (c.) Shall not sell or use for the food of swine or other animals any such milk unless and until it shall have been boiled.

16. At any time after receipt of such notice as last mentioned such dairyman may serve a notice on the Inspector-(a.) Stating that all the cattle on the said dairyman's

- (a.) Stating that all the cattle on the said dairyman's dairy premises are free from disease or are in a healthy condition; or,
 (b.) Should the cattle be found to be diseased, the fee of the veterinary surgeon appointed by the Principal Board shall be paid by the owner of such cattle. A qualified veterinary surgeon, at a fixed scale of fees, may be appointed for all purposes of inspection under these regu-lations to the purpose. lations by the Principal Board; and in case of sickness or permitted absence at any time of the veterinary surgeon so appointed, the Mayor of the Principal Board may by writing under his hand temporarily appoint a duly-qualified substitute.

tute. 19. The decision of the veterinary surgeon appointed by the Principal Board shall be final, and, if his notice shall render it necessary, the Inspector shall serve upon the dairyman an amended notice in pursuance thereof. 20. At any time after receipt of such last-mentioned notice, such dairymam may notify the Inspector that the requisitions thereof have been complied with, and the Inspector shall thereupon make a further inspection. 31. Every dairyman and milk-vendor shall provide in, upon, or about his dairy premises, milk shop, or store, and shall upon demand show to the Inspector, sufficient facilities

for boiling the water required for all the purposes mentioned in these regulations; and all registered milk-vendors must affix to and maintain upon their premises and vehicles the

affix to and maintain upon their premises and venicies the words "Registered milk-vendor." 32. All milk supplied for human food shall, immediately after milking, be removed from the milking-shed or stock-yard, and once at least carefully strained through some apparatus sufficient for that purpose, and then cooled to a temperature of not more than 65 degrees.

If himself so suffering, or having recently been in contact as aforesaid, to milk cows or handle vessels used for containing milk for sale, or in any way to take part in the conduct of his trade or business so far as regards the production, dis-tribution, or storage of milk, until in each case all danger therefrom of the communication of infec-tion to the milk, or of its contamination, has ceased.

34. If in any case any cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, or any member of his family, or any person living on or employed about any dairy premises, is attacked by or is suffering from any contagious disease, the said cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor shall forthwith notify to the Clerk the

dairyman, or purveyor shall forthwith notify to the Clerk the fact that he or such member or person is suffering from such (specifying what) contagious disease. 35. The Local Board or the Inspector shall, upon receipt of such notice, or upon being otherwise informed of the ex-istence of any contagious or infectious disease, take such steps as may be deemed necessary to be taken for the pre-vention of injury to the public health, and in particular the Inspector, if he considers it advisable and necessary, shall certify that the sale of milk from such dairy premises is likely to prove injurious to public health. His certificate shall be in the Form F. A copy thereof shall be served upon the dairyman or milk vendor, and thereupon the con-sequences mentioned in Regulation 15 hereof shall have full effect. effect.

It shall not be lawful for any person following the trade of a dairyman or purveyor of milk to keep or permit to remain any swine in any cowshed, dairy, milk shop or store, or within a distance of 60tt. from any part thereof. 40. It shall not be lawful for any person following the trade of a dairyman or purveyor of milk to erect, construct, or permit to remain any fowlhouse, dungstead, dungheap, latrine, urinal, water-closet, earth closet, cesspit or cesspool in or about or within a distance of 20ft. from any part of any cowshed, dairy, milk shop or store. In the case of a patent water closet this distance shall be not less than 10ft. Nor shall it be lawful for such person to construct or permit to remain any foul drain, or gully or other drain-trap, in or about any such cowshed, dairy, milk shop or store. 41. No milk-cart, milk-van, or other vehicle used for or in connection with the transport, carrying, or distribution of milk from or about dairy premises shall be used for the purpose of carrying any manure, excrement, or filth, pigs' wash, pigs' food, or other animal or decaying vegetable matter, or for the purpose of carrying brewers' grains; and in case any such cart shall be so used contrary to these regulations, the owner of such dairy premises and also the owner of such cart shall be guilty of an offence for each occasion on which such cart shall be so used. 42. No dairyman or purveyor of milk shall purchase,

The exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Stock Act, 1893" (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby revoke the Orders in Council, Notice No. 399, and Notice No. 416, made under the provisions of the said Act, dated respectively the twenty-eighth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, and the twenty-third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, prescribing certain ports at which Australasian stock may be landed, and prohibiting the introduction of cattle, &c., from Queens-land respectively, and in lieu thereof doth hereby make the following regulation, namely,— I. The introduction into the Colony of New Zealand from the Colonies of Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia, and Western Australia of all cattle and sheep, and also of fresh meat (with the exception of frozen meat), bones, hoors, hoofs, hair, hides, skins, offal, or other part of any such animals, and of all fittings which have been used in the transport of any such animals, is hereby absolutely prohibited, except under the following conditions :—

(a.) Cattle may be landed if accompanied by a declaration by the owner and a certificate by a veterinary surgeon, as provided in subsections one and two

sorigen, as provided in subsections one and two of section twenty-six of the regulations, and shall be subjected to a quarantine of ninety days:

THE Gisborne Harbour Board has notified that two leading beacons have been erected to mark the ap-proach to the anchorages at that port, and that the said beacons are situated 1 mile N. 61° 52′ W. from the entrance of the Turanganui Biyer of the Turanganui River.

The front or eastern beacon is 25ft. high, and has an alti-tude of 40ft. above high-water mark. This beacon has a triangular top. The whole of the triangle and part of the rectangle, also the lamphouse (at the base of the beacon), is painted black, and the middle portion of the beacon is

painted black, and the middle portion of the beacon is painted white. The back or western beacon is 30ft. high, and has an alti-tude of 50ft. above high-water mark. This beacon has a rectangular top, and is painted white; the lamphouse (at the base of the beacon) is also painted white. These beacons, when in a line, will bear N. 30° 56' W., and S. 30° 56' E., magnetic. By night two red lights will be exhibited—one from the summit of each of the above-mentioned beacons—and the said lights will be visible all round seaward as far as the land will allow. Deaths occurring at hospitals have been omitted, except where deceased had previously resided in one or other of the above boroughs, in which case the death is counted against the borough of residence.
The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 325, against 391 in October, a decrease of 66. The deaths in November were 126, a decrease of 33 on the number in October. Of the total deaths, males contributed 66, females 60. Thirty-five of the deaths were of children under 5 years of age, being 26.98 per cent. of the whole number; 20 of these were under 1 year of age. There were 23 deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: Five men of 69 (two), 72, 74, 92, and one woman of 68, died at Auckland; two men of 70 and 81, and two women of 81 and 94, at Wellington; three men of 65, 68, 70, and two women of 79 and 82, at Christchurch; five men of 66, 67, 68, 69, 72, and three women of 65, 66, 78, at Dunedin.

In the first table are given the deaths and death-rates for each of the four cities, for the suburban boroughs severally, and for each city with its suburban towns. As regards Auckland and Christchurch, the whole of the area usually recognised as suburban has not yet been brought under municipal government, and the vital statistics do not deal with such portions as still remain in road districts. But the omission is not very important, for there are in either case quite enough suburbs included within borough boundaries to give a fair idea of the death-rate of Greater Auckland and Greater Christchurch. As further boroughs are formed the vital statistics will be made to include them.

By including the suburban boroughs the death-rate for last month is lowered at each of the four centres. The rates for November are,--

Specific Febrile and Zymotic Diseases.—The number of deaths from this class of disease in November was 5 only, as against 9 in October, 14 in September, and 19 in August. Influenza, diphtheria, and diarrhœa were each fatal in one case at Auckland; and there were 2 deaths (both of infants) from scarlet fever at Christchurch. In October 1 death from scarlet fever occurred at Dunedin, but for nine months of the present year no deaths from this cause were recorded at any one of the four centres.

Constitutional Diseases.—The deaths in this class fell from 48 in October to 33 in November. Tubercular diseases accounted for 23 deaths (phthisis 18), and cancer for 8. Of those who died from phthisis 11 were under and 7 over forty years of age. The cases of cancer were as follow: Men, 4—of stomach 2, of abdomen 1, of bladder 1; women, 4—of abdomen 2, of liver 1, of womb 1.

Local Diseases.—The deaths were 67, as against 69 in October. The mortality from diseases of the respiratory organs, which rose as high as 49 in August and 47 in September, comprised no more than 11 deaths last month. Sixteen deaths were attributed to diseases of the nervous system, 10 to heart-disease and heart-failure (the latter of these was given as the cause of death in the case of two women aged eighty-one and ninety-four respectively), 16 to diseases of the digestive organs, 8 to Bright's disease and nephritis, 3 to diseases of the reproductive system, 2 to diseases of the locomotive system, and 1 to disease of the lymphatic system.

Violent Deaths.—These were all accidental. A bricklayer had his spine fractured by a fall of earth, and a driver died of fracture of the pelvis. In the case of a woman of twenty-seven the cause was given as "concussion" only. Two patients died under chloroform—one a woman of twenty-six, the other a man of fifty-three. A child two years old was scalded to death, an infant was found drowned in the Wellington Harbour, and another died of hæmorrhage at birth. A seaman was drowned at Auckland and a butcher at Dunedin. The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of the four centres from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.
