Examinations for the Indian Civil Service.

Education Department, Wellington, 21st September, 1896. THE following regulations, respecting examinations for the Civil Service of India, are published for general information.

W. C. WALKER.

Examinations for the Civil Service of India. An open competitive examination for admission to the Civil Service of India will be held in London, under the subjoined regulations, commencing on the 3rd August, 1897.

The number of persons to be selected at this examination will be announced hereafter.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received on or before the 31st May, 1897, an application on the prescribed form, accompanied by a list of the subjects in which the candidate desires to be examined.

The order for admission to the examination will be posted on the 20th July, 1897, to the address given on the form of application. It will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates will be required to attend, and as to the manner in which the fee (£6) is to be paid.

Regulations.

** The following regulations, made by the Secretary of
State for India in Council, are liable to alteration
from year to year.

1. An examination for admission to the Civil Service of
India, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London
in August of each year. The date of the examination and
the number of appointments to be made for each province
will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners sioners.

2. No person will be deemed qualified who shall not satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners

(1.) That he is a natural-born subject of Her Majesty.

(2.) That his age will be above twenty-one years and under twenty-three years on the first day of the

under twenty-three years on the first day of the year in which the examination is to be held.

[N.B.—In the case of natives of India it will be necessary for a candidate to obtain a certificate of age and nationality, signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the province, or the Commissioner of the division, within which his family resides, or, should he reside in a native State, by the highest political officer accredited to the State in which his family resides.]

(3.) That he bas no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Civil Service of India.

(4.) That he is of good moral character.

3. Should the evidence upon the above points be primâ facie satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be

admitted to the examination. The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of the certificate of qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and, if the result of such inquiries, in the case of any candidate, should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Civil Service of India, and, if already selected, will be removed from the position of a probationer.

5. The merit of the persons examined will be estimated by marks; and the number set opposite to each branch in the preceding regulation denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it.

6. The marks assigned to candidates in each branch will be subject to such deduction as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary(d) in order to secure that "a candidate be allowed no credit at all for taking up a subject in which he is a mere smatterer."

7. The examination will be conducted on paper and vivâ voce, as may be deemed necessary.

8. The marks obtained by each candidate in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined will be added up, and the names of the several candidates who shall have obtained, after the deduction above mentioned, a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining candidates, will be set forth in order of merit, and such candidates shall be deemed to be selected candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided they appear to be in other respects duly qualified. Should any of the selected candidates become disqualified, the Secretary of State for

India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled up or not. In the former case, the candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be filled up or not. In the former case, the candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a selected candidate. A candidate entitled to be deemed a selected candidate, but declining to accept the nomination as such which may be offered to him, will be disqualified for any subsequent competition.

9. Selected candidates, before proceeding to India, will be on probation for one year, at the end of which time they will be examined with the view of testing their progress in the following subjects(a):—

In this examination, as in the open competition, the merit of the candidates examined will be estimated by marks (which will be subject to deductions in the same way as the marks assigned at the open competition), and the number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it. The examination will be conducted on paper and vivâ voce, as may be deemed necessary. This examination will be held at the close of the year of probation, and will be called the "final examination."

10. The selected candidates will also be tested during their probation as to their proficiency in riding. The examinations in riding will be held as follows:—

(1.) Shortly after the result of the open competitive examination has been declared, or at such time or times as the Commissioners may appoint during the course of the probationary year.

(2.) Again, at the time of the final examination, candidates who may fully satisfy the Commissioners of their ability to ride well and to perform journeys on horseback shall receive a certificate which shall entitle them to be credited with 200 or 100 marks, according to the degree of proficiency marks, according to the degree of proficiency displayed, to be added to their marks in the final examination.

(3.) Candidates who fail to obtain this certificate, but who gain a certificate of minimum proficiency in riding, will be allowed to proceed to India, but will be subjected on their arrival to such further tests in riding as may be prescribed by their Government, and shall receive no increase to their initial salary until they have passed such tests to the satisfaction of that Government. A candidate who fails at the end of the year of probation to gain at least the certificate of minimum proficiency in riding will be liable to have his name removed from the list of selected candidates.

The selected candidates who, at the final examination, shall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subshall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in Regulation 9, and who shall have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character, and ability to ride, shall be certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, provided they shall comply with the regulations in force at the time for that service.

12. Persons desirous to be admitted as candidates must apply on forms, which may be obtained from "The Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London, S.W.," at any time after the 1st December in the year previous to that in which the examination is to be held. The forms must be returned the examination is to be held. The forms must be returned so as to be received at the office of the Civil Service Commissioners on or before the SIst May (or, if that date should fall upon a Sunday or public holiday, then on or before the first day thereafter on which their office is open) in the year in which the examination is to be held.

(c) A syllabus, defining in general terms the character of the examination in the various subjects, may be obtained on application to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission.

(d) No deduction will be made from the marks assigned to candidates in mathematics or English composition.

⁽a) Instructions, showing the extent of the examination, will be issued to the successful candidates as soon as possible after the result of the open competition is declared.

The Civil Service Commissioners are authorised by the Secretary of State for India in Council to make the following announcements

(1.) Selected candidates will be allotted to the various provinces upon a consideration of all the circumstances, including their own wishes; but the requirements of the public service will rank before every other consideration.

service will rank before every other consideration.
(2.) An allowance amounting to £100 will be given to all candidates who pass their probation at one of the universities or colleges which have been approved by the Secretary of State—viz., the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Dublin, Glasgow, Edinburgh, St. Andrew's, and Aberdeen; Victoria University, Manchester; University College, London; and King's College, London: provided such candidates shall have passed the final examination to the satisfaction shall have passed the final examination to the satisfaction of the Civil Service Commissioners, and shall have conducted of the Civil Service Commissioners, and shall have conducted themselves well, and complied with such rules as may be laid down for the guidance of selected candidates. The whole probation must ordinarily be passed at the same institution. Migration will not be permitted except for special reasons approved by the Secretary of State.

(3.) The allowance of £100 will not be paid to any selected candidate until he has been certified by the Civil Service Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India; and every certificated candidate must, before receiving his allowance, give a written undertaking to refund the amount in the event of his failing to proceed to India.

(4.) All candidates obtaining certificates will be also required to enter into covenants by which, amongst other things, they will bind themselves to make such payments as under the rules and regulations for the time being in force they may be required to make towards their own pensions or for the pensions of their families. The stamps payable on

these covenants amount to £1.

(5.) The seniority in the Civil Service of India of the selected candidates will be determined according to the order in which they stand on the list resulting from the combined marks of the open competitive and final examina-

Syllabus showing the Extent of the Examination in certain Subjects.

English Composition.—An essay to be written on one of several subjects specified by the Civil Service Commissioners on their examination-paper.

English Language and Literature.—The examination will be in two parts. In the one the candidates will be expected be in two parts. In the one the candidates will be expected to show a general acquaintance with the course of English literature as represented (mainly) by the following writers in verse and prose between the reign of Edward III. and the accession of Queen Victoria:—Verse: Chaucer, Langland, Spenser, Shakespeare, Milton, Dryden, Pope, Gray, Collins, Johnson, Goldsmith, Crabbe, Cowper, Campbell, Wordsworth, Scott, Byron, Coleridge, Shelley, Keats. Prose: Bacon, Sir Thomas Browne, Milton, Cowley, Bunyan, Dryden, Swift, Defoe, Addison, Johnson, Burke, Scott, Macaulay (essays and biographies).

A minute knowledge of the works of these authors will not A minute knowledge of the works of these authors will not be looked for in this part of the examination, which will, however, test how far the candidates have studied the chief productions of the greatest English writers in themselves, and are acquainted with the leading characteristics of their thought and style, and with the place which each of them occupies in the history of English literature. Candidates will also be expected to show that they have studied in these authors the history of the English language in respect of its vocabulary, syntax and prosedy. in respect of its vocabulary, syntax, and prosody.

The other part of the examination will relate to one of the periods named below, which will follow each other year by year in the order indicated.

1. (1897.) A.D. 1600 to A.D. 1700 (Shakespeare to Dryden).
2. (1898.) A.D. 1700 to A.D. 1800 (Pope to Cowper).
3. (1899.) A.D. 1800 to A.D. 1832 (nineteenth century writers to the death of Scott).

4. (1900.) A.D. 1360 to A.D. 1600 (Chaucer to Spenser).

The examination in this part will require from candidates a more minute acquaintance with the history of the English language and literature, as illustrated in the chief works

produced in each period, and will be based to a considerable extent, but by no means exclusively, on certain books specified each year by the Commissioners.* The names placed dates are intended to suggest the general chaunder the dates are intended to suggest the general character of the literary development of the period, and, consequently, the natural limits of the examination. All the works of Shakespeare, for example, will be regarded as falling within the period 1600 to 1700; all the works of Swift within the period 1700 to 1800; all the works of Scott and Wordsworth, and all the works of Macaulay, within the period 1800 to 1832.

French Language and Literature. — Translation from French into English, and from English into French. Critical questions on the French language and literature.

German Language and Literature. - Translation from German into English, and from English into German. Critical questions on the German language and literature.

Latin Language and Literature.—Translation from Latin attentiation from Latin into English, composition in prose and verse, or (as an alternative for verse-composition) a Latin essay or letter. Critical questions on the Latin language (including questions on philology) and literature.

Greek Language and Literature. — Translation from Greek into English, composition in prose and verse, or (as an alternative for verse-composition) a Greek dialogue or oration. Critical questions on the Greek language (including questions on philology) and literature.

Sanskrit Language and Literature.—Translation from Sanskrit into English, and from English into Sanskrit. History of Sanskrit literature (including knowledge of such Indian history as bears upon the subject); Sanskrit grammar; Vedic philology.

Arabic Language and Literature. — Translations as in Sanskrit. History of Arabic literature; Arabic grammar; Arabic prosody.

English History.—General questions on English history from A.D. 800 to A.D. 1848; questions on the Constitutional History of England from A.D. 800 to A.D. 1848.

General Modern History.—Candidates may, at their choice, be examined in any one of the following periods:

1. From the accession of Charlemagne to the Third Crusade (A.D. 800 to A.D. 1193).

2. From the Third Crusade to the Diet of Worms (A.D. 1193 to A.D. 1521).

3. From the Diet of Worms to the death of Louis XIV. (A.D. 1521 to A.D. 1715).

4. From the accession of Louis XV. to the French Revolution of 1848 (A.D. 1715 to A.D. 1848).

Periods 3 and 4 will include Indian history.

Greek History. — Questions on the general history of Greece to the death of Alexander; questions on the constitutional history of Greece during the same period.

Roman History. — Questions on the general history of Rome to the death of Vespasian; questions on the constitutional history of Rome during the same period.

In Greek and Roman history candidates will be expected

to show a knowledge of the original authorities.

Mathematics. — Pure mathematics: Algebra, geometry (Euclid and geometrical conic sections), plane trigonometry, plane analytical geometry (less advanced portions), differential calculus (elementary), integral calculus (elementary). Applied mathematics: Statics, dynamics of a particle, hydrostatics, geometrical optics; all treated without the aid of the differential or integral calculus.

Advanced Mathematics. — Pure mathematics: Higher algebra, including theory of equations, plane and spherical trigonometry, differential calculus, integral calculus, differential equations, analytical geometry, plane and solid. Applied mathematics: Statics, including attractions, dynamics of a particle, rigid dynamics, hydromechanics, geometrical and physical optics, and geometrical astronomy.

Political Economy and Economic History.—Candidates will be expected to possess a knowledge of economic theory as treated in the larger text-books; also, a knowledge of the existing economic conditions, and of statistical methods as applied to economic inquiries, together with a general know-ledge of the history of industry, land-tenure, and economic legislation in the United Kingdom.

Logic and Mental Philosophy (Ancient and Modern).— Logic will include both deductive and inductive logic. Mental philosophy will include psychology and metaphysics.

Political Science.—The examination will not be confined to analytical jurisprudence, early institutions, and theory of legislation, but may embrace comparative politics, the history of political theories, &c. Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of original authorities.

2. A candidate born of European parents in India should be prepared to produce, when required, a certificate of baptism from the district in which he was baptized. If this does not also mention the date of birth it should be accompanied by a statutory declaration by one of the candidate's parents, stating the date and place of birth. When such certificates are not in the possession of the candidates an extract from the registers kept at the India Office will probably be obtainable.

NORTH-WEST CHANNEL, MORETON BAY.—NEW LIGHTS AND Buoys.

NOTICE is hereby given that, on and after the 7th September, NOTICE is hereby given that, on and after the 7th September, the following lights, gas buoys, and additional buoys will be exhibited and in position for use in entering or leaving Moreton Bay by the North-west Channel, viz.:—

Light on Caloundra Head.—The light is of the fourth order dioptric condensing; it is placed in a circular tower 38tt, high from ground to lantern-top, standing on the

summit of the hill, 113 cables west from Bray Rock. The focal plane of the light is 171ft. above high water level, and the light is visible a distance of about sixteen miles.

It shows a fixed white light to seaward between the bearings of S. 1° E. and N. 61° W., a fixed red light over the North Banks between the bearings of N. 61° W. and N. 30° W., and an intensified white sector down the North-west Channel between the bearings of N. 30° W. and N. 23° W.

[Note: The light may be partially obscured by trees between the bearings of S.S.W. and S. by W.]

Leading-lights on Bribie Island.—These lights bear in line S. 55° W. The front light is of the fourth order dioptric condensing; it is placed in a skeleton wooden tower 62ft. high from ground to lantern-top, and the tower stands 80 yards back from high-water line, bearing S. 10° W., distant 4.73 miles from Bray Rock. The focal plane of the light is 56ft. above high-water level, and the light will be visible about twelve miles.

It shows a fixed white light to seewerd between the bear

visible about twelve miles.

It shows a fixed white light to seaward between the bearings of S. 17° W. and S. 77° W., intensified over an arc of 15°, the centre of which is on the line of lights; it is obscured between the bearings of S. 77° W. and N. 46° W., and shows an intensified white sector down the North-west Channel between the bearings of N. 46° W. and N. 40° W.

The back leading-light is holophotal, showing a fixed white light over an arc of about 15° to seaward, the centre of which passes over the front light. It is placed on a skeleton wooden tower 97ft. from ground to top of lantern, and is 1,060 yards distant from the front light; the focal plane of the light is 95ft. above high-water level, and the light will be visible about fifteen miles.

Two gas-buoys, painted black, with can-shaped superstructures, replace the two black buoys hitherto marking the western extremity of the Spitfire Banks and the western side of Yule Bank respectively; and one gas-buoy, painted red, with conical superstructure, replaces the red buoy hitherto marking the northern extremity of the Western Banks.

Even the black brouge a fixed white light is black to the second of the Western Banks.

From the black buoys a fixed white light is shown; and from the red buoy an occulting white light, visible four seconds, eclipsed two seconds, is shown; the focal plane of the lights is 10ft. above water-level, and the lights will be visible about three to four miles.

Additional Black Buoys.—Three additional black buoys, marking the eastern side of the North-west Channel, are placed on a line joining the buoys marking the northern ex-tremity of the North Banks and the western extremity of the Spitfire Banks on the following bearings, viz.:

Buoy in 8 fathoms:

Caloundra Lighthouse, bearing N.W. by N. 1/8 N.

Caloundra Lighthouse, bearing N.W. by N. Mount Beerwah, bearing W. ½ S. Buoy with top-mark in 10 fathoms:

Buoy in 9 fathoms:

Buoy-numbers. — The black buoy marking the northern extremity of the North Banks will be numbered NW1, as before; the additional buoys will be numbered NW3, NW5, and NW7 respectively. The Spitfire Bank gas-buoy will be numbered NW1. The Western Banks gas-buoy will be numbered NW1. The Western Banks gas-buoy will be numbered NW4.

Buoys Nos. 1 and 5 will carry top-marks.

Directions by Night.—Vessels from the southward, after rounding Cape Moreton, should steer a course for Caloundra Light, keeping both the Yellow Patch and the Caloundra Light white until the Bribie leading-lights come in line bearing S. 55° W. Keep the latter in line, passing through the red sector from Caloundra Light until in the white sector from the light then have large and bring the light extern red sector from Caloundra Light until in the white sector from that light, then haul up and bring the light astern bearing N. 25° W. until through the obscured sector of the front leading-light, and when the white sector from the latter is entered keep within its limits until the Spitfire Bank gasbuoy is visible, when steer to pass it on the port hand at a distance of about three cables; thence steer to pass the Western Banks gas-buoy on the starboard hand at a distance of about three cables off; then steer to pass the Yule Bank gas-buoy on the port hand at a distance of about four cables, and then steer for Cowan Cowan Light, bearing S.E. \(\frac{3}{4} \) E. until the bright white sector from Comboyuro Light is entered, when bring that light astern bearing north, and continue, passing through the obscured sector from Cowan Cowan Light, until the Cowan Cowan Light opens out bright again, when bring it astern, and, keeping within the limits of again, when bring it astern, and, keeping within the limits of that sector, steer a course across the bay for the anchorage near the Pile Light.

Vessels from the northward must approach the entrance, keeping Caloundra Light white until the leading-lights are in line, when proceed as directed above.

Directions by Day.—Vessels from the southward, after rounding Cape Moreton, should steer for Caloundra Head, keeping Cape Moreton Lighthouse open east of the Outer White Patch until the light-towers on Bribie Island come in line bearing S. 55° W., or until the S.E. Glasshouse Mountain (marked 920ft. on chart) comes in line with the front leading lighthouse. Steer in on that line until Coolum Hill (600ft. high) is shut in its own width with Caloundra Head—its ton showing over the near land—or until Caloundra Light. (600ft. high) is snut in its own width with Caloundra Head—its top showing over the near land—or until Caloundra Lighthouse bears N.W. by N. \(\frac{3}{4}\) N.; then steer S. 36° E., rounding the black buoy with top-mark on the north extreme of the North Banks, passing three more black buoys on the port hand, the middle one of which carries a top-mark, and the Spitfire Bank gas-buoy. Pass the latter at a distance of beat true to the read and steep and steep the read aga heavy. about two to three cables, and steer to pass the red gas-buoy on the Western Banks on the starboard hand at a similar distance; then steer to pass the Yule Bank gas-buoy on the port hand at a distance of three to four cables; and then steer for Cowan Cowan Lighthouse, keeping Cone Hill just open south of the tower until the red buoy on the East Knoll Bank is visible, when steer to pass it on the starboard hand at a distance of about four cables, and continue until Mount Campbell, bearing N.E. \(\frac{1}{2} \) N., is just open south of Cowan Cowan Light. Keep these marks in that position, and continue on across the bay to the roadstead.
