Te Makarini Scholarships, held at Te Aute College, Hawke's Bay.

THREE scholarships of the yearly value of £35, tenable for two years, are offered for competition. One of these scholarships, to be called the senior scholarship, is open to all Maori boys under sixteen years of age at the end of the month preceding the date of the examination: the other two scholarships are junior scholarships, one of which is open to all Maori boys under fifteen years of age at the end of the month preceding the date of the examination who have attended a Native school or schools other than Te Aute or St. Stephen's, and whose attendance at school during the previous year is considered by the Inspector of Native Schools to have been satisfactory; the other is open to Maori boys whose attendance at any school during the previous year has been similarly satisfactory. The senior scholarship is offered for competition among Maori boys on the conditions laid down in the regulations of the Trustees of the Te Makarini Scholarships Fund, as printed in the Native Schools Code, 1897. Candidates for the junior scholarships will be examined in the subjects specified for Standard IV. in the Native Schools Code, 1897. The questions will, however, be more difficult than those set for the standard examinations. The examination will be held at convenient centres on the 20th and 21st December, 1897.

Candidates must, either directly or through their teachers, send notice to the Inspector of Native Schools, Education Department, Wellington, of their intention to present themselves for examination. Such notice must be posted not selves for examination. Such later than the 31st October next.

Copies of the regulations and forms of notice may be obtained from teachers of Native schools and boarding institutions, the Secretaries to Education Boards, or the Secretary for Education.

General Description.

Deaths occurring at hospitals, of persons not residents of the borough wherein the hospital is situated, have been allotted in each case to the borough where the disease was contracted, and not to that in which the death actually took place.

The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 377, against 375 in August, an increase of 2. The deaths in September were 154, a decrease of 41 on the number in August. Of the total deaths, males contributed 83, females 71. Thirty-nine of the deaths were of children under 5 years of age, being 25 32 per cent. of the whole number; 24 of these were under 1 year of age. There were 40 deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: five men, 66, 69 (two), 79, 85, and eight women, 66, 68, 69, 71, 74, 80, 81, 89, died at Auckland; six men, 68, 70 (three), 73, 77, and four women, 66 (two), 74, 95, at Wellington; four men, 68, 73, 80, 82, and two women, 66, 68, at Christchurch; and six men, 71, 79 (two), 82, 87, 91, and five women, 65, 66, 68, 79, 81, at Dunedin.

In the first table are given the deaths and death-rates for each of the four cities, for the suburban boroughs severally, and for each city with its suburban towns. As regards Auckland and Christchurch, the whole of the area usually recognised as suburban has not yet been brought under municipal government, and the vital statistics do not deal with such portions as still remain in road districts. But the omission is not very important, for there are in either case quite enough suburbs included within borough boundaries to give a fair idea of the death-rate of Greater Auckland and Greater Christchurch. As further boroughs are formed the vital statistics will be made to include them.

The inclusion of the suburban boroughs tends to lower the rate at Auckland and Christchurch, but raises it at Wellington and Dunedin. The rates for September are—

Specific Febrile or Zymotic Diseases.—The deaths from this class of disease at the four chief towns and suburbs for September numbered 6, 3 of which were from influenza (1 at Auckland and 2 at Dunedin), 1 from diarrhœa, 1 from syphilis, and 1 from septicæmia. In August the total deaths were 17, and in July 11.

Constitutional Diseases.—The deaths numbered 40, 25 of which were from phthisis, 4 from other tubercular diseases, 8 from cancer, 2 from rheumatic fever and gout, and 1 from diabetes mellitus.

Local Diseases.—Of 78 deaths 22 were from diseases of the nervous system (including 6 apoplexy, 6 paralysis, 3 convulsions); 16 from diseases of the circulatory system (heart-disease, &c.); 21 from diseases of the respiratory system (8 bronchitis, 5 congestion of lungs, 4 pneumonia); 12 from diseases of the digestive system (4 appendicitis, 2 cirrhosis of liver); 6 from diseases of the urinary system (2 Bright's); and 1 death from disease of the reproductive system.

Violent Deaths.—These numbered 8 altogether—6 accidental and 2 suicidal. A child was run over by an omnibus and an engine-driver killed by concussion of the spinal cord at Auckland; a boy was crushed to death between a gate and post, a child was drowned, and a labourer killed by fall of earth, at Wellington; another labourer died from shock caused by accidental burning at Dunedin. Of the suicides one was that of a baker who shot himself with a pistol at Dunedin, and the other that of a butcher who poisoned himself at Christchurch.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of the four centres from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.
