WHEREAS the lands mentioned in the Schedule hereto form part of land taken for the purposes of the Foxton-New Plymouth Railway, and it is considered desirable to allocate such lands to the purposes of a road: And whereas it has been certified by the Minister for Railways that such lands are not required for railway pur-

dividing such lands from the railway to the satisfaction of the Minister for Railways: And whereas His Excellency the Governor is of opinion that the said local authority can conveniently construct and maintain the said road and fences: Now, therefore, I, Uchter John Mark, Earl of Ranfurly, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities in me vested by section one hundred and seventy-seven of "The Public Works Act, 1894," and of every other power and authority in anywise enabling me in that behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare that the lands described in the Schedule hereto shall, upon the publication hereof in the New Zealand must declare that the lands described in the Schedule hereto shall, upon the publication hereof in the New Zealand Gazette, become a road, and that the said road shall be under the control of the Hawera County Council, and shall be maintained by the said Council in like manner as other public highways are controlled and maintained by the said Council.

A PROCLAMATION. WHEREAS by "The River Boards Act, 1884," it is, among other things, enacted that the Governor may, on petition signed by not less than two-thirds of the rate-payers of a river district, enlarge, alter, or diminish any such district; and also that, when any district is altered under the said enactment, the Governor shall, in the Pro-clamation making such alteration, make such redistribution of the members of the Board as he shall think fit: And whereas a petition, signed as aforesaid, has been duly presented, praying that the Pukahu River District may be altered, and that the boundaries thereof may be those set forth in the Schedule hereto: And whereas it appears expedient to grant the praver of

And whereas it appears expedient to grant the prayer of

And whereas it appears expedient to grant the prayer of the said petition: Now, therefore, I, Uchter John Mark, Earl of Ranfurly, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the above-recited power and authority, do hereby alter the boundaries of the Pukabu River District, and do hereby proclaim and declare that the boundaries of the said district shall be those set forth in the Schedule hereto; and also do hereby redistribute the members of the Pukahu River Board as constituted immediately before the date when this Proclamation comes into force and declare date when this Proclamation comes into force, and declare that such members shall be the members of the Board for the said district as altered hereby, and that this Proclama-tion shall come into force on the first day of June, one thousand nine hundred.

WHEREAS by Order in Council dated the twenty-eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, made under the authority of "The Post Office Act, 1881" (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), and published in the New Zealand Gazette of the third day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, rules and regulations were prescribed for the receiving, despatch-ing, conveying, and delivering of letters, including "special request" letters, such last-named letters being defined as letters posted within the colony in terms of the regulations contained in the said Order in Council: And whereas it is expedient to extend the definition of such "special request"

letters as hereinafter provided : Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred upon him by the said Act, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby revoke paragraph No. 1 under the heading "Special Request Letters" of the above-recited regulations, and in lieu thereof doth hereby make the regulation set forth in the Schedule hereto, and doth hereby declare that such substituted regulation shall be read as part of the regulations made by the hereinbefore-mentioned Order in Council, and doth further declare that this Order in Council and the regulation hereby made shall have effect on and after the first publication of this Order in Council in the New Zealand Gazette.

"Special Request" Letters.

1. LETTERS and other postal packets posted in or beyond the colony, having the names and addresses of the senders written, printed, or embossed on the address side or on the fly of the envelopes, are returned unopened to the writers or senders by Chief Postmasters when not claimed within thirty days; and all such letters which have, in addition, a thirty days; and all such letters which have, in addition, a request on the address side of the cover that the letters be returned if not claimed within a stated period, are also returned unopened by Chief Postmasters. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this eleventh day of May, 1900.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the twelfth section of "The Public Domains Act, 1881," it is, *inter alia*, enacted that the Governor, by Order in Council, may from time to time delegate all or any of the powers by the said Act conferred, delegate all or any of the powers by the said Act conferred, save as is therein mentioned, to any person or persons, for any period, and subject to such stipulations as may be specified in such Order, and that every such delegation may from time to time in like manner be altered or revoked : And whereas, pursuant to "The Public Reserves Act, 1881," by an Order in Council of even date herewith, the land described in the Schedule hereto, situate in the Hawke's Bay Land District, is declared to be brought under the operation of and to be subject to the provisions of the said "Public Domains Act, 1881": Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony of New Zealand, doth hereby, and in respect of the land hereinafter mentioned, delegate all the powers con-

land hereinafter mentioned, delegate all the powers con-ferred by the said Act, except the powers conferred by sections five and twelve thereof, for the period of ten years from the date hereof (unless previously altered or revoked under the said Act), to the under-mentioned persons, who shall be known as the Whetukura Domain Board, namely,—

WILLIAM GREIG WALLACE, of Whetukura, storekeeper; JAMES WILLIAM BARER, of Whetukura, farmer; MARTIN CARROLL, of Whetukura, farmer; JOHN WINDER WEBSTER, of Whetukura, shepherd; JAMES HUTTON, of Whetukura, sheep-farmer

(hereinafter referred to as "the Board"), subject to the stipulations hereinafter contained, that is to say,— I. The Board shall meet for the transaction of business

I. The Board shall meet for the transaction of business on the third Monday in each month, at half past seven o'clock p.m., at the Schoolhouse, Whetukura, or at such other time or place as may from time to time be fixed by the Board. The first meeting shall be held on Monday, the eighteenth day of June, one thousand nine hundred.
 2. Special meetings may be convened by the Chairman or by any two members of the Board, provided that two days' notice of such meeting be given to each member, specifying the business to be transacted at such special meeting; and no other business than that so specified shall be transacted at such meeting.

at such meeting.

3. Any three members of the Board shall form a quorum.

Any meeting may be adjourned from time to time. 4. The members of the Board shall, at their first meeting, and thereafter at an annual meeting to be held on the third Monday in January in every succeeding year thereafter, elect one of themselves to be Chairman, who may join in the discussion, and shall have an original as well as a casting yote. The Chairman shall hold office until the election of his successor.

his successor. 5. The Board shall prepare and submit at each annual meeting a report of the proceedings of the Board for the previous year ending on the thirty-first day of December, together with a statement of the receipts and expenditure of the Board for such year. A copy of every such report and statement, certified by the Chairman to be correct, shall be sent to the Minister of Lands as soon as possible

after each annual meeting. 6. If at any meeting the Chairman is not present at the time appointed for holding the same, the members present shall choose some one of their number to be chairman of such meeting.

7. If, by resignation, death, or incapacity, or otherwise, the office of Chairman shall be or become vacant, the members may at any monthly or special meeting appoint a Chairman.

Chairman. 8. All questions shall be determined by the majority of votes of the members of the Board present at a meeting. And with the like advice and consent as aforesaid doth hereby also order that this delegation shall take effect in respect of the parcel of Crown lands described in the Schedule hereto.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.-EXTRADITION TREATY.-SAN MARINO. Windsor, 3rd March, 1900.

At the Court at Windsor, the 3rd day of March, 1900.

Present:

THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY. LORD CHANCELLOR, LORD PRESIDENT, LORD JAMES OF HEREFORD.

HEREFORD. WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1895, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals. Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient: And whereas a treaty was concluded on the sixteenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, be-tween Her Majesty and the Captains Regent of the Most Serene Republic of San Marino for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which treaty is in the terms following:— Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and the Most Serene Republic of San Marino, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice and to the pre-vention of crime within their respective territories, that per-sons charged with or convicted of the crimes hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up, the said high contracting parties have named as their plenipo-tentiaries to conclude a treaty for this purpose, that is to say.—

Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to His Majesty the King of Italy; And the Most Serene Republic of San Marino, His Excel-lency Cavaliere Paolo Onorato Vigliani, Patrician of San Marino, Grand Cross and Grand Cordon of the Order of Saint Maurice and Saint Lazarus, and of the Crown of Italy, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, &c., &c., Minister of State, ex-President of the Court of Cassation, Senator of the Kingdom of Italy.

of Italy; Who, having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following articles :---

ARTICLE I.

The high contracting parties engage to deliver up to each other those persons who, being accused or convicted of a crime or offence committed in the territory of the one party, shall be found within the territory of the other party under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present treaty.

ARTICLE II.

The crimes or offences for which the extradition is to be granted are the following :-

1. Murder, or attempt or conspiracy to murder, and manslaughter.

slaughter.
2. Assault occasioning actual bodily harm. Malicious wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm.
3. Counterfeiting or altering money, or uttering counterfeit or altered money.
4. Knowingly making any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for counterfeiting coin.
5. Forgery, counterfeiting, or altering or uttering what is forged counterfeited or altered

forged, counterfeited, or altered.

6. Embezzlement or larceny.

7. Malicious injury to property if the offence be indictable

8. Obtaining money, goods, or valuable securities by false pretences.

9. Receiving money, valuable security, or other property knowing the same to have been stolen, embezzled, or unlaw-fully obtained.

Crimes against bankruptcy law.
 Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent factor, trustee, or director, or member or public officer of any company.

Perjury, or subornation of perjury.
 Rape.

14. Carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have carnal knowledge, of a girl under sixteen years of age, so far as such acts are punishable by the law of the State upon which the demand is made. 15. Indecent assult.

15. Indecent assult. Indecent assault, even with con-sent, upon children of either sex under thirteen years of age

Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of a woman.
 Abduction.

18. Child-stealing

19. Abandoning children, exposing or unlawfully detaining them.

20. Kidnapping and false imprisonment. 21. Burglary or housebreaking.

22. Arson.

23. Robbery with violence

24. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the

25. Threats by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort.
26. Piracy by law of nations.

27. Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting or conspiring to do so. 28. Assaults on board a ship on the high seas with intent

to destroy life or to do grievous bodily harm. 29. Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more per-

ons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the master.

30. Dealing in slaves in such a manner as to constitute a criminal offence against the laws of both States. Extradition is also to be granted for participation in any

of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation in any punishable by the laws of both the contracting parties. Extradition may also be granted, at the discretion of the State applied to, in respect of any other crime for which, according to the laws of both the contracting parties for the time being in force, the grant can be made.

ABTICLE III.

Either Government may, in its absolute discretion, re-fuse to deliver up its own subjects to the other Government.

ARTICLE IV.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of the British Government, or the person claimed on the part of the Government of San Marino, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is actually upon his trial, within the territory of the other of the two high contracting parties, for the orime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of the British Govern-ment, or if the person claimed on the part of the Govern-ment of San Marino, should be under examination, or be undergoing sentence under a conviction, for any other orime within the territories of the two bigh contracting parties respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until after he has been discharged, whether by acquittal, or on expiration of his sentence. of his sentence, or otherwise.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal pro secution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecu-tion or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, ac-cording to the laws of the State applied to.

ABTICLE VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has in fact been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

ARTICLE VII.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made for any other crime or on account of any other matters than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored or had an opportuity of returning to the State by which he has been surrendered.

This stipulation does not apply to orimes committed after the extradition.

ARTICLE VIII.

The requisition for extradition shall be made in the following manner :

Application on behalf of Her Britannic Majesty's Govern-ment for the surrender of a fugitive criminal in San Marino shall be made by Her Majesty's Consul for the Republic of San Marino.

Application on behalf of the Republic of San Marino for the surrender of a fugitive criminal in the United Kingdom shall be made either direct by the Captains Regent or by the Consul of the Republic accredited to the British Government in London.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the orime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court

of the State that makes the requisition for extradition. A sentence passed *in contumaciam* is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

ABTICLE IX,

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

ARTICLE X.

If the fugitive has been arrested in the British dominions, he shall forthwith be brought before a competent Magistrate, who is to examine him and to conduct the preliminary investigation of the case, just as if the apprehension had taken place for a crime committed in the British dominions. In the examinations which they have to make in accord-

ance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the British dominions shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or the affirmations of witnesses taken in San Marino, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating the fact of, a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows :--

same are authenticated as follows: —
1. A warrant must purport to be signed by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the Republic of San Marino.
2. Depositions or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified, under the hand of a Judge, Magis-trate, or officer of the Republic of San Marino, to be the original depositions or affirmations, or to be the true copies original depositions or affirmations, or to be the true copies thereof, as the case may require. 3. A certificate of or judicial document stating the fact of

3. A certificate of or judicial document stating the fact of a conviction must purport to be certified by a Judge, Magis-trate, or officer of the Republic of San Marino. 4. In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated either by the cath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal and legalisation of the Republic of San Marino; but any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by the law in that part of the British dominions where the examination is taken may be substi-tuted for the foregoing.

ABTICLE XI.

If the fugitive has been arrested in the Republic of San Marino, his surrender shall be granted if, upon examination

by a competent authority, it appears that the documents furnished by the British Government contain sufficient *primâ facie* evidence to justify the extradition. The authorities of the republic shall admit as valid evi-dence records drawn up by the British authorities of the depositions of witnesses, or copies thereof, and records of conviction or other judicial documents, or copies thereof: Provided that the said documents be signed or authenticated by an authority whose competence shall be certified by the seal of a Minister of State of Her Britannic Majesty.

ARTICLE XII.

ARTICLE XII. The extradition shall not take place unless the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the said State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical per-son convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition, and that the crime of which he has been conrequisition, and that the crime of which he has been con-victed is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to. In Her Britannic Majesty's dominions the fugi-tive criminal shall not be surrendered until the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his being committed to prison to await his surrender.

ARTICLE XIII.

If the individual claimed by one of the two high contracting parties, in pursuance of the present treaty, should be also claimed by one or several other Powers on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective terri-tories, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is earliest in date.

ARTICLE XIV.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to, or the proper tribunal thereof, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

ARTICLE XV.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered, at the time of his apprehension, shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery thereof, be given up when the extradition takes place, and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

ARTICLE XVI.

The expenses of arresting, maintaining, and transporting the person whose extradition is applied for, as well as those of handing over and transporting the property and articles which by the preceding article must be restored or given up, shall be borne by the two States within the limits of their respective territories.

The expenses of transport or other necessary expenses by sea or through the territories of a third State shall be borne by the demanding State.

ARTICLE XVII.

Either of the high contracting parties who may wish to have recourse for purposes of extradition to transit through the territory of a third Power shall be bound to arrange the condition of transit with such third Power.

ARTICLE XVIII

When in a criminal case of a non-political character either When in a criminal case of a non-political character either of the high contracting parties should think it necessary to take the evidence of witnesses residing in the dominions of the other, or to obtain any other legal evidence, a "Com-mission Rogatoire" to that effect shall be sent through the channel indicated in Article VIII., and effect shall be given thereto conformably to the laws in force in the place where the evidence is to be taken.

ABTICLE XIX.

The stipulations of the present treaty shall be applicable to the colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, so far as the laws for the time being in force in

such colonies and foreign possessions respectively will allow. The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such colonies or foreign pos-sessions may be made to the Governor or chief authority of such colony or possession by any person authorised to act such colony or possession as a consular officer of the Republic of San Marino.

of San Marino. Such requisitions may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such colony or foreign possession will allow, to the provisions of this treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the **matter** to his Government,

Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British colonies and make special arrangements in the British colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of criminals from San Marino who may take refuge within such colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such colony or foreign possession will allow, of the provisions of the present treaty. Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding articles of the present treaty.

ARTICLE XX.

The present treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the publication, in contormity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the high contracting parties. It may be terminated by either of the high contracting parties at any time on giving to the other six months' notice of its intention to do so.

The treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be

In witness whereof the respective plenipotentiaries have signed the present treaty in duplicate in English and Italian, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms. Done at Florence, the 16th day of October, 1899.

ROBERT J. COLLING, Accountant to the Treasury. THE foregoing accounts have been examined and found correct, subject to the following remarks :— (1.) The "Customs," "Railways," and "Territorial Revenue" receipts are not now examined by the Audit Office. (2.) The Audit Office is unable satisfactorily to verify the receipts of gold revenue, through the failure of the Mines Department to comply with a requisition for a certified statement of the amounts collectible as such revenue. (3.) The "Advances in the hands of officers of the Government" include payments to the amount of £11,601 12s. 6d., though the accounts of the same were received at the Treasury before the close of the quarter. J. K. WARBURTON, Controller and Auditor-General.

THE accounts making up the sum of £11,601 12s. 6d. referred to above had not been received in the Treasury from departments at the time of the closing of the books for the past financial year, and therefore could not be included in the accounts of the quarter. It is, however, admitted by the Audit Office that "such a contingency has been of invariable occurrence, and may in some measure be unavoidable, notwithstanding the requirements of section 71 of 'The Public Revenues Act, 1891.'" See certificate of Audit Office to the Abstract of Revenue and Expenditure for the Financial Year ended 31st March, 1899.

Deaths occurring at hospitals, of persons not residents of the borough wherein the hospital is situated, have been allotted in each case to the borough where the disease was contracted, and not to that in which the death actually took place.

The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 367, against 427 in March.—a decrease of 60. The deaths in April were 189 — an increase of 4 on the number in March. Of the total deaths, males contributed 93, females 96. Sixty-five of the deaths were of children under five years of age, being 34:39 per cent. of the whole number; 54 of these were under one year of age.

Shays no of the deaths were of children under not years of age, being 54 55 per cent. of the whole number, 54 of these were under one year of age.
There were forty-four deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: Four men, 68, 72, 75, 77, and four women, 65, 73, 87, 88, died at Auckland; two men, 67, 84, and six women, 65, 72, 75 (two), 78, 91, at Wellington; seven men, 66, 67 (two), 69 (two), 82, 84, and six women, 66, 68, 69, 76, 80, 85, at Christohurch; and eight men, 65, 66 (two), 67, 70, 72, 73, 90, and seven women, 67, 68 (two), 70, 71, 73, 77, at Dunedin.

In the first table are given the deaths and death-rates for each of the four cities, for the suburban boroughs severally, and for each city with its suburban towns. As regards Auckland and Christchurch, the whole of the area usually recognised and for each city with its suburban towns. As regards Auckland and Constitution, the whole of the area usually recognised as suburban has not yet been brought under municipal government, and the vital statistics do not deal with such portions as still remain in road districts. But the omission is not very important, for there are in either case quite enough suburbs included within borough boundaries to give a fair idea of the death-rate of Greater Auckland and Greater Christchurch. As further boroughs are formed the vital statistics will be made to include them. The inclusion of the suburban boroughs tends to lower the rate at Wellington and Christchurch, but raises it at Auckland and Dunedin. The rates for April are—

Specific Febrile or Zymotic Diseases.—The mortality in this class of disease at the chief centres and suburbs during April amounted to 31 deaths, against 30 in March. Of 31 deaths in April, no less than 17 were at Auckland, 14 of these being children dying from diarrhœal complaints. The deaths from diarrhœa at Wellington were limited to 2, at Dunedin there were 5, while at Christchurch there were no deaths from this cause. Influenza was fatal at Auckland in April (1 death) and at Christchurch (2 deaths). Typhoid fever is noticed as causing 2 deaths at Wellington, and diphtheria i at Auckland.

Constitutional Diseases.—The deaths last month at the cities and suburbs in this class numbered 36, against 30 in March and 22 in February. Phthisis shows 17 deaths in April, tubercular enteritis 2, tubercular meningitis 1, tuberculosis 2, and tabes mesenterica 1 death.

Local Diseases.—Of 87 deaths, 21 resulted from disease of the nervous system, 18 of the circulatory, 12 of the respiratory, 27 of the digestive, 7 of the urinary, 1 of the reproductive, and 1 of the locomotive systems.

Violent Deaths.—At Christchurch a guard was run over by a tram, and a labourer killed while boarding a railway-train. At Dunedin an aged woman lost her life by a tram-car, making three fatal cases of accident of this kind. At Auckland a child was scalded to death by the upsetting of a kettle of hot water, another killed by sunstroke, while a boy and two adult males were drowned in the harbour. At Christchurch a girl died from failure in respiration caused by ether, and an infant from delayed birth. The suicide was that of a domestic, and was effected by drowning.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of the four centres from six principal specific febrile or symptic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.
