N exercise of the powers conferred upon him by "The Workers' Compensation for Accidents Act, 1900," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby, for the purposes of that Act, make the regulations hereinafter set forth:—

REGULATIONS.

APPLICATION FOR ARBITRATION.

- 1. An application for the settlement of any question under section 8 of "The Workers' Compensation for Accidents Act, 1900" (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), shall be made by the claimant filing with the Clerk of Awards of the Arbitration Court (hereinafter called "the Clerk") an application for arbitration.

 2. Particulars shall be appended to the application con-
- taining-
 - (1.) A concise statement of the circumstances under which the application is made, and the relief or order claimed;
 - (2.) The date of service on the employer of notice of the accident, or, if no notice has been served, the reason for such omission; and
 (3.) The full names and addresses of the respondents.
- 3.) The full names and addresses of the respondents.

 3. The application shall be according to such of the forms 1 to 4 in the Schedule hereto as may be applicable, with such modifications as the nature of the case requires.

 4. The claimant shall deliver to the Clerk with the application three copies thereof for the use of the Arbitra-

- application three copies thereof for the use of the Arbitration Court and a copy for each respondent to be served.

 5. Every party, other than the claimant, whose presence at the arbitration may be necessary to enable the Court effectively and completely to adjudicate upon and settle all the questions involved shall be made party to the application, and is herein included in the expression "respondent." ent,
- 6. Where the claimant is illiterate and unable to furnish the required information in writing, the request and particulars and copies shall be filled up by the Clerk.

FIXING DATE OF HEARING.

7. (1.) On the filing of an application for arbitration the Clerk shall transmit a copy of the request and particulars to the President of the Arbitration Court, who shall, as soon as conveniently may be, appoint a day and hour for proceeding with the arbitration.

(2.) Such day shall be so fixed as to allow the copies of the application to be served on the respondents at least fourteen days before the hearing.

Provided that the Court may, in case of non-compliance with Regulation 11 and on such terms as it thinks fit, either proceed with the arbitration and allow the respondent to avail himself of any matter of which he should, pursuant to that regulation, have given notice by filing an answer, or adjourn the arbitration to enable the respondent to file such answer.

Where the application is made on behalf of a deceased worker, or for the settlement of the sum payable in respect of medical attendance on and the burial of a deceased worker who leaves no dependants, pay into Court such sum as the respondent considers sufficient to cover his liability in the circumstances of the case.
 15. The Clerk shall, within twenty-four hours from the time of any notice filed or payment made under the last preceding regulation, send notice thereof in the Form 9 or 10 in the Schedule hereto as the case requires, together with a
- the Schedule hereto as the case requires, together with a copy of the notice filed, if any, to the claimant and to the

other respondents, if any.

16. If the claimant is the injured worker, and elects to accept the weekly payment specified in the respondent's notice in satisfaction of his claim, he shall send to the Clerk and to the respondent a written notice in Form 11 in the Schedule hereto stating such acceptance.

17. If the application for arbitration has been made on behalf of the dependants of a deceased worker, or for the settlement of the sum payable in respect of medical attendance and burial as aforesaid, and the claimant is willing to accept the sum paid into Court in satisfaction of the compensation payable to the dependants, or in respect of such medical attendance and burial (as the case may be), he shall send to the Clerk and to the respondent a written notice in the Form 11 in the Schedule hereto of such acceptance.

18. If there are any other respondents the claimant shall in like manner give notice of his acceptance to those respondents; and if they or any of them are willing to accept the sum paid into Court in satisfaction of such compensation as aforesaid, they shall in like manner give notice of their acceptance to the Clerk and to the claimant and the other respondents.

19. The notice required by Regulations 16, 17, and 18 to be sent to the Clerk and to the respondent shall in each case be sent within such reasonable time before the day fixed for proceeding with the arbitration as the time of filing of the notice of submission by the respondent under Regulation 14

permits.

20. If the claimant is the injured worker, and elects to accept in satisfaction of his claim the weekly payment submitted to by the respondent, or if in any other case the claimant and all the other respondents give notice of their acceptance of the sum paid into Court, the following provisions shall apply:—

(1.) Where the respondent submits to an award for the payment of a weekly sum, the Court may forthwith make an order directing payment of such weekly sum accordingly.

(2.) Where the respondent has paid money into Court

(2.) Where the respondent has paid money into Court, further proceedings against such respondent shall be stayed, except as hereinafter mentioned.
(3.) If the claimant and the other respondents agree as to the apportionment and application of such sum, the Court may, on application made on behalf or with the consent of all such parties, forthwith make an award for such apportionment and application.
(4.) In any other case the arbitration may proceed as

In default of notice of acceptance by the claimant and all the respondents the arbitration may proceed, but if no greater weekly payment or compensation is awarded than that which the respondent has submitted to pay or has paid into Court, such respondent shall not be liable to pay any further costs than he would have been ordered to pay if the weekly payment offered or sum paid into Court had been accepted; and the Court may order any costs incurred by the respondent after notice of submission or payment into Court to be paid by any party who has not given notice of acceptance, and may order such costs to be set off against any costs payable to such party, or to be deducted from any weekly payment or compensation awarded to him.

AWARD.

22. (1.) The award of the Court shall be in writing under the seal of the Court, and signed by the President, and filed. (2.) The award shall be in one of the forms 12 to 14 in

the Schedule hereto, or as near thereto as the circumstances

(3.) A copy of the award shall be served on all persons affected thereby.

Costs.

23. The Court shall in each case determine the amount of the costs to be paid by any party to the arbitration, and to whom the same shall be paid, and shall embody in its award such direction as to the payment of costs as it thinks fit.

24. Where a worker submits himself for examination to a medical referee under clause 5 of the Second Schedule to the Act, and the certificate of the referee is used in any subsequent proceedings, any reasonable travelling and other expenses incurred by the worker in attending the referee for examination or in obtaining such certificate may (if not otherwise provided for) be allowed as costs in the arbitration.

ENFORCING PAYMENT.

25. When a party liable to pay compensation or costs under any award makes default in payment of the amount awarded, or, where payment is to be made by instalments, of any instalment, payment may be enforced in the following manner :

(1.) On application by the party entitled to payment (in the Form 15 in the Schedule hereto) the Clerk shall issue a certificate (in the Form 16 in the Schedule hereto), under his hand and sealed with the seal of the Court, stating the amount payable and the respective persons to whom the same is payable.

(2.) That certificate may be filed in any Court of competent jurisdiction, and shall thereupon be enforceable as a final judgment in such Court.

(3.) Where such sum is not payable into Court the party applying for the certificate shall satisfy the Clerk, by affidavit or otherwise, as to the amount in pay-ment of which default has been made.

Regulations for the Compulsory Taking of Land under "The Land for Settlements Consolidation Act, 1900."

RANFURLY, Governor.

WHEREAS, in exercise of the powers in that behalf conferred on him by "The Land for Settlements Act, 1894," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand did, on the third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, make certain regulations for the forms of requisitions and claims under that Act, and the time within and the manner in which should be done anything in that Act expressed to be prescribed: And whereas the said regulations were gazetted on the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven: And whereas that Act was repealed by "The Land for Settlements Consolidation Act, 1900" (hereinafter called "the said Act"), which, however, provides that all regulations made under any power contained in any repealed Act shall be deemed to have been made under the said Act, and shall continue in force until revoked by the Governor under the said Act: And whereas by the said Act it is further provided that the Governor may from time to time make regulations for, inter alia, the following purposes, that is to

Prescribing the forms of notices, requisitions, and claims in respect of land to be taken compulsorily under the said Act;

REGULATIONS FOR THE FOREST SERVICE BRANCH OF THE ROYAL INDIAN ENGINEERING COLLEGE, COOPER'S HILL, FOR 1901.

1. 2. Admission to the College is under the orders of the President, who will allot accommodation as may best secure

Candidates examined at a college or school will probably be required to pay a local fee in addition to the fee of £3 (in order to defray the expenses of superintendence), as to which they should obtain early information from the college or school authorities. The fee payable to the Civil Service Commissioners must be paid by means of stamps of the specified amount. Instructions on this point will be issued to candidates about ten days before the examination.

4. The number of candidates to be selected annually varies according to the requirements of the Forest Service in India; the figures as regards each particular year will be advertised from time to time. In 1901 there will be ten

(1.) An applicant must be a natural-born British subject, and must be above seventeen and under twenty years of age on the 1st June of the year in which he competes for an appointment. He must be unmarried, and if he marries before reaching India he will forfeit his appointment.

(2.) An applicant must sendt to the Revenue Department of the India Office, on or before the 1st day of May of the year in which he proposes to compete,—

(a.) His name, parentage, and home address, a certificate or other satisfactory evidence

of the date of his birth, and the written consent of parent or guardian that his name should be recorded as a candidate.

(b.) A statement of the places of education at which he may have been, accompanied by testimonials of good conduct, during the leaf four years. last four years.

(3.) Applicants will have to appear before a Medical Board; at the India Office, particular stress being laid upon good vision; and hearing. A physical test will also be imposed, so as to insure the selection of persons of active habits and powers of en-

It is suggested that a candidate, before commencing any special course of study, should undergo a thorough medical examination. Candidates for the Forest Service may, if they wish it, undergo a preliminary examination by the Medical Board at the India Office, not more than two years before they are qualified to compete, under the following conditions:—

(b.) Candidates must pay their travelling expenses.

(5.) The Secretary of State will nominate as probationers (5.) The Secretary of State will nominate as probationers such competitors as attain the highest aggregate of marks (provided they obtain the aggregate referred to above, and satisfy the requisite conditions in other respects). These probationers will then enter the College, where they will be further trained for the Forest Service of India.
(6.) If the full number of competent probationers required in any year cannot be obtained from the persons so examined, the Secretary of State re-

persons so examined, the Secretary of State re-serves a discretion to fill up the deficiency by selecting any other person or persons whom, after consulting the authorities of the College, he may consider properly qualified to become probationers for the Forest Service.

6. The course of study for candidates for the India Forest Service extends over about three years. For about six terms the candidates will prosecute their studies mainly at the College, and during the period of foreign study, which will occupy the remainder of the course, they will visit, under suitable supervision, such continental forests as may be selected for the purpose. Excursions may also be made for purposes of instruction, both during term-time and during part of the vacations.

7. Each annual session begins in September, and is divided into three terms, with vacations of about four weeks at Christmas, two weeks at Easter, and eight weeks in the summer.

8. A charge of £61 is made for each of the six terms spent at the College; for the period of foreign study the charge is £70 for each of the three terms: the amounts must be paid terminally in advance to the Bank of England. Receivable orders, with full directions as to the mode of payment, will be forwarded from the India Office to the parents or guardians shortly before the fees fall due. A student will not be allowed to come into residence or to start for or continue his study of foreign forests until his fee for the term has been paid. has been paid.

9. A deposit of £5 is required to be paid by each student on admission to the College as caution-money, to cover charges incurred by him for damage to books, instruments, &c., or any College bills outstanding on leaving the College. Any balance over and above such charges will be repaid. This deposit is to be paid with the fee for the first term,

This deposit is to be paid with the fee for the first term, making the total payment on that occasion £66.

10. The foregoing payments cover all charges for tuition, board according to the College tariff, lodging, with washing up to a cost of 2s. a week, and ordinary medical attendance while in residence at the College. 11. The prescribed course of study comprises the following subjects:—I. Auxiliary subjects: (1) geometrical drawing, (2) freehand drawing, (3) surveying, (4) forest engineering, (5) accounts, (6) German, (7) physics, (8) chemistry, (9) geology and mineralogy, (10) entomology, (11) botany, (12) drill and gymnastics. II. Forestry, theoretical and practical, in all its branches. and gymnastics. in all its branches.

12. Every student is required to conform to the College rules, to exhibit due diligence in his studies throughout the course, and to give evidence of satisfactory progress in such manner as may be required, failing which, or in the event of serious misconduct, he will be liable to be removed from the College, or to be sent back from the foreign study, which may enterlish loss of his appointment.

College, or to be sent back from the foreign study, which may entail the loss of his appointment.

13. During the course of study the proficiency of the students will be tested by periodical examinations, and on the termination of their studies there will be a final examination. Each student may also, at the discretion of the Secretary of State for India, be required from time to time to appear before the Medical Board, and should the result be unsatisfactory he cannot claim to be allowed to complete the course.

14. The subjects enumerated in paragraph 11 are grouped in certain main branches of study,* and a fixed minimum of qualification is required in each branch and in the subjects

taught during the forest tours, as well as a certain minimum for all branches taken together. Students who obtain these minima will receive the College diploma in forestry.

15. Candidates who have obtained this diploma, and are found to be of sound constitution and free from physical defects which would render them unsuitable for employment to the Forest Department (the final decision on which renter in the Forest Department (the final decision on which points will rest with the Secretary of State for India), will be appointed Assistant Conservators in the Forest Department of pointed Assistant Conservators in the Forest Department of India in the order of their standing at the end of the final examination. They will be allowed before leaving the College to state their preference in respect to the provinces to which they desire to be allotted; but the distribution will be made to the several provinces according to the needs of the public service, at the discretion of the Secretary of State for India after consulting the President of the College. Officers are, however, at all times liable to be transferred from one province to another at the pleasure of the Government of province to another at the pleasure of the Government of

India.

16. Within a month of his nomination as Assistant Conservator, each nominee must sign articles of agreement describing the terms and conditions of his appointment; he must embark for India when required to do so by the Secretary of State, and will be provided with a free passage. Failure to embark at the stated time will, in the absence of satisfactory explanation, lead to forfeiture of appointment.

of satisfactory explanation, lead to forfeiture of appointment.

17. The pay of an Assistant Conservator of Forests will begin from the date of reporting arrival in India. Probationers who acquit themselves creditably during their course at Cooper's Hill College will begin on a salary of Rs. 350 a month. It will, however, rest with the President of the College to decide whether any of the probationers, though they have obtained the College diploma in forestry, have failed to deserve that rate of initial salary. Such probationers, if any, will begin on a salary of Rs. 250 a month; and this difference of salary will continue until the first departmental examination is passed in India. Officers entering the forest service will be required to contribute a subscription ranging from a compulsory minimum of 5 per cent. up to a voluntary maximum of 10 per cent. of their salary to the Forest Officers' Provident Fund. Such contributions, with compound interest, will accumulate till the date of retirement, when the total sum will be paid to the contributor, or, in the event of death before retirement, to his legal representative.

18. Promotion, leave, and pension will be governed by the regulations laid down by the Government of India and made applicable to Forest officers, such regulations being subject

regulations laid down by the Government of India and made applicable to Forest officers, such regulations being subject to any modifications or alterations which may be made in them from time to time by the Government of India, and their interpretation in case of any doubt arising being left to that Government. The pension rules applicable to Public Works and Telegraph officers appointed from Cooper's Hill College have been extended to Forest officers appointed from England; and the Inspector-General of Forests and Conservators of the first grade are now eligible for the extra pension of Rs. 1,000 per annum admissible to an officer after at least three years of approved service as a an officer after at least three years of approved service as a head of a department in any province, if considered deserving of the special concession. A copy of the regulations relative to these matters can be seen on application either at the Library or the Record Department of the India Office; the

19. Every candidate, before proceeding to India, will be required to furnish to the President of the College satisfactory evidence of his competency in riding.

GENERAL RULES.

20. Chemical, physical, and botanical laboratories, 20. Chemical, physical, and botanical laboratories, a forestry museum, a forest nursery, a library, and gymnasium are attached to the College. Means are also provided for the practice of photography. Students making use of the laboratories are supplied with the needful apparatus.

21. The responsibility for the discipline and management of the College and for the superintendence of the studies is vested in the President, under the control of the Secretary of State for India.

22. The students are distributed in divisions, under per-

22. The students are distributed in divisions, under personal charge of one of the professors or instructors selected by the President; such tutor being responsible for exercising the proper degree of personal supervision over each student in his division, and for conducting necessary correspondence with the student's parents or guardians.

23. Each student residing in the College is provided with a separate room, and with fuel and light, also with the necessary attendance. Furniture and bedding are supplied by the College, but students are required to provide their own towels and bed-linen. Meals are taken in hall. Wine and beer are not included in the ordinary fare, but can be obtained from the College cellar at fixed prices. obtained from the College cellar at fixed prices

24. A chapel is attached to the College, which the students are required to attend at Sunday morning service, unless

specially exempted.

25. Every student will be required to go through a course of gymnastics and also of military exercises, including the of the rifle.

STUDENTS NOT NOMINATED FOR THE INDIAN FOREST SERVICE, BUT DESIROUS OF OBTAINING A DIPLOMA IN FORESTRY FROM COOPER'S HILL COLLEGE.

26. Students not nominated for the Indian Forest Service 26. Students not nominated for the Indian Forest Service may be received into the College, as far as the available accommodation permits. Such students may pass through the course of instruction prescribed for the nominees of the Indian Forest Service, as detailed above, or they may be permitted to participate in the instruction given in certain subjects only. On obtaining the prescribed minima of marks in the several branches of study and in totals as laid down above, they will receive, as the case may require, either the College diploma in forestry or special certificates showing in what subjects they have followed the instruction, and with what result. with what result.

with what result.

27. Candidates who desire to be admitted under paragraph 26 may submit the necessary application at any time, but not later than the 15th day of June of the year named for admission, except with the special permission of the President. The application must be made on the prescribed forms, which can be obtained from the Secretary of the College.

College.

Candidates whose applications are found satisfactory as to character and in other respects will be required undergo an examination, to be held at the College, about the last week in June of the year for admission. The object

the last week in June of the year for admission. The object of the examination will be to ascertain whether the candidate is qualified to follow the course of instruction with advantage (or certain parts of it, as the case may be). Candidates who do not come up to the required standard will not be admitted to the College.

The President may dispense with the whole or any portion of this examination in the case of a candidate who produces an University diploma or other similar certificate granted by a recognised examining body.

29. Candidates admitted to the College under paragraph 26, who propose to pass through the full prescribed course of study, will be required to pay the same fees in every respect as those paid by the nominees for the India Forest Service. Candidates who do not become resident, and are admitted only to certain subjects of study, will be required to pay the fees which may be fixed in each special case in consideration fees which may be fixed in each special case in consideration of the extent of their studies. The candidates of both classes will be required to abide by the general rules of the College.

FOREST ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.—SYLLABUS.

Mathematics I.—Arithmetic; algebra, up to and including the binomial theorem; the theory and use of logarithms; Euclid, Books I. to IV. and VI.; plane trigonometry, up to and including solution of triangles; mensuration.

Mathematics II.—Further questions on the syllabus of Mathematics I.; elementary solid geometry, including Euclid, Book XI., propositions 1 to 21; Euclid, Book XII.,

propositions 1 and 2; geometrical conic sections, the elementary properties common to the ellipse, parabola, and hyperbola; dynamics and statics, uniform and uniformly accelerated rectilinear motion, uniform circular motion, motion of projectiles (not requiring a knowledge of the para-bola), equilibrium of forces in one plane and of parallel forces, the centre of mass, and the construction and use of the simpler machines.

Latin.—Passages selected from the authors usually read in schools will be set for translation into English. Passages from English authors will be given for translation into Latin prose and verse, but candidates will be allowed, in the place prose and verse, but candidates will be allowed, in the place of verse - composition, to answer questions of a simple character which will test whether they possess a fundamental knowledge of the grammar of the language, and such an elementary acquaintance with Roman history as is required for the intelligent study of the books they have read.

Greek.—Passages will be set for translation into English from the authors usually read in schools, and in other respects the examination will proceed on the same lines as in Latin.

atin.

French.—Translations of unseen passages from French into English, and from English into French. The passages for translation will be taken mainly from standard authors, and a few simple questions may be asked on the passages set as the structure and character of the language and set, as to the structure and character of the language, and allusions of obvious and general interest. The vivâ voce set, as to the structure and character of the language, and allusions of obvious and general interest. The vivâ voce examination will include dictation. Three hundred marks will be allotted to colloquial knowledge of the language.

German.—The passages for translation will be taken mainly from standard authors, and in other respects the examination will proceed on the same lines as in French.

English Composition.—Candidates will be tested by précis-

mitting as well as by an essay. The standard of positive merit will be looked for in logical arrangement of thought, and in accuracy and propriety of expression, but large deductions of marks will be made for faults of writing and spelling.

(Candidates are also warned that, for similar faults in the use of the English language, similar deductions will be made from the marks obtained in other subjects.)

Geometrical Drawing.—Practical plane geometry; the construction of scales; and the elements of solid geometry, and of simple orthographic projection. Great importance will be attached to neatness and exactness of drawing.

Geography—Simple questions in descriptive and general

geography.

English History.—The general paper in this subject will be confined to events subsequent to the Norman Conquest. It will test whether the candidates are accurately acquainted It will test whether the candidates are accurately acquainted with the facts of English history, and also possess an intelligent knowledge of the meaning of the facts. The paper on the special period will be confined to distinctly modern history. It will require from the candidates more minute knowledge than the general paper. The special period will be, for 1901: From 1748 to 1800.

Natural Science Subjects.—The standard of examination in these subjects will be such as may be reasonably expected from the education given at schools possessing appliances for practical instruction, such as a laboratory, &c. A considerable portion of the marks will be given for proficiency shown in the practical part of the examination. A knowledge of the metric system will be expected.

Chemistry.—The laws of chemical combination and decomposition, and the preparation, classification, and properties of the principal metallic and non-metallic elements, and of such of their compounds as are treated of in inorganic

of the principal metallic and non-metallic elements, and or such of their compounds as are treated of in inorganic chemistry. In the practical part of the examination only the more ordinary apparatus and the less dangerous reagents will be supplied, and no candidate will be allowed to bring his own apparatus or reagents.

Heat.—The elementary portion of the subject.

Physics.—The elementary properties of electricity, magnetism, light, and sound.

Physiography.—i.e., physical geography.

Geology.—Chiefly economic, including the recognition of the more familiar minerals and rocks, and their properties

and uses. and uses.

Botany.—The elementary parts of vegetable morphology, histology, and physiology, and the principles of a natural system of classification as illustrated by the more important British natural orders. Candidates will be required to describe plants in technical language.

REPORT UNDER "THE NATIVE SCHOOLS SITES ACT, 1880."

The Magistrate's Office, Auckland, 30th April, 1901.

Auckland, 30th April, 1901. I HAVE the honour, in accordance with the direction of His Excellency the Governor conveyed to me in your letter of the 4th April instant, "to ascertain the title of certain Natives to land at Takahiwai, in the County of Whangarei, appropriated by them for the site of a school," under "The Native Schools Sites Act, 1880," to report as follows:—

1. I gave public notice by advertisement (printed in English and Maori) in the Northern Advocate, a local newspaper published at Whangarei, that I would hold an inquiry at Takahiwai on the 26th April instant, and caused copies of such notice to be posted in the Native settlement at Takahiwai, and otherwise communicated to the Natives concerned.

cerned.

2. I met the Natives at the Native settlement of Takahiwai on the 27th instant. The following Natives were present: Wiki te Pirihi, Kawhena Paki, Maraea Petimana, Hoone Tana, Hori Petimana, Henare Pirihi, Hori Maki, Hoorowai Honetana, Hohepa Petimana, Wirituki, Wiremu Pirihi, and Paki Pirihi.

Pirihi, and Paki Pirihi.

3. The object of the inquiry was explained to the Natives, and the plan of the site was produced and its locality identified, being the land described in the Schedule hereto. Wiki te Pirihi, the head chief of the settlement, stated that the following were the owners of the site: Wiki te Pirihi, Kawhena Puki, Maraea Petimana, Hoone Tana.

4. Those present unanimously agreed that the Natives named were the owners, and that no other had, or rightfully could have, any claim to the land.

5. The effect of the owners agreeing to the appropriation of the land for the purpose in view having been explained, the Natives named as the owners then severally agreed to the appropriation of the site to the purpose of a Native

the appropriation of the site to the purpose of a Native

6. The whole of the Natives expressed the wish that the owners' act of appropriation, having been for a long time intended, should be given effect to by the Government as

speedily as possible.

7. In conclusion, I am satisfied that the persons named in paragraph 3 hereof are the owners of the land described in the Schedule, being the school-site referred to, and that they severally agreed to the appropriation thereof as a site for a Native school.

The foregoing accounts have been examined and found correct subject to the following re-

1. The "Customs," "Railways," and "Territorial Revenue" receipts are not now examined by the Audit Office.

2. The Audit Office is unable satisfactorily to verify the receipts of gold revenue, through the failure of the Mines Department to comply with a requisition for a certified statement of the amounts collectible as such revenue.

3. The Deputy Commissioner of Stamps, Wellington, failed to make to the Audit the return prescribed by the regulations under the Stamp Act, showing the value of stamps in his hands on the last Saturday in June, in July, and in August, 1900, supported by a certificate by an officer of or on the part of the Audit Office that the stock named in such return had been counted and found correct.

4. The "Advances in the hands of officers of the Government" include payments to the amount of £8,816 15s. 3d., though the accounts of the same were received at the Treasury before the close of the year.

5. The following amounts paid during the financial year are not included in the estimates for the year, as required by section 37 of the Public Revenues Act:—

- (a.) £50, being the amount by which £150 paid in respect of the Khandallah Bridge, as unauthorised expenditure in anticipation of the Appropriation Act, exceeds the sum of £100 included in the estimates;
 - (b.) £17,866 14s. 9d., being sums paid, in respect of charter of steamers to South Africa, as unauthorised expenditure in anticipation of the Appropriation Act;

(c.) £7,020 4s. 3d., being sums paid, under authority of Imprest Supply, as expenditure of the Department of Industries and Commerce for charter of ship to South Africa, &c., and transferred subsequently to the Unauthorised Expenditure Account.

6. The lodgments to the credit of Deposit Accounts include a sum of £5,657 10s. 6d., which was received for the repurchase by the Bank of New Zealand, under section 8 of "The Bank of New Zealand and Banking Act, 1895," of the preferred shares, and which, being such part of "all moneys received for the said repurchase" as consisted of "the amount of all dividends of "all moneys received for the said repurchase" as consisted of "the amount of all dividends accrued and unpaid in respect thereof up to the time of payment of the price," should have been transferred to, and shown in the statement of receipts and expenditure of, "The Bank of New Zealand and Banking Act, 1895," Account, and paid to the Public Trustee.

7. The "Statement of the Receipts and Expenditure of the Government Accident Insurance Loan Account" is not satisfactory. On that account there were the following transactions, which

are not entered, and for the entry of which no requisition has been received from the Treasury:-

- (a.) £1,000, being the sum raised by the Governor in Council as a temporary advance from the Government Insurance Office on the security of the debentures created for £2,000; and
- (b.) £1,000, being the sum so raised, which was placed to the credit of the Government Accident Insurance Account.
- 8. The Treasury Cashier, out of moneys issued to him by way of imprest under votes, made four advances to other officers for unauthorised expenditure, though in each case the application had neither been passed by the Audit Office, nor returned to it with any reply to its objection to the proposal to charge the required advance to a vote.

The following remarks may be added in explanation of the comments made by the Audit Office as above:

 The usual comment: In accordance with law, the heads of revenue named are not now, and have not been for some years past, examined by the Audit Office.

2. The usual comment: It is sufficient to state that the law does not require the statement. 3. The regulations have been amended, and the Deputy Commissioner has complied with

4. These outstandings are known to be unavoidable, and the Audit Office has previously admitted it.

5. (a.) By mistake Parliament was asked to vote £100 instead of £150.

(b) and (c). The Audit Office should have mentioned that a vote for a net sum of £1,000 was taken for these services. It was specially worded so as to provide for recoveries, but the Audit Office decided that no more than the amount voted could be charged; therefore the sums named were transferred to "Unauthorised" until credits are ascertained.

6. The Solicitor-General was consulted, and gave his opinion that it was unnecessary to pay over to the Public Trustee more than the £500,000 of repurchase money.

7. This is a matter concerning the Accident Insurance Branch of the Government Life Insurance Department alone. So far as the Treasury is concerned the facts are that £2,000 of debentures were issued to the Insurance Department, and this amount has to be included in the Public Accounts as a liability of the public debt.

The foregoing accounts have been examined and found correct subject to the following re-

1. The "Customs," "Railways," and "Territorial Revenue" receipts are not now examined

by the Audit Office.

2. The Audit Office is unable satisfactorily to verify the receipts of gold revenue, through the failure of the Mines Department to comply with a requisition for a certified statement of the amounts collectible as such revenue.

3. The "Advances in the hands of officers of the Government" include payments to the amount of £8,816 15s. 3d., though the accounts of the same were received at the Treasury before

the close of the year.

4. The Deposit Accounts, in "The balance at beginning of quarter," include the sum of £5,657 10s. 6d. which, being part of all moneys received for the repurchase by the Bank of New Zealand of its preferred shares, as provided by section 8 of "The Bank of New Zealand and Banking Act, 1895," should have been transferred to "The Bank of New Zealand and Banking Act, 1895," Account, and paid to the Public Trustee.

5. The "Statement of the receipts and expenditure of the Government Accident Insurance Loan Account" is not satisfactory. On that account there were the following transactions which are not entered, and for the entry of which no requisition has been received from the Treasury:

(a.) £1,000, being the sum raised by the Governor in Council as a temporary advance from the Government Insurance Office on the security of the debentures created for £2,000; and

(b.) £1,000, being the sum so raised, which was placed to the credit of the Government

Accident Insurance Account.

6. The Treasury Cashier, out of moneys issued to him by way of imprest under votes, made four advances to other officers for unauthorised expenditure, though in each case the application had neither been passed by the Audit Office nor returned to it with any reply to its objection to the proposal to charge the required advance to a vote.

The following remarks may be added in explanation of the comments made by the Audit Office as above:

- 1. The usual comment: In accordance with law, the heads of revenue named are not now, and have not been for some years past, examined by the Audit Office.

 2. The usual comment: It is sufficient to state that the law does not require the statement.
- 3. These outstandings are known to be unavoidable, and the Audit Office has previously admitted it.

4. The Solicitor-General was consulted, and gave his opinion that it was unnecessary to pay over to the Public Trustee more than the £500,000 of repurchase money.

5. This is a matter concerning the Accident Insurance Branch of the Government Life Insurance Department alone. So far as the Treasury is concerned, the facts are that £2,000 of debentures were issued to the Insurance Department, and this amount has to be included in the

Public Accounts as a liability of the public debt.
6. The officers alluded to were the Commander of the Forces and other military officers who were ordered to visit Australia in connection with the Commonwealth and military business. The

Audit Office is in error in stating that no replies were made to the objections raised.
