In pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in the Governor by "The Registration of Births and Deaths Act, 1875," I, Uchter John Mark, Earl of Ranfurly, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby abolish the existing registration district known as the Pukekohe District, and do proclaim and declare that the territory heretofore comprised within the said district is hereby divided anew into two registration districts, the names whereof shall be the Pukekohe and Rangiriri Districts, and the boundaries whereof shall be coterminous with the boundaries of the marriage districts hearing the with the boundaries of the marriage districts bearing the same names, as are set forth in a Proclamation of even date herewith, made under the provisions of "The Marriage Act,

And I hereby declare that this Proclamation shall come into operation on the eighteenth day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and one.

Districts constituted under "The Marriage Act, 1880."

RANFURLY, Governor. (L.S.) A PROCLAMATION.

In pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in the Governor by "The Marriage Act, 1880," I, Uchter John Mark, Earl of Ranfurly, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby abolish the existing marriage district known as the Pukekohe District, and do proclaim and declare that the territory heretofore comprised within the said district is hereby divided anew into two marriage districts, the names and boundaries whereof shall be as follow: be as follow :-

PUREKOHE DISTRICT.

All that area in the Auckland Land District bounded

towards the north generally by the northern boundary-lines of the Parishes of Pukekohe, Mangatawhiri, and Koheroa respectively, from the north-western corner of the Parish of Pukekohe to the Mangatangi River; thence towards the south-east generally by that river to its confluence with the Maramarua River, thence by the said Maramarua River to its confluence with the Whangamarino River, thence by the said Whangamarino River to the Waikato River, and by a line due west across the said Waikato River, thence towards the south by the southern bank of that river to a point in line with the south-eastern boundary-line of the Parish of Puni; thence towards the west generally by a right line to the said south-eastern boundary-line, and thence by the Parish of Puni aforesaid to the place of commencement. ment.

RANGIRIRI DISTRICT.

All that area in the Auckland Land District bounded towards the north generally by the south bank of the Walkato River from the sea to a point opposite the mouth of the Whangamarino River; thence by a line due east to the mouth of the said river, and thence by the said Whangamarino River to its confluence with the Maramarua River; thence by the said Maramarua River to its confluence with the Mangatangi River; thence by the said Mangatangi River to the northern boundary-line of the Koheroa Parish; thence by the porthern boundary-line of that parish to the towards the north generally by the south bank of the Wai-River to the northern boundary-line of the Koheroa Parish; thence by the northern boundary-line of that parish to the Firth of Thames; and thence by the Firth of Thames to the mouth of the Piako River: thence towards the east generally by the Piako River to its intersection by a right line joining Te Aroha Trig. Station and Putakauere, on the Waikato River: thence towards the south generally by that line to Putakauere aforesaid; thence by a right line to the northern corner of Section No. 22, Parish of Whangape; thence by the eastern shore of Lake Whangape to its southernmost point; and thence by a right line running west-south-west to the sea: and thence towards the west by the sea to the place of commencement. the sea to the place of commencement.

Regulations under "The Hospitals and Charitable Institutions Act, 1885," for the Election of Members of Boards by Contributory Local Authorities in Grouped Districts.

The local authorities named in the first column of the Schedule hereto shall have respectively the number of votes set opposite them in the second column of the said Schedule, and their representative or representatives shall meet at the time and place set opposite the names of such local authorities in the third and fourth columns of the said Schedule respectively to elect such member or members as have been apportioned to such local authorities by Order in Council of the tenth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and one.

2. The Presiding Officer to conduct the election in each case shall be the person named in the fifth column of the said Schedule, opposite the name of each local authority. Any local authority may, if it think fit, send only one representative to such election, and such representative shall then be entitled to exercise the full number of votes which such local authority is given by regulation one aforesaid.

3. Any local authority may appoint, by writing under the hand of the Chairman or Mayor, as the case may be, any person or persons residing at or near the place of meeting as aforesaid to be its representative or representatives at such meeting, and such representative or representatives shall be entitled to exercise the full number of votes which such local authority is given by regulation one.

4. In case any contributory local authority shall not send a representative to such election, the representative or representatives of the local authority or authorities present at the meeting called for such election shall elect the member or members which such local authorities together are entitled to have, and that either at the meeting then held, or at a subsequent meeting to be specially convened for the purpose by the Presiding Officer of such first-mentioned meeting.

5. The Presiding Officer at every meeting of local authorities as aforesaid shall make a return in writing to the Secretary of the Board to which any member has been elected, setting forth the names of the person or persons elected to serve as members of such Board. The Secretary shall thereupon notify the Inspector of Hospitals of the result of such election or elections for publication in the Gazette, and such publication shall be deemed to be prima facie evidence that the persons named therein were duly elected in terms of "The Hospitals and Charitable Institutions Act, 1885."

6. In the event of the number of votes on each side at any election being equal, the Presiding Officer shall give a casting vote.

PHYSICAL AND MEDICAL EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR COMMISSIONS IN THE ARMY.

I. A candidate for a commission in His Majesty's army must be in good mental and bodily health, and free from any physical defect likely to interfere with the efficient performance of military duty.

II. The physical examination will be conducted by a Board of Officers consisting of the Inspector and Assistant Inspector of Gymnasia.

III. The attention of the Board will be directed to the following points:

(a.) That the correlation of age, height, and chest-girth is equal or superior to that which is given in the following

(c.) Measurement of height:—

The candidate will be placed against the standard with his feet together, and the weight thrown on the heel, and not on the toes or outside of the feet. He will stand erect without rigidity, and with the heels, calves, buttocks, and shoulders touching the standard; the chin will be depressed to bring the vertex of the head level under the horizontal bar, and the height will be noted in parts of an inch to eighths.

(c.) Measurement of chest:-

The candidate will be made to stand erect with his feet The candidate will be made to stand erect with his feet together, and to raise his hands above his head. The tape will be carefully adjusted round the chest, with its posterior upper edge touching the inferior angles of the shoulder-blades, and its anterior lower edge the upper part of the nipples. The arms will then be lowered to hang loosely by the side, and care will be taken that the shoulders are not thrown upwards or backwards so as to displace the tape. The candidate will then be directed to empty his chest of air as much as possible. This is best done by continuous whistling with the lips as long as sound can be produced. The tape is carefully gathered in during the process, and when the minimum is reached it is noted.

He will then be directed to inflate his chest to its utmost

He will then be directed to inflate his chest to its utmost spacity. This maximum measurement will likewise be capacity.

The girth, with the chest fully expanded, and the range of expansion between the minimum and maximum, will then be recorded.

(d.) Weight:—
The candidate will also be weighed, and his weight recorded on the proceedings of the Board.

*This paragraph is for inclusion in the regulations respecting admission to the Royal Military Academy and Royal Military College only.

IV. Only those candidates who satisfy the above physical requirements will be permitted to proceed to the medical examination.

Both the physical and medical examination will be held

on the same day and at the same place.

A certificate, signed by the Inspector of Gymnasia, setting forth the physical equivalents of the candidates will be furnished for the information of the Medical Board.

V. The medical examination will be conducted by a Board of Medical Officers. The President will be detailed by the Director General, Army Medical Service; the Assistby the Director General, Army Medical Service; the Assistant Professor of Clinical and Military Surgery, Army Medical School, Netley, the Surgeon, Royal Military Academy, Woolwich, and the Surgeon, Royal Military College, Sandhurst, may be members of the Board ex officio. The other members will be composed of officers of a rank not lower than major, Royal Army Medical Corps, and in their selection due regard should be given to their possession of special qualifications for the duty.

VI. The attention of the Medical Board will be directed

(a.) Eyesight—
The regulations regarding the examination of eyesight are as follows:—

1. If a candidate can read D=6 at 6 metres (20 English feet), and D=0.6 at any distance selected by himself, with each eye without glasses, he will be considered fit.

2. If a candidate can only read D=24 at 6 metres (20 English feet) with each eye without glasses, his visual deficiency being due to faulty refraction, which can be corrected by glasses which enable him to read D=6 at 6 metres (20 English feet) with one eye, and D=12 at the same distance with the other eye, and can also read D=0.8 with each eye without glasses, at any distance selected by himself, he will be considered fit.

3. If a candidate cannot read D=24 at 6 metres (20 English feet) with each eye without glasses, notwithstanding he can read D=0.6, he will be considered unfit.

Normal vision of one eye may be sufficient to allow a higher defect in the other, to the extent of one-sixth, if the defect is simple error in refraction remedied by glasses.

The candidate must be able to read the tests without hesitation in ordinary daylight.

(N.B.—Snellen's test-types will be used for determining the acuteness of vision.)

Squint, inability to distinguish the principal colours, or any morbid conditions subject to the risk of aggravation or recurrence, in either eye, will cause the rejection of a candidate.

THE MAORI COUNCIL OF THE TAMATEA MAORI DISTRICT. By-LAWS.

THE Maori Council of the Tamatea Maori District, constituted under "The Maori Councils Act, 1900," hereby makes the following by-laws under and by virtue of the said Act, such by-laws to come into operation upon approval thereof by the Governor, and the publication of the same in the Gazette and Kahiti:-

Interpretation.

In these by-laws, except when inconsistent with the context, or when otherwise expressly provided, the following expressions shall have the meanings attached thereto:—
"The said Act" means "The Maori Councils Act,

"The Council" means the Maori Council of the Tamatea

Maori District, constituted under the said Act.
"Committee" or "Village Committee" means the
Village Committee or Komiti Marae of a Maori

Village Committee or Komin Marae of a Maori kainga, village, or pa, appointed by the Maori Council under the provisions of the said Act. "District" means the Tamatea Maori District, pro-claimed by the Governor under the said Act by Proclamation dated the 26th day of December,

1900.

"Native township" means a township constituted under "The Native Townships Act, 1895."

"Prescribed" means prescribed by rules or regulations made under the said Act or by these by-laws.

(A.) Health and Personal Convenience. (Section 16, Subsection 1.)

1. Human corpses shall be buried, if the death occurs between the 15th day of March and the 15th day of September (both days inclusive) in any year, within four days after death; and, if the death occurs between the 16th day of September, and the 14th day of March of the following year (both days inclusive), within three days after death, unless the Council shall otherwise direct, or unless it is otherwise provided for by any Act of the General Assembly.

2. It shall be the duty of the nearest relatives of the de-

2. It shall be the duty of the hearest relatives of the deceased, or, in their absence, of the owner or occupier of the house or premises wherein deceased died, to comply with the provisions of the last preceding by-law; and all or any of them shall be deemed to be guilty of a breach thereof as the Council may deem fit, and shall be liable to a penalty not preceding one nound.

exceeding one pound.

3. No human corpse shall be buried, except with the per mission of the Council, in any place other than a burial-ground recognised by the inhabitants of a Macri kainga, or reserved or set apart by them or some duly constituted authority as a burial-ground.

4. No human corpse shall be permitted to lie in state in front of any meeting-house or in the courtyard (marae) thereof, but may lie in state at some other spot in the vicinity that may be indicated by the Chairman of the Village Committee or the member of Council for the riding.

(B.) Cleansing Houses.

(Section 16, Subsection 2.)

5. The Chairman of the Council, or any person duly authorised by the Council in that behalf, may by notice in writing direct the owner or occupier of any house or other building in a dirty and unwholesome state to clean or cause the same in a dirty and unwholesome states to crean or cause the same to be cleaned within a time to be specified in such notice, which may be in Form A in the Schedule hereto. And if after service of such notice upon him any person shall refuse or neglect to comply with such notice, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one pound for the first offence and not exceeding two nounds for every subsequent offence.

not exceeding two pounds for every subsequent offence.

6. The Council may order the removal or destruction of any building in a dirty and unwholesome state, if in its opinion it is unsuitable for human accommodation, or if the owner or occupier thereof fails after due notice to clean, renovate, or himself remove or destroy the same. Any costs

struction shall be a debt due to the Council, recoverable as liquidated damages by process in the Magistrate's Court.

7. If any such building is occupied by any person who, being ill, old, or feeble, is in the opinion of the Council or of

being ill, old, or feeble, is in the opinion or the council of a Village Committee, not competent or able to comply with the provisions of the two last preceding by laws, the Council or Committee may in their discretion modify the application of such by laws to meet the circumstances. The Chairman of such by-laws to meet the circumstances. The Chairman of the Village Committee shall report the case and all the circumstances to the Chairman of the Council, whereupon the Council shall consider such case and decide whether it shall devote part of its funds towards cleansing and otherwise improving the dwellings of such sick, old, or feeble persons.

(C.) Nuisances.

(Section 16, Subsection 3.)

8. No nightsoil, refuse, or offensive rubbish shall be cast or deposited or allowed to flow into any spring, stream, or watercourse that flows through or past a Maori kainga and which is used as a water-supply by the inhabitants of such kainga, or any other kainga on the banks of such stream or near such spring.

9. No person who is the owner or occupier of any premises within a Maori kainga shall permit or suffer any nightsoil or refuse or any offensive rubbish or matter of any kind whatever to accumulate or remain or be in or upon such premises so as to be injurious or dangerous to health or so

as to cause an offensive smell.

10. No horses, cattle, sheep, dogs, or other animals shall

be buried within a Maori kainga.

11. No person shall throw or leave any dead animal on any property within a Maori kainga whereby any offensive smell is or is likely to be created.

12. Every person who commits a breach of any of the By-laws 8, 9, 10, and 11 shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one pound.

ceeding one pound.

13. No alcoholic liquor shall be supplied, drunk, or brought to any Maori hui, gathering, or meeting of any kind or for any purpose whatsoever, whether held in a Maori kainga or

any purpose whatsoever, whether held in a Maori Kainga or at any other place within the district, except townships and European lots in a Native township.

14. Where a public meeting is held by invitation, the person or persons issuing such invitation shall be jointly and severally liable, if he or they supply or cause to be supplied any alcoholic liquor to the visitors, or any of them, or to any person whatsoever attending such meeting, to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

15. Any person found drunk at any Maori meeting shall be liable to a fine of not less than ten shillings and not

exceeding two pounds.

16. Any person found drunk in any Maori kainga shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five shillings for the first offence, not exceeding ten shillings for the second offence, and not exceeding one pound for every subsequent offence.

17. Any person shall be guilty of an offence who—

(1.) Being drunk, or under the influence of liquor, enters

Being drunk, or under the influence of liquor, enters a meeting-house, or a church, or some other public building within a Maori pa.
 Takes any alcoholic liquor into such meeting-house, church, or public building.
 Drinks or causes any one else to drink any alcoholic liquor in any such meeting-house, church, or public building.

Inquor in any such meeting-house, church, or public building.

And such person shall be liable to a penalty of not less than five shillings and not exceeding one pound for a first offence, and not exceeding two pounds for every subsequent offence.

(E.) Hawkers.

(Section 16, Subsection 13.)

18. The following by-laws shall apply to Indian, Assyrian, and other hawkers selling their wares in the Maori kaingas within the district—that is to say:—

(1.) Such person shall have a license from the Council

before he may vend his wares within the kaingas of the district.

(2.) Such license shall be in the Form E in the Schedule hereto, and shall have force throughout the whole of the district, and the fee therefor shall be two

(3.) The Chairman or the Clerk of the Council, or any member of the Council duly authorised by the Council in that behalf, is empowered to issue any such license.

(4.) All fees paid for licenses shall be forwarded to the office of the Council.
(5.) Any person hawking goods without license within Maori kaingas in the district shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

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(F.) Billiard-rooms.

(Section 16, Subsection 15.)

19. No billiard-room shall be constructed and no billiard table erected within any Maori kainga, or at any other place within the district except townships and European settlements: Provided that this by-law shall have force in respect of Maori lots within a Native township. Any person guilty of a breach of this by-law shall be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty-five pounds, and the Council shall have power to remove or destroy such billiard room or table, and shall not be liable for such removal or destruction. struction.

Village Committees.

20. The Council may delegate all or any of its powers under the foregoing by-laws to the Village Committee of any Maori kainga, village, or pa, and such Committee shall thereupon have full authority to exercise such powers within such kainga, village, or pa.

21. The Village Committee may impose a fine cr a penalty for the breach of a by-law, but if the same is not paid within a specified time the Chairman of the Committee shall thereupon report such breach and all the circumstances of the case, and the failure to pay the fine or penalty imposed, to the Chairman of the Council.

Te Makarini Scholarships, held at Te Aute College, Hawke's Bay.

HREE scholarships of the yearly value of £35, tenable for two years, are offered for competition. IN pursuance of all powers and authorities enabling me under "The Government Railways Act, 1900," I, Joseph George Ward, Minister for Railways, do hereby make the following alterations in the scale of fares, rates, and charges in force on the New Zealand Government railways open for traffic, such alterations to come into force on and after the 26th day of February, 1901:—
