Amendments to the Volunteer Regulations.

RANFURLY, Governor.

WHEREAS by "The Defence Act, 1886," it is, among other things, enacted that the Governor may from to time make, alter, or revoke regulations respecting, *inter alia*, the enrolment, promotion, discipline, training, exer-cise, and pay of the Forces, or any portion thereof, and respecting the several other matters in the said Act relating to Volumeers." respecting the several other matters in the said Act relating to Volunteers: And whereas on the twenty-sixth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, cer-tain regulations were made under the said Act, and were published in the *New Zealand Gazette* of the twenty-eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five: And whereas it is expedient to revoke part of the said regu-lations and to make additional regulations as hereinafter set forth. forth :

Now, therefore, I, Uchter John Mark, Earl of Ranfurly, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the above-recited power and authority, do hereby revoke regulation number fifty-nine of the said recited regulations, and do hereby make the several additional regu-lations set forth in the First and Second Schedules hereto. And I do further declare that the regulations hereby made shall come into force on the twenty-sixth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and two.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

300. REGULATIONS FOR SCHOOLS OF INSTRUCTION FOR OFFICERS AND NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS.

1. STAFF ESTABLISHMENT.

While so attached regimental sergeant-major, R.A., will be allowed 4s. per diem, the sergeant-major, mounted in-fantry and infantry duties, 2s. per diem, clerk, 2s. per diem, extra; and the acting adjutant 5s. per diem extra-duty pay, exclusive of Sundays. 2. With a view to raise the standard of proficiency of officers and N.C.O.s of New Zealand Forces, classes of in-

struction will be held from time to time under the direction of the Commandant of the Forces.

3. Courses for officers and N.C.O.s of the various arms will be arranged for by the Commandant, Schools of Instruc-tion. Places and dates will be published in General Orders from time to time, as follows:

For officers-

A course : Headquarters corps. B course : Outlying corps.

For N.C.O.s-

C course : Headquarters corps.

D course : Outlying corps.

4. HOURS OF ATTENDANCE.

A Class.--7.30 p.m. to 9.30 p.m. Mondays to Fridays, 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday afternoons; and will extend over about six weeks.

B Class.—6.30 a.m. to 7.30 a.m., 9 a.m. to 11.30 a.m., 2 p.m. to 5 p.m., and lectures in the evening; and will be for three weeks. *C Class.*—Same as for A. *D Class.*—Same as for B.

5. Applications to attend courses for which dates have been fixed must be forwarded (see form of application) through officers commanding districts, to reach head-quarters at least fourteen days prior to date of commencement of course.

ment of course. All correspondence addressed to Commandant, School of Instruction, should be forwarded through officers com-manding districts, unless otherwise notified. 6. Officers and N.C.O.s attending B and D classes respec-tively will be accommodated, as far as is found practicable, in barracks, a daily charge being made for messing, and applications should state whether candidates desire to avail themselves of the accommodation provided. N.C.O.s will be attached for maintenance to the Permanent Artillery, and will be charged about 2s. per diem for messing. will be charged about 2s. per diem for messing.

7. Allowances.

Free railway passes and passages to join the courses, and return journey, will be granted to all officers and N.C.O.s selected.

Subject to passing the examination at the conclusion of the course, and on recommendation of the Commandant of the School, the following will be allowed :--

For B and D courses: Officers, 6s. 6d. per diem and N.C.O.s 5s. per diem for the period over which the course extends.

For A and C courses: A grant of £4 for officers, and for N.C.O.s £2 and a badge.

An extra grant, £2 per annum for two years after date of passing examination, will be made towards capitation of corps for each officer and N.C.O. who has passed the School of Instruction in all subjects, and is in possession of the capitation of the certificate.

Bedding will be supplied, but candidates must bring their own blankets.

THE MAORI COUNCIL OF THE MANIAPOTO MAORI DISTRICT.

THE Maori Council of the Maniapoto Maori District, con-stituted under "The Maori Councils Act, 1900," hereby makes the following by-laws under and by virtue of the said Act, such by-laws to come into operation upon approval thereof by the Governor, and the publication of the same in the Covernor, and the publication of the same in the Gazette and Kahiti:

Interpretation.

In these by-laws, except when inconsistent with the con-"The said Act" means "The Maori Councils Act, 1900."

- "The Council" means the Maori Council of the Mania poto Maori District, constituted under the said Act.
- Act.
 "Committee" or "Village Committee" means the Village Committee or Komiti Marae of a Maori kainga, village, or pa, appointed by the Maori Council under the provisions of the said Act.
 "District" means the Maniapoto Maori District, pro-claimed by the Governor under the said Act by Proclamation dated the 26th day of December, 1000
 - 1900.
 - "Native township" means a township constituted under "The Native Townships Act, 1895." "Prescribed" means prescribed by rules or regula-tions made under the said Act or by these by-laws.

(A.) Health and Personal Convenience.

(Section 16, Subsection 1.)

1. Human corpses shall be buried, if the death occurs be-tween the 15th day of March and the 15th day of September (both days inclusive) in any year, within four days after death; and, if the death occurs between the 16th day of September and the 14th day of March of the following year (both days inclusive), within three days after death, unless the Council shall otherwise direct, or unless it is otherwise provided for by any Act of the General Assembly.

2. It shall be the duty of the nearest relatives of the deceased, or, in their absence, of the owner or occupier of the house or premises wherein deceased died, to comply with the provisions of the last preceding by law; and all or any of them shall be deemed to be guilty of a breach thereof as the Council may deem fit, and shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one pound.

3. No human corpse shall be buried, except with the permission of the Council, in any place other than a burial-ground recognised by the inhabitants of a Maori kainga, or reserved or set apart by them or some duly constituted au-thority as a burial-ground.

4. No human corpse shall be permitted to lie in state in front of any meeting-house or in the courtyard (marae) thereof, but may lie in state at some other spot in the vicinity that may be indicated by the Chairman of the Village Committee or the member of Council for the

riding. 5. The Council may, by notice in writing in Form A in 5. The Council may, by notice in writing in Form A in the Schedule hereto, require the owner or occupier of any house within a kaings (other than cooking-houses, kautas, and out-buildings) which shall be eracted after the coming into operation of these by-laws to construct a floor for the same (within a time to be specified in such notice), to be approved by the Council or any person or body it may authorize in the bahalf authorise in that behalf.

6. Any person who, after service upon him of such notice as aforesaid, refuses or neglects, within the time specified in such notice, or such further time as the Council may allow, to comply with the same, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one pound.

7. The Council may, in lieu of notice referred to in By-law No. 5, by notice in writing in Form B in the Schedule. law No. 5, by notice in writing in Form B in the Schedule, hereto, require the owner or occupier of any such building as is referred to in By-law No. 5 to construct or provide a couch or raised bedstead in such house at least 1ft. above the ground; and any person who, after service of such notice, shall refuse or neglect within the time specified in such notice to comply with the same shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one pound.

(B.) Cleansing Houses.

(Section 16, Subsection 2.)

8. The Chairman of the Council, or any person duly autho-rised by the Council in that behalf, may by notice in writing direct the owner or occupier of any house or other building in a dirty and unwholesome state to clean or cause the same

direct the owner or occupier of any house or other building in a dirty and unwholesome state to clean or cause the same to be cleaned within a time to be specified in such notice, which may be in Form C in the Schedule hereto. And if after service of such notice upon him any person shall refuse or neglect to comply with such notice, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one pound for the first offence and not exceeding two pounds for every subsequent offence. 9. The Council may order the removal or destruction of any building in a dirty and unwholesome state, if in its opinion it is unsuitable for human accommodation, or if the owner or occupier thereof fails after due notice to clean, renovate, or himself remove or destroy the same. Any costs incurred by the Council in and about such removal or de-struction shall be a debt due to the Council, recoverable as liquidated damages by process in the Magistrate's Court. 10. The Village Committee may in its discretion ease or modify the application of the foregoing By-laws Nos. 8 and 9, in the case of any old, ill, or feeble person occu-pying any such buildings as aforesaid, so that such by-law may not press heavily on such person. The Chairman of the Village Committee shall report the case and all the circumstances to the Chairman of the Council, whereupon the Council shall consider such case and decide whether it shall devote part of its funds towards cleansing and other-wise improving the dwellings of such sick, old, or feeble persons. (C.) Nuisances. persons.

(C.) Nuisances.

(Section 16, Subsection 3.)

11. No nightsoil, refuse, or offensive rubbish shall be cast or deposited or allowed to flow into any spring, stream, or watercourse that flows through or past a Maori kainga

or watercourse that flows through or past a Maori kainga and which is used as a water-supply by the inhabitants of such kainga, or any other kainga on the banks of such stream or near such spring.
12. No person who is the owner or occupier of any premises within a Maori kainga shall permit or suffer any nightsoil or refuse or any offensive rubbish or matter of any kind whatever to accumulate or remain or be in or upon such premises, or upon any footpath, street, drain, or any public thoroughfare, so as to be injurious or dangerous to health or so as to cause an offensive smell.
13. No horses, cattle, sheep, dogs, or other animals shall be buried within a Maori kainga.
14. No person shall permit or suffer any dead animal or any portion of any dead animal to be upon or to lie upon his land or any portion thereof occupied by him in close proximity to the public road or any public place so as to cause an offensive smell.
15. No person shall throw or leave any dead animal on the present of the public road or any public place so as to cause an offensive smell.

15. No person shall throw or leave any dead animal on any property within a Maori kainga or upon a public road whereby any offensive smell is or is likely to be created.

16. Every person who commits a breach of any of the By-laws Nos. 11, 12, 13, 14, and 15 shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one pound.

(D.) Drunkenness.

(Section 16, Subsection 4.)

No alcoholic liquor shall be supplied, drunk, or brought to any Maori *hui*, gathering, or meeting of any kind, or for any purpose whatsoever, whether held in a Maori kainga or at any other place within the district, except townships and European lots in a Native township. 18. Where a public meeting is held by invitation, the person or persons issuing such invitation shall be jointly and severally liable, if he or they supply or cause to be supplied any alcoholic liquor to the visitors, or any of them, or to any person whatsoever attending such meeting, to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds. 19. Any person found drunk at any kainga or Maori meet-ing shall be liable to a fine of not less than ten shillings and not exceeding two pounds.

ing shall be hable to a fine of not less than ten shiftings and not exceeding two pounds. 20. Any person found drunk in any Maori kainga shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five shillings for the first offence, not exceeding ten shillings for the second offence, and not exceeding one pound for every subsequent offence. 21. Any person shall be guilty of an offence who— (1.) Being drunk, or under the influence of liquor, enters

a meeting-house, or a church, or some other public building within a Maori pa.

- (2.) Takes any alcoholic liquor into such meeting-house, church, or public building. (3.) Drinks or causes any one else to drink any alcoholic
- liquor in any such meeting-house, church, or pub

lic building. And such person shall be liable to a penalty of not less than five shillings and not exceeding one pound for a first offence, and not exceeding two pounds for every subsequent offence.

(E.) Tohungas.

(Section 16, Subsection 5.)

22. It shall not be lawful for any tohunga or alleged tohunga to cause any patient under his treatment to bathe in cold water.

in cold water. 23. It shall not be lawful for any such *tohunga* to hinder or prevent the attendance of a duly qualified medical prac-titioner on such patient, or the treatment of such patient with European medicines suitable to the complaint or pre-scribed by a duly qualified medical practitioner. 24. It shall not be lawful for any person alleged to be a *tohunga* to charge or receive any fee or reward for his services.

services. 25. Any person committing a breach of the above By-laws Nos. 22, 23, and 24 shall be liable to a penalty not ex-ceeding ten pounds. 26. Wherever, on account of the practices of any person alleged to be a *tohunga*, he gathers a following and establishes himself in any kainga, or travels from one kainga to another with such following, so as, in the opinion of the Council or of any Village Committee, to cause serious inconvenience to the inhabitants of any kainga, or to any of them, by causing waste of food or substance, or in any other way, the Council may, by notice in writing, direct such *tohunga* to desist from such practices, and if he persist the Council may impose a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds. 27. The Council may grant a license, after full inquiry, to

27. The Council may grant a license, after full inquiry, to persons skilled in the use of Maori herbs or *wairakau*, for such term and subject to such conditions as the Council may deem fit. Such license shall have force only within the district.

(F.) Dog Registration.

(Section 16, Subsection 7.)

The fee for the registration of any dog of a greater age than six months, owned by a Maori within the district, shall be three shillings: Provided that when dogs are kept for the sole purpose of the management of sheep or cattle, or for the destruction of rabbits, the fee for registration shall be two shillings and sixnera

be two shillings and sixpence. 29. The fee shall be paid and registration made at the office of the Council, or to persons authorised under the seal of the Council to receive such fee and make such registration.

(G.) Stray Cattle.

(Section 16, Subsection 8.)

30. Any person allowing cattle, horses, or other cattle to roam at large in a Maori kainga or through the streets of any kainga occupied as a township may be fined the sum of not more than two shillings and sixpence for each animal (cattle or horses), and one shilling for each sheep, pig, or goat. goat.

31. Any person furiously riding a horse in any kalnga or through any streets of any Maori kalnga occupied as a township, or furiously driving any sledge, wagon, carriage, or other vehicle through the same, may be fined a sum not exceeding one pound.

(H.) Hawkers.

(Section 16, Subsection 13.)

32. The following by-laws shall apply to Indian, Assyrian, and other hawkers selling their wares in the Maori kaingas within the district—that is to say :-(1.) Such person shall have a license from the Council before he may vend his wares within the kaingas

- (5.) The Secretary shall register the name and residence of all persons to whom licenses are issued. The of all persons to whom licenses are issued. The said register shall be open to all persons who may wish to inspect the same. The fee for each search shall be one shilling.
 (6.) Any person hawking goods without license within Maori kaingas in the district shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

(7.) The Council may cancel the license of any hawker if it is proved that such hawker is a confirmed drunkard or has been convicted by the law of

drunkard or has been convicted by the law of larceny or any other criminal offence. 53. A special license may be issued by the Chairman or Clerk or any member of the Council, or by the Chairman of the Village Committee of a kainga where any hui or gather-ing is held, to any person desirous of hawking and selling goods at such hui or gathering, on payment of a fee of one pound. Such license shall be in force only while such hui or gathering lasts, and no longer. Any person hawking and selling goods at such hui or gathering without special license, or a license as provided in the foregoing by-laws, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

(J.) Smoking.

(Section 16, Subsection 14.)

34. Every person, whether European or Maori, who sells, gives, or supplies any cigarette, tobacco, or torori to any Maori youth under the age of fifteen years shall be deemed guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds. 35. Every Maori youth under the age of fifteen years who smakes tobacco torori or a cigarette, or any part of a cigar-

smokes tobacco, torori, or a cigarette, or any part of a cigar-ette, shall be deemed to be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable for the first offence to a penalty not exceeding five shillings, for the second offence to a penalty not exceeding ten shillings, and for a third or subsequent offence to a penalty of one pound penalty of one pound.

(K.) Gambling.

(Section 16, Subsection 15.)

36. Any person, whether Maori or otherwise, desirous of establishing a billiard-room in any kainga, village, or pa, and any Maori desirous of establishing a billiard-room at any other place within the district, except townships (but not Maori lots within a Native township) and European settlements, shall first obtain a license from the Council, which may be

- granted subject to the following terms and conditions :---(a.) Such license shall be in Form E in the Schedule hereto.

 - (b.) The fee for such license shall be five pounds. (c.) Such license shall remain in force for twelve months from the date thereof (unless sooner revoked by the Council as hereinafter provided).

No Maori youth under the age of fifteen years shall be permitted to play billiards on such licensed premises, and, if discovered playing therein, the licensee or the person for the time being in charge of the premises shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds for the first offence, and for a second offence the Council may revoke the license.

(g.) Renewal of license must be applied for before the expiry of the term for which a license has been granted.

Any Maori youth under the age of fifteen years found playing billiards in any place whatsoever shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings for the first offence, not exceeding ten shillings for the second offence, and for a third or subsequent offence to a penalty not exceeding one pound.
38. Any person keeping a billiard-room or a billiard-table in any Maori kainga, and any Maori keeping such a room or table at any other place within the district except townships (but not Maori lots within a Native township) and European settlements, without license from the Council, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty-five pounds.

Any person found playing for money, whether by cards or any other game, within the precincts of any kainga, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten shillings for the first offence, not exceeding one pound for the second offence, and not exceeding two pounds for every subsequent offence. 40. Any person, Maori or otherwise, the owner or occupier of any house or premises situate in any Maori kainga who shall permit or allow gambling or playing for money (other than billiards in duly licensed premises) in such house or upon such premises shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten shillings for the first offence, not exceeding one pound for the second offence, and not exceeding two pounds for for the second offence, and not exceeding two pounds for every subsequent offence: Provided that in the event of any owner being absent when an offence as aforesaid is committed such owner shall not be liable.

* The remaining suburbs do not lie within borough boundaries, and particulars respecting them have not been obtained for the Vital Statistics. The total population of Auckland and its suburbs was 67,926 persons, and that of Christchurch with its complete suburbs amounted to 57,041 persons at the date of the census, March, 1901.

Deaths occurring at hospitals, of persons not residents of the borough wherein the hospital is situated, have been allotted in each case to the borough where the disease was contracted, and not to that in which the death actually took place.

place. The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 476, against 388 in December—an increase of 88. The deaths in January were 187—an increase of 31 on the number in December. Of the total deaths, males contributed 106, females 81. Forty-six of the deaths were of children under five years of age, being 24.60 per cent. of the whole number; 39 of these were under one year of age.

There were forty-nine deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: Seven men, 67, 68, 69, 70, 78 (two), 79, and five women, 65, 66, 73, 80, 84, died at Auckland; four men, 66, 67, 73, 74, and eight women, 67, 70, 71, 72 (two), 75, 76, 86, at Wellington; six men, 66, 69, 72, 73, 74, 79, and seven women, 69, 73, 76 (two), 83, 84, 85, at Christchurch; and nine men, 67, 70, 72 (two), 78, 87, 89, 90, 92, and three women, 67, 70, 90, at Dunedin.

In the first table are given the deaths and death-rates for each of the four cities, for the suburban boroughs severally, and for each city with its suburban towns. As regards Auckland and Christchurch, the whole of the area usually recognised as suburban has not yet been brought under municipal government, and the vital statistics do not deal with such portions as still remain in road districts. But the omission is not very important, for there are in either case quite enough suburbs included within borough boundaries to give a fair idea of the death-rate of Greater Auckland and Greater Christchurch. As further boroughs are formed the vital statistics will be made to include them.

The inclusion of the suburban boroughs tends to lower the rate at Wellington and Christchurch, but raises it at Auckland and Dunedin.

Specific Febrile or Zymotic Diseases.—Influenza caused 2 deaths in January, both at Auckland. From diarrhœa there were 16 deaths—4 at Auckland, 4 at Wellington, 7 at Christohurch, and 1 at Dunedin. Including with the above 1 death of a child from congenital syphilis gives the total mortality in this class for the month—viz., 19 deaths at the chief centres.

Constitutional Diseases.---Of 40 deaths, 19 were from phthisis, and 3 from other tubercular diseases; 13 from cancer. There were also 2 from diabetes.

Local Diseases.—These deaths numbered 97 for January, against 80 in December: 23 of these were from nervous diseases, including 9 apoplexy and 7 paralysis; 24 deaths occurred from disease of the circulatory system, 17 of the respiratory, 24 of the digestive, 2 of the lymphatic, 5 of the urinary, 1 of the reproductive, and 1 of the integumentary systems.

Violent Deaths.—There were 7 accidental and 2 suicidal deaths. Of the accidental deaths, 1 was caused by fall from a bicycle, another by fall from a tram. There was 1 case of drowning, and 1 of accidental poisoning. The suicides were by means of poison and shooting.

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The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of the four centres from six principal specific febrile or symptic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.
