City Corporation of Christchurch authorised to erect and lay down Electric Lines in the City of Christchurch.

In exercise of the power and authority conferred upon me by "The Electric Lines Act, 1884," I, Joseph George Ward, the Electric Telegraph Commissioner appointed under the said Act, do hereby authorise and license the Corporation of the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of Christchurch (hereinatter referred to as "the Corporation") to erect, construct, lay down, and maintain electric lines for lighting and power purposes through the several streets in the City of Christchurch which are shown on the plan (marked "B") deposited in the office of the Superintendent of Electric Lines, and on which plan the electric lines are indicated by red lines, and which is signed by me as such Commissioner as aforesaid, subject to the following con-Commissioner as aforesaid, subject to the following conditions, namely :-

The system for the supply of electrical energy shall be that known as the low-pressure, continuous-current, two- or

three-wire system.

2. Continuous current shall be generated at a voltage not exceeding 250 volts when two wires are used, or 500 volts between the two outers of the system when three wires are used. The declared pressure at the consumer's terminals shall be 220 and 440 volts. Incandescent lamps shall be sup-

shall be 220 and 440 volts. Incandescent lamps shall be supplied at a pressure of 220 volts.

3. All overhead conductors crossing telegraph or telephone wires shall be insulated throughout their entire length with a grade of rubber insulation of not less than 300 megohms per mile, and in other places with duplex waterproof compounded insulation.

4. The main switchboard shall be made of and be mounted upon material that is not inflammable.

5. The said electric-lighting lines and wires may be placed wholly underground and

wholly underground or overhead, or partly underground and partly overhead. All overhead lines shall be placed on the opposite side of the streets where any telegraph or telephone opposite side of the streets where any telegraph or telephone lines exist at the time of their erection, except by permission from the Electric Telegraph Commissioner.

6. Where the erection of the electric-light line or wires necessitates the alteration of existing telegraph or telephone lines or wires, the expense of such alterations shall be borne by the above-named Corporation.

7. The maximum working-current in any conductor shall

not be sufficient to raise the temperature of the conductor, or any part thereof, to such an extent as to materially alter the physical condition or specific resistance of the insulating covering, if any, or in any case to raise such temperature to a greater extent than 30° Fahr. The cross-sectioned area and conductivity at joints must be sufficient to avoid local heating, and the joints must be carefully made, using resin as a flux, and must be protected against corrosion. The sectional area of all conductors from any distribution block must be maintained throughout the circuit, and joints should be made only when branching off a circuit, and should be at least 8 in. distant from a joint in a conductor of opposite polarity.

polarity.

8. The sectional area of the conductor in any electric line laid or erected in any street shall not be less than the area of a circle of 10 in. diameter, and where the conductor is formed of a strand of wires each separate wire shall be at least as large as No. 20 standard wire gauge.

9. All material used for insulating electric lines or apparatus shall be of the best quality, and thoroughly durable and efficient, having regard to the conditions of its use. Suitable provision shall be made for the protection of the insulating material against injury or removal.

If the protection so provided be wholly or partly metallic

If the protection so provided be wholly or partly metallic it shall be efficiently connected with earth.

10. Any metallic body to be "efficiently connected with earth" shall be connected with the general mass of the earth in such manner as will insure at all times an immediate and safe discharge of electrical energy.

11. Every main shall be tested for insulation after having been placed in position and before it is used for the purposes of supply, the testing pressure being at least 220 volts, and the Corporation shall duly record the results of the tests of each main or section of a main.

each main or section of a main.
12. The insulation of every complete circuit used for the supply of energy, including all machinery, apparatus, and devices forming part of or in connection with such circuit, shall be so maintained that the leakage-current shall not under any conditions exceed one-thousandth part of the maximum supply-current; and suitable means shall be provided for the immediate indication and localisation of leakage. Every leakage shall be remedied without delay.

Every such circuit shall be tested for insulation at least once in every week, and the Corporation shall duly record

the results of the testings:

Provided that where the Electric Telegraph Commissioner has approved of any part of any electric circuit being connected with earth the provisions of this section shall not apply to that circuit so long as the connection with earth

13. Where any portion of any electric line or any support for an electric line is exposed in such a position as to be liable to injury from lightning it shall be efficiently pro-

14. Every aerial line shall be attached to supports at intervals not exceeding 200 ft. where the direction of the line is straight, or 150 ft. where the direction is curved or where the line makes a horizontal angle at the point of

support.

15. Every support for an aerial line shall be of a durable aterial, and properly stayed against forces due to wind-pressure, change of direction of the line, or unequal lengths of span. The factor of safety shall be for aerial lines and suspending wires at least 6, and for all other parts of the structure at least 12, taking the maximum possible wind-pressure at 50 lb. per square foot. No addition need be made for a possible accumulation of snow.

Every support, if of metal, and all iron pillars shall be efficiently connected with earth.

16. All aerial lines shall be attached to porcelain insulators, and shall be so guarded that they cannot fall away from the support. Conductors covered with insulating material shall not be attached to the insulators by uninsulated metal binders. binders.

17. Any aerial line or wire shall not in any part thereof be at a less height from the ground than 18 ft., or within 5 ft. measured horizontally or 7 ft. measured vertically from any building or erection other than a support for the line, except where brought into a building for the purpose of

except where brought into a building for the purpose of supply.

18. Service lines from aerial lines shall be led as directly as possible to insulators firmly attached to some portion of the consumer's premises which is not accessible to any person without the use of a ladder or other special appliance. Every portion of any service line which is outside a building but is within 7 ft. from the building shall be completely enclosed in stout indiarubber tubing.

19. Where an aerial line crosses a street the angle between the line and the direction of the street at the place of crossing shall not be less than 60°, and the spans shall be as

short as possible.

20. Where an aerial line crosses or is in proximity to any metallic substance, precautions shall be taken against the possibility of the line coming into contact with the metallic substance, or of the metallic substance coming into contact

with the line, by breakage or otherwise.

21. Efficient guard-wires shall be erected in a manner to meet with the approval of the Electric Telegraph Commissioner at all crossings and places where aerial electric-lighting wires intersect telegraph or telephone wires as may be required by the Commissioner to be so protected. The Corporation shall bear the expense of such guard-wires in all cases where an aerial electric-lighting wire intersects a tele-

cases where an aerial electric-lighting wire intersects a telegraph or telephone wire previously existing.

22. Every aerial line, including its supports and all the structural parts and electrical appliances and devices belonging to or connected with the line, shall be duly and efficiently supervised and maintained as regards both electrical and mechanical conditions.

23. An aerial line shall not be permitted to remain erected after it has ceased to be used for the supply of energy, unless the Corporation intend within a reasonable time again to take it into use.

24. Where the electric lines are run in cables laid under-

ground, the cables may be placed in conduits, metal pipes, or solid in wood troughing, and all such receptacles shall be constructed of durable materials, which shall be of sufficient

strength and be buried deeply enough to resist damage from heavy traffic. Reasonable means shall be taken and periodical inspection made by the Corporation to prevent accumulations of gas in those receptacles. Underground feeder-cables, lead-covered and well armoured, may be laid direct in the ground. The conductors of all underground cables shall be well insulated from earth, and from each other in the case of multiple conductor cables.

Where any underground electric line crosses or is in proximity to any metallic substance, special precautions shall be taken by the Corporation against the possibility of any electrical discharge to the metallic substance from the line, or from any metal conduit, pipe, or covering enclosing the

26. All metal conduits, pipes, or coverings containing any electric line shall be efficiently connected with earth, and shall be so jointed and connected up as to make good electrical connection throughout their whole length.

27. Where isolated lengths of metal conduit, pipe, or covering are used for the protection of any electric line at road-crossings or similar positions, special precautions shall be taken to prevent the possibility of any electrical charging

28. All metal pipes or casings containing any electric line shall be efficiently connected with earth, and shall be so jointed as to make good electrical connection throughout

their whole length.

29. The Corporation shall be responsible for all electric lines, fittings, and apparatus belonging to them, or under their control, which may be upon a consumer's premises, being maintained in a safe condition and in all respects fit

for supplying energy.

30. In delivering the energy to a consumer's terminals the Corporation shall exercise all due precautions so as to avoid

- corporation snail exercise all due precautions so as to avoid risk of causing fire on the premises.

 31. All electric lines and apparatus placed on a consumer's premises shall be highly insulated, excepting such parts as are required to be connected with earth, and thoroughly protected against injury to the insulation or access of moisture, and any metal forming part of the electric circuit shall not, unless efficiently connected with earth, be exposed so that it can be touched. All electric lines shall be so fixed and protected as to prevent the possibility of electrical discharge to any adjacent metallic substance.
- 32. Where the demand from the three-wire system does not exceed 21 kilowatts the service mains for all installations, whether of lighting (excepting arc-lighting) or power, shall consist of two conductors taken from one outer and the neutral wire.

33. Where the demand for lighting from the three-wire system exceeds 2½ kilowatts the main may consist of three conductors taken from the two outers and the middle wire, and where three conductors are used for the service mains the premises shall be wired with two circuits kept separate from each other, and the load shall be divided as nearly as possible equally between them.

34. The Corporation shall fix, where their service mains terminate on any premises, single-pole well-protected fuses on each conductor of at least 2½ in. clear break. Double-pole main switches shall also be fixed of ample carrying-capacity, well insulated, with quick break of sufficient clearance to prevent arcing. When the premises are wired for a consumption of 5 kilowatts or over, either from the two-wire system, or from one outer and the neutral wire or from poin outer wires and the neutral wire of the three-wire system, the break switches should be fitted with magnetic blow-out or other equivalent device for extinguishing the arc, and a distance of at least 4 in. shall separate their poles. Where the supply is from one outer and the neutral wire or from both outer wires at least 4 in. shall separate their poles. Where the supply is taken from the two outers and the middle wire two double-pole break switches shall be used, the neutral wire being joined to one terminal of each, and they shall be placed not less than 6 in. apart. They may be arranged to operate simultaneously.

35. All wiring shall be done from distributing-boards, which shall be of incombustible material. Suitable fuses on each pole fitted to engage in spring clips shall be placed on these boards, so that it shall be possible to disconnect any

on these boards, so that it shall be possible to disconnect any or all circuits from the supply.

36. The covers of fuses, switches, and plugs shall be of porcelain or other incombustible non-conducting material, or of rigid metal lined with vitreous enamel or suchlike substance. All metal parts liable to be touched must be effectively insulated from the electrical circuit. Where switchboards are accessible only to some responsible person, separate insulated covers for the parts mounted thereon will not be required. not be required.

37. There must be a porcelain bridge or other efficient in-

31. There must be a porceian bridge of other emicient insulation between the terminals of lamp-holders, and where lamp-holders are liable to be handled by persons making good earth contact they must be provided with non-conducting covers. Not more than ten sixteen-candle-power lamps, or their equivalent, shall be controlled by each switch.

38. The insulation-resistance of conductors used for the wiring of buildings for lighting or heating purposes shall not withing of bindings for lighting or heating purposes shall not be less than 600 megohms per mile after one minute's electrification and twenty-four hours' immersion in water immediately preceding the test. Concentric conductors may be used, and their insulation-resistance shall not be less than that required for separate conductors.

39. All are lamps shall be so guarded as to prevent pieces of ignited carbon or broken glass falling from them, and shall not be used in situations where there is any danger of

shall not be used in situations where there is any danger of the presence of explosive dust or gas.

40. Arc lamps used in any street for public lighting shall be so fixed as not to be in any part at a less height than 10 ft. from the ground.

41. Arc lamps used in any street for private lighting shall be so fixed as not to be in any part at a less height than 8 ft. from the ground, and shall be so screened as to prevent risk of contact with persons.

of contact with persons.

- 42. Arc lamps must be insulated from earth, and fixed so that they cannot swing into contact with any substance, metallic or otherwise, that might connect them to earth. When supplied from the two outer wires of the three-wire supply system the conductors for supplying them with current, where not aerially suspended or run underground, shall be run in strong metal casing, which shall be electrically continuous and effectively connected with earth. The insulation resistance of such conductors run in metal casing shall, where the lamps are supplied from the outers of the three-wire system, be not less than 2,500 megohms per mile after one minute's electrification and twenty-four hours' immersion in water immediately preceding the test; and where they are supplied at a pressure not exceeding 220 volts an insulation resistance of 600 megohms per mile will suffice. Resistances for the regulation of arc lamps shall be mounted on incombustible bases, shall be so placed that they cannot by conduction or radiation set fire 42. Arc lamps must be insulated from earth, and fixed so placed that they cannot by conduction or radiation set fire to any contiguous materials, and shall be of ample size to safely carry the maximum current that will normally flow through them. Each arc-lamp circuit shall be provided with
- a switch and fuse on each pole.

 43. Motors shall be either of the enclosed type or enclosed in strong metal cases, and shall be efficiently ventilated.
- Motors up to 3½-horse power may be supplied with current at 220 volts, due regard being had to "balancing" and avoidance of disturbance to lighting.

 44. The magnet, frame, and shaft of all motors shall be connected to an efficient earth by a copper conductor, capable of carrying without overheating twice the fusing-current of the main fuse with a minimum section of T. standard with of the main fuse with a minimum section of T_6 standard wire gauge. All metal casings of switches, resistances, fuses, cables, and wires shall be efficiently earthed in a similar

45. An approved starting switch and resistance shall be used on all motors connected directly with the mains, so arranged that the current can only be gradually increased.

46. Every motor must be controlled by an efficient double-

pole quick-break switch suitable to prevent arcing, and conveniently placed so that the person in charge of the motor can cut off wholly the supply from the motor, and all devices in connection therewith. This switch should interlock with the starting-switch so that while it can be operated to cut off the supply in any position of the starting-switch, it can only be closed when the starting-switch has been placed so as to put all the resistance in circuit.

47. A minimum-current cut-out must be provided to dis-connect the motor should the supply become interrupted. This arrangement may be in the starting-switch if found con-

venient.

48. Efficient single-pole fuses or other automatic cut-out must be provided to efficiently protect the conductors on each pole from excess of current, and where these are used to guard conductors taking current only from the two outer wires of the three-wire supply system, provision shall be made to extinguish the arc.

49. Precaution shall be taken in choosing positions for and

in setting up motors and the necessary devices in connection therewith so that there shall be no danger of fire being caused by their normal or abnormal action, or of shock being

obtained in the ordinary handling thereof.

50. Brush rockers must be arranged so that they cannot bring either conductor into contact with the framework of the motor.

51. Terminals of motors must be guarded so that they cannot be accidentally touched or short-circuited.

52. Motors exceeding 31-horse power must be supplied with current taken from the two outer wires of the threewith current taken from the two outer wires of the three-wire system, and a distinct circuit must be run for them. The conductors must have an insulation-resistance of 2,500 megohms per mile. For all motors supplied from the two-wire system, and for motors not exceeding 3½-horse power when supplied from one outer and the neutral wire, an in-sulation-resistance of 600 megohms per mile will suffice. 53. The conductors of all motors supplied from the outer

wires of the three-wire system shall be enclosed in strong metal covering, electrically continuous throughout its entire length, and effectively connected to earth.

length, and effectively connected to earth.

54. The insulation-resistance of each motor-circuit, including all devices necessary for the working of the motor, shall be not less than 1 megohm to earth when all metal parts that are required to be connected to earth are so connected.

55. A printed notice shall be fixed in a conspicuous position at every motor and switchboard forbidding unauthorised

persons to touch the motors or apparatus, and no alterations shall be made during the time that current is on either pole of that part of any lighting or motor circuit to which altera-

tions may be required.

56. The Corporation shall not connect the wires and fittings on a consumer's premises with their mains, or, in the case of premises already connected, continue the supply from case of premises already connected, continue the supply from their mains, unless they are reasonably satisfied that the requirements of this license are complied with, and that the connection or continuance of supply would not cause a leakage from those wires and fittings exceeding one tenthousandth part of the maximum supply-current to the premises; and where the Corporation decline to make such connection or to continue supply they shall serve upon the consumer a notice stating their reasons for so declining.

57. If the Corporation are reasonably satisfied, after

connection or to continue supply they shall serve upon the consumer a notice stating their reasons for so declining.

57. If the Corporation are reasonably satisfied, after making all proper examination by testing or otherwise, that a leakage exists at some part of a circuit of such extent as to be a source of danger, and that such leakage does not exist at any part of the circuit belonging to the Corporation, then and in such case any officer of the Corporation duly authorised by them in writing, or, if the Corporation so require, on application by them to the Electric Telegraph Commissioner, any officer of the Post and Telegraph Department (hereafter referred to as an "Electric Inspector") instructed to so act, may, for the purpose of discovering whether the leakage exists at any part of a circuit within or upon any consumer's premises, by notice require the consumer at some reasonable time after the service of the notice to permit him to inspect and test the wires and fittings belonging to the consumer and forming part of the circuit.

In any case where the Corporation require the services of an Electric Inspector under this section they shall pay the cost of such inspection.

If on such testing the officer or the Electric Inspector discovers a leakage from the consumer's wires exceeding one ten-thousandth part of the maximum supply-current to the premises, or if the consumer does not give all due forthwith discontinue the supply of energy to the premises in question, giving immediate notice of the discontinuance to the consumer, and shall not recommence the supply until they are reasonably satisfied that the leakage has been removed.

58. If any consumer is dissatisfied with the action of the

58. If any consumer is dissatisfied with the action of the Corporation in refusing to give, or in discontinuing, or in not recommencing the supply of energy to his premises, the wires and fittings of that consumer may, on his application to the Electric Telegraph Commissioner, and on payment of the cost of such inspection, be tested for the existence of leakage by an Electric Inspector.

This provision shall be indorsed on every notice given under the provisions of either of the two last preceding sections.

59. From and after the time when the Corporation commence to supply energy through any distributing-main, they shall maintain a supply of sufficient power for the use of all the consumers for the time being entitled to be supplied from such main; and such supply shall be constantly maintained: Provided that, for the purposes of testing, or for any other purposes connected with the efficient working of the undertaking, the Electric Telegraph Commissioner may give permission to the Corporation to discontinue the supply at such intervals of time and for such periods as he may think expedient. When the supply is so discontinued public notice shall be given of such discontinuance, and of the probable duration thereof.

60. The variation of pressure at any consumer's terminals 59. From and after the time when the Corporation com-

60. The variation of pressure at any consumer's terminals shall not under any conditions of the supply which the consumer is entitled to receive exceed 4 per cent. from the normal pressure at which he is being supplied.

normal pressure at which he is being supplied.

61. The Electric Telegraph Commissioner may at any time order an inspection to be made of the works, lines, and wires of the Corporation used for electric-lighting purposes. When a defect or defects are found to exist they must be remedied forthwith, and, should they be serious in the opinion of the officer or person inspecting, the Electric Telegraph Commissioner may, on receipt of the report, direct the Corporation to at once cease transmitting energy either over the whole of the Corporation's lines and wires, or over any part thereof that to him may seem fit, until such defect or defects are repaired or remedied. The cost of such inspection shall be borne by the Corporation. Corporation.

62. Where not contrary to the provisions of this license, and where applicable, the Phænix Fire Office rules for electric light and power installations shall be observed.

63. If the Corporation make default in complying with any of the provisions of this license they shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20 for every such default.

The recovery of a penalty under this license shall not affect the liability (if any) of the Corporation to make compensation in respect of any damage or injury which may be caused by reason of the default.

And I do hereby declare that this license shall come into force on and after the date of publication thereof in the New Zealand Gazette.

Deaths occurring at hospitals, of persons not residents of the borough wherein the hospital is situated, have been allotted in each case to the borough where the disease was contracted, and not to that in which the death actually took place.

The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 454, against 458 in May—a decrease of 4. The deaths in June were 217, an increase of 31 on the number in May. Of the total deaths, males contributed 124, females 93. Sixty-eight of the deaths were of children under five years of age, being 31-34 per cent. of the whole number; 57 of these were under one year of age.

In the first table are given the deaths and death-rates for each of the four cities, for the suburban boroughs severally, and for each city with its suburban towns. As regards Auckland and Christchurch, the whole of the area usually recognised as suburban has not yet been brought under municipal government, and the vital statistics do not deal with such portions as still remain in road districts. But the omission is not very important, for there are in either case quite enough suburbs included within borough boundaries to give a fair idea of the death-rate of Greater Auckland and Greater Christchurch. As further boroughs are formed the vital statistics will be made to include them.

The inclusion of the suburban boroughs tends to lower the rate at each of the four centres.

Specific Febrile or Zymotic Diseases.—Measles was fatal at each of the four chief centres during the month of June. There were 2 deaths from this cause at Auckland, 1 at Wellington, 2 at Christchurch, and 1 at Dunedin. Three deaths were attributable to scarlet fever—1 at Wellington and 2 at Dunedin. Influen za is notice at Auckland and Dunedin—1 death at each town. Only 5 deaths were registered at these cities from diarrhoeal diseases—3 from cholera infantum, diarrhoea and dysentery, at Auckland, 1 from diarrhoea at Christchurch, and 1 at Dunedin. The mortality in this class was very low, amounting to 18 deaths in the total.

Constitutional Diseases.—Of 30 deaths, 12 were due to phthisis, and 4 to other tubercular diseases, 8 deaths were the result of cancer, and 2 of hydrocephalus; the remaining 3 were from rheumatism and rheumatic fever, and 1 from anomia.

Local Diseases.—Of 119 deaths, 24 were from diseases of the nervous system, 1 of organs of special sense, 20 of the circulatory and 37 of the respiratory system. These last are cases of pneumonia, bronchitis, pleurisy, croup, and laryngitis. From diseases of the digestive organs the mortality comprised 17 deaths, and from disease of urinary 14, and reproductive systems 4, besides 2 of organs of locomotion.

Violence.—All the violent deaths at the chief towns in June were accidental. Two were caused by falling, 3 by collision with tram, 3 by drowning, 1 by suffocation, 1 by burns, 1 by cut, 1 by choking with a crumb, and 1 by misadventure under operation during birth.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of the four centres from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.
