"The Education Act, 1877."—Examination and Classification of Teachers.

RANFURLY, Governor. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this twenty-eighth day of October, 1903.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

IN exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Education Act, 1877," the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, doth make the regulations hereto annexed for the examination and classification of teachers; and, with the like advice and consent, doth prescribe that this order shall come into force on the first day of June, one thousand nine hundred and four, and that on the same date the regulations for the examination and classification of teachers made by Orders in Council of the seventh day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and of the tenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and of the ninth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, shall be repealed.

REGULATIONS.

CERTIFICATES.

1. CERTIFICATES shall be of five classes, determined by mental training and attainment, and distinguished, from the highest to the lowest, by the letters A, B, C, D, and E. But no certificates of Class E shall be issued except to teachers that have already passed the examination for Class E under former regulations, or obtained partial pass at that teachers that have already passed the examination for Class E under former regulations, or obtained partial pass at that examination, or that shall pass or obtain partial pass at the examination to be held in January 1904. Teachers that have obtained partial pass already, or that shall have obtained partial pass at the examination to be held in January 1904, will be entitled to complete their examination at any examination up to and including that of January 1905, but not afterwards; and no certificate of Class E shall be issued after the thirty-first day of December 1906. after the thirty-first day of December 1906.

after the thirty-first day of December 1906.

2. The division of a certificate within the class shall depend—first, with the limitations noted in clause 5, on the number of years during which the teacher has been actually engaged in school teaching, one mark being assigned for two years' service, two marks for five years, three marks for eight years, and four marks for eleven years and upwards; and, secondly, on the judgment of an Inspector, such judgment being expressed by marks numbering 2, 4, 6, 8, or 10, according to the Inspector's estimate of less or greater efficiency; and, the marks of both series being added together, fourteen marks shall qualify for the first division, eleven marks for the second, eight marks for the third, five marks for the fourth, and three marks for the fifth. In assigning marks for efficiency the Inspector will use the number "2" as a substitute for the lowest, and the number "10" as a substitute for the highest, term in a series of terms beginning substitute for the highest, term in a series of terms beginning with "tolerable" and ending with "excellent"; and an Inspector may put "0" in place of a number to indicate that he considers the candidate to be incompetent.

3. Marks for efficiency can be given only by the Inspector in whose district the teacher is at work, except that the Inspector-General of Schools may assign marks for efficiency, not exceeding four, to teachers whose practical skill is sufficiently attested by certificates granted by authorities acting outside the Colony of New Zealand, and that he or any other Inspector of the Education Department may also assign marks to teachers in schools inspected by him.

4. On the thirtieth day of June in each year teachers who by length of service, or upon a more favourable judgment expressed by the Inspector before the thirty-first day of May, shall have become entitled to promotion to a higher division

shall have become entitled to promotion to a higher division shall receive such promotion.

5. Notwithstanding anything in the preceding clauses, no teacher shall be classified until he has taught for two years in a school inspected by an Inspector of an Education Board or of the Education Department, nor until he has been assigned at least two marks for practical skill in teaching. No teacher shall be placed in Division 2 until he has been at least eight years a teacher in a public school; and no teacher shall be placed in Division 1 until he has shown to the satisfaction of his Inspector, ability to take charge, as head teacher, of a school with more than 150 children in average attendance; and the mark "10" shall not be given unless the Inspector is satisfied that such ability has been shown; but the teacher need not have been actually in charge of but the teacher need not have been actually in charge of such a school. For the purpose of this regulation a period of normal-school training shall count as service of twice its length, provided that not less than two hours a day on an average has been devoted to actual practice in teaching

under supervision approved by the Minister of Education, or to practice in teaching and to criticism of actual teaching, both practice and criticism being under approved supervision; otherwise a period of normal-school training, if approved by the Minister of Education, shall be counted as ordinary service.

The Minister of Education may determine what value shall be attached to a period of service in schools other than public schools.

public schools.

6. The requirements for Class E shall remain as heretoo. The requirements for Class E shall remain as herefore, except that no examination for Class E shall be held after January 1904, nor for completion of partial pass for Class E after January 1905.

7. The requirements for Class D are set forth in clauses 21

to 24 hereof.

8. The requirements for Class C are set forth in clauses 25 to 35 hereof.

9. The examination for Class B shall be the pass examination for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Science, Laws, or Medicine at the University of New Zealand, together with an examination in the following subjects as for Class C:

an examination in the following subjects as for Class C: Reading, writing, arithmetic, music, drawing, elementary human physiology, theory of education.

Provided, first, that any candidate who, having passed the intermediate examination for the degree of Bachelor of Medicine, or the first examination for the degree of Bachelor of Laws, or the first section of the examination for the degree of Bachelor of Arts or of Science, at the University of New Zealand, shall, before the first day of June 1904 have amplied to the Inspector-General of Schools June, 1904, have applied to the Inspector-General of Schools for recognition of his success at such examination, shall, on

for recognition of his success at such examination, shall, on producing evidence of having passed in the remaining subjects of the examination for such degree, be regarded as having passed for Class B, without further examination.

And provided, secondly, that any candidate who, having passed the examination herein prescribed for Class C, shall at any one and the same degree examination of the University of New Zealand pass in not less than three subjects other than those in which his work has been counted for Class C, shall on application to the Inspector-General of for Class C, shall, on application to the Inspector General of Schools, be regarded as having passed for Class B, without

further examination.

further examination.

And provided, thirdly, that any candidate who, having passed the examination herein prescribed for Class C, shall produce to the Inspector-General of Schools certificates of proficiency granted by the University of New Zealand in not less than four subjects other than those in which his work has been counted for Class C, shall be regarded as having passed for Class B, without further examination.

10. The examination requirement for Class A shall be the same as for Class B, with the addition of such success at an honours examination of the University of New Zealand as is required for first-class or second-class honours, but with no limit as to the time of passing such honours examination.

AGE OF CANDIDATES.

11. No certificate shall be issued to a candidate that has 11. No certificate shall be issued to a candidate that has not attained the age of eighteen years; and a certificate granted to a candidate under the age of twenty-one years shall be a provisional certificate, which shall rank as a license to teach, and which may be exchanged for an ordinary certificate when the candidate has reached the age of twenty-one; and no candidate that has not attained the age of sixteen years shall be admitted to examination for a certificate

EVIDENCE OF CHARACTER AND HEALTH.

12. No person shall receive a certificate or be admitted to examination under these regulations who does not produce sufficient documentary evidence of good moral character, and of freedom from all such physical defects as are incompatible with efficiency in teaching and in the management of a school.

No medical certificate shall be considered as sufficient evidence under this clause unless it is on the form provided, and is signed by a medical officer approved by the Minister.

EXAMINATION REQUIRED.

13. A certificate shall not be granted except after examina-13. A certificate shall not be granted except after examination held in accordance with these regulations, or after proof of the passing of an equivalent examination held by some sufficient public authority: Provided that a partially equivalent examination may be recognised pro tanto, and supplemented by such further examination as the Minister of Education may order, and that the Minister shall be the judge of the value to be assigned to examinations proposed for acceptance as equivalent or partially equivalent.

DATE OF EXAMINATIONS.

14. An examination for the two Classes C and D shall be held every year in the month of January, beginning not earlier than the fifth day of the month, and ending, if possible, not later than the eighteenth day of the month.

EXAMINATION CENTRES.

15. The examination shall be held at the chief town of each education district, and at such other places as the Inspector General shall from year to year recognise as suitable and desirable as special centres of examination: Provided that the Inspector General may in any year decline to recognise any place as a special centre if he finds that thoroughly satisfactory arrangements cannot be made.

16. No application to be examined at a special centre shall be entertained uplass it is accompanied by a special fee of one

be entertained unless it is accompanied by a special fee of one pound sterling in addition to the fee or fees payable under clause 18, and this fee shall be refunded if the application to be examined at a special centre is not granted; but the candidate must be prepared to supplement it by a further payment if the cost of holding an examination at the centre named is such as, in the opinion of the Inspector-General,

named is such as, in the opinion of the inspector-General, would make such a payment reasonable.

17. Candidates shall, at the time of making application to be examined, say at which centre they wish to present themselves. They may afterwards, up to the fifteenth day of October, elect to be examined at some other centre upon payment of a fee of one pound sterling.

NOTICE OF CANDIDATURE: ENTRANCE FEE AND LATE FEE. 18. Every candidate must give notice of his wish to be examined, the notice being given in a form provided for that purpose. The notice must be sent so as to reach the office of the Education Department not later than the thirtieth day of September next before the examination, and must be

day of September next before the examination, and must be accompanied by a receipt for the payment of one pound sterling to the Public Account at some branch of the Bank of New Zealand: Provided that a candidate that presents himself only for completion of "partial success," as defined by clause 24, shall be admitted to examination upor payment of an entrance fee of five shillings for each subject.*

19. A candidate's notice, whether for the whole examination or for the completion of partial success, may, however, be received between the thirtieth day of September and the fifteenth day of October if it is accompanied by a bank receipt for a late fee of one pound sterling in addition to the receipt for the entrance fee.

EVIDENCE OF AGE AND IDENTITY.

20. Every candidate for examination must produce a Registrar's certificate of birth to show that he will be not less than sixteen years of age on the first day of the month of January in which the examination is to be held; provided that, in the case of a candidate for whom it is impossible to obtain a Registrar's certificate of birth, it shall be for the Minister of Education to decide what other documentary cridence of a candidate the way because of the control of the control of the case and identity way because of the case of the cas mentary evidence of age and identity may be accepted instead of such certificate. And every candidate that relies on an equivalent examination must give similar evidence of having reached the age of sixteen years before the time of passing such examination.

EXAMINATION FOR CLASS D.

21. Any candidate that has passed or that shall pass the Matriculation Examination of the University of New Zealand, being not less than sixteen years of age on the first day of the month of January next following the time of the examination, shall be entitled to exemption from further examination for Class D in the subjects in which he has

passed.

22. The examination for Class D shall include the thirty subjects named below. Every candidate must be examined in all the subjects of Group I., and in not less than three nor more than four other subjects, of which, in the case of men, one must be taken from Group III., and another from Group II. or Group III.; and, in the case of women, one must be taken from either Group II. or Group III.,

Reading.—The candidate may be required to read, without time for preparation, a passage from some well-known prose work or from the leading article of a newspaper, and also a passage of verse. Due regard shall be had to enunciation, correct pronunciation, tone, inflexion, fluency, expression, character, and intelligence.

(2.) Writing.—An exercise in text hand and in small hand, in such style as the candidate would adopt in setting copies for children. In the text-hand exercise the height of the smaller letters is to be the same as the space between two lines on an ordinary sheet of ruled foolscap, say one-third of

an inch.

(3), (8), (9). Arithmetic, English, and Geography.—The papers set will be based on the programme of the public school syllabus. In geography the elements of mathematical and physical geography will be required, and the general topography and political geography of the world (without minute detail), with map-drawing (from memory) of European countries and British dependencies.
(4.) Music.—Paper work:—The notation of time, tune, intervals, &c. Candidates will be expected to show an acquaintance with both the tonic sol-fa and the staff notations. The order and manner of teaching; to include the subjects of breathing, voice training (with suitable exercises for class

of breathing, voice training (with suitable exercises for class use), tune, time, ear training, &c. The diatonic (major and minor) and chromatic scales. The common terms and signs used in music. The writing of one or more simple tunes from memory, also of suitable blackboard exercises for

specific objects. Practical tests:—A simple ear test, to consist of phrases to be imitated by the candidate from the examiner's pattern, or of short passages to be written down from dictation. A time test, consisting of a few measures to be sung on one note to the examiner's counting. A tune test, consisting of a short melody in a major or minor key, and introducing the common accidentals of the sharpened fourth or flattened coverth (fe and to) or modulation (terms). fourth or flattened seventh (fe and ta), or modulation (transition) to the next sharp or flat key; the melody to be sung to the sol-fa syllables or to "lah," the examiner giving the keynote. Note.—Vivâ voce questions on the notation, &c., of the above tests may be asked at the discretion of the examiner.

[The Department does not recommend particular text-books, nor, of necessity, limit the examination to the matter of any text-book; but it suggests, at the instance of an experienced teacher of music, the following books as useful to candidates: The School Music-teacher, by Evans and McNaught (Curwen and Sons, London); also the prefaces to Parts 1, 2, and 3 of the Zealandia Songster, by J. L. Innes (come publishers) (same publishers).]

In certain cases, as when a qualified teacher of music shall certify that a candidate is unable, after duly persistent trial, to qualify to pass the examination in that subject, the Inspector-General of Schools may permit the candidate to substitute for music one of the Class C subjects of Group III. or Group IV.; but the candidate shall not be allowed, either at the same time or afterwards, to take as an ordinary subject for Class C or for Class D the subject that he has been allowed to substitute for music.

(5.) Drawing.—The examination in drawing shall be in six divisions of the subject:—

(a.) Drawing on the blackboard: A candidate shall be required to make a sketch on a large scale from an object or group of objects; to make an en-largement of a diagram of a simple ornament; to

draw from memory some common object or some natural or conventional ornamental form.

(b.) Freehand drawing in outline: The candidate shall be required to make a drawing from a cast or from a photograph of a cast of an ornament, or from a diagram of a simple ornament or natural form. The drawing must not be of the same size as the example provided. No ruling, measuring, tracing, or use of instruments will be allowed.

(c.) Model-drawing: The candidate shall be required to draw the group of objects placed before him, including the board on which it stands. The group may coneist of three or more geometrical models and vases (as described in the Directory of the Board of Education, South Kensington, London), or of some simple common objects. (d.) Geometrical drawing: — Plane geometry: Simple problems relating to straight lines and angles, and to the construction of triangles and quadrilaterals. To divide a given line proportionally to a given divided line; to find the mean or the third proportional to two given lines; to find the fourth proportional to three given lines. Scale drawing and the method of making an enlargement or a reduction of a given diagram. Simple problems relating to circles and straight lines. Construction of a regular polygon of n sides, one of the sides or the circumscribing circle being given. Construction of similar figures. Construction of three-sided and four-sided rectilinear figures of given area. Given two similar figures, to construct a third figure similar to them, and having an area equal to the sum or to the difference of the areas of the given figures. The reduction of any given rectilinear figure to a triangle of the same area.

Solid geometry: Plans and elevations of straight lines and plane figures variously placed with regard to the horizontal plane, and of simple geometrical solids having one face or one edge in the horizontal plane. Sections of such solids by vertical and by horizontal planes; the

solids by vertical and by horizontal planes; the method of finding the true form of a section.

(e.) Perspective:—(i.) The representation in perspective of lines or surfaces on or parallel or perpendicular to the ground plane, and either parallel or perpendicular or obliquely inclined to the picture plane, or obliquely inclined to the ground plane and parallel or perpendicular to the picture plane, but not obliquely inclined to both planes. (ii.) The representation in perspective, from plans and elevations or from specifications, of simple geometrical solids or common objects from plans and elevations or from specifications, of simple geometrical solids or common objects of plane or cylindrical or conical surfaces, the leading constructive lines of which are in one or the other of the positions indicated in (i.). (iii.) A candidate that has obtained a second-class certificate at the examinations of the Board of Education, South Kensington, London, in any of the above divisions will be exempted from examination in the divisions in which he has co passed.

(b.) Geometry:—The ground covered by Euclid in Book I., and in propositions 1 to 7 and 11 to 14 of Book II. The constructions and proofs of problems or theorems need not be the same as Euclid's. The theorems may be proved without regard to the order of the problems of construction; but one theorem must not be made to depend on another theorem if in Euclid the latter is, directly or indirectly, dependent on the former. Similarly, the solutions of the problems of construction may be independent of the order of the theorems; but one problem of construction must not be made to depend on another if in Euclid the latter is, directly or indirectly, dependent on the former.

(18.) Elementary Theoretical Mechanics.—Candidates will not be expected to show any further knowledge of pure mathematics than what is demanded in subject (17) Elementary Mathematics.—Solids:—The British and metric systems of measurement. General and specific properties of bodies; relative and absolute motion; rest; distinction between mass and weight; density and relative density; uniform and variable velocity; measure of velocity; force and momentum; acceleration; acceleration due to gravity; representation of forces; composition of two forces acting at a point along parallel or intersecting lines; equilibrium of two or more forces acting at a point; moments of forces; composition of parallel forces; couples; centre of parallel forces; conditions of equilibrium in case of levers, wheel and axle, pulleys, inclined plane, wedge, and screw. Gravitation; centre of gravity, its position in simple cases determined by experiment; stable, unstable, and neutral equilibrium; the balance; requisites of a good balance.

Magnetism and Electricity.—Candidates will not be expected to show any further knowledge of pure mathematics than what is demanded in subject (17) Elementary Mathematics.— Magnetism:—Natural and artificial magnets; parts and properties of bar and horse-shoe magnets; tests of permanent magnetization; attraction and repulsion; mutual action of poles of two magnets of equal strength; astatic system; the various ways of using permanent magnets for magnetizing steel bars; graphic representation of the distribution of free magnetism along a bar magnet, and of its lines of force; magnetic influence; the action of a magnet on soft iron and on steel at varying distances; keepers and their use; magnetization of a steel ring; the directive action of the earth on a magnetic needle free to swing in a horizontal or in a vertical plane. (22.) Elementary Geology.—The composition, form, size, and heat of the earth. Divisions of rocks: igneous, sedimentary, metamorphic. Rock structure: lamination, stratification, false bedding, cleavage, foliation, joints, columnar jointing. General characters and composition of the followjointing. General characters and composition of the following groups of minerals, with special reference to their New Zealand localities: quartz, opal, and chalcedony; feldspars; micas; hornblendes and augites; carbonates of lime and magnesia; oxides and sulphides of iron. The general characters of the following types of rocks and a knowledge of their occurrence in New Zealand: granite; diorite; gabbro; rhyolite; andesite; basalt; volcanic glasses, pumice, and volcanic dust; conglomerates, sands, and sandstones; clays, shales, and slates; limestones and coals; rock-salt and gypsum; gneiss and schists. Texture of igneous and of sedimentary rocks. Agents producing changes in the earth's surface: volcances; earthquakes. Disturbed strata: dip, strike, outcrop, contorted and overthrown strata, anticlinal and synclinal axes, faults, slickensides, dykes. Denuding agents and their work: rain, running water above and below ground, the sea, frost and frozen water, wind, animal and vegetable agencies. Deposition of sediment. Landscape: plains, valleys, formation of escarpments, lateral and scape: plains, valleys, formation of escarpments, lateral and transverse streams, lakes, destruction of valleys, mountains, effects of joints and faults, dry valleys. Economic geology: water, artesian wells, mineral and hot springs; coal and oil; building stone, roofing slate, sands, lime and cement, clay; road metal, flagstone; ornamental stone; grindstones; fuller's earth, salt, phosphate, soils, metals, lodes and veins. (28.) Shorthand.—Writing eighty words a minute, and transcribing accurately into longhand. Candidates should be able to explain the principles of the system they use.

(29.) Needlework.—The repairing of any plain article of underelothing; the drawing of diagrams of such a plain article, and the cutting out and making of it. The answering of questions on needlework, as required in the public-school syllabus.

PARTIAL SUCCESS AT THE EXAMINATION FOR CLASS D.

24. A candidate whose work at the examination for Class D is good on the whole, but in one or two subjects is below the required standard, may be registered as having achieved partial success at the examination, and, on giving notice as required by clauses 18 and 19, and on payment of a fee of five shillings for each such subject, may at the next examination present himself to be examined in such one or two subjects only; and the candidate, if successful in such subject or subjects, shall be deemed to have passed the examination.

29. Candidates that, at the Junior Scholarship Examination of the University of New Zealand, have obtained "credit" shall not be required to take, at the examination for Class C, the subjects in which they gained 45 per cent. of the possible marks at the scholarship examination.

30. Candidates that have passed the Civil Service Senior Examination shall not be required to pass again for Class C in the subjects in which they have already passed at the Senior Examination.

31. A candidate that holds a certificate of Class D or

A teacher that holds a certificate of any class may, upon making due application, as is provided for in clauses 18 and 19, and upon payment of a fee of five shillings for each subject taken, be admitted to examination in any of the subjects of Groups II., III., or IV. of the examination for Class C in which he has not already passed, and shall be entitled to have a record of his success endorsed upon his

(8.) In English Language and Literature a candidate shall English composition, ability to write good English, and a knowledge of certain special books together with a period of literature. The special books and the period of literature will be chosen from time to time and duly announced.

(19.) Logic.—Deductive and inductive logic.
(20.) Arithmetic and Algebra.—Algebra shall include quadratic equations and easy surds; easy arithmetical and geometrical series; graphs of simple algebraical functions within the limits of the foregoing work; and graphical methods of solving equations.

(21.) Geometry and Trigonometry. — In geometry the ground covered by Euclid in Books I. to IV., and in propositions 1, 2, 4, 8, 19, and 20 of Book VI.; trigonometry to solution of triangles. Conductance and resistance of wires; resistance of conductors in series and in parallel shunts; Wheatstone's bridge and the use of it. Development and distribution of heat in a circuit; Joule's law; electric lamps. (25.) Chemistry.—The three states of matter; indestructibility of matter. Physical changes compared with chemical changes. Difference between mechanical mixtures and chemical compounds. Phenomena of chemical action; con-

ditions that promote or check or otherwise modify chemical action. The metric system. Elements and compounds. Modes of chemical action: direct union, displacement, mutual exchange, decomposition. Effects of pressure and temperature on gases; Boyle's and Charles's laws. Estimation of the weight of an element in a given weight of one of its compounds, of the weight of one element required to displace another from a given compound, and of the weight of known volumes of gases. Combining weights; laws of combination of elements in definite proportions by weight; laws of gaseous combination of elements and compounds; atoms and molecules, their relative weights; the atomic theory; Avogadro's law; meaning and use of symbols, formulae, and, equations; valency; graphic formulae; calculations of quantities by volume and by weight. Production and properties of oxygen, hydrogen, and nitrogen. Air, its properties, the exact determination of its composition; the constituents of the atmosphere; estimation of the amounts of aqueous vapour and of carbonic dioxide. Water, its properties; solution and crystallization; hard and soft water; determination of the composition of water by volume and by weight; production and properties of ozone and of peroxide of hydrogen. The production and properties of chlorine, hydrochloric acid, ammonia, oxides of nitrogen, nitric acid. Definition and general properties of oxides, acids, alkalies, and bases; the basicity of acids and the classification of salts. The physical and chemical properties of the various forms of carbon, sulphur, and phosphorus; the production of the two latter on the large scale; the production and properties of the oxides of the three elements just named; the production and properties of sulphuretted hydrogen, of bisulphide of carbon, of sulphure acid (manufacture not required), and of phosphoric acid. Experimental determination of the composition of hydrochloric acid, ammonia, carbon dioxide, sulphuretted hydrogen. The halcgens, their physical and chemical properties of

their more important oxides and salts.

(26.) Physiography.—(a.) Forms of matter; units of length, area, volume; quantity of matter; specific gravity; law of Archimedes. Measurement of time; its relation to the earth's rotation. mentary knowledge of the chief orders of plants and the chief orders of animals that are at present represented in New Zealand; recognition of a well-known mineral or of a common rock from specimens or from descriptions.

(28.) Botany. — Elementary general biology; elementary morphology, anatomy, and physiology of plants; elementary knowledge of the structure and life-history of the bean, the pine, the fern, the liverwort (Marchantia or Lunularia), of Spirogyra, of a mould (Mucor), of Haematococcus, of yeast, of Bacterium; a knowledge of the chief divisions of plants and the characters of the Pteridophyta (or vascular cryptogam.), and of the following orders of flowering plants—Graminaceae, Liliaceae, Orchidaceae, Ranunculaceae, Cruciferae, Geraniaceae, Umbelliferae, Myrtaceae, Rosaceae, Leguminosae, Scrophulariaceae, Compositae, Coniferae; an elementary general knowledge of the New Zealand flora; recognition and classifications. fication of a well-known plant from a specimen or from a description. (36.) Commercial Geography has to do with the producing and distributing of commercial commodities, especially food and foodstuffs, raw and manufactured products, minerals, &c., and with the various facilities for trade and hindrances to trade. The paper will have special reference to Great Britain, to New Zealand, to Australia and the Pacific Islands, and to America. The candidate should be acquainted with the chief geographical and local conditions under which commodities are produced and distributed, with the chief trade routes and means of transit, with the main the chief trade routes and means of transit, with the main features of tariffs so far as they affect New Zealand trade, with currencies, with social and political characters affecting or likely to affect trade with New Zealand, with ports or harbours, and with coaling-stations, with the chief post and telegraph routes, with capacity for commercial development, with statistics as to total population, and as to the export and import of the more important articles of trade in which New Zealand is interested. main physical and geographical features, the distribution of mineral products and of kauri gum, the distribution of vegetable products, the distribution of industries, the distribution of forests and of the main timber trees, the distribution of density of population, railway routes and trade lines, routes by sea to the countries with which most trade is done. He should also know what special inducement is offered by the Government of New Zealand to any given trade, and what exports and imports are carried on under special Government supervision or regulation.

SPECIAL CERTIFICATES FOR HANDWORK AND OTHER SUBJECTS.

36. Candidates may, upon giving notice in the usual way as provided for in clauses 18 and 19, and upon payment of an entrance fee of two shillings and sixpence for each branch taken, be examined in any one or more of the branches of manual work named in this clause, and shall, upon passing, receive a special certificate of having so passed. A successful candidate that holds a teacher's certificate of any class may elect to surrender his special certificate and to have his success recorded by endorsement upon his teacher's certificate instead. (The issue of a special certificate for drawing is provided for in clause 23, section (5).

(5.) Iron work, and the drawing pertaining thereto.(6.) Cookery, household management, laundry work. (Two of these branches will suffice.)

(7.) Dairy work. (8.) Cottage gardening, including a practical knowledge of the life of plants.

(9.) Knitting.

(10.) First aid and ambulance.

(11.) Military and physical drill.

(12.) Swimming and life saving.

The Department reserves the right to hold the examinations in these subjects at any time and place, or to require candidates to take the examination of the City and Guilds of London Institute or other examinations.

SPECIAL MENTION AT EXAMINATION.

37. With the report of every examination for certificates, lists will be published containing the names of candidates who pass in any subject well enough to deserve special mention.

38. A candidate that falls not far short of the examination requirements for a certificate may, it of the age of twenty-one years, and having not less than two years' experience as defined in clause 5, receive a license to teach, which

license shall be in force for two years from the last day of June or the last day of December, as the case may be, next following the date on which it is issued, and shall during its currency have the force of a certificate.

LIST OF CERTIFICATED TEACHERS.

39. In the month of June in each year a list of teachers holding certificates and licenses shall be issued by the Minister of Education, and such list shall set forth in every case of promotion to a higher class or division the reason of case of promotion to a higher class or division the reason of such promotion; and after the publication of such list every teacher that has been so promoted shall be entitled, upon making due application to the Inspector-General of Schools, to have a record of his promotion endorsed upon his certificate. The name of any teacher that is not known to have been actively engaged in the work of education at any time during the previous five years shall be omitted from the list, unless he shall have made application since the publication of the previous list to have his name retained on the list or restored to it. restored to it.

OLD CERTIFICATES.

40. Subject to the provisions of clause 1, certificates, licenses, passes, partial passes, and exemptions from examination granted under any regulations hereby repealed shall remain in force under these regulations, except that provisional certificates granted to teachers that have still to pass in one or more of the subjects necessary to their examination shall rank as licenses to teach.

CANCELLATION OF CERTIFICATES.

41. The Minister of Education shall have power to cancel any certificate or license to teach if the holder of such certificate or license shall at any time be proved guilty of immoral conduct or gross misbehaviour within the meaning of "The Education Act, 1877," or of any subsequent Act.

42. These regulations shall come into force on the first day of June 1904, and on that day the regulations that were previously in force shall be deemed to be repealed.

2. The concessions and privileges conferred by this Order 2. The concessions and privileges contested by this Order in Council shall extend and apply only to the part of the foreshore necessary for the construction of the landing-shed, as shown on plan marked M.D. 2657.

3. In consideration of the concessions and privileges granted by this Order in Council, the Council shall pay to

4. All persons shall, at all reasonable times, upon payment of the proper dues, have free and full liberty to use the said landing-shed, and all rights of ingress and egress thereon and therefrom.

5. His Majesty, or the Governor, and all officers in the Government service acting in the execution of their duty, shall at all times have free ingress, passage, and egress into, through, and out of the said landing shed without payment.

6. Any person authorised by the Minister may at all reasonable times enter upon the said landing-shed and view the state of repair thereof; and upon such Minister leaving at or posting to the last known address of the Council in New Zealand a notice in writing of any defect or want of repair in such shed, requiring it within a reasonable time, to be therein prescribed, to repair the same, it shall with to be therein prescribed, to repair the same, it shall with all convenient speed cause such defect to be removed or such repairs to be made.

7. Nothing herein contained shall authorise the Council to do or cause to be done anything repugnant to or inconsistent with any law relating to the Customs, or any regulation of the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, or with any provisions of "The Harbours Act, 1878," or its amendments, or any regulations made thereunder, and that are now or

may hereafter be in force.

8. The rights, powers, and privileges conferred by or under this Order in Council shall continue to be in force for fourteen years from the date hereof, unless in the meantime such rights, powers, and privileges shall be altered, modified,

or revoked by competent authority; and the Council shall not assign, charge, or part with any such right, power, or privilege without the previous written consent of the Minister first obtained.

9. The said rights, powers, and privileges may be at any time resumed by the Governor, without payment of any compensation whatever, on giving to the Council three calendar months' previous notice in writing. Any such notice shall be sufficient if given by the Minister, and delivered at or posted to the last known address of the Council in New Zealand.

10. The Council shall be liable for any injury which the said landing shed may cause any vessel or boat to sustain through any default or neglect on its part.

(1.) Commit or suffer a breach of the conditions herein-

before set forth, or any of them; or
(2.) Cease to use or occupy the said landing-shed for a

(2.) Cease to use or occupy the said landing-shed for a period of thirty days—
then and in either of the said cases this Order in Council, and every right, power, or privilege, may be revoked and determined by the Governor in Council without any notice to the Council or other proceeding whatsoever; and publication in the New Zealand Gazette of an Order in Council containing such revocation shall be sufficient notice to the Council, and to all persons concerned or interested, that this Order in Council, and the license, rights, and privileges thereby granted and conferred, have been revoked and determined.

12. The construction of the landing-shed shall be sufficient evidence of the acceptance by the Council of the terms and conditions of this Order in Council.

Regulations for the Occupation of Pastoral Lands within the Westland Mining District.

RANFURLY, Governor.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred by section four of "The Land Act, 1892," and by section thirty-eight of "The Mining Act, 1898," I, Uchter John Mark, Earl of Ranfurly, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby declare that the following shall be the regulations under which pastoral licenses may be granted within the Westland Mining District:—

REGULATIONS.

Interpretation: In these regulations, unless inconsistent with the context, the word "licensee" includes "his heirs and assigns," and the word "Warden" means any Warden exercising jurisdiction within the Westland Mining District.

1. Application may be made for any of the Crown lands within the Mining District of Westland excepting timber

and other public or mining reserves.

2. The area which may be applied for under these regulations shall not be less than 100 acres nor exceed 1,000 acres, and shall entitle the holder thereof to the exclusive right of pasturage over the lands specified therein, but shall give no

right to the soil, timber, or minerals.

3. The Commissioner of Crown Lands for the Land Dis-3. The Commissioner of Crown Lands for the Land District of Westland may, with the approval of the Warden and the Land Board of the Westland Land District (hereinafter referred to as "the Land Board"), grant not more than one pastoral license under these regulations to any person of the age of seventeen years and upwards who may apply for

the same, but the Land Board may refuse any application, and their decision shall be final and without appeal.

4. Annual rent payable under the license shall be a sum to be fixed by the Land Board, but shall be not less than 2.4d. per acre, payable half-yearly in advance to the Receiver of Land Revenue, Hokitika, together with the

lease fee of £1.

5. Term of license to be twenty-one years, and upon the expiration of the term it shall be competent for the Land Board to grant a renewal for twenty-one years over the whole or part of the area comprised in the license, upon such terms as they think fit, subject to the Warden's approval and section 207 of "The Land Act, 1892." Such license shall be issued subject to the terms and conditions, as nearly as may be, contained in section 199 of the said Act.

be, contained in section 199 of the said Act.
6. No deposit of survey fees shall be required, except in exceptional cases, which shall be determined by the Land Board, who shall fix the amount of deposit, which shall not exceed 1s. 6d. per acre.
7. The licensee shall have the right to the use of the surface-soil only of the demised land, for the purpose provided for in his license, as already set forth in Regulation No. 2.
8. The licensee shall have no right, either himself or

8. The licensee shall have no right, either himself or through any other person, to fell, cut, sell, remove, or other-

wise dispose of any milling-timber or silver-pine on the land included in his license, except in conformity with the regula-tions under the Mining Acts for the time being in force. The Commissioner of Crown Lands, or any person appointed by him, shall decide what is milling-timber, and his decision shall be final.

9. The licensee shall not be en itled to fell, cut, or remove any timber growing on the land comprised in his license, except for his domestic use, or for fencing or clearing for

cultivation.

10. The licensee shall, by virtue of his pastoral license, acquire no rights to mine for gold, silver, or any other metals or minerals whatever, without first obtaining the sanction of the Warden in the manner provided for by the

sanction of the warden in the manner provided for by the mining laws.

11. The holders of miners' rights shall have the right to prospect over the whole area held under pastoral license, and for that purpose to enter and camp thereon, and to use mining-timber and firewood growing thereon, so long as they are legitimately engaged in prospecting; but any prospecting carried on upon the cultivated area surrounding the dwelling of the licensee, as limited by Regulation No. 13 hereof, shall

carried on upon the cultivated area surrounding the dwelling of the licensee, as limited by Regulation No. 13 hereof, shall be subject to the provisions of sections 72 and 73 of "The Mining Act, 1898."

12. The Warden shall have the right to grant any mining privilege or easement in and over the land comprised in a pastoral lease, subject to the compensation for improvements as provided for in "The Mining Act, 1898," and its amendments

ments.

ments.

13. No previous consent shall be required from the licensee to enable the Warden to grant any application which may be lawfully made to him under the Mining Act or regulations for the time being in force in and over the lands comprised in a pastoral license, unless the applicant encroaches upon the area containing the dwellinghouse or immediately surrounding same, provided the dwelling is of a substantial nature, the land in cultivation, and surrounded by a substantial fence. For the purpose of this proviso, and for the purpose of Regulation No. 11 hereof, the area to be protected to the licensee around his dwelling shall be 50 acres. Provided, however, in all cases where the area which otherwise would be protected is not cultivated or substantially fenced, then so much only of the area as is substantially fenced or cultiso much only of the area as is substantially fenced or cultivated shall be protected.

14. The Warden shall have the power from time to time to make such reserves as he may deem necessary, and the same shall thereupon be excluded from the land comprised in a pastoral license, and rent shall be proportionally reduced as set forth in Regulation No. 16, and the Warden may do all such other things as may in his opinion be of benefit to the resident community, or may in any way conduce to the advancement of the mining industry or of the persons engaged

therein.

15. The Crown and the local bodies shall have the right to survey and take all lands necessary for the construction of roads on the demised pastoral lands, and compensation only for the value of substantial improvements made by the licensee will be paid in case of land resumed for public

purposes.

16. For all land resumed for public or mining purposes a reduction proportionate to the acreage resumed on future annual rentals shall be made.

17. Applications to transfer a license under these regula-tions shall be made to the Commissioner of Crown Lands, and shall be subject to the approval of the Land Board. No transfer will be allowed within one year from date of lease, nor until permanent improvements have been effected to the value of 4s. per acre upon the area held under the license. Such permanent improvements shall include reclamation from swamps, clearing of bush not being milling-timber as in Regulation No. 9, scrub, gorse, broom, or sweetbriar, grassing, cultivation, planting with trees and live hedges, the laying-out and cultivating of gardens, fenc-ing, grassing, draining, making roads, sinking wells or watertanks, sheep dips, making embankments or protective works of any kind, in any way improving the character or fertility of the soil, or the erection of any building at lessee's option upon the protected area of 50 acres, as described in Regula-

18. Forfeiture of all licenses may ensue if payment of rental is not made within three months of the date it is due, or if the licensee fails to effect substantial improvements to the value of 4s. per acre within three years from the date of

19. All existing pack-tracks, whether surveyed or not, to remain available for public use, and where the licensee's fences run across the same a swing-gate must be provided to the satisfaction of the Warden.

20. Every holder of a miner's right shall have the right of ingress and egress over the whole area of a pastoral license, excepting so much thereof as may be under cultivation and substantially fenced, as provided in paragraph 13 of these regulations.

21. All water-rights are reserved to the Crown, but not so as to deprive the licensee's stock of access to the water on his holding.

"Cattle" means and includes any horse, mare, gelding, colt, filly and foal, any bull, cow, ox, steer, heifer and calf, any ram, ewe, wether and lamb, any mule, ass, goat, boar, or sow.

2. No person shall ride, drive, or lead any horse or other animal on, upon, or along any footway or footpath constructed for foot-passengers only within the district.

- 3. No person shall wheel any barrow or truck, or use, drive, or conduct any velocipede, bicycle, tricycle, or other vehicle of any description, on, upon, or along any footway or footpath constructed for foot-passengers only within the
- 4. No person shall leave or allow to remain upon any district road, or any district bridge, or upon or over any channel or surface-drain in any district road, any logs, timber, bricks, stone, building or other materials, so that such logs, timber, bricks, stone, building or other materials shall be a source of danger, or shall delay, impede, or obstruct the passage of any person, horse, or vehicle over such district road.

 5. No person shall upon any district road, except at places

5. No person shall upon any district road, except at places which shall have been appointed by the Board for the purpose, load any vehicle with, or place upon or attach to any vehicle, any timber or logs.

6. No person shall use or allow to be used any sledge for the carriage or transport of logs, timber, or other materials along or on any district road or district bridge; and no person shall permit, suffer, or allow any logs, timber, or other materials to be dragged on or along any district road.

7. No person shall take any engine, agricultural or other machine, or any load or materials of any kind weighing more than 2½ tons avoirdupois on one pair of wheels across any district bridge without the written sanction of the Board

8. No person shall drive or ride at other than a walking. ace across or upon any district bridge which has a span of

pace across or upon any district bridge which has a span of 20 ft. or upwards.

9. No person shall at other than a walking-pace drive, lead, or take any horses, cattle, engine, agricultural or other machine or vehicle, across or upon any district bridge which has a span of 20 ft. or upwards.

10. Each vehicle mentioned in the first column of the First Schedule of these by-laws which shall be driven, taken, or used upon or over any district road or district bridge from the 1st day of May to the 30th day of September in each and every year, and having the number of wheels mentioned on the same line in the second column of the said Schedule, and carrying the maximum weight mentioned on the same on the same line in the second column of the said Schedule, and carrying the maximum weight mentioned on the same line in the third column of the said Schedule, shall have the minimum width of tire mentioned on the same line in the fourth column of the said Schedule; and if the width of the tires of the wheels, or any of them, of such vehicle be less than is required by the said First Schedule, the owner and driver of such vehicle shall be deemed to have committed a breach of this by-law.

11. For the purposes of these by-laws the number or quantity mentioned in the second column of the Second Schedule to these by-laws of the articles mentioned on the same line in the first column of the Second Schedule will be deemed a weight of 1 ton.

12. Any person acting under the authority of the Board may at all times examine and measure the tires of the wheels of any vehicle, and may examine, weigh, and measure any vehicle, or the load thereon, which in his opinion sure any vehicle, or the load thereon, which in his opinion infringes these by-laws; and no person shall obstruct or interfere with the person acting under such authority, or refuse to permit such examination and measurement.

13. All vehicles plying for hire on the district roads carrying a load of 1 ton and upwards shall pay a yearly license of £2; and all vehicles plying for hire on the district roads carrying a load under 1 ton shall pay a yearly license of £1.

14. Every person who shall commit a breach of or fail to comply with any of the provisions of these by-laws shall be guilty of an offence, and for such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of £5.

Te Makarini Scholarships, held at Te Aute College, Hawke's Bay.

HREE scholarships of the yearly value of £35, tenable I for two years, are offered for competition. The senior scholarship is open to Maori boys on the conditions laid down in the regulations of the Trustees of the Te Makarini Scholarships Fund, as printed in the Native Schools Code, 1897. Candidates for the junior scholarships will be examined in the subjects specified for Standard IV. in the Native Schools Code, 1897. The questions will, however, be somewhat more difficult than those set for the standard examinations. The examination will be held at convenient centres on the 14th and 15th of December, 1903.

Candidates must, either directly or through their teachers, send notice to the Inspector of Native Schools, Education Department, Wellington, of their intention to present themselves for examination. Such notice must be posted so as to reach the Department not later than the 9th of November, 1903.
