A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by section one hundred and fourteen of "The Public Works Act, 1894" (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), it is, *intr alia*, enacted that the Governor may, upon the terms and conditions in the said section mentioned. by Proclamation publicly notified, direct that any bridge already constructed or which may hereafter be con-structed, over or across any river or arm of the sea restructed, over or across any river or arm of the sea re-spectively shall, from and after a date to be fixed in such Proclamation, be under the exclusive care, control, and management of such local authority as shall be mentioned in that behalf in such Proclamation; and may by any such Proclamation as aforesaid fix and determine whether all or any, and if so what part, of the cost, whether the retofore incurred or thereafter to be incurred, of maintaining, re-pairing, improving, or reconstructing any such bridge is to be provided and paid by the local authority or authorities; and may by any such Proclamation as aforesaid direct how, when, and to whom any such payment is to be made:

when, and to whom any such payment is to be made: And whereas it is expedient to make provision under the said Act for the purposes and in the manner hereinafter set forth:

said Act for the purposes and in the manner hereinafter set forth: Now, therefore, I, William Lee, Baron Plunket, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and in exercise of the powers and authority vested in me by the said Act, and of all other powers and authorities in anywise enabling me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim and direct that the said bridge shall, from and after the date of this Proclamation, be under the exclusive care. control, and management of the Council of the County of Wairarapa South; and in further pursuance of the aforesaid powers and authorities I do hereby fix and determine that the cost of maintaining. repairing, improving, or reconstructing the said bridge shall be borne by the Council of the County of Wairarapa South in the proportion of three-thirteenths and the Council of the Borough of Greytown in the proportion of ten-thirteenths of the said cost respectively: And I do hereby also further direct that any contribution hereby required to be made as aforesaid by the Council of the Borough of Greytown shall be paid from time to time in the proportion hereinbefore prescribed out of the funds of the said borough, within a period of thirty days after demand in writing made by or on benalf of the Council of the County of Wairarapa South, and such payments shall be made from time to time to time to time to time to the County of Wairarapa South, and such payments shall be made from time to time to the Clerk of the said Council for and on account of such Council.

The total population of Auckland and its suburbs was 67,326 persons, and that of Christchurch with its complete suburbs amounted to 57,041 persons, at the Census of March, 1901.

Deaths occurring at hospitals, of persons not residents of the borough wherein the hospital is situated, have been allotted in each case to the borough where the disease was contracted, and not to that in which the death actually took place.

The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 539, against 485 in September—an increase of 54. The deaths in October were 192, an increase of 10 on the number in September. Of the total deaths, males contributed 95, females 97. Forty of the deaths were of children under five years of age, being 20.83 per cent. of the whole number; 36 of these were under one year of age.

There were fifty deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: Five men, 65, 73, 77 (two), 78, and seven women, 67, 69, 74, 78, 80, 82 (two), died at Auckland; three men, 65, 73, 74, and three women, 65, 68, 74, at Wellington; five men, 65, 71 (two), 78, 79, and six women, 66, 68, 77, 78, 79, 82, at Christchurch; and twelve men, 66, 67, 68, 69, 73 (three), 74, 76 (two), 80, 82, and nine women, 67, 68, 72, 74, 75, 76, 79, 82, 87, at Dunedin.

In the first table are given the deaths and death-rates for each of the four cities, for the suburban boroughs severally, and for each city with its suburban towns. As regards Auckland and Christohurch, the whole of the area usually recognised as suburban has not yet been brought under municipal government, and the vital statistics do not deal with such portions as still remain in road districts. But the omission is not very important, for there are in either case quite enough suburbs included within borough boundaries to give a fair idea of the death-rate of Greater Auckland and Greater Christohurch. As further boroughs are formed the vital statistics will be made to include them.

•• Specific Febrile or Zymotic Diseases.—There were 8 deaths from these causes in the chief towns and suburbs during ber. Measles was fatal at Wellington (1 death), influenza at Dunedin (also 1 death); whooping-cough caused 1 death October. at Dunedin, and typhoid fever 1 at Christchurch.

Constitutional Diseases .-- Of 57 deaths, 21 resulted from cancer, 26 from phthisis, 6 from other tubercular diseases. There were also 3 deaths from diabetes, and 1 trom anæmia.

Local Diseases. — Of 91 deaths, 20 were from diseases of the nervous system, 23 of circulatory system, 24 of the respiratory, 13 of the digestive, 1 of the lymphatic, 7 of the urinary, 2 of the reproductive, and 1 of the integumentary systems.

Violent Deaths. --Of 11 deaths, 7 were accidental and 4 were suicidal. Two deaths were caused by fall, 1 by tram-car, another by burns, and 3 by drowning. The suicides were by throat-cutting (1) and hanging (3).

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The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of the four centres from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.

Locality and General Description of the Ohotu Block.

This block, which comprises an aggregate area of 55,121 acres, subdivided into sixty-seven sections and one small grazing-run, ranging from 176 acres to 3,530 acres, is situated on the left bank of the Whanganui River, about forty-five miles from Whanganui, and about six miles south of the Raetihi Township.

The access to the western portion of the block is by river-steamer up the Whanganui River for a distance of about forty-five miles; thence by unformed surveyed roads to the different sections.

The northern portion of the block can be reached from Raetihi, which is six miles distant by about two miles of dray road and the remainder pack-track. This pack-track, which was constructed some years ago, is continued through the block along the Mangawhero River, and joins Field's Track south of the block.
