Crown Land reserved under "The Scenery Preservation Act, 1903."

PLUNKET, Governor. A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by "The Scenery Preservation Act, 1903" (hereinafter referred to as "the said Act"), it is, inter alia, enacted that the Governor may from time to time appoint such suitable persons, not exceeding five, as he thinks fit to be a Commission under the said Act; such Commission may, if it deems necessary, inspect any lands possessing scenic or historic interest, or on which there are thermal springs, and shall make inquiries respecting the same and report to the Governor, and shall from time to time recommend what lands, whether Crown, private, or Native lands, in their opinion should be permanently reserved as scenic, thermal, or historic reserves; and that the Governor may from time to time, by Proclamation, declare that any lands so recommended to be reserved shall be a reserve under the said Act, and thereupon such lands shall be inalienable unless by special Act of Parliament passed in that behalf, and no person shall cut or remove timber or in any way interfere with such lands, or damage the scenic features thereof; and such lands may be fenced, preserved, and conserved intact as and for an inalienable patrimony of inter alia, enacted that the Governor may from time to time and conserved intact as and for an inalienable patrimony of the people of New Zealand:

And whereas the Governor has, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the said Act, appointed certain persons to be a Commission for the purposes thereof: And whereas the said Commission has, after making inquiries respecting the same, reported to the Governor and recommended that the parcel of Crown land described in the Schedule hereto should be permanently reserved as a scenic reserve: And whereas it is expedient that the said recommendation should be given effect to:

Now, therefore, I, William Lee, Baron Plunket, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities aforesaid, do hereby proclaim and declare that, from and after the date of the publication hereof in the New Zealand Gazette, the parcel of Crown land described in the Schedule hereto shall be a reserve under the said Act.

The access is from Rakaunui, distant about two miles by metalled road; also from Makuri Township, which is about nine miles distant, of which seven miles is metalled, the remainder is summer dray-road. This section is situated in the Pohonui-a-tane (Hunterville No. 1) Block. The access is from Hunterville, which is about twenty-nine miles distant, via the Ongo - Turakina Valley Road and Mangamahoe Road, which are formed for dray traffic to within about three miles of the section; this dray-road is, however, frequently blocked by slips: the rest is formed bridle-track, bad in winter and often blocked by slips. The section comprises all hilly and broken land, with a small area of easy ground in the western corner. The soil is of good quality, resting on papa formation. The access is from Silverstream, which is about three miles distant by good metalled road. The section comprises from 25 to 30 acres of easy-sloping ground, the remainder being hilly. The greater portion of the flat is in rough grass, partly overgrown with manuka and patches of gorse. The hills and some of the easy ground are all covered with thick manuka and fern. The soil varies from fair on the flats to very poor on the hills; a portion of the flat is swamp, but could be drained; the formation is clay and shingle. GENERAL SUMMARY FOR FEBRUARY, 1905.

General Summary for February, 1905.

In dealing with comparisons of monthly rainfalls, allowance has to be made for February having two or three days less than other months. This year the month had a remarkably light rainfall, and in the North Island several observers have it as the driest on record. The wind, however, was generally light, and evaporation therefore by no means excessive, thus avoiding the more trying effects of drought, and causing cloudiness in the daytime. Coming, also, at the end of a wet and late summer, the dry and warmer period experienced almost everywhere between the 8th and 22nd, and in many parts for over twenty-one days, except for some slight showers about the 15th in a few places, had generally most beneficial effects upon the crops and vegetation. Owing to the anticyclonic conditions which then prevailed, the days were calm and hot, while the nights were cool, with heavy dews, and even frosts were reported on the high country inland. The weather, especially in the south, was regarded as most favourable to the season, and crops have on the whole turned out considerably better than anticipated. The "harvest" of oaten hay for chaffing, hay, and grass-sed was mostly completed and saved in good condition. Cereals throve and ripened almost too rapidly, so that harvesting made strides southwards until stopped at the end of the month by the rain, then most welcome to pastoralists and dairy-farmers, and needed for the late crops, rape, and the turnips so extensively cultivated this season. On account of the weather, however, which delayed the sowing, it must be expected that the harvesting will be somewhat irregular, and the results more uneven than usual. Taranaki, and parts of the country north and west of it which usually have a plentiful rainfall, and where the soil is of a porous nature, suffered from the want of regular summer rain, and gardens and fields bore a parched appearance unusual to them. Mr. H. A. Goudie, chief officer at the Rotorua Nursery, Whakarewarewa, remarks that, "G the mornings and evenings.

Land and sea breezes were very marked in places on the sea-coast, the sea-breeze as evening approached springing up quite suddenly and strongly out of a calm.

A brilliant red sunset and very muggy weather preceded the warm rains about the 6th. This was accompanied by a gale lasting nearly all night over Taranaki. It is to be noted that thunder accompanied this rainfall in a few places, but thunder was more general about the 27th. It was, however, not so widely experienced as last month. Some observers think it more common this season than usual in New Zealand.

A grand display of the aurora australis occurred on the night of the 3rd, and was witnessed all over Southland.

Observations from two additional second-order stations are now used in the climatological tables, and will serve to bring out truer means for both Islands and indicate irregularities; Mr. H. F. Skey, B.Sc., of the Magnetic Observatory, sending them for Christchurch, and the Rev. D. Kennedy, D.D., who has imported a splendid set of instruments, for Meeanee, Hawke's Bay.

Very useful and valuable monthly and annual totals of rainfall and days with rain have been furnished by Mr. H. I. Jones, of Wanganui. His observations come up to date from January, 1863. Captain J. Makgill, of Waiuku, Auckland, gives records from August, 1882, to January, 1904. Mr. J. W. Paulin, of Opoho, Dunedin, has kindly supplied a copy of similar records from January, 1889, to December, 1904, inclusive. Mr. H. N. Watson has sent in rainfall returns for Ongaonga, Hawke's Bay, for 1904. Dr. J. Gunn, F.R. Met. Soc., of Kaikoura, and the Rev. H. W. Williams, M.A., of Gisborne, have also made interesting use of their observations, and forwarded the results for the use of this office.

The total population of Auckland and its suburbs was 67,226 persons, and that of Christchurch with its complete suburbs amounted to 57,041 persons, at the Census of March, 1901.

Deaths occurring at hospitals, of persons not residents of the borough wherein the hospital is situated, have been allotted in each case to the borough where the disease was contracted, and not to that in which the death actually took place.

The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 519, against 514 in December—an increase of 5. The deaths in January were 197, an increase of 19 on the number in December. Of the total deaths, males contributed 119, females 78. Fifty-one of the deaths were of children under five years of age, being 21.83 per cent. of the whole number; 43 of these were under one year of age.

There were sixty deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: Seven men, 65, 70, 75, 77, 80, 81, 84, and eight women, 65 (two), 72, 75, 76, 78, 79, 85, died at Auckland; eleven men, 65, 67, 68, 70, 74, 77, 80, 82, 87, 88, 92; and four women, 67, 70 (two), 76, at Wellington; five men, 65, 68, 72 (two), 82, and six women, 66, 67, 68, 70, 71, 74, at Christchurch; and fourteen men, 66, 67 (two), 69, 70 (two), 72, 74, 79, 81, 83, 84, 85, 88, and five women, 66, 70, 74, 77, 85, at Dunedin.

In the first table are given the deaths and death-rates for each of the four cities, for the suburban boroughs severally, and for each city with its suburban towns. As regards Auckland and Christchurch, the whole of the area usually recognised as suburban has not yet been brought under municipal government, and the vital statistics do not deal with such portions as still remain in road districts. But the omission is not very important, for there are in either case quite enough suburbs included within borough boundaries to give a fair idea of the death-rate of Greater Auckland and Greater Christchurch. As further boroughs are formed the vital statistics will be made to include them.

The inclusion of the suburban boroughs tends to lower the rate at Auckland and Wellington.

Specific Febrile or Zymotic Diseases.—The deaths in this class at the four centres and suburbs during January numbered 10: 7 of these were from diarrheal complaints, of which 2 occurred at Auckland, 1 at Wellington, and 4 at Christchurch.

Constitutional Diseases.—Of 40 deaths, 18 resulted from phthisis and 4 from other tubercular diseases; there were also 14 from cancer, 1 from anæmia, and 3 from diabetes.

Local Diseases.—The total for the four chief towns and surroundings is 97 deaths, or 49.24 per cent. of the total mortality. 21 deaths resulted from diseases of the nervous system, 28 of the circulatory, 18 of the respiratory, 19 of the digestive, 1 of the lymphatic, 8 of the urinary, and 2 of the reproductive systems.

Violent Deaths.—Of 15 deaths, 12 were accidental and 3 suicidal. The accidental deaths comprised 1 from striking a post in a railway-cutting, 1 fall from cart, 1 by shooting, 2 burns, 1 mercurial poisoning, 3 drowning, 1 suffocation, and 2 birth accidents. The suicides included 2 cases of shooting and 1 of hanging.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of the four centres from six principal specific febrile or symotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.

The account for the special period is to include all receipts after bank hours on Saturday, the 25th March, and the whole of the subsequent transactions up to the time when the bank closes on Friday, the 31st instant.

Officers who render four weekly accounts will close their

account on Friday, the 31st instant, so as to embrace all transactions from the closing of the bank on the 4th March.

If any bank receipts for moneys paid in on or before the 31st instant are received from sub-offices after copies of cash-books have been posted, receivers are directed to enter all such receipts in a supplementary account, and to transmit a copy thereof to the Receiver-General on the same day.

The first ordinary account for the new year shall be for the period from the 1st to the 8th April, both inclusive, and is only to contain such revenue as may have been paid to the Public Account subsequent to the 31st instant, or col-lected after bank hours on that date.

The first four-weekly account shall be for the period from the 1st to the 29th April, both inclusive.

Receivers are requested to take great care that the copies of their cash books to be rendered during the current month are promptly posted.

The foregoing instructions are also to apply to deposits and law trust accounts.

Parasitic Diseases.—Hydatids were fatal at Auckland (1 death), at Wellington (2 deaths), at Christchurch (2 deaths), and at Dunedin (3 deaths). There were also 1 death at Wellington from aphthe, and 1 from worms at Auckland.

Dietetic Diseases.—These numbered 15, 6 being due to want of breast-milk, or malnutrition, 8 to alcoholism, and 1 to delirium tremens.

Constitutional Diseases.—The deaths at the four towns numbered 496 in 1904. The first in importance of these diseases, and of all causes of death, is tubercle. The figures for 1903 and 1904 show 250 and 259 deaths for each year respectively.

Developmental Diseases.—There were 234 deaths in this class, of which 100 were from premature births, 119 from old age, and 15 from other causes.

Local Diseases.—Deaths in this class were 44 less than in 1903, the figures being 1,223 against 1,267. Diseases of the nervous system were the most fatal of this class, amounting to 273; this number includes 102 deaths from apoplexy, 33 from convulsions, and 47 from paralysis, including hemiplegia and paraplegia. Diseases of the circulatory system show 272 deaths from heart-disease and other allied complaints. Diseases of the respiratory system show 268 deaths for 1904, against 275 in the former year. Bronchitis, pneumonia, congestion of the lungs, pleurisy, and allied diseases form this group.

this group.

Under the head of "Diseases of the Digestive System" there were 255 deaths at the four centres, including 100 from enteritis; peritonitis, 11; gastritis, 14; cirrhosis of liver, 20; jaundice and liver-disease, 12; and dentition, 12. From appendicitis 16 deaths are particularly noted.

Diseases of the urinary system caused 102 deaths. The remaining deaths were—2 disease of organs of special sense, 8 of the lymphatic, 37 of the reproductive systems, 3 of the organs of locomotion, and 3 of the integumentary system.

Violent Deaths.—There were 124 violent deaths, 95 of which were classed as accidental. Nine of these latter were caused by fractures, and 17 by falls. In 6 cases deaths resulted from the deceased being run over by a cart, tram, train, &c. Six deaths were from burns or scalds, 17 by drowning, 8 by suffocation, 3 by poisoning, 9 by injuries to head, spine, hip, &c.; besides 5 from accident at birth, and 15 others.

Locality and Description.

These rurs are situated on the west bank of the Whanganui River, the access being from Wanganui, which is about twenty-one miles distant by the river, or about thirteen miles overland, by about eight miles of formed road and about five miles of good horse-track. The runs comprise low and somewhat steep-faced bush hills; the soil is of good quality, resting on papa formation. The forest is light, comprising tawa, rimu, rata, hinau, &c., with a light undergrowth of rangiora, karamu, &c. The runs are well watered by numerous streams. The elevation ranges from about 100 ft. to 1.000 ft. above sea-level. 100 ft. to 1,000 ft. above sea level.

 Every tender shall be deemed to be informal and incapable of being accepted where the rental tendered is less than the upset rental fixed as aforesaid.

 4. The highest tenderer, if his tender shall equal or exceed the upset rental, shall be declared the lessee, and be entitled to possession of the lands so soon as he has been notified of acceptance of tender, and has complied with all other conditions lawfully prescribed in that behalf.

 5. If the rent offered by two or more persons is the same amount, and is higher than that offered by any other tenderers, then the Council shall, after opening all the tenders, decide by lot, in such manner as it shall think fit, which of such two or more persons shall be declared the lessee.

 6. The deposits and fees paid by the unsuccessful tenderers for any lease shall be returned to them by the Council immediately after any tender for such lease has been accepted.
- 7. When the Council shall declare any person to be the lessee of any block it shall forthwith notify the same to such person by registered letter, addressed to such person at

the address given in the tender, and shall in such notice, require such person, within thirty days after such notice, to execute the lease in triplicate. If two or more persons jointly tender, the notice shall be posted to each of such persons. Such notice shall be in the Form L in the Regulations under "The Maori Lands Administration Act, 1900," or to the effect thereof.

8. If no tender shall be received prior to the time fixed for opening the tenders for any of the leases advertised for sale, any person may at any time thereafter apply for any one of such leases, unless the same shall have been withdrawn from sale by the Council, and be declared the lessee thereof at the upset rental fixed, upon complying with the other conditions prescribed as to tenders. If, in any such case, two or more applicants shall lodge their tenders on the same day, the right to the lease shall be decided by lot.

10. The Council may at any time reduce the upset value

10. The Council may at any time reduce the upset value of land which it has failed to lease for three months, and may again call for tenders for the same at such reduced

value.

11. The lease to be granted in pursuance of any tender may be in the Form M in the Regulations under "The Maori Lands Administration Act, 1900," or in such other

form as the circumstances may require.

12. No tender shall be accepted or lease granted except the same be in accordance with the provisions of "The Maori Lands Administration Act, 1900" (herein referred to as "the said Act"), and its amendments, and the regulations

made thereunder.

13. No lease shall comprise more than 2,000 acres, inclusive of not more than 640 acres of first-class land, except in the case of small grazing runs and pastoral leases, nor shall any lessee have any right to acquire the freehold of the demised land.

No lessee or person, by himself or by or jointly with any other person on his behalf, shall hold at one time, whether as occupier, lessee, assignee, sub-lessee, or otherwise, more than 2,000 acres, inclusive of not more than 640 acres of pastoral leases. Any occupation license, lease, assignment, sub-lease, or other instrument in contravention of this section shall be illegal and void from the commencement:

Provided always that this section shall not apply to any

person who acquires an interest in any lease by bankruptcy, or under an intestacy, or by virtue of a will.

14. The Council shall have power to offer for lease any lands as small grazing-runs which are suitable only for occupation in larger areas than 2,000 acres, and may classify occupation in larger areas than 2,000 acres, and may classify the land into first- or second-class pastoral country. 18. The lessee shall be liable for all rates, taxes, or assess ments of every nature or kind whatsoever imposed upon the occupier of the lands included in his lease during the term for which he is lessee.

The Council, upon being satisfied that any lease has been lost or accidentally destroyed, may grant a new lease in lieu thereof, upon such terms and conditions and upon payment of such fee in each case as it shall think fit. - 21. Every lease, after execution thereof as afore aid, shall be registered by the Council under "The Land Transfer Act, 1885," or any Act hereafter passed in lieu thereof, in like manner, as nearly as may be, mutatis mutandis, as a Crown grant is registered; and the lease which is retained in the office of the District Land Registrar shall form a folium of the register-book in such office, and on it all dealings therewith shall be registered; but no fee shall be payable by way of contribution to the assurance fund on the registration of any such lease.

All dealings with or transmissions of land comprised in such lease shall be made in accordance with the provisions of the last-mentioned Acts, and be in all respects subject

22. All dealings with or under leases in contravention of the provisions of the said Act as to transfers of leases shall be absolutely void, and the District Land Registrar shall

refuse to register any dealing with or under a lease until he is satisfied that the said provisions have been complied with.

23. Every lessee shall, within twelve months of the commencement of his term, and thereafter for a period of six consecutive years, reside on some portion of the lands leased

by him.

This condition shall not apply to any person who has acquired an interest in any lease under an intestacy or by virtue of a will.

The Council may dispense with the necessity of such residence, in the case of bush or swamp lands, during the first four years of the term, and altogether as to all lands if the lessee resides on lands contiguous to the lands leased, or with the concurrence of the Minister for any other sufficient reason. Lands shall be deemed to be contiguous to each other if only separated by a road or stream, or by such interval of space* as the Council may in each case determined. mine.

In cases of youths who may become lessees, and who are living within the Maori land district and are residing with their parents or near relatives, the Council may dispense with residence until four years after the commencement of the term.

When any two lessees shall lawfully intermarry, the Council may dispense with residence by either of such lessees on the lands comprised in one of the leases.

24. Every lessee shall bring into cultivation—

- - (a.) Within one year from the date of his lease, not less than one-twentieth of the land leased by him;
 - (b.) Within two years from the date of his lease, not less
 - than one-tenth of the land leased by him;
 (c.) Within four years from the date of his lease, not less than one-fifth of the land leased by him;

and shall, within six years from the date of his lease, in addition to the cultivation of one-fifth of the land, have put substantial improvements of a permanent character on first-class land to the value of £1 for every acre of such land, and on second-class land to an amount equal to the net price of every acre of such land: Provided that in no case shall the additional improvements required on second-class land be

more than 10s. per acre.

The terms "improvements," "substantial improvements, and "substantial improvements of a permanent character," mean and include reclamation from swamps, clearing of bush, gorse, broom, sweetbriar, or scrub, cultivation, plant-ing with trees or live hedges, the laying-out and cultivating of gardens, fencing, draining, making roads, sinking wells or water-tanks, constructing water-races, sheep-dips, making embankments or protective works of any kind, in any way improving the character and fertility of the soil, or the erection of any building.

25. Whenever a lease is to be sold or otherwise disposed of, 20. Whenever a lease is to be sold or otherwise disposed of, the valuation of the improvements shall, in all cases where it is not otherwise provided by the said Act, be made as by section eighty-three hereinafter provided; and payment of such valuation shall be made to the Council on or before the day of the commencement of the term of the new lease by the purchaser of such lease.

26. The amount of the valuation of the improvements, when paid by the purchaser of a new lease, shall be paid by the Council to the original lessee, less any arrears of rent or other moneys due in respect of such land by the outgoing tenant; and, in case of forfeiture, less also the amount of expenses incurred in recovering possession of the land and

the lease or other disposal thereof.

27. In every case of the forfeiture of a lease for breach of conditions, the payment of the amount of the valuation of improvements, or of any part thereof, shall be absolutely at the discretion of the Council.

28. If payment of any such valuation is not made as aforesaid, the Council may sue for and recover the same in any Court of competent jurisdiction from the person who should

make such payment.

29. In any case where a lease is granted with a right of 29. In any case where a lease is granted with a right of renewal for one further term only, not exceeding twenty-one years, the Council shall, on the expiration of such further term, or on the expiration of the original term, or in the case of a lease where the right of renewal is perpetual, on the expiration of any term, if the right of renewal has in any case been surrendered or otherwise determined, weight the land with the value of the improvements of the outgoing tenant on again offering it for lease; or the Council outgoing tenant on again offering it for lease; or the Council may in its discretion retransfer the land to the Native owners on payment of the value of the improvements and The value of such improvements and all other charges to which the land may be lawfully subject. The value of such improvements, or the balance thereof, after deducting any amounts which may be due to the Council by the outgoing lessee, shall, when recovered by the Council, be paid over to him.

30. No outgoing tenant shall have any right or claim against the Maori owners or the Council in respect of the value of any improvements made by him on the lands in his occupation, in case any person shall fail to pay such value to the Council:

Provided that in any such case of failure the Council may retransfer the land to the Native owners on payment of such value and all other charges to which the land may be lawfully subject.

All claims for compensation in respect of any matters 31. All claims for compensation in respect of any matters arising under the said Act, or for value of improvements or other matters, shall, unless otherwise specially provided, be settled in the manner provided in Part III. of "The Public Works Act, 1894," for which purpose the said Part III. shall be deemed to be incorporated with the said Act.

In every such claim the Council shall be the respondent.

32. Where it is provided or agreed that any matter shall be referred to arbitration, then such reference, unless herein otherwise provided, shall be to one or more arbitrators.

otherwise provided, shall be to one or more aroitrators appointed by the parties on each side respectively, and an umpire to be appointed by such arbitrators.

(a.) If either party shall fail to appoint an arbitrator within twenty-one days after being requested in writing to do so by the other party, then the arbitrator appointed by the other party shall alone conduct the arbitration, and his decision shall be final and binding on both parties.

(b.) If the said arbitrators shall fail to agree upon the

matter referred to them within twenty-eight days of the same having been so referred, then the matter so referred shall be decided by an umpire to be appointed by the said arbitrators, whose decision shall be final and binding on both decision

parties.

(c.) Every such arbitration shall be carried on in the manner prescribed by "The Arbitration Act, 1890," and be subject to such last-mentioned Act in the same manner as if the reference to such arbitration had been made by consent of parties under a deed

parties under a deed.

parties under a deed.

(d.) Each party shall pay his or its costs of such reference, and any costs incidental to the appointment of an umpire shall be paid equally by the parties to the arbitration.

(e.) Such arbitrators or umpire shall have all the powers vested in Commissioners by "The Commissioners' Powers Act, 1867," as well as all the powers given to them by "The Arbitration Act, 1890."

33. Not sooner than one year and not later than three months before the end of the original or renewed term for which the lease is granted, a valuation shall be made by arbitration, or in some other manner that may be agreed upon between the Council and the lessee, of the then value of the fee-simple of the lands then included in the lease, and also a valuation of all substantial improvements of a permanent character made by the lessee during the term and then in existence on the land then comprised in the lease. The publishing of the valuations made as aforesaid may be effected by serving a copy of the same on the lessee and another copy on the Council; and thereafter, but

not later than two months before, the expiry of the term for which the lessee then holds the lands, the lessee shall elect, by notice in writing delivered to the Council, whether he will accept a fresh lesse of the said lands for a further term of twenty-one years from the expiration of the then term, at a rental equal to not less than five pounds per centum on the gross value of the lands after deducting therefrom the value of the substantial improvements of a permanent character as fixed respectively.

34. If the lessee shall not elect to accept a renewal as above mentioned, or shall refuse or neglect to execute a lease within seven days after the same is tendered to him for the purpose, a lease of the said lands shall, not later than one month before the end of the term for which the ter-minating lease was granted, be put up to public compe-tition by public tender for such term of twenty-one years, on the following terms and conditions:—

(a.) The upset rent shall be such rent as shall be fixed by the Council, not being a greater sum than that at which the lease was offered to the outgoing lessee under the last preceding clause.
(b.) The amount of such upset rent shall be stated in the

(d.) When the day has arrived on which the terminating lease expires, or thereafter, if the Council shall have satisfied itself that the outgoing lessee has let the new lessee into quiet possession of the lands to be leased, and that none of the improvements on the lands which were thereon when the valuations mentioned in the last preceding clause were made have taints which were thereoff when the variations inentioned in the last preceding clause were made have been destroyed or appreciably damaged, the Council shall pay over to the outgoing lessee the amount received by it from the incoming lessee as aforesaid.

(e.) If any of the improvements as mentioned in the pre-

ceding subclause have been destroyed or appreciably damaged, as in the said subclause referred to, then the value of the improvements so destroyed, or the cost of repairing such damage, shall be decided by the Council or some person appointed by it; and the amount so fixed, with the costs attending such decision, shall be deducted from the amount payable as aforesaid to the outgoing lessee, and, save the amount deducted for costs, shall be returned to the incoming lessee.

25. If such lease shall not be disposed of as above mentioned to some person other than the lessee, or if such person fails to execute the lease in triplicate within thirty days, or to pay the sum offered by him as aforesaid within thirty days from the day on which the tenders were opened, then the lessee may again, within sixty days after the day fixed for the opening of the tenders, elect in a manner aforesaid whether he will accept a fresh lease as aforesaid; and if he does not elect to accept the same, or refuses or neglects to execute such lease within seven days after the same is tendered to him for the purpose, then he may continue as lessee of the said land from year to year, so long as he shall pay the rent reserved by his lease and observe and perform the covenants and conditions contained in the same or in this Act, or until the Council shall succeed in finding a purchaser of the new lease, unless, prior to the finding of such purchaser by the Council, he shall elect to accept a new lease for the said further period of twenty-one years as aforesaid.
