WHEREAS the respective Councils of the City of Dunedin and of the Borough of South Dunedin, by VV Dunedin and of the Borough of South Dunedin, by petitions under the respective common seals of the Corporations of such city and borough, as provided by "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1900," have prayed the Governor that such city and borough (forming one continuous area) be constituted one united borough:

Now, therefore, I, William Lee, Baron Plunket, Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1900," do hereby proclaim that the said City of Dunedin and the said Borough of South Dunedin are hereby constituted one borough, and also that the said borough so constituted is a city by the name of the City of Dunedin, and also that the said city so constituted and named is hereby divided into six wards, with the names and boundaries set forth in the Schedule hereto:

CAVERSHAM WARD.

THE HONOURABLE SIR J. G. WARD, K.C.M.G., PRESIDING IN COUNCIL.

THEREAS by Order in Council dated the tenth day of VV December, one thousand nine hundred and three, and published in the New Zealand Gazette of the seventeenth and published in the New Zealand Gazette of the seventeenth day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three, regulations were made under the authority of "The Post Office Act, 1900" (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), for the transmission of letters, books, packets, and newspapers through the post for places within New Zealand and beyond seas, prescribing, inter alia, the stamps to be used in the postage of such letters and other articles, and it is expedient to amend, in the manner hereinafter mentioned, the afore-

to amend, in the manner hereinafter mentioned, the aforesaid regulations prescribing the prepayment of postage by means of adhesive stamps:

Stamps of Rarotonga, Niue, or Penrhyn Island may not be used outside those dependencies respectively for prepayment of postage.

width, or, in the alternative, throughout the entire depth of the site, and shall be free from any erection thereon above the level of the ground, and shall be so maintained while the site is occupied by the dwelling-house.

5. The minimum distance across such open space from

every part of the dwelling-house, and from every part of any wash-house, shed, convenience, or other erection at-tached thereto, shall be as follows:—

(a.) If the height of the dwelling-house does not exceed

15 ft.—15 ft.

(b.) If the height exceeds 15 ft. but does not exceed 25 ft.—20 ft. (c.) If the height exceeds 25 ft. but does not exceed

35 ft.—25 ft. (d.) If the height exceeds 35 ft.—30 ft.

6. For the purposes of these by-laws, where the side boundaries of any site are not of the same length, the mean length of such side boundaries shall be taken as the depth the site for the purpose of defining the distance across such open space

7. The height of a dwelling-house shall, for the purpose of these by-laws, be measured from the average level of the ground immediately adjoining the side or the rear of such dwelling-house, as the case may be, to the level of half the vertical height of the roof, or to the top of the parapet,

the vertical height of the roof, or to the top of the parapet, whichever is the higher.

8. Where any alteration or addition is made to any dwelling-house (whether erected before the coming into operation of these by-laws or not), the open space attached to such dwelling-house shall not be diminished by such alteration or addition so as to leave a less area than is required by these by-laws to be provided.

9. The erection of a dwelling-house upon vacant land or upon a site previously occupied by any building, or the recetion of any dwelling-house pulled down to within 1 ft. of the ground floor, or the conversion into a dwelling-house of any building not originally constructed for human habitation, or the conversion into more than one dwelling-house of or any building not originally constructed for luthan instat-tion, or the conversion into more than one dwelling-house of a building originally constructed as one dwelling-house only, or an addition or raising of an existing dwelling-house (so far as such addition or raising is concerned), shall be deemed to be the erection of a new dwelling-house within the meaning of these by-laws.

ing of these by laws.

10. The ground upon which any dwelling-house is erected, together with the whole curtilage thereof enclosed within the boundary fences, walls, or lines of the premises, shall be deemed to be the site of such dwelling-house within the

meaning of these by-laws.

11. Every person who, after the coming into operation of these by-laws, shall do or cause to be done or be concerned in doing anything contrary to these by-laws, or any provision therein contained, or who shall omit to do anything required to be done by him, shall be deemed to have com-

mitted a breach of these by-laws.

12. Any person committing a breach of the foregoing by-laws shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds for every such offence, and in case of a continuous offence to a penalty of not more than five pounds for each day during which such offence

continues.

13. These by-laws shall affect the whole of the One-tree Hill Road District.

With Respect to Nightsoil, Closets, and Privies.

From and after the date upon which this by-law comes into operation no person shall make, build, erect, or permit or suffer to be made, built, or erected, any cesspool or cesspit, or any, or any other like receptacle for nightsoil, on any land situated within the area to which this by-law applies, or cover with earth, or bury, or permit or the first to be covered with earth, or buried, any nightsoil on any such land, or place, conduct, or drain, or continue to place, conduct, or drain, any nightsoil in or into any cesspit or cesspool erected and being on any such land, or deposit or place any nightsoil in any place or receptacle on such land, except in the pan or receptacle in a privy or closet as hereinafter mentioned.

 2. No person shall drain nightsoil, or permit the same to be
- nentioned.

 2. No person shall drain nightsoil, or permit the same to be drained or flow, into any channel, ditch, or drain on any land situated within such area, or into any river, stream, or watercourse on or adjoining any such land, or into any drain or ditch upon the line or within the limits of any roads,

streets, or ways within such area.

3. No person shall spill or cast, or permit or suffer any nightsoil to be spilt or cast, upon any land, street, road, or

way within such area.

4. No person shall remove, cart away, or permit to be removed or carted away, any nightsoil from any land situated within such area, or from any building, closet, or privy being thereon, without authority in writing from the Road Board.

- thereon, without authority in writing from the Road Board.
 5. From and after the date upon which this by-law shall come into operation, if in the opinion of the Road Board any privy or closet, building, or other receptacle for the deposit of nightsoil erected or being upon any land within such area (except where such privy, closet, building, or other receptacle is connected with the public sewers) is a nuisance, or likely to become a nuisance, or injurious to health, the Road Board may order the owner or occupier of any such land land.-
 - (a.) To abolish such privy, closet, building, or other receptacle;
 - (b.) To amend, alter, construct, or reconstruct the same or any part thereof, and to furnish the same so as to make the same conform with this by-law as hereinafter mentioned, and to satisfy the requirements thereof.
- 6. Every person who shall, at any time after the date of the coming into operation of this by-law, construct a closet or privy (except where such privy or closet is connected with the public sewers) on any land situate within such area shall construct and furnish the same in manner hereinafter provided.
 - (a.) He shall furnish such privy or closet with a reservoir or receptacle of suitable construction and of adequate capacity for dry earth or other deodorising substance, and he shall construct and fix such reservoir or receptacle in such manner and in such position as to admit of ready access to such reservoir or receptacle for the purpose of depositing therein the necessary supply of dry earth or other deodorising substance.

(b.) He shall construct or fix in connection with such reservoir or receptacle suitable means or apparatus for the frequent and effectual application sufficient quantity of dry earth or other deodorising substance to any filth which may from time to time be deposited in any pan constructed, fitted, or used in and in connection with such

closet.

(c.) He shall also place and provide in or in connection with such closet or privy a pan so that the position and adjustment of such pan may admit of the frequent and effectual application of a sufficient quantity of dry earth or other deodorising substance to any filth which may from time to time be deposited in such pan.

(d.) He shall also construct such closet or privy so that the contents of such pan may not at any time be

the contents of such pan may not at any time be exposed to any rainfall or to the drainage of waste water or liquid refuse from any adjoining pre-

(e.) He shall also construct such pan of such material e shall also construct such pan of such material and in such manner as to prevent any absorption by any part of such pan of any filth deposited therein, or any escape by leakage or otherwise of any part of the contents of such pan. (f.) He shall construct such pan so that the bottom or floor thereof shall be in every part at least three inches above the level of the surface of the ground

adjoining such pan.

(g.) He shall construct such closet or privy in such a manner and in such a position as to afford ready means of access thereto for the purpose of cleansmeans or access thereto for the purpose of cleansing the same and of removing filth therefrom, and in such a manner and in such a position as to admit of all filth being removed from such privy or closet, and from the premises to which such privy or closet may belong, without being carried through any dwellinghouse.

(h.) He shall provide such privy or closet with a sufficient opening for ventilation, as near to the top as practicable, and communicating directly with the

external air.

- (i.) He shall construct such privy or closet in such manner as to afford adequate access to the space beneath the seat thereof for the purpose of cleansing such space, or of removing therefrom or placing and fitting therein the appropriate pan for filth.
- (i.) No privy or closet shall have an opening directly on any road, street, or public place within such area.

With Respect to Night-carts.

1. No person shall convey any nightsoil along any street or road within such area between the hours of 7.30 a.m. and

With Respect to Nuisances.

1. No person shall lay or construct a drain under any public or private street or road, footpath, or right-of-way within such area, except such as shall be made or built of iron, stone, brick, glazed pipes, or concrete, and except with the consent in writing of the Road Board being first ob-

2. Neither the owner nor the occupier of any land situate within such area, or other person for the time being in charge of any premises thereon, shall cause, or permit, or suffer any offensive matter or liquid whatever to be dissuffer any offensive matter or liquid whatever to be discharged from such land or premises into or upon any street, road, or right-of-way, or public place within such area, or into or upon any ditch or drain being within the limits of such street, road, or right-of-way; and any such owner or occupier, or other person who, after receiving notice that offensive matter or liquid has been or is being so discharged, fails to remove the same, or to prevent and put an end to such discharge, shall be deemed to be guilty of a breach of this by-law. this by-law.

3. No person shall permit any land situated within such area, or any premises thereon, to become a nuisance by reason of injurious smells arising therefrom, or by the accu-

mulation of offensive matter thereon or therein.

4. All drains, water-closets, earth-closets, stables, dog-kennels, fowlhouses, outhouses, yards, and ashpits on any premises on any land situated within such area shall be maintained and kept by the owner, occupier, or agent of such land and premises so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and so that there shall be no overflow or soakage therefrom.

5. No person shall throw any animal with the intention of drowning it, or any dead animal, or offensive matter, or rubbish of any kind, into any river or public watercourse, drain, or water-channel within such area, or shall throw or leave any dead animal or offensive matter on any land, street,

or road within such area.

6. Every person who shall construct an ashpit in connection with a building shall construct such ashpit at a distance of six feet at the least from any dwellinghouse or public building, or any building in which any person may be, or may be intended to be, employed in any manufacture, trade,

7. He shall construct such ashpit in such a manner and in such a position as to afford ready means of access to such ashpit for the purpose of cleansing the same and of removing the contents thereof, and, so far as may be practicable, in such a manner and in such a position as to admit of the contents that he half he appeared therefore and from the such a manner and in such a position as to admit of the contents of such ashpit being removed therefrom, and from the premises to which such ashpit may belong, without being carried through any dwellinghouse or public building, or any building in which any person may be, or may be intended to be, employed in any manufacture, trade, or business.

8. He shall construct such ashpit of a capacity not exceeding in any case nine cubic feet, or of such less capacity as may be sufficient to contain all dust, ashes, rubbish, and dry refuse which may accumulate during a period not exceeding one week upon the premises to which such ashpit may be-

9. Any person committing a breach of or failing to comply with any of the provisions of this by-law shall be liable to, and shall for each offence forfeit and pay, a penalty not exceeding the sum of five pounds.

A minute knowledge of the works of these authors will not be looked for in this part of the examination, which will, however, test how far the candidates have studied the chief productions of the greatest English writers in themselves, and are acquainted with the leading characteristics of their thought and style, and of the place which each of them occupies in the history of English literature. Candidates will also be expected to show that they have studied in these authors the history of the English language in respect of its vocabulary, syntax, and prosody.

The other part of the examination will relate to the period vocabulary, syntax, and prosedy.

The other part of the examination will relate to the period

named below:-

A.D. 1600 to A.D. 1700. [Shakespeare to Dryden.] The examination in this part will require from candidates a more minute acquaintance with the history of the English language and literature, as illustrated in the chief works produced in the period, and will be based to a considerable extent, but by no means exclusively, on certain books specified by the Commissioners.* The names placed under the dates are intended to suggest the general character of the literary development of the period, and, consequently, the natural limits of the examination. All the works of Shakespeare, for example, will be regarded as falling within the period 1600 to 1700. period 1600 to 1700.

French Language and Literature .--Translation and composition. Critical questions on the French language and iterature. Conversation. literature.

German Language and Literature.--Translation and comosition. Critical questions on the German language and literature. Conversation.

Latin Language and Literature .--Translation from Latin into English, composition in prose and verse, or (as an alternative for verse-composition) an original prose composition in Latin. Critical questions on the Latin language (including questions on philology) and literature.

Greek Language and Literature.—Translation from Greek into English, composition in prose and verse, or (as an alternative for verse-composition) an original prose composition in Greek. Critical questions on the Greek language (including questions on philology) and literature.

Sanskrit Language and Literature.—Translation from Sanskrit into English, and from English into Sanskrit. History of Sanskrit literature (including knowledge of such Indian history as bears upon the subject); Sanskrit grammar; Vedic philology.

Arabic Language and Literature.—Translation as in Sanskrit; history of Arabic literature (including knowledge of such Arabic history as bears upon the subject); Arabic grammar; Arabic prosody.

English History.—General questions on English history from A.D. 800 to A.D. 1848; questions on the constitutional history of England from A.D. 800 to A.D. 1848.

General Modern History.—Candidates may, at their choice, be examined in any of the following periods:—

1. From the accession of Charlemagne to the Third

2. From the Third Crusade to the Diet of Worms.

A minute knowledge of the works of these authors will not be looked for in this part of the examination, which will, however, test how far the candidates have studied the chief productions of the greatest English writers in themselves, however, test how far the candidates have studied the chief productions of the greatest English writers in themselves, and are acquainted with the leading characteristics of their thought and style, and with the place which each of them occupies in the history of English literature. Candidates will also be expected to show that they have studied in these authors the history of the English language in respect of its vocabulary, syntax, and prosody.

The other part of the examination will relate to one of the periods named below, which will follow each other year by year in the order indicated.

A.D. 1700 to A.D. 1800. (1906.)[Pope to Cowper.] A.D. 1800 to A.D. 1832. (1907.) [Nineteenth Century writers to the death of Scott.] A.D. 1360 to A.D. 1600. (1908.) [Chaucer to Spenser.] A.D. 1600 to A.D. 1700. [Shakespeare to Dryden.] (1909.)

The examination in this part will require from candidates a more minute acquaintance with the history of the English language and literature, as illustrated in the chief works produced in each period, and will be based to a considerable extent, but by no means exclusively, on certain books specified each year by the Commissioners.* The names placed under the dates are intended to suggest the general character of the literary development of the period, and, consequently, the natural limits of the examination. All the works of Shakespeare, for example, will be regarded as falling within the period 1600 to 1700; all the works of Swift within the period 1700 to 1800; all the works of Scott and Wordsworth

and all the works of Macaulay within the period 1800 to 1832.

- 2. No person will be deemed qualified who shall not satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners:
 - (i.) That he is a natural-born subject of His Majesty.

(ii.) That he had attained the age of twenty-two and had not attained the age of twenty-four on the 1st day of August of the year in which the

examination is held.

[N.B.—In the case of Natives of India it will be necessary for a candidate to obtain a certificate of age and nationality issued under Notification of the Government of India, No. 2252, dated 21st August, 1888, as amended by Notification No. 404, dated 19th May, 1898, and signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the province, or the Commissioner of the division within which his family resides, or, should he reside in a Native State, by the highest political officer accredited to the State in which his family resides.]
(iii.) That he has no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit [N.B.-In the case of Natives of India it will be

(iv.) That he is of good moral character.

The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of the certificate of qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and, if the result of such inquiries in the case of any candidate should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Civil Service of India, and, if already selected, will be removed from the position of a probationer. Should any of the selected candidates become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled up or not. In the former case, the candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a selected candidate. A candidate entitled to be deemed a selected candidate, but declining to accept the nomination as such which may be offered to him, will be disqualified for any subsequent competition.

Deaths occurring at hospitals, of persons not residents of the borough wherein the hospital is situated, have been allotted in each case to the borough where the disease was contracted, and not to that in which the death actually took place.

The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 438, against 519 in January—a decrease of 81. The deaths in February were 147, a decrease of 50 on the number in January. Of the total deaths, males contributed 83, females 64. Thirty-six of the deaths were of children under five years of age, being 24 49 per cent. of the whole number; 28 of these were under one year of age.

There were forty-two deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: Seven men, 66, 67, 72 (two), 74, 77, 88, and four women, 65 (two), 71, 80, died at Auckland; five men, 67, 72, 76, 78, 84, and five women, 68 (two), 69, 79, 89, at Wellington; six men, 66, 68, 71, 74 (two), 90, and two women, 68, 80, at Christchurch; and eight men, 65, 69, 74, 78 (two), 81 (two), 89, and five women, 66, 70, 74, 78, 80, at Dunedin.

In the first table are given the deaths and death-rates for each of the four cities, for the suburban boroughs severally, and for each city with its suburban towns. As regards Auckland and Christchurch, the whole of the area usually recognised as suburban has not yet been brought under municipal government, and the vital statistics do not deal with such portions as still remain in road districts. But the omission is not very important, for there are in either case quite enough suburbs included within borough boundaries to give a fair idea of the death-rate of Greater Auckland and Greater Christchurch. As further boroughs are formed the vital statistics will be made to include them.

The inclusion of the suburban boroughs tends to lower the rate at Auckland and Dunedin, but raises it at Wellington.

Specific Febrile or Zymotic Diseases.—There were only 6 deaths at the four chief centres with their suburbs in ruary. From diarrhea the deaths numbered 4, all of children at Christchurch. The other 2 were from septicæmia February. From di and specific disease.

Constitutional Diseases.—Of 35 deaths, 16 were caused by cancer, 13 by phthisis, 3 by other tubercular complaints, 2 by anemia, and 1 by acute rheumatism.

Local Diseases.—The deaths at the chief towns were 82, or 55.78 of the total mortality for the month. Of these, 27 resulted from nervous diseases, and 27 also from diseases of the circulatory system, 11 of the respiratory and 12 of the digestive systems. There were also 4 deaths from diseases of the urinary, and 1 of the reproductive organs.

Violent Deaths.—Four were accidental and 3 suicidal. One death was caused by fracture of skull, 1 by tram, 1 by crushing (railway-truck), and 1 accident of birth. Two of the suicides were by poisoning, and 1 by hanging.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of the four centres from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.
