(2.) The duplicate shall, on the day of the receipt thereof by the Mining Registrar or Clerk of the Court, be posted in a conspicuous place either within or without the Court, and shall be kept posted, legible, and intact till the day of hearing of the application.

(3.) The applicant shall forthwith cause a conv of his

(3.) The applicant shall forthwith cause a copy of his application to be published in three consecutive issues of a local newspaper, and shall also keep a copy posted until the hearing in a conspicuous place on the building in which he intends to carry on his business as a licensed gold-dealer.

2. Any person may, either before or at the hearing of an application, object to the issue of a gold-dealer's license to any applicant: Provided that any objection may be communicated to the Warden or to the Minister by ordinary letter through the post; and, for the purpose of making due inquiry into the grounds of such objection, the Warden or Minister may defer dealing with the application for such period as may be necessary.

3. If the Minister decides to grant to any such applicant a gold-dealer's license he shall cause a license in the Form No. 2 in the Schedule hereto to be issued to such person. When any such license has been granted, and has been registered in the Register of Licensed Gold-dealers at the office of the Department of Mines in Wellington, it shall be forwarded to the Warden for delivery to the licensee.

4. (1.) An incorporated bank may, at any time during

An incorporated bank may, at any time during the month of December, apply in writing to the Minister for a general gold-dealer's license, and, on receipt of a fee of £5, together with £1 ls. in addition for each branch at which gold-dealing is to be carried on, such license may be granted in the Form No. 3 in the Schedule hereto.

(2.) Such license shall authorise the bank to deal in gold at every branch specified therein.

(3.) The manager, accountant, or officer in charge for the time being at every such branch shall be deemed to be a "licensee" within the meaning of the said Act.

(4.) The bank in the application for the license shall state the places at which such branches are established, and from time to time give to the Under-Secretary for Mines written notice of the establishment of any additional branch at which gold-dealing is to be carried on.

5. A Gold-dealer's Book, in the Form No. 4 in the Schedule hereto, shall be kept at the registered place of business of every gold-dealer, and at every branch of an incorporated bank holding a gold-dealer's license at which gold-dealing is carried on. Every licensed gold-dealer other than an incorporated bank, and, in the case of a bank, the manager, accountant, or officer in charge for the time being of the branch, as the case may be, shall personally conduct and carry out every transaction relating to the purchase or sale of gold, and shall, after every purchase or sale has been effected, forthwith record in his Gold-dealer's Book the prescribed particulars of the transaction.

IN exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Education Act, 1904," His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the colony, doth hereby amend the regulations relating to attendance registers and returns made by Order in Council dated the sixteenth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and three, by inserting after clause three the words in the Schedule hereto; and, with the like advice and consent, doth prescribe that this Order shall come into force on the date of the first publication thereof in the New Zealand Gazette.

# SCHEDULE.

3a. If any child whose name is entered upon the register of attendance of any school shall be duly attending at an examination conducted by the Department of Education or the Education Board of the district or the University of New Zealand, or at a camp of instruction for public-school cadets duly authorised by the Minister of Education, then the time recognitive event by such child at such school cadets duly authorised by the Minister of Education, then the time necessarily spent by such child at such examination or camp of instruction or in travelling thereto shall be reckoned as time spent in attendance at such school; and the head teacher thereat, upon receipt of a certificate under the hand of the Secretary to the Education Board as to the number of half-day attendances to be recorded for such child on account of such examination or camp as aforesaid, may add the total of such attendances to the total of those previously entered in the register of attendance belonging to the said school. Every such certificate when received shall be fastened into the said register, and shall not be removed. and shall not be removed.

N exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities L vested in him by "The Education Act, 1904," the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the colony, doth hereby revoke all regulations heretofore made under the authority of the said Act, or any Act thereby repealed, regarding staffs and salaries in public schools, and in lieu thereof doth make the regulations hereto annexed; and, with the like advice and consent, doth pre-scribe that this Order shall be deemed to have come into force on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and six.

#### REGULATIONS.

1. For the purposes of "The Education Act, 1904," and the Acts amending the same (hereinafter called "the Acts"), the average attendance to be taken as the basis of computations for any school year shall, except where it is prescribed otherwise, be the average daily attendance for the year ended 31st. December immediately preceding, called hereinafter "the yearly average attendance." The yearly average attendance yearly average attendance." The yearly average attendance for any school or department thereof shall be found by adding together the average daily attendances thereat for the four quarters ending 31st December, as ascertained at the end of each quarter, and dividing the total by four; and for any district it shall be the total of the yearly average attendances of all the schools in such district; the result in each case shall be averaged as a whole number correct to

tendances of all the schools in such district; the result in each case shall be expressed as a whole number correct to the nearest unit, one half being reckoned as a whole.

2. (a.) On the 1st January in each year the schools in each district shall, according to the yearly average attendance of each school respectively, be placed in the grades named in the scale of staffs and salaries in Part I of the Schedule to "The Education Act Amendment Act, 1905" (hereinafter called "the Schedule").

(b.) If the average attendance at any school for any quarter is less than two-thirds of the average weekly roll-number for such quarter, or is such as to place the school in a grade lower than that in which it would be placed by the mean of the average attendances for the other three quarters of the the average attendances for the other three quarters of the year, or if there be in any quarter less than thirty half-days on which the average attendance is at least half the number of the children on the roll, then, in order to find the yearly average attendance, there may, at the option of the Board, be substituted for the average attendance for such first-named quarter either the average attendance for the corresponding quarter of the preceding year or the average attendance for the quarter ending 31st December of the preceding year, and the yearly average attendance thus found shall be in lieu of the yearly average attendance as defined in clause 1 hereof.

If in any of the four cases hereinafter in this clause set forth the average daily attendance at a school shall increase as described therein, the Board may at its discretion make such addition to the staff as will bring it into accord with the staff provided for in Part I of the Schedule for a school

6. (a.) Clauses 3, 4, and 5 shall affect the average attendance for a school only during the quarter therein prescribed and any subsequent quarter in the same year. In the following year such school shall, in accordance with clause 2 hereof, be placed in the grade corresponding with the yearly

average attendance thereat.

(b.) Nothing in the said clauses 3, 4, and 5 shall be deemed to affect the average attendance upon which is computed the salary of any member of the staff whose appointment or

removal shall not have been made by virtue thereof.
7. In any school placed on the 1st January in grade 0, the average attendance on which the salary for any subsequent quarter shall be paid shall be the average daily attendance for the quarter immediately preceding, or the yearly average attendance for the year ending 31st December preceding, whichever shall be higher, 8. In the case of the opening of a new school, or of the reopening of a school that has been closed for more than six months immediately preceding, the amount of the salaries due to the teachers of the school from the date of opening or reopening thereof shall be paid to the Board after the first calendar month in which the school shall have been open continuously on and after the first Monday of the month; and the staff and salaries shall be calculated on the average daily attendance from the day of the opening or reopening of daily attendance from the day of the opening or reopening of the school until the end of such month; and in like manner for each subsequent month until the end of the first quarter during the whole of which the school shall have been open, when the average attendance from the date of opening or reopening of the school to the end of such quarter shall be held to be the yearly average attendance until the end of the next ensuing quarter; and in like manner for each subsequent quarter until the end of the school year in which the school shall have been open continuously for not less than one quarter immediately preceding the end of such year, when the average daily attendance from the opening or reopening of the school to the end of such year shall he held to be the of the school to the end of such year shall be held to be the yearly average attendance in the same way as if it were the

yearly average attendance in the same way as it is were one average attendance for the whole year.

9. As soon as, under the provisions of the Acts and of these regulations, a reduction in the staff of a school is imminent, it shall be the duty of the Board to give notice to every teacher whom it may deem it necessary to discharge in order to come out such reduction.

10. In the case of a reduction in the staff of a school, or in 10. In the case of a reduction in the staff of a school, or in the case of the closing of a school, such amount shall be paid to the Board in respect of the teachers whose services are dispensed with as will enable the Board to comply with section 63 of "The Education Acr, 1904"; but, with the exceptions set forth in clause 14, on no account will payment be made to the Board for the salary of any teacher for a longer period than three months after the end of the quarter in which the school ceases to be entitled to the services of such teacher; nor in the case of the closing of services of such teacher; nor, in the case of the closing of a school, for a longer period than three months after the closing of such school.

11. Average daily attendance for the purposes of subsection 1 (b) of section 6 of "The Education Act, 1904," shall for any quarter be the average daily attendance for the quarter immediately preceding.

12. The sums payable to Boards under section 6 of "The Education Act, 1904," for the salaries of teachers and pupil-teachers, as determined by the operation of the Schedule and these regulations, shall be paid to the Boards in monthly instalments. instalments.

13. Average attendance for the purposes of the Second Schedule to "The Education Act Amendment Act, 1904" ("House Allowances") shall be the yearly average attendance as defined by clause 1 of these regulations; except that in the case of a new school, or of the reopening of a school which has been closed for more than six months school which has been closed for more than six months immediately preceding, the average attendance for the first quarter during the whole of which the school has been open shall be the attendance on which the house allowance for

shall be the attenuance of the year is paid.

14. (a.) If at the beginning of any year a school is reduced from a higher to a lower grade, the salaries of the assistants or pupil-teachers provided for in the higher grade but not provided for in the lower grade may, at the discretion of the Minister, be paid until the 30th April following, but no longer unless:

(b.) The average attendance for the first quarter of the (c.) The average attendance for the first quarter of the year exceeds by five in the case of a school in a grade lower than grade 11, or by ten in the case of a school of grade 11 or a higher grade, the maximum for such lower grade, in which case payment of the salary or salaries may be continued until the 31st July following.

(c.) And, further, if in such school the average attendance for each of the first two quarters of the year average by five in

for each of the first two quarters of the year exceeds by five in the case of a school in a grade lower than grade 11, or by ten in the case of a school in grade 11 or a higher grade, the maximum for the lower grade aforesaid, then payment of the salaries referred to may be continued until the 30th September following, but no longer, unless the conditions of clause 3 of these regulations be satisfied.

(d.) The payments made in subclauses (b) and (c) hereof shall be at the discretion of the Minister, and shall not be made unless his sanction shall have been previously ob-

tained.

(e) This regulation shall not affect the staff or salaries in any school except as regards the payment of the salaries referred to.

#### District High Schools.

15. The foregoing regulations relating to average attendance at an ordinary public school shall in all respects apply to the primary department of a district high school.

16. A certificate of proficiency shall be the qualification for admission to the secondary department of a district high

school:

Provided that if the number of pupils in the secondary department of a district high school would otherwise be less than 20, the Board may at its discretion also admit to such secondary department any pupil who has gained a certificate of competency in Standard VI; but in no case shall the attendance of any pupil be included in the yearly average attendance for the secondary department, unless he has obtained at least a certificate of competency in Standard VI.

If, in any of the three cases hereinafter in this clause set forth, the average daily attendance in the secondary department of a district high school shall increase as described therein, the Board may at its discretion make such addition to the staff as will bring it into accord with the staff prescribed in Part VI of the Schedule for a department in the grade to which it shall be advanced.

- (a.) A secondary department having on the 1st January a yearly average attendance of over 30 which at the beginning of any subsequent quarter has had an average attendance

On the 1st January following such department shall (in accordance with clause 2 hereof) be placed in the grade corresponding with the yearly average attendance the restricted. responding with the yearly average attendance thereat; and, further, nothing in the said clauses shall be deemed to affect the average attendance upon which is computed the salary of any member of the staff of such department who shall not have been appointed or removed thereunder.

20. In the case of the establishment of a new district high school, the average attendance of the primary and secondary departments thereof shall be found in accordance with clause 8 of these regulations in the same way as if such primary and secondary departments respectively were new

schools.

21. The teachers of the secondary department in any district high school shall not be employed in the primary department of such school, except in so far as it may be necessary for one or more of them to give instruction during the time that the head teacher is giving instruction in the second-ary department; nor shall any teacher in the primary de-partment other than the head teacher devote any part of the ordinary school hours to the instruction of the secondary de-

#### HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

In pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred upon him by "The Education Act, 1904," and of all other powers and authorities him enabling in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby, in respect of the regulations made by Orders in Council dated the fourteenth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and two, the fourth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and three, and the fourth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and four, under the authority of the Act first hereinbefore mentioned, revoke clauses forty-five, sixty, and sixty-seven, also clauses seventy-seven to seventy-seven (j) inclusive, thereof, and in lieu of the said clauses doth make the regulations set forth in the Schedule hereto; and with the like advice and consent doth declare that this Order shall come into force on the date of the publication thereof in the New Zealand Gazette.

#### SCHEDULE.

#### II .- SPECIAL AND ASSOCIATED CLASSES.

45. Classes for commercial instruction to be approved by the Minister as "technical classes" must provide for regular instruction in such subjects as may properly be included in one or other of the following courses:—

(1.) Commercial correspondence and précis-writing. Office

(1.) Commercial correspondence and precis-whiting. Omce routine (as for correspondence clerks).
 (2.) Commercial or actuarial arithmetic. Book-keeping (as for accountants).
 (3.) Mercantile and commercial practice (as for shipping (4.) Mercantile and commercial law and other clerks.
 (5.) Other similar courses, or combinations of courses (1)

to (4).

Capitation at the rate prescribed for technical classes will not be paid on account of the attendances of any student who has not attended regularly throughout the year classes for instruction in the subjects included in his course of commercial instruction.

V.—Grants in Aid of Buildings, Fittings, Furniture, and Permanent Apparatus.

60. All grants for buildings, fittings, furniture, and permanent apparatus will be subject to the appropriation of moneys by the General Assembly for that purpose, and the Minister may, if he deem fit, pay the whole or part of the amount for which application is made, or he may decline to make any grant whatever. Grants in aid of buildings, fittings, furniture, and permanent apparatus will be paid to the controlling authority of the classes.

#### VI .- GRANTS IN AID OF MATERIAL.

67. Under the head of "Material" may be included the material necessary for demonstrations and for individual practical work in classes for instruction in art, science, or technology (see clause 43 hereof), and also apparatus and appliances for use in connection with such classes and re-

appliances for use in connection with such classes and requiring to be replaced from year to year.

67. (a.) The following, among others, may be regarded as material—lead, timber, chemicals, modelling-clay, foodstuffs—but not articles included under the head of stationery.

#### VIII .- FREE PLACES.

77. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary regulations as to scholarships made under "The Education Act, 1877," the Education Board of any district may, if it see fit, allow scholarships granted under the said Act to be held at any educational institution approved by the Minister, at which instruction is given in technical, commercial, or agricultural subjects, provided that such instruction is higher than they which is given in public school discussed. than that which is given in public schools in school classes under the Act.

#### JUNIOR FREE PLACES.

JUNIOR FREE PLACES.

77. (a.) Subject to these regulations, a pupil shall be qualified to be a junior free pupil or the holder of a junior free place under the Act if, being not under thirteen years of age, he is the holder of an Education Board Scholarship, a National Scholarship, a Queen's Scholarship, or any other scholarship that the Minister shall approve for the purpose: Provided that the value of any such scholarship is not greater than £40 per annum in the case of any pupil who is obliged to live away from home in order to attend the technical school, or than £10 per annum in any other case; or if he has qualified for an Education Board Scholarship, or for a free place in the examination for Junior National Scholarships, or in the special examination for junior free places held by the Education Department; or if he has obtained a certificate of proficiency as defined under "The Education Act, 1904." 1904.

77. (b.) Subject to these regulations, the following payments, in addition to the capitation payable under the Act, shall be made to the controlling authority of classes under the Act on account of each junior free pupil admitted to such classes, namely :-

(i.) For each attendance at a recognised technical class in any of the subjects named in clauses 43, 45, and 47 of these regulations, a payment of 3d.:

and 47 of these regulations, a payment of 3d.:

(ii.) For each attendance at a recognised continuation class in any of the subjects named in division (2), (3), (4), or (5) of clause 40 of these regulations, or in book-keeping or shorthand, a payment of 3d.:

Provided that no such payment shall be made on account of a junior free pupil for any class in which he has made less than twenty hour-attendances during the year: Provided further that under this clause not more than £5 shall be paid on account of any one junior free pupil in each year.

77. (c.) Every holder of a junior free place granted under these regulations shall receive in each year instruction in—

(i.) English of a standard higher than that required for

(i.) English of a standard higher than that required for Standard VI of the public-school syllabus, or in one of the languages named in division (3) of clause 40 of these regulations; the English to include English composition and a study of one or more than one of the works of some standard author or authors—not less than 600 lines of poetry and 100 lines of prose in a year.

(ii.) Arithmetic as for Standard VII of the public-school syllabus, or mathematics, or commercial or actuarial arithmetic. (See divisions (4), (5), and (6) of clause 40 of these regulations.)

He must receive the instruction referred to in (i) and (ii) at classes established by the controlling authority, at each of which he must make not less than twenty hour-attendances

during each year.

He must also attend in each year one or more technical classes in subjects named in clauses 43, 45, and 47 of these regulations, and must make in respect of each class so attended not less than twenty hour-attendances during the

The instruction he receives during the two years that he

The instruction he receives during the two years that he holds a junior free place must have reference to a definite course of technical instruction. No capitation under clause 77, (b), hereof will be paid in respect of attendances at classes which have not a bearing on such course.

77. (d.) A junior free place is tenable for two years from the 1st January preceding the actual date of admission as a free pupil, but a pupil shall cease to hold a junior free place if he fails to make in either year of his tenure the minimum number of hour-attendances at each of the classes prescribed in clause 77, (c), hereof; and, further, shall not be eligible to hold any other free place, whether at a technical school, a secondary school, or a district high school, unless such failure was caused by illness or other sufficient cause.

#### SENIOR FREE PLACES.

77. (e.) A pupil shall be qualified to be the holder of a senior free place if he has been the holder for two years of a junior free place, and has passed such examination as the Minister may approve in the subjects in which he has received instruction as a junior free pupil, or if he is the holder of an Education Board Scholarship, a National Scholarship, or any other scholarship that the Minister may approve for the purpose: Provided that the value of any such scholarship.

ship is not greater than £40 per annum in the case of any pupil who is obliged to live away from home in order to attend the technical school, or than £10 per annum in any other case; or if he has passed the Matriculation Examination, or the Civil Service Junior Examination, or the special examination for senior free places held by the Education Department; or has qualified for an Education Board

Department; or has qualified for an Education Board Scholarship.

77. (f.) Subject to these regulations, a payment of 3d. for each hour-attendance at a recognised technical class in any of the subjects named in clauses 43, 45, and 47 hereof, in addition to the capitation payable under the Act, shall be made to the controlling authority of classes under the Act on account of each senior free pupil admitted to such classes: Provided that no such payment shall be made on account of a free pupil for any class at which he has made less than twenty hour-attendances during the year: Provided further that under this clause not more than £5 shall be paid on account of any one free pupil in each year.

account of any one free pupil in each year.

77. (g.) Every holder of a senior free place granted under these regulations shall take up a definite course of technical instruction, which course shall be determined by the director of the technical school, due regard being had to the calling or profession which the pupil is following or has in view. The instruction must be of a more advanced character than that

instruction must be of a more advanced character than that given to holders of junior free places.

77. (h.) A senior free place shall be tenable for three years from the 1st January preceding the actual date of admission as a senior free pupil, but a pupil shall cease to hold a senior free place if he fails to make in any year of his tenure the minimum number of hour-attendances at a class in any subject included in his course of instruction; and, further, shall not be eligible to held over these face also as the three free place. shall not be eligible to hold any other free place, whether at a technical school, a secondary school, or a district high school, unless such failure was caused by illness or other sufficient cause.

#### GENERAL.

77. (i.) Any holder of a free place who after his admission to a technical school shall remove more than five miles from the technical school at which his free place is held may conthe technical school at which his free place is held may continue to hold his free place at any other technical school on the same terms as if he had remained at the first named school, or at a secondary school, or at a district high school, subject to the regulations governing free places at such school: Provided that, except in the case of such removal, the holder of a free place at a technical school shall not be entitled to continue to hold his free place at a secondary school or at a district high school school or at a district high school.

77. (j.) Free railway tickets will be granted where neces-

sary to holders of junior or senior free places.

5. In clause 14, by adding the following words: "(ii.) Except as provided in clause 15 hereof, any junior or senior free pupil who has so forfeited his free place, or who has failed to complete two years' study while a free pupil at a secondary school or district high school, shall not be eligible for a junior or senior free place at a t-chnical school, as the case may be; and vice versa any one who has forfeited a junior or senior free place at a technical school, or who has failed to complete two years' study while a free pupil, shall not be eligible for a junior or senior free place at a secondary school or district high school."

In exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities conferred by "The Civil Service Reform Act, 1886," and of all other powers and authorities enabling him in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby revoke all examination referred to in the said Act, and in lieu thereof doth make the regulations set forth in the Schedule hereto; and with the like advice and consent doth prescribe that this order shall come into force on the date of the first publication thereof in the New Zealand Gazette.

#### SCHEDULE.

# REGULATIONS FOR THE JUNIOR EXAMINATION.

1. The competitive examination (hereinafter called "the Junior Examination") required by "The Civil Service Reform Act, 1886," shall be held every year in the month of November, December, or January, in every city or borough in which the Board of any education district has its office, and in any other places that may from year to year be appointed for the purpose by the Minister of Education. At least six months' notice shall be given of the date of the examination.

cation. At least six months' notice shall be given of the date of the examination.

2. Every candidate for the Junior Examination must give notice, and such notice must be in a form prescribed by the Minister of Education, and must be sent so as to be delivered at the office of the Education Department not later

than the 30th day of September next before the examination: Provided that a candidate's notice shall be received between the 30th day of September and the 15th day of October if it is accompanied by a bank receipt for a late fee of £1 sterling, in addition to the receipt referred to below for the ordinary entrance fee. With the aforesaid notice each candidate must send-

- (a.) A bank receipt for the payment of £1 sterling to the Public Account at some branch of the Bank of New Zealand; and
- (b.) The names of the optional subjects chosen by the candidate.

If the candidate is willing to accept appointment to some one particular Department only, or to one of two or more Departments, and to no other, it will be necessary for him to send-

- (c.) The name of the particular Department or Departments.
- 3. As soon as possible after a Junior Examination has been held the Minister of Education shall publish a list of the names of the candidates that have passed the examination, arranged in the order of their merit, which order shall be wholly determined by the marks assigned to the several candidates by the several examiners.
- 4. The name of every candidate that has passed the Junior Examination, and no other name, shall be included in the list of names in order of merit to be published as aforesaid.
- 5. Appointments to places in the Civil Service (with the exceptions indicated in "The Civil Service Reform Act, 1886"), in the order in which vacancies occur, shall be offered to the candidates in the order in which their names appear in the list of the results of the Junior Examination pub-lished next before the date at which the appointments are offered; except that a candidate for appointment to one particular Department only, or to one of two or more particular Departments only, named by him at the time of giving the notice required by clause 2 of these regulations, shall not receive an offer of appointment to any Department that he has not so named; and that girls shall receive offers of appointment to such vacancies only as in the opinion of the Departments concerned are suitable for girls.
- 6. Every candidate, on receiving an offer of appointment, must produce
  - (a.) Evidence of having attained an age of not less than fifteen nor more than twenty-one years on the 1st day of December nearest the examination. This evidence shall be a Registrar's certificate of birth: Provided that in the case of a candidate for whom rrovided that in the case of a candidate for whom it is impossible to obtain a Registrar's certificate of birth it shall be for the Colonial Secretary to decide what other documentary evidence of age and identity may be accepted instead of such certificate.
  - (b.) A medical certificate of fitness for the service, which certificate shall be in the form prescribed in clause 14 hereof; and the appointment shall not take effect until the certificate is received and approved of.

- 7. A candidate that declines an offer made to him under clause 5 shall have his name struck off the list of can-didates for appointment, unless the Colonial Secretary other-

9. The maximum marks assignable by examiners in the several subjects shall be—in English, 600; in arithmetic, 300; in any subject of Group II, 300; in mathematics or any language other than English, 400; in any branch of drawing, 100; and in every other subject, 200.

10. In order to pass the examination a candidate must gain 33 per cent. in each of the compulsory subjects (English and arithmetic), and 40 per cent. of the total possible maximum of marks assignable—that is, he must gain 800 marks in the aggregate.

11. In order to pass the examination with credit a candidate must gain, subject to clause 10, at least 50 per cent. in the two compulsory subjects taken together, and at least 50 per cent. of the total possible maximum of marks assignable -that is, he must gain at least 1,000 marks in the aggregate.

12. In any case, if the marks assigned to a candidate's work in any subject are less than 25 per cent. of the maximum assignable in that subject, such marks shall not be included in reckoning the candidate's aggregate of marks.

13. The scope of the Civil Service Junior Examination is

here set forth.

(8.) Elementary Geology.—The composition, form, size, and heat of the earth. Divisions of rocks: igneous, sedimentary, metamorphic. Rock structure: lamination, stratification, false bedding, cleavage, foliation, joints, columnar jointing. General characters and composition of the following groups of minerals, with special reference to their New Joining. General characters and composition of the following groups of minerals, with special reference to their New Zealand localities: quartz, opal, and chalcedony; feldspars; micas; hornblendes and augites; carbonates of lime and magnesia; oxides and sulphides of iron. Candidates may be required at the examination to recognise and to describe specimens or preparations of parts of the animal body, or to prepare an animal, such as a rabbit, so as to display the general arrangement of the circulatory, the respiratory, the digestive, or the nervous system. Practical work requiring the use of the compound microscope will not be demanded.

(12.) Elementary Physical Measurements.—The candidate will be expected to show that he has acquired his knowledge of the matters set forth in the subjoined syllabus by actual experiment, observation, and measurement; but he will not be expected to show that he is familiar with other than the simple apparatus and appliances commonly used in connection with elementary instruction in practical physics in primary or secondary schools.

(13.) Elementary Practical Agriculture. — The candidate will be expected to show that he has a practical knowledge of the operations incident to the work of a school garden, and that he has conducted experiments and observations bearing on the life and growth of plants, on the lines indi-cated below under the head of Experimental and Observational Work :-

Work in the Garden .- General: Preparation of the land; Work in the Garden.—General: Preparation of the land; digging, trenching, hoeing, raking, and surface cultivation. Drawing drills. Sowing. Thinning, pricking off, hardening, and planting out seedlings. Methods of treating light and heavy soils. Fertilisers; the time of year and the condition in which to apply fertilisers. The selection of fertilisers for particular purposes. Use of lime, soot, clay, road-sweepings, ashes, leaf-mould, &c., as soil-improvers. Arrangement of the garden to the best advantage from the points of view of space, succession of crops, and weeding. The application of preventives and remedies for garden pests and diseases. and diseases.

Special: Methods of plant-cultivation. Cultivation and management of plants selected from one or more of the

following groups:—

(i.) Green, pod-bearing, and tap-rooted vegetables, potatoes, onions, vegetable marrows, tomatoes.

Gathering and storing of vegetables.

(ii.) Flowering plants (annuals, perennials, and bulbs).

Methods of propagating flowering plants. Succession of crops.

(iii.) Tree and bush fruits. The care of fruit-trees. The operations of pruning, budding, and grafting.
 (iv.) Cereals and other grasses, and fodder-plants gene-

rally.

The Stem and Buds:—General structure and functions of stems. The "habit" of a plant. The habits of different plants compared. Twining and climbing plants. Experiments on the work of stems (e.g., Effect on a plant of "ringing" the stem. How the sap circulates. Demonstration of the presence of starch and sugar in stems, &c.). stems, &c.).

the Flower and Fruit:—The parts of the flower and their functions. Causes influencing the opening and closing of flowers. Pollination. Devices for the protection of pollen, for the prevention of self-pollination, and the promotion of cross-pollination. The formation of fruits. Different types of fruits. Devices for the protection of seeds from foes. Dissemination of seeds. Experiments on cross-fertilisation.

The Soil:—How soil is made. The mechanical analysis of soil. The texture of soil. The soil as a sponge from which a plant may obtain water, as a storehouse of plant food, and as a laboratory in which plant-food is prepared and dissolved. Experiments with soils (e.g., How moisture is held in the soil. How the moisture-holding capacity of a soil may be increased. Conservation of moisture. Rate of evaporation at surface of different soils. How the texture of a soil may be improved. The selection and testing of fertilisers).

The care of plants. The principles of pruning. The enemies of plants. The life-histories of the commoner animal pests. How to preserve specimens of plants.

#### Group III.

(14.) Elementary Mathematics.—(a.) Algebra:—Fundamental operations; easy fractions involving the knowledge of the factors of expressions that are the product of binomial factors, and of such expressions as  $a^3 \pm b^3$  and  $a^8 \pm 3a^2 b + 3a b^2 \pm b^3$ , only numerical coefficients being used; common multiples and divisors to correspond; simple easy quadratic equations involving one or two unknown quantities, and easy quadratic equations involving one unknown quantity; easy problems; graphs of simple algebraical functions within the limits of the foregoing work, and graphical methods of solving simple equations involving two unknown quantities. quantities.

(b.) Geometry:—
The examination in geometry shall include questions on practical and on theoretical geometry. Every candidate shall be expected to answer questions in both branches of

the subject.

The questions on practical geometry shall be set on the constructions contained in Section A, together with easy extensions of them. In cases where the validity of a extensions of them. In cases where the validity of a construction is not obvious, the reasoning by which it is justified may be required. Every candidate shall provide himself with a ruler graduated in inches and tenths of an inch and in centimeters and millimeters, set-squares, a protractor, compasses, and a hard pencil. All figures should be drawn accurately. Questions may be set in which the use of the set-square or of the protractor is forbidden.

The questions in theoretical geometry shall consist of theorems contained in Section B, together with questions upon these theorems, easy deductions from them, and arithmetical illustrations. Any proof of a proposition shall be accepted which appears to the examiners to form part of a systematic treatment of the subject; the order in which the theorems are stated in Section B is not imposed as the sequence of their treatment.

In the proof of theorems and deductions from them, the

In the proof of theorems and deductions from them, the use of hypothetical constructions shall be permitted. Proofs which are applicable only to commensurable magnitudes shall be accepted.

SECTION A.—PRACTICAL GEOMETRY.

#### SECTION B .- THEORETICAL GEOMETRY.

Angles at a Point.

If a straight line stands on another straight line, the sum of the two angles so formed is equal to two right angles; and the converse.

If two straight lines intersect, the vertically opposite angles are equal.

Parallel Straight Lines.

When a straight line cuts two other straight lines, if

(i.) A pair of alternate angles are equal; or (ii.) A pair of corresponding angles are equal; or

(iii.) A pair of interior angles on the same side of the cutting line are together equal to two right angles

then the two straight lines are parallel; and the converse.

Straight lines which are parallel to the same straight line are parallel to one another.

Triangles and other Rectilinear Figures.

The sum of the angles of a triangle is equal to two right angles.

If the sides of a convex polygon are produced in order, the

sum of the angles so formed is equal to four right angles.

If two triangles have two sides of the one equal to two sides of the other, each to each, and also the angles contained by those sides equal, the triangles are congruent.

If two triangles have two angles of the one equal to two angles of the other, each to each, and also one side of the one equal to the corresponding side of the other, the triangles are congruent.

If two sides of a triangle are equal, the angles opposite to

these are equal; and the converse.

If two triangles have the three sides of the one equal to the three sides of the other, each to each, the triangles are congruent.

If the two right-angled triangles have their hypotenuses equal, and one side of the one equal to one side of the other, the triangles are congruent.

If two sides of a triangle are unequal, the greater side has

the greater angle opposite to it; and the converse.

Of all the straight lines that can be drawn to a straight line from a given point outside it, the perpendicular is the shortest.

The opposite sides and angles of a parallelogram are equal, each diagonal bisects the parallelogram, and the diagonals bisect one another.

If there are three or more parallel straight lines, and the intercepts made by them on any straight line that cuts them are equal, then the corresponding intercepts on any other straight line that cuts them are also equal.

#### Areas.

Parallelograms on the same or equal bases and of the same altitude are equal in area.

Triangles on the same or equal bases and of the same altitude are equal in area.

Equal triangles on the same or equal bases are of the same altitude

Illustrations and explanations of the geometrical theorems corresponding to the following algebraical identities:

$$k (a + b + c + ...) = ka + kb + kc + ...$$

$$(a + b)^{2} = a^{2} + 2ab + b^{2},$$

$$(a - b)^{2} = a^{2} - 2ab + b^{2},$$

$$a^{2} - b^{2} = (a + b) (a - b).$$

The locus of a point which is equidistant from two fixed points is the perpendicular bisector of the straight line joining the two fixed points.

The locus of a point which is equidistant from two intersecting straight lines consists of the pair of straight lines which bisect the angles between the two given lines.

- (15.) Greek.—Candidates will be expected to show such a knowledge of the language and of its vocabulary and grammar as may be gained by the study of Xenophon's Anabasis, Book II; but candidates will not be expected to have read that particular book, nor will the passages for translation necessarily be taken from it. Great importance will be attached to translation from Greek, and writing easy passages or sentences in Greek.
- (16.) Latin.—Candidates will be expected to show such a knowledge of the language and its vocabulary and grammar as may be gained by the study of Caesar's Gallic War, Book II; but candidates will not be expected to have read that particular book, nor will the passages for translation necessarily be taken from it. Great importance will be attached to translation from Latin, and to writing easy passages or sentences in Latin.
- (17.) French.—Candidates will be expected to show such a knowledge of the language and of its vocabulary and grammar as may be gained (1) by easy conversation in French about the facts of every-day life, (2) by the study of Jules Verne's Le Tour du Monde en quatrevingts jours (Siepmann's French Course); but candidates will not be expected to have read that particular book, nor will the passages for translation processes with the taken from it. Creat importance will tion necessarily be taken from it. Great importance will be attached to translation from French, and to the writing of easy passages and sentences in French.
- (18.) German.—Candidates will be expected to show such a knowledge of the vocabulary and grammar of the language as may be gained (1) by easy conversation in German about the facts of every-day life, (2) by the study of Von Wilden-bruch's Das edle Blut (Siepmann's German Course); but cannot be expected to have read that particular didates will book, nor will the passages for translation necessarily be taken from it. Great importance will be attached to trans-lation from German, and to the writing of easy passages or sentences in German. German script will not be insisted
- (19), (20). Italian, Spanish.—The syllabus in any of these subjects will be supplied on application to the Inspector-General of Schools, Wellington.

(21.) Maori.—Candidates will be expected to show such a knowledge of the language and of its vocabulary and grammar as may be gained (1) by easy conversation in Maori about the facts of every-day life, (2) by the study of the story of Tawhaki in Sir George Grey's Mythology and Traditions of the New-Zea'anders; but candidates will not be expected to have read that particular story, nor will the passages for translation necessarily be taken from it. Great importance will be attached to translation from Maori, and to the writing will be attached to translation from Maori, and to the writing of casy passages and sentences in Maori.

(22.) English History.—The requirements will be based on (22.) English History.—The requirements will be based on the programme of work prescribed in clause 49 of the Regulations for the Inspection and Examination of Schools, but will be more advanced in character. Especially, a somewhat fuller knowledge of the history of the nineteenth century will

be required.

(23.) Shorthand.—Writing eighty words a minute, and transcribing accurately into longhand.

(24.) Book-keeping and Commercial Correspondence.—The requirements will include commercial arithmetic and tots

and easy *précis*-writing.

and easy précis-writing.

Book-keeping: — The object and value of book-keeping.

Double entry: its meaning and advantages. The form, nature, and classification of accounts. The balancing and closing of accounts. The explanation of simple commercial terms such as debit, credit, balance, profit (gross and net), interest, discount, commission, insurance, assets, liabilities, capital, bankruptcy, composition, bad debts, folio, trial balance, company (limited and unlimited), invoice, receipt, voucher, cheque, bill of exchange. A knowledge of the transactions involved and the special terms used in connection with cheques, promissory notes, and bills of exchange. The forms and uses of the cash-book, the purchases-book or invoice-book, the sales-book or day-book, the journal, and the ledger, and methods of keeping them. (25.) Drawing .- Any one, two, three, or four of the following branches:

(a.) Drawing on the blackboard: A candidate shall be required to make a sketch on a large scale from an object or group of objects; to make an en-largement of a diagram of a simple ornament; to draw from memory some common object or some natural or conventional ornamental form.

(b.) Freehand drawing in outline: The candidate shall be required to make a drawing from a cast or from a photograph of a cast of an ornament, or from a

a photograph of a cast of an ornament, or from a diagram of a simple ornament or natural form. The drawing must not be of the same size as the example provided. No ruling, measuring, tracing, or use of instruments will be allowed.

(c.) Model-drawing: The candidate shall be required to draw the group of objects placed before him, including the board on which it stands. The group may consist of three or more geometrical models and vases (as described in the Directory of the Board of Education, South Kensington, London), or of some simple common objects. No ruling, measuring, or use of instruments will be allowed; but the pencil may be held between the eye and the objects for the purpose of estimating apparent relative size.

(d.) Geometrical drawing: — Plane geometry: Simple problems relating to straight lines and angles, Reometrical drawing: — Plane geometry: Simple problems relating to straight lines and angles, and to the construction of triangles and quadrilaterals. WHEREAS, there being no Harbour Board empowered to grant the licenses hereinafter mentioned, under "The Harbours Act Amendment Act, 1883" (hereinafter called "the said Act"), the Kauri Timber Company (Limited), (being a duly registered company under the provisions of "The Companies Act, 1882," and hereinafter called "the company"), panies Act, 1882," and hereinafter called "the company"), in the years one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-twe, one thousand nine hundred and three, and one thousand nine hundred and four respectively, applied to the Governor for licenses under the said Act to occupy the several parts of the foreshore and land below low-water mark in Hokianga Harbour shown on the plans hereinafter mentioned for the purpose of reclamation, and in order to erect and maintain thereon sawmills, whereas, and other erections; and, in accordance with the wharves, and other erections; and, in accordance with the

one-hundred-and-fifty-sixth section of "The Harbours Act, 1878," deposited plans in the office of the Marine Department at Wellington, marked respectively 1719, 1818 (two sheets), 2599, and 2703, showing the nature of such reclamations, and the manner in which such reclamation, sawmills, and wharves were proposed to be carried out and erected, the places in the said harbour where it was proposed to reclaim and erect the same respectively, and the areas of foreshore or land below low-water mark intended to be occupied for such purposes: And whereas it was made to appear to the Governor in Council that the proposed works would not be or tend to the injury of navigation, and the said plans were approved by the Governor in Council: And whereas, pursuant to such applications, licenses were, by Orders in Council dated respectively the ninth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, the sixteenth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and three, and the twenty-ninth day of February, one thousand mine hundred and four, and published in the New Zealand Gazettes of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, No. 40, the nineteenth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and three, No. 20, and the third day of March, one thousand nine hundred and four, No. 19, respectively, granted and issued to the said company for the terms therein respectively mentioned, computed from the dates of the said Orders in Council, on the terms and conditions therein expressed: And whereas the company duly reclaimed or constructed the said reclamation, sawmills, and wharves, and the same are now under its control and management: And whereas the company has made applicaone-hundred-and-fifty-sixth section of "The Harbours Act, 1878," deposited plans in the office of the Marine reclaimed or constructed the said reclamation, sawmills, and wharves, and the same are now under its control and management: And whereas the company has made application for one license under the said Act to include the four licenses hereinbefore mentioned, for a term of seven years, computed from the first day of January last, being the date of the expiry of the several hereinbefore mentioned licenses, and for authority to fix and charge dues in respect of the wharf shown on Plan No. 1818, and known as the Kohukohu Wharf, and it is expedient to grant the same for the term and subject to the conditions hereinafter expressed:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in him by the said Act, and of all other powers and authorities enabling him in that behalf, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby approve of the purposes or objects for which the said license is required by the company as aforesaid; and in further pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority, and with the like advice and consent as aforesaid, doth hereby license and permit the company to use and occupy those parts of the foreshore and of the land below low-water mark immediately contiguous thereto which are particularly shown and delineated on the plans so de-posited as aforesaid, for the purpose of using the aforesaid reclamation, sawmill, and wharves, such license to be held and enjoyed by the company upon and subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter expressed; and doth also hereby and conditions hereinatter expressed; and doth also hereby declare that this Order in Council shall come into force and take effect as from the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and six, being the date of the expiry of the term of the several before-mentioned licenses; and doth also hereby prescribe that the dues and rates specified in the Schedule hereto shall be charged and taken from the said first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and six, for the use of the wharf known as the Kohukohu Wharf, and shown on Plan No. 1818 (sheet 1).

CONDITIONS.

1. The concessions and privileges conferred by this Order in Council shall extend and apply only to the parts of the foreshore and of the land below low-water mark necessary for such reclamation as aforesaid and for the erection of such sawmills and wherves, which are shown on the plans marked M.D. 1719, M.D. 1818, M.D. 2599, and M.D. 2703 respec-

2. In consideration of the concessions and privileges granted by this Order in Council, the company shall, on being supplied with a copy thereof, pay to the Minister the sum of three pounds for this Order in Council and the first annual sum of thirty pounds, and thereafter an annual sum of thirty pounds on the first day of January in each year of the said term of seven years.

3. That all His Majesty's subjects shall at all reasonable times, upon payment of the proper dues have free and full

times, upon payment of the proper dues, have free and full liberty to use the said wharves, and of ingress and egress thereon and therefrom.

4. That His Majesty, or the Governor, and all officers in the Government service acting in the execution of their duty, shall at all times have free ingress, passage, and egress into, through, and out of the said wharves without payment.

5. The company shall maintain the above-mentioned wharves and other works in good order and repair; and

shall at all times exhibit therefrom, and maintain at its own cost, suitable and necessary lights for the guidance of vessels:
Provided that no light shall be exhibited until after it has

Provided that no light shall be exhibited until after it has been approved of by the Minister.

6. Any person authorised by the Minister may, at all reasonable times, enter upon the said wharves and other works and view the state of repair thereof; and upon such Minister leaving at or posting to the last known address of the company a notice in writing of any defect or want of repair in such wharves and other works, requiring the company, within a reasonable time to be therein prescribed, to repair the same, it shall with all convenient speed cause such defect to be removed or such repairs to be made.

7. That nothing herein contained shall authorise the

7. That nothing herein contained shall authorise the company to do or cause to be done anything repugnant to or inconsistent with any law relating to the Customs, or any regulation of the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, or with any provisions of "The Harbours Act, 1878," or its amendments, or any regulations made thereunder, and that are now or may hereafter be in force.

8. The ballast of all vessels loading at the said wharves shall be taken away by the company and deposited above high-water mark, or at such place as may be approved of by the Minister or by any person appointed by the Minister for

the Minister or by any person appointed by the minister for that purpose.

9. The rights, powers, and privileges conferred by this Order in Council shall continue in force for seven years, computed from the 1st day of January, 1906, unless in the meantime such rights, powers, and privileges shall be altered, modified, or revoked by competent authority; and the company shall not assign, charge, or part with any such right, power, or privilege without the previous written consent of the Minister first obtained.

Deaths occurring at hospitals, of persons not residents of the borough wherein the hospital is situated, have been allotted in each case to the borough where the disease was contracted, and not to that in which the death actually took place.

The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 587, against 562 in December—an increase of 25. The deaths in January were 200, an increase of 12 on the number in December. Of the total deaths, males contributed 114, females 86. Fifty of the deaths were of children under five years of age, being 25 per cent. of the whole number; 45 of these were under one year of age.

There were sixty-three deaths of persons 65 years and upwards: Twelve men. 65, 66 (three), 67 (two), 68, 70, 73, 74, 78 (two), and eleven women, 66, 68, 71, 72 (two), 74, 75, 77, 85, 86, 89, died at Auckland; nine men, 65 (two), 68 (two), 69, 71, 73, 76, 80, and two women, 65, 76, at Wellington; five men, 65, 71, 72, 73, 83, and three women, 65, 76, 79, at Christchurch; and thirteen men, 66, 67, 68, 69, 72, 73, 75 (three), 77 (two), 79, 85, and eight women, 67, 68, 79 (two), 84, 86, 94, 98, at Dunedin.

In the first table are given the deaths and death-rates for each of the four cities, for the suburban boroughs severally and for each city with its suburban towns. As regards Auckland and Christchurch, the whole of the area usually recognised as suburban has not yet been brought under municipal government, and the vital statistics do not deal with such portions as still remain in road districts. But the omission is not very important, for there are in either case quite enough suburbs included within borough boundaries to give a fair idea of the death-rate of Greater Auckland and Greater Christchurch. As further boroughs are formed the vital statistics will be made to include them.

The inclusion of the suburban boroughs tends to lower the rate at Auckland, Wellington, and Dunedin, but raises it at Christchurch.

Specific Febrile or Zymotic Diseases.—The mortality at the four centres with suburbs amounted to 8 deaths. Three deaths were caused by diphtheria—1 at Auckland, and 2 at Wellington. There was 1 death from influenza at Christchurch, 2 from enteric fever at Wellington and Dunedin, and 2 from diarrhosa at Auckland and Wellington.

Constitutional Diseases.—Ol 45 deaths at the four chief towns, or 22 per cent. of the whole mortality, 20 resulted from cancer, 19 from phthisis and other tubercular diseases, 3 from diabetes, and 3 from anæmia.

Local Diseases.—The deaths at the four boroughs and suburbs in December numbered 106, or 53 per cent. of the total mortality. Of these, diseases of the nervous system cau-ed 18, of the circulatory 28, of the respiratory 16, of the digestive 25, of the lymphatic 3, of the urinary 11, of the reproductive 2, of the organs of locomotion 2, and of the integumentary system 1.

Violent Deaths.—The total mortality was 7 deaths—all accidental. Two were caused by fracture of skull, 1 from fall of earth, 1 by falling off a tram, 1 by bullet-wound, 1 by drowning, and 1 by suffocation.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of the four centres from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.

By the inclusion of the suburbs the rate is raised at Dunedin, but lowered at Auckland, Wellington, and Christchurch. It will be observed that Christchurch has the highest rate, Wellington next highest, Auckland and Dunedin following with intervals. The difference between the Christchurch rate (29.63) and the Dunedin rate (23.97) is considerable. The birth-rate for the whole colony last year was 27.21 per thousand. Auckland, Wellington, and Christchurch are thus over the average, and Dunedin below it.

The birth-rates for three of the central boroughs last year show a rise when compared with 1904. In Auckland the rate fell from 31.08 to 30.06; but it rose in Wellington from 26.77 to 29.72, in Christchurch from 27.53 to 29.70, and in Dunedin from 22.40 to 23.90. Dietetic Diseases.—These numbered 18, 8 being due to want of breast-milk, sourcy, or malnutrition, 6 to alcoholism, and 4 to delirium tremens.

Constitutional Diseases.—The deaths at the four towns numbered 466 in 1905. The first in importance of these diseases, and of all causes of death, is tubercle. The figures for 1904 and 1905 show 259 and 211 deaths for each year respectively.

Developmental Diseases.—There were 283 deaths in this class, of which 110 were from premature births, 157 from old age, and 16 from other causes.

Local Diseases.—Deaths in this class were 52 more than in 1904, the figures being 1,275 against 1,223. Diseases of the circulatory system were the most fatal of this class, amounting to 302. Diseases of the nervous system show 283 deaths—102 from apoplexy. Diseases of the respiratory system show 279 deaths for 1905, against 272 in the former year. Bronchitis, pneumonia, congestion of the lungs, pleurisy, and allied diseases form this group.

Under the head of "Diseases of the Digestive System" there were 251 deaths at the four centres, including 94 from enteritis; peritonitis, 14; gastritis, 19; cirrhosis of liver, 14; jaundice and liver-disease, 21; and dentition, 9. From appendicitis 15 deaths are particularly noted.

Diseases of the urinary system caused 109 deaths. The remaining deaths were—4 disease of organs of special sense, 10 of the lymphatic, 31 of the reproductive systems. 2 of the organs of locamotion, and 4 of the integrmentary system.

Violent Deaths.—There were 139 violent deaths, 109 of which were classed as accidental. Seven of these latter were caused by fractures, and 19 by falls. In 11 cases deaths resulted from the deceased being run over by a cart, tram, train, &c. Nine deaths were from burns or scalds, 16 by drowning, 6 by suffocation, 3 by poisoning, 9 by injuries to head, spine, hip, &c.; besides 9 from accident at birth, and 20 others.

One death was classified as homicide. Of 28 suicides, 7 were by shooting, 2 by cutting throat, 7 by poison, 7 by hanging, 3 by drowning, 1 by suffocation (gas), and 1 by jumping from a house.

#### Teachers' Examination, 1906.

Education Department,
Wellington, 23rd February, 1906.
THE following lists contain statements of the principal results of the examination held in January. It must be understood that the granting of a certificate depends only in part upon the result of an examination, and that candidates that have not had the experience required by the regulations, or that do not receive the necessary marks from an Inspector of Schools, have no claim to a certificate. Further, in accordance with clauses 11 and 12 of the regulations, are received as a teacher's certificate who ruther, in accordance with clauses 11 and 12 of the regulations, no person can receive a teacher's certificate who does not produce (a) satisfactory evidence of age, and (b) sufficient documentary evidence of freedom from all such physical defects as are incompatible with efficiency in teaching and in the management of a school. (No medical certificate is accepted under this clause unless it is on the form provided, and is signed by a medical officer approved by the Minister.) by the Minister.)

The first list contains the names of the successful candidates

dates for Classes C, D, and E. The names of the candidates who, having been partially successful in former years, have now passed in the subjects in which they formerly failed are included in this list. The second list gives the names of candidates that will be allowed to qualify for Classes C and D respectively by passing at the next examination in those subjects only in which they have this year been unsuccessful. In the case of candidates that relied partly upon work done at University Examinations, the results of those examinations have been taken into consideration in preparing these lists. The third list gives the names of the candidates that have passed in one or more subjects of the examination for Class C under clause 31 or clause 32 of the regulations. In the fourth list are given the names of the candidates whose work has been deemed worthy of special mention, in accordance with clause 37

ance with clause 37.

Candidates whose names are in the second list will be advised as to the subjects in which they will have to be ex-

advised as to the subjects in which they will have to be examined again.

There will hereafter be no more examination for Class E or for completion of partial pass for Class E, but candidates that hold a partial pass for Class E will not be required to present themselves for the examination of Class D in those subjects in which the standard of requirement was, under former regulations, the same in Classes D and E.

The next examination will take place in January, 1907, beginning about the 5th of the month. Notice must be given so as to be in the office of the Department by the 30th September. Candidates that have obtained "partial pass" must observe this rule equally with other candidates, and must not expect to receive any further intimation of the date at which the notices become due. Forms of application can be obtained at the office of the Department or of any Education Board. tion Board.

Certificated teachers that have gained promotion at this examination may send their certificates to the Department for endorsement.
