California as a Field for Immigration: Caution to Wouldbe Settlers.

In previous reports from this Consulate General, California In previous reports from this Consulate General, California as a field for immigration has been dealt with at length, but a few words of further caution appear to be necessary. Before British subjects decide to come to California, ordinary prudence requires that the conditions of the country should be carefully inquired into. Farming in California is different from farming at Home, and an experience gained on a British farm is not all that is required to make a successful settler in California. Numberless cases are recorded in this office where British subjects have purchased land in California that they have not even seen, with disastrous results to the buyers. If people at Home would stay a moment to consider the facts they would realise that if bargaits are offered to them there is generally something wrong, as Amerito consider the facts they would realise that if bargairs are offered to them there is generally something wrong, as Americans on the spot are shrewd enough to pick up anything good on the market. Land companies are not all honest, even though they advertise their schemes in the best London papers, and escecially in papers of a religious character. Even representations made in perfect good faith may on personal investigation turn out to be not quite what the reader at a distance thought them to be. The following broad rules of conduct for intending settlers are suggested:—

1. Never purchase land in California until it has been personally examined.

sonally examined.

2. Never buy land at all until you have been in the country for at least a year, and have learned all about crops, marketing facilities, "hardpan," labour-supply, water-supply (rainfall on a wificial) allowers. crops, marketing facilities, "naropan," labour-supply, water-supply (rainfall or artificial), climate, whether malarial or not, &c.

3. Never pay a premium to "learn farming." This is a rank imposition where labour is scarce and highly paid.

4. Take a berth on a ranch for a year or so whilst you look

4. Take a berth on a ranch for a year or so whilst you look about and gain experience.

5. Then, if you decide to settle, lease land for a term with the option of purchase, if not quite certain of all conditions. This can easily be arranged in all parts of the State.

6. Avoid land companies, land syndicates, and real-estate agents, unless you have by careful inquiry satisfied yourself that they are trustworthy.

7. Decide clearly in your mind why you are searching in a foreign land for conditions which you will find in our own Empire, under our own flag and our own laws, advantages which are rarely appreciated until they are lost.

8. Satisfy yourself also as to the reason why Americans in

8: Satisfy yourself also as to the reason why Americans in large numbers, and with considerable capital, are leaving California for Canada, and why there are numerous British subjects in California who have been here for years and done fairly well, who are anxious to sell, at a considerable reduction on the price originally paid for them, ranches and fruit orchards which they bought long since.

"The Public Works Act, 1905," and all other enabling powers, provisions, and authorities contained in any other Acts or otherwise vested in them, the Wakanui Road Board doth hereby make and ordain the following by laws for regularing the conditions on which traction engines may be allowed to pass along the public roads within the Wakanui Road Districr, and for providing for a yearly license fee on any traction-engine engaged in heavy traffic within the said district:—

1. The term "traction-engine" or "engines" where used in these by-laws means a locomotive engine propelled by

1. The term "traction-engine" or "engines" where used in these by-laws means a locomotive engine propelled by steam or other power not being used on a railway or tramway. The word "road" or "highway" means a road as defined in section 101 of "The Public Works Act, 1905," and includes county roads and district roads, and any road actually in use by the public. "Local authority," "Board," or "Road Board" means the Wakanui Road Board. "Clerk of the Board" means the Clerk of the Wakanui Road Board. "Heavy traffic" shall have the meaning given to it by section 139 of "The Public Works Act, 1905."

2. No person shall use, or cause to be used, or be concerned

No person shall use, or cause to be used, or be concerned in using, any engine which of its if or toge her with any thing or things being transported thereon shall weigh more than one and a half tons avoirdupois to each pair of wheels on a road within the district for the purpose of hauling or carrying any load of any description whatever, unless such engine shall be duly licensed in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

3. Any person owning or using an engine who shall desire to obtain a license to use the same on roads within the district shall deliver at the office of the Road Board an application in writing signed by him pursuant to the form contained in Schedule B to this by-law, or to the like effect, describing such engine, and for every such license granted by describing such engine, and for every such license granted by the Road Board there shall be paid to the Clerk of the Board such sum or sums of money to be placed to the credit of the Road Board fund as are respectively specified in Schedule

A to this by-law.
4. Licenses for engines may be in the form contained in 4. Licenses for engines may be in the form contained in Schedule C to this by-law, or to the like effect, and shall continue in force for one year from the date of issue, and no longer. In every such license shall be specified the number and duration of the license, the name and place of abode of the owner of the engine in respect of which the license is greated the description of the angine and the weight of the granted, the description of the engine, and the weight of the

engine when unloaded.
5. Traction engines shall be driven so that none of the

o. Praction engines shall be driven so that none of the wheels shall travel in ruts formed in the highway by the wheels of the tame or any other traction engine.

6. No engine shall pass along or come upon any bridge at any time while any person with a horse or carriage drawn by a horse is on such bridge.

7. If it becomes necessary to discharge any ashes or other

7. If it becomes necessary to discharge any ashes or other such refuse from the furnace of any engine on any road or

highway, or the sides thereof, such ashes or refuse shall not highway, or the sides thereof, such ashes of refuse shall not be left in a heap, but shall be spread out on such road or highway, or the sides thereof, in such manner that such road or highway, or the sides thereof, shall be kept even and the level thereof maintained: Provided that no such refuse shall be discharged upon any bridge or culvert, or upon any wooden structure, or upon any metalled road within one chain of any bridge or culvert.

wooden structure, or upon any metalled road within one chain of any bridge or culvert.

8. Whenever any person who shall be riding on horseback, or driving a horse or horses in a vehicle, upon or along a public road or highway shall be approaching an engine, and shall indicate his desire by holding up his hand that the driver of such engine shall stop such engine, such driver shall thereupon immediately stop the same, and also shall, upon being requested by such person so riding or driving as aforesaid so to do, give to such person such assistance as may be necessary for the purpose of enabling him to pass with his horse or horses in safety by such engine.

9. While anv engine shall be travelling upon or is being taken over a bridge or along metalled parts of roads, no studs or other pieces, or rings of fron or other metal, shall be attached to or raised upon the level of the faces of the tires of the wheels of any such engine for the purpose or which shall have the effect of sinking into, gripping, or breaking the surface of any bridge or roadway.

10. The person in charge of an engine shall give immediate notice to the Clerk of the Wakanui Road District of any damage or injury done by the engine, or any wagon attached there to, to any roadway, or to any fence, bridge, culvert, watercourse, drain, side ditch, or other thing appertaining to any such roadway, and the damage shall be forthwith repaired and made good by or at the expense of the owner or person having charge of such engine.

11. Every owner of a traction-engine shall cause his name and address to be painted or marked on such engine on the off-side thereof, in letters of not less than two inches in height and of proportionate breadth, and of such a colour or in such a manner as to be clearly distinguishable from the colour or nature of the ground whereon such letters are painted or marked, and when such owner possesses more than one engine a separate number distinguishing each such engine shall in like manner be painted immediately below such name a

12. Nothing herein contained shall be held to relieve owners or employers of traction-engines from liability in respect of injury done and damage sustained by the traction of excessive weight or extraordinary traffic over or along any

bridge or roadway.

13. Every person employed in driving or conducting an engine shall, while so employed, have in his possession a printed copy of these by-laws, and also the certificate of registration as mentioned in Schedule C of these by-laws, and he shall exhibit the same on demand to any person in charge of a horse or vehicle drawn by a horse, or to any constable. It shall be the duty of the owner to furnish every person employed in driving and conducting the engine with such copy by-law, and the person in charge with the certificate. certificate.

## MOUNT ROSKILL ROAD BOARD.

By-laws of the Body Corporate under the Name of "The Inhabitants of the Mount Roskill Road District" made and enacted by the Mount Roskill Road Board.

Special Order of the Mount Roskill Road Board.

In pursuance of the powers vested in it by "The Road Boards Act, 1882," and its amendments, "The Public Works Act, 1905," and its amendments, "The Public Health Act, 1900," and its amendments and by all or any other statutes it hereunto enabling, the Road Board of the Mount Roskill Road District doth hereby ordain as follows:—

### INTERPRETATION.

In the interpretation of these by-laws, unless inconsistent

with the context,—

"Board" means the Mount Roskill Road Board;

"District" means the Mount Roskill Road District;

"District Health Officer" means the District Health

"District Health Officer" means the District Health Officer of the public health district within which the district is situate; "Footpath" means any portion of a road laid off or formed for the use of pedestrians solely; "House" includes hotel, boardinghouse, office, public hall, school, and any building in which human beings dwell or are intended to dwell, and also includes a shop with dwelling-rooms attached;

"Inspector of Nuisances" means the Inspector of Nuisances for the time being appointed by the Board, or if there be no such Inspector appointed, then the Clerk of the Board shall be deemed the Inspector of Nuisances for the purpose of these

by-laws;
"Occupier" in respect of any premises means the
person by whom or on whose behalf such premises are actually occupied, and in the case of a factory includes any agent, manager, foreman, or other person acting or apparently acting in the general management or control of such factory, and in the case of any premises not actually occupied by any person means the owner of such premises;

person means the owner of such premises;

"Owner" in respect of any premises means the person
for the time being entitled to receive the rack-rent
thereof, or who would be so entitled if the same
were let to a tenant at a rack-rent;

"Offensive matter" includes offal, putrid or decayed
animal or vegetable matter or fish, the refuse of
fruit and vegetable, carrion, dead animals, and any
other matter diving off an offensive oderr or being

fruit and vegetable, carrion, dead animals, and any other matter giving off an offensive odour or being in any way injurious to health;

"Person" and words applying to any person or individual shall include a body of persons whether incorporated or unincorporated;

"Road" includes street, and also any footpath and crossing, and the whole land between the fences on either side of a road or street;

"An offence" shall mean an offence against these bylaws, and shall include the omission or neglect to comply with any part thereof.

Where not inconsistent, words, phrases, and designations herein used which appear in the interpretation clauses of any of the Acts under which these by-laws are made shall have and include the interpretation given thereto by such

### PART "A."-CARE AND MANAGEMENT OF ROADS.

#### A 1.—Protection of Footpaths.

No person shall drive, ride, or lead any horse or other animal, or wheel any barrow or other vehicle, or ride any cycle or other vehicle, upon or along any footpath.

### A 2.—Preventing the Dragging of Material.

No person shall drag or allow to be dragged on a road timber or other heavy material not being wholly raised above the ground on wheels.

### A 3.—Cattle wandering, &c.

No person shall permit any cattle to be at large without proper guidance, or to wander, or to be herded, drafted, or grazed upon any road.

# A 4.—Obstructing by Vehicles, &c.

No person shall allow to remain upon any road any vehicle having no horse or other animal harnessed thereto, or any plough, harrow, reaping, threshing, or other machine; and no person shall leave any vehicle with any horse or animal harnessed thereto on any road unless one of the wheels is fastened to the vehicle by a chain.

## A 5 .- Obstruction by Materials.

No person shall leave any timber, bricks, stone, hedge-clippings, rubbish of any description, building or other material upon any road, or upon or over any channel or surface drain in any road, without the permission in writing of the Board having been first obtained.

# A 6 .- Offensive Droppings.

No person shall spill or cast or allow any nightsoil or other offensive matter to be spilt or cast into or upon any road, or any land, building, or erection adjacent to such

## A 7 .- Offensive Drainage.

No person shall cause or permit any offensive matter or offensive liquid to run from any land, manufactory, building, or place into or upon any road, or any right-of-way, or any footpath, or channel, or ditch.

### A 8 .- Rubbish Deposits, &c.

No person shall throw, or leave, or deposit upon any road or vacant allotment within the district any offensive matter, or any bottles, earthenware, china, or rubbish of any description.

### A 9 .- Burning Litter, &c.

No person shall burn any litter, shavings, straw, or other materials or matter on any road or on any open space near any building without the consent in writing of the

### A 10. - Eaves-droppings.

No person shall allow any droppings of the eaves of any house, erection, or verandah to fall upon any road.

## A 11.—Regulation of Bicycles, Motor-cars, &c.

No person shall use or permit to be used any bicycle, tricycle, or motor-car, or any other vehicle not propelled by a horse or other animal, in or upon any road after sunset and before sunrise unless, in the case of a bicycle or tricycle, the same shall be provided with a lamp, which shall be lighted and placed in a conspicuous place in the front of lighted and placed in a conspicuous place in the front of such bicycle or tricycle; or, in the case of a motor-car or any such other vehicle, the same shall be provided with a light on each side of such motor-car or vehicle. And no person shall at any time use or permit to be used on any road any bicycle, tricycle, motor-car, or other vehicle as aforesaid unless the same shall be provided with an alarmbell or a horn, and the rider or driver thereof shall sound such bell or horn when approaching any vehicle or person on horseback, or any person who may be crossing any road, whether on foot or on horseback; and the rider or driver of every such bicycle, tricycle, motor-car, or other vehicle shall observe the rules as to keeping the proper side of the road when meeting or passing vehicles as is prescribed by road when meeting or passing vehicles as is prescribed by law for persons driving vehicles.

# A 12.—Carrying Lights.

No person shall drive or use any vehicle drawn by one or more horses in or upon any road between sunset and sunrise without carrying a light on each side of such vehicle.

### A 13.—Driving round Corners.

No person shall ride or drive any animal or vehicle of any kind round any corner of any road at other than a walking pace.

# A 14.—Crossings and Drains on Footpaths.

A 14.—Crossings and Drains on Footpaths.

No person shall construct any crossing across any channel, drain, or footpath, or make any drain under any footpath. All such crossings and drains shall be constructed by the Board, but at the expense of the person requiring the same, and any such crossing or drain shall consist of such material as the Board shall from time to time approve. No person shall allow anything other than storm-water to pass through any drain laid under any footpath. Any person desiring to have a crossing made or drain laid leading from his property into any road shall make a written application in that behalf to the Clerk of the Board stating the estimated cost of the construction of such crossing or drain, as the case may be, pay the amount of such estimated cost to the Clerk of the Board shall proceed with the construction. If any such crossing or drain shall be out of repair, the owner or occupier of the premises from which the same leads, or any person for whose use and benefit the same exists, shall, within seven days after notice in writing from the Clerk of the Board to that effect stating the repairs required, propelly and completely reason to the same in accordance with the Board to that effect stating the repairs required, properly and completely repair the same in accordance with such notice, failing which the Board may effect such repairs and recover the cost thereof from such owner, occupier, or person. And in case any such owner, occupier, or person shall make default and fail to comply with such notice within the time therein mentioned he shall be deemed to commit an offence on every day during which he shall be in such default as aforesaid.

### A 15.—Carting over Footpaths.

A 15.—Carting over Footpaths.

No person shall cart any metal, stone, building or other material across any footpath where there is not a crossing constructed in accordance with By-law A 14 without the consent in writing of the Clerk of the Board on written application made in that behalf, and stating the property to or from which the carting is to be done, first obtained; and the applicant for such consent shall, prior to the issue of such consent, deposit with the Clerk of the Board a sum not exceeding £10 as the Engineer, or, if there be no Engineer, the Clerk of the Board, shall direct as security for the necessary repairs to the footpaths or kerbing which may be caused by carting material or otherwise, and shall obtain a receipt for the same, and upon repairs being completed to the satisfaction of the Engineer or Clerk of the Board, as the case may be, the said deposit shall thereupon be returned, and on failing to execute the necessary repairs after forty-eight hours' notice so to do from the Clerk of the Board the same shall be done at the cost and risk of the applicant, and the costs thereof deducted from the amount of such deposit.

PART "B."-BUILDINGS.

#### B 1 .- Buildings-site Area.

Except as provided by By-law No. B 2, no person shall erect a new house in the district upon a site of a less area than one quarter of an acre, and unless such site shall have a frontage of at least 50 ft. to a road.

#### B 2.—Exceptions.

By-law No. B 1 shall not apply to prevent the erection of one new house on an allotment, lot, or section which does not comply with the requirements of By-law No. B 1, but which is shown on any public plan lodged or deposited in the Deeds Registration Office or the District Land Registry Office at Auckland prior to the coming into operation of these by-laws, or on a site owned at the date of these by-laws have present not coming any adjoining land or to present by a person not owning any adjoining land, or to prevent the re-erection of a shop with dwelling-rooms attached upon any site having frontage to the main Auckland - Onehunga

#### B 3 .- Air-spaces.

No person shall erect a new house in the district unless he shall provide at the side or in the rear thereof an open space exclusively belonging to such house and of an aggregate area of not less than 600 square feet: Provided that such open space shall extend throughout the entire width, or, in the alternative, throughout the entire depth, of the site, and shall be free from any erection thereon above the level of the ground, and shall be so maintained while the site is occupied by the house: Provided also the minimum distance across such open space from every part of any wash-house, shed, convenience, or other erection attached thereto shall be as follows:

- (a.) If the height of the house does not exceed 15 ft. 15 ft.;
- (b.) If the height exceeds 15 ft. but does not exceed 25 ft., 20 ft.;
  (c.) If the height exceeds 25 ft. but does not exceed 35 ft., 25 ft.;
- (d.) If the height exceeds 35 ft., 30 ft.

For the purpose of these by-laws where the side boundaries of any site are not of the same length the mean length of such side boundaries shall be taken as the depth of the site for the purpose of defining the distance across such open space; and the height of a house shall for the purpose of these by-laws be measured from the average level of the ground immediately adjoining the site or the rear of such house, as the case may be, to the level of half the vertical height of the roof or to the top of the parapet, whichever is the higher.

### B 4.—Alteration to Buildings.

No person shall make any alteration or addition to any house (whether erected before the coming into operation of these by-laws or not) whereby the open space attached to such house shall be diminished by such alteration or addition so as to leave a less open space than is required by these by-laws to be provided.

### B 5 .- Definition of New House.

The erection of a house upon vacant land or upon a site previously occupied by any building, or the re-erection of any house pulled down to within 1 ft. of the ground floor, or the conversion into a house of any building not originally constructed for human habitation, or the conversion in the conve originally constructed for human habitation, or the conver-sion into more than one house of a building originally constructed as one house only, or an addition or raising of a house (so far as such addition or raising is concerned), shall be deemed to be the erection of a new house within the meaning of these by-laws.

### B 6.—Definition of Site.

The ground upon which any house is erected, together with the whole curtilage thereof enclosed within the boundary fences, walls, or lines of the premises, shall be deemed to be the site of such house within the meaning of these

### B 7 .- Site Formation.

The ground on which any new house is erected, and the ground immediately round such new house, shall be so formed and graded that no water can lodge thereon or under such house, or run under such house.

# B 8 .-- Insanitary Material.

No person shall use any materials in the erection, re-erection, or repair of any house which are unsound, insanitary, or improper to be used for their intended purpose, and any such materials shall within twenty-four hours of their condemnation by the Inspector of Nuisances be removed from the site of the proposed house, and shall not again be brought thereon until the house has been completed.

### B 9 .- Height of Room, &c.

No room in any house other than a bathroom, closet, or storeroom shall have a less average height than 9 ft., nor less cubic capacity than 650 cubic feet.

### B 10 .- Walls of Bathrooms and Closets.

One wall of every bathroom or water-flushed closet shall be an external wall.

### B 11. - Position of Sinks, Baths, &c.

Every sink, lavatory, basin, closet-basin, or bath shall be placed so that the outlet thereof is as near as possible to the external wall of the room containing any such sanitary fitting.

### B 12 .- Plates and Joists above Ground.

No part of any plate or joist of any house shall be at a less distance, in the case of a plate, than 3 in., and, in the case of a joist, than 6 in., from any portion of the ground below or immediately adjoining such plate.

#### B 13 .- Foundations of Concrete, &c.

In any foundation-wall, either of concrete, or bricks, or stone, either separate or conjoined, a proper damp-proof course of sheet 4 lb. lead, asphalt, or slates laid in cement, or other durable material impervious to moisture shall be laid beneath the level of the lowest timbers and at a height of not less than 6 in. above the surface of the ground adjoining such wall.

### B 14.—Air-space.

The space between the lowest joists and the ground shall in all cases have sufficient and proper communication with the external air for the purposes of ventilation.

#### Breaches and Offences.

Every person who, after the coming into operation of these by-laws, shall do, or cause to be done, or be concerned in doing, anything contrary to the foregoing by-laws, or any

in doing, anything contrary to the foregoing by-laws, or any of them, or any provision therein contained, or who shall omit to do anything required by the foregoing by-laws, or any of them, to be done by him, shall be deemed to have committed a breach of the foregoing by-laws.

Any person committing a breach of any of the foregoing by-laws shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds for every offence, and in case of a continuous offence to a penalty of not more than five pounds for each day during which such offence continues. tinues.

In pursuance of section 100 of "The Public Health Act, 1900," I hereby approve of these by-laws.

# AWATERE ROAD BOARD.

By-laws regulating Heavy Traffic.

SPECIAL ORDER of the Awatere Road Board, made the 25th day of April, 1906, and confirmed the 4th day of June, 1906.

In pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in it by "The Counties Act, 1886," "The Road Boards Act, 1882," and "The Public Works Act, 1905," and the several Acts amending the same respectively, and of every

other power enabling it in that behalf, the Awatere Road Board doth hereby, in respect of all roads, bridges, ferries, and fords under the care, control, or management of the said Awatere Road Board, make the following by-laws, which shall come into force upon their being gazetted:—

1. In the construction of these by-laws the words "heavy traffic" shall mean "heavy traffic" as defined by section 130 of "The Public Works Act, 1894"; the words "the said Board" shall mean the Awatere Road Board; the words "the said reads" shall mean and include all the roads, bridges ferries and forder under the core control. the roads, bridges, ferries, and fords under the care, control, or management of the Awatere Road Board; the words "the said district" shall mean and include the whole of "the said district" snail mean and include the whole of the district within the jurisdiction of the Awatere Road Board; the word "engine" shall mean any locomotive engine propelled by steam, electricity, petrol, or other power and designed for use on roads; the word "owner" shall include every person having the use of or any interest (whether permanent or temporary) in any engine or vehicle.

2. No person shall engage (whether as owner, driver, or otherwise whatsoever) in heavy traffic upon or over any road, bridge, ferry, or ford in the said district other than and except in strict conformity with the provisions of these

3. The owner of every engine or vehicle intended to be used or engaged in heavy traffic in the said district shall, before being so used or engaged, be registered by the owner thereof in manner hereinafter provided; and no engine or vehicle shall be so used or engaged except and until the same shall have been duly registered and authorised and licensed in manner following:—

such registration shall be effected by the owner of such engine or vehicle making an application in writing to the Secretary of the said Board in the form marked "A" in the Schedule to these by-laws, and such application shall be signed by the applicant. Upon such application being duly made the said Secretary shall issue a certificate of registration in the form marked "B" in the said Schedule for such engine or vehicle, and for such certificate a fee of 21s. shall be paid by the applicant: Provided that the certificate of registration for an engine may include not more than three vehicles having tires not less than 6 in. in width, with a carrying capacity limited to 6 tons for each such vehicle to be used with such engine; but each vehicle not used with an engine shall require a separate certificate.

No engine or vehicle so registered shall travel on Such registration shall be effected by the owner of such

shall require a separate certificate.

4. No engine or vehicle so registered shall travel on any of the roads in the said district without the owner thereof first obtaining from the said Secretary a license for each and every journey required to be made. Such license shall contain the particulars and be in the form marked "C" in the said Schedule, and for every such license a fee of 20s. shall be paid to the said Board: Provided that the owner of any engine shall, on payment to the said Board of the sum of £30, be entitled to receive a license for the free use by such engine of all the roads in the said district for the period of twelve months from the date thereof; and a like license shall issue to the owner of every vehicle on payment of the sum of £15: Provided that if an engine is used solely for the transportation or working of threshing-machines, chaff-cutters, or mechanical appliances no such license fees shall be payable: Provided also that every license issued in respect of an engine shall include the right to use with such engine not more than three vehicles having tires not less than 6 in. in width, than three vehicles having tires not less than 6 in. in width, with a carrying-capacity limited to 6 tons for each such vehicle.

5. It shall not be necessary to register the following vehicles, nor shall any license be required before such vehicles can be used on any of the roads in the said district, viz.:

—Vehicles having tires of the following widths: If drawn by an engine or by more than three horses to each pair of wheels, 6 in.; if drawn by three horses to each pair of wheels, if the party by two horses or under to each pair of wheels. 5 in.; if drawn by two horses or under to each pair of wheels, 3 in. The said license shall authorise the owner of the engine or vehicle in respect of which it is granted to engage in the heavy traffic specified in such license, subject to the provisions of these by laws, over all the said roads, bridges, ferries, and fords which shall from time to time during the continuand fords which shall from time to time during the continu-ance of the said license be passable and not declared per-manently or temporarily unsafe for, and not closed perma-nently or temporarily to, heavy traffic generally, and to the limited extent only prescribed in respect of any of the roads, bridges, ferries, or fords closed permanently or temporarily to heavy traffic in excess of a specified weight.

7. Nothing in any such license contained shall operate to

prevent the said Board from at any time and from time to time during the continuance thereof closing any of the said roads, bridges, ferries, or fords against heavy traffic generally, or heavy traffic in excess of a specified weight; and such

license shall be issued and accepted expressly subject to the right of the said Board to so close.

8. In the event of any resolution of the said Board closing a road, bridge, ferry, or ford to heavy traffic generally, or limiting the weight to be carried over any such road, bridge, ferry, or ford, a copy of the resolution legibly setting out the terms thereof shall be posted in a conspicuous place at each end of the road or portion of the road affected thereby, or of such bridge, or ford, or ferry, as the case may be, and a copy of such resolution shall be advertised once at least in a news-

of such resolution shall be advertised once at least in a newspaper circulating in the said district.

9. Every certificate of registration and every license shall be signed by the Secretary of the said Board, and shall be numbered in order, and every license and short particulars of the matters therein contained shall be registered by the said Secretary in a register book to be kept for that purpose.

10. The owner of the engine or vehicle for which the license shall be granted shall, before using such engine or vehicle in heavy traffic, cause the full name of the owner and the number of the license, in letters and figures (together with the letters A.R.B.) of a minimum length of 2 in., to be legibly painted with good white paint on a black ground on the right-hand side of such engine or vehicle, and shall cause the right-hand side of such engine or vehicle, and shall cause the painting to be maintained, and, if necessary, renewed, during the currency of such license, and within three days after such engine or vehicle shall have ceased to be so licensed such owner shall cause the said painting to be completely effaced and obliterated.

11. No vehicle or machine drawn by any engine shall carry more than 6 tons weight (over and above the weight of the vehicle and the machine): Provided that, on special application in writing to the Secretary of the Board, and with the approval of the Inspector for the time being of the said Board, permission may be granted to the applicant to carry a greater weight than 6 tons on each one vehicle or machine at any one time. Every such permits shall be in writing under the hand of the Secretary, and shall state the maximum weight (over and above the weight shall state the maximum weight (over and above the weight of the vehicle or machine) which may be carried by each such vehicle or machine at any one time, and the period for which such permit is given, and the conditions (if any) on which such extraordinary weight may be carried. 12. The maximum weight of goods which may be drawn by any engine, exclusive of the weight of the vehicles in which such goods may be carried or transported, shall be 20 tons.

13. No person shall use or take part in the use of any engine in the transportation of any vehicle or machine unless and until the true and correct weight of such vehicle or machine shall have been legibly painted thereon.

14. No more than two vehicles shall be drawn at any one

time by any engine over any of the said bridges.

The person for the time being in charge of any vehicle, machine, or engine engaged in heavy traffic shall, whenever required to do so by any officer of the said Board, or by any person authorised for that purpose by the said Board, cause such vehicle, engine, or machine to be stopped, and to remain so stopped for a reasonable and sufficient time to allow such officer or authorised person to inspect and examine such vehicle, engine, or machine, and the load being transported, and the person so in charge shall permit such inspection and examination, and shall not obstruct such officer or authorised person in or about making such inspection or examination; and the person for the time being in charge of any such vehicle, engine, or machine shall, at the verbal request of such officer or authorised person, give such information as to the load being transported, and as to the quantity, weight, size, and measurement of the same, as shall then be required by such officer or authorised person. by such officer or authorised person.

16. The driver or person in charge of any engine shall not 16. The driver of person in charge of any engine shall not propel or cause the same to be propelled along and over any of the said roads, bridges, ferries, or fords unless the engine shall be accompanied by at least one other man, whose duty it shall be to keep careful watch both in front of and behind the engine, and any vehicle or machine drawn thereby, for horses and vehicles which may be approaching, and to warn the riders and drivers of such horses and vehicles of the

proximity of such engine, and to assist them in passing the engine and its load in safety.

17. The driver or person in charge of any engine shall, upon being signalled to by the rider or driver of any vehicle or horse, immediately stop such engine, and if it shall appear that the rider or driver of any horse or vehicle meeting or overtaking such engine shall have any difficulty in passing the same, or shall request assistance, then the driver or person in charge of such engine shall forthwith stop the engine, and he and the said man mentioned in the last preceding by-law shall render all possible assistance to each rider or driver.

18. The whistle of the engine shall not be sounded, nor 18. The whistle of the engine shall not be sounded, nor shall the cylinder caps be opened, within sight of any person riding, driving, leading, or in charge of any horse upon any road, bridge, ferry, or ford; nor shall the steam of any such engine be allowed to attain a pressure exceeding the limit fixed by the safety-valve.

19. No engine shall be propiled over any of the said bridges at a greater speed than three miles per hour, and no engine shall be propelled along or over any of the roads or fords in the said district at a greater speed than eight miles per hour.

20. While any engine shall be travelling upon, or is being propelled over, any of the said roads or of the said bridges, no studs or other projections shall be attached to or raised above the level of the face of the tires.

21. Before crossing any of the said bridges all stones or other substances which might, if passed over by the engine, injure the woodwork of such bridge shall be removed, and before entering upon such bridge a man shall be stationed at the end farthest from the engine, who shall expose a red flag and warn all persons approaching the bridge that the said engine is approaching the bridge, or is crossing the bridge, as the case may be. And before nearing the corner of a road the person in charge of any engine shall take all necessary precautions, by slowing down or otherwise, to insure sary precautions, by slowing down or otherwise, to insure the safety of the traffic.

22. The person for the time being in charge of an engine shall give or send immediate notice in writing to the R ad Foreman, Road Inspector, Chairman, or Secretary of the said Board (whichever he can with all reasonable diligency first communicate with) of all damage or injury which may have been caused by the engine or any vehicle or machine attached thereto to any road, fence, gate, bridge, ferry, culvert, ford, watercourse, drain, footpath, or water-table under the care, control, or management of the said Board; and if such damage has rendered any road, bridge, ferry, or ford dangerous for traffic the person in charge of such engine shall, in addition, immediately upon ascertaining such damage, place such signals as shall be sufficient to warn persons using such road, bridge, ferry, or ford, by day or by night, of the existence of such damage, and shall maintain such signals and any other signals in such position and for hight, of the existence of such damage, and shall maintain such signals and any other signals in such position and for such time as the person to whom such notice is given, or the Engineer or Secretary of the Board, shall direct.

23. Nothing herein contained shall relieve any person owning or using any engine, machine, or vehicle engaged in heavy traffic from liability in respect of any injury done to or damage sustained by any of the said roads, bridges, ferries, or fords by reason of such heavy traffic.

24. An engine engaged or used in heavy traffic shall be driven so that none of the wheels shall travel in ruts formed in any of the said roads by the wheels of the same or any

driven so that none of the wheels shall travel in ruts formed in any of the said roads by the wheels of the same or any other engine, and any person committing a breach of this by-law shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty of £1.

25. Every person who shall offend against any of the foregoing by-laws shall be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding £5, and in the case of a continuing offence to a further penalty not exceeding £10 for each day during which such offence shall continue.

The beacons are painted black, and the lanterns green, from which a green light showing towards the cutting is exhibited; a white light is also exhibited from the back of each lantern showing towards the chortest towards the chortest. showing towards the shore.

All the green-light beacons are numbered from the first or seaward beacon with the letter "G" added, as follows: No. 0G being outside beacon; No. 1G, near the reflecting beacon; No. 2G, opposite the old boat-channel. This light indicates the turning-point from No. 2 (red) lead towards No. 3. All the others—that is, Nos. 3G to 9G, both inclusive—are placed opposite the corresponding numbers of the white-light beacons on the other side of the cutting.

All the single-light beacons are placed about 15 ft. back from the cutting, and painted red to starboard and black to port. The lights are white to starboard and green to port from seaward.

The red light on the pile beacon south of No. 3, being no longer required, will on and after the 1st June, 1906, be dis-

In consequence of the above alterations the sailing directions have been amended to read as follows:—

### Sailing Directions.

By Night.—In approaching the anchorage, vessels of deep draught should not bring the white light on the oid structure to bear north of N.E. by E. in order to avoid the fourfathom patch, which bears N.W. half N. from the light on Wonga Shoal; then get No. 1 lead (which consists of two red lights vertical 10 ft. apart, and two white lights vertical

11 ft. 9 in. apart) in line; keep these in line passing between the occulting light on the red buoy and the outer green light on the north bank, also between the other green lights on the north bank and the white lights on the revetment mound.

Steer on the same line until the two red lights of No. 2 lead are coming on; then steer with them in line until abreast of No. 2G beacon; then direct the course to pass between No. 3 and No. 3G beacons; and so on from beacon to beacon round the point until No. 9 is reached. From a safe distance off No. 9 the lights of No. 10 lead will be seen; keep them in line until the red light is about a quarter of a point open to the right of the white light of No. 11 lead; then gradually alter the course to bring the lights of No. 11 lead in line; keep them in line (a sharp lookout being kept for the mooring-buoys on the starboard hand) until the lights of No. 12 lead are seen coming into line; proceed as before by altering the course before the lights are on with each other.

altering the course before the lights are on with each other. The same applies in the change from No. 12 to No. 13 lead. When the lights on the wharves are seen opening out off Luff Point, alter the course so as to round the point at a safe distance, and then up the centre of the channel, looking out for the mooring buoys on the starboard hand.

In going outwards the directions are just the opposite to those given for those coming inwards; but in such case, in changing from one lead to another, the course should be gradually altered when abreast of the low (red) beacon of each lead, excepting No. 2 lead. In this case, when abreast of No. 3 beacon, gradually alter the course to a safe distance off No. 2G until the two red lights of No. 2 lead are in line, then proceed outwards with No. 2 lead in line.

By Day.—The directions by day are the same as by night, merely substituting the beacons for the lights.

This affects Admiralty Charts 2389a and B, 1750, and 1752.

During the progress of the work at the Light's Pas harbour works, masters of vessels exempt from pilotage may, if they so desire, avail themselves of the services of a pilot to assist them in passing such works, either in or out, at one-half the usual rates.

If the usual exemption-flag is not hoisted it will be taken

as a signal that a pilot is required. At night if a pilot is required the usual signal for a pilot should be shown.
