Regulations for Trout-fishing, Nelson Acclimatisation District.

### PLUNKET, Governor. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this tenth day of September, 1906.

### Present :

### HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

N pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884," and its amendments, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby make the following regulations for that part of the South Island comprised within the Counties of Waimea, Collingwood, and Takaka, and the boroughs and town districts situated therein (hereinafter called "the Nelson Acclimatisation District"), and doth hereby declare that these regulations shall, as from the date of the publication thereof in the New Zealand Gazette, supersede all regulations for the said district at variance therewith, and such regulations are hereby revoked.

#### REGULATIONS.

1. Licenses to fish for trout in all the waters of the Nelson Acclimatisation District may be issued by the secretary of the Nelson Acclimatisation Society (hereinafter termed "the said society"), or any one authorised by such secretary in that behalf: Provided that the secretary may refuse to issue a license to any person who within the previous two years has been convicted of any breach of the provisions

of any Act relating to fishing for trout, or of any regulation 2. The fee to be charged for a license as aforesaid to each

2. The fee to be charged for a license as aforesaid to each male person over the age of sixteen years shall be one pound, and every such license shall be in the form set forth in the Schedule hereto. Licenses may also be issued to boys at tending school or under the age of sixteen, or to women, at a reduced fee of five shillings for each license so issued. No license shall confer any right of entry upon the land of any person without his consent : Provided that it shall be lawful for the said secretary, or his deputy, in any case where ap-plication is made for a license on or after the first day of January in any year, to issue a license to any man for the January in any year, to issue a license to any man for the sum of twelve shillings and sixpence, but so that such license shall only extend from the time of granting the same until the termination of the then trout-fishing season.

the termination of the then trout-fishing season.
3. The secretary of the said society may issue day licenses to bond fide travellers and strangers not resident within the district aforesaid on payment of a fee of two shillings and sixpence for each day's fishing.
4. Any holder of a license may fish for trout in the above-named waters from the first day of October in any year to the thirty-first day of March in the following year, both inclusive, but every such license shall be for one precess.

both inclusive; but every such license shall be for one season only, and shall expire on the thirty-first day of March follow-

only, and shall expire on the thirty-first day of March follow-ing the date on which it was issued. 5. Trout shall not be fished for, taken, or killed otherwise than with one rod and line, but a landing-net or gaff may be used to secure any trout caught with such rod and line; and no lures or baits other than natural or artificial flies, insects, worms, or fish shall be used with such rod and line.

6. No license shall authorise any person other than the

person named therein to fish. 7. No person shall have in his possession any of the Sal-monidæ or trout between the first day of April and the thirtieth day of September in any year, which period is hereby ap-pointed a close season for all such fish: Provided always that this regulation shall not apply to fish caught by the officers of the said society for purposes of acclimatisation. 8. No person shall cast or throw into any stream in which trout or salmon exist or have been liberated, or shall allow to flow into an exist or the beat are using the shall allow

trout or salmon exist or have been liberated, or shall allow to flow into or place near the bank or margin of any such stream, any sawdust or sawmill refuse, lime, sheep-dip, flax-mill refuse, or any other matter or liquid that is noxious, poisonous, or injurious to fish: Provided that nothing herein contained shall extend to prohibit the depositing in such stream of *debris* from any mining claim. 9. No person shall take, fish for, catch, or kill, in any manner whatever, or have in his possession, any salmon, salmon-parr, or smolts, or the ora, young, or fry of any salmon in any stage whatever; and any of the above-named taken by accident or otherwise shall immediately be re-turned alive into the water from which the same is taken. 10. No person shall fish for trout without a license; and every person fishing shall on the demand of any Ranger,

to. No person shall hish for trout without a license; and every person fishing shall on the demand of any Ranger, constable, officer of the said society, or of any person pro-ducing a license, produce and show to such Ranger, officer, constable, or person his license, and the contents of his creel or bag, and the bait used by him for taking, catching, or killing such trout.

11. Every trout not exceeding nine inches in length from nose to tip of tail taken or caught by any person shall imme-diately be returned alive into the water from which the same is taken.

13 taken. 12. No cross-line fishing, stroke-hauling, or any other un-sportsmanlike device shall be used for the purpose of taking, catching, or killing trout; nor shall any of the above-mentioned baits be used with any medicated or chemical preparation whatever.

13. Except as aforesaid, no person shall fish with or use any net, or any instrument, or device, or means for taking trout in any river or stream within the district aforesaid,

trout in any river or stream within the district aforesaid, or at the mouth or entrance of any such river or stream. 14. For the purposes of these regulations the mouth of every such river or stream shall be deemed to include every outlet of the same and the sea-shore between such outlets, and shall extend over a radius of five hundred yards from the point or line where the waters of such river or stream much these of the sea or of any herebour at low water

15. No person shall buy, sell, or expose or offer for sale, or shall fish for the purpose of obtaining for sale, any trout,

or shall fish for the purpose of obtaining for sale, any trout, or any part thereof. 16. The penalty for the breach of any of these regulations shall not be less than forty shillings or more than fifty pounds. 17. The number of trout allowed to be taken by any one angler in one day must not exceed twenty. 18. If any person shall be convicted of an offence against these regulations, the license (if any) held by the offender shall thereupon become void.

(c.) To the owner of such dairy or any person employed by him in or about the dairy, except in so far as he or such person is the owner of any premises to which the regulations lawfully apply; or
(c.) To the owner of such dairy or any person employed by him in or about the dairy, except in so far as he or such person is the owner of any premises to which the regulations lawfully apply or is employed in or about the same.

(2.) A copy of every regulation made by the Council under the powers hereby conferred shall be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary within seven days after the making of the same, and the Colonial Secretary may at any time within six months of the making of such regulation disallow the same. the same.

CONDITIONS.
1. IN these conditions the term "Minister" means the Minister of Marine, as defined by "The Shipping and Seamen Act, 1909," and includes any officer, person, or authority acting by or under the direction of such Minister.
2. The concessions and privileges conferred by this Order in Council shall extend and apply only to the part of the foreshore, and land below low-water mark adjacent thereto, necessary for the erection of the wharf, as shown on plans marked M.D. 763 and 2820.
3. All His Majesty's subjects shall at all reasonable times, and upon payment of the proper dues, have free and full liberty to use the above-mentioned wharf, and rights of ingress and egress thereto and therefrom.
4. His Majesty, or the Governor, and all officers in the Government service acting in the execution of their duty, shall at all times have free ingress, passage, and egress into, over, and out of the wharf without payment.
5. The Board shall maintain and keep the above-mentioned wharf, and all erections on the wharf, in good order and repair; and shall at all times permit to be erected and exhibited therefrom any lights for the guidance of vessels, and shall maintain at its own cost any such lights: Provided that no new light shall be exhibited until after it has been approved of by the Minister.
6. Any person authorised by the Minister, or any officer acting with his approval, may at all reasonable times enter upon the said wharf, and any buildings erected on the wharf or buildings, requiring the Board within a reasonable time, to be therein prescribed, to repair the same, the Board shall with all convenient speed cause such defect to be removed or such repairs to be made.
7. The Board shall appoint all officers necessary for the working and management of the wharf.

Nothing herein contained shall authorise the Board to do or cause to be done anything repugnant to or incon-sistent with any law relating to the Customs, or any regula-tion of the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, or with any provisions of "Tne Harbours Act, 1878," or its amend-ments. or any regulations thereunder.

The rights, powers, and privileges hereby conferred shall continue in force for fourteen years, computed from the date of the foregoing Order in Council, unless in the meantime altered, modified, or revoked. 10. The rights, powers, and privileges conferred under or by virtue of the foregoing Order in Council may be at any time resumed by the Governor, on giving to the Board six calendar months' notice in writing. Any such notice shall be sufficient if given by the Minister, or by any person acting under his instructions, and delivered at or posted to the last known address of the Board, its successors or assigns. No compensation or allowance shall be payable in such case. 11. The Board shall be liable for any injury which may

Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the candidate of any claim to consideration.

The order for admission to the examination will be posted on the 18th July, 1907, to the address given on the form of application. It will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates will be required to attend and as to the manner in which the fee  $(\pounds 6)$  is to be paid.

An examination for admission to the Civil Service of India, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in August of each year. The date of the examination and the number of appointments to be made for each province will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners.

2. No person will be deemed qualified who shall not satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners,-

- (1.) Toat he is a natural-born subject of His Majesty.
- (2.) That he had attained the age of twenty-two and had not attained the age of twenty-four on the lst day of August of the year in which the examination is held.

[N.B.—In the case of natives of India it will be [N.D.—In the case of natives of india it will be necessary for a candidate to obtain a certificate of age and nationality issued under Notification of the Government of India, No. 2252, dated 21st August, 1888, as amended by Notification No. 404, dated 19th May, 1898, and signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the province or the Commissioner Government of the province, or the Commissioner of the division, within which his family resides, or, should he reside in a Native State, by the highest political officer accredited to the State in which his family resides.]

- (3.) That he has no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Civil Service of India.
- (4.) That he is of good moral character.

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3. Should the evidence upon the above points be primá facie satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the candi-date, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the examination. The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of the cer-tificate of qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further incuring a they may doe measured at such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and if

the result of such inquiries, in the case of any candidate, should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above re-spects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Civil Service of India, and, if already selected, will be removed from the position of a probationer.

Deaths occurring at hospitals, of persons not residents of the borough wherein the hospital is situated, have been allotted in each case to the borough where the disease was contracted, and not to that in which the death actually took place.

The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 584, against 534 in July—an increase of 50. The deaths in August were 245, an increase of 30 on the number in July. Of the total deaths, males contributed 136, females 109. Fifty-eight of the deaths were of children under five years of age, being 23.67 per cent. of the whole number; 48 of these were under one year of age.

There were ninety deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: Twelve men, 65, 66, 67, 69, 71, 77 (four), 82 (two), 86, and eight women, 65 (two), 67, 73, 75, 80 (two), 81, died at Auckland; eleven men, 69 (two), 70, 72, 75, 76 (two), 77, 82, 83, 87, and five women, 72, 78 (two), 84 (two), at Wellington; fourteen men, 66, 67 (two), 69 (two), 70, 74 (two), 75, 76, 80 (two), 82, 83, and fifteen women, 65 (66 (two), 67, 70, 73, 74, 77, 80, 81, 82, and thirteen women, 66, 67, 68, 70, 72 (two), 74, 79, 80, 81, 83, 84, 86, at Dunedin.

In the first table are given the deaths and death-rates for each of the four eities, for the suburban boroughs severally and for each eity with its suburban towns. As regards Auckland and Christeburch, the whole of the area usually recognised as suburban has not yet been brought under municipal government, and the vital statistics do not deal with such portions as still remain in road districts. But the omission is not very important, for there are in either case quite enough suburbs included within borough boundaries to give a fair idea of the death-rate of Greater Auckland and Greater Christeburch. As further boroughs are formed the vital statistics will be made to include them.

The inclusion of the suburban boroughs tends to lower the rate at Auckland, Wellington, and Dunedin, but raises it at Ghristchurch.

Specific Febrile and Zymotic Diseases.—During August 12 persons in the four centres died of diseases of this class measles, 2 (at Dunedin); influenza, 6 (3 at Auckland, 2 at Christchurch, 1 at Dunedin); diphtheria, 1 (at Auckland); puerperal septicæmia, 1 (at Wellington); and diarrhœa, 1 (at Christchurch). Tertiary specific disease of the brain also caused 1 death. Constitutional Diseases. — There were 48 deaths in this class, cancer being fatal in 18 cases, phthisis in 16 (Auckland 2, Wellington 7, Christohurch 2, Dunedin 5), and other forms of tuberculosis in 6 (3 at Auckland, 2 at Christohurch, and 1 at Dunedin). Diabetes caused 1 death at Christohurch, and anæmia 2 at Auckland.

Developmental Diseases .- There were 35 deaths, of which 19 were of senile decay.

Local Diseases.—In this class there were 127 deaths. Of these, 24 were of the nervous system, 36 of the circulatory, 30 of the respiratory, 17 of the digestive, 1 of the lymphatic, 14 of the urinary, 2 of the reproductive, 1 of the integumentary, and 2 of the organs of locomotion. Bronchitis caused 13 deaths (5 each at Auckland and Wellington, and 3 at Dunedin); pneumonia, 11 (3 at Auckland, 1 at Wellington, 4 at Christchurch, and 3 at Dunedin); and other pulmonary diseases, 6 (1 at Auckland, 2 at Wellington, 2 at Christchurch, and 1 at Dunedin). Appendicitis was fatal in 1 case (at Christchurch), and Bright's disease in 11 (2 at Auckland, 1 at Wellington, 5 at Christchurch, and 3 at Dunedin).

Violence.—Of the 12 deaths in this class, 2 were by suicide, 1 by shooting, and 1 by hanging. Accidental deaths resulted from the following causes: Fracture of skull, 1; fall from window, 1; fall at dock, 1; kick from horse, 2; scalds, 2; and sufficiently.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of the four centres from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.
