A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by "The Scenery Preservation Act, 1903" (hereinaster referred to as "the said Act"), it is, inter alia, enacted that the Governor may appoint a Commission who may inspect any lands possessing scenic or historic interest, or on which there may be thermal springs, and report thereon to the Governor, with recommendations as to what lands should be reserved as scenic, thermal, or historic reserves: And whereas such Commission was duly appointed, and, after inspection, recommended that the parcels of land described in the Schedule hereunder should be permanently reserved for scenic purposes, and it is expedient to give effect to such recommendation:

Now, therefore, I, William Lee, Baron Plunket, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers contained in the said Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that the parcels of land described in the Schedule hereunder shall be reserved under and subject to the provisions of the said Act.

REGULATIONS FOR THE ENTRY OF AUSTRALIAN AND NEW ZEALAND CANDIDATES FOR COMMISSIONS IN THE MEDICAL DEPARTMENT OF THE ROYAL NAVY.

EVERY Candidate for admission into the Medical Department of the Royal Navy must not be under twenty-one nor over twenty-eight years of age on the day of his acceptance by

the Governor-General of Australia or the Governor of New Zealand. He must produce an extract from the Register of the date of his birth, or, in default, a declaration made before a Magistrate from one of his parents, or other near relative, stating the date of birth. He must also produce a certificate of moral character, up to date, and a recommendation signed by a Clergyman or Magistrate to whom he has been for some years personally known, or by the President or senior Professor of the College at which he was

President or senior Professor of the College at which he was educated; and he must declare that he is ready to engage for general service at home or abroad as required.

2. Registration under the Medical Act in force, as qualified to practise Medicine and Surgery in Great Britain and Ireland, may be deferred until after the arrival in England of a Candidate who has been passed on the Australian Station; but a Commission as Surgeon will not be granted until the certificate of the Registrar of the Medical Council has been produced at the Medical Department of the Navy

until the certificate of the Registrar of the Medical Council has been produced at the Medical Department of the Navy.

3. He must be free from organic or other disease, and his physical fitness will be determined by a Board of Naval Medical Officers on the Station, who are to certify that his vision comes up to the required standard, which will be ascertained by the use of Snellen's Test Types.

4. The certificates of character and birth must accompany the Declaration (copy attached), which is to be filled up and signed by the Candidate and transmitted to the Chancellor of his University, who, if he recommends the Candidate, will in turn forward it to the Governor-General of Australia or the Governor of New Zealand.

5. Candidates must be Medical Practitioners and hold suitable certificates in both medicine and surgery granted by

suitable certificates in both medicine and surgery granted by the Universities of Sydney, Melbourne, or Adelaide, or the University of New Zealand. They will be appointed pro-visionally only, their commissions in the Royal Navy being determined by the result of the course of training at Haslar, in which they will be expected to qualify to the satisfaction of the home Naval Medical Authorities.

6. Selected Candidates will be granted a passage to Eng-

land at the public expense.

7. Surgeons on entry are only required to provide themselves with a pocket case of instruments, a stethoscope, and three clinical thermometers. All other instruments are provided at the public expense.

#### MOUNT ALBERT ROAD BOARD.

BUILDING AND OVERCROWDING BY-LAW No. 5.

- Of the Body corporate under the Name of "The Inhabitants of the Mount Albert Road District, made and enacted by and under Special Order of the Mount Albert Road Board passed on the 26th day of November, 1906, and sealed with the Seal of the said Board on the 24th day of December, 1906, to come into force on being gazetted.
- I. In pursuance of the powers vested in it by "The Road Boards Act, 1882," and its amendments, and "The Public Health Act, 1900," and its amendments, and by all or any other statutes it thereunto enabling, the Road Board of the Mount Albert Road District doth hereby ordain as follows:

- "Board" means the Mount Albert Road Board.

  "Building Committee" means such members of the
  Board as the Board shall from time to time appoint
  - to act as a Building Committee.
    "Clerk" means the Clerk for the time being of the Board.
  - "Inspector of Nuisances" means the Inspector of Nui-sances appointed for the purpose of these by-laws, and includes any person for the time being appointed by the Board to perform the duties of such office.

#### Sites and Dwellinghouses.

2. No person shall erect a new dwellinghouse within the district except in conformity with the following provisions:—

#### Definition of site

(a.) The ground upon which any dwellinghouse is erected, together with the whole curtilage thereof enclosed within the boundary fences, walls, or lines of the premises, shall be deemed to be the site of such dwellinghouse within the meaning of these by-laws.

Definition of new dwellinghouse.

(b.) The erection of a dwellinghouse upon vacant land he erection of a dwellinghouse upon vacant land or upon a site previously occupied by any building, or the re-erection of any house pulled down to within 5 ft. of the ground floor, or the conversion into more than one dwellinghouse of a building originally constructed as one dwellinghouse only, or an addition to or raising of a house (so far as such addition or raising is concerned), or the procuring of an existing dwellinghouse or of any other building or part of a building intended to be re-erected and used as a dwellinghouse or part of a dwellinghouse upon the site, shall be deemed to be the erection of a new dwellinghouse within the meaning of these bylaws. laws.

# Plans to be provided.

(c.) The erection of a new dwellinghouse shall not be commenced or proceeded with until the person who proposes to carry out such work shall have made application to the Clerk in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to this by-law. Such person shall at the same time lodge with the Clerk complete plans showing the block plan. Such person shall at the same time lodge with the Clerk complete plans showing the block-plan and sections of the said site, and the measurements of the height and distance from the boundaries of such dwellinghouse, as required by the provisions of this by-law. Such plan and sections shall be in ink on drawing-paper or tracing-cloth, and shall be to a scale not less than \(\frac{1}{2}\) in to the foot: Provided always that if the work proposed to be done is of such a trivial nature as, in the opinion of the Building Committee, not to require the preparation of such plans and sections, such Committee may dispense with their production. If the Building Committee are satisfied that all conditions required by this by-law are or can be fulfilled by the proposed works as described in such plans, and after the payment of the fees set forth in the First Schedule hereof, a permit for the erection of the dwellinghouse shall be for the erection of the dwellinghouse shall be issued by the Clerk.

#### Building-site area.

(d.) Except as provided by next succeeding subsection (e), no person shall erect a new dwellinghouse in the district upon a site of a less area than 5,445 square feet, and unless such site shall have a frontage of at least 50 ft. to a public road.

#### Provisional section.

(e.) The preceding subsection (d) shall not apply to prevent the erection or re-erection of one new dwellinghouse on an allotment, lot, or section which does not comply with the requirements of subsection (d), but which is shown on any public plan or any plan lodged or deposited in the Deeds Registration Office or the District Land Registry Registration Office or the District Land Registry Office at Auckland prior to the coming into operation of these by-laws, or on a site owned at the date of these by-laws by a person not owning any adjoining land, or prevent the erection or re-erection of a shop and dwellinghouse combined upon any site: Provided that where more than one shop is erected on the frontage of the site not more than one dwellinghouse shall be permitted for every 40 ft. of such frontage.

#### Site-formation.

(f.) The ground on which any new dwellinghouse is erected, and the ground immediately adjoining any such new dwellinghouse, shall be so formed any such new dwellinghouse, shall be so formed and graded that no water can lodge thereon or under such house; and no person shall commence the erection of any building upon any site having matter thereon which, in the opinion of the Inspector of Nuisances, might prove deleterious to the health of the occupants of such dwelling until such matter has been removed to the satisfaction of such Inspector of Nuisances. of Nuisances.

#### Air-spaces.

- Air-spaces.

  (g.) No person shall erect a new dwellinghouse in the district unless he provide at the side or in the rear thereof an open space exclusively belonging to such house and of an aggregate area of not less than 600 square feet: Provided that such open space shall extend throughout the entire width, or, in the alternative, throughout the entire depth, of the site, and shall be free from any erection thereon above the level of the ground, and shall be so maintained while the site is occupied by the house: Provided also that the minimum distance across such open space from every part of the across such open space from every part of the dwellinghouse, and from every part of any washhouse, shed, convenience, or other erection attached thereto, shall be as follows:—

  (a.) If the height of the house does not exceed

- 15 ft.—15 ft.

  (b.) If the height exceeds 15 ft. but does not
- exceed 25 ft.—20 ft.

  (c.) If the height exceeds 25 ft. but does not exceed 35 ft.—25 ft.

exceed 35 ft.—25 ft.

(d.) If the height exceeds 35 ft.—30 ft.

For the purposes of these by-laws, where the side boundaries of any site are not of the same length, the mean length of such side boundaries shall be taken as the depth of the site for the purpose of defining the distance across such open space; and the height of a dwellinghouse shall, for the purpose of these by-laws, be measured from the average level of the ground immediately adjoining the side or the rear of such dwellinghouse, as the case may be, to the level of half the vertical height of the roof, or to the top of the parapet, whichever is the higher. parapet, whichever is the higher.

# Preventing reduction of space.

(h.) No person shall make any alteration or addition to any dwellinghouse (whether erected before the coming into operation of these by-laws or not) whereby the open space attached to such dwellinghouse shall be diminished by such alteration or addition so as to leave a less open space than is required by these by-laws to be provided.

#### Foundations of concrete, &c.

(i.) In any foundation-wall, either of concrete, or bricks, any ioungation-wall, either of concrete, or bricks, or stone, either separate or conjoined, a proper damp-proof course of sheet 4lb. lead, asphalt, or slates laid in cement, or other durable material impervious to moisture, shall be laid beneath the level of the lowest timbers and at a height of not less than 6in. above the surface of the ground adjoining such wall,

Plates and joists above ground.

(j.) No part of any plate or joist of any house shall be at a less distance, in the case of a plate, than 3 in., and, in the case of a joist, than 6 in., from any portion of the ground below or immediately adjoining such plate. The space between the lowest joist and the ground shall in all cases have sufficient and proper communication with the external air for the purpose of ventilation.

#### Walls of living-rooms.

(k.) No room in any house other than a bathroom, closet, or storeroom shall have a less average height than 9 ft. 6 in. between the floor and the ceiling throughout an area equal to at least two-thirds of the floor-space.

# Ventilation and lighting.

Ventilation and lighting.

(l.) Every room other than a bathroom, or closet, or storeroom shall be provided with at least one window other than a skylight opening direct to the external air. At least one-half of such window shall be movable or made to open, and the opening must extend to the top of the window, and the total glazed surface of such window or windows provided shall be equal in area to at least one-tenth of the floor-space of such room.

#### Walls of bathrooms and closets.

(m.) At least a portion of one wall of every bathroom or water-closet shall be in contact with the external air.

#### Insanitary material.

- (n.) No person shall use any materials in the erection, re-erection, or repair of any dwellinghouse which are unsound, insanitary, or improper to be used for their intended purpose, and any such materials shall within twenty-four hours of their condemnation by the Inspector of Nuisances be removed from the site of the proposed house, and shall not again be brought thereon until the house has been completed. completed.
- completed.

  (o.) If any dwellinghouse or part of a dwellinghouse be erected, altered, or repaired contrary in any particular to the provisions of this by-law, it shall be lawful for the Board to give notice in writing to the owner of such dwellinghouse, within a time to be mentioned in such notice, to take down, remove, or alter such dwellinghouse, or part of such dwellinghouse in such a manner that the prodwellinghouse, in such a manner that the pro-visions of this by-law shall be accurately fulfilled. Non-compliance with any such notice shall be deemed an offence.

#### Drainage and Septic Tanks.

3. From and after the coming into force of these by-laws every person on whose behalf any underground drain not connecting with a sewer, or water-closet, or septic tank is laid or erected shall cause all the provisions of this by law to be

complied with.

(a.) All underground drains used or intended to be used to carry away sewage or household waste waters or matters from any house or dwelling, and all sanitary fittings in connection therewith, shall

or matters from any house or dwelling, and all sanitary fittings in connection therewith, shall conform in construction and in the materials used with the provisions required by the Sanitary and Drainage By-laws of 1903.

(b.) Except as provided in subsections (c) and (f) hereof, the point of discharge and disposal of the contents carried by any underground drain shall in every case be made to the satisfaction of the Inspector of Nuisances.

(c.) No person shall allow any household waste or matters to flow from any building or land in his occupation on to a road, or into any ditch or drain declared to be a public drain.

(d.) Every sink, lavatory-basin, closet-basin, or bath shall be placed so that the outlet thereof is as near as possible to the external wall of the room containing any such sanitary fitting, and the gully-traps over which the waste-pipes from such fittings discharge shall be so placed as to enable such waste-pipes to be of the shortest possible length.

(e.) No person shall lead the waste matters from any

(e.) No person shall lead the waste matters from any water-closet into any drain or sewer not being a brick, iron, or earthenware pipe, drain, or sewer. No person shall erect any water-closet under subsection (f) hereof unless all the drains and sewers through which the waste matters from such water-closet would pass are closed drains, and sewers from such water-closet connect to a final sewer outfall or septic tank approved by the District Health Officer. (f.) No water-closet shall be placed in any bathroom, or in any room or closet used for any other purpose except as a lavatory, privy, or urinal; and no person shall hereafter in any manner erect, make, or establish a water-closet or septic tank without first obtaining a permit from the Board.
Application for such permit to be accompanied
by a plan of such proposed work and to have
received the approval in writing of the District Health Officer.

Health Officer.

(g.) When, for any reason, any sanitary convenience, or any portion of a drain, or any fittings in connection therewith are no longer required for use, such portion of the drain and fittings shall be disconnected and removed, and any openings or connections with existing drains and sewers shall be properly closed and made good.

Privies.

4. No person shall construct any privy or closet other than a water-closet except in accordance with the following provisions, and the owner and occupier of any premises upon which any privy or closet exists shall at any time after two months from the coming into force of this by-law cause such privy or closet to conform in every respect thereto.

(a.) No part of any privy shall be at less than 15 ft. distance from any road, street, or footpath, nor from any dwellinghouse, and from every part of any wash-house, shed, convenience, or other erection attached to such dwellinghouse; or from any building, shop, or office in which any person may or may be intended to be employed in any manufacture, trade, or business other than a detached wash-house used exclusively for domestic purwash-house used exclusively for domestic purposes; or from any place of public worship, or any public hall or school. Every privy shall be so situated that the pan can be removed and the contents disposed of without the same having to be carried through any house, shop, factory, or reachibles.

workshop.

(b.) Every privy other than a water-closet shall be so constructed or altered that at least one of its sides shall be an external wall. The floor, including the space under the seat, shall be of good sound timber, planed, tongued, and grooved, or of brick or cement, and shall be at least 6 in above brick or cement, and shall be at least 6 in. above the level of the ground immediately adjoining thereto. It shall be properly lighted and ventilated, and the door shall be in a position adapted to conceal the interior from the public view. The seat shall be capable of being opened or removed for the entire width for the purpose of cleaning the space beneath. Battens shall be placed on the floor beneath the seat so as to secure that the pan shall be so placed that all excreta shall fall directly into the pan.

into the pan. into the pan.

(c.) Every privy shall be provided with a removable watertight metal receptacle made in accordance with such model pan or pans as may from time to time be determined by resolution of the Board, and deposited at the Board's office as a pattern of a "regulation pan," and approved by the District Health Officer: Provided that if before the coming into force of this by-law the owner or ccoupier has provided a removable watertight receptacle with at least two handles and of not greater capacity than 2 cubic feet. it shall not be greater capacity than 2 cubic feet, it shall not be compulsory upon the owner or occupier of the premises to provide the "regulation pan" herein specified until served with a notice in writing by the Inspector of Nuisances appointed by the Board requiring him so to do.

# Disposal of nightsoil.

5. No person shall place or deposit nightsoil in a pit or other fixed receptacle in the ground, or spread nightsoil upon the surface of the ground, or bury nightsoil within 33 ft. of any house, shop, factory, or workshop, or within 20 ft. of the boundary of such premises. No person shall dispose of nightsoil in any way so as to create a nuisance. No person shall bury nightsoil otherwise than in the following manner:

A Vehened furrow or trench shall be formed of not more A V-shaped furrow or trench shall be formed of not more than 18 in. in depth, and the nightsoil shall be placed along the bottom of such furrow or trench, and covered with earth level with the surface and so that the nightsoil shall be forthwith covered with at least 6 in. of earth.

#### Depositing rubbish.

6. No person shall throw, leave, or deposit upon any road or vacant allotment within the district any offensive matter, or any bottles, earthenware, china, or rubbish of any description.

7. If any person shall commit a breach of these by-laws he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5, and in the case of a continuous breach an additional penalty not exceeding £5 for every day on which the breach is continued after the first day. The continued existence in a state contrary to any by-laws of any work or thing shall be deemed a continuous breach within the meaning of this section.

8. These by-laws shall come into force on the 1st day of January, 1907, or so soon thereafter as they shall be published in the New Zealand Gazette.

The receipts for the year from subscriptions and donations must not have been less than £2, exclusive of moneys received from endowments, or from Government, or from Borough or County Councils, or for special building purposes, or as rent, hire, or consideration for the use of any room, or building, or land belonging to the institution, in respect of none of which will subsidy be allowed. The net proceeds of concerts, lectures, or other entertainments net proceeds of concerts, lectures, or other entertainments on behalf of the current expenses of the library will be regarded as voluntary contributions. A subsidy will not be given to more than one library in the same town.

In the division of the vote a nominal addition of £25 will be made to the amount of the income of each library derived from subscriptions, donations, and rates, and the vote will be divided according to the amounts thus augmented; but no library will receive credit for a larger income than £75—that is, in no case will the augmented amount on which distribution is based exceed £100.

3. The whole of the subsidy must be expended without delay in the purchase of books for the library.

4. Application to share in the distribution must be by means of a statutory declaration by the Chairman, or Secretary or Tressurer of the institution on behalf of which it

Vital Statistics.

Deaths occurring at hospitals, of persons not residents of the borough wherein the hospital is situated, have been allotted in each case to the borough where the disease was contracted, and not to that in which the death actually took place.

The total births in the above boroughs amounted to 552, against 546 in November—an increase of 6. The deaths in December were 180, a decrease of 46 on the number in November. Of the total deaths, males contributed 97, females 83. Thirty-seven of the deaths were of children under five years of age, being 20.56 per cent. of the whole

There were forty-nine deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards: Five men, 71, 72, 75, 80, 83, and five women, 65, 72, 75, 77, 78, died at Auckland; eight men, 67, 70, 72, 75 (two), 77, 79, 89, and three women, 65, 72, 88, at Wellington; eight men, 67 (two), 68, 73, 74, 75, 78, 82, and five women, 76, 78, 81, 86, 91, at Christchurch; and nine men, 66, 67 (three), 68, 69, 74, 81, 84, and six women, 67, 68, 73, 75, 78 (two), at Dunedin.

In the first table are given the deaths and death-rates for each of the four cities, for the suburban boroughs severally and for each city with its suburban towns. As regards Auckland and Christchurch, the whole of the area usually recognised as suburban has not yet been brought under municipal government, and the vital statistics do not deal with such portions as still remain in road districts. But the omission is not very important, for there are in either case quite enough suburbs included within borough boundaries to give a fair idea of the death-rate of Greater Auckland and Greater Christchurch. As further boroughs are formed the vital statistics will be made to include them.

The inclusion of the suburban boroughs tends to lower the rate at Auckland and Dunedin, but raises it at Christ-

Specific Febrile and Zymotic Diseases.—Fifteen deaths were registered as occurring from this class of disease at the four chief centres, with their suburbs, during December, 1906. Influenza caused 6 deaths, and was fatal at each town—1 death at Auckland, 1 at Wellington, 2 at Christchurch, and 2 at Dunedin. Whooping-cough shows 1 death at Dunedin, and diphtheria 2—1 at Wellington and 1 at Dunedin. From typhoid fever there were 3 deaths—2 at Auckland, and 1 at Wellington. Diarrhœa was fatal at Auckland only, there being 1 death registered under this head. The remaining two deaths were from specific disease.

Constitutional Diseases.—These deaths form 20 per cent. of the total mortality at the four chief centres, and numbered 36 altogether, of which 19 resulted from cancer, and 8 from phthisis. Other tubercular diseases caused 7 deaths more, and there were 2 deaths from diabetes.

Local Diseases.—The total of deaths from the four chief towns was 84, or 46 per cent. of the whole mortality. Diseases of the nervous system caused 14 deaths; of the circulatory, 21; of the respiratory (pneumonia, bronchitis, &c.), 19; and of the digestive, 15. Besides these there were 2 deaths from diseases of the lymphatic system, 8 of the urinary (4 Bright's) and 5 of the reproductive systems.

Violent Deaths.—Eleven deaths were accidental and 2 suicidal. Two of these were caused by fall of stone or earth, and another by accident in a quarry. Accidents with railway-engine, tramcar, and motor show 3 deaths, and drowning 3 more. Suffocation and birth accident (1 death each) complete the total of accidental deaths. The two suicides were by drowning and hanging.

The subjoined table shows the mortality for the last two months at each of the four centres from six principal specific febrile or zymotic diseases, and also the deaths from certain inflammatory diseases of the lungs. These causes of death have been distinguished from the others of the classes to which they belong as being the most important special diseases which give rise to sudden increases in the death-rates of towns, and the prevalence of which is closely connected with sanitary condition and climatic influence of the season on health.

- 25. In every case of the forfeiture of a lease for breach of conditions, the payment of the amount of the valuation of improvements, or of any part thereof, shall be absolutely at the discretion of the Board.
- 26. If payment of any such valuation is not made as aforesaid, the Board may sue for and recover the same in any Court of competent jurisdiction from the person who should make such payment
- 27. No outgoing tenant shall have any right or claim against the Maori owners or the Board in respect of the value of any improvements made by him on the lands in his occupation, in case any person shall fail to pay such value to the Board.
- 28. All claims for compensation in respect of any matters arising under the said Act, or for value of improvements or other matters, shall, unless otherwise specially provided, be settled in the manner provided in Part III of "The Public Works Act, 1905," for which purpose the said Part III shall be deemed to be incorporated with the said Act.

In every such claim the Board shall be the respondent. 29. Where it is provided or agreed that any matter shall be referred to arbitration, then such reference, unless herein otherwise provided, shall be to one or more arbitrators appointed by the parties on each side respectively, and an

appointed by the parties on each side respectively, and an umpire to be appointed by such arbitrators.

(a.) If either party shall fail to appoint an arbitrator within twenty-one days after being requested in writing to do so by the other party, then the arbitrator appointed by the other party shall alone conduct the arbitration, and his decision shall be final and binding on both parties.

(b.) If the said arbitrators shall fail to agree upon the matter referred to them within twenty-eight days of the same having been so referred, then the matter so referred shall be decided by an umpire to be appointed by the said arbitrators, whose decision shall be final and binding on both parties

parties.
(c.) Every such arbitration shall be carried on in the manner prescribed by "The Arbitration Act, 1890," and be subject to such last-mentioned Act in the same manner as if the reference to

such arbitration had been made by consent of parties under a deed.

(d.) Each party shall pay his or its costs of such reference, and any costs incidental to the appointment of an umpire shall be paid equally by the parties to the arbitration.

(e.) Such arbitrators or umpire shall have all the powers vested in Commissioners by "The Commissioners' Powers Act, 1867," as well as all the powers given to them by "The Arbitration Act, 1890."

#### Renewal of Leases.

31. (a.) The upset rent shall be such rent as shall be fixed by the Board, not being a greater sum than that at which the lease was offered to the outgoing lessee under the last preceding clause.

(b.) The amount of such upset rent shall be stated in the advertisements calling for tenders; and it shall be a condition of tender that the tenderer shall, together with his tender, deposit the amount of one half year's rent, which shall be returned to him if he fails to obtain the lease

(c.) If any person other than the outgoing lessee be declared the purchaser, he shall, within seven days after the day fixed for opening the tenders, pay over to the Board the amount of the value of the substantial improvements of a permanent character as fixed in manner provided by the last preceding clause.

(d.) When the day has arrived on which the terminating lease expires, or thereafter, if the Board shall have satisfied itself that the outgoing lessee has let the new lessee into quiet possession of the lands to be leased, and that none of the improvements on the lands which were thereon when the valuations mentioned in the last preceding clause were made have been destroyed or appreciably damaged, the Board shall pay over to the outgoing lessee the amount received by it from the incoming lessee as aforesaid.

(e.) If any of the improvements as mentioned in the pre-ceding subclause have been destroyed or appreciably damaged, as in the said subclause referred to, then damaged, as in the said subclause referred to, then the value of the improvements so destroyed, or the cost of repairing such damage, shall be decided by the Board or some person appointed by it; and the amount so fixed, with the costs attending such decision, shall be deducted from the amount payable as aforesaid to the outgoing lessee, and, save the amount deducted for costs, shall be returned to the incoming lessee

33. If such lease shall not be disposed of as above men-33. It such lease shall not be disposed of as above mentioned to some person other than the lessee, or if such person fails to execute the lease in triplicate within thirty days, or to pay the sum offered by him as aforesaid within thirty days, from the day on which the tenders were opened, then the lessee may again, within sixty days after the day fixed for the opening of the tenders, elect in manner aforesaid whether will except a fresh lessee as aforesaid; and if he does not opening of the tenders, elect in manner aloresaid whether he will accept a fresh lease as aforesaid; and if he does not elect to accept the same, or refuses or neglects to execute such lease within seven days after the same is tendered to him for the purpose, then he may continue as lessee of the said land from year to year, so long as he shall pay the rent reserved by his lease and observe and perform the covenants and conditions contained in the same or in this Act, or until and conditions contained in the same or in this Act, or until
the Board shall succeed in finding a purchaser of the new
lease, unless, prior to the finding of such purchaser by the
Board, he shall elect to accept a new lease for the said
further period of ten years as aforesaid.

34. The Board, in selling a renewed lease to a purchaser,
may make provision that the right to take possession under

35. All the provisions of the foregoing rules and regulations (except the provisions as to cultivation) as regards the tenders for sale, form, and conditions of first leases made under the said Act, and otherwise howsoever as regards such leases, shall, mutatis mutandis, apply to the sale, form, and conditions of the new or renewed leases above mentioned, and to the leases the reworder and otherwise howsoever report of to the lessees thereunder, and otherwise howsoever, except as herein is otherwise expressly provided.

Notwithstanding anything in the foregoing regulations contained, the Board reserves to itself the right to refuse to

accept the highest or any tender.

- (5.) That save as above the lessee shall not permit, and shall use his best endeavours to prevent, the destruction or burning of timber or bush standing or growing on the said land.
- (6.) That all trenches or holes over 1 ft. in depth which the lessee or those employed or licensed by him may open or dig on the said land and which are not in the nature of improvements shall be filled in, and the surface left, as regards such holes or trenches, as nearly as possible in the same condition as when the lessee took possession under this lease. this lease.
