HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by section fifteen of "The Native Land Court Act, 1894," it is enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Order, from time to time confer on the

Native Land Court, as established by the said Act, jurisdiction in any matter or question referred to in such Order exclusively affecting the rights of Natives in any real or personal property: And whereas a Crown grant was issued on the second day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, for the land described in the Schedule hereto, to Hami Ngaropi, Hemi Matini te Puke, Hone Kiingi Muriwhenua, and Te Waspu, their heirs and assigns, for ever, upon trust for the members of the Ngatimahanga Tribe of aboriginal Natives: And whereas it appears that portions of the said land have been sold, and it is expedient that the Native Land Court should be empowered to inquire and ascertain who are the Natives powered to inquire and ascertain who are the Natives beneficially entitled under the trust recited in the said

beneficially entitled under the trust recited in the said grant, and in what shares and proportions:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred upon him as aforesaid, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby order and declare that the investigation and determination of the and declare that the investigation and determination of the names of the Natives beneficially entitled under the said trust, and the relative shares and proportions in which such Natives are so entitled, and of any matter or question which may arise in relation thereto, or which it shall be necessary to determine for the purpose aforesaid, shall be and the same are hereby brought within the jurisdiction of the said Court.

WHEREAS by section four of "The Native Land Laws Amendment Act, 1895," it is enacted that the Governor may, by Order in Council, except from the operation of section one hundred and seventeen of "The Native Land Court Act, 1894" (hereinafter called "the said Act"), for a limited period or otherwise, and either generally or for such purposes and subject to such restrictions as shall be in such Order specified, any land, wheresoever situate, which is for the time being subject to the operation of the said section, or any interest therein or right over the same, or may in like manner make such exception in favour exclusively of any lessee or other person who has been bond fide in occupation of and has made improvements on such land, or has paid money to Native owners for lease or purchase thereof, prior to the passing of the said Act: Provided that no Order in Council under the provisions of this section shall take effect until after the expiration of two months from the date of the publication thereof in the Gazette. Provided also that every alienation under the provisions of this section shall be confirmed by the Court in terms of section fifty-three of the said Act:

And whereas the Aotea District Maori Land Board, by a recommendation made on the ninth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and seven, has recommended the Governor to except from the operation of section one hundred and seventeen of "The Native Land Court Act, 1894," for the purpose of alienation

APPENDIX.

"The Servants' Registry Offices Act, 1895," provides as follows :-

Section 15. "Every license-holder shall at all times keep posted up in some conspicuous place in his office, so as to be easily read by all persons, a printed copy of the scale of fees for the time being in force under this Act."

Section 16. "It shall not be lawful for any license-holder to directly or indirectly demand or receive from any person, for or in respect of the hiring of any servant, any greater or other fees than those specified in such scale; and any sum so in any way received by any license-holder in breach of this section may be recovered back, with full costs of suit, by the person who paid it."

"No license-holder shall, directly or indirectly, take or accept of any goods or chattels in payment or as security for the payment of such fees, nor shall any license-holder receive or accept any reward or other consideration in addition to the said fees."

Section 19. "If any person, being a license-holder, fails or neglects to comply with any of the provisions of this Act, or, being a license-holder or not, commits a breach of any of the provisions of this Act, he is liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds."

Section 22. "Every conviction against a license-holder shall be indorsed on his license by the convicting Magistrate or Justices; and, upon a third indorsement within three years from the first indorsement within such period being made, the license shall be deemed ipso facto cancelled, and the Clerk of the Court shall deliver it up to the Inspector."

Section 23. "No person whose license has been cancelled shall be entitled to hold a license in any district until the expiration of one year from the date of such cancellation."

REGULATIONS UNDER WHICH COMMISSIONS IN THE BRITISH ARMY MAY BE OBTAINED BY OFFICERS OF COLONIAL ARMY MAY BE OF MILITARY FORCES.

(As to candidates from the Chartered Universities in the Colonies, see "Regulations under which Commissions in the Army may be obtained by University Candidates," to be purchased in the same manner as these Regulations.)

1907.

(N.B.—Officers appointed to commissions in the Regular Forces may, in case of voluntary retirement from the Regular Forces, be called upon, as a condition of receiving the full rates of retired pay, to serve for a time in the Militia or Imperial Yeomany.)

1. Commissions in the Regular Forces will be granted to officers of the Militia* of certain Colonies under the conditions hereinafter prescribed, which, stated generally, are as

Candidates who possess the qualifications specified in paragraph 3 may be nominated by the authority specified in paragraph 2. After such nomination they will be examined by a Medical Board (see paragraph 17), and will undergo an examination in military subjects (see paragraph 21)

2. Until further notice the number of commissions allotted each half-year to the Colonies, and the authority by whom nominations will be made, are as follows:—

In the total of 16 will be included one commission in the Royal Artillery, which will be awarded to the candidate desirous of such an appointment who obtains highest marks at the examination in military subjects (see paragraphs 3, (d), and 11).

3. A candidate to be eligible for nomination must

(a.) Be unmarried.
(b.) Have attained the age of 20, and not have attained the age of 25, on the 1st of April if nominated for a March Military Examination, or on the 1st of October if nominated for an October Military Examination.

Examination.

(c.) Have obtained a "leaving" or "qualifying" certificate, or have passed one of the examinations accepted in lieu thereof, see paragraphs 4 to 12.

(d.) Have served as an officer in the Militia of the Colony from which he is nominated, and have attended two annual trainings, each training in a distinct year, or have seen active service in the field. A candidate for a commission in the Royal Artillery must be an officer of the Militia Artillery.

(e.) Have been attached to a British Regular Unit, or to

(e.) Have been attached to a British Regular Unit, or to a unit of the Permanent Military Force of the Colony, for a period of two months in accordance with paragraph 13, and have obtained a satisfactory certificate as laid down in Appendix IV.

II. "Leaving" and "Qualifying" Certificates.

4. In order to show that they have attained a fair standard of general education, all candidates will be required to produce either-

(a.) A "leaving" certificate;
(b.) A "qualifying" certificate; or
(c.) Proof of having passed one of the examinations laid

(c.) Proof of having passed one of the examinations laid down in paragraph 12.

5. A "leaving" certificate is a certificate including the subjects stated in paragraph 11, and granted in Scotland and Wales by a central body to candidates, not less than 17 years of age, who have attended three years' continuous teaching, with satisfactory conduct, in one or more properly inspected schools.

inspected schools.

In England and Ireland (until such time as a system of "leaving" certificate granted by a central body is instituted) this certificate, which must fulfil the above conditions as regards subjects, age, teaching, &c., will be granted by one of those bodies mentioned in paragraph 6 to a candidate at a school‡ which has been approved by the Army Council.

The examination for the "leaving" certificate will be held at the School by the body which inspected it and recommended it for approval.

recommended it for approval.

* For the purposes of these Regulations Militia should be defined as "a partially paid and annually trained force, as shown in the Annual Return of Naval and Military Resources, and controlled by the Colonial Government.

- 7. A "qualifying" certificate is a certificate including the subjects mentioned in paragraph 11, granted by the Army Qualifying Board to a candidate not less than 17 years of age.
- 8. Examinations will be held, commencing on or about the first Tuesday in March and the third Tuesday in September, at which candidates who wish to obtain "qualifying" certificates may present themselves, provided they have completed their seventeenth year before the first day of the month in which the examination is held.

The examination will be held in the Colony. The fee for the examination will be £3.

- 9. A candidate who is desirous of attending one of these examinations must apply to his Commanding Officer, at such date as will allow of the nominating authority forwarding the application so as to reach the War Office not later than the 1st of January or the 1st of July for the March and September examinations respectively. The nominating authority, in forwarding the application, will certify that the candidate is, having regard to the limits laid down in paragraph 3, (b), eligible in point of age, and that he will be prepared, when necessary, to recommend him in the manner prescribed in paragraph 15. The necessary papers will then be sent to the nominating authority.
- 10. Candidates must clearly understand that the fact of their obtaining a "leaving" or "qualifying" certificate, or of having passed one of the examinations laid down in paragraph 12, does not entitle them to nomination unless they are eligible in other respects, as laid down in paragraph 3.
- 11. The subjects covered by a "leaving" or "qualifying" certificate (see Syllabus, in Appendix II) are divided into classes, as follows:—

Class I.

- (1.) English.
 (2.) English History and Geography.
 (3.) Mathematics (elementary).
- N.B.—A candidate must take up and qualify in each of the subjects of Class I. If he is a candidate for the Royal Artillery, he must in addition take up and qualify in Mathematics I (see page 3036).

Class II.

- (4.) Science.(5.) French or German.
- (6.) Latin or Greek.

N.B.—A candidate must take up and qualify in any two of the three subjects, (4), (5), and (6), of Class II.

(Science in a "leaving" certificate means such combination of experimental or natural science as the Army Council may approve, provided always that the sciences recognised shall have been taught in a sufficiently extended course, including a due amount of laboratory and field work.)

(Any "leaving" certificate accepted as exempting from the qualifying examination must certify that the candidate has taken a sufficient course of elementary geometrical drawing and practical geometry, and also an elementary course of practical measurements as specified in the syllabus of elementary mathematics for the qualifying examination, and must also certify that the candidate has passed in these subjects; but it will be in the option of the candidate to take those subjects separately in the qualifying examination.)

- 12. A candidate will be exempt from attending a qualifying examination-
 - (a.) If he has qualified for admission to the Royal Military Academy or Royal Military College at a competitive examination held under the regulations in force up to and including June, 1905; or if he has attained a similar standard in one of the following examinations held by the Civil Service Commissioners up to and including June, 1905:—

III. Attachment to Regular Forces or Permanent Local

13. Commencing with the nomination of 1st July, 1908, a candidate to be eligible for nomination must have been attached to a Regular Unit or to a unit of the Permanent Military Forces of the Colony for two consecutive months at any time after the completion of his first annual training, and must have obtained a satisfactory certificate as set The forth in Appendix IV.

During the attachment a candidate will be instructed in

drill, discipline and interior economy, musketry, semaphore signalling, and practical tactics (including Sections 124-150 inclusive, and 169, Part IV, Infantry Training).

14. The attachment will be arranged by the general officer commanding the Regular or Permanent Forces in the Colony, who will cause a candidate who has qualified to be furnished with a certificate as set forth in Appendix IV.

No charges will be admissible against Imperial Funds in connection with this attachment.

IV. Nomination.

15. The nominating authority mentioned in paragraph 2 will notify to the War Office, through the Secretary of State for the Colonies, each half-year, the names of any duly qualified candidates he is desirous of nominating for examination in Military Subjects.

military Subjects.

This notification must reach the War Office by the 1st July for an October Examination, and by the 1st January for a March Examination, and should be accompanied by—

(a.) An extract from the register of the candidate's birth; or, in default, a certificate of his baptism, or other documentary evidence accompanied by a declaration made by one of his parents or guardians before a Magistrate, giving his exact age.

(b.) A certificate of having served the required number of annual trainings (each training in a distinct year).

(c.) A certificate as to attachment to a unit of the Regular or Permanent Military Forces in accordance with paragraph 13 and Appendix IV.

(d.) A certificate from the nominating authority that he is satisfied that the candidate is a bona fide Colonial resident, that he is of good moral character, unmarried, and in all other respects a fit and proper person to hold a commission in a fit and proper person to hold a commission in
His Majesty's Army.

(c.) One of the certificates as to literary qualification
mentioned in paragraph 4.

16. Should the number of candidates nominated exceed

the number of commissions allotted to the Colony for the half-year, the commissions will be awarded to those candidates who obtain highest marks in the examination. Commissions not taken up by one Colony may be awarded to candidates from other Colonies, if the exigencies of the Service permit.

V. Medical Examination.

17. A nominated candidate will be required to undergo examination by a Medical Board, to be convened by the Governor of the Colony, or other proper authority, and will not be allowed to proceed with his examination in military subjects unless pronounced by this Board to be physically fit for His Majesty's Service.

18. The general conditions as to height, weight, chest measurement, eyesight, &c., are given in Appendix I.

- The Board has power—

 (a.) To pass the candidate as physically fit.

 (b.) To report the candidate as unfit; but—

 (1.) In a case in which a defect can be cured by operation, to recommend that he be re-examined by a Medical Board after such operation.*

 (2.) In a case in which the candidate is slightly below one or other of the conditions as to height, chest girth, &c., enumerated in Appendix I, and in which the Board consider that he will fulfil them within six months, to recommend that he be re-examined at the end of that period. A candidate so recommended will be re-examined at the end of six months, and will not be granted a commission unless he has then attained the standard required according to his age.
- (c.) To reject a candidate as physically unfit.
 No relaxation of the eyesight test can ever be allowed.
 The decision of the Board will in all cases be absolutely

A candidate who is rejected by that Board can, under no circumstances, be medically re-examined (unless he be again nominated)

VI. Preliminary Medical Examination.

19. It is suggested that a candidate before commencing his 19. It is suggested that a candidate before commencing his course of study should undergo a thorough medical examination. By such an examination any serious physical disqualification would be revealed, and the candidate probably spared expense and the mortification of rejection.

20. Candidates may undergo a preliminary examination by a Military Medical Board, not more than two years before they compete, under the following conditions:—

(a.) Applications must be addressed to the nominating authority, accommanied by a fee to be assessed by

authority, accompanied by a fee to be assessed by the Colonial Authorities.

- (b.) Instructions will be issued for the examination to take place at the station nearest the candidate's residence, where a Medical Board can be held.

 The result will be notified to candidates by the
- (c.) The Board will be constituted by the nominating authority, and will be composed of military medical officers or, when this is not practicable, of civil medical practitioners of recognised professional standing.
- (d.) Candidates must pay their travelling-expenses.
- * Such a candidate will be re-examined at the end of six months. If not then pronounced fit, his name will be removed from the list of successful candidates.

- (e.) Candidates found unfit by the preliminary Board are not bound to accept its finding, but may, at their own risk, continue their studies, and, if nominated, may then submit themselves for medical examination by the final Medical Board.
 (f.) It must be distinctly understood that passing such preliminary Medical Board is solely for the candidate's information, and would give him no sort of claim to be accepted as physically fit when he presents himself as a candidate. His acceptance will depend entirely upon the report of the final Medical Board. Candidates may be fit for the service at the preliminary medical examination, but may become disqualified by some subsequent physical deterioration. physical deterioration.

VII. Examination in Military Subjects.

21. Examinations in Military Subjects of Candidates nominated under paragraph 15 will be held in March and October in each year. The subjects* and the maximum marks obtainable in each subject will be as follows:—

(b.) Measurement of height.

The candidate will be placed against the standard with his feet together, and the weight thrown on the heels, and not on the toes or outside of the feet. He will stand erect without rigidity, and with the heels, calves, buttocks, and the shoulders touching the standard; the chin will be depressed to bring the vertex of the head level under the horizontal and the height will be noted in parts of an inch to

bar, and the height will be noted in parts of an inch to eighths.

(c.) Measurement of chest.

The candidate will be made to stand erect with his feet together, and to raise his arms over his head. The tape will be carefully adjusted round the chest, with its posterior upper edge touching the inferior angles of the shoulder-blades, and its anterior lower edge the upper part of the nipples. The arms will then be lowered to hang loosely by the side and care will be taken that the shoulders are not the side, and care will be taken that the shoulders are not thrown upwards or backwards so as to displace the tape. The candidate will then be directed to take a deep inspiration several times, and the maximum expansion of the chest will be carefully noted. It is often attempted to conceal the true minimum measurement, but it can be obtained by a little manipulation and by drawing off attention from the examination by a few questions.

The maximum expansion rarely exceeds the average minimum by more than 2 in. to $2\frac{1}{2}$ in.

The papers will be set to test knowledge of fundamental principles and readiness in application to simple practical problems. The solutions of equations must be worked out to a few significant figures; and candidates must be accustomed to test the accuracy of solutions by substitution. Skill in elaborate analysis, such as the simplification of complicated fractions, will not be looked for.

PRACTICAL MEASUREMENTS.

Measurement of length-verniers, calipers, micrometer, screw-gauge, spherometer.

forces; centre of gravity; three-force problems; friction; mechanical powers—e.g., lever, wedge, pulleys, &c.

APPENDIX V.

FIRST APPOINTMENTS TO LINE REGIMENTS.

THE appointment of qualified candidates to particular regiments of the Line will be made on the following principles:

1. A candidate having a special family or territorial connection with a regiment may, when attending the examination in military subjects, apply, on a form which will be supplied to him, to be appointed to the regiment, and such consideration as can be afforded will be given to his applica-

tion.
2. If desirous of waiting for a particular regiment he must 2. If desirous of waiting for a particular regiment he must state this when making application, but he must clearly understand that he will only be allowed to wait if his claim be a very strong one, and if the conditions at the time are such as to allow of this without detriment to the Service. The period for which he will be allowed to wait will in no case exceed six months, but may be determined at any moment if the needs of the Army so require. After a candidate has once been gazetted on first appointment, no application for a transfer will be entertained.

3. Candidates without special claims are at liberty to apply for particular regiments (not exceeding three in all), but will in no case be allowed to wait.

4. Where the claims of different candidates for the same regiment are evenly balanced, the first consideration will be given to those highest on the list in their final examination.

5. All candidates must clearly understand that, while

5. All candidates must clearly understand that, while their wishes will be met as far as possible, they will be posted to vacancies as demanded by the interests of the Service.

N.B.—All applications for Regiments must be made on the form which is supplied to each candidate for this purpose.

Whereas by an instrument under his hand dated the 25th day of July, 1907, reciting that, pursuant to the abovementioned Act, the Timaru Harbour Board had appointed Albert Kaye, Esquire, of Christchurch, Grain-merchant, and the Waimate Borough Council had appointed Ernest Page Lee, Esquire, of Oamaru, Solicitor, to be Commissioners for the purpose of inquiring, as provided by the said Act, whether it is just and equitable that the Borough of Waimate be included in the Timaru Harbour District, and if the decision is in the affirmative, then from what date it should be included, the terms of its inclusion, and other. it should be included, the terms of its inclusion, and otherwise, as mentioned in section 2 of the said Act, the Colonial Secretary did, pursuant to the powers in that behalf contained in the said Act, appoint the undersigned, Frederick Revans Chapman, being a Judge of the Supreme Court of New Zealand, to sit with the above-named Commissioners, and to act as Chairman, and to exercise equal jurisdiction with them in respect of the determination of the matters aforesaid: And whereas on the 12th and 13th days of September, 1907, the Court of inquiry constituted by the said Act sat at Timaru and heard the evidence tendered by the said parties, and what the said parties by their respective counsel desired to allege and argue in the premises.

The said Commissioners and Judge, sitting as such Court as aforesaid, do decide as follows:-
1. On and from the 1st day of January, 1908, the Borough of Waimate shall be included in the Timaru Harbour District.

2. The terms of inclusion are that, as to past loans and future liabilities, the said borough, and its ratepayers, and their rateable property, shall be upon the same footing as other local bodies included in the said district, and their ratepayers, and the rateable property of such ratepayers.

3. That, as to representation, the said borough shall be incorporated with and be entitled to be represented until the next election of members of the Board, and thereafter in all future elections of members, together with and as if it were part of the Makikihi District; and that for the purposes of all such elections there shall be incorporated with the electoral roll of the said district by the Clerk of the County of Waimate, or other the person whose duty it is to make the same up, the electoral roll for the time being in force in the said borough for the purposes of elections under the law for the time being in operation relating to the election of for the time being in operation relating to the election of the Mayor and Councillors of the said borough, and the roll of the said district, as described in "The Timaru Harbour

Board Act, 1882."

(c.) It shall be a sufficient compliance with this paragraph of this decision if the Timaru Harbour Board remits to each of the said Commissioners the sum of twenty-five pounds (£25) and pays to the Treasurer of the said borough the sum of seventy-five pounds (£75).

Te Makarini Scholarships, held at Te Aute College, Hawke's Bay.

THREE scholarships of the yearly value of £35, tenable for two years, are offered for competition. One of these scholarships, to be called the senior scholarship, is open to all Maori boys under sixteen years of age at the end of the month preceding the date of the examination: the other two scholarships are junior scholarships, one of which is open to all Maori boys under fifteen years of age at the end of the month preceding the date of the examination who have attended a Native school or schools other than Te Aute or St. Stephen's, and whose attendance at school during the previous year is considered by the Inspector of Native Schools to have been satisfactory; the other is open to Maori boys whose attendance at any school other than Te Aute and St. Stephen's during the previous year has been similarly satisfactory. The senior scholarship is open to Maori boys on the conditions laid down in the regulations of the Trustees of the Te Makarini Scholarships Fund, as printed in the Native Schools Code, 1897. Candidates for the junior scholarships will be examined in the subjects specified for Standard IV in the Native Schools Code, 1897. In the one the candidates will be expected to show a general acquaintance with the course of English literature as represented (mainly) by the following writers to show a general acquaintance with the course of English literature, as represented (mainly) by the following writers in verse and prose, between the reign of Edward III and the accession of Queen Victoria:—Verse: Chaucer, Langland, Spenser, Shakespeare, Milton, Dryden, Pope, Gray, Collins, Johnson, Goldsmith, Crabbe, Cowper, Campbell, Wordsworth, Scott, Byron, Coleridge, Shelley, Keats. Prose: Bacon, Sir Thomas Browne, Milton, Cowley, Bunyan, Dryden, Swift, Defoe, Addison, Johnson, Burke, Scott, Macaulay (essays and biographies).

A minute knowledge of the works of these authors will not

A minute knowledge of the works of these authors will not be looked for in this part of the examination, which will, however, test how far the candidates have studied the chief productions of the greatest English writers in themselves, and are acquainted with the leading characteristics of their and are acquainted with the leading characteristics of their thought and style, and with the place which each of them occupies in the history of English literature. Candidates will also be expected to show that they have studied in these authors the history of the English language in respect of its vocabulary, syntax, and prosedy.

The other part of the examination will relate to one of the periods named below, which will follow each other year by

year in the order indicated:—
1. (1908.) A.D. 1360 to A.D. 1600 (Chaucer to Spenser).
2. (1909.) A.D. 1600 to A.D. 1700 (Shakespeare to Dryden).

3. (1910.) A.D. 1700 to A.D. 1800 (Pope to Cowper).
4. (1911.) A.D. 1800 to A.D. 1832 (nineteenth-century writers to the death of Scott).

The examination in this part will require from candidates a more minute acquaintance with the history of the English language and literature, as illustrated in the chief works produced in each period, and will be based to a considerable extent, but by no means exclusively, on certain books specified each year by the Commissioners.* The names placed under the dates are intended to suggest the general character of the literary development of the period, and, consequently, the natural limits of the examination. All the works of Shakespeare, for example, will be regarded as falling within the period 1600 to 1700; all the works of Switt within the period 1700 to 1800; all the works of Scott and Wordsworth, and all the works of Macaulay, within the period 1800 to 1832.

The pupils are taught to use and understand ordinary speech. The full charge for board and education is £40 a year, but less is accepted from parents who cannot afford to pay this amount. In case of necessity admission is free.

By the Education Act, the education of deaf children tetween the ages of 7 and 16 is made compulsory. A child is, as a rule, best fitted to begin the school course at about the age of 6, but advice should be obtained as soon as any sign of deafness is observed.

The following classes of deaf children are admitted:

1. Children born deaf, or who have lost their hear-Children born dear, or who have loss their hearing before learning to speak.
 Children who can hear a little, but are too deaf to be taught in an ordinary school.
 Children who have lost their hearing after having

learned to speak.
