Regulations under "The Infant Life Protection Act, 1907."

PLUNKET, Governor. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government Buildings, at Wellington, this nine teenth day of December, 1907.

Present:

THE RIGHT HONOURABLE SIR J. G. WARD, K.C.M.G., PRESIDING IN COUNCIL.

TN pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred upon him by "The Infant Life Protection Act, 1907" (hereinafter termed "the Act"), His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby make the following regulations, and doth also declare that the said regulations shall come into force and take effect on and after the first day of January. one thousand nine hundred and eight:— January, one thousand nine hundred and eight :-

REGULATIONS.

"District Agent" means an officer who is appointed by the Minister of Education to be an agent of the Department of Education for the purposes of the Act: "Local Visitor" means a person whose name is registered in the office of a District Agent as undertaking to maintain a regular supervision of an infant or infants coming within the operation of the Act, and to make monthly reports to the District Agent as to the well-being of such infant or infants.

2. Every application for a license under the Act shall be in the prescribed form. It shall be addressed to the Secretary for Education, and lodged with the District Agent of the district within which the applicant resides.

3. When an infant is taken into a foster-home the foster-parent shall forthwith supply the Secretary for Education with the name and other particulars of the infant on the

prescribed form. The form shall be lodged with the Dis-

prescribed form. The form shall be lodged with the District Agent.

4. Except by special sanction of the Minister of Education, no person who is in receipt of charitable aid shall be licensed as a foster-parent.

5. The foster-parent shall keep a record-book in the Form No. 4 in the Schedule hereto, and shall enter the particulars therein specified immediately after the occurrence of the incident to be recorded. incidents to be recorded.

6. Every foster-home and the infants maintained therein

shall be visited regularly by an officer duly appointed under the Act. Such visits shall be made as frequently as the individual circumstances of each case require, but in no case shall an infant under one year of age be visited less often then once in two months, nor an infant over that age less often than once in four months.

7. Foster-parents are required to promptly comply with any direction given by a District Agent or other duly authorised person in the execution of his duty.

8. Foster-parents must always allow all reasonable facili-ties to Local Visitors for ascertaining the condition of infants

placed in foster-homes.
9. Foster-parents must treat infants with all the care and kindness suited to their tender age.

kindness suited to their tender age.

10. If an infant becomes so ill as in the judgment of the foster-parent of such infant to need medical attendance, the foster-parent shall by the most speedy means call upon the father, mother, or other near relative of such infant to provide such medical attendance; but if it is not practicable to communicate promptly with a near relative of the infant, or if for any reason there is delay in the arrival of medical aid, the foster-parent shall on her own responsibility immediately obtain the attendance of a medical practitioner. The foster-parent on the occurrence of such illness must inform the District Agent without any delay.

11. If the license of a foster-parent is revoked on the

11. If the license of a foster-parent is revoked on the ground that any infant in her charge has been improperly treated, the revocation may include the forfeiture of any moneys for the maintenance of such infant that would otherwise be due to her.

12. In the event of the loss or destruction of a license the Secretary for Education shall, before issuing a duplicate license, obtain from the foster parent a statutory declaration setting forth the facts and circumstances of such loss or destruction.

13. The forms set forth in the Schedule hereto are hereby prescribed as forms to be used for the purposes of the Act

and these regulations.

14. The Clerk or Registrar of the Court in which any order of adoption under "The Adoption of Children Act, 1895," is made shall, immediately upon the issue of the same, forward a true copy thereof to the Secretary for Education, and also to the District Agent of the district wherein the adoptive parent or parents reside, together with a statement setting forth the terms of any agreement or arrangement under which the adoptive parent or parents receive a premium or other consideration in respect of such adoption.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

THEREAS by section nine of "The Beer Duty Act Amendment Act, 1907" (hereinafter called "the said Act"), it is enacted that the Governor may from time to time, by Order in Council gazetted, make regulations for the carrying-out of the provisions of the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, and in everying of the powers and authorities vested in him.

The license to be granted under the said Act shall be in the following form:—

LICENSE TO MANUFACTURE HOP-BEER.

, of , having paid into my office the sum of £1, in accordance with the provisions of "The Beer Duty Act Amendment Act, 1907," is hereby licensed to manufacture hop-beer for sale, the alcoholic strength of which does not exceed 3 per cent. of proof spirit. This license shall continue in force until the 31st day of December, 190 .

REGULATION 43.

Franco-British Exhibition.

In consideration of their being carried solely at the risk of consignors, and of the Government being freed of all liability in connection therewith, exhibits consigned for exhibition at the Franco-British Exhibition, to be opened in London in May next, will be carried free on the New Zesland Government railways, received the new Zestand Government railways, provided that each package shall be marked legibly "For exhibition at the Franco-British Exhibition," and consigned to the Department of Industries and Commerce or to the Exhibition direct.

All loading and unloading shall be done at the expense of the consignors, and in the event of the exhibits or any part thereof being sold the full ordinary railage

any part thereof being sold the full ordinary railage charges must be paid.

Under similar conditions, and on the production of a certificate from the Exhibition authorities stating that the exhibits have not been transferred, exchanged, or sold, and are still the property of the original consignors, free railage will be granted on the return journey. journey.
