

Any person authorized by the Minister may at all reasonable times enter upon the said hoppers and view the state of repair thereof; and upon such Minister leaving at or posting to the last known address of the licensee a notice in writing of any defect or want of repair in such hoppers, requiring him within a reasonable time, to be therein prescribed, to repair the same, he shall with all convenient speed cause such defect to be removed or such repairs to be made. repairs to be made.

. Nothing herein contained shall authorize the licensee to do or cause to be done anything repugnant to or incon-sistent with any law relating to the Customs, or any regu-lation of the Minister of Customs, or with any provisions of the Harbours Act, 1908, or its amendments, or any regulations made thereunder, and that are now or may hereafter be in force.

hereafter be in force. 8. The rights, powers, and privileges conferred by or under this Order in Council shall continue in force for the term of fourteen years, computed from the date hereof, unless in the meantime such rights, powers, and privileges are altered, modified, or revoked by competent authority; and the licensee shall not assign, charge, or part with any such right, power, or privilege without the previous written consent of the Minister first obtained. 9. WHEREAS by section two of the Public Works Amendment Act, 1911, it is provided that no person shall lay, construct, put up, place, or use any electric line except under the authority of a license issued to him by the Governor in Council under that Act : And whereas the Frankton Town Board (hereinafter referred to as "the Board") desires to erect electric lines for lighting and power purposes, and it is expedient ac-cordingly to issue a license in respect thereof under the said section :

said section :

Now, therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred on him by the said section, and of all other powers in anywise enabling him in that behalf, His Ex-

cellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Execu-tive Council of the said Dominion, doth, subject to the conditions set forth in the Schedule hereto, hereby autho-rize and license the Board to erect, construct, lay down, and maintain electric lines for lighting and power purposes within the Frankton Town District, such electric lines being indicated by red lines on the plan marked P.W.D. 31431, deposited in the office of the Minister of Public Works, at Wellington, in the Wellington Provincial Dis-trict. trict.

SCHEDULE.

CONDITIONS.

1. In the following conditions,

"Consumer's wires" means any electric line on a con-sumer's premises which is connected with the service lines of the Board. "Inspecting Engineer" means the Engineer or other officer appointed by the Minister for the purpose of in-specting the works to be constructed or maintained by the Reard Board.

"Pressure" means the difference of electrical potential

"Pressure" means the difference of electrical potential between any two conductors through which a supply of energy is given, or between any part of either conductor and the earth. "Minister" means the Minister of Public Works. "Telegraph" includes telephone. Any metallic body to be "efficiently connected with earth" shall be connected with the general mass of the earth in such manner as will ensure at all times an imme-diate and safe discharge of electrical energy. 2. The supply of electrical energy shall be given to private consumers by means of direct current on the two- or three-wire system at a pressure of 230 volts effective between each of the outer wires. The declared voltage at the consumers' terminals shall be 230 and 460 volts respectively.

voltage at the consumers terminals shan so zer and zer volts respectively. 3. The neutral wire shall be efficiently insulated through-out its length, and shall be earthed only at the power-station. The earth connection shall be provided with a switch for cutting off the earth connection for testing, and with a recording ammeter reading to a maximum of

switch for cutting off the earth connection for testing, and with a recording ammeter reading to a maximum of 5 amperes. 4. The main switchboard shall be made of and be mounted on material that is not inflammable. 5. Except where otherwise provided, the overhead con-ductors may be of bare hard-drawn copper or aluminium wire. If at any time it is found detrimental to the public safety to have these wires bare, the Minister may require the Board to have them insulated, and they shall thereupon be insulated accordingly. No electric-light wire shall come within 3 ft. of any other class of aerial wires or of cables, except where it may be permitted to pass the electric-light wires through such other wires or cables at a pole. 6. Where lead-covered telephone cables or any open telegraph or other aerial wires are crossed above or beneath by the electric-light wires, the latter wires shall be insulated with not less than 600-megohms-per-mile grade of vulcanized rubber throughout the crossing-span, and over every such span they shall be suitably suspended from effectively earthed steel bearer-wires if the Minister of Telegraphs shall so require. 7. In places where it may be required to cross with the electric-light wires through any other aerial wires or through cables, all such through crossings, if permitted, shall be effected at a pole. In every case of a through crossing, no matter whose property the lines crossed through may be, the method of carrying the electric-light wires across the pole, protecting them thereon, preventing other wires from ceming into contact with them, and

other wires from coming into contact with them, and protecting persons working on the poles from danger of shock, shall be to the satisfaction of the Minister of Tele-

shock, shall be to the satisfaction of the Minister of Tele-graphs. Where the insulated wires cross through on the pole they shall be encased in a protecting tube for the entire length of the arms on such pole. If metal pipe is used to encase the wires it shall be effectively earthed. 8. Efficient guard-wires shall, if so required by the Minister of Telegraphs or the Minister, be erected in a manner to meet with the approval of either one Minister or the other, or both, as the case may require, at all crossings and places where the electric-light wires inter-sect telegraph or other wires. The Board shall bear the expense of such guard-wires in all cases where an electric-light wire intersects a telegraph or other wire previously existing.

existing. 9. In running the lines authorized by this license through streets where no telegraph lines exist, the Board shall keep to one side of the street; and in running service wires to the opposite side of the street, the Board shall arrange

so as to interfere as little as possible with the route of

of the streets to that on which any delegraph potentials exist; and where the erection of the electric-light wires, and such alteration is approved by the Minister of Tele-graphs, the expense of the alteration shall be borne by the Board. 11. Where the electric-light wires are on one side of a street and the telegraph wires are on the other, and service is required to be given from either to the other side of the street, the Board and the Minister of Telegraphs shall give to each other reasonable facilities as far as possible to effect supply. 12. Every main shall be tested for insulation after having been placed in position and before it is used for the purposes of supply, the testing pressure being at least 500 volts, and the Board shall duly record the results of the tests of each main or section of a main, and forthwith forward a report thereof to the District Engineer of Public

the tests of each main or section of a main, and forthwith forward a report thereof to the District Engineer of Public Works at Auckland. 13. The insulation of every complete circuit used for the supply of energy, including all machinery, apparatus, and devices forming part of or in connection with such circuit, shall be so maintained that the leakage current shall not under any conditions exceed one-thousandth part of the maximum supply current. Every leakage shall be shall be so indiffusited that the only of the only of the only conditions exceed one-thousandth part of the maximum supply current. Every leakage shall be remedied without delay. Every such circuit shall be tested for insulation at least once in every week, and the Board shall duly record the results of the tests, and forward a report thereof at the end of each week to the District Engineer of Public Works at Auckland. 14. The sectional area of the conductor in any electric line other than service wires or connections to street lamps laid or erected in any street shall not be less than 7/18 standard wire gauge. Service wires and connections to street lamps shall not be less than No. 12 standard wire gauge if solid, or 7/20 standard wire gauge if stranded. 15. All metal pipes or coverings containing any electric wire shall be efficiently connected with earth, and shall be so jointed as to make good electrical connection throughout their whole length.

throughout their whole length.

16. Arc lamps used in any street for public lighting shall be so fixed as not to be in any part at a less height

shall be so fixed as not to be in any part at a less height than 10 ft. from the ground. All arc lamps shall be so guarded as to prevent pieces of ignited carbon or broken glass falling from them, and shall not be used in situations where there is any danger of the presence of explosive dust or gas.

17. The variation of pressure at any consumer's ter-minals shall not exceed 4 per cent. above or below the normal pressure at which he is being supplied. 18. Every support for an aerial line shall be of durable

18. Every support for an aerial line shall be of durable material and properly strengthened against forces due to wind-pressure, change of direction of line, and unequal length of span. The factor of safety of such supports shall be at least four if of iron, steel, or reinforced concrete, and six if of wood, taking into consideration all possible stresses, including wind-pressure at 30 lb. per square foot on plane surfaces and 18 lb. per square foot of diametrical plane for cylindrical surfaces. The stress in the aerial conductors shall not exceed 28,000 lb. per square inch for copper and 15,000 lb. per square inch for aluminium in the extreme case of a temperature of 12° Fahr. and a wind-pressure of 18 lb. per square foot of diametrical plane occurring simultaneously.
19. Earth-wires, where led down poles, shall be protected

19. Earth-wires, where led down poles, shall be protected by casing for a distance of 8 ft. from the ground.

20. All aerial wires shall be attached to suitable insulators carried on cross-arms of suitable material and cross-

20. All aerial wires shall be attached to suitable insulators carried on cross-arms of suitable material and cross-section, and they shall be so attached to the insulators or guarded that they cannot fall away from the support. Conductors covered with insulating material shall be so attached that their insulation will not be impaired where they are secured to the insulator.
21. Any aerial wire shall not in any part thereof be at a less height from the ground than 18 ft., or within 5 ft. measured horizontally or vertically from any part of any building or erection other than a support for the line, except where brought into a building for the purpose of supply. No work of any nature shall be erected or constructed upon, over, or under any part of the New Zealand Government railways until the Board has obtained the consent of the Minister of Railways thereto, as required by section 4 of the Government Railways Amendment Act, 1910 (No. 2).
22. Service lines from aerial lines shall be led as directly as possible to insulators firmly attached to some portion of the consumer's premises which is not accessible to any person without the use of a ladder or other special appliance. Every portion of any service line which is out-

side a building, and is within 7 ft. from any part of the building, shall be rubber-insulated. 23. Where an aerial line crosses a street, the angle between the line and the direction of the street at the place of crossing shall not be less than 60 degrees, and the spans shall be as short as possible. The minimum height of the line shall be 20 ft above the street layed of the line shall be 20 ft. above the street level.

Where an aerial line crosses or is in proximity to any 24.

24. Where an aerial line crosses or is in proximity to any metallic substance, precautions shall be taken against the possibility of the line coming into contact with the metal-lic substance, or of the metallic substance coming into contact with the line by breakage or otherwise. 25. Every aerial line, including its supports, its con-ductors, and their insulating covering, and all the struc-tural parts and electrical appliances and devices belonging to or connected with the line, shall be duly and efficiently maintained as regards both electrical and mechanical conditions. conditions.

26. An aerial line shall not be permitted to remain receted after it has ceased to be used for the supply of energy, unless the Board intends within a reasonable time again to take it into use.

again to take it into use. 27. Where any portion of any electric line or any support for an electric line is exposed in such a position as to be liable to cause injury from lightning, it shall be efficiently protected against such liability. 28. The Board shall be responsible for all electric lines or wires, fittings, and apparatus belonging to it, or under its control, which may be upon a consumer's premises, being maintained in a safe condition and in all respects fit for supplying energy.

29. In delivering the energy to a consumer's terminals the Board shall exercise all due precautions so as to avoid risk of causing fire on the premises.

30. A suitable safety-fuse or other automatic circuit-breaker shall be inserted in each service line within a consumer's premises as close as possible to the point of entry, and contained within a suitable locked or sealed receptacle of fireproof construction.

31. All electric wires placed on a consumer's premises shall be insulated with rubber of 600-megohm grade, and shall be thoroughly protected against injury to the insula-tion or access of moisture. All electric wires shall be so fixed and protected as to prevent the possibility of electrical discharge to any adjacent metallic substance.

32. The Board shall not connect the wires and fittings 32. The Board shall not connect the wires and fittings on a consumer's premises with its mains, or, in the case of premises already connected, continue the supply from its mains, unless it is reasonably satisfied that the require-ments of this license are complied with, that the wiring and fittings are suitable for the voltage at which supply is being given, that the installation generally is in accord-ance with the requirements of good practice, and that the connection or continuance of supply would not cause a leakage from those wires and fittings exceeding one ten-thousandth part of the maximum supply current to the premises. premises.

For the purpose of satisfying itself that the require-ments of this license are being observed in so far as they apply to wires on a consumer's premises, the Board may require that notice be served upon it of the intention to instal wires, fittings, lamps, motors, or other apparatus on any premises, and may inspect the same during any reasonable hours while the installation of such is in progress.

33. If the Board is reasonably satisfied, after making all proper examination by testing or otherwise, that the wiring and fittings are not suitable for the voltage being employed, that a leakage exists at some part of a circuit of such extent as to be a source of danger, and circuit of such extent as to be a source of danger, and that such leakage does not exist at any part of the circuit belonging to the Board, or that any other requirements of this license are not being complied with, then and in such case any officer of the Board, duly authorized by it in writing, may, for the purpose of discovering whether the leakage exists at any part of a circuit within or upon any consumer's premises, or whether the wiring is suitable and the general requirements of the license are complied with, by notice require the consumer, at some reasonable time after the service of the notice, to permit him to inspect and to test the wires and fittings belonging to the consumer and forming part of the circuit. to the consumer and forming part of the circuit.

If on such testing and inspection the officer discovers a leakage from the consumer's wires exceeding one ten-thousandth part of the maximum supply current to the premises, or that the requirements of this license are not properly conformed to, or if the consumer does not give all due facilities for inspection and testing, the Board shall either not commence the supply or shall forth-with discontinue the supply of energy to the premises in question, giving immediate notice to the consumer of its reasons for not commencing or for discontinuing the supply, and in either case supply shall not be given until

the Board is reasonably satisfied that the installation is

the Board is reasonably satisfied that the installation is in conformity with the requirements of this license. 34. If any consumer is dissatisfied with the action of the Board in refusing to give, or in discontinuing, or in not recommencing the supply of energy to his premises, the wires and fittings of that consumer may, on his applica-tion to the Minister, and on payment of the cost, be inspected and tested by the Inspecting Engineer. This provision shall be indorsed on every notice given under the provisions of either of the two last preceding clauses.

From and after the time when the Board com-mences to supply energy in pursuance of this license, it shall maintain continuously sufficient power for the use of all the consumers for the time being entitled to be sup-plied : Provided that, for any purposes connected with the efficient working of the undertaking, the Minister may give permission to the Board to discontinue the supply at such intervals of time and for such periods as he may think expedient. When the supply is so discontinued, public notice shall be given, when practicable, of such dis-continuance, and of the probable duration thereof. 36. The Minister may at any time order an inspection to be made of the works, lines, and wires of the Board used for electric lighting and power purposes. If any defect is found to exist it must be remedied forthwith, and if in the opinion of the officer or person inspecting such default is serious, the Minister may, on receipt of the report, direct the Board to at once cease transmitting energy either over the whole of the Board's line and wires, or over any specified part thereof. until such defect is repaired or remedied. The cost of such inspection shall be borne by the Board. 37. After the supply of energy has begun, notice shall be given to the District Engineer of Public Works, Auck-land, of each further proposed extension or alteration of lines or wires in pursuance of this license. 38. The construction of the works hereby authorized shall be substantially commenced on or before the Ist day of August, 1912, and shall be completed on or before the Ist day of March, 1913. 39. The recovery of a penalty under this license shall not affect the liability (if any) of the Board to pay or make compen-sation in respect of any damage or injury which may be caused by reason of the default. 43. Notwithstanding anything in the last preceding clause of these conditions, if the Board fails to comply with the terms of any such notice for ninety days after the receipt theorem.

Note — Weather very changeable during the month, with the rainfall considerably above the average for June. Ba-rometer unsteady, and somewhat below the mean of previous years, with a range of 1.12 inches. Bright sunshine amounted to 77 hours 27 minutes, and five days without recorded sun-shine. Frost was recorded on four mornings. Earth tem-peratures during the month declined 8° at 1 ft. and 5° at 3 ft.; the mean at the former being 48.8° and 51.4° at the latter cepth. Mean dew-point, 38.5° ; mean elastic force of vapour, 0.233 inches; mean relative humidity, 68 per cent. of saturation.

- "Traction-engine" or "engine" means a locomotive usually propelled by steam or other generated motive power not being used on a railway or tramway:

NO. 1 BY-LAW.-PEDLARS AND HAWKERS.

Every licensee who may desire to transfer his license shall make signed application to the County Clerk for a transfer, and upon production to him of such application and of the license which it is desired to transfer, and upon payment of a fee of 5s., the County Clerk shall note such transfer on the register, and indorse a memorandum thereof on the license.

6. Every person in charge of a traction-engine engaged in propelling the same upon any road within the county shall exhibit the license for the same, upon request, to the County Clerk, or to the Engineer, or to any person authorized by the Council in that behalf.

Security for Damage.

Every owner shall, before the issue to him of a license, give security, to the satisfaction of the County Clerk, that no special damage will accrue to any road, bridge, ferry, or ford which shall be under the care, control, or management of the Council, by reason of the transportation of the traction-engine in respect of which such license is issued. Such security shall be by bond in such form, and with or without securities, as the County Clerk may require in a sum not exceeding $\pounds 50$; provided that in lieu of a bond the applicant may deposit, to the entire setisfaction of the County Clerk a sum of exceeding $\pounds 50$; provided entire satisfaction of the County Clerk, a sum not exceeding £50.

NO. 6 BY-LAW .--- TRAFFIC ON BRIDGES.

1. No person shall drive any vehicle across or upon any traffic-bridge at any pace faster than that of a walk. 2. No person shall ride, drive, or lead any cattle or horses across or upon any traffic-bridge at any pace faster.

The Council may from time to time, by resolution, declare any county bridge or bridges unsafe for traffic by any cart, wagon, vehicle, engine, or machine which shall itself or together with any things being transported therein itself or together with any things being transported therein or thereon weigh more than 30 cwt. to each pair of wheels, and after the passing of such resolution shall have been publicly notified it shall not be lawful to transport any cart, vehicle, engine, or machine which shall itself or together with any things being transported therein or thereon weigh more than 30 cwt. to each pair of wheels over such bridge or bridges so declared to be unsafe. 4. Any owner, driver, or person in charge of any cart, wagon, vehicle, engine, or machine acting in breach of this by-law commits an offence, and shall upon conviction thereof be liable to a fine not exceeding £5 for every such offence.

No. 7 BY-LAW.—LIGHTS ON VEHICLES. 1. Lights to be carried on Vehicles.—Every vehicle, public or private, being upon any road within the County of Akitio after sunset and before sunrise shall carry lights. Such lights so carried shall at all times be in good order, and be kept clearly burning, so as to be distinctly seen by all persons being upon or using the same road. 2. The lights carried by all vehicles, except as herein-after provided in the case of heavy wagons and drays, shall be two outside carriage-lamps, one upon each side. 3. The lights carried by heavy wagons and drays may be one light, burning brightly, securely fixed on the driver's side of the load, or so placed as to be seen on all sides by drivers of other vehicles approaching or passing. 4. Every owner and driver of any vehicles being upon any road in the County of Akitio after sunset and before sunrise, and not provided with lights as hereinbefore pre-scribed, commits an offence, and shall upon conviction thereof be liable to a fine not exceeding £5 for every such offence. offence.

NO. 8 BY-LAW.-PUBLIC BILLIARD-ROOMS.

NO. 8 BY-LAW. — PUBLIC BILLIARD-ROOMS. 1. For the purpose of this by-law, "public billiard-room" means a billiard-room where billiards or any similar games are played for payment, but does not include a billiard-room in premises licensed under the Licensing Act, 1908, or in a club. 2. No public billiard-room shall be used for the playing of any game of billiards, or any similar game, for reward

of any game of billiards, or any similar game, for reward or payment to the proprietor or manager, unless the same is licensed.

3. Licenses at a fee of one guinea for any public billiard-room may be issued by the Council to any person of good character, upon condition that the room licensed shall only be kept open between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10 p.m. on

be kept open between the hours of a s.m. and to p.m. on any week-day, and shall be kept strictly closed on Sundays. 4. No game of chance, betting, sweepstakes, wagering, lottery, or other form of gaming shall be permitted in or in connection with any public billiard-room. 5. No disorderly behaviour shall be allowed in any

5. No disorderly public billiard-room.

6. The proprietor or manager of any public billiard-room who permits upon or in connection with the licensed pre-mises any game of chance, betting, sweepstakes, wagering, lottery, or other form of gaming, or who allows any dis-orderly behaviour thereon, commits an offence, and shall upon conviction thereof be liable to a fine not exceeding £5 for guewe upon defence

for every such offence. 7. The Council may at any time, if it sees fit, cancel the license of such room where it is satisfied there has been a breach of this by-law.

NO. 9 BY-LAW .--- MOTOR-CARS.

Whereas the Chairman, Councillors, and Inhabitants of the County of Akitio, a local authority within the meaning of the Motor Regulation Act, 1908, is satisfied that the use of motor cars upon all roads in the County of Akitio of width of not more than 66 ft., with a road-formation of not more than 30 ft. in width, and upon all bridges would

not more than 30 ft. in width, and upon all bridges would be attended with risk or danger to the public :---1. No motor-car shall be driven on any road at a greater rate of speed than five miles per hour on any portion of such road where the driver cannot see the whole roadway for at least one hundred yards ahead of his car. 2. Every driver of a motor-car meeting any vehicle or horseman on any road, if the driver of such vehicle or such horseman so approaching shall hold up his hand, shall at once stop his motor-car, to enable such vehicle or horse

at once stop his motor-car, to enable such vehicle or horse-

at once stop his hotor-car, to enable such vehicle of hotor man to pass the motor-car.
3. No driver of any motor-car shall attempt to cross any bridge upon any road when any vehicle or horseman is upon or within twenty yards of such bridge.
4. For the purpose of this by-law the word "owner" shall include as well as the true owner the person for the

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time being having the custody, control, and use of the motor-car, and the word "driver" shall mean the person having the actual control, conduct, and charge of any

motor-car upon any road. 5. The "owner" of any motor-car who shall not observe the requirements of or do anything prohibited by this by-law commits an offence, and shall upon conviction thereof be liable to a fine not exceeding £5 for every such

No. 10 BY-LAW .--- AGAINST OFFENCES ON ROADS AND PUBLIC PLACES

Any person guilty of any of the following offences, omissions, or neglects within the County of Akitio, or offending against any of the following by-laws numbered 1 to 34, both inclusive, shall, in all cases where no special penalty is imposed by any particular by-law for any par-ticular offence, omission, or neglect, be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5 for each separate offence :---1. Breaking in any hores or other animal woon any road

1. Breaking-in any horse or other animal upon any road or in any public place, or by locking the wheels of any cart or other vehicle, or otherwise testing or trying any horse or other animal so as to obstruct or injure any

13. Being in charge of any bull, stallion, or entire animal and permitting it to cover within public view.
14. Acting as driver or having the sole charge of more than one vehicle on any road, unless where two of such vehicles, and no more, are drawn each by one horse only, in which case the horse of the hinder of such vehicles shall be attached by a sufficient halter to the back of the foremost of such vehicles. most of such vehicles.

most of such vehicles. 15. Placing any hoarding, scaffolding, timber, bricks, stone, or other building material upon any road, footpath, or public place without the permission of the Council. 16. Opening any drain or sewer or removing the surface of any road or footpath without the permission of the Council. 17. Naclesting, the share

17. Neglecting to clean any private yard, way, or passage by which neglect a nuisance by offensive smell or otherwise is caused.

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18. Riding or travelling on a bicycle or other similar wehicle on any footpath.

¹ 19. Keeping or maintaining any pigsty within 2 chains of any road or of any private or public dwelling or place of business.

20. Taking any engine, agricultural or other machine or implement, or drawing or trailing any sledge, timber, or other thing or material upon any road or footpath, bridge, or culvert to the injury of such road, bridge, or culvert.

21. Carting any nightsoil or other offensive matter on any public road without the permission of the Council in writing so to do.

22. Allowing nightsoil or other offensive matter to be spilt or otherwise cast upon any road, footpath, or public place.

23. Taking across any bridge or culvert in any public road any engine, agricultural or other machine or imple-ment, or any cart, wagon, dray, or other vehicle which, whether unloaded (together with the load therein), shall exceed 8 tons in weight, without the permission in writing of the Council of the Council.

of the Council. 24. Taking any engine, agricultural or other machine or implement, or drawing or trailing any sledge, timber, or other material or thing across any bridge in any public road to the injury of such bridge. Any person committing any breach of this by-law shall, in addition to the after-mentioned penalty, pay to the Council such sum, by way of compensation for damage, as the Justice adjudicating upon the information shall on the hearing thereof order.

25. Laying out or opening any road or footpath and mitting to take such precautions for guarding against injury to passengers along such road as may be necessary, or as may be directed by the Council or County Ranger or County Engineer.

26. Making or leaving any hole, excavation, or danger-ous formation in or near any road or public place without fencing or enclosing the same, or without keeping a light burning at or upon such hole, excavation, or formation between sunset and sunrise.

27. Removing any gravel, soil, or material from any road without the permission of the Council in writing.

28. Neglecting or omitting to keep in good repair any rail, gate, fence, or cover, or about any area or cellar or other place upon or adjoining any road, or keeping open for more than a reasonable time for taking in or out any articles any entrance to any area, cellar, or other place as aforesid sforesaid.

410resaid. 29. Leading, driving, or riding any horse or other animal, or driving or wheeling any carriage, cart, or other wehicle upon, along, or across any footway or any water-channel or gutter by the side of any road, except at a crossing. Any person committing any breach of this by-law shall, in addition to the before-mentioned penalty, pay to the Council such sum, by way of compensation for damage as the Justice adjudicating upon the information damage, as the Justice adjudicating upon the information shall on the hearing thereof order.

• 30. Allowing any horses, sheep, pigs, goats, or cattle belonging to him, or under his charge, to be at large in any road or public place.

31. Tethering or otherwise placing any horses, sheep, poats, pigs, or cattle upon any road or public place for the purpose of depasturing or grazing.

32. Driving any horse or vehicle so as to cause any injury to any person or property whatsoever by negligence, or by driving on the wrong side of the road, or by being away from any horse or cattle so as to be unable to have the full control of them.

33. Any person driving any vehicle whatsoever, or riding any animal, or meeting any other vehicle or animal, shall keep on the left or near side of the road, and when passing or being passed by any vehicle or animal going in the same direction shall pass or allow any person desirous of doing so to pass, when practicable, on the right or off side of the road; except as in the next by-law provided.
34. Any person leading any horse or other animal, or in charge of any led horse or other animal, when passing any person, animal, or vehicle, shall intervene his person between the horse or other animal led by him and the person, animal, or vehicle which he shall be passing.

MOTOR BY-LAW (No. 13).

IN pursuance of the powers, provisions, and authorities contained in the Counties Act, 1908, the Public Works Act, 1908, and the Motor Regulation Act, 1908, or any amendment thereof respectively, and of all other enabling powers, provisions, and authorities contained in any other Acts or otherwise vested in it, the Lake County Council hereby makes, by way of special order, the follow-ing by-law for Lake County, that is to say :---1. In this by-law "motor" shall have the meaning assigned to the word "motor" by section 2 of the Motor Regulation Act, 1908, and shall include a motor-car, a motor-cycle, or any other similar vehicle propelled by motor-power. "Motor-car" means any motor having not less than four wheels.

"Motor-power. "Motor-car" means any motor having not less than four wheels. "Road" means any highway, road, street, thoroughfare under the care, control, or management of the Lake County Council, or any road within Lake County as to which the Lake County Council has by law authority to make this by-law, or as to which the same is capable of operating; and, unless repugnant to the context, includes a bridge forming part of such road. "Bridge" or "culvert" means any bridge or culvert respectively under the care, control, or management of the Lake County Council, or any bridge or culvert within Lake County Council, or any bridge or culvert within Lake County as to which the said Lake County Council has by law authority to make this by-law, or as to which the same is capable of operating. "Vehicle" means and includes every coach, carriage, omnibus, drag, cab, cart, dray, wagon, timber, carriage, lorry, van, express-wagon, and any other conveyance what-ever its construction, drawn by or harnessed to an animal or animals.

birly, van, express-wagon, and any other conveyance whatever its construction, drawn by or harnessed to an animal or animals.
"Disc" means a metal disc painted red on one side and white on the other, 18 in. at least in diameter, and fixed by authority of the Lake County Council in a conspicuous position above the level and on the side of the road.
"The Council" means the Lake County Council.
No person shall drive or operate a motor, or cause or permit the use of a motor, upon any of the several places within Lake County Council mentioned in the Schedule hereto, the Lake County Council being satisfied that the use of motors upon any of the said places would be attended with risk of danger to the public.
No person shall drive or operate, or attempt to drive or operate, a motor on a road unless he is a person competent to drive or operate the same, and competent to control and direct its use and movement.
No driver or person in charge of a motor while on a

control and direct its use and movement. 4. No driver or person in charge of a motor while on a road shall cause or permit or allow such motor to be driven or operated, or to remain or stand, on a road or bridge or culvert so as to obstruct or interfere with the traffic thereon. 5. No owner, bailee, or person in charge of a motor shall permit any person to drive or operate, or attempt to drive or operate, such motor on a road unless such last-mentioned person is competent to drive or operate. the same. same

same. 6. No person driving or in charge of a motor-car when on a road shall quit such car without having taken due precaution against its starting or being started in his absence.

absence.
7. No person driving or in charge of a motor-car when on a road shall cause such motor-car to travel backward for a greater distance or time than shall be requisite for the purpose of safety.
8. The person in charge of a motor on any road shall, when within a reasonable distance from and before over-taking any person in sight on foot, and when within a reasonable distance from and before meeting or overtaking any person in a vehicle or motor, or on horseback, or leading or driving a horse or other animal in sight, give

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audible and sufficient warning of the approach or position of the motor by sounding the bell, horn, or other instru-ment which he is by law required to carry attached thereto.

thereto. 9. When a motor is being driven or propelled on any road, if owing to a bend, corner, or crossing, or junction in such road or for any similar cause, it becomes impos-sible for the driver or person in charge of such motor to have an uninterrupted view of the traffic on such road, or on any road junctioning therewith, for at least 50 yards ahead, such driver or person in charge shall reduce speed to six miles an hour, and by sounding a bell, motor, horn, or other instrument give audible and sufficient warning of the approach of such motor. 10. If the driver, rider, or person in charge of any motor on a road is about to turn off such road he shall, when reasonably necessary, signify his intention so to do by signalling with his hand to any motor, vehicle, or horseman following or approaching such first-mentioned motor.

motor. 11. The person driving or in charge of a motor on any road shall, on the request of any person driving, riding, or having charge of a restive horse on such road, or on such person holding up his hand as a signal for that purpose, cause such motor to stop and remain stationary, and shall cause the engine thereof to stop and remain silent as long as shall be reasonable to enable such person to pass the motor with the vehicle or horse he is driving, riding, or in charge of.

the motor with the vehicle or horse he is driving, riding, or in charge of. 12. If a motor has been stopped pursuant to the preced-ing section, or from any cause is stationary on the road, the person in charge of such motor, on the request of any person driving, riding, or having charge of a restive horse about to pass such motor, shall cause the engine of the said motor to stop and remain silent so long as shall be necessary to enable such person to pass the motor with the vehicle or horse he is riding, driving, or in charge of; and shall, if requested by such person, render any reasonable assistance that may be necessary to enable such person to pass such motor safely. 13. When a motor is being driven or ridden on a road constructed in a side cutting with an embankment, or on a road having a fall on one side, or on a road bounded by or near to a river or stream, the driver or person in charge of such motor shall, notwithstanding any rule of the road to the contrary, when meeting or passing any person riding, leading, or driving any horse or other animal, or driving any vehicle, drive such motor on the side of the said road towards the embankment, fall, river, or stream, and shall by signalling or otherwise warn any such person as to the side of the road on which he is about to drive such motor. 14. Subject to the preceding section hereof, the driver, rider, or person in charge of a motor on any road shall.

Subject to the preceding section hereof, the driver, rider, or person in charge of a motor on any road shall, when meeting any vehicle or animal, keep to the left or near side of the road; and when overfaking or being overtaken by any vehicle or animal shall, subject as afore-said, pass or allow any person desirous of doing so to pass when practicable on the right or off side of the road. 15. The driver, rider, or person in charge of any motor on any road shall, when meeting or overtaking any horses, cattle, sheep, or pigs being driven along a road, slow down the motor to a speed not exceeding six miles an hour, or on the person in charge of or driving such horses, cattle, sheep, or pigs and approaching any motor holding up his hand as a signal for that purpose, shall stop the motor and the engine, and shall cause the engine to remain silent till such horses, cattle, sheep, or pigs shall have passed the motor. 16. No driver, rider, or person in charge of any motor wheal meets or other to may any vehicle horse or other

pigs small have passed the motor. 16. No driver, rider, or person in charge of any motor shall pass or attempt to pass any vehicle, horse, or other animal in charge of any person while such vehicle, horse, or other animal is on a culvert or bridge or dangerous part of a road.

No driver, rider, or person in charge of any motor shall enter upon any bridge whilst any vehicle or person riding, leading, or driving a horse, or any horses, cattle, sheep, or pigs, are on such bridge, and coming towards such driver, rider, or person in charge of such motor, or while such vehicle or person or any of the horses, cattle, sheep, or pigs led or driven by such person is within such a distance on the further side of the bridge as to be likely to meet the motor on the bridge. If any such driver, rider, or person in charge shall meet any vehicle or person or animal as aforesaid on any bridge he shall back or remove the motor clear of such bridge until such vehicle, person, or animal shall have passed. 18. Every road crossed on the level by a Government railway is deemed and is hereby declared by the Council to be dangerous for the use of motors for a distance of 50 yards on each side of such railway. 19. If at any time the Council is satisfied that the use of motors upon any bridge, road, or part of a road would

be attended with risk of damage to the bridge or danger to the public, it may by resolution declare such bridge, road, or part of a road to be dangerous for the use of

motors. 20. Every bridge, road, or part of a road or railway-crossing hereby or hereafter declared by the Council to be dangerous shall be indicated by discs placed at either extremity of such bridge, road, part of a road, or rail-way-crossing, the white side of each disc facing towards the bridge, road, part of a road, or railway-crossing where the danger is deemed to be; and beside each disc there shall also be placed a sign-post having clearly and conspicuously painted thereon, so as to be legible to a person travelling along the road towards the dangerous part, the words "To Motorists. Speed not to exceed 6 miles an hour." 21. Every driver, rider, or person in charge of a motor

part, the words "To Motorists. Speed not to exceed 6 miles an hour." 21. Every driver, rider, or person in charge of a motor on a road shall, when approaching a disc coming towards the red side thereof, if such disc is visible or its exist-ence known to such driver, rider, or person, slow down the motor to a speed not exceeding six miles an hour when passing the disc, and shall not exceed that speed until passing another disc coming towards the white side thereof, or, in the case of a level crossing, until after passing over the railway. 22. No person shall drive, propel, or take, or cause to be driven, propelled, or taken, any motor across any bridge at a greater speed than six miles an hour. 23. No motor-car shall be driven or operated on any road unless such motor-car is fitted with at least two efficient brakes, and no motor not being a motor-car shall be so driven or operated unless such motor is fitted with at least one efficient brake. 24. No motor shall be driven or operated on any road

one efficient brake. 24. No motor shall be driven or operated on any road unless such motor is fitted with an efficient muffler or silencer, and no such muffler or silencer shall be dis-connected from the exhaust, opened, or removed while such motor is being driven or operated within fifty yards from any horse or vehicle on any road. 25. Every person who shall commit a breach of or fail to comply with any of the provisions of this by-law shall for every such breach or failure be deemed to be guilty of an offence, and for every such offence shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5. 26. By-law "No. 12, Motors," made by the Lake County Council, which came into force on the 9th day of July, 1907, shall be and the same is hereby repealed. 27. This by-law shall apply to the whole of the Lake County, and shall come into force on the 28th day of August, 1912.

SCHEDULE.

1. The portion of the Queenstown to Cromwell main oad (known as the Frankton Road) within Lake County, extending from the boundary of the Queenstown Borough (Suburb Street) to the south-west corner of Section 29,

(Suburb Street) to the south-west corner of Section 29, Block XXI, Shotover Survey District, near the Frankton Jetty, comprising a distance measured along the said road of 2 miles and 20 chains, or thereabouts.
2. The portion of the Queenstown to Skippers main road commencing at the junction near Arthur's Point of the Skippers Road with the road from Queenstown to Arrowtown, and extending to and terminating at Skippers, comprising a distance measured along the said road of fifteen miles, or thereabouts.
3. The portion of the Arrowtown to Skippers main road known as the Dan O'Connell Road, being the portion of the said road extending from the homestead at the foot of Coronet Peak Station to the junction of the said road

one said road extending from the homestead at the foot of Coronet Peak Station to the junction of the said road with the Queenstown to Skippers main road, a distance measured along the said road of four miles, or thereabouts. 4. So much of the main road from Arrowtown to Mace-town as lies within Lake County.

town as lies within Lake County. 5. That portion of the road from Arrowtown to Crown Terrace, in Lake County, known as "Tobin's Track," commencing at the west side of the Arrow River (within Lake County) about opposite to Section 36, Block I, Town of Arrowtown, and near the small foot-bridge across the Arrow River (which road passes through the south-west corner of Section 22, Block X, Shotover Survey District), and terminating at the north-west corner of Section 9, Block X, Shotover Survey District (the top of the hill). The terminal points of each of the said portions of road will be indicated by sign-posts having clearly and con-spicuously painted thereon the words "Prohibited for Motors by the Lake County Council."
