Amending Regulations governing the Grading and Export of New Zealand Hemp.—Notice No. 1684.

LIVERPOOL, Governor.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this thirteenth day of January, 1913.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Products Export Act, 1908, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the

said Dominion, doth hereby make the following regulations; and doth also declare that the said regulations shall come into force on the date of publication hereof in the *New Zealand Gazette*.

REGULATIONS.

1. THESE regulations shall be read together with and be deemed part of the regulations (relating to the grading and export of hemp) made under the Products Export Act, 1908, (hereinafter termed "the general regulations") by Order in Council on the 21st day of December, 1908, and published in the *Gazette* of 23rd December, 1908.

2. The definition in the general regulations of the term "grade," as applied to stripper-slips, is hereby revoked.

3. All stripper-slips for export shall be packed in bales approximately of the following dimensions and weight after eaving the press:—

- Length : 4 ft. 2 in.
- Width : 2 ft. 4 in.
- Depth : Not prescribed.
- Weight : Not exceeding 3½ cwt.

The above dimensions and weight shall be in lieu of those prescribed for stripper-slips in clause 2 of the general regulations, and the said clause is hereby amended accordingly.

4. In lieu of the leather tag prescribed in paragraph (b) of clause 3 of the general regulations, tags made of strong, closely woven, light-coloured, cotton duck may be used, subject to approval of the material by the Chief Hemp Grader, which approval may be withdrawn at any time, after reasonable notice. All references in the general regulations to the leather tags shall be deemed to apply equally to the duck tags when used in lieu thereof; provided that where duck tags are used, the registered brand and the bale number shall be printed in black ink on the duck instead of being impressed.

5. The store occupied by the Shaw, Savill, and Albion Company (Limited), Kaiwarra, Wellington, is hereby appointed a grading-store for the examination and grading therein of hemp, tow, or stripper-slips.

6. Subclause (2) of clause 7 of the general regulations is hereby amended by inserting the words "or stripper-slips" after the words "hemp or tow" wherever the latter occur.

7. The following shall be substituted for clause 12 of the general regulations, which clause is hereby revoked:—

"12. (i.) In grading stripper-slips, the following will be the maximum points for allotment:—

"For freedom from dirt or rubbish ..	50 points.
"For colour	25 "
"For strength	25 "
"Total	100 points.

(ii.) The following will be the standards on which the grades of stripper-slips will be determined:—

- "No. 1 Grade: 75 to 100 points, both inclusive.
- "No. 2 Grade: 50 to 74 "

(iii.) No grader's certificate as provided for in clause 15 of the general regulations shall be issued in respect of any stripper-slips scoring less than 50 points."

8. Clause 15 of the general regulations is hereby amended by deleting the words "in the case of hemp or tow," and the words "and in the case of stripper-slips, sign and deliver to the owner a grader's certificate as provided for in clause 12 hereof"; and also by inserting, after the words "the second schedule hereto," the following words: "provided that, in the case of stripper-slips, the total points awarded need not be shown in the grader's certificate."

9. Clause 19 of the general regulations is hereby amended by inserting, after the words "immediately shipping it," the words "for export beyond New Zealand."

10. Diagram No. 4 of the First Schedule of the general regulations is hereby amended by substituting for the specimen grade-stamp for stripper-slips the following specimen grade-stamps:—

For No. 1 grade stripper-slips:	N.Z. GOVT. STRIPPER-SLIPS. No. 1 GRADE.
For No. 2 grade stripper-slips:	N.Z. GOVT. STRIPPER-SLIPS. No. 2 GRADE.

11. If after any hemp, tow, or stripper-slips has been graded and a certificate issued, such hemp, tow, or stripper-slips are

damaged by fire or water, or through any other cause, the owner shall, if the certificate issued in respect of such hemp, tow, or stripper-slips is still in his possession, forthwith surrender the certificate to the grader; and whether the certificate is or is not surrendered, such hemp, tow, or stripper-slips shall not be shipped from New Zealand without being regraded and a new certificate issued as hereinafter provided.

Such hemp, tow, or stripper-slips may be reconditioned and submitted again for grading; provided that in such case the owner shall, when giving the grader the written particulars prescribed by the general regulations, state on the form of advice that the hemp, tow, or stripper-slips have been so reconditioned; provided also that the grader shall, when issuing a certificate for such hemp, tow, or stripper-slips, indorse on the certificate a statement that the fibre has been reconditioned.

4. The said poll shall be taken as nearly as may be in the manner provided by the Local Elections and Polls Act, 1908, and the Returning Officer hereby appointed shall be deemed to be a Returning Officer appointed for the purposes of the said Act.

Regulations under the Prisons Act, 1908.

LIVERPOOL. Governor.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS it is enacted by section eight of the Prisons Act, 1908 (hereinafter referred to as the said Act) that the Governor may from time to time by Proclamation make regulations prescribing:—

- (a.) The duties of the officers of prisons;
- (b.) The construction and description of cells for separate confinement or punishment of persons confined in prisons, and the certifying the same as fit for the purpose;
- (c.) The safe custody, the classification, hours of labour, mode of employment, separation, diet, instruction, treatment, and correction of the prisoners confined in prisons;
- (d.) The employment, safe custody, management, and discipline of prisoners under sentence of penal servitude or of imprisonment for a term of three years or upwards;
- (e.) What labour or employment shall be deemed hard labour, and for classifying such labour;
- (f.) The remission of portions of sentences by marks to be earned by the good conduct of the prisoners;
- (g.) Any other purpose or object for which by the said Act it is provided that regulations, either general or special, may be made;
- (h.) Generally all such regulations as are necessary for the good management and government of such prisons, and the discipline and safe custody of the prisoners therein, and not only while therein, but also while employed at labour beyond the limits of the prison:

Now, therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the powers so conferred upon me by the said section, and of all other powers enabling me in that behalf, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby revoke, as from the first day of February, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, the following regulations, namely:—

- (a.) Regulations made under the Prisons Act, 1882, and published in the *Gazette* of the twenty-ninth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, at page 1681; and
- (b.) Regulations made under the Prisons Act, 1882, and published in the *Gazette* of the twenty-ninth day of March, one thousand nine hundred, at page 633,—

and do hereby make in lieu thereof the regulations hereinafter set forth, and do hereby declare that the said regulations shall come into force on the said first day of February, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen.

REGULATIONS.

INTERPRETATION.

1. IN these regulations—

- “Minister” means the Minister of Justice.
- “Under-Secretary” means the Under-Secretary for Justice, Wellington.
- “Inspector” means the Inspector of Prisons appointed under the said Act.
- “Deputy Inspector” means the Deputy Inspector of Prisons appointed under the Prisons Amendment Act, 1912.
- “Medical Officer” of any prison means the surgeon appointed to that prison under section 5 of the said Act.

APPLICATION.

2. If it appears to the Minister that the provisions of these regulations are not wholly applicable to any particular prison he may, in their application to the said prison, make such modifications thereof as he thinks fit.

ADMINISTRATIVE.

Inspector.

3. The Inspector shall from time to time visit the different prisons of the Dominion, and shall endeavour to ensure by personal inspection that the rules and regulations are duly enforced and that the discipline of the prisons is properly maintained.

4. He shall make inquiry into any matter relating to the conduct of any prison or the administration of the said Act that may from time to time be specially referred to him by the Minister.

5. He shall, subject to the confirmation of the Minister, have power to suspend, fine, or stop the pay of any officer of the prison service; and any departmental orders he may issue shall be strictly carried out.

6. He shall from time to time inspect the stores, and shall ascertain that the rations, clothing, and utensils are of good quality and fit for the purposes for which they are severally required.

7. He shall inspect the books and accounts of each prison, and shall be responsible that they are properly and efficiently kept.

8. He shall have access to all parts of the prison, and shall from time to time visit the works where prisoners may be employed, and shall see that suitable employment is given to the prisoners and that the marks are fairly allotted.

9. All orders and instructions given by the Inspector shall be entered in the Inspector's Order Book and signed by him; and he shall on any subsequent visit of inspection see that all such orders or instructions have been duly carried out or given effect to.

10. All prison books shall be submitted to the Inspector on his visits of inspection.

Deputy Inspector.

11. The Deputy Inspector shall from time to time, when directed so to do by the Minister or otherwise in the course of his official duties, visit the several prisons of the Dominion; and shall, when so engaged or employed, have all the powers and duties of the Inspector in respect of any such prison.

Prison Officers and their Duties.

12. It shall be the first duty of all officers to make themselves thoroughly acquainted with these regulations and with the general orders, and by the exercise of zeal, attention, care, and example to secure the successful and exact operation of the said regulations and orders.

13. Every officer shall constantly bear in mind that discipline is the purpose of the prison and of his employment therein. He must study, according to his grade, not only to enforce, but himself to observe it in the smallest detail, understanding that by failing to enforce submission to the authority with which he is intrusted he will prove himself to be incompetent in the performance of his duty. He should carry out the exercise of that authority with firmness, accompanied by good temper and humanity; although determination and force must sometimes be necessary, violence or harshness must never be resorted to.

14. He shall render in his turn the same implicit obedience that he is required to exact.

15. He shall not question the order of a superior, but must obey first, and, if he thinks himself warranted in doing so, may remonstrate afterwards.

16. He shall treat his superior officers with deference and respect, and his subordinates with courtesy.

17. All subordinate officers shall obey the instructions of and perform such duties as may from time to time be directed by the Gaoler.

18. Officers shall observe the strictest punctuality in their hours of attendance, and hold themselves always in readiness for any extra or special duty that may be required of them.

19. Subordinate officers shall not be absent from the prison without leave from the Gaoler; and before absenting themselves such officers shall leave their keys, instruction-book, and report-book in the Gaoler's office.

20. If any officer is by reason of sickness unable to attend to his duty, he shall at once send word to the Gaoler, and shall also as soon as possible forward to the Gaoler a medical certificate as to his state of health, signed by the Medical Officer.

21. Officers on duty shall wear the uniform of their particular grade, and must at all times be cleanly and smart in their appearance.

22. Officers must not frequent nor loiter about publichouses, nor may they associate or communicate in any way with any relative or friend of a prisoner, nor with discharged prisoners; and all communications from any such person to an officer must be delivered to the Gaoler forthwith.

23. Intemperance, immorality, or improper language, whether within or without the precincts of the prison, will not be tolerated, and will render an officer liable to dismissal.

24. No officer shall be permitted to carry on, directly or indirectly, any trade, business, or calling in addition to his prison duties.

25. No officer, nor any person employed by him or on his behalf, shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in any contract for the supply to the prison of any provisions or other articles for use therein.

26. No officer shall at any time receive any money, fee, gratuity, or reward of any kind other than his salary for any service for or on behalf of any prisoner, or on any other account.

27. No officer shall purchase any prison-made article, or have any work done for him by any prisoner.

28. No officer shall use for his own purposes any Government material or property, however trifling in value it may be.

29. Officers must not hold communication of any kind with prisoners, except as may be required by their duty.

30. It is the duty of all officers to treat prisoners with kindness and humanity, to listen patiently to and report their complaints and grievances, at the same time being firm in maintaining order and discipline and enforcing complete observance of the rules and regulations of the prison. The great object of reclaiming the criminal should always be kept in view by all officers, and they should strive to acquire a moral influence over the prisoners, by performing their duties conscientiously and without harshness. They should especially try to raise the prisoners' minds to a proper feeling of moral obligation, by the example of their own uniform regard for truth and integrity.

31. An officer shall not strike a prisoner unless compelled to do so in the interests of self-defence. In any case in which the application of force is needful, no more force than is necessary shall be used.

32. Officers shall exercise the utmost care and vigilance in the custody and surveillance of the prisoners under their charge; and no warder shall part with the custody of a prisoner otherwise than in accordance with orders, or by handing him over to another officer, the safe custody of prisoners being of paramount importance.

33. It is the duty of every officer to inform the Gaoler of any prisoner who appears to be out of health, although he may not complain, or whose state of mind appears to be deserving of especial notice and care, in order that the opinion and instructions of the Medical Officer may be obtained.

34. All officers shall, without delay, inform the Gaoler of any prisoner who desires to see him, or to make any complaint, or to prefer any request to him or to any superior authority, or who desires to see the Medical Officer.

35. No officer shall leave his post except by permission or until relieved.

36. Subordinate officers shall not be permitted to receive visitors within the prison, except by permission of the Gaoler duly noted in his journal.

37. No private person (including the members of officers' families) shall have access to an officer on duty.

38. All officers shall attend such drills and shooting exercises as may be ordered by the Inspector, and shall be expected to acquire proficiency therein.

39. In all cases of emergency and in unforeseen circumstances, officers are expected to act with discretion, promptitude, and intelligence.

40. No officer shall communicate beyond the prison occurrences that may take place therein, nor shall he, except in the performance of his official duties, in any way disclose the identity of discharged prisoners.

41. No officer shall use tobacco or fermented or spirituous liquors within the prison, except under such restrictions as to time and place as may be specified by the Gaoler and approved by the Inspector.

42. Officers shall report any breach of the regulations or orders, or any irregularity that may occur. Such reports must be in writing and submitted to the Gaoler within twenty-four hours after the occasion of such breach or irregularity. Unless the matter is within his own authority, the Gaoler shall immediately forward the report to the Under-Secretary.

43. An officer shall not fail on any pretence whatever, through favour or mistaken notions of kindness, to make an immediate report to the Gaoler, or officer in charge, of any misconduct or wilful disobedience of orders.

44. Any misconduct of officers is to be recorded by the Gaoler, and brought under the notice of a Visiting Justice or the Inspector without delay; and in all investigations into the conduct of officers by the Visiting Justice or the Inspector the evidence is to be taken down in writing and signed by the persons giving such evidence.

45. For each officer there shall be a defaulters sheet, on which shall be recorded all instances wherein he may have been punished or reprimanded for misconduct.

46. Officers permitting their official conduct to be influenced by sectarian feelings shall, on sufficient evidence thereof, be forthwith dismissed from the service.

47. Any proceeding on the part of officers in the nature of or tending to a combination for any object connected with their duties or position, or with charges against a superior, taken without the knowledge and sanction of the officer in charge, is strictly forbidden. But the officer in charge will forward any representation made in writing, and duly signed by the officers, or any of them, respecting their duties or position, to the Under-Secretary.

48. For unfitness, disobedience, failure in duty, neglect, breach of regulations or orders or permitting the breach thereof, or for any sufficient misconduct, officers shall be subject to such penalties and punishments by way of fine, stoppage of pay, or suspension as the Inspector may direct, subject to the confirmation of the Minister.

49. Every officer who is suspended from duty for misconduct shall immediately give up his keys, and quit the prison, but shall afterwards, until otherwise directed, attend daily at the prison at such hour as the Gaoler may appoint.

50. Any officer desiring to appeal against any decision which affects him, or wishing to bring any matter before superior authority, shall, without unnecessary delay, state his complaint in writing to the Gaoler, who shall forthwith forward the same for the consideration of the Under-Secretary.

51. Officers are warned against making frivolous or vexatious complaints, or allowing private differences to interfere with the working of the institution. An officer will be held strictly responsible for establishing any charge that he may prefer.

52. Officers communicating with the head of the Department must forward their communications through the officer in charge of the prison.

53. An officer leaving the service under circumstances other than dismissal shall, on application, be entitled to receive from the Inspector a certificate as to his services, character, and cause of retirement.

54. The control of the prison, or of a particular post or body of officers, devolves upon the superior or senior officer present, unless otherwise directed, and he shall be held responsible therefor.

55. No ingress or egress shall be allowed into or out of the prison between the hours of 10 o'clock p.m. and 5 o'clock a.m., except to the Gaoler, or in such special cases as shall be entered in the Gaoler's journal.

The Gaoler.

56. The Gaoler is charged with the control and management of the prison; with the order, discipline, and regularity of the institution; with the safe custody of the prisoners, journals, registers, books, warrants, and other documents; with all the Government property confided to his care. All such journals and other documents must be produced for inspection by the Inspector at each of his visits.

57. He shall strictly conform to the provisions of the said Act and of these regulations, and carry out the orders issued for his instruction. He shall also be held responsible for the due observance of the said Act and regulations by other persons under his control.

58. He shall reside in the house assigned to him, and shall not be absent therefrom by night without the permission of the Under-Secretary or a Visiting Justice.

59. He shall not be concerned in any business or employment other than the duties of his office, without the sanction of the Minister.

60. He shall take every precaution to prevent the escape of prisoners, and shall assure himself that his officers are fully instructed in this and in all other of their duties, and that they perform them with diligence and competency.

61. He shall cause a copy of these regulations or an authorized abstract thereof, and a copy of the sections of the said Act, relating to the treatment of prisoners, together with a copy of the prison dietaries, to be posted in each ward, and shall cause the same to be read, within twenty-four hours after his admission, to every prisoner who cannot read. He shall take an early opportunity of seeing all prisoners after their admission, and shall satisfy himself that they understand the rules and regulations to which they must conform, the privileges that they may gain by industry and good conduct, and also the consequences of idleness or misconduct.

62. He shall daily visit every cell and apartment of the prison and see every prisoner therein. As far as possible, he shall see every prisoner daily. He shall visit, at uncertain hours, all the working-parties, and record in his journal the hours of such visits, noting and describing any dereliction of duty, breach of discipline, or want of order that may come under his notice. At least once a week, and at uncertain hours, he shall go through the whole prison at night, stating in his journal the date and hour of such visit and the condition of the prison at the time. In default of any such visits he shall record the omission in his journal, and state the extent and cause thereof. When visiting the female division, he shall always be accompanied by the Matron or by the female officer in charge.

63. He shall assure himself that all gates are locked at the proper times, and that the keys are kept in the authorized place or in the possession of the authorized officers, and he shall not allow any key to be taken outside of the prison-gate.

64. He shall require reports to be made to him accounting for all prisoners in his custody, night and morning, at the closing and opening of the prison respectively, at such hours as they go and return from labour, and at such other times as may be necessary.

65. He shall see that the officers attend the drills and shooting exercises ordered by the Inspector, and that the arms are kept ready for immediate and effective use.

66. He shall have power to suspend any subordinate officer for any act or neglect for which he may be dismissed, and in such case shall report particulars without delay to a Visiting Justice and to the Under-Secretary.

67. He shall pay attention to the lighting, ventilating, drainage, and sanitary systems of the gaol, and take such measures as may be necessary for their being maintained in good order. Any imperfection or defect in these systems which he cannot himself remedy he shall forthwith report to the Under-Secretary.

68. He shall inspect the armoury and test the effectiveness of all weapons at least once a month.

69. All prisoners must have ready access to him, and he shall hear their cases or complaints with patience, and shall especially see that all prisoners are treated with the strictest impartiality.

70. He shall not place any apparently insane prisoner or any prisoner undergoing medical treatment under mechanical restraint without the concurrence of the Medical Officer. In any case of emergency, however, the Gaoler shall act according to his discretion, reporting his action to the Medical Officer and to the Under-Secretary without delay.

71. In cases of absolute necessity he may put a prisoner in irons as a restraint, but not as a punishment. If he considers it necessary to keep a prisoner in irons or under mechanical restraint for a longer period than twenty-four hours, he shall apply to a Visiting Justice, who may, by an order in writing, direct a prisoner to be kept in irons for such period as he thinks necessary, and this order shall be kept by the Gaoler as his warrant. This provision shall also apply in the case of a prisoner undergoing separate treatment.

72. He shall report to the Under-Secretary promptly upon all cases of prisoners undergoing punishment or mechanical restraint, or separate treatment, or who may be sick, or who have met with accidents, or who may be transferred to or from another prison.

73. He shall give immediate notice of the death of any prisoner to the Coroner and to one of the Visiting Justices, and shall also send notice, by telegram, to the Under-Secretary and, where practicable, to the nearest relative of the deceased.

74. He shall without delay call the attention of the Medical Officer to any prisoner whose state of mind or body appears to require attention, and shall carry into effect the written directions of the Medical Officer respecting alterations of the discipline or treatment of any such prisoner.

75. He shall deliver to the Medical Officer at every visit a list of the names of all prisoners who complain of illness, or who are in the prison hospital, or confined to their cells by illness, or are confined in separate or punishment cells.

76. He shall take such means as will effectually prevent any prisoner suffering from an infectious or contagious disease from communicating such disease to others.

77. He shall not be absent from the prison for more than six hours of any day without the permission of a Visiting Justice or the Inspector, and, before leaving the prison on any occasion, shall give the control thereof to the Chief Warder or next senior officer. Should he require to be absent for a longer period than six hours in any day, or for a night, or be unable through sickness to perform his duties, he shall make over charge to the next senior officer and telegraph to the Under-Secretary for instructions. He shall record any leave or unusual absence in his journal, together with the name of the person granting such leave.

78. He shall freely and confidentially communicate with the Under-Secretary all matters relating to the prison, and shall notify him of any matter of importance. In case of any emergency not sufficiently provided for in the regulations he shall apply to the Under-Secretary, and conform to his instructions, acting, if necessary, in the meantime to the best of his judgment according to the circumstances of the case.

79. He shall submit to the Under-Secretary, as soon as possible after the 31st December in each year, a report in writing specifying, with reference to the year ended on that date, the conduct of the subordinate officers; the number of prisoners admitted to his custody and their disposal; the conduct of the prisoners and the number and nature of punishments and restraints imposed upon them; the number of escapes or attempted escapes; the labour in which the prisoners have been employed; the particulars of their labour and the value thereof; the state and condition of the buildings, fences, and other property connected with the prison; the repairs or alterations which have been made in the prison buildings; and such other particulars as may be directed.

80. He shall have constant regard for the economical administration of the prison, and shall propose any method of reducing the expenditure which may seem to him practicable.

81. He may at any time offer any suggestion for the improvement or for the advantage of the service, and need not necessarily reserve these matters for his annual report.

82. He shall keep, or cause to be kept, the following books, and shall lay them before the Inspector on his visits:—

Admission register—Containing the names and descriptions of all prisoners received.

Diary of discharges—In which, in the case of every prisoner, there shall be entered from time to time in advance, under the date of the expiration of the sentence of any prisoner, the name of the prisoner to be discharged on such date.

Discharge-book—Containing names and particulars of all prisoners discharged daily.

Journal—In which he must personally enter from day to day the number of prisoners received and discharged, and the total number sleeping in the prison each night. He must also record therein any occurrence of importance, and any departure from the rules and regulations, and the particulars and cause thereof. He shall also set forth the periods of his absence from the prison, the times at which he visits the different posts at night, and such other particulars as he thinks fit or as may be directed. He shall lay this book before the Inspector on each visit.

Journal, Index to.

Monthly-state book—Showing day by day during each month the number of men engaged at the various works.

Officers' report-book—In which all reports against officers shall be entered.

Official correspondence, register of—In which shall be entered particulars of all letters received, and showing what has been done with them.

Official-letter book—Containing copies of all official letters despatched.

Order-book—In which all orders and instructions are to be entered.

Prisoners' cash book—Giving an account of all money received from or on account of prisoners, and how it is disposed of, with receipts therefor.

Prisoners' interview book—In which shall be entered all applications by prisoners to see the Minister, or any departmental official, or the Gaoler, or any Visiting Justice.

Prisoners' letters received book, with index—For record of prisoners' letters received, with the names and addresses of the persons from whom received.

Prisoners' letters despatched book, with index—Record of prisoners' letters despatched, with names and addresses of persons to whom despatched.

Prisoners' property book—In which shall be entered all clothing and other property, except money, taken from prisoners; and showing how it is disposed of, and receipts therefor.

Property-return book—Containing a return of all the property of the Government in the prison.

Punishment-book—Containing a record of reports against prisoners, and how disposed of.

Requisition-book—Containing copies of all requisitions for stores, stationery, and other supplies sent in.

Stores-book—In which shall be entered all stores received and issued, and the stock on hand on the last day of each quarter.

Visitors' book—In which every visitor to the prison shall write his name.

He shall also cause to be kept an account of all prison receipts and disbursements, and such other books, records, and accounts as may from time to time be directed by the Under-Secretary.

The Chief Warder or Officer next in Charge to the Gaoler.

83. The Chief Warder or officer next in charge to the Gaoler shall, in the absence of the Gaoler, have charge of the prison, and be responsible in like manner as the Gaoler.

84. He shall reside in the quarters provided, and be specially charged with the carrying-out of the rules and instructions of the order-book.

85. He shall be present at the opening and closing of the prison, and shall conduct the musters.

86. He shall superintend the arrival and departure of the prisoners, and shall see that the searching duty is properly performed, and that all matters relating to the prisoners are properly regulated and conducted.

87. He shall exercise, under the direction of the Gaoler, a general supervision of the prison, and see that the subordinate officers perform their respective duties. He shall visit frequently all parts of the prison without notice, and see that the prisoners are orderly and industrious.

88. He shall give his constant attention to the security of the prison.

89. He shall be specially responsible for the cleanliness and smartness of the subordinate officers and for the good condition and readiness of the arms.

90. He shall parade the warders each day previous to placing them on their posts, and before dismissing them from their duty, and shall explain to any officer placed for the first time upon any post the duties of such post.

91. He shall direct the repair of any worn or damaged property brought under his notice if he has the means available for executing such repair. Otherwise he shall report the matter to the Gaoler.

The Principal Warders.

92. Principal Warders shall, according to seniority or specific direction, take general charge next after the Chief Warder. They shall, unless other arrangements are made, have the care of the prison stores, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to them.

Warders.

93. Warders shall reside as near as possible to the prison. They must be prepared to reside in the prison if required.

94. They shall frequently examine the state of the cells, bolts, locks, bedding, &c., and report upon their condition to the Gaoler.

95. They shall at all times carefully watch the prisoners in their various movements and employments; shall give necessary directions thereon; and shall use the utmost alacrity and vigilance to promote industry and to maintain order and silence among them, and to prevent the escape of any prisoner.

96. They shall carefully observe the character, habits, and industry of the prisoners under their charge, and shall carefully and impartially keep such records as may be ordered, and shall afford at all times to their superiors unreserved information on such subjects.

97. No officer shall inflict any punishment or privation of any kind upon any prisoner unless ordered so to do by the Gaoler. In cases of emergency, where waiting for instructions would tend to disorganize discipline and order, any warder may lock up a refractory prisoner, and if the circumstances demand it he may place any such prisoner in irons. He must report such action to the officer in charge forthwith.

98. Warders must not allow any familiarity on the part of a prisoner towards themselves or any other officer or servant of the prison, nor shall they on any account speak of their duties, or of any matter of discipline or prison-management, within the hearing of a prisoner.

99. It is the duty of warders to see that no tools, implements, or articles of any description are secreted by prisoners, and they shall seize all forbidden articles.

Warder on Gate Duty.

100. The warder upon gate duty shall not open the gate to any person until he has ascertained who the person seeking admission is. He shall admit no person who is not properly authorized, unless by direction of the Gaoler. He shall not allow to pass out of the prison any subordinate officer who has entered upon duty, without the sanction of the Gaoler or the officer in charge of the prison. He shall see that the visit to the prison of every person, other than an officer, is recorded.

101. He shall examine all articles carried in or out of the prison, and shall stop any person suspected of bringing prohibited articles into the prison, or of carrying out any property belonging to the prison, and shall give immediate notice thereof to the Gaoler.

Warders on Armed Duty.

102. Warders on armed duty must at all times be vigilant and alert. On no account are they to sit down or lounge about. Rifles are to be carried at slope, trail, or shoulder. Such warders shall abstain from using their arms without sufficient occasion, but must nevertheless regard it as their duty to prevent escape (either by individual attempts of prisoners or by general riot leading to such attempt), and to protect unarmed officers, and shall act accordingly. They must on all occasions be guided by their own judgment and intelligence; but any default in recognizing their proper course of duty or in acting with effect when needful will be regarded as incompetency, and the officer shall, apart from any legal penalties incurred, be liable to be dismissed.

Escort Duty.

103. Officers, when required to do so, shall perform escort duties.

104. In despatching officers upon escort the Gaoler shall decide whether they are to be armed or not.

105. Officers on escort shall not permit their prisoners to communicate with the public. They are not to drink intoxicating liquors, nor permit their prisoners to do so, and shall not enter any public-house unless upon strong necessity.

Warder Instructors.

106. The regulations and orders governing the duties of warders shall likewise govern the duties of all warder instructors and all other employees in the prisons, whether civilian or institutional.

107. It is the special duty of warder instructors to see that the prisoners are diligent at their work, and they are also to keep accurately the daily records of industry.

108. They are responsible for the amount and character of the work done, and also for the condition of all tools, machinery, implements, material, buildings, and property of which they have the charge.

109. They shall carefully instruct the prisoners in their work, and are expected to suggest any improvements or alterations that they believe will tend to promote the efficiency of the department over which they have charge or in which they are engaged.

110. They shall encourage individual industry and ingenuity on the part of the prisoners.

111. Any loss, damage, or unfitness of any property shall be immediately reported to the Chief Warder by the warder instructor having the charge of such property.

The Matron.

112. The Matron shall reside in the prison, and shall have the care and superintendence of the female division thereof. The keys of the wards, cells, and yards occupied by females shall be in her custody.

113. She shall, as far as practicable, visit and inspect every part of the prison occupied by female prisoners, and shall see every female prisoner frequently in every twenty-four hours; and in default of such daily visits and inspection shall state in her journal how far she has omitted them and the cause thereof. She shall at least once during the week go through such part of the prison at an uncertain hour of the night, which visit, with the hour and the state of such part of the prison at the time, shall be recorded in her journal.

114. She shall not be absent from the prison for a night without permission in writing from a Visiting Justice on the recommendation of the Gaoler, and her leave of absence, with the name of the Visiting Justice granting it, shall be entered in her journal.

115. In all cases before leaving the prison the Matron shall make over the keys and charge of the female department to the Assistant Matron or other female as the Gaoler may appoint when there is no Assistant Matron.

116. She shall keep a journal in which she shall record all occurrences of importance within her department, and all punishments of female prisoners. She shall submit this journal to the Gaoler daily, and to the Visiting Justices and the Inspector at their visits.

117. She shall take care that no male officer or visitor enters the division of the prison allotted to females unless accompanied by herself or some other female officer.

The Medical Officer.

118. The Medical Officer shall visit the prison once a week, and oftener if necessary, and shall see every prisoner in the course of the week.

119. He shall examine every prisoner as soon after admission as possible, and shall enter in his journal the name of the prisoner examined, a record of his state of health, what labour he is fit for, and any remarks that he may deem it expedient to add.

120. He shall enter day by day, in his journal, to be kept in the prison, an account of the state of every sick prisoner, the name of his disease, a description of the medicines and diet, and any other treatment which he may order for such prisoner.

121. He shall, once at least in every three months, inspect every part of the prison, and report to the Under-Secretary, through the Gaoler, the result of such inspection, recording any observations he may think fit to make with respect to any want of cleanliness, drainage, warmth, or ventilation, any bad quality of the provisions, any insufficiency of clothing or bedding, any deficiency in the quantity or defect in the quality of the water, or any other matter which may affect the health of the prisoners.

122. Whenever the Medical Officer has reason to believe that the mind of a prisoner is, or is likely to be, injuriously affected by the discipline or treatment he is undergoing, he shall report thereon in writing to the Gaoler, together with such directions as he may think proper. He shall call the attention of the Gaoler to any prisoner whose state of health appears to require the attendance of a minister of religion.

123. He may, if he thinks fit in any particular case, call in additional medical assistance; and no serious operation shall be performed without a previous consultation being held with another medical practitioner, except under circumstances not admitting of delay; such circumstances shall be recorded in his journal.

124. He shall forthwith on the death of any prisoner enter in his journal the following particulars, viz.: At what time the deceased was taken ill; when information of the illness was first communicated to him; the nature of the disease; when the prisoner died; and, in cases where a *post-mortem* examination is made, an account of the autopsy; together with any remarks that appear to him to be required.

125. A Medical Officer desiring leave of absence from his duties shall make application to the Minister, nominating another medical man to act for him, subject to the approval of the Minister.

126. In case of sickness or other emergency preventing him from attending when summoned, the Medical Officer shall provide a substitute.

127. He shall attend the officers of the prison in all cases of ordinary illness free of charge.

128. He shall guard against any imposition on the part of prisoners.

129. He shall keep the following books:—

A journal—In which shall be entered the name of every prisoner coming before him, together with a description of his condition and treatment prescribed;

A prescription-book—For copies of all prescriptions;

A hospital-book—Showing names and particulars of all prisoners admitted to the prison hospital, or transferred to a public hospital, with dates of admission and discharge.

130. In cases of contagious or infectious diseases the Medical Officer shall give detailed instructions for the proper isolation and treatment of the patient.

131. He shall, in the case of any prisoner in bad health, transferred from the prison either to the hospital or another prison, deliver to the Gaoler a memorandum of the particulars of the case, a copy of which the Gaoler shall immediately forward to the Under-Secretary.

132. He shall examine all prisoners prior to their removal to another prison and shall certify in his journal whether or not they are fit for removal.

133. He shall examine any prisoner before corporal punishment is inflicted, and certify whether or not such prisoner is fit to receive such punishment. The Medical Officer shall be present at every infliction of corporal punishment, and shall cause such punishment to cease if he considers that the prisoner is likely to collapse, or his punishment to cause permanent injury to his health.

134. Within twenty-four hours of the infliction of any corporal punishment at which he has been a witness, the Medical Officer shall forward to the Under-Secretary his report upon the authorized form.

135. He may employ any ameliorative treatment to a prisoner who has been flogged, twenty-four hours after such flogging has taken place, or sooner if the prisoner's state of health demands it.

ORDER-BOOK.

136. There shall be kept in each prison an order-book, in which shall be set forth all rules and instructions that may from time to time be made or authorized, providing in detail and in minor matters for the duties of the officers and the management of the prison. Once in each month the contents of any additions to the order-book shall be read to the officers, and in like manner, so far as they may be affected thereby, to the prisoners.

GENERAL RULES FOR APPOINTMENT AND PROMOTION OF OFFICERS.

137. A candidate for the position of a prison warder must be able to produce satisfactory references and fulfil the following conditions—viz., Age not less than twenty-three years nor over thirty-five years; minimum height, 5 ft. 9 in., and of proportionate build and of sound health. Candidates must furnish evidence of having passed at least the Fifth Standard or some equivalent examination. Candidates must be British subjects.

138. Application for appointment must be made by the candidate in his own handwriting on the form provided.

Probationary Warders.

139. Candidates selected for employment must pass a medical examination as to mental and bodily soundness by a Medical Officer of the Prison service.

140. Probationary warders shall be required to serve for twelve months as probationers, during which time they shall not be allowed leave of absence, and their services may be dispensed with at any time.

141. They must render implicit obedience to all rules, regulations, and general orders, and in all other respects conform to the discipline of the prison.

142. They must, during the probationary period and before being appointed to the permanent staff, pass an examination to the satisfaction of the Inspector in the following subjects:—

- (a.) Handwriting and spelling—To be tested by writing from dictation an extract from a newspaper containing not less than 50 words;
- (b.) Arithmetic—First four simple rules;
- (c.) Duties of a warder, including the writing of reports, drill, the Prisons Act, and the General Rules and Regulations;

and must receive a satisfactory report as to conduct and ability from the Gaoler of the prison to which they are attached.

Chief Warder.

143. Only Principal Warders who show conspicuous ability in the management of prisons, in the enforcement of discipline among officers and prisoners, and who are zealous and diligent in the performance of their duties shall be eligible for promotion to the rank of Chief Warder.

Principal Warders.

144. Only officers who have good records for conduct and ability shall be eligible for promotion to the rank of Principal Warders.

145. Before promotion to this rank they shall be required to pass an examination in the following subjects:—

- Arithmetic—Keeping of accounts; simple proportion.
- Handwriting and spelling—Sixth Standard requirements.
- Institutional—Prison book-keeping; writing of reports; the General Orders and Regulations; duties of posts; practical drill (if deemed necessary).

146. Criminology and Penology—The Inspector will from time to time set the necessary papers.

VISITING OFFICERS.

Visiting Justices.

147. Visiting Justices shall at all times have free access to every part of the prison and to every prisoner therein.

148. They shall report in writing to the Minister on any abuses within the prison, and in case of necessity they may suspend any officer of the prison until the decision of the Minister is known.

149. They shall also report to the Minister as to any repairs or alterations which in their opinion may be urgently required.

150. They shall forthwith report to the Minister any occurrence of an extraordinary nature, or anything that may seem to them proper to be brought under his notice.

151. They shall visit the prison frequently and at uncertain times, and shall also, on the application of the Gaoler, visit the prison at any time to hear and determine any case awaiting adjudication.

152. They shall co-operate with the Inspector in promoting the efficiency of the service, and they shall make inquiry into any matter specially referred to them by the Minister, and report their opinion thereon.

153. They shall forthwith upon the receipt of any report in writing as to the mind or body of any prisoner being likely to be injured by the discipline or treatment to which he is subjected, take the same into consideration, and shall communicate their opinion to the Minister. If the case is urgent they shall also give such directions thereon as they may deem expedient, pending the decision of the Minister.

154. They shall frequently inspect the diet of the prisoners, and if they find that the quality of any article does not comply with the terms of the contract for the supply to the prison of that article they shall report the same to the Minister, and, if necessary, take such steps as may be expedient to provide the prisoners with suitable food.

Official Visitors.

155. Visitors appointed under section 21 of the said Act (hereinafter referred to as "Official Visitors") shall from time to time visit any prison of which they may be duly appointed visitors.

156. Official Visitors shall at all times have free access to all parts of the prison, and to all prisoners confined therein.

157. Official Visitors shall not give any order or interfere with the administration of the prison. The books of the prison are to be open to their inspection.

VISITORS TO PRISONS.

158. Any person, other than a Minister of the Crown, a member of the Legislature, or a Justice of the Peace, desiring to visit any prison must first obtain an order from the Minister, the Under-Secretary, or the Inspector.

159. Except under special conditions, the visiting-hours shall be on Mondays and Fridays from 10 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. and from 1.30 p.m. to 3 p.m.

160. Not more than four persons shall be admitted in any one party, and not more than two parties shall be admitted at any one time.

160A. Every party must be accompanied by two officers, or by one officer if two are not available.

161. Prisoners are not to be pointed out to visitors, nor is any information whatsoever regarding them to be given to visitors.

162. Visitors must not in any way communicate with prisoners unless they receive the permission of the Gaoler.

163. Visitors shall be allowed to visit such parts of the prison only as are occupied by members of their own sex.

ROUTINE OF DUTIES.

164. The following time-table shows the routine to be observed at all prisons so far as the circumstances will permit, and where special regulations in particular cases do not provide to the contrary.

Week-days.

(From 1st September to 30th April.)

From 1st May to 31st August, the above time-table shall be observed with the following exceptions: Labour will cease at 4 p.m.; last lock up shall be at 4.20 p.m.

Saturday.

(Throughout the Year.)

Duties up to 12 noon: Same as other week-days.

On return of prisoners from labour after 12 noon prisoners are mustered and searched.

Officers on Short-duty, leave for the Day.

1.55 p.m.	Officers parade, keys issued, and prisoners unlocked.

GENERAL RULES AS TO THE TREATMENT AND CONDUCT OF PRISONERS.

Admission and Discharge.

165. No prisoner shall be received or discharged after 8 p.m. unless under special circumstances.

166. Prisoners upon admission shall be duly searched and all property taken from them and placed in the charge of the Gaoler, who shall cause an inventory of it to be made specifying in detail every article. Such inventory must be entered in the prisoners' property-book and be signed by the prisoner. When the property is returned to the prisoner he must sign the book as a receipt.

167. When prisoners are transferred from one prison to another their property shall be forwarded to the Gaoler of the prison to which they are so transferred, together with a complete list of it. This list shall be a certified copy of the original inventory. If there is no property, a "nil" list shall be forwarded.

168. Female prisoners shall be searched by female officers, and shall at all times be in charge of female officers. In other respects the same course shall be pursued in reference to the admission, removal, or discharge of a female prisoner as in the case of a male, the matron or principal female officer performing the duties imposed on the Gaoler in the case of a male prisoner.

169. The name, age, height, weight, features, peculiar marks, and general appearance, and the religion and alleged occupation of a prisoner shall, upon his admission, be noted in a nominal record of prisoners to be kept by the Gaoler.

170. All clothing shall be washed and disinfected before being stored. If filthy or infected it shall be destroyed upon the direction of the Medical Officer, and a memorandum of the fact shall be entered in the prisoners' property-book.

171. Prisoners may see and inspect their property one month before the date upon which they are due for discharge. They may be allowed to check it with the original inventory or a certified copy of it.

172. Every prisoner shall, as soon after admission as possible, be examined by the Medical Officer, who shall enter in his journal the name of the prisoner examined, a record of his state of health, what labour he is fit for, and any remarks that he may deem it expedient to add.

173. All prisoners shall be thoroughly washed and cleansed before being placed among the other prisoners.

174. A prisoner shall be exposed to public view as little as possible while being removed to or from prison. In order to avoid exposure while passing through the public streets, he shall, if necessary, be conveyed in a cab or closed vehicle.

175. Every prisoner shall, wherever possible, be given a separate cell, and shall be supplied with a stool, table, bed, shelf, small mirror, tooth-brush, hair-brush and comb, drinking-vessel, and night-pan.

176. Any female prisoner having a child at breast may take the child into the prison with her, to be kept at the public expense until the child is twelve months old. Before the discharge of any such child the Gaoler shall make inquiry as to whether the relatives or friends of the mother are able and willing to receive her child, and if they are both able and willing he shall commit the child to their care ; in any other case he shall report the case to the Inspector.

177. Prisoners' gratuities shall be paid according to the directions of the Under-Secretary in each case.

178. No prisoner shall be discharged from prison while suffering from an acute or dangerous illness unless or until in the opinion of the Medical Officer such discharge can be made without risk to the prisoner, or unless such prisoner requests to be discharged.

179. Any prisoner whose sentence expires on any Sunday, Christmas Day, or Good Friday shall be discharged on the day next preceding such Sunday, Christmas Day, or Good Friday.

Haircutting.

180. All male prisoners whose sentences exceed one month shall on admission have their hair cut, and it shall thereafter be kept reasonably short, but not so as to disfigure them. Such prisoners shall also

have their beards cut or close-clipped once a week. If deemed necessary, on the ground of health or cleanliness, any convicted prisoner may have his hair and beard cut no matter what the length of his sentence may be.

181. Prisoners under committal shall not have their hair or beards cut save so far as may be necessary to preserve their appearance as at the period of their examination.

182. Unless the Medical Officer otherwise orders prisoners shall be permitted to grow their hair and beard as they desire for two months before the expiration of their sentences or of the time when they may be eligible for discharge in pursuance of the regulations hereof relating to remission of sentences.

183. Under very special circumstances cutting or clipping may be dispensed with at any time on sufficient representations being made by the medical or other officer to the Inspector, and, pending his decision, the Gaoler may temporarily direct any prisoner to be exempt from the rules as to cutting or clipping.

184. Female prisoners shall not have their hair cut without their consent unless the interests of health demand it. In such case the direction of the Medical Officer shall be obtained.

Photographing.

185. Every prisoner convicted or accused of any criminal offence shall be photographed on his reception into any prison or police gaol, or at such time or times during his confinement therein as the Gaoler or other officer in charge of such prison or police gaol directs.

186. If any prisoner refuses to be photographed, or resists or impedes the officer or photographer detailed to photograph him, reasonable force may be used by the prison or police-gaol officers to compel him to submit to the taking of such photograph.

187. Any prisoner who refuses to obey this regulation after the same has been read to him by an officer of the prison or police gaol shall be deemed to be guilty of an aggravated prison offence.

188. The photographs of any accused person who is not subsequently convicted of a criminal offence and the negatives of such photographs shall be destroyed, on the receipt of a written order to that effect from the Under-Secretary or Inspector by any officer of the public service who, for the time being, has the custody of such photographs.

Finger-prints and Measurements.

189. The finger-prints of every prisoner convicted or accused of any criminal offence shall be taken in duplicate on his reception into any prison or police-gaol, or at such time or times during his confinement therein as the Gaoler or other officer in charge of such prison or police-gaol shall direct.

190. In like manner the measurements of every prisoner convicted or accused of any criminal offence shall be taken at such time as the Gaoler or other officer in charge of the prison or police-gaol in which he is confined directs.

191. If any prisoner resists or impedes the officer or officers detailed to take his finger-prints or measurements, reasonable force may be used to compel him to submit to the taking of such finger-prints or measurements.

192. Any prisoner who refuses to obey this regulation after the same has been read to him by an officer of the prison or police-gaol shall be deemed guilty of an aggravated prison offence.

193. The finger-prints of any accused person who is not subsequently convicted of a criminal offence shall, on the receipt of a written order to that effect from the Under-Secretary or Inspector, be destroyed by any officer of the public service who, for the time being, has the custody of such finger-prints.

Searching.

194. Prisoners shall be searched upon admission.

195. They shall be searched daily before proceeding to and after returning from labour.

196. Cleaners shall be liable to be searched before and after having access to cells.

197. All prisoners, whether they are under report or seeking an interview, shall be searched before being brought into the presence of the Inspector, Gaoler, Medical Officer, or other departmental official, or of any Visiting Justice or Official Visitor.

198. Prisoners shall be searched before being locked in a cell when under report or punishment.

199. Prisoners may be searched at any time when such search may appear to be expedient or necessary.

200. Two prisoners at least shall be selected daily to be completely searched.

201. No prisoner shall be present while any other prisoner is being searched, if the search involves the removal of any garment.

General Rules of Conduct.

202. Prisoners must promptly obey all orders that are given them. Any prisoner who considers himself aggrieved by such orders, must nevertheless obey, but may on the first convenient occasion thereafter complain to the Inspector, the Gaoler, or a Visiting Justice.

203. Profane swearing, indecent conversation, gambling, trafficking, damaging or defacing the walls, cells, or furniture of the prison, or otherwise destroying or injuring prison property, is strictly prohibited, and offenders shall be punished for any such offence. No scratching or marking, however slight, on the walls or furniture will be overlooked.

204. Prisoners shall not light pieces of paper, rags, or other articles, either in their cells, the yards, or any other part of the prison; and they are strictly prohibited from having in their possession any article not issued to them by the prison authorities.

205. Prisoners shall not be allowed to alter their clothing, and shall be held responsible for its being kept in repair, clean, and properly marked. They must not leave any article of their clothing on the works.

206. Prisoners are not to leave school or Divine service without being regularly dismissed, and no prisoner shall on any pretence leave the ranks at muster, or his work during labour hours, or his allotted place at labour, without permission of the officer in whose charge he may be at the time.

207. At all musters prisoners are required to be in their places in the ranks immediately upon the ringing of the bell.

208. Prisoners must preserve strict silence at all musters, at meals, in the dormitories and cells, while undergoing solitary confinement, and while marching to and from their places of labour.

209. Male prisoners must invariably salute and stand to attention when addressing an officer or Visitor, and must always stand to attention (except when at meals), when any of the principal officers or visitors enter their cells or the yards. They must at all times be respectful to their officers and to all Visitors to the prison.

210. Prisoners are to be attentive and diligent in performing all duties that may be assigned to them. They are on no account to be idle during the fixed hours of labour, but must continue to devote themselves actively to the work of the day. They shall, when necessary, apply to the instructor for direction as to the manner of performing their work. Any wilful or negligent mismanagement of work will render the offender liable to punishment.

211. Prisoners desirous of seeing the Inspector, a Visiting Justice, or any departmental official visiting the gaol, must apply to the officer under whose charge they may be, to have their names placed on a list kept for the purpose. The same rule shall apply in the case of visits of Ministers of the Crown, or other gentlemen who, in a public capacity, may visit the gaol; but only in the cases of departmental officials and Visiting Justices can it be promised that prisoners will be granted interviews. Prisoners are warned that for making frivolous or groundless complaints they render themselves liable to punishment.

212. All games, jumping, wrestling, singing, whistling, and conduct of a like description are strictly prohibited.

213. All prisoners, other than those in the hospital, shall rise immediately the first bell is rung, dress, wash their hands and faces, and make up their bedding neatly in such form as may be directed. They must keep their persons, cells, and the furniture therein in the highest state of cleanliness.

214. On hearing the cell-door unlocked, prisoners, unless in bed, must stand to attention in the centre of the cell, facing the door, hands to the side, and heels close together.

215. Prisoners in their cells desiring assistance should communicate to the officer on duty by using the semaphores; but on no account may the semaphore be used unnecessarily.

216. No prisoner shall be permitted to be present while any other prisoner is being searched (except on parade), or being examined, photographed, having his finger-prints or measurements taken, or his property examined.

Employment of Prisoners.

217. Every prisoner sentenced to imprisonment with hard labour shall be kept at hard labour during the whole term of his sentence unless the Medical Officer certifies that he is unable to perform the work allotted to him.

218. No prisoner shall be employed at tasks other than those necessary for the service of the prison on Sundays, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Labour Day, and the birthday of the reigning Sovereign.

219. No prisoner shall be allowed to perform any clerical work.

Correspondence.

220. No prisoner shall be permitted to send or to receive any letter or parcel of any description whatsoever, excepting through the hands of the Gaoler; and the Gaoler is hereby authorized and directed to open and examine every such letter or parcel, and to take possession of any such letter or parcel being conveyed from or to a prisoner contrary to this regulation. The Gaoler is further required to detain any such letter or parcel that may appear to him to affect the discipline or security of the prison, and to lay the same before the Inspector or a Visiting Justice, who shall be empowered to detain the same and to take such action concerning it as to him may seem necessary.

221. No prisoner shall be allowed to communicate with a prisoner in any other prison except by the permission of the Inspector.

222. Prisoners shall not be allowed to communicate with their friends concerning any matter happening within the prison or concerning any matter connected with the discipline of the prison or the treatment of prisoners.

223. All letters must contain their whole meaning clearly expressed in the English language, save in the case of Maoris and foreigners, who may write in their own language, but every letter so written must be forwarded through the Under-Secretary.

224. All letters must be on the authorized form. In addition to the periods in which letters may be despatched and received under Regulation No. , the Gaoler may, under special circumstances, allow letters to be forwarded or received at any time.

225. Prisoners shall not be allowed to receive or despatch any letters containing, in the opinion of the Gaoler, any objectionable matter.

Visits.

226. Prisoners shall, according to their class, be allowed to receive visits from their friends and relatives according to the following restrictions:—

227. Male prisoners shall be visited in the presence of a male officer. Female prisoners shall be visited in the presence of a female officer.

228. No person shall be allowed to visit a prisoner except by the authority of the Under-Secretary, the Inspector, or the Gaoler.

229. The Gaoler shall withhold his authority if he considers that the visit is inconsistent with the security or discipline of the prison, or has reason to believe that the person applying for permission is of bad character. Under the same circumstances he may refuse to admit a person having an order under Regulation No. , but shall in such case immediately refer his decision and the reasons therefor to the Under-Secretary and shall await instructions.

230. The Gaoler shall require the name and address of all visitors to prisoners to be given, and if he has any ground for suspicion may search, or cause to be searched, any male visitor, and direct a female officer to search any female visitor, but such searching shall not take place in the presence of any prisoner or other visitor, nor, in the case of a female visitor, in the presence of any male officer; and a note with all particulars as to the result of the search shall be entered in the Gaoler's journal.

231. Not more than three persons shall be allowed to visit a prisoner at any one time.

232. The officer present at a visit shall carefully supervise such visit, and if circumstances arise affording him reason for believing that the visit is inconsistent with the security or discipline of the prison, or is of a frivolous character, he shall immediately bring the visit to a close and report the visitor or visitors to the Gaoler before they leave the prison.

233. Apart from anything in the regulations to the contrary, the Gaoler may grant special permission to a prisoner to see his friends, provided that the circumstances are pressing and urgent and admit of no delay.

234. No visit shall be allowed on Sunday except in cases of emergency.

Food.

235. Every prisoner shall be supplied with a sufficient quantity of wholesome food according to the scales of diet hereinafter prescribed.

236. A prisoner who has any complaint to make regarding the diet furnished to him, or who wishes his diet to be weighed or measured for the purpose of ascertaining whether he is supplied with the proper quantity, must make his request as soon as possible after the diet has been handed to him, and it shall thereupon be weighed or measured in his presence, and in that of the officer deputed for that purpose. Repeated complaints of a groundless nature made by any prisoner under colour of this regulation shall be treated as a breach of prison discipline, and the offender shall be liable to be punished accordingly.

237. Any special addition to the food in the diet scale may, in the case of a prisoner not being a patient in the prison hospital, be made only on the recommendation of the Medical Officer.

238. The Gaoler shall from time to time consult the Medical Officer respecting the quality of the provisions furnished to the prisoners.

239. No fermented or spirituous liquors of any kind shall be sold or supplied to, or be admitted to the prison for the use of, any of the prisoners in any prison under any pretence whatsoever, unless on the written order of the Medical Officer specifying the quantity to be admitted. A copy of every such order shall be entered by the Medical Officer in his journal. This regulation shall not apply to any stock of such liquor kept in the prison under the Medical Officer's control for the use of sick prisoners. Whenever the Medical Officer prescribes any liquor he shall do so under a written order, which shall specify the quantity and the name of the prisoner for whose use it is intended.

Bedding and Clothing.

240. Every prisoner shall be supplied with such bedding as may be prescribed by the Gaoler, and with such additional clothing and bedding during cold weather or in special cases as the Medical Officer may deem requisite.

241. The beds and bedding shall be aired not less frequently than twice a week in summer and once a week in winter.

242. Every prisoner required to wear prison clothing shall be supplied with a complete outfit, sufficient for warmth.

Exercise.

243. All prisoners shall be allowed as much air and exercise as may be deemed necessary for the preservation of health consistently with security.

244. Prisoners employed at work in their cells or in the prison workshops shall exercise in the open air for half an hour before commencing labour in the morning, and half an hour after the conclusion of the day's labour in the afternoon, or oftener if the Medical Officer deems it necessary.

245. Every prisoner not employed at hard labour shall exercise two hours every forenoon and two hours every afternoon (weather permitting), or for a longer or shorter time, as the Medical Officer deems necessary for the purposes of health.

246. Prisoners undergoing solitary confinement shall on and after the third day be allowed such exercise during the period of this punishment as the Medical Officer shall deem necessary.

Health of Prisoners.

247. All prisoners, except when directions to the contrary are given by the Medical Officer, shall bathe as often as may be necessary in the interests of health, being in no case less than once a week.

248. Prisoners suffering from any contagious or infectious disease shall be kept strictly apart from the other prisoners, and all instructions issued by the Medical Officer shall be rigidly adhered to. They shall not use any plunge bath, but either a shower or sponge bath.

249. Prisoners who desire to see the Medical Officer must give their names before breakfast to the officer of their ward, to be by him given to the Gaoler. Officers will also make a report to the Gaoler of the name of any prisoner who, in their opinion, should consult the Medical Officer.

250. All directions or recommendations made by the Medical Officer are to be entered by him in his journal, and shall at once be given effect to by the Gaoler, who shall enter opposite the direction or recommendation in the medical journal when and how such direction or recommendation was given effect to, and any remarks he may deem fit to make.

251. Prisoners employed at work in their cells or in the prison workshops shall exercise in the open air for half an hour before commencing labour in the morning, and half an hour after the conclusion of the day's labour in the afternoon, or oftener if the Medical Officer deems it necessary.

252. Every prisoner not employed at hard labour shall exercise two hours every forenoon and two hours every afternoon (weather permitting), or for a longer or shorter time, as the Medical Officer may deem necessary for his health.

253. In every prison, when practicable, a hospital shall be provided for the reception of sick prisoners.

254. All prisoners shall be examined by the Medical Officer prior to their being removed to another prison, and no prisoner shall be so removed unless the Medical Officer has certified in his journal that the prisoner is medically fit for removal. Nothing in this regulation shall be deemed to prohibit the removal of any prisoner to a public hospital.

Orderlies and Cleaners.

255. Such prisoners as the Gaoler thinks fit may be employed as orderlies and cleaners in any prison.

256. The night-tubs in use in the prison are to be emptied by them every morning and thoroughly cleansed, as directed.

257. They shall be required to wash the floors and whitewash the walls as often as they may be directed.

258. No orderly, cleaner, or other prisoner shall have access to the cell of any other prisoner except under the supervision of an officer; and it shall be the duty of such officer to see that no prisoner under his charge places any contraband article in any other prisoner's cell, abstracts any article therefrom, or in any way commits a breach of the prison order or discipline.

259. Cleaners may be allowed into the quarters of officers sleeping within the prison for the purposes of sweeping, scrubbing, and washing, or of moving heavy articles; but no such cleaners are to be admitted to the officers' quarters except under the effective supervision of an officer.

260. The Gaoler shall provide that all orderlies and cleaners have their time fully occupied.

261. No prisoner is to be employed as an orderly or cleaner who is suffering from any contagious or infectious disease.

Cooks.

262. The cooks are to be in such numbers as shall from time to time be directed.

263. They shall be held responsible that the prisoners' rations are properly cooked and distributed according to the direction of the Gaoler.

264. They shall be required to have the cookhouse, cooking-utensils, tables, mess-kits, pails, &c., at all times properly cleansed and kept in their proper places.

265. They are to be employed during spare time in such work as the Gaoler may allot to them.

266. No prisoner is to be employed as a cook who is suffering from any disease.

267. The food, cooking-utensils, crockery, &c., of officers are to be kept apart from the food and utensils of the prisoners.

PRISONERS AWAITING TRIAL OR SENTENCE AND ON REMAND.

268. Prisoners before trial may, by permission of the Visiting Justices or Inspector, be allowed to retain in their possession any books or documents belonging to them at the time of their arrest, which may not be required for evidence against them, and are not reasonably suspected of being part of any property improperly acquired by them, or are not on some special grounds required to be taken from them for the purposes of justice.

269. Prisoners committed in the same case shall, so far as circumstances will permit, be kept separate, and shall not be permitted to communicate with each other.

270. Prisoners who have not served a previous sentence are to be kept apart from others.

271. Prisoners may, by permission of the Visiting Justices or Inspector, be visited by not more than two persons at once at a convenient time on any week-day for a quarter of an hour, or longer if sufficient cause is shown.

272. Each such prisoner shall be allowed to see his solicitor, or a clerk authorized in writing by such solicitor, on any week-day at any reasonable hour, and, if required, in private; provided that if the Gaoler thinks it advisable, every such interview shall take place in the view of an officer of the prison.

273. Paper and all other writing-materials, to such an extent as may appear reasonable to the Inspector or the Gaoler shall be furnished to any such prisoner who requires to be so supplied for the purposes of communicating with friends or preparing a defence.

274. Prisoners before trial shall be permitted to procure for themselves, or receive from their friends, tobacco, ordinary food, clothing, and other necessaries, subject to strict examination by the Gaoler in order to prevent the introduction of spirituous and fermented liquors or other prohibited articles. Any food, &c., so procured may be paid for out of the moneys belonging to such prisoner in the hands of the Gaoler.

275. No part of such food, &c., shall be sold or transferred to any other prisoner. If a prisoner before trial does not provide himself with food, rations in accordance with No. 2 Scale shall be issued to him.

276. Prisoners before trial may, if they so desire (and must if they volunteer to work), wear the prison dress. They shall also be required to do so if their own clothes are insufficient or unfit for use or necessary to be preserved for the purposes of justice.

277. Prisoners before trial shall be required to keep their cells and utensils clean and in good order.

DEBTORS.

278. Debtors are to be kept apart from other prisoners.

279. Debtors shall be provided with separate cells, to which no other prisoner or unauthorized person shall have access.

280. Debtors shall not have their hair or beards cut except by their own wish, unless for sanitary reasons it should be so ordered by the Medical Officer.

281. As a precaution against the retention of prohibited articles they shall be searched upon admission; but such searching shall not, unless it appears that the debtor is wilfully secreting any article upon his person, require a debtor to divest himself of any portion of his clothing.

282. They are not to be photographed nor have their finger-prints taken.

283. They shall receive the scale of rations laid down for prisoners, in Scale No. .

284. They may provide themselves with food, clothing, bedding, books, writing-materials, or toilet accessories.

285. They shall be permitted to procure for themselves or receive from their friends tobacco, food, clothing, and other necessaries, subject to strict examination by the Gaoler in order to prevent the introduction of spirituous and fermented liquors or other prohibited articles. Any food, &c., so procured may be paid for out of the moneys belonging to such prisoner in the hands of the Gaoler. No part of such food, &c., shall be sold or transferred to any other prisoner.

286. Debtors shall be required to keep their cells and utensils clean and in good order, and make up their bedding, but no other labour will be required of them.

287. They shall be allowed visits daily on week-days at a convenient hour, and may correspond daily with their friends.

288. All debtors shall be liable to punishment for breaches of prison regulations.

MISDEMEANANTS OF THE FIRST AND SECOND DIVISIONS.

Misdemeanants of the First Division.

289. Persons imprisoned for non-compliance with the order of any Court to pay a sum of money, or imprisoned in respect of the default of a distress to satisfy a sum of money ordered to be paid by a Court of justice, and persons imprisoned in default of security of maintenance under the Destitute Persons Acts, shall be treated in all respects as misdemeanants of the First Division, and shall not be deemed criminal prisoners.

290. Misdemeanants of the First Division shall be required to keep their cells and utensils clean and in good order, and shall receive the scale of rations laid down for prisoners not working at hard labour. They shall be kept separate from the criminal prisoners, and shall be allowed visits daily at a convenient hour, and to correspond daily with their friends.

291. They shall be allowed to wear their own clothing, provided it is sufficient and fit for use. Their hair and beards shall not be cut except by their own wish or for sanitary purposes.

292. They are not to be photographed or have their finger-prints taken.

293. All misdemeanants shall be liable to punishment for breaches of prison regulations.

294. They may provide themselves with food, &c., in the same way as permitted to debtors.

Misdemeanants of the Second Division.

295. Every person convicted of an offence and not sentenced to hard labour shall be treated as a misdemeanant of the Second Division unless the Court or Judge before whom such person has been tried otherwise orders. Second-class misdemeanants shall be required to keep their cells and utensils clean and in good order, and shall receive the same scale of rations as first-class misdemeanants. They shall be allowed visits once a month at a convenient hour, and to correspond monthly with their friends. They shall wear the prison clothing. Their hair and beards shall not be cut except by their own wish or for sanitary purposes. All misdemeanants shall be liable to punishment for breaches of prison regulations.

CLASSIFICATION OF PRISONERS SENTENCED TO HARD LABOUR.

296. All prisoners sentenced to hard labour, except life-sentence prisoners, shall be classified as follows into three classes—viz., the Third, Second, and First Classes respectively.

Third Class.

297. All prisoners sentenced to imprisonment with hard labour for any period exceeding six months shall commence their sentences in this class.

298. Prisoners in this class shall be eligible for promotion to the second class when they have earned 1,464 marks.

299. They may for misconduct be required to serve an additional period in this class.

300. They shall be permitted to receive a visit of not more than twenty minutes' duration, and to receive and despatch two letters within one week from the date of their conviction. Thereafter they may receive a visit of not more than twenty minutes' duration, and may despatch and receive one letter every eight weeks; provided that their conduct and industry have been good for the preceding four weeks.

301. They shall be allowed to take one book from the library each week.
 302. They shall be granted a gratuity at the rate of 1d. for each thirty marks earned.
 303. They shall wear the prison dress with black facings.

Second Class.

304. Prisoners shall be required to serve one-fourth of their full sentences in this class before becoming eligible for promotion to the First Class.
 305. Prisoners may for misconduct be required to serve an additional period in this class, or may be removed to the Third Class for a stated period.
 306. Prisoners in this class shall be permitted to receive a visit not exceeding thirty minutes in duration, and to despatch and receive one letter every six weeks: provided that their conduct and industry have been good during the preceding four weeks.
 307. They shall be allowed to take one book and one magazine from the library each week.
 308. They shall be granted a gratuity at the rate of 1½d. for each thirty marks earned.
 309. They shall wear the prison dress with yellow facings.

First Class.

310. Prisoners on attaining this class shall serve the remainder of their sentence therein, unless promoted to the Special Class hereinafter referred to, or removed to a lower class.
 311. They may for misconduct be removed to any lower class for a stated period. If removed to the Third Class they shall, on completion of the stated period, be returned to the First Class.
 312. Prisoners in this class shall be permitted to receive a visit of not more than thirty minutes' duration, and to despatch and receive one letter every four weeks: provided that their conduct and industry have been good during the preceding four weeks.
 313. They shall be allowed to take two books and one magazine from the library each week.
 314. They shall be granted a gratuity at the rate of 2d. for each thirty marks earned.
 315. They shall wear the prison dress with red facings.

Special Class.

316. In addition to the classes hereinbefore specified, there shall be a Special Class, to which prisoners may be promoted for industry and good conduct.
 317. Before being eligible for promotion to this class prisoners must be within twelve months of the prospective date of their release, and must have earned 2,920 marks in the First Class and served the preceding twelve months in that class with exemplary conduct.
 318. Prisoners who have served more than one previous term of imprisonment shall not be eligible for promotion to this class, unless under exceptional circumstances to be decided by the Inspector.
 319. Prisoners may, for misconduct, be removed to a lower class for a stated period, and will not again be eligible for promotion to this class. If removed from this class to the Third or Second Class they shall, on completing the stated period, be placed in the First Class.
 320. Prisoners in this class shall be permitted to receive a visit of thirty minutes' duration, and to despatch and receive a letter every two weeks.
 321. They shall be allowed to change their library books as often as they wish, but must not have more than one book and one magazine at any one time.
 322. They shall be granted a gratuity at the rate of 2½d. for each thirty marks earned.
 323. They shall wear a blue dress.

Applicable to all Classes.

324. Prisoners who are sentenced to serve an additional period in a class, or to removal to a lower class for a stated period, shall be required to earn the number of marks allotted to such period—viz., the whole number of days multiplied by 8—before being again eligible for promotion. These marks are not to be added to the total number that a prisoner has to earn, but they represent the additional number to be earned in the class in which he then is or in a lower class, as the case may be.

Prisoners sentenced to Hard Labour for any Period not exceeding Six Months.

325. Prisoners serving sentences of hard labour for periods exceeding three months and not exceeding six months shall wear the prison dress without facings. They shall be allowed to write and receive one letter, and to receive a visit of twenty minutes' duration immediately after conviction, and thereafter to write and receive one letter, and to receive a visit of twenty minutes' duration every eight weeks, provided that their conduct and industry have been good for the preceding four weeks.

326. For the first three months of their sentences they will not be granted any marks, but for the remainder they may earn by good conduct and industry a remission by marks according to the scale and under the same conditions as in the case of hard-labour prisoners serving sentences exceeding six months.

327. They may on discharge be granted a gratuity as follows: Four months, 4s.; five months, 5s.; six months, 6s.

Prisoners sentenced to Hard Labour for Periods not exceeding Three Months.

328. Prisoners serving sentences of hard labour for periods not exceeding three months shall wear the prison dress without facings. They shall be allowed one visit of twenty minutes' duration and to write and receive one letter immediately after their conviction. They shall also be allowed a visit of twenty minutes' duration and to write and receive one letter when within a fortnight of being entitled to discharge.

329. They shall not be entitled to any remission of sentence.

330. They may on discharge be granted a gratuity not exceeding 2s. 6d., unless sentence expires on a Saturday, when the gratuity may be increased to an amount not exceeding 4s.

PUNISHMENTS.

331. A prisoner shall not be punished for a breach of any rule or regulation relating to the maintenance of discipline within the prison unless and until he has had an opportunity of hearing the charges and evidence against him and of making his defence.

332. Prisoners undergoing solitary confinement shall on and after the third day be allowed such exercise during the period of this punishment as the Medical Officer shall deem necessary.

333. If any prisoner undergoing solitary confinement wishes to see a Visiting Justice, an Official Visitor, a minister of religion, the Inspector, the Medical Officer, or the Gaoler, he shall inform the warden on duty accordingly, whose duty it will be to report to the Gaoler promptly. All other communication is strictly prohibited.

334. Every prisoner in solitary confinement is to be deprived of his mattress.

Corporal Punishment.

335. No instrument shall be used for the purpose of inflicting corporal punishment upon any prisoner except as authorized by the Minister. All authorized instruments shall bear a tag attached to them with the following inscription: "Authorized.—A. B., Minister of Justice. [Date.]"

336. In each prison there shall be duplicates of every instrument authorized for the infliction of corporal punishment.

337. No instrument shall be used or continued in use that is out of order.

338. Any instrument that is not authorized or is out of order shall be forwarded immediately to the Under-Secretary.

ESCAPING OR ATTEMPTING TO ESCAPE.

339. Any prisoner escaping or attempting to escape shall thereby render himself liable to be shot by any officer of the prison if, after having been called upon to stand, he refuses or fails to do so.

PRISONERS UNDER SENTENCE OF DEATH.

340. Prisoners under sentence of death shall be in charge of the Gaoler till the day appointed for the execution, when the Gaoler shall hand them over to the Sheriff on demand; they shall be frequently and carefully searched, and all dangerous articles taken from them; they shall be confined in a cell apart from all other prisoners, and placed day and night in charge of officers; they shall be allowed such diet and exercise as the Medical Officer may recommend; and they shall be visited only by a minister of religion, the Visiting Justices, Official Visitors, Inspector, the Sheriff, immediate relatives, or an officer of the prison, or such other persons as may be authorized by the Minister. The Gaoler may, if he thinks it necessary for their safe custody, place them in irons.

RULES FOR THE REMISSION OF SENTENCES.

341. The time which every prisoner sentenced to hard labour must pass in prison shall be represented by a certain number of marks which he may earn by industry and good conduct, and by obtaining such marks shall become entitled to a remission of part of his sentence in accordance with the following rules:—

342. The scale of marks shall be—Eight marks per diem for steady hard labour; seven marks per diem for a lesser standard of labour; six marks per diem for a fair or moderate standard of labour.

343. On Sundays, holidays, and such other times when prisoners are not mustered for labour the same rate of marks shall be awarded for good conduct.

344. The number of marks allotted to any sentence shall be determined by multiplying the number of days in the sentence by 6. All marks earned in excess of six per diem shall count for remission at the rate of one day's remission for every eight marks earned.

345. The officer in charge of prison works shall carefully inspect the work of all prisoners, and allot the marks daily earned.

346. Prisoners while in solitary confinement shall be credited with six marks only per diem.

347. Prisoners while in separate confinement shall be credited with six marks only per diem, unless the Inspector otherwise directs.

348. Prisoners who are unable to work through illness or any other cause are to be credited with six marks per diem, but these may be increased by the Inspector.

349. The maximum amount of remission that a prisoner sentenced to hard labour for more than six months may earn in accordance with these rules is a period equal to one-fourth of the period to which he was sentenced.

350. Prisoners not sentenced to hard labour who volunteer for and perform hard labour shall be granted the same remissions according to marks as prisoners sentenced to hard labour.

351. Gaolers shall forward to the Under-Secretary on or before the 15th day of each month applications for remission of sentences in respect of all prisoners confined in their respective prisons who will have earned such remissions on or before the last day of the succeeding month.

352. Gaolers having no prisoners for whom application is to be made shall forward a "nil" return.

Life Sentences.

353. The above rules for the remission of sentences do not apply in the case of prisoners serving life sentences.

TABLE OF GRATUITIES.

354. Prisoners sentenced to imprisonment with hard labour shall be paid, on their release, gratuities according to the following scale:—

Extra Gratuities.

355. Prisoners sentenced to hard labour may be granted, for exemplary conduct and industry, extra gratuities according to the scale set out in the following table.

356. The following table sets forth the minimum sentence to be served (allowing for the remission of sentences in accordance with the foregoing rules) and the amount of gratuity that may be earned in particular cases:—

CUMULATIVE SENTENCES.

357. For the purpose of estimating the period of remission of sentences and the amount of gratuities, and also for class progress, cumulative sentences of any prisoner shall be counted as one sentence, the maximum period of which shall be the same as the aggregate of the cumulative sentences awarded.

DRILL.

358. In prisons where instruction in drill is given, all prisoners, unless certified unfit by the Medical Officer, or exempted by the Gaoler, shall be required to attend and perform the drills.

SCHOOLS AND INSTRUCTION.

359. Provision shall be made in every prison for the instruction of prisoners in reading, writing, and arithmetic, in other than the prescribed hours for labour; and every assistance by means of instruction-books, slates, &c., shall be given to prisoners anxious to advance their education.

360. In prisons where a schoolmaster is appointed attendance at schools shall be compulsory in the case of all prisoners whose standard of education is deemed to be insufficient.

361. It shall be the schoolmaster's duty to instruct the prisoners committed to his charge in such subjects as shall be determined by the Inspector.

362. The schoolmaster shall forward a monthly report of the progress of each prisoner to the Under-Secretary through the Gaoler.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

363. Such Ministers of the several religious denominations, as may be authorized by the Minister, shall be allowed to attend prisons and hold divine service therein and to interview prisoners who are members of their respective denominations at convenient times and hours.

364. They shall enter the date and hour of each such visit in the visiting-book, and the number of prisoners attending each service.

365. They shall studiously avoid communicating with prisoners who do not belong to the religious denomination which they represent.

366. They must not communicate with the friends or relations of prisoners on their behalf without the concurrence of the Gaoler.

367. They shall be required to conform to the rules of the prison so far as those rules concern them.

368. Prisoners shall attend divine service of the denomination to which they belong at the appointed times, and shall behave themselves with the greatest propriety.

369. The denomination of each prisoner is to be determined by his voluntary statement upon his reception into the prison; and no prisoner shall be allowed to hold intercourse with a clergyman of a different denomination. If any prisoner desires to change his religious denomination he may make

application, setting out his reasons for desiring to make the change, to the Gaoler, who shall forthwith forward the application, with remarks thereon, to the Under-Secretary for decision.

370. Sunday must be kept as a day of rest as far as possible.

371. Any prisoner who is a Jew may be employed on any necessary duty on a Sunday, but he is not to be compelled to labour on his Sabbath or on any of the following sacred festivals, viz.: The New Year Festival, two days; Day of Atonement, one day; Festival of Tabernacles, four days; Passover, four days; Pentecost, two days. The dates of these festivals shall be communicated annually to Gaolers by the Under-Secretary. Jewish prisoners receiving these holidays may in lieu thereof be required to work on ordinary prison holidays.

372. Each prisoner who can read shall be furnished with a Bible, prayer-book, and hymn-book for the denomination to which he belongs.

LIBRARY.

373. There shall be a library in each prison, consisting of such books as may be approved by the Inspector. All such books shall be stamped with the prison stamp.

374. The Inspector, in exceptional circumstances, may allow a prisoner to retain in his cell, at his own risk, educational works or works of reference belonging to himself or sent for his use, without their being stamped with the prison stamp. These books shall be scrutinized before being handed over to the prisoner, and must not be marked by the prisoner in any way. The possession of such books by the prisoner will not restrict his privilege of receiving books from the library according to his class. Except as provided in this regulation books shall be supplied to prisoners only from the prison library.

GENERAL RULES AS TO MANAGEMENT AND CLEANLINESS OF PRISONS.

375. The prison shall be kept in a cleanly state, and the walls and ceilings of the wards, cells, rooms, and passages used by the prisoners throughout every prison shall either be painted with oil or be limewashed, or partly painted and partly limewashed. Disinfectants are to be freely used for keeping the drains, sinks, &c., sweet and clean.

376. Where painted with oil, the painting shall be washed with hot water, soap, and soda at least once in every six months; and where limewashed, the washing shall be renewed once in every six months, or oftener if necessary.

377. The beds and bedding shall be aired not less frequently than twice a week in summer, and once a week in winter.

378. The night-pails are to be kept carefully clean, and their contents disposed of according to orders.

379. No tree or shrub shall be allowed to grow against the outer walls of the prison; nor shall any rubbish or other thing be laid against or near them; nor shall any tool or implement of any kind likely to facilitate escape be left unnecessarily exposed.

380. No filth or offensive matter is to be allowed to collect within the prison.

381. No animals of any kind are to be kept within the prison without the especial permission of the Inspector.

Ladders.

382. Ladders in or about the prison, when not in use, shall be chained and locked.

Keys.

383. At the final locking-up of prisoners the senior officer present shall make a careful examination of all keys and check them with the key-list. He shall then give the keys into the custody of the Gaoler, together with his report.

384. No officer in charge of any keys shall lend them to any other officer, or dispose of them otherwise than in accordance with orders.

385. No officer on night-watch duty is to carry a cell-key.

386. No officer is to carry any prison-key outside the prison.

387. The inner and outer gates of the prison shall not both be open at the same time except when prisoners are actually passing in and out going to and returning from labour.

Stores.

388. The stores shall, with respect to their reception, charge, and issue, be managed in each prison according to rules approved by the Inspector.

Alterations may be made in the prescribed diets, subject to the approval of the Minister.

Notes.

390. (a.) The allowances of oatmeal, meat, and vegetables are as uncooked.
 (b.) Any order made by the Medical Officer for the special dieting of any prisoner shall be given in writing, and strictly attended to.
 (c.) The labour ration shall be subject to the completion of all tasks assigned and to good conduct, and shall be given only upon the recommendation of the overseer or officer in charge.
 (d.) Non-performance of any task shall, at the direction of the Gaoler or officer in charge of the prison, render a prisoner employed at hard labour liable to be placed on No. 2 Scale for the following day; but the sanction of the Visiting Justice or of the Inspector must be obtained to any such reduction of rations for more than three consecutive days.
 (e.) All prisoners in respect of whose rations any reduction is made, shall have their cases brought under the notice of the Medical Officer.
 (f.) Females employed at laundry-work shall be allowed one pint of tea, with milk and sugar, at 11 o'clock a.m.

RULES AS TO UNIFORM CLOTHING OF OFFICERS.

391. Officers while on duty shall wear uniforms as follows, and no variation whatever shall be permitted except by authority of the Minister. The uniforms shall be provided free of charge.

Gaoler.

392. The uniform of the Gaoler shall be as prescribed by the Minister from time to time.

Chief Warder.

393. Cap: Blue cloth; plain black patent-leather projecting peak embroidered with gold, gold crown in front; black mohair band (oak-leaf pattern); gold button on top.

Jacket: Blue cloth; single-breasted; stand-up collar, rounded in front to fasten with hook and eye, trimmed with $\frac{1}{4}$ in. gold lace round top and $\frac{1}{8}$ in. gold lace round bottom; twisted gold $\frac{1}{2}$ in. cord shoulder-straps secured with two small gold-gilt buttons; jacket bound with 1 in. black mohair braid; breast trimmed with plain black mohair braid; six gold-gilt uniform buttons with crown, with letters "N.Z. Prisons"; two inside breast-pockets. Distinction badge: Sleeve trimmed with Austrian knot.

Trousers: Blue cloth; plain black mohair braid, $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. wide, down seams; two side-pockets.

Boots: As approved.

Overcoat: Approved pattern.

Principal Warder.

394. Cap: Blue cloth, chin-strap, plain black leather projecting peak; black mohair band, oak-leaf pattern, $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. wide.

Jacket: Blue cloth, single-breasted; six gold-gilt buttons; stand-up collar, to fasten with one hook and eye, bound with plain mohair braid; collar trimmed top and bottom with $\frac{1}{8}$ in. gold lace; twisted gold $\frac{1}{2}$ in. cord shoulder-straps secured with two small gold-gilt buttons. Distinction badge: Three-bar gold chevron on right arm above elbow.

Trousers: Blue cloth with two side-pockets, red piping on seams.

Boots: As approved.

Overcoats: Approved pattern.

Warders.

395. Cap: Blue cloth, chin-strap, plain black leather peak.

Jacket: Blue cloth, single-breasted; six gold-gilt uniform buttons; stand-up collar rounded in front to fasten with one hook and eye, bound all round with plain black mohair braid; twisted black mohair $\frac{1}{2}$ in. cord shoulder-knots secured with two small gold-gilt buttons; two inside breast-pockets. Distinction badge: One-bar gold chevron on right arm above elbow.

Trousers : Same as Principal Warder.
Boots : As approved.
Overcoats : Approved pattern.

Probationary Warders.

396. Cap : Same as for warders.
Jacket : Material and pattern same as for warders except that collar is plain.
Trousers : Material and pattern same as for warders.

Officers engaged on Works.

397. Officers engaged on works may wear such overalls or other suitable clothing as may be approved by the Under-Secretary.

Matrons.

398. *Winter Costume.*—Blouse, dark-blue serge ; skirt, dark-blue serge ; belt ; collars, white linen ; cuffs, white linen ; caps and aprons, white, as approved by the Under-Secretary ; boots, one pair.
Summer Costume.—Blouse, dark-blue linen ; skirt, dark-blue linen ; caps, as for winter costume ; collars, white linen ; cuffs, white linen ; boots, one pair.

General.

399. Warder instructors in physical or other drill shall wear embroidered cross-swords on left forearm while actually holding the position and while so authorized.

400. Warders of any rank who have passed the educational and other examinations for seniority be entitled to wear a gold star on each shoulder-strap, except the Chief and Principal Warders, who shall wear the distinction on each side of the collar.

401. Officers attending the Courts shall wear white gloves.

402. Every article of clothing, whether made in the prison or not, is to be received by the Gaoler. The clothing is not to be taken into use until the officers have been paraded in it by the Gaoler, and it has been passed by him both as to quality and fit, after which no complaint on the part of an officer shall be entertained. Prior to its issue the Gaoler shall cause each garment to be marked indelibly in white paint, $\frac{1}{2}$ in. type, with the officer's number and the month and year of issue. He shall also take a receipt from each person in the uniform-book for the several articles issued, showing the number, date of issue, and condition, whether new or part worn, and the period for which it is to last. All uniform clothing shall remain the property of the Government, and must be produced when required. Gaolers shall take from each officer provided with a uniform an undertaking in writing to give up all uniform clothing when required ; and the value of any article not so returned, or any damage to the uniform beyond fair wear-and-tear, shall be charged against the Warder.

403. No officer is to appear, whether on or off duty, partly in uniform and partly in plain clothing, and any officer offending in this respect will be fined.

404. No prison officer of any grade, while in uniform, shall enter a publichouse.

405. No officer under suspension shall wear uniform.

406. Officers on leaving the service shall return their uniform clothing to the store. Before any such clothing is reissued from the store, it shall be cleaned and pressed.

407. Officers who may be granted leave of absence pending settlement of their applications for permission to retire must return their uniform clothing to the Gaoler on ceasing to perform duty.

408. Officers in charge shall be responsible that no officer is allowed to go on duty improperly dressed, or with dirty boots or clothing. Gaolers will pay particular attention to the appearance of the staff on their daily inspection.

409. On the first day of the months of December, March, June, and September in each year the Gaoler of each prison shall make a special inspection of all articles of uniform in the use of officers. If it appears that any article has been unfairly used the Gaoler shall confer with a Visiting Justice, and if it is considered that the condition of the article has arisen from want of care on the part of the individual, the matter shall be referred to the Inspector, who may order that such article be replaced and the value thereof deducted from the officer's pay.

410. General repairs to uniforms (including boots) may, on the written order of the Gaoler, be effected by prison labour where practicable.

411. If an officer for whose uniform a requisition has been made is transferred to another prison before delivery of the uniform a notification to that effect should be sent accordingly to the Gaoler of the prison to which he has been transferred, and the uniform, when received, should be forthwith forwarded to that prison.

412. Officers in charge of prisons shall be held responsible that the most accurate measurements for clothing and boots are supplied. Duplicate copies of measurements should be kept by such officers.

Authorizing the Thames Borough Council to erect Electric Lines within the Thames Borough and Thames County.

LIVERPOOL, Governor.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this twentieth day of January, 1913.

Present :

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by section two of the Public Works Amendment Act, 1911, it is provided that no person shall lay, construct, put up, place, or use any electric line except under the authority of a license issued to him by the Governor in Council under that Act :

And whereas the Thames Borough Council (hereinafter referred to as "the said Council") desires to erect electric lines for lighting and power purposes partly within the Thames Borough and partly within the Thames County : And whereas the Thames County Council has, subject to certain conditions, consented to the erection of such lines by the said Borough Council within the county : And whereas it is expedient accordingly to issue a license in respect of the said lines under the said section :

Now, therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred on him by the said section, and of all other powers in anywise enabling him in that behalf, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth, subject to the conditions set forth in the Schedule hereto, hereby authorize and license the said Council to erect, construct, lay down, and maintain electric lines for lighting and power purposes within the Thames Borough and Thames County, in the areas coloured blue and brown and shown on the plan marked P.W.D. 32781, deposited in the office of the Minister of Public Works, at Wellington, in the Wellington Provincial District.

SCHEDULE.

CONDITIONS.

1. IN the following conditions—

"Consumer's wires" means any electric line on a consumer's premises which is connected with the service lines of the said Council :

"Inspecting Engineer" means the Engineer or other officer appointed by the Minister for the purpose of inspecting the works to be constructed or maintained by the said Council :

"Pressure" means the difference of electrical potential between any two conductors through which a supply of energy is given, or between any part of either conductor and the earth :

"Minister" means the Minister of Public Works :

"Telegraph" includes telephone.

Any metallic body to be "efficiently connected with earth" shall be connected with the general mass of the earth in such manner as will ensure at all times an immediate and safe discharge of electrical energy.

2. The supply of electrical energy shall be given to private consumers by means of direct current on the two- or three-wire system at a pressure of 230 volts effective between each of the outer wires and the neutral, and 460 volts between the two outer wires. The declared voltage at the consumer's terminals shall be 230 and 460 volts respectively.

3. The neutral wire shall be efficiently insulated throughout its length, and shall be earthed only at the power-station. The earth connection shall be provided with a switch for cutting off the earth connection for testing, and with a recording-ammeter of a suitable range.

4. The main switchboard shall be made of and be mounted on material that is not inflammable.

5. Except where otherwise provided, the overhead conductors may be of bare hard-drawn copper or aluminium wire. If at any time it is found detrimental to the public safety to have these wires bare, the Minister may require the said Council to have them insulated, and they shall thereupon be insulated accordingly. No electric-light wire shall come within 3 ft. of any other class of aerial wires or of cables, except where it may be permitted to pass the electric-light wires through such other wires or cables at a pole.

6. Where lead-covered telephone cables or any bare telegraph or other aerial wires are crossed above or beneath by the electric-light wires, the latter wires shall be covered with triplex weatherproof compounded braiding throughout the crossing-span, and over every such span they shall, if the Minister of Telegraphs so requires, be suitably suspended from effectively earthed steel bearer-wires.

7. In places where it may be required to cross with the electric-light wires through any other aerial wires or through cables, all such through crossings, if permitted, shall be effected at a pole. In every case of a through crossing with telegraph wires or cables, the method of carrying the electric-light wires across the pole, protecting them thereon, preventing other wires from coming into contact with them, and protecting persons working on the poles from danger of shock, shall be to the satisfaction of the Minister of Telegraphs. Where the covered wires cross through on the pole, they shall be encased in a protecting tube for the entire length of the arms on such pole.

8. Efficient guard-wires shall, if so required by the Minister of Telegraphs or the Minister, be erected in a manner to meet with the approval of either one Minister or the other, or both, as the case may require, at all crossings and places where the electric-light wires intersect telegraph or other wires. The said Council shall bear the expense of such guard-wires in all cases where an electric-light wire intersects a telegraph or other wire previously existing.

9. In running the lines authorized by this license through streets where no telegraph lines exist the said Council shall keep to one side of the street, and in running service wires to the opposite side of the street the Council shall arrange so as to interfere as little as possible with the route of any future telegraph line.

10. Except by permission of the Minister, all overhead electric-light pole lines shall be placed on the opposite side of any street to that on which any telegraph pole lines exist ; and where the erection of the electric-light wires necessitates the alteration of any existing telegraph wires, and such alteration is approved by the Minister of Telegraphs, the expense of the alteration shall be borne by the said Council.

11. Where the electric-light wires are on one side of a street and the telegraph wires are on the other, and service is required to be given from either to the other side of the street, the said Council and the Minister of Telegraphs shall give to each other reasonable facilities as far as possible to effect supply.

12. Every main shall be tested for insulation after having been placed in position and before it is used for the purposes of supply, the testing pressure being at least 500 volts, and the said Council shall duly record the results of the tests of each main or section of a main, and forthwith forward a report thereof to the District Engineer at Auckland.

13. The insulation of every complete circuit used for the supply of energy, including all machinery, apparatus, and devices forming part of or in connection with such circuit, shall be so maintained that the leakage current shall not under any conditions exceed one-thousandth part of the maximum supply current. Every leakage shall be remedied without delay. Every such circuit shall be tested for insulation at least once in every week, and the said Council shall duly record the results of the tests, and forward a report thereof at the end of each week to the District Engineer at Auckland.

14. The sectional area of the conductor (other than a pilot wire) in any electric line laid or erected in any street shall not be less than 7/18, standard wire-gauge.

15. All metal pipes or coverings containing any electric wire shall be efficiently connected with earth, and shall be so jointed as to make good electrical connection throughout their whole length.

16. Arc lamps used in any street for public lighting shall be so fixed as not to be in any part at a less height than 10 ft. from the ground. All arc lamps shall be so guarded as to prevent pieces of ignited carbon or broken glass falling from them, and shall not be used in situations where there is any danger of the presence of explosive dust or gas.

17. The variation of pressure at any consumer's terminals shall not exceed 4 per cent. above or below the normal pressure at which he is being supplied.

18. Every support for an aerial line shall be of durable material, and properly strengthened against forces due to wind-pressure, change of direction of line, and unequal length of span. The factor of safety of such supports shall be at least four, taking into consideration all possible stresses, including wind-pressure at 30 lb. per square foot on plane surfaces and 18 lb. per square foot of diametrical plane for cylindrical surfaces. The stress in aerial conductors shall not exceed 28,000 lb. per square inch for copper and 15,000 lb. per square inch for aluminium in the extreme case of a temperature of 12° Fahr., and a wind-pressure of 18 lb. per square foot of diametrical plane occurring simultaneously.

19. Earth-wires, where led down poles, shall be protected by casing for a distance of 8 ft. from the ground.

20. All aerial wires shall be attached to suitable insulators carried on cross-arms of suitable material and cross-section, and they shall be so attached to the insulators or guarded that they cannot fall away from the support. Conductors

covered with insulating material shall be so attached that their insulation will not be impaired where they are secured to the insulator.

21. Any aerial wire shall not in any part thereof be at a less height from the ground than 18 ft., or within 5 ft. measured horizontally or vertically from any part of any building or erection other than a support for the line, except where brought into a building for the purpose of supply.

22. Service lines from aerial lines shall be led as directly as possible to insulators firmly attached to some portion of the consumer's premises which is not accessible to any person without the use of a ladder or other special appliance. Every portion of every service line which is outside a building and is accessible therefrom shall be rubber-insulated.

23. Where an aerial line crosses a street, the angle between the line and the direction of the street at the place of crossing shall be not less than 60 degrees, and the spans shall be as short as possible. The minimum height of the line shall be 20 ft. above the street-level.

24. Where an aerial line crosses or is in proximity to any metallic substance, precautions shall be taken against the possibility of the line coming into contact with the metallic substance, or of the metallic substance coming into contact with the line by breakage or otherwise.

25. No work of any nature shall be erected or constructed upon, over, or under any part of the New Zealand Government railways until the said Council has obtained the consent of the Minister of Railways thereto, as required by section 4 of the Government Railways Amendment Act, 1910 (No. 2).

26. Every aerial line, including its supports, its conductors, and their insulating covering, and all the structural parts and electrical appliances and devices belonging to or connected with the line, shall be duly and efficiently maintained as regards both electrical and mechanical conditions.

27. An aerial line shall not be permitted to remain erected after it has ceased to be used for the supply of energy, unless the said Council intends within a reasonable time again to take it into use.

28. Where any portion of any electric line or any support for an electric line is exposed in such a position as to be liable to cause injury from lightning, it shall be efficiently protected against such liability.

29. The said Council shall be responsible for all electric lines or wires, fittings, and apparatus belonging to it, or under its control, which may be upon a consumer's premises, being maintained in a safe condition and in all respects fit for supplying energy.

30. In delivering the energy to a consumer's terminals the said Council shall exercise all due precautions so as to avoid risk of causing fire on the premises.

31. A suitable safety-fuse or other automatic circuit-breaker shall be inserted in each service line within a consumer's premises, as close as possible to the point of entry, and contained within a suitable locked or sealed receptacle of fireproof construction.

32. All service wires placed in a consumer's premises shall be insulated with rubber of 600-megohm grade, and shall be thoroughly protected against injury to the insulation or access of moisture. All electric wires shall be so fixed and protected as to prevent the possibility of electrical discharge to any adjacent metallic substance.

33. The said Council shall not connect the wires and fittings on a consumer's premises with its mains, or, in the case of premises already connected, continue the supply from its mains, unless it is reasonably satisfied that the requirements of this license are complied with, that the wiring and fittings are suitable for the voltage at which supply is being given, that the installation generally is in accordance with the requirements of good practice, and that the connection or continuance of supply would not cause a leakage from these wires and fittings exceeding one-tenth-thousandth part of the maximum supply current to the premises.

34. For the purpose of satisfying itself that the requirements of this license are being observed in so far as they apply to wires on a consumer's premises, the said Council may require notice to be served on it of the intention to instal wires, fittings, lamps, motors, or other apparatus on any premises, and may inspect the same during any reasonable hours when such installation is in progress.

35. If the said Council is reasonably satisfied, after making all proper examination by testing or otherwise, that the wiring or fittings are not suitable for the voltage being employed, that a leakage exists at some part of a circuit of such extent as to be a source of danger, and that such leakage does not exist at any part of the circuit under the control of the said Council, or that any other requirements of this license are not being complied with, then and in such case any officer of the said Council, duly authorized by it in writing, may, for the purpose of discovering whether the leakage exists at any part of a circuit within or upon any consumer's premises, or whether the wiring is suitable and

the general requirements of the license are complied with, by notice require the consumer, at some reasonable time after the service of the notice, to permit him to inspect and to test the wires and fittings belonging to the consumer and forming part of the circuit.

36. If on such testing and inspection the officer discovers a leakage from the consumer's wires exceeding one-tenth-thousandth part of the maximum supply current to the premises, or that the requirements of this license are not properly conformed to, or if the consumer does not give all due facilities for inspection and testing, the said Council shall either not commence the supply or shall forthwith discontinue the supply of energy to the premises in question, giving immediate notice to the consumer of its reasons for not commencing or for discontinuing the supply, and in either case supply shall not be given until the said Council is reasonably satisfied that the installation is in conformity with the requirements of this license.

37. If any consumer is dissatisfied with the action of the said Council in refusing to give, or in discontinuing, or in not recommencing the supply of energy to his premises, the wires and fittings of that consumer may, on his application to the Minister and on payment of the cost, be inspected and tested by the Inspecting Engineer. This provision shall be indorsed on every notice given under the provisions of either of the two last preceding clauses.

38. From and after the time when the said Council commences to supply energy in pursuance of this license, it shall maintain continuously sufficient power for the use of all the consumers for the time being entitled to be supplied: Provided that, for any purposes connected with the efficient working of the undertaking, the Minister may give permission to the said Council to discontinue the supply at such intervals of time and for such periods as he may think expedient. When the supply is so discontinued public notice shall be given, when practicable, of such discontinuance, and of the probable duration thereof.

39. The Minister may at any time order an inspection to be made of the works, lines, and wires of the said Council used for electric lighting and power purposes. If any defect is found to exist it must be remedied forthwith, and if, in the opinion of the officer or person inspecting, such default is serious, the Minister may, on receipt of the report, direct the said Council to at once cease transmitting energy either over the whole of the lines and wires under its control, or over any specified part thereof, until such defect is repaired or remedied. The cost of such inspection shall be borne by the said Council.

40. The said Council shall, upon receipt of an application from the occupier of any premises within 60 ft. of any of its public-supply electric lines, furnish such premises with electrical energy upon the same terms and conditions as those on which any other consumer is entitled under similar circumstances to a corresponding supply, provided that the plant is of sufficient power to supply the electrical energy required by such occupier.

41. The said Council shall, before the erection or construction of any part of the work hereby authorized is begun, submit for the approval of the Minister such plans and other information with reference to such work as he may require. In the event of the said Council at any time desiring to make alterations to the work involving a departure from the type of construction shown on the approved plans, it shall submit for the Minister's approval plans showing the type of construction it is proposed to adopt, and with such approval the alterations may be carried out.

42. After the supply of energy has begun, notice shall be given to the Postmaster at Thames and to the District Engineer, Auckland, of each further proposed extension or alteration of lines or wires in pursuance of this license.

43. The construction of the works hereby authorized shall be substantially commenced on or before the 1st day of October, 1913, and shall be completed on or before the 1st day of October, 1914.

44. The said Council shall, prior to the completion of the said works, give to the Minister at least one month's notice in writing of the estimated date of such completion.

45. The said Council shall not use the electric lines authorized by this license, or permit the same to be used, for any purpose until the Minister has given to it notice in writing that he has received from the Inspecting Engineer a certificate that the said works have been satisfactorily carried out.

46. This license and the benefits and obligations hereunder shall not be assigned by the said Council without the express consent in writing of the Minister first had and obtained; but such consent shall not be withheld if it is proved to the satisfaction of the Minister that the transferee is financially and otherwise able to carry out the obligations specified in this license.

47. If the said Council fails to comply with any of the conditions of this license, the Minister may, by notice in

writing, require it within thirty days to remedy the default specified in that notice; but the Council shall not be held to have committed default for any failure to maintain power continuously if such failure is due to the breakdown of machinery or other accident, unless such breakdown or accident is proved to be due to negligence on the part of the said Council; and if the Council fails to comply with the terms of the said notice within the said period, it shall be liable to a penalty of £20, to be recoverable by or on behalf of the Minister as a debt due to the Crown. The recovery of a penalty under this license shall not affect the liability (if any) of the Council to pay or make compensation in respect of any damage or injury which may be caused by reason of the default.

48. Notwithstanding anything in the last preceding clause of these conditions, if the said Council fails to comply with the terms of any such notice for ninety days after the receipt thereof, the Governor in Council may thereupon revoke this license without further notice.

49. For the purpose of ascertaining whether the conditions of this license are being faithfully complied with by the said Council, the Minister, or any person appointed by him in that behalf, may at all reasonable times enter on the lands and works and inspect the same.

50. Nothing in this license shall be deemed in any way to interfere with, affect, or abridge any rights or powers vested in His Majesty the King, or in the Governor on his behalf, authorizing the construction, management, or working of any public works; nor shall any compensation be payable to or on behalf of the said Council for injury done to the works herein authorized by the construction, management, or working of any such public work as aforesaid, or for the loss occasioned thereby, or for the exercise of any such right or power as aforesaid.

51. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, the said Council shall not be entitled to erect, maintain, or use any electric line within the Thames County except subject to such conditions, not inconsistent with the provisions of this license, as may from time to time be agreed on between the said Council and the Thames County Council.

WHEREAS by section two of the Public Works Amendment Act, 1911, it is provided that no person shall lay, construct, put up, place, or use any electric line except under the authority of a license issued to him by the Governor in Council under that Act :

And whereas the Acetone Illuminating and Welding Company (hereinafter referred to as "the company") desires to erect an electric line from its new works on the Harbour Board Sections 673, 674, and 675, Borough of Napier South, across Owen Street to the site of its old works, and the Napier South Borough Council has consented to the erection of such a line, and it is expedient accordingly to issue a license in respect thereof under the said section :

Now, therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred on him by the said section, and of all other powers in anywise enabling him in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth, subject to the conditions set forth in the Schedule hereto, hereby authorize the said company to erect and maintain an electric line for lighting and power purposes, such electric line being indicated by a broken black line on the plan marked P.W.D. 32769, deposited in the office of the Minister of Public Works, at Wellington, in the Provincial District of Wellington.

SCHEDULE.
CONDITIONS.

1. THE conductors shall be at a minimum height of 20 ft. above the surface of the ground, and may be uninsulated.

2. THE conductors shall be composed of stranded copper or aluminium. The size of the strand shall not be less than No. 20 standard wire gauge, and the number of strands shall not be less than seven.

3. THE potential difference between the two wires, or between either wire and the earth, shall not exceed 110 volts direct current.

4. EVERY support for an aerial line shall be of durable material, and properly strengthened against forces due to wind-pressure, change of direction of the line, and unequal length of span. The factor of safety of such supports shall be at least four, taking into consideration all possible stresses, including wind-pressure at 30 lb. per square foot on plane surfaces and 18 lb. per square foot on cylindrical surfaces. The stress in the aerial conductors shall not exceed 28,000 lb. per square inch for copper and 15,000 lb. per square inch for aluminium in the extreme case of a temperature of 12° Fahr. and a wind-pressure of 18 lb. per square foot of diametrical plane occurring simultaneously.

5. WHERE the conductors cross telegraph or telephone wires, or if any telegraph or telephone wire is hereinafter installed so as to cross the conductors, substantial guard-wires shall be erected by or at the cost of the company. Such guard-wires shall consist of two stranded galvanized steel wires, carried on substantial supports, at a height of 2 ft. above the conductors if the telegraph or telephone wires pass over the conductors, or 2 ft. above the telegraph or telephone wires if they pass under the conductors.

6. THE construction of the works hereby authorized shall be substantially commenced on or before the 1st day of February, 1913, and shall be completed on or before the 1st day of December, 1913.

7. THE company shall, prior to the completion of the said works, give to the Minister of Public Works (hereinafter referred to as "the Minister") at least one month's notice in writing of the estimated date of such completion.

8. THE company shall not use the said electric line, or permit the same to be used, for any purpose until the Minister has given notice in writing to the company that he has received from the Engineer appointed by him to inspect the works a certificate that they have been satisfactorily carried out.

9. THIS license, and the benefits and obligations hereunder, shall not be assigned by the company without the express consent in writing of the Minister first had and obtained; but such consent shall not be withheld if it is proved to the satisfaction of the Minister that the transferee is financially and otherwise able to carry out the obligations specified in this license.

10. IF the company fails to comply with any of the above conditions of this license the Minister may by notice in writing require the company, within thirty days, to remedy the default specified in that notice; and if the company fails to comply with the terms of the notice within the said period it shall be liable to a penalty of £10, to be recovered by or on behalf of the Minister as a debt due to the Crown.

11. NOTwithstanding anything in the last preceding clause of these conditions, if the company fails to comply with the terms of any such notice for ninety days after the receipt thereof, the Governor in Council may thereupon revoke this license without further notice.

12. FOR the purpose of ascertaining whether the conditions of this license are being faithfully complied with by the company the Minister, or any person appointed by him in that behalf, may at all reasonable times enter on the lands or works and inspect the same.

13. NOTHING in this license shall be deemed in any way to interfere with, affect, or abridge any rights or powers vested in His Majesty the King, or in the Governor on his behalf, authorizing the construction, management, or working of any public work, nor shall any compensation be payable to or on behalf of the company for injury done to the works herein authorized by the construction, management, or working of any such public work as aforesaid, or for the loss occasioned thereby, or for the exercise of any such right or power as aforesaid.

Making and revoking Rules under the Judicature Act, 1908.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the fifty-first section of the Judicature Act, 1908, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, and with the concurrence of their Honours the Judges of the Supreme Court of the said Dominion, doth hereby revoke Rules 232, 466, 468, 470, 583, 584, 585, 586, and 587 of the Code of Civil Procedure as from the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, and doth hereby make the rules contained in the Schedule hereto; and doth declare that the said rules contained in the said Schedule shall come into force and take effect as from the first day of February, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen.

SCHEDULE.

205A. (a.) EVERY party to any contentious proceeding shall forthwith upon filing any affidavit deliver a true copy thereof, but not necessarily of the exhibits thereto, to the opposite party.

(b.) Legible carbon duplicates of typewritten affidavits and exhibits may be used for delivery under this rule.

232. (a.) In all other actions in which the defendant or any defendant has not filed a statement of defence within the time limited in the writ of summons the plaintiff may move, on due notice to the defendant, for such judgment against the defendant who has not filed a statement of defence as he considers himself entitled to, and on such motion judgment may be given for such relief as the plaintiff shall be entitled to on the facts set out in the statement of claim. The Court may give the plaintiff leave to proceed with such motion without giving the defendant the notice required by Rule 395.

(b.) The plaintiff instead of moving in manner aforesaid may set the case down for hearing at the sittings of the Court

at which the defendant was required by the writ of summons to attend for the trial thereof, or at any subsequent sittings of the Court for the trial of actions, and on such hearing judgment may be given for such relief as the plaintiff shall be entitled to on the facts set out in the statement of claim.

466. Any person claiming the issue of a writ of mandamus, or of a writ of injunction, or of a writ of prohibition, or an order under Rule 464 shall, without issuing a writ of summons, file in Court a statement of claim setting out the facts upon which he bases his claim to the relief sought to be obtained.

468. (a.) Such motions shall be made in manner hereinbefore provided as to motions generally, and if made on notice such notice, together with a copy under the seal of the Court of the statement of claim and a copy of any affidavits filed in support of the motion, shall be served upon all persons whom it is sought to affect by the relief claimed.

(b.) The rules as to the time for giving notice of motion and filing affidavits in support thereof shall not apply to any motion for a writ of injunction.

(c.) The Court on the hearing of the motion or of any motion to rescind an order obtained *ex parte* may adjourn such hearing, and direct that any other persons shall be served with notice of such motion, and may give leave to such persons to appear on the adjourned hearing of such motion.

470. Affidavits may be filed in support of the allegations contained in any such statement of defence and in answer to any affidavits filed in support of the motion.

583. Every party who commences any contentious proceeding not commenced by writ of summons shall indorse on the summons, petition, notice of motion, or other document by which such proceeding is commenced a memorandum similar to that required by Rules 14 and 16 to be indorsed on a writ of summons. The address for service to be specified in such memorandum shall be not more than three miles from the registry of the Court in which the proceeding is commenced.

584. (a.) Every party to any such contentious proceeding, other than the party commencing the same, shall give an address for service not more than three miles from the registry in which the proceeding was commenced.

(b.) Such address for service shall be given either by indorsing on the first document filed by such party in connection with the proceeding a memorandum specifying such address for service, and stating the name and address of such party's solicitor if he is acting by a solicitor, or by filing such memorandum separately in the said registry and serving a copy thereof on the party who commenced the proceedings.

(c.) Until such party shall have given an address for service as herein prescribed he shall not be entitled to be served with notice of any further proceedings in connection with the matter or with copies of any further affidavits filed in the proceeding, or to address the Court at any stage of the proceeding.

585. In cases where personal service is not required, all judgments, orders, notices, and other written communications required to be served on a party to any contentious proceeding other than the document commencing the proceeding shall be served as mentioned in the next two rules.

586. Where the party to be served is acting by a solicitor they shall be delivered to or left for the solicitor at his address for service (if any), or, in cases in which a solicitor is not required to give an address for service, at his office or place of business before four o'clock in the afternoon. Where the party to be served is not acting by a solicitor they shall be delivered to him or left for him at his address for service or his place of residence, in cases in which he is not required to give an address for service, with his wife or a domestic servant or any person whose business it is or who has authority from him to receive messages and convey or forward them to him. Where such service is impracticable the Court may, on affidavit showing the circumstances of the case and the necessity, give special directions as to service or publication in lieu thereof.

587. Service of all judgments or orders shall be made by delivering a duplicate of such judgment or order.

Apportioning the Cost of Maintenance of the Waiau-ua Combined Road and Railway Bridge over the Waiau-ua River, Cheviot County.

LIVERPOOL, Governor.

WHEREAS by section one hundred and twenty of the Public Works Act, 1908 (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), as amended by section thirteen of the Public Works Amendment Act, 1909, it is, *inter alia*, enacted that the Governor may, by Warrant under his hand publicly notified and gazetted, fix and determine whether all or any, and, if so, what part, of the cost, whether theretofore incurred or thereafter to be incurred, of maintaining, repair-

ing, improving, or reconstructing any combined road and railway bridge is to be provided and paid by any local authority or local authorities, and, if so, by what local authority or local authorities; and may by any such Warrant as aforesaid direct how, when, and to whom such payment is to be made:

And whereas by an agreement dated the twentieth day of April, one thousand nine hundred and nine, and made between His Majesty the King and the Chairman, Councillors, and Inhabitants of the Cheviot County, His Majesty agreed to construct the railway-bridge over the Waiau-ua River, on the route of the Blenheim-Waipara Railway, as a combined road and railway bridge, and the Council of that county agreed to pay the King the sum of two hundred and thirty pounds (£230) per annum, commencing from the date the said bridge was first used for road traffic, and also the sum of one hundred and ten pounds (£110) per annum for the services of each gatekeeper or signalman appointed to control the road traffic over the said bridge, and the King in consideration thereof undertook to maintain the said bridge, and to keep the same in good order and condition, and fit for wheeled traffic and for public use:

And whereas the local authorities hereinafter mentioned have agreed to pay certain proportions of the Cheviot County Council's said contribution towards the cost of maintaining, repairing, improving, or reconstructing the said Waiau-ua combined road and railway bridge described in the Schedule hereto, and hereinafter referred to as "the said bridge":

And whereas it is expedient to make provision under the said Act for the purpose and in the manner hereinafter set forth:

Now, therefore, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by the said Act and its amendments, and of all other powers and authorities in anywise enabling me in this behalf, do hereby fix and determine that the Cheviot County Council's said contribution towards the cost of maintaining, repairing, improving, or reconstructing the said bridge after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, shall be borne by the Cheviot County Council, the Kaikoura County Council, and the Awatere County Council in the following proportions, viz.: The Cheviot County Council shall pay sixty-seven per centum, the Kaikoura County Council shall pay thirty per centum, and the Awatere County Council three per centum of such contribution respectively:

And I do also hereby further direct that any contributions hereby required to be made as aforesaid by the Kaikoura County Council and the Awatere County Council (hereinafter referred to as "the said local authorities") shall be paid from time to time in the proportion hereinbefore prescribed out of the funds of the said local authorities, within a period of thirty days after demand in writing made by or on behalf of the Council of the County of Cheviot, and such payments shall be made from time to time to the Cheviot County Council for and on account of the said local authorities.

The distribution will take place on the 3rd February, 1913, and no claim will be entitled to consideration that shall not have been sent in in due form and received by the Secretary for Education, Wellington, on or before the 25th January, 1913.

1. A library to be entitled to a subsidy must be public in the sense of belonging to the public, and of not being under the control of an association, society, or club whose membership is composed of a section of the community only, and if within a borough it must be open to the public free of charge. The receipts for the year from subscriptions and donations must not have been less than £2, exclusive of moneys received from endowments, or from Government, or from Borough or County Councils, or for special

building purposes, or as rent, hire, or consideration for the use of any room, or building, or land belonging to the institution, in respect of none of which will subsidy be allowed. The net proceeds of concerts, lectures, or other entertainments on behalf of the current expenses of the library will be regarded as voluntary contributions. A subsidy will not be given to more than one library in the same town.

2. In the division of the vote a nominal addition of £25 will be made to the amount of the income of each library derived from subscriptions, donations, and rates, and the vote will be divided according to the amounts thus augmented; but no library will receive credit for a larger income than £75—that is, in no case will the augmented amount on which distribution is based exceed £100.

3. The whole of the subsidy must be expended without delay in the purchase of books for the library.

4. Application to share in the distribution must be by means of a statutory declaration by the Chairman, or Secretary, or Treasurer of the institution on behalf of which it is made, and must be accompanied by a statement of the receipts and expenditure of the institution for the year ending on the 31st day of December, 1912; and such declaration must be on the form provided for the purpose, which form shall be as follows:—

Arrivals and Departures in 1912.

Registrar-General's Office, Wellington, 21st January, 1913.

TABLES showing the numbers of arrivals in and departures from New Zealand during the year 1912, with totals for the previous nine years by way of comparison, are published for general information.

The total number of persons who arrived in the Dominion during 1912 was 44,660, and the departures during the year numbered 35,733, the excess of arrivals over departures for the year being 8,927 persons.

According to returns furnished by the Immigration officers, 12,912 persons arrived from the United Kingdom, and 2,605 persons departed therefor during the year. From the Commonwealth of Australia the arrivals are returned as numbering 23,522 persons, and the departures thereto as 30,141 persons. Arrivals and departures from and to other countries were 3,226 and 2,987 persons respectively.

Of the 44,660 persons who came to New Zealand last year, 5,192, or 11.63 per cent. of the total, were children—i.e., under twelve years of age; and of the 35,733 departures the children numbered 3,304, or 9.25 per cent.
