Any person authorized by the Minister may at all reasonable times enter upon the said wharf and view the state of repair thereof; and upon such Minister leaving at or posting to the last known address of the licensee a notice in writing of any defect or want of repair in such wharf, requiring him, within a reasonable time, to be therein prescribed, to repair the same, he shall with all convenient speed cause such defect to be removed or such repairs to be made.
7. Nothing herein contained shall authorize the licensee

to do or cause to be done anything repugnant to or in-consistent with any law relating to the Customs, or any regulation of the Minister of Customs, or with any pro-visions of the Harbours Act, 1908, or its amendments, or any regulations made thereunder, and that are now or

THE following particulars of the regulations relating to the introduction into the United States of America of nursery stock from New Zealand have been received from the Consul-General for the United States of America, and are published for general information,

Intending shippers of nursery stock to the United States of America who desire to obtain the official certificate referred to in Regulation 7 should apply to the Inspectors of Imported Fruit at Auckland, Wellington, Christchurch, Dunedin, or Bluff.

UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE. RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR CARRYING OUT THE PLANT QUARANTINE ACT.

Regulation 1.—Short Title of the Act.

THE Act "to regulate the importation of nursery stock and other plants and plant products; to enable the Secretary of Agriculture to establish and maintain quarantine districts for plant diseases and insect pests; to permit and regulate the movements of fruits, plants, and vegetables therefrom, and for other purposes," approved August 20, 1912, shall be known and referred to as the Plant Quarantine Act, August 20, 1912.

Regulation 2.—Definition.

For the purposes of this Act the term "nursery stock" includes all field-grown florists' stock, trees, shrubs, vines, cuttings, grafts, scions, buds, fruit pits, and other seeds of fruit and ornamental trees or shrubs, and other plants and plant products for propagation, except field, vegetable, and flower seeds, bedding plants, and other herbaceous plants, bulbs, and roots.

All woody plants and parts thereof for propagation or planting are included within the term "nursery stock" as used in this Act.

"Field-grown florists' stock" is all florists' stock which is usually grown outside of greenhouses for all or part of the

Regulation 3.—Applications for Permits for Importation of Nursery Stock.

Persons contemplating the importation by mail, express, freight, or other form of transportation of nursery stock, as defined in this Act, from any part of the world will first make defined in this Act, from any part of the world will first make application to the Secretary of Agriculture for a permit, stating in the application the general nature and quantity of the nursery stock, the district or locality where grown, the name and address of the exporter, together with the name and address of the importer in the United States, and the proposed port of entry. (Note.—The port of entry is the port where the imported nursery stock is cleared from Customs and the duty raid)

By "general nature" is meant the class or type of stocks, as fruit trees, fruit-tree stocks, &c., as specified in the official

Application for permits should be made in advance of the shipment of the nursery stock, but if through no fault of the importer stock shall arrive before the issue of a permit the stock will be held in Customs custody at the risk and expense of the importer for a period not exceeding ten days pending the issue of a permit.

of notice in writing from an Inspector of the Department of Agriculture that the nursery stock has been inspected by him or under his direction at the port of arrival, and was found or believed to be free from injurious plant diseases and insect

(See Regulation 6 for entry of nursery stock from countries having no official system of nursery inspection.)

Permits are not required for nursery stock entering the United States for immediate transportation in bond to foreign countries.

Permits for nursery stock entered for immediate transportation to interior points in bond are required only at point of entry.

Regulation 6 .- Entry of Nursery Stock.

On and after July 1, 1913, entry of nursery stock will not be allowed unless the invoice is accompanied by the original certificate, and unless each container bears a copy certificate, issued by a duly authorized official of the country from which issued by a duly authorized omeia of the country from which it is shipped, stating that the nursery stock covered by these certificates has been thoroughly inspected by him or under his direction and was found or believed to be free from injurious plant diseases and insect pests; provided that for stock to be shipped between October 1 and May 31 such insection shall be made on or after the 1st October, and for spection shall be made on or after the 1st October, and for stock shipped during the growing season inspection shall be made at the time of packing; provided further that on and after July 1, 1913, nursery stock from countries which do not maintain official nursery-stock inspection will be admitted into the United States only for experimental purposes and in limited quantities. For such importation a special permit will be required (see Reg. 5). Applications for such permits should be addressed in writing to the Federal Horticultural Board, specifying the amount and kinds of nursery stock which it is intended to import. Any such shipments will be allowed to enter only through a port which the Secretary of Agriculture will designate in the permit. Such nursery stock shall not be delivered to the importer or consignee until it has been examined by an Inspector of the Department of Agriculture and found to be free from plant diseases and insect pests. spection shall be made on or after the 1st October, and for insect pests.

Prior to July 1, 1913, it will not be required that the original certificate of inspection accompany the invoice, but each container of imported nursery stock must bear a copy of the certificate of inspection in the form authorized by the responsible inspection official of the country of origin.

Prior to July 1, 1913, nursery stock from countries which

Prior to July 1, 1913, nursery stock from countries which maintain no official nursery-stock inspection will be admitted into the United States only through the ports of New York, San Francisco, Seattle, Jacksonville, New Orleans, Honolulu, and San Juan after examination by Inspectors of the Department of Agriculture at the port of entry, if found to be free from plant diseases and insect nests

Collectors of Customs will be notified from time to time,

Collectors of Customs will be notified from time to time, through the Secretary of the Treasury, of the countries which maintain official nursery-stock inspection.

Entry will not be allowed unless the case, box, or other container or covering is plainly and correctly marked to show the number of permit, the general nature and quantity of the contents, the district or locality and country where grown, the name and address of the exporter, and the name and

address of the consignee.

Nursery stock offered for entry without compliance with these regulations will be refused admission. Nursery stock, inspected as provided herein, which is found to be carrying dangerous insects or plant diseases may be treated or de-

when a package of imported nursery stock includes any prohibited species, the entire package will be refused entry,

and treated or destroyed as circumstances may require.
All charges for storage, cartage, and labour incident to inspection, other than the services of inspectors, shall be paid by the owner or consignee.

Regulation 7.—Foreign Certificate of Inspection.

On and after July 1, 1913, certificates and copy certificates shall give the date of inspection, name of the grower, the district or locality, and country where grown; a statement that the stock has been inspected by a duly authorized official, and found or believed to be free from dangerous insects and plant diseases. The original certificate shall be signed and sealed by, and the copy certificate shall bear the seal of, the responsible inspection official for the country of origin.

Lists of officials in foreign countries authorized to inspect

nursery stock, giving their names and official designations, will be furnished to Collectors of Customs through the Secretary of the Treasury.

Regulation 9.—Declaration.

Office of the Public Service Commissioner, Wellington, 30th April, 1913.

Extract from regulations made by the Public Service Commissioner, dated 1st April, 1913, section 172: "The syllabus and procedure for the Civil Service Junior and Senior Examinations are adopted and shall remain in force for all Entrance Examinations during the year 1913, and for all Senior Examinations until February, 1914."

OTICE is hereby given of the intention to hold Public Service examinations—viz., the Public Service En-

trance Examination (heretofore known as the Civil Service Junior Examination) and the Public Service Senior Examination (heretofore known as the Civil Service Senior Examination), as follows:—

Public Service Entrance Examination: On or about 18th November, 1913, and following days.

Public Service Senior Examination: On or about 5th January, 1914, and following days.

No entrance fee will be payable for the Public Service Entrance Examination or the Public Service Senior Examination.

Entries for the Public Service Entrance Examination and the Public Service Senior Examination must be addressed "The Inspector-General of Schools, Wellington," and be sent so as to reach him on or before the 8th September, 1913, and 15th October, 1913, respectively. No application received after the date herein specified will be considered, and the provision heretofore existing in regard to late entries is abolished.

All entries must be made on the proper forms which may be obtained at any time after the 1st July from the office of the Public Service Commissioner, or of the Education Department, or of any Education Board.

Dunedin Brass-finishers.—Recommendation of Conciliation Council.

In the matter of the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act, 1908, and its amendments; and in the matter of an industrial dispute, relating to brass-finishers, between the Dunedin Branch of the Amalgamated Society of Engineers' Industrial Union of Workers, applicant, and J. Anderson and Co. and others, respondents.

THE following recommendation of the Conciliation Council appointed to hear the above dispute is published pursuant to subsection (4) of section 43 of the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Amendment Act, 1908, and number 34 of the regulations thereunder.

RECOMMENDATION.

Hours of Work.

1 FORTY-SEVEN hours shall constitute a week's work, of which eight hours and a half shall be worked on each working-day except Saturday, and four hours and a half on Saturday.

Overtime.

2. All time worked in excess of the time mentioned in clause I hereof in any one day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a quarter for the first two hours, and thereafter at the rate of time and a half.

Holidays.

3. (a.) Work done on New Year's Day, Easter Monday, or the King's Birthday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(b.) Work done on Sunday, Good Friday, Labour Day, or Christmas Day shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

Wages.

4. (a.) All journeymen brass-finishers shall receive not less than

1s. 4d. per hour.

(b.) Machinists working nibbling, facing, boring, or grinding machines not to come under the operation of this clause, except such machines are worked by brass-finishers.

Apprentices.

5. (a.) An employer taking an apprentice to learn the trade shall be deemed to undertake the duty which he agrees to perform

as a duty enforceable under this award, and shall pay such apprentice not less than the undermentioned rates of wages: For the first year, 5s. per week; for the second year, 10s. per week; for the third year, 15s. per week; for the fourth year, £1 per week; for the fifth year, £1 5s. per week.

(b.) The period of apprenticeship shall be five years, but three months' probation shall be allowed the first employer of any apprentice to determine his fitness, such three months to be included in the period of apprenticeship. The obligation of the apprentice to serve his employer shall be deemed to be a duty enforceable

under this award.

(c.) At the end of the period of apprenticeship the employer shall give the apprentice a certificate to show that he has served his apprenticeship. Should the employer at any time before the termination of the apprenticeship wish for any reason to dispense with the services of the apprentice he shall give him a certificate for the time served, and procure him another employer carrying on business within a reasonable distance of the original employer's place of business, who will continue to teach the apprentice, to pay him the wages prescribed by this award according to the total length of time he has served, and generally to perform the obligation of the original employer: Provided that it shall not be obligatory on an employer to find the apprentice another employer if he shall so misconduct himself as to entitle the employer to discharge him, but he shall give him a certificate covering the time actually served.

(d.) An employer taking an apprentice shall give notice thereof and the name of the apprentice to the Inspector of Factories within one week after the expiration of the period of probation, and an employer transferring an apprentice to another employer shall similarly within one week thereof give notice of such transfer to

such Inspector.

(e.) An employer shall not be deemed to discharge his duty towards his apprentice if he fails to keep him at work owing to the slackness of work, but such slackness may form a proper ground for transferring him to an employer willing to undertake the responsibility of teaching him.

(f.) When an apprentice is discharged for cause the employer shall send notice of the discharge and the cause thereof to the

Inspector of Factories.

(g.) All time lost by an apprentice, either through his own default or through sickness in any year of his apprenticeship, shall be made up before such apprentice shall be considered as having entered upon the next succeeding year of his apprenticeship; but an apprentice working overtime shall have such time added to his ordinary time in calculating the respective years of his apprentice-

(h.) An employer shall not be bound to pay an apprentice for time lost through the default of the apprentice or by his voluntary absence from work with the consent of the employer, but an employer shall not be entitled to make any deduction from the wages of an apprentice for time lost through sickness or any cause other

than those hereinbefore specified.

(i.) These conditions shall apply only to apprentices engaged after the coming into operation of this award, and shall not apply to apprentices previously engaged: Provided that notification is made to the Inspector of Awards within one month of the coming into operation of this award for all apprentices subject to this

Improvers.

6. An apprentice, after serving his apprenticeship, may be employed as an improver at the rate of not less than 11d. per hour for one year after the expiration of his apprenticeship, and thereafter the minimum wage.

Country Work.

7. (a.) For country work the employer shall pay the fare of the worker both ways, and a proper allowance at current rates shall be made to the worker for necessary meals. When the worker is employed at such a distance that he is unable to return to his home at night, suitable board and residence shall be provided at the employer's expense.

(b.) Travelling-time shall be paid for at ordinary rates, but not to a greater amount than eight hours in a day.

(c.) When a worker is employed on country work at such a distance that he is unable to return to his home at night, he may agree with his employer to work at ordinary rates in excess of the hours prescribed by clause 1 hereof.

Under-rate Workers.

8. (a.) Any worker who considers himself incapable of earning the minimum wage fixed by this award may be paid such lower wage as may from time to time be fixed, on application of the worker after due notice to the union, by the Inspector of Awards or such other person as the Court may from time to time appoint for that purpose; and such Inspector or other person in so fixing such wage shall have regard to the worker's capability, his past earnings, and such other circumstances as such Inspector or other person shall think fit to consider after hearing such evidence and argument as the union and such worker shall offer.

(b.) Such permit shall be for such period, not exceeding six months, as such Inspector or other person shall determine, and after the expiration of such period shall continue in force until fourteen days' notice shall have been given to such worker by the secretary of the union requiring him to have his wage again fixed in manner prescribed by this clause: Provided that in the case of any person whose wage is so fixed by reason of old age or permanent disability it may be fixed for such longer period as such Inspector or other

person shall think fit.

(c.) Notwithstanding the foregoing, it shall be competent for a worker to agree with the president or secretary of the union upon such wage without having the same so fixed.

(d.) It shall be the duty of the union to give notice to the Inspector of Factories of every agreement made with a worker

pursuant hereto.

(e.) It shall be the duty of an employer, before employing a worker at such lower wage, to examine the permit or agreement by which such wage is fixed.

Matters not provided for.

9. Any dispute in connection with any matter not provided for in this award shall be settled between the particular employer concerned and the secretary or president of the union, and in default of any agreement being arrived at then such dispute shall be referred to the local Inspector of Awards, who may either decide the same or refer the matter to the Court. Either party, if dissatisfied with the decision of the Inspector, may appeal to the Court upon giving written notice of such appeal to the other party within seven days after such decision shall have been communicated to the party desiring to appeal.

Tools.

10. Employers shall provide workers with all tools and trade requisites, except scientific instruments such as rules, squares, compasses, calipers, &c.

Piecework.

11. No piecework shall be allowed until a log is agreed upon by both parties to this dispute.

Preference.

12. If and so long as the rules of the union permit any person now employed in this trade in the industrial district, and any person who may hereafter reside in this industrial district, and who is a worker within the scope of this award and of good moral character and sober habits, to become a member of the union upon payment of an entrance fee not exceeding 5s., and of subsequent contributions, whether payable weekly or otherwise, not exceeding 6d. per week, upon a written application to the secretary by the person so desiring to join the union, without ballot or other election, then and in such case employers shall when engaging workers employ members of the union in preference to non-members, provided there are members of the union equally qualified with non-members to perform the particular work required to be done, and ready and willing to do it.

Limitation of Award.

13. Nothing contained in the award shall be deemed to apply to the work that is now being done by girls.

Term of Award.

14. The award shall come into force on the 19th day of June, 1913, and shall remain in force until the 19th day of June, 1915.

SUMMARY FOR APRIL.

As a general rule there was a preponderance of anticyclonic conditions with fair weather, but three periods of unsettled weather occurred, the first between the 2nd and 8th, during the passage of an Antarctic depression in the south, the second between the 12th and 15th, on account of a similar type of depression but of far greater intensity, and the third from the 26th to the end of the month, when two shallow depressions were in evidence. Of these, one apparently passed eastward of East Cape on the 26th, and the other was a "Westerly low" which overspread the Dominion on the 29th. However, none of the above-mentioned disturbances were accountable for particularly heavy rains. The only districts with a total fall in excess of the average were Gisborne, South Canterbury, and Southland. All other parts of the Dominion recorded below the normal.
