ORDER IN COUNCIL.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by section two of the Public Works Amendment Act, 1911, it is provided that no person shall lay, construct, put up, place, or use any electric line except under authority of a license issued to him by the Governor in Council under that Act:

And whereas the Martinborough Town Board (hereinafter referred to as "the Board") desires to erect electric lines in the Town District of Martinborough, and it is expedient accordingly to issue a license in respect thereof under the said section:

Now, therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred on him by the said section, and of all other powers in anywise enabling him in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth, subject to the conditions set forth in the Schedule hereto, authorize the Board to erect and maintain electric lines for lighting, heating, and power purposes within the town district as shown on plan P.W.D. 34080.

SCHEDULE.

IN the following conditions—

"Minister" means Minister of Public Works.

"Board" means the Martinborough Town Board.

"Inspecting Engineer" means the engineer or other officer appointed by the Minister of Public Works for the purpose of inspecting the works to be constructed or maintained under this license.

"Telegraph" includes telephone.

"Pressure" means difference of electric potential.

"Earthed" applied to any conductor means that such conductor shall be so connected to the general mass of earth as to ensure at all times an immediate and safe discharge to earth of electric energy.

"Electric lines" means any wire, wires, conductor, or other means used for conveying, transmitting, or distributing electricity for power, lighting, or heating purposes, and includes any instrument, insulator, casing, tubing, pipe, covering, or post enclosing or supporting an electric line or anything connected therewith.

"Consumers' wires" means any electric line on the consumers' electric supply lines.

1. System of Supply.

Electrical energy shall be supplied by means of a direct-current two-wire system. The pressure between wires at the consumers' terminals shall be 230 volts. Both wires shall be insulated from earth.

2. Regulation of Pressure.

The pressure shall be maintained within 4 per cent. on lighting-distributing circuits above or below the declared pressure at the consumers' terminals. The Board shall supply suitable recording voltmeters for this service, and on complaint by any consumer that the variations in voltage exceed these limits, or on the instructions of the Inspecting Engineer, the Board shall connect a recording voltmeter to record the pressure between the lines at their entrance to the consumer's premises and shall supply the Inspecting Engineer with a chart showing the variations in voltage between the lines at this point for a period of seven consecutive days. If the variations thus recorded exceed the above limits the Board shall take immediate steps to comply with this regulation. If after thirty days a similar chart shows that the above limits of variation in voltage are not complied with, a breach of these regulations shall be deemed to have been committed. If the accuracy of the Board's recording voltmeter is questioned by the consumer a standard instrument shall be supplied by the Inspecting Engineer, the readings of which shall be accepted as final.

3. Switchboard.

All switchboards shall be made of and mounted on material that is not inflammable, and no switchboard conductor shall carry electric current at a density exceeding five hundred amperes per square inch.

4. Circuit-breakers.

All outgoing feeders and distributors shall be provided with automatic circuit-breakers or fuses set to open at 50 per cent. excess current over the rated full load of such feeder or distributor.

5. Overhead Electric Lines.

Electric lines shall consist of overhead conductors of stranded hard-drawn copper, aluminium, and other material of not less than 0.0129 square inch in section, provided that service wires of short span of 100 ft. or less shall be not less than 0.0072 square inch in section.

The stress in overhead conductors shall not exceed 25,000 lb. per square inch for copper, and 12,000 lb. per square inch for aluminium, and 35,000 lb. per square inch for steel in the extreme case of a temperature of 20 degrees Fahr., and a wind-pressure of 18 lb. per square foot of diametrical plane occurring simultaneously. The span between supports and the sag shall be determined to conform with the above limiting stresses.

No overhead electric lines shall come within 2 ft. of any aerial wires or cables belonging to another authority unless permitted to pass either set of wires between other wires at a pole or support.

The lines shall be covered with triple jute braiding thoroughly impregnated with waterproof compound, provided that where circumstances permit the lines may, with the consent of the Minister, be bare; provided also that where the electric lines cross the telegraph lines the provisions of clause 8 hereof shall be observed.

6. Supports for Overhead Lines.

All overhead lines shall be carried at a minimum height of 18 ft. above the ground, except at road-crossings, where the minimum height shall be 20 ft. above the ground.

All aerial wires shall be attached to suitable insulators carried on cross-arms of suitable material and cross-section, and they shall be so attached to the insulators or guarded that they cannot fall away from the support. Conductors covered with insulating material shall be so attached that their insulation shall not be impaired where they are secured to the insulator.

Every support for an aerial line shall be of durable material and properly strengthened against forces due to wind-pressure, change of direction of line, and unequal length of span. The factor of safety of supports carrying distributing-lines shall

be four in the case of steel, iron, or ferro-concrete, and five in the case of wood, calculated upon the ultimate strength of the material under the same conditions of round pressure as hereinbefore mentioned.

The distance between supports carrying distribution-lines shall not exceed 200 ft., except by approval of the Minister.

7. Location of Overhead Lines.

Except by permission of the Minister of Telegraphs, or subject to an agreement between the Post and Telegraph Department and the Board, all overhead electric-light pole lines shall be placed on the opposite side of the road to that on which any telegraph lines exist, and where the erection of the electric-light wires necessitates the alteration of any existing telegraph wires, and such alteration is approved by the Minister of Telegraphs, the expense of the alteration shall be borne by the Board.

Where electric-light lines are on one side of the road and electric-telegraph lines on the other, and service is required to be given from either to the other side of the road, the Board and the Minister of Telegraphs shall give to each other reasonable facilities as far as possible to effect supply.

In running the lines authorized by this license through roads where no telegraph line exists, the Corporation shall keep to the one side of the road, and in running wires to the opposite side of the road, the Board shall arrange so as to interfere as little as possible with the route of any future telegraph line.

8. Telegraph and Telephone Wire Crossings.

Where electric lines are permitted to be supported on telegraph poles all details of the supports and of the insulation of the adjacent spans shall be approved by the Minister of Telegraphs, who may require such electric lines at any time to be removed from such telegraph poles on reasonable notice and without compensation of any description.

The cost of all necessary guard-wires and special provisions required to comply with this clause shall be borne by the Board.

At crossings the electric lines shall cross over or under the telegraph wires or cables as may be decided by the Minister of Telegraphs.

Where overhead conductors cross over or under open telegraph or any other aerial wires they shall be insulated throughout the entire length of every crossing-span with a triple covering of jute braiding thoroughly compounded.

Where lead-covered telephone cables are crossed above or below by the electric-light wires the latter wires shall be insulated with a triple covering of jute braiding thoroughly compounded throughout the crossing-span, and over every such span they shall, if the Minister of Telegraphs so requires, be suitably suspended from effectively earthed steel bearer-wires.

In cases where it may be required to cross with the electric-light wires through any other aerial wires or through cables because of the impracticability of crossing above or below (and crossing shall be effected above or below if possible), all such through crossings, if permitted, shall be effected at a pole. In every case of a through crossing, no matter whose property the lines crossed through may be, the method of carrying the electric-light wires across the pole, of protecting them thereon, of preventing other wires from coming in contact with them, and of protecting persons working on the poles from danger of shock, shall be to the satisfaction of the Minister of Telegraphs. The electric-light wires shall be insulated with a triple covering of jute braiding thoroughly compounded where they pass through on the poles and over the whole length of the span on each side of the pole crossed through. Where the insulated wires cross through on the pole they shall be encased in some approved hard protecting substance for the entire length of the arms on such pole. If metal pipe is used to encase the wires it shall be effectively earthed.

Efficient guard-wires or other protective devices shall be erected in a manner to meet with the approval of the Minister of Telegraphs at all such crossings and places where electric-light wires intersect telegraph or telephone wires, as may be required by the said Minister to be so protected.

9. Railway Crossings.

No work of any nature shall be erected or constructed upon, over, or under any part of the New Zealand Government Railways, until the Board has obtained the consent of the Minister of Railways thereto, as required by section 4 of the Government Railways Amendment Act, 1910 (No. 2).

10. Service Connections to Overhead Lines.

Service lines from aerial lines shall be taken from insulators at the point of support, and shall not be tapped off between

insulators. They shall be led as directly as possible from the insulators to insulators supported and firmly attached to some portion of the consumer's premises, which is not accessible to any person without the use of a ladder or other special appliance. Every portion of any service line which is outside a building and accessible therefrom shall be rubber insulated.

11. Maintenance.

Every aerial line, including its supports, its conductors, and their insulating covering, and all structural parts and electric appliances and devices belonging to or connected with the line, shall be duly and efficiently maintained as regards both electrical and mechanical conditions.

12. Lightning-arresters.

Where any portion of any electric line or support for an electric line is exposed in such a position as to be liable to injury from lightning, it shall be efficiently protected against such liability.

13. Insulation of Electric Mains.

Every electric line shall be tested for insulation after having been placed in position and before it is used for the purpose of supply, the testing-pressure being at least 500 volts, and the Board shall duly record the results of the tests of each main or section of a main, and forthwith forward a report thereof to the Under-Secretary for Public Works at Wellington.

14. Service Connections.

The Board shall be responsible for all electric lines or wires, fittings, and apparatus belonging to it or under its control, which may be upon a consumer's premises, being maintained in a safe condition and in all respects fit for supplying energy.

In delivering the energy to a consumer's terminals the Board shall exercise all due precaution so as to avoid risk of causing fire on the premises.

A suitable safety-fuse or other automatic circuit-breaker shall be inserted in each service line within a consumer's premises as close as possible to the point of entry, and contained within a suitable locked or sealed receptacle of fireproof construction.

All electric wires and apparatus on a consumer's premises, except such parts as require to be earthed, shall be highly insulated and suitable for the voltage at which supply is given. They shall be thoroughly protected against injury to the insulation or access of moisture. All electric wires shall be so fixed and protected as to prevent the possibility of electrical discharge to any adjacent metallic substance.

15. Insulation of Consumer's Installation.

The Board shall not connect the wires and fittings on a consumer's premises with its mains or, in the case of premises already connected, continue the supply from its mains, unless it is reasonably satisfied that the requirements of this license are complied with, that the wiring and fittings are suitable for the voltage at which supply is being given, that the installation is generally in accordance with the requirements of good practice, and that the connection or continuance of supply would not cause a leakage from those wires dangerous to life or property or deleterious to the rendering of good service.

For the purpose of satisfying itself that the requirements of this license are being observed, in so far as they apply to wires on a consumer's premises, the Board may require that notice must be served upon it of the intention to instal wires, fittings, lamps, motors, or other apparatus on any premises, and may inspect and test the same during any reasonable hours while the installation of such is in progress.

16. Testing Consumer's Installation.

If the Board is reasonably satisfied, after making all proper examination on the completion of the installation by testing or otherwise, that the wirings and fittings are not suitable for the voltage being employed, or that a leakage exists at some part of a circuit of such extent as to be a source of danger, and that such leakage does not exist at any part of the circuit belonging to the Board, or that any other requirements of this license are not being complied with, then, and in such case, any officer of the Board, duly authorized by it in writing, may, for the purpose of discovering whether the leakage exists at any part of a circuit within or upon any consumer's premises, or whether the wiring is suitable and the general requirements of the license are complied with, by notice require the consumer, at some reasonable time after the service of a notice, to permit him to inspect the wires and fittings belonging to the consumer forming part of the circuit.

If on such testing and inspection the officer discovers a leakage from the consumer's wires exceeding one ten-

thousandth part of the maximum supply current to the premises, or that the requirements of this license are not properly conformed to, or if the consumer does not give all due facilities for inspection and testing, the Board shall either not commence the supply or shall forthwith discontinue the supply of energy to the premises in question, giving immediate notice to the consumer of its reasons for not commencing or for discontinuing the supply, and in either case supply shall not be given until the Board is reasonably satisfied that the installation is in conformity with the requirements of this license.

If any consumer is dissatisfied with the action of the Board in refusing to give, or in discontinuing, or in not recommencing the supply of energy to his premises, the wires and fittings of that consumer may, on his application to the Minister and on payment of the cost by him, be inspected and tested by the Inspecting Engineer.

17. Continuity of Supply.

From and after the time when the Board commences to supply energy in pursuance of this license, it shall maintain continuously sufficient power for the use of all the consumers for the time being entitled to be supplied, provided that, for any purpose connected with the efficient working of the undertaking, the Minister may give permission to the Board to discontinue the supply at such intervals of time and for such periods as he may think expedient. When the supply is so discontinued public notice shall be given, when practicable, of such discontinuance and of the probable duration thereof.

18. Commencement and Completion of Works.

The construction of the works hereby authorized shall be substantially commenced on or before the 1st day of December, 1913, and shall be completed on or before the 1st day of December, 1914.

19. Supply to Consumers.

The owner or occupier of any premises within the area of supply included in the license shall be entitled to a supply of electrical energy on the following conditions:—

(a.) If such premises are situated within 60 ft. of the boundary of any road in which an electric line belonging to the Board exists, the service shall be made free of cost.

(b.) If such premises are more than 60 ft. distant from such road boundary, the Board shall run the necessary service mains for a distance of 60 ft. free of charge, and the consumer shall pay the cost of the service wires for the balance of the distance, such payment not exceeding 1s. per foot of distance.

(c.) Every consumer within any part of the area included in the license shall be entitled to a supply of electrical energy on the same terms on which any other consumer in such part of the area is entitled under similar circumstances to a corresponding supply.

(d.) If the nature of the proposed consumption of energy by any applicant is such as is likely to seriously interfere with the maintenance of a constant pressure on the lines in accordance with clause 2, the Board may, with the approval of the Minister, require the consumer to install such apparatus as shall enable the conditions of clause 2 to be complied with.

(e.) The Board may require services to be wired or installed by competent tradesmen, but no preference shall be given to services wired or installed by any individual contractor or firm of contractors.

(f.) If payment by the consumer is delayed more than thirty days after the date of rendering a correct account, the supply of electricity to such premises may be cut off without notice, and need not be restored until all arrears are paid.

20. Plans.

The Board shall, before the erection or construction of any part of the work hereby authorized is begun, submit for the approval of the Minister such plans and other information showing and describing such work as he may require. In the event of the Board at any time desiring to make alterations to the work involving a departure from the type of construction shown on the approved plans, it shall submit for the Minister's approval plans showing such type of construction as it is proposed to adopt, and with such approval the alterations may be carried out.

21. Notice to be given before Commencing Work.

Before commencing the erection of any part of the lines hereby authorized, or the extension of any line already erected, the Board shall give at least fourteen days' notice in writing to the Electrical Engineer of the Public Works Department

in Wellington, and also to the Telegraph Engineer of the Post and Telegraph Department in Wellington, of its intention to carry out the work, and shall forward to the Minister a locality plan showing the route of any extension.

22. Notice of Completion.

The Board shall, prior to the completion of the said works, or any separate portion thereof, give to the Minister at least one month's notice in writing of the estimated date of such completion.

23. Commencement of Supply.

The Board shall not use any portion of the electric lines authorized by this license, or permit the same to be used, for any purpose until the Minister has given notice in writing to the Board that he has received from the Inspecting Engineer a certificate that the said works in respect of that portion have been satisfactorily carried out.

24. Inspection of Works.

The Minister may at any time order an inspection to be made of the works, lines, and wires of the Board used for electric lighting, heating, and power purposes. If any defect is found to exist it must be remedied forthwith; and if, in the opinion of the officer or person inspecting, such default is serious the Minister may, on receipt of the report, direct the Board to at once cease transmitting energy either over the whole of the Board's lines and wires or over any specified part thereof until such defect is repaired or remedied. The cost of such inspection shall be borne by the Board.

25. Compliance with Conditions.

For the purpose of ascertaining whether the conditions of this license are being faithfully complied with by the Board, the Minister, or any person appointed by him in that behalf, may at all reasonable times enter on the lands and works and inspect the same.

26. Assignment.

This license, and the benefits and obligations hereunder, shall not be assigned by the Board without the express consent in writing of the Minister first had and obtained; but such consent shall not be withheld if it is proved to the satisfaction of the Minister that the transferee is financially and otherwise able to carry out the obligations specified in this license.

27. Default and Penalty.

If the Board fails to comply with any of the conditions of this license the Minister may, by notice in writing, require the Council within thirty days to remedy the default specified in that notice; but it shall not be held to have committed default for any failure to maintain power continuously if such failure is due to the breakdown of machinery or other accident, unless such breakdown or accident is proved to be due to negligence on the part of the Board; and if the Board fails to comply with the terms of the notice within the said period it shall be liable to a penalty of £20, to be recoverable by or on behalf of the Minister as a debt due to the Crown. The recovery of a penalty under this license shall not effect the liability (if any) of the Board to pay or make compensation in respect of any damage or injury which may be caused by reason of the default.

28. Revocation of License.

Notwithstanding anything in the last preceding clause of these conditions, if the Board fails to comply with the terms of any such notice for ninety days after the receipt thereof, the Governor in Council may thereupon revoke this license without further notice.

29. Public Works, Compensation, &c.

Nothing in this license shall be deemed in any way to interfere with, affect, or abridge any rights or powers vested in His Majesty the King, or in the Governor on his behalf, authorizing the construction, management, or working of any public works; nor shall any compensation be payable to or on behalf of the Board for injury done to the works herein authorized by the construction, management, or working of any such public work as aforesaid, or for the loss occasioned thereby, or for the exercise of any such right or power as aforesaid.

30. Commencement of License.

This license shall come into force on and after the date of publication thereof in the *New Zealand Gazette*.

WHEREAS by Order in Council dated the twenty-eighth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, and published in the *New Zealand Gazette* No. 92, of the tenth day of the following month, John McIntosh, of Mangonui, was licensed to occupy a part of the foreshore of Whangaroa Harbour, as a site for a wharf, erected in accordance with plan marked M.D. 2294, and deposited in the office of the Marine Department, at Wellington, for a period of fourteen years from the twenty-eighth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine :

And whereas the said license was, with the consent of the Minister of Marine, transferred to Duncan McCheyne McIntosh (hereinafter called "the licensee") :

And whereas the said period has expired, and the licensee has made application for a fresh license under the Harbours Act, 1908 (hereinafter called "the said Act"), for a term of fourteen years, computed from the expiry of the term of the hereinbefore-recited Order in Council, and it is expedient to grant the same for the term and subject to the conditions hereinafter expressed :

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in him by the said Act, and of all other powers and authorities enabling him in that behalf, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby license and permit the licensee to use and occupy that part of the foreshore of Whangaroa Harbour on which the said wharf is erected, as shown on the said plan marked M.D. 2294, upon and subject to the terms and conditions set forth in the Schedule hereto.

SCHEDULE.

1. In consideration of the concessions and privileges granted by this Order in Council the licensee shall, on being supplied with a copy thereof, pay to the Minister the sum of £2 10s., and thereafter an annual sum of £1 in advance, payable on the 1st day of October, dating from the 1st day of October, 1913, the first of such annual payments to be made on the licensee being supplied with a copy of this Order in Council.

2. His Majesty or the Governor, and all officers in the Government service acting in the execution of their duty, shall at all times have free ingress, passage, and egress into, through, and out of the said wharf without payment.

3. The licensee shall maintain the said wharf in good order and repair; and shall at all times exhibit therefrom, and maintain at his own cost, suitable and necessary lights for the guidance of vessels; provided that no light shall be exhibited until after it has been approved of by the Minister.

4. The licensee shall not erect, or suffer to be erected, on the said wharf any building or structure without the written consent of the Minister.

5. The ballast of all vessels loading at the said wharf shall be taken away by the licensee, and deposited above high-water mark, or at such place as may be approved of by the Minister or by any person appointed by the Minister for that purpose.

6. Any person authorized by the Minister may, at all reasonable times, enter upon the said wharf and view the state of repair thereof; and upon such Minister leaving at or posting to the last known address of the licensee a notice in writing of any defect or want of repair in such wharf, requiring him, within a reasonable time, to be therein prescribed, to repair the same, he shall with all convenient speed cause such defect to be removed or such repairs to be made.

7. Nothing herein contained shall authorize the licensee to do or cause to be done anything repugnant to or inconsistent with any law relating to the Customs, or any regulations of the Minister of Customs, or with any provisions of the Harbours Act, 1908, or its amendments, or any regulations made thereunder, and that are now or may hereafter be in force.

8. The rights, powers, and privileges conferred by or under this Order in Council shall continue in force for the term of fourteen years, computed from the 1st day of October, 1913, unless in the meantime such rights, powers, and privileges shall be altered, modified, or revoked by competent authority; and the licensee shall not assign, charge, or part with any such right, power, or privilege without the previous written consent of the Minister first obtained.

9. The said rights, powers, and privileges may be at any time resumed by the Governor, without payment of any compensation whatever, on giving to the licensee three calendar months' previous notice in writing. Any such notice shall be sufficient if given by the Minister, and delivered at or posted to the last known address of the licensee.

10. The licensee shall be liable for any injury which the said wharf may cause any vessel or boat to sustain through any default or neglect on his part.

11. In case the licensee shall—

- (1.) Commit or suffer a breach of the conditions hereinbefore set forth, or any of them;
- (2.) Cease to use or occupy the said wharf for a period of thirty consecutive days;
- (3.) Become bankrupt, or be in any manner brought under the operation of any Act for the time being in force relating to bankruptcy; or
- (4.) Fail to pay the sums specified in clause 1 of these conditions,—

then and in any such case this Order in Council, and every license, right, power, or privilege thereby conferred, may be revoked and determined by the Governor in Council without any notice to the licensee or other proceeding whatsoever; and publication in the *New Zealand Gazette* of an Order in Council containing such revocation shall be sufficient notice to the licensee, and to all persons concerned or interested, that this Order in Council, and the license, right, and privileges thereby granted and conferred, have been revoked and determined.

12. In these conditions the term "Minister" means the Minister of Marine as defined by the Shipping and Seamen Act, 1908, and includes any officer, person, or authority acting by or under the direction of such Minister.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this thirteenth day of October, 1913.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by section eleven of the Harbours Act, 1908 (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), it is enacted that the Governor in Council may vest the management of any wharf the property of His Majesty in any local governing body or person, upon such terms and conditions as the Governor in Council thinks fit :

And whereas it is thought desirable to vest in the Thames County Council (hereinafter called "the Council") the management of the wharf at Tairua, in the County of Thames, on the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth :

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, and in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in him by the said eleventh section of the said Act, and of all other powers and authorities in anywise enabling him in that behalf, doth hereby vest the management of the wharf at Tairua aforesaid in the Council, subject to the conditions set forth in the Schedule hereto.

SCHEDULE

CONDITIONS OF MANAGEMENT.

1. In these conditions the term "Minister" means the Minister of Marine as defined by the Shipping and Seamen Act, 1908, and includes any officer, person, or authority acting by or under the direction of such Minister.

2. All His Majesty's subjects shall at all reasonable times, and upon payment of the proper dues, have free and full liberty to use the above-mentioned wharf, and all rights of ingress and egress thereto and therefrom.

3. His Majesty or the Governor, and all officers in the Government service acting in the execution of their duty, shall at all times have free ingress, passage, and egress into, over, and out of the said wharf without payment.

4. The Council shall maintain and keep the above-mentioned wharf, and all erections on or in connection with the wharf, in good order and repair; and shall at all times exhibit therefrom and maintain at its own cost suitable and necessary lights for the guidance of vessels: Provided that no new light shall be exhibited until after it has been approved by the Minister.

5. All dues and rates received on account of the said wharf by the Council shall be applied to keeping the said wharf and all erections on or in connection with such wharf in good order and repair.

6. Any person authorized by the Minister may at all reasonable times enter upon the said wharf, and any buildings erected on the wharf or in connection therewith, and view the state of repair thereof; and upon his leaving at or posting to the last known address of the Council a notice in writing of any defect or want or repair in such wharf or buildings, requiring the Council, within a reasonable time, to be therein prescribed, to make good or repair the same, the Council shall, with all convenient speed, cause such defect to be removed or such repairs to be made.

7. The Council shall not erect, or suffer to be erected, on the said wharf any buildings or structure whatever except with the consent of the Minister.

8. The Council shall keep a separate account of the receipts and expenditure on account of such wharf and premises, and shall cause such account to be balanced to the 31st day of March in every year, and shall send a copy of such account when balanced to the Minister, and shall supply any particulars in reference thereto as may be required by the Minister.

9. The Council shall appoint all officers necessary for the working and management of the wharf.

10. Nothing herein contained shall authorize the Council to do or cause to be done anything repugnant to or inconsistent with any law relating to the Customs, or any regulation of the Minister of Customs, or with any provisions of the Harbours Act, 1908, or its amendments, or any regulations thereunder, and that are now or may hereafter be in force.

11. The rights, powers, and privileges hereby conferred shall continue in force for fourteen years, computed from the date of this Order in Council, unless in the meantime altered, modified, or revoked by competent authority; and the

Council shall not assign, charge, or part with any such right, power, or privilege without the previous written consent of the Minister first obtained.

12. The rights, powers, and privileges conferred under or by virtue of this Order in Council may be at any time resumed by the Governor on giving to the Council three calendar months' notice in writing. Any such notice shall be sufficient if given by the Minister and delivered at or posted to the last known address of the Council. No compensation or allowance shall be payable in such case.

13. The Council shall be liable for any injury which may be caused at the said wharf to any vessel or boat through any default on the part of the Council.

14. In case the Council shall—

(1.) Commit or suffer a breach of the conditions herein before set forth, or any of them; or

(2.) Cease to use or occupy the said wharf for a period of thirty consecutive days,—

then and in either of the said cases every right, power, or privilege hereby conferred may be revoked and determined by the Governor in Council without notice to the Council or other proceeding whatsoever, and publication in the *New Zealand Gazette* of an Order in Council containing such revocation shall be sufficient notice to the Council, and to all persons concerned or interested, that this Order in Council, and the rights and privileges thereby conferred, have been revoked and determined.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE CHRISTCHURCH STOCK EXCHANGE.

CONSTITUTION.

1. THE Christchurch Stock Exchange (hereinafter called the Exchange) shall consist of the persons whose names and signatures appear at the foot hereof, and such others as may hereafter be elected in accordance with the rules.

OBJECTS.

2. The objects and purposes of the Exchange are the exchange of quotations, facilitating purchases and sales of shares, scrip, stocks, and debentures, the maintenance of honourable dealing by and amongst members, and the decision and settlement of all disputes between members or affecting members.

MANAGEMENT.

3. The management and control of the Exchange and its affairs shall be vested in an Executive Committee consisting of four members (three to form a quorum), one of whom shall be the Chairman for the time being of the Exchange; the other three shall be chosen by ballot at an annual meeting of the Exchange to be held in the month of March in each year. Any vacancy occurring during the year shall be filled at a special meeting of the Exchange summoned for that purpose. At any meeting of the Exchange six members personally present shall form a quorum, and have power to act.

QUORUM.

4. If there is not a quorum present at any meeting, either of the Exchange or the Executive Committee, within fifteen minutes of the time appointed, the same shall lapse. The lapse of a meeting shall in no way prejudice or affect the right to call another meeting for the same purpose.

5. The Exchange shall have power to alter, amend, or repeal any article of the Constitution of the Exchange, and enforce the due observance of its rules and regulations.

CHAIRMAN.

6. The members of the Exchange shall annually elect one of their number as Chairman of the Exchange, who shall also and *ex officio* be Chairman of the Executive Committee. The Chairman, or any member presiding at any meeting in his absence, shall have both a deliberative and a casting vote.

DISPUTES.

7. All disputes between members shall be settled by the Executive Committee. The complainant shall state his case in writing, and pay in advance to the Secretary a hearing fee of 10s. 6d. The Executive Committee shall make such order in relation to the matter in dispute and the costs as they shall think fit. In any case in which a non-member requires the intervention of the Executive Committee, he must forward to the Chairman of the Exchange a written statement of his case, accompanied by a hearing fee of £1 1s., and undertake to abide by and forthwith carry out the decision of the said Committee in the same manner as if he were a member of the Stock Exchange. Any member or other person who feels aggrieved by any order or determination of the Executive Committee may appeal to the Exchange.

8. No member shall participate in the adjudication of a case in which he or his firm, or any member of his firm, is personally interested.

9. Every member of the Exchange, and every clerk to a member, shall attend before the General Committee, or the Executive Committee, or any subcommittee when required, and give such information as may be in his or their possession relative to any matter then under investigation.

10. Any member proved guilty of dishonourable or contumacious conduct, or of wilfully infringing the rules of the Exchange, or of conduct which, in the opinion of the Executive Committee, renders him unfit to remain a member of the Exchange, shall be liable to expulsion. Every charge against a member must, in the first instance, be submitted in writing to the Chairman, and a copy forwarded to any and every member affected thereby. The Chairman shall forthwith submit all complaints and charges affecting members to the Executive Committee, and if upon due investigation the Committee shall be of opinion that the circumstances require it, a special meeting shall be convened for the purpose of hearing the same and adjudicating thereon. The decision of such special meeting shall be taken by ballot, when, if three-fourths of the members present and voting in person at the meeting shall decide that the accused member has merited expulsion, he shall cease to be a member of the Exchange. The decision of the Executive Committee or the Exchange, as the case may be, shall be notified to the member or members affected by the Secretary. Such meeting shall have power, in lieu of expulsion, to suspend any member or members for a period not exceeding six months.

EXPULSION OF MEMBERS.

11. The Executive Committee shall have power to suspend or expel any member who (1) fails to comply with any decision, order, or award of the Committee or Exchange; or (2) fails to keep a cash-book and full records of all his transactions.

12. No member who has been suspended under these rules shall attend any of the ordinary daily meetings, or any meeting of the Exchange, or any committee thereof, or be admitted to or enjoy any of the rights of membership whilst under suspension.

ALTERATIONS TO RULES.

13. No alteration of or addition to these rules shall be made unless notice of such proposed alteration shall have been given in writing at one meeting of the Exchange, and considered and adopted either with or without amendment at another and special general meeting called for the purpose, and held not sooner than the seventh and not later than the fourteenth day after the giving of such notice.

SPECIAL MEETINGS.

14. A notice calling a special meeting of the Exchange, or any committee thereof, and stating the purpose thereof, read to an ordinary meeting of the Exchange or Committee, as the case may be, by the Chairman, or posted in the Exchange room not less than forty-eight hours previous to the time fixed for holding such special meeting, shall be held to be sufficient notice to members of the calling of such meeting. The Secretary, when so directed by the Chairman or four members of the Exchange, shall call a special meeting of the Exchange by giving forty-eight hours' notice in writing to the members of the time, place, and object of such meeting. Any such notice may be sent to a member by post, or delivered at his office or place of business.

SECRETARY.

15. The Executive Committee may from time to time appoint a Secretary and Reader, who shall respectively hold office during their pleasure, and at such remuneration as they may appoint.

16. The Secretary shall record the sales, purchases, transactions, and proceedings of the ordinary daily meetings of the Exchange, and of the proceedings of all other meetings of the Exchange and its Committee, and keep the accounts of the Exchange, and prepare a yearly balance-sheet as at 1st March in each year. The Secretary, subject to the Executive Committee, shall have the custody of all books and papers of the Exchange, and shall perform such other duties as the Exchange or the Committee may prescribe.

17. In the absence of the Secretary or Reader from any meeting, the Chairman may carry out his duties, or may appoint any member to do so.

NEW MEMBERS.

18. The Exchange may admit by ballot such persons (being sharebrokers and not less than twenty-one years of age) as they deem eligible. A notice of each application to be admitted as a member shall be exhibited in the Exchange Room for a period of seven days before the applicant can be balloted for. Every applicant must be nominated by one member and seconded by another, and must address and sign a letter in the following form:—

To the Chairman of the Christchurch Stock Exchange.

SIR, — I am desirous of becoming a member of the Christchurch Stock Exchange. I hereby agree to pay my entrance fee on election, also the annual subscription, and such calls as may be made under the rules; and I also agree to conform to, observe, and be bound by the rules of the Exchange, and that in the event of my being suspended, disqualified from membership, or expelled, or otherwise dealt with in accordance with the rules, I will not raise any suit in equity or at law against the said Exchange or any member or members thereof.

I am, Sir, &c.

19. In balloting for members one black ball in five shall exclude.

20. If any applicant for admission is rejected, such rejection shall be conclusive, and preclude such applicant from making a second application to be admitted a member for a period of twelve months.

21. The Secretary shall, on the day of election of a new member, notify in writing such new member of his election, and such member shall, within three days of his election and notification thereof to him by the Secretary, pay his entrance fee and subscription, and sign the Constitution of the Exchange.

22. If a newly elected member does not comply with the above rule his election shall be void, unless he shall justify the delay to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee.

23. Any member resigning or being expelled shall cease to have any claim whatsoever on the property or funds of the Exchange.

ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTION.

24. The annual subscription shall be £3 3s., payable on the 1st day of March in each year. Any member joining after the 31st August in any year shall pay half subscription for the year then current. The Executive Committee shall have power to make calls to meet current expenses, and such calls shall be payable at the time or times and in manner directed by the Committee.

ENTRANCE FEE.

25. The Committee shall have power to impose an entrance fee not exceeding £10 10s.

26. It shall be competent for the Executive Committee to suspend any member whose subscription, or any instalment thereof, or call shall remain unpaid for fourteen days from the date on which it is due and payable, the seat of such member shall be liable to forfeiture at the discretion of the Exchange.

CONTRACTS.

27. Any contract authorized by the Exchange may be entered into, signed, and executed by the Chairman on behalf of the Exchange, and any contract so made or entered into shall bind the Exchange and each and every member thereof.

28. In all contracts between members they shall be held and regarded as principals to each other in so far as the delivery, acceptance, and payment of shares, stock, debentures, &c., is concerned.

SETTLEMENTS.

29. All settlements shall be made in cash or by banker's cheque, or cheque marked by a banker as correct.

MEMBERS INSOLVENT.

30. If any member shall become insolvent, or fail in his engagements with his creditors, he shall *ipso facto* cease to be a member, and that, too, although he may not at the time be a defaulter on the Christchurch Stock Exchange, and no application for his readmission, except as a new member, shall be entertained. The seat of an insolvent or defaulting member on the Exchange may be sold by the Exchange to a new member, and the price shall be treated as an asset for the benefit of his creditors, subject to the provisions of Rule 36 as to disposal of same.

PARTNERS.

31. Where one of the members of a firm is a member of the Exchange, the entrance fee payable by another member of the same firm shall be reduced one-half, provided that, in the event of a dissolution of such partnership taking place, the member who entered at a reduced entrance fee shall, if he desire to remain a member, pay within one month after such dissolution has taken place a sum which shall, with the amount already paid by him, make up the full entrance fee payable in respect of a member at the date of his election; and until such sum be paid the member shall be considered as not having paid his entrance fee as provided by these rules, and shall not be entitled to attend the Exchange Room or have any of the rights of membership.

32. The seat of each member on the Exchange shall be his own property, irrespective of his being in partnership with another member. It shall be competent for a member to hold more than one seat. A member who holds more than one seat shall only be entitled to exercise one vote in the Exchange.

VOTING AND PROXIES.

33. At all meetings of the Exchange each member shall have one vote; any vote may be given by proxy through another member.

34. The privileges of membership shall be suspended if a member, either personally, or by his partners, clerks, or agents, shall become a member of or attend any other Exchange in Christchurch City where shares, scrip, stock, or debentures are dealt in.

35. A member shall not enter into or be in active partnership with any person other than a member, unless such partner shall have been approved by resolution of a meeting of the Executive Committee.

TRANSFER OF SEATS.

36. A member shall have the right to sell and transfer his membership and seat subject to the following conditions, that is to say:—

- (1.) That such member shall have paid the full entrance fee payable in respect of a member having no partner at the time when he became a member of the Exchange.
- (2.) That such member so wishing to transfer his membership and seat on the Exchange shall submit the

name of the proposed transferee to the Executive Committee, who shall be balloted for in terms of the rules relating to the election of members, when, if elected, the transfer may be completed.

- (3.) In no case shall any transfer of membership be permitted until all dues to the Exchange shall have been paid in full.
- (4.) The Exchange shall have a prior lien upon the proceeds of the transfer for the amount of dues owing by the transferor.
- (5.) A transferee shall pay to the Exchange 10 per cent. of the then existing entrance fee in lieu of such entrance fee.

The transfer of a seat from one member to another shall be subject to the provisions contained in this rule, with the exception of the condition as to balloting.

APPOINTMENT OF CLERKS.

37. Every member shall furnish the Executive Committee (in writing) with the name of any clerk or employee who is authorized by him to deal on his behalf outside the Exchange Rooms, and shall be responsible for all transactions entered into by such clerk or employee with other members.

38. It shall be competent for the Executive Committee, on application being made by a member in writing, to grant the clerk of such member permission to attend the daily meetings of the Exchange for the purpose of making quotations and reporting transactions on behalf of his employer. The member sending any such clerk shall be responsible for the quotations made, transactions reported, and sales and purchases affected by such clerk. The Executive Committee may at any time withdraw any such permission. A clerk shall have no vote, nor any voice in the management or administration of the Exchange. No clerk shall attend the ordinary daily meeting of the Exchange until his employer has received from the Secretary notice of permission to attend.

ATTENDING AUCTIONS AND TENDERING.

39. No member of this Exchange, nor his partner or clerk, or any one employed by him, shall be allowed to attend auctions to bid directly or indirectly for stock, debentures, scrip, bonds, or shares of any description (forfeited shares excepted); and no member shall be allowed directly or indirectly to tender for stock, scrip, bonds, debentures, or shares of any description in a deceased or bankrupt estate.

ADVERTISING.

40. No member of the Exchange shall at any time advertise in his own name or his firm's name, or anonymously setting forth that he is a buyer and (or) a seller of certain shares, stocks, or debentures.

LISTING COMPANIES.

41. Any company doing business in New Zealand, which desires to have its stock, shares, scrip, or debentures placed on the Call List, shall furnish the Secretary with a copy of its last annual balance-sheet, a list of its directors, also a statement of the objects of the company, the names, residences, and occupations of its shareholders, and such other particulars as may be required by the Committee. The Executive Committee may fix a fee to be paid by any company desiring to have its stock, shares, scrip, or debentures placed on the Call List.

PUBLISHING INFORMATION.

42. No member shall publish in any newspaper any information about any company quoted by the Exchange, except in the name and with the consent of the Executive Committee or the Chairman.

MEETINGS.

43. The Exchange shall hold meetings daily at such time and place as shall from time to time be appointed by the Executive Committee.

BROKERAGE.

44. The brokerage chargeable on transactions shall be as follows (commission shall not be divided except among members, or with recognized sharebrokers beyond Christchurch):—

On debentures of every description	$\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.
On shares other than mining	$1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.
On mining shares sold, up to 6d. per share	$\frac{1}{2}$ d.
.. .. over 6d. and up to 2s.	$\frac{1}{2}$ d.
.. .. over 2s. 6d. and up to	1d.
.. .. 3s. 4d.	1d.
.. .. over 3s. 4d. and up to 10s.	$1\frac{1}{2}$ d.
.. .. over 10s.	$1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.
On syndicate shares	$2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

45. A minimum charge of 5s. on any transaction. Buyers pay stamp duty and transfer fees. A penalty, not exceeding £50 or less than £10, shall be inflicted for any breach of the above tariff. Rates of brokerage chargeable to both buyer and seller. The Committee to decide from time to time what may be classified as syndicate shares.

BIDS.

46. Offers to buy or sell shares, scrip, or stock shall be definite as to number and price, and remain open until the line be passed by the Reader. Any dispute arising between members as to sale or purchase of any stock during the reading of the list shall be settled by the Chairman, whose decision shall be final.

SETTLEMENTS AND DELIVERIES.

47. When sales are effected, the selling member must deliver the documents within ten days from 12 o'clock on the day of sale, except in the case of Tasmanian and Australian stocks, when twenty days shall be allowed, unless a special time for delivery is stated at the time of sale. If the documents are not delivered in accordance with this rule, the buying member shall (subject to his having given not less than twenty-four hours' notice to the Chairman of the Exchange, dating from noon of the day on which notice is given, of his intention so to do) have the right to purchase or buy the said shares through the Chairman on 'Change on the following or any subsequent day within the period of six weeks from date of the original purchase, and at the risk of the seller.

48. If a buyer does not claim, in writing, delivery of documents within six weeks from the date of purchase, or, in the case of a time bargain, within six weeks after the date agreed upon for completion, it shall be optional with the seller to complete or not.

49. If a seller does not tender delivery of documents within the regulation number of days, or, in the case of a time bargain, within the time agreed upon, the buyer may refuse to take delivery by giving the seller twenty-four hours' notice in writing of his intention so to do. It being understood that the buyer must take delivery of the shares if tendered within the said twenty-four hours. Any twenty-four hour notice required to be given under these rules shall not, however, include Saturday or Sunday, or Stock Exchange or Bank holidays; and, if six weeks shall have lapsed, it shall be optional with the buyer whether he completes or not.

BUYERS' NAMES.

50. The buying member must, if required, supply the name of the buyer within seventy-two hours computed from hour of sale. If this is not done, it shall be competent for the selling member to insert the name of the buying member.

MEMBERS LEAVING CALL.

51. No member shall leave the Exchange Room at any ordinary daily meeting until the Chairman has declared the ordinary business closed, without the express sanction of the meeting, under penalty not exceeding £20. Any member going out during a meeting shall not be allowed to re-enter during the same meeting, except with the express sanction of the meeting; and any member impeding business, either by attempting to deal in shares, scrip, stock, bonds, or debentures out of their turn, or by conversation not relevant to the subject before the meeting, or by any noisy, disorderly, or improper conduct whatever, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £1, and for each repetition of the offence shall be liable to a further fine not exceeding £1, or he may be suspended for a period not exceeding three months, or he may thereupon immediately be expelled from the meeting. Such fines, penalties, suspensions, and expulsions to be inflicted or imposed by the Chairman, subject, however, to an immediate appeal to the members present in the room, whose decision shall be final. No member so fined shall be entitled to attend the room, or to take his seat, or have any of the rights of membership, until all fines and penalties inflicted upon him are paid, and his suspension, if any, removed.

TELEGRAMS.

52. Telegrams and other written communications may be received by members during business meetings, but no messages shall be sent out during such meetings.

MINIMUM FOR QUOTATIONS.

53. No sales of shares shall be reported of less amount than £50 or of less than 100 shares, if the amount of such sales be under the value of £50, or, in respect of mining shares other than coal, sales of 50 shares or to the value of £25.

CHALLENGING QUOTATIONS.

54. If any quotation of sale be challenged at the daily meetings of members, the Chairman of the day shall accompany the member whose quotation is doubted to his office, and shall there satisfy himself by examination of the books or papers of such member as to the *bona fides* of the quotation, and shall report the result either to the Executive Committee in the first instance or direct to the members in daily meeting assembled, as to him shall seem fit. Any member refusing to allow the Chairman a full inspection of his books and documents shall be treated as guilty of making a false quotation, and dealt with as contumacious.

QUOTATIONS.

55. The prices made shall be binding on members making them to the extent of £50 value of such stock, or of 100 shares if the value be under £50, or £25 for mining shares other than coal. Any offer of or for stock or shares on 'Change must be considered as offered publicly.

56. No member can demand a quotation for stock which is not and has never been on the list.

DELIVERY AND SETTLEMENT.

57. As between members the seller shall deliver to the buyer separate transfers of scrip representing the exact number of shares sold in each separate sale. Transfers requiring scrip must be delivered with scrip, or the transfers marked as correct by the institution to which the stock sold relate, or marked as correct by the Secretary, provided the scrip are lodged with him to be forwarded to the company for registration of the transfer.

58. A member selling shares or stocks is responsible for the genuineness and regularity of all documents delivered until reasonable time has been allowed to the transferee to execute and duly lodge such documents for verification and registration. In case of dispute what is reasonable time shall be fixed by the Executive Committee, but in no case (excepting that of fraud or proved misrepresentation) shall a member be liable for any loss sustained, unless he shall have received written notice within sixty days (or in the case of transactions in which transfer has to be completed in Europe within 130 days) of the date of the delivery of documents.

DIVIDENDS.

59. Transactions in shares shall be with dividend until the dividend is payable. When transfers or scrip are delivered subsequent to the declaration of dividend, but prior to the closing of the books of the company, and in sufficient time for the registration of the shares, the seller shall not be responsible for the dividend, and the buyer's claim shall be only upon the registered holder; but when no time is afforded to the buyer to register the shares in his own name, then the seller shall be responsible for the dividend.

DIVIDENDS *re* FORWARD SALES.

60. Dividends payable between the date of sales and maturity of time bargains, and between the date of sale and exercise of options, shall accrue to the buyer and be accounted for at the time of settlement of the bargain.

CALLS.

61. All calls due on date of sale shall be paid by the seller before delivery. A call shall be considered due upon the day on which it is struck. Calls becoming due between the date of sale and maturity of time bargains and between the date of sale and exercise of options, shall be paid by the buyer to the seller at the time of settlement of the bargain.

SCRIP.

62. Scrip shall be delivered with all calls paid to date marked thereon and certified thereto by the company or by the selling member at the option of the buyer, or the seller may attach the company's receipt for the call.

63. When one member of the Exchange purchases shares from another member and no buyer's name is asked for or supplied, the buying member shall be liable for all calls struck thereafter.

DISPUTES.

64. In cases of dispute the Exchange or any committee dealing with the same may appoint a subcommittee of two members to examine such books and documents of the disputants as they may consider necessary to enable them to make a reliable statement of facts to the committee.

65. Purchasers shall not be required to take delivery and pay for securities rendered after eleven o'clock on Saturdays and one o'clock on other days.

66. All transactions between members taking place outside the Exchange Room shall be subject to the rules and regulations of the Exchange.

67. Should it come to the knowledge of any member of this Exchange that a broker, either in Christchurch or elsewhere, has failed to meet his engagements, the said member must at once report the circumstances to the Chairman, who shall bring the matter before the Exchange at its first meeting, for decision as to what action shall be taken. Any member failing or neglecting to report to the Chairman as above specified shall be liable to be fined a sum not exceeding £200, or to be suspended at the option of the Exchange.

The total births in the four chief cities and their suburban boroughs amounted to 683, against 606 in August—an increase of 77. The deaths in September were 316—an increase of 78 as compared with last month. Of the total deaths males contributed 151, females 165. Sixty-five of the deaths were of children under five years of age, being 20.57 per cent. of the whole number; 48 of these were under one year of age.

There were 121 deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards in the four chief cities and their suburban boroughs, as against 94 in August. The following table shows the classification:—

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

Spencer Gulf.—Port Victoria Jetty Light.

MASTERS of vessels, pilots, and others are hereby informed that on and after the night of 15th September, 1913, the light which has hitherto been exhibited from the jetty, Port Victoria, will be discontinued, and from the same position will be shown a 6th-order port light on a cast-iron pillar, painted red, at an elevation of 25 ft. above H.W.S. tides, with the following characteristics, viz.: It will show red fixed, between the bearings of $165\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ (S. 19° E. mag.) and $63\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ (N. 59° E. mag.)—i.e., over Wardang Island and Eclipse Rock—and white fixed from $63\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ (N. 59° E. mag.) to $35\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ (N. 31° E. mag.), all bearings being from seaward. In ordinary clear weather the white light will be visible for a distance of nine miles, and the red light for a distance of six miles.

The white light showing through an arc of 196° is obscured on the landward side of the channel, the magnetic bearing of intersection of green and white being N. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. The white does not quite clear Two Hummock Spit by about one cable, but in a line with No. 2 beacon a vessel will pass well clear.

No. 2 beacon, at Bluff Reach, on the starboard hand, in 35 ft. at l.w., about $3\frac{1}{2}$ cables N.W. by W. of existing disc two-pile beacon.—The beacon is similar to that described above, and is painted red. The light is an "AGA" flashing white light, flashing 40 flashes per minute, its focal plane being 15 ft. above h.w. The light shows through an arc of 215° , and is obscured over Middle Bank and shallow water to eastward of channel. Safe navigable water exists with both Nos. 1 and 2 lights in view.

No. 3 beacon, at Commissariat Point, on the port hand, in 19 ft. at l.w.—The beacon is similar in construction to those previously described, and is painted black. The light is an "AGA" flashing green light, flashing 40 flashes per minute, with its focal plane 15 ft. above h.w., and showing through an arc of 195° , obscured on the landward side of the channel and indicating safe navigable water with both Nos. 2 and 3 lights in view.

No. 4 beacon, at Snapper Reach, on the starboard hand, in 24 ft. at l.w.—The beacon is similar to those previously described, and is painted red. The light is similar to No. 3, except that it is red and shows through an arc of 215° , and is obscured on the landward side of the channel, indicating safe navigable water with both Nos. 3 and 4 lights in view.

No. 5 beacon, east of Curlew Island, on the port hand, in 18 ft. at l.w., about 200 ft. from existing gridiron beacon.—The beacon and light are similar to No. 3, except that the light shows through an arc of 235° , obscured on the landward side of the channel, and indicating navigable water with both Nos. 4 and 5 lights in view.

No. 6 beacon, north of Curlew Island, on the port hand, in 16 ft. at l.w.; approximately two cables north of Curlew Island.—The beacon and light are similar to No. 3, except that the light shows through an arc of 210° , and is obscured over the landward side of the channel.

No. 7 beacon, north of Curlew Point, on the starboard hand, in 18 ft. at l.w.; approximately 600 ft. S.E. of existing red disc two-pile beacon.—The beacon and light are similar to No. 4, and are both red, the light showing over an arc of 192° , and is obscured on the landward side of the channel.

No. 8 beacon, near Orchard Point, on the starboard hand, in 19 ft. at l.w., about two cables N.W. of existing red disc two-pile beacon.—The beacon and light are similar to No. 4, except that the light shows through an arc of 198° , and is obscured over the landward side of the channel.

No. 9 beacon (front leading), near Brown's Point, on the starboard hand, in 22 ft. at l.w.—The beacon and light are red, and similar to No. 4, except that the light shows through an arc of 215° , flashing 60 times per minute, and when in line with its back beacon (No. 10) indicates the centre of the channel in a southerly direction. It shows white over a sector of 10° between No. 11 and the shallow water off Brown's Point, so that vessels passing outwards on the line of Nos. 11 and 10 leads may steer for it when the light changes to white.

No. 10 beacon (back leading), 800 ft. distant from No. 9.—The beacon is similar to those previously described, but is 12 ft. higher, and painted white. The light is white, flashing 120 times per minute, its focal plane is 27 ft. above h.w., and when in line with Nos. 9 or 11 indicates the centre of the channel.

No. 11 beacon (front leading), at Brown's Point, on the starboard hand, in 20 ft. at l.w.—The beacon and light are red, and similar to No. 9, the light showing through an arc of 215° at an elevation of 15 ft. above h.w., and when in line with No. 10 indicates the centre of the channel in a north-westerly direction. It shows white over a sector of 8° between No. 9 and the shallow water off Brown's Point, and vessels passing inwards on the line of Nos. 9 and 10 leads may leave the line of leads and steer for No. 11 when it changes to white.

No. 12 beacon, on the starboard hand, about $6\frac{1}{2}$ cables from south end of wharf, in 18 ft. at l.w.—The beacon and light are red, and similar to No. 4, the light showing through an arc of 200° , and is obscured on the landward side of the channel.

No. 13 beacon, on the starboard hand, about $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables from the southern end of the wharf, in 12 ft. at l.w.—The beacon and light are red, and similar to No. 4, the light showing through an arc of 204° , and is obscured on the landward side of the channel.

NOTE.—Where the beacons have been placed near the buoys (hitherto shown on chart) at Nos. 3, 4, 6, and 7, the buoys have been removed. A new chart showing all marks from Douglas Bank to Port Augusta wharf, with the necessary sailing directions, will be issued at once by the Marine Board of South Australia.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

BURRARD INLET.—VANCOUVER HARBOUR.—BURNABY SHOAL.—POSITION OF LIGHT AND FOG-BELL.—Information has been received that the wooden float carrying an electric light and fog-bell, moored on Burnaby Shoal, Vancouver Harbour, British Columbia, is located about 300 ft. south-eastward of its old position and no longer marks the northern edge of the shoal. This change was made necessary because it was found that in its old position the float was liable to be fouled and damaged by tows or carried away by the strong tides.

The red spar buoy marking the northern edge of the shoal is still in position, but on account of its liability of being fouled it is not to be implicitly relied upon.

CARDERO CHANNEL.—GRIFFITHS ISLAND.—LIGHT ESTABLISHED.—On 18th June, 1913, an unwatched intermittent white acetylene light was established on the western end of Griffiths Island, Cardero Channel, British Columbia.

BRAZIL.

STANDARD TIME ADOPTED.—Information has been received from the American Ambassador at Rio de Janeiro that standard time, referred to the meridian of Greenwich, has been adopted in Brazil. The Republic of Brazil is divided into four zones. The first zone includes the archipelago of Fernando Noronha and the Island of Trinidad, in which the standard time is 2 hours earlier than that of Greenwich. The second zone includes the whole sea-coast of Brazil, and in this zone the standard time adopted is 3 hours earlier than at Greenwich.

Two other zones in which the time is 4 and 5 hours earlier than at Greenwich cover the interior and western portions of the country.

NORTH COAST.—PARA RIVER ENTRANCE.—TIJOCA BANK.—SHOALS TO WESTWARD.—Capt. H. O. Te Makarini Scholarships, held at Te Aute College, Hawke's Bay.

SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF, NEAR SUMNER, CHRISTCHURCH.

UNDER THE CONTROL AND SUPERVISION OF THE EDUCATION DEPARTMENT.

Director: MR. J. E. STEVENS.

FOR Deaf Children of sound intellect. The pupils are taught to understand and use ordinary speech. The full charge for board and education is £40 a year, but less is accepted from parents who cannot afford to pay this amount. In case of necessity admission is free.

By the Education Act it is compulsory for deaf children to come under instruction at the age of six, and to continue until the age of twenty-one unless the Education Department previously grants exemption. Though a child is, as a rule, best fitted to begin the school course at the age of six, advice should be obtained as soon as any sign of deafness is observed.

The following classes of deaf children are admitted to the School for the Deaf (sound intellect being always a necessity):—

1. Children born deaf, or who have lost their hearing before learning to speak.
2. Children who can hear a little, but are too deaf to be taught in a public school.
3. Children who have lost their hearing after having learned to speak.

The Act imposes upon every parent, teacher of a school (either public or private), constable, or officer of a charitable or kindred institution who is aware of the place of residence (either temporary or permanent) of a deaf child, and the householder in whose house any such child resides, an obligation to send notification of the fact to the Minister of Education, giving the name, age, and address of the child; and any neglect or failure to comply with this provision involves liability to a fine.
