HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS subsection one of section fifty of the Native Land Act, 1909, enacts that at any time and from time to time, on application made *ex parte* or otherwise by any person interested, the Chief Judge may, if he thinks fit, on being satisfied that the applicant has shown a *prima facie* case of error, whether of fact or law, in any final order of the Native Land Court, grant leave to the applicant to appeal to the Appellate Court against that order, notwithstanding the fact that, owing to lapse of time or for any other reason, the applicant has no appeal as of right to that Court:

And whereas subsection two of that section further enacts that, save with the precedent consent of the Governor in Council, leave to appeal shall not be granted by the Chief Judge under this section unless application for same is made within five years after the making of the order appealed from:

And whereas application has been made to His Honour the Chief Judge of the Native Land Court to grant leave to appeal against the decision of the Native Land Court dated the twenty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, in respect of the

definition of relative interests of the owners of Taupara Block: And whereas it is expedient that such leave to appeal should be granted:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred upon him by subsection two of section fifty of the Native Land Act, 1909, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby consent to the Chief Judge granting the applicant leave to appeal as aforesaid. And it is hereby declared that this Order in Council is made under the provisions in that behalf of the Native Land Act, 1909, and shall operate accordingly as a consent of the Governor in Council to the proceedings hereby authorized.

Education Amendment Act, 1912.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this twenty-ninth day of October, 1913.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities vested in him by the Education Act, 1908, and its amendments, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby make the regulations hereto annexed; and, with the like advice and consent, doth prescribe that this Order shall come into force on the date of the first publication thereof in the *New Zealand Gazette*.

REGULATIONS FOR PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND MILITARY DRILL.

1. *Physical Drill*.—The physical drill for all boys and girls attending public schools shall consist of such suitable exercises as are contained in the "Syllabus of Physical Exercises" issued by the Board of Education, Whitehall, London, and in any appendices or notes thereto or in any abstracts thereof that may be issued from time to time with the authority of the Minister of Education.

2. *Time to be allotted to the Subject*.—At least one period of not less than fifteen minutes during school hours in each day

should be devoted to physical drill; and, in addition, a breathing exercise should be given at the close of each hour or lesson period in every class of the school.

3. *Junior Cadet Corps*.—In public schools in which there was, prior to 1st January, 1913, a duly equipped Junior Cadet corps or detachment, such corps or detachment may be recognized for the purposes of instruction in military drill under the conditions hereinafter prescribed.

4. A corps shall contain not less than forty-eight boys who are pupils of the school; a detachment not less than ten; provided that if any corps or detachment shall for twelve months fall below ten the corps or detachment shall be disbanded. No boy shall be included on the roll of any corps or detachment who is less than twelve years of age, or more than fourteen years of age, unless he is still on the roll of the public school, or in the case of a district high school on the roll of the primary department of such school.

5. There must be a qualified instructor on the staff of the school in charge of the corps. For the purpose of this clause an instructor shall be held to be qualified if—

(a.) He holds a commission in the Defence Forces or in the Senior Cadets.

(b.) He was gazetted as an officer in the Junior Cadets before 1st January, 1913.

6. Instructors qualified under paragraph (b) of clause 5 hereof may not wear uniform unless they are also qualified under paragraph (a).

7. Applications for recognition for such corps or detachments must be sent before 31st December, 1913, to the Secretary of the Education Board, who shall, if the Board approves thereof, forward them to the Director of Physical Education before 31st January, 1914.

8. *Rifle Shooting*.—Pellets or cartridges, as the case may be, may on application through the Education Board be issued to any recognized corps or detachment that is provided with the necessary equipment for target practice.

Order prohibiting the Importation into Niue Island of certain Perfumed Spirits and Perfumery except under Conditions.

LIVERPOOL, Governor.

WHEREAS by section seventeen, subsection (b), of the Cook Islands Government Act, 1908, it is provided that the Governor may from time to time, by Warrant or Order, prohibit, either absolutely or subject to such conditions as he thinks fit, the importation into the said Islands of arms or other munitions of war, intoxicating liquors, opium, or any other article of any kind which in his opinion is likely to be injurious to the inhabitants thereof; and by subsection (c) of the said section seventeen it is further provided that the Governor may impose fines for the breach of any such Warrant or Order, and may make provision for the recovery of any such fine by forfeiture of the ship or goods, or otherwise: And whereas in the opinion of the Governor the importation of certain perfumed spirits and perfumery into Niue Island except under conditions is likely to be injurious to the inhabitants thereof by reason of their using the same as drink of an intoxicating nature:

Now, therefore, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities vested in me by the said Act, and of every other power and authority enabling me in this behalf, do hereby order that, from and after the date of the publication of this Order in the *New Zealand Gazette*, the importation of the following perfumed spirits or perfumery—into wit, Florida-water, eau-de-Cologne, lavender-water, and bay-rum, or any colourable imitation thereof respectively—into Niue Island shall be prohibited except subject to the following conditions:—

1. Any person desiring to import any of the said perfumed spirits or perfumery shall apply in writing to the Resident Commissioner at Niue for permission so to do, and such application shall state the amount of such perfumed spirits or perfumery proposed to be imported. The said Resident Commissioner may thereupon, if he thinks fit, give permission in writing for such importation.

2. All perfumed spirits or perfumery imported pursuant to such permission shall be imported in separate packages addressed to the importer (being the person so applying for permission to import) through the said Resident Commissioner.

3. Perfumed spirits or perfumery so imported may, as the said Resident Commissioner thinks expedient, either be delivered to the importer or be stored in the King's bond or some other place of safe custody under the control of the said Resident Commissioner for delivery to the importer from time to time in such quantities as the said Resident Commissioner thinks fit; provided that delivery shall not be given until all duties and charges payable to the Crown have been duly paid.

4. Every person or his agent importing perfumed spirits or perfumery in accordance with this Order, and every person selling such perfumed spirits or perfumery, shall keep a full and true account of all such perfumed spirits or perfumery sold by him, showing the date when and the person to whom such perfumed spirits or perfumery were sold. Such account shall be open for inspection by the said Resident Commissioner at any time.

5. Any person importing any of the aforesaid perfumed spirits or perfumery except in accordance with the provisions hereof, or any person contravening in any way the provisions of this Order, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding

fifty pounds, to be recovered in the Resident Commissioner's Court at Niue, and in addition the said Resident Commissioner may seize and forfeit for the benefit of the Crown all perfumed spirits or perfumery imported contrary to the provisions of this Order.

Regulations for the Manufacture, Use, and Sale of Methylated Spirits.

Department of Trade and Customs,
Wellington, 28th October, 1913.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in me by subsection (10) of section 35 of the Customs Law Act, 1908, I, Francis Marion Bates Fisher, the Minister of Customs for the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby revoke all regulations previously made under the authority of the said subsection (10) of section 35 of the said Act, and in lieu thereof do hereby prescribe the following regulations for the manufacture, use, and sale of methylated spirits:—

REGULATIONS.

1. No spirits shall be methylated which are of a lower strength than 50 per cent. overproof.

2. No wood naphtha or pyridine shall be used for the purposes of methylation which have not been approved by the Secretary of Customs.

3. (1.) Samples of wood naphtha or pyridine to be submitted for approval must be drawn and sealed in the presence of an officer of Customs; the vessels containing the naphtha or pyridine must also be sealed prior to delivery from Customs control.

(2.) Samples must not be less in quantity than a half-pint, and must bear on the label the marks and numbers of the packages of importation, the name of the country of origin, and the initials of the officer in whose presence they were drawn.

4. No wood naphtha shall be approved which is of a less strength than 60 o.p. by Sikes hydrometer.

5. Pyridine must comply with the following tests:—

(a.) *Colour.*—The colour of the pyridine should not be darker than that of a solution of 2 cc. decinormal iodine solution per litre of distilled water.

(b.) *Behaviour towards Cadmium-chloride.*—10 cc. of a solution of 1 cc. pyridine-bases in 100 cc. water are treated with 5 cc. of a 5-per-cent. aqueous solution of water-free fused cadmium-chloride and vigorously shaken, and distinct crystalline separation must soon appear. 10 cc. of the same pyridine-base solution should give a white precipitate with 5 cc. of Nessler's reagent.

(c.) *Boiling-point.*—If 100 cc. of pyridine-bases are distilled in the following manner at least 90 cc. should have passed over at 140 deg. C. 100 cc. of pyridine are placed in a copper flask, with short neck, of 180–200 cc. capacity, and the flask placed on an asbestos plate with a circular opening of 30 mm. diameter. The flask bears a fractionating tube, 12 mm. wide and 170 mm. long, provided with a bulb. It is joined to a Liebig condenser by a side tube set in 1 centimetre above the bulb; the water envelope of the condenser should be at least 400 mm. long. In the upper opening of the fractionating tube an officially verified thermometer, showing the temperature range of 200 deg. C., is fixed so that its

mercury reservoir occupies the centre of the bulb. The distillation is so carried on that about 5 cc. of the distillate passes over per minute; the distillate is caught in a glass cylinder divided into cubic centimetres. At 140 deg. C. and normal barometer pressure of 760 mm. at least 90 cc. of distillate should have passed over. If the barometric pressure during the distillation is not 760 mm., a correction of 1 deg. C. must be applied for every 30 mm. difference: for example, at 770 mm. barometric pressure 90 cc. must have passed over at 140.3 deg. C., and at 750 mm. barometric pressure 90 cc. at 139.7 deg. C.

- (d.) *Miscibility with Water.*—20 cc. of pyridine must give with 40 cc. water a clear or only so slightly opalescent a mixture that printed matter after five minutes is still distinctly recognizable through a column of 15 cm. in depth.
- (e.) *Water-contents.*—On shaking together 20 cc. pyridine-bases with 20 cc. soda-lye of sp. gr. 1.4 at least 18.5 cc. of the bases should separate out after standing for some time.
- (f.) *Titration.*—1 cc. of pyridine-bases dissolved in 10 cc. water is treated with normal sulphuric acid until a drop of the mixture produces a distinct blue border on Congo paper, which soon disappears. Not less than 10 cc. solution should have been used for the appearance of this reaction. For the preparation of Congo paper, filter-paper is immersed in a solution of 1 g. Congo red per 1 litre of water and dried.

6. The following are the kinds of methylated spirit which may be manufactured:—

- (a.) Completely denatured spirit, for sale without restriction, made by the admixture of ingredients in the following proportions:—

Rectified spirit ..	100 gallons.
Approved wood naphtha ..	11 gallons.
Approved pyridine ..	From 2 to 4 pints, as may be determined by the Collector.

- (b.) Methylated "finish" without pyridine, for sale without restriction, consisting of rectified spirit mixed with 5 per cent. of approved wood naphtha, and at least 10 per cent. by weight of shellac, copal, or other resins, such resins having been dissolved to the satisfaction of the supervising officer before delivery.

Packages containing "finish" shall, prior to delivery, be distinctly marked "Methylated finish W.P." (without pyridine).

- (c.) (1.) Methylated spirit without pyridine shall be manufactured with 5 per cent. of approved wood naphtha, and shall not be made except (a) for use in furniture polishing or in similar industries, or (b) for the use of or delivery to a manufacturer of approved articles making such articles on his own premises.

(2.) Methylated spirit without pyridine for use in furniture polishing or in similar industries shall, before delivery, be distinctly marked "Methylated spirit W.P." (without pyridine) "for furniture polishing," and shall only be made in such limited quantity as the Collector may direct or permit.

(3.) Methylated spirit without pyridine, for furniture polishing, shall only be sold on the written guarantee of a *bona fide* furniture-polisher, or such other person as may be approved by the Collector, (and on conditions prescribed by him), that all such spirit from time to time sold or delivered to him shall be used and applied solely to furniture polishing, or such other uses as may be permitted by the Collector.

(4.) "Methylated spirit W.P. for furniture polishing," shall not be purchased or delivered in less quantity than 2 gallons at any one time, nor in greater quantity than 5 gallons in any week, unless upon special permit from the Collector.

(5.) Every manufacturer or holder for sale of methylated spirit W.P. for furniture polishing shall keep a book, which shall be open to inspection by any officer of Customs, in which he shall enter with respect to all such spirit the following particulars: (a) The quantity manufactured or purchased; (b) the date of manufacture or purchase; (c) the person to whom delivered; (d) the quantity delivered; (e) the date of delivery.

(6.) Methylated spirit without pyridine for the manufacture of approved articles shall, upon methylation, be distinctly marked "Methylated spirit W.P." (without pyridine).

(7.) Every holder of duty-paid "Methylated spirit W.P." shall provide a room or place of security approved by the Collector for the storage of such

spirit under the Crown lock. He shall also enter into a bond with two sufficient sureties, in the form provided, and shall undertake not to sell or dispose of any unmanufactured or partially manufactured product containing "Methylated spirit W.P."

(8.) Every manufacturer of articles approved under these regulations shall keep a book, in which he shall enter all "Methylated spirit W.P." received by him immediately on receipt thereof; he shall also, immediately upon delivery from Customs control, enter the quantity of spirit used to dissolve or treat such materials as are enumerated in paragraphs 9 and 10, or such other materials as may from time to time be permitted.

(9.) "Methylated spirit W.P." for the manufacture of varnishes, lacquers, and polishes shall be mixed with and have in solution, before delivery from Customs control, at least 2 per cent. by weight of either shellac, copal, resin, or other material approved by the Minister. Spirit so treated is not to be delivered until the materials added have had time to come into solution.

(10.) "Methylated spirit W.P." for the manufacture of veterinary medicines shall be mixed, while under Customs control, with the ingredients approved for such medicines, time being allowed before delivery for solution, percolation, or maceration where necessary.

(11.) Every manufacturer of veterinary medicines made with methylated spirit shall cause each packet containing the same, and every bottle, tin, or other receptacle filled upon or delivered from his premises for sale, to be distinctly labelled—

"For veterinary use. Made with methylated spirit."

(12.) The premises of every holder of "Methylated spirit W.P." shall be open to inspection by an officer of Customs, who shall be permitted to examine the book referred to in paragraph (8), and to check the balances shown therein with the stock of methylated spirit in hand.

- (d.) (1.) Spirit methylated by the addition of 1 per cent. of absolute phenol may be manufactured and sold for exclusive use in any public or private hospital, provided that a guarantee satisfactory to the Collector of Customs is given by the licensee of a private hospital, or the medical officer of a public hospital, that spirit delivered on such guarantee will be used exclusively for hospital purposes other than the compounding of medicines.

(2.) Every receptacle containing spirit methylated with phenol shall be distinctly marked with the words "Methylated spirit for exclusive use in hospitals."

(3.) The provisions of Regulations 6 (c) (5) and 6 (c) (7) shall, *mutatis mutandis*, apply to such methylated spirit for exclusive use in hospitals.

7. One shilling and sixpence per hour will be charged for the services of an officer of Customs when such services are required to supervise the manufacture or delivery of any methylated spirit, "finish," or veterinary medicines made in accordance with these regulations.

8. Every person who commits any breach of these regulations shall, except as otherwise provided for under the Customs Law Act, 1908, be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20.

CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA, ETC.

SYLLABUS OF ANY OPEN COMPETITIVE EXAMINATION FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA, CLERKSHIPS (CLASS I) IN THE HOME CIVIL SERVICE, AND EASTERN CADETSHIPS IN THE COLONIAL SERVICE THAT MAY BE HELD IN THE YEAR 1914, AND OF ANY OTHER COMPETITION THAT MAY BE HELD IN COMBINATION THEREWITH.

IN view of the importance of legible handwriting in the public service, candidates are warned that the provision as to deductions for bad handwriting in these competitions will be strictly enforced.

Candidates are warned that full marks cannot be obtained on any paper unless the whole of it is answered, or, in cases where the number of questions to be answered is specified, unless the full number specified is answered.

English Composition.—An essay to be written on one of several specified subjects.

Sanskrit Language and Literature.—Translation from Sanskrit; composition in Sanskrit; Sanskrit literature,

including the life, thought, and antiquities of ancient India, together with such knowledge of history as bears upon the subject; questions on the Sanskrit language (including questions on philology).

Composition will be required in classical Sanskrit alone; elsewhere Vedic Sanskrit is also included.

Candidates are expected to make a special study of the Seventh Mandala of the Rig-veda, but other Vedic hymns may also be set in the examination.

Arabic Language and Literature.—Translation from Arabic; set composition and free composition in Arabic; Arabic literature, including the life and thought of the Arabs as shown in the literature, together with such knowledge of history as bears upon the subject; question on the Arabic language (including questions on philology).

Greek Literature.—Questions on the Greek language (including questions on philology) literature, and antiquities.

Latin Literature.—Questions on the Latin language (including questions on philology) and on Roman literature and antiquities.

English Language and Literature.—The examination will be in two parts. In the one candidates will be expected to show a general acquaintance with the course of English literature, as represented in the chief writers in verse and prose, between the reign of Edward III and the death of Queen Victoria.

A minute and detailed knowledge will not be looked for in this part of the examination, but its aim will be to test how far the candidates have studied at first hand the chief productions of the greatest English writers, and are acquainted with the leading characteristics of their thought and style, and with the place which each of them occupies in the history of English literature.

The other part of the examination will relate to one of the following periods, which will follow each other year by year in rotation:—

- Period I: 1360 to 1600 (Chaucer to Spenser).
- Period II: 1600 to 1660 (the later Elizabethans).
- Period III: 1660 to 1744 (the age of Dryden and Pope).
- Period IV: 1744 to 1800 (from the death of Pope to Cowper).
- Period V: 1800 to 1832 (nineteenth century writers to the death of Scott).
- Period VI: 1832 to 1892 (from the death of Scott to the death of Tennyson).

The examination in this part will require from the candidates a more minute acquaintance with the history of the English language and literature, as illustrated in the chief works produced in each period, and will be based to a considerable extent, but by no means exclusively, on certain books specified each year by the Commissioners. The names and other indications placed beside the dates are intended to suggest the general character of the literary development of the period, and, consequently, the natural limits of the examination. All the works of Shakespeare and Milton, for example, will be regarded as falling within the period 1600 to 1660; all the works of Wordsworth and Coleridge within the period 1800 to 1832; all the works of Carlyle, Landor, and Macaulay within the period 1832 to 1892.

For the year 1914, Period III (1600-1774) is prescribed, and the following are the specified books:—

- Dryden: Absalom and Achitophel, Part I; Don Sebastian; Essay of Dramatic Poesie; Preface to the Fables.
- Otway: Venice Preserved.
- Congreve: The Way of the World.
- Farquhar: The Beaux' Stratagem.
- Pope: Essay on Criticism; The Rape of the Lock; Epistle to Dr. Arbuthnot; Epistle to Augustus.
- Swift: Tale of a Tub; Gulliver's Travels.
- Addison: Essays from the Spectator (Arnold's Edition).
- Steele: Essays (Golden Treasury Series).
- Defoe: Journal of the Plague.
- Thomson: Winter; Castle of Indolence.
- Berkeley: Three Dialogues between Hylas and Philonous.

Italian: Translation, Composition, and Conversation.—In the conversation test importance is attached to pronunciation. The study of phonetics is an important aid to correctness of pronunciation.

Italian: History of the Language and Literature.—Passages for translation may be set, and questions asked, demanding a knowledge of the language in its early stages; but it will not be obligatory upon candidates to master in detail the old forms in use before the time of Dante. Candidates will not be required to write their answers in Italian.

French: Translation, Composition, and Conversation.—In the conversation test importance is attached to pronunciation. The study of phonetics is an important aid to correctness of pronunciation.

French: History of the Language and Literature.—Passages for translation may be set, and questions asked

demanding a knowledge of the language in its early stages; but it will not be obligatory upon candidates to master in detail the old forms in use before 1500. Candidates will not be required to write their answers in French.

German: Translation, Composition, and Conversation.—In the conversation test importance is attached to pronunciation. The study of phonetics is an important aid to correctness of pronunciation.

German: History of the Language and Literature.—Passages for translation may be set, and questions asked, demanding a knowledge of the language in its early stages; but it will not be obligatory upon candidates to master in detail the old forms in use before 1500. Candidates will not be required to write their answers in German.

Lower Mathematics.—Plane geometry, including conic sections; solid geometry, including the method of orthogonal projection; algebra and plane trigonometry; elementary plane co-ordinate geometry; elementary mechanics of solids and fluids; geometrical optics; elements of differential and integral calculus, with simple illustrations from other branches of the subject. The questions may involve the use of drawing instruments. The use of the slide rule is allowed.

Higher Mathematics.—Higher algebra (including theory of equations), plane and spherical trigonometry, differential calculus, integral calculus, differential equations, analytical geometry (plane and solid), statics (including attractions), dynamics of a particle, rigid dynamics, hydrodynamics, the mathematical theory of electricity and magnetism. The questions may involve the use of drawing instruments. The use of the slide rule is allowed.

Chemistry, Physics, Geology, Botany, Zoology, Animal Physiology.—Candidates are warned that the practical examinations carry a large proportion of the marks.

*Geography.**—The history of geographical ideas and methods.

The construction and use of the more familiar map-projections. A general knowledge of the methods of exploratory surveying.

The characteristics and cartographical analysis of the physical regions of the world. The configuration of the continents and of the bed of the ocean. The characteristics and distribution of typical land-forms. The circulation of air and water. The climatic characteristics of different parts of the earth. The distribution of plant and animal associations.

The classification and distribution of the races of mankind. Past and present lines of communication. The influence of geographical environment (physical features and other natural conditions) upon the habits, arts, industries, social organization, and, generally, the political and economical development of the more important existing peoples.

There will be a practical test which will necessitate a knowledge of cartographical methods and notations, and for this test drawing instruments may be required.

Greek History.—Questions (a) on the general and (b) on the constitutional history of Greece to the death of Alexander. Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of the original authorities. They must also be prepared to answer questions on historical geography, and to draw sketch-maps.

Roman History.—Questions (a) on the general and (b) on the constitutional history of Rome to the death of Trajan. Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of the original authorities. They must also be prepared to answer questions on historical geography, and to draw sketch-maps.

English History.—The subject will include (a) the political history of the British Isles and the colonies; (b) the constitutional history of England. Candidates should be acquainted with the following authorities:—

Period I, to 1485. Stubbs, *Select Charters* (Clarendon Press).

Period II, 1485 to 1848. Prothero, *Statutes and Constitutional Documents* (Clarendon Press). Gardiner, *Documents of the Puritan Revolution* (Clarendon Press).

In each period the number of marks assigned to the question or questions dealing with the text of the prescribed books will be about one-sixth of that assigned to the whole period. Candidates must be prepared to answer questions on historical geography, and to draw sketch-maps.

General Modern History.—Candidates may, at their choice, be examined in any one of the following periods. Periods III, IV, and V will include Indian history.

Candidates are warned that high marks will not be awarded in this subject unless the text of the prescribed

* The syllabus of geography for 1915 will be: Geography as understood in the universities, not excluding topics which concern geography jointly with other subjects such as economics, history, physics, botany, and geology. English Law.—Law of contract; law of evidence; law of the Constitution; criminal law; law of torts.

The following applies only to Candidates for Clerkships on the Establishment of the Foreign Office, for Attachés in the Diplomatic Service, and for Student Interpreterships in China, Japan, and Siam:—

Spanish: Translation, Composition, and Conversation.—In the conversation test importance is attached to pronunciation. The study of phonetics is an important aid to correctness of pronunciation.

Spanish: History of the Language and Literature.—Passages for translation may be set, and questions asked

demanding a knowledge of the language in its early stages; but it will not be obligatory upon candidates to master in detail the old forms in use before 1500. Candidates will not be required to write their answers in Spanish.

EXAMINATIONS FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.

An open competitive examination for admission to the Civil Service of India will be held in London, under the subjoined regulations, commencing on the 1st August, 1914.

The number of persons to be selected at this examination will be announced hereafter.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received on or before the 1st June, 1914, an application on the prescribed form, a copy of which is sent herewith. No allegation that an application form or a letter respecting such form has been lost or delayed in the post will be considered by the Commissioners unless the person making such allegation produces a post-office certificate of posting. Candidates, who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk.

Acknowledgments of such application forms are sent, and any candidate who has filled up and returned the printed application form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within four complete days should at once write to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, Burlington Gardens, London W. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the candidate of any claim to consideration.

The order for admission to the examination will be posted early in July, 1914, to the address given on the form of application. It will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates will be required to attend and as to the manner in which the fee (£6) is to be paid.

REGULATIONS.

** The following regulations, made by the Secretary of State for India in Council, are liable to alteration from year to year.

1. An examination for admission to the Civil Service of India, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in August of each year for such number of appointments to that Service as the Secretary of State may on each occasion determine. The date of the examination and the number of appointments to be made for each province will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners.

2. No person will be deemed qualified who shall not satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners,—

- (i.) That he is a natural-born subject of His Majesty.
- (ii.) That he had attained the age of twenty-two and had not attained the age of twenty-four on the 1st day of August of the year in which the examination is held.

[N.B.—In the case of Natives of India it will be necessary for a candidate to obtain a certificate of age and nationality issued under Notification of the Government of India, No. 2252, dated 21st August, 1888, as amended by Notification No. 404, dated 19th May, 1898, and signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the province, or the Commissioner of the division, within which his family resides, or, should he reside in a Native State, by the highest political officer accredited to the State in which his family resides.

- (iii.) That he has no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Civil Service of India.*
- (iv.) That he is of good moral character.

3. No person who, in a previous year, accepted the offer of a nomination as a selected candidate for the Civil Service of India, and subsequently resigned his position as a selected candidate, will be admitted to the examination.

4. Should the evidence upon the above points be *prima facie* satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the examination. The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of the certificate of qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such inquiries, in the case of any candidate, should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Civil Service of India, and, if already selected, will be removed from the position of a probationer.

* The Civil Service Commissioners will regard no person as constitutionally fitted for appointment to the Civil Service of India who has not been satisfactorily vaccinated within the last seven years.

From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

Consistently with the limitations specified above, candidates are at liberty to name any of the foregoing subjects, provided that the maximum number of marks that can be obtained from the subjects chosen is limited to 6,000. If this maximum is exceeded by a candidate's selection he will be required to indicate one of his subjects the marks for which should in his case be reduced so as to bring his maximum marks within the prescribed limit. The marks so reduced will be subject to a correspondingly reduced deduction.

Moreover, if a candidate's handwriting is not easily legible, a further deduction will on that account be made from the total marks otherwise accruing to him.†

6. A list of the competitors shall be made out in order of their proficiency as disclosed by the aggregate marks finally awarded to each competitor, and in that order so many competitors, up to the determined number of appointments, as are found by the Civil Service Commissioners to be qualified by examination shall be designated to be selected candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided that they appear to be duly qualified in other respects. Should any selected candidate become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled or not. In the former case the candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified shall be deemed to be a selected candidate.

* A syllabus defining the character of the examination in the various subjects may be obtained on application to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London W.

† It is notified for general information that the number of marks deducted for bad handwriting may be considerable.

7. Selected candidates, before proceeding to India, will be on probation for one year, at the end of which time they will undergo an examination, called the final examination, in the following compulsory subjects* :—

In Hindustani the candidate will be required to be acquainted with both the Persian and the Nagari character.

A candidate assigned to Bengal or Assam, whose mother tongue is Bengali, must offer for examination Hindustani; a candidate assigned to Bombay, whose mother tongue is Marathi, must offer for examination Hindustani; and a candidate assigned to Madras, whose mother tongue is either of the languages shown against his province, must offer the other for examination.

No candidate who offered Sanskrit or Arabic at the open competition may offer the same language at the final examination, and only candidates assigned to the Province of Burma may offer Hindustani as an optional subject.

9. In the final examination, as in the open competition, the merit of the candidates examined will be estimated by marks (which will be subject to deductions in the same way as the marks assigned at the open competition), and the number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it. The examination will be conducted on paper and *viva voce*, as may be deemed necessary.

If any candidate is prevented by sickness or any other adequate cause from attending such examination, the Commissioners may, with the concurrence of the Secretary of State for India in Council, allow him to appear at the final examination to be held in the following year, or at a special examination.

10. The selected candidates will also be tested during their probation as to their proficiency in riding.

The examinations in riding will be held as follows :—

- (1.) Shortly after the result of the open competitive examination has been declared, or at such time or times as the Commissioners may appoint during the course of the probationary year.
- (2.) Again at the time of the final examination. Candidates who may then fully satisfy the Commissioners of their ability to ride well and to perform journeys on horseback will be awarded from 100 to 200 marks, according to the degree of proficiency displayed, to be added to their marks in the final examination. Candidates who fail to obtain 100 marks, but are reported by the Civil Service Commissioners to have reached a minimum standard of proficiency in riding, and are certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, will, on their arrival in India, be subjected to such further tests in riding as may be prescribed by their Government, and shall receive no increase to their initial salary until they have passed such tests to the satisfaction of that Government.

A candidate who fails at the end of the year of probation to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that he has reached the minimum standard of proficiency in riding will be liable to have his name removed from the list of selected candidates.

* Instructions, showing the extent of the examination, will be issued to selected candidates as soon as possible after the result of the open competition is declared.

11. The selected candidates who, on examination, shall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in Regulation 7, and who shall have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character, conduct during the period of probation, and ability to ride, shall be certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, provided they shall comply with the regulations in force at the time for that service.

12. Persons desirous to be admitted as candidates must apply on forms, which may be obtained from "The Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners, London," at any time after the 1st December in the year previous to that in which the examination is to be held. No person will be admitted to the examination from whom the Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners has not received, on or before the 1st June (or, if that date should fall upon a Sunday or public holiday, then on or before the first day thereafter on which their office is open) in the year in which the examination is to be held, an application, in the handwriting of the candidate, on the prescribed form.

The Civil Service Commissioners are authorized by the Secretary of State for India in Council to make the following announcements :—

(1.) Selected candidates will be allotted to the various provinces upon a consideration of all the circumstances, including their own wishes; but the requirements of the public service will rank before every other consideration.

(2.) An allowance amounting to £150 will be given to any candidate who passes his probation at one of the universities or colleges which have been approved by the Secretary of State—viz., the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Dublin, Glasgow, Edinburgh, St. Andrew's, Aberdeen, and London (University College); Victoria University, Manchester.

This allowance will be paid to the selected candidate in four instalments on the following dates respectively: December 24th after his selection, March 25th, June 24th, and the date of his signing his covenant on being finally appointed to the Service.

With the final instalment an allowance on account of passage to India will be paid to each newly appointed civilian to the amount of £37 10s. for passage to Calcutta, Madras, or Bombay, and £43 for passage to Rangoon, the officer then making his own arrangements for his passage.

The payment of each of the first three instalments will be conditional on the receipt, by the Secretary of State, through the Civil Service Commissioners, of a certificate that the candidate has fulfilled up to date the requirements of the authorities, and shown satisfactory conduct at the authorized university or college; the fourth and final instalment will be paid as soon as the selected candidate has signed his covenant, and for its payment no certificate from the college authorities will be required.

The whole probation must ordinarily be passed at the same institution. Migration will not be permitted except for special reasons approved by the Secretary of State.

(3.) Each candidate will be required before receiving the first instalment of his allowance to execute an agreement binding himself and one surety, jointly and severally, to refund all moneys he may have received from the Secretary of State for India in the event of—

- (i.) His failure to pass the final examination within the time prescribed by the regulations, and to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners of his fitness for admission to the Civil Service of India; or
- (ii.) His subsequent failure to execute the usual covenant, and to proceed to India as and when he shall be directed by the Secretary of State for India.

(4.) All candidates obtaining certificates will be also required to enter into covenants by which, amongst other things, they will bind themselves to make such payments as under the rules and regulations for the time being in force they may be required to make towards their own pensions or for the pensions of their families. The stamps payable on these covenants amount to £1.

(5.) The seniority in the Civil Service of India of the candidates obtaining certificates will be determined according to the order in which they stand on the list resulting from the combined marks of the open competitive and final examinations.

(6.) Candidates obtaining certificates will be required to report their arrival in India within such period after the grant of their certificates of qualification as the Secretary of State may in each case direct.

(7.) Candidates who fail to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners at the final examination held in any year will be definitely rejected, and will not be allowed to present themselves for re-examination, unless it shall appear to the Secretary of State in Council, after reference to the Civil Service Commissioners, that such failure is due to circumstances wholly exceptional and beyond the control of the candidate.

EVIDENCE OF AGE TO BE REQUIRED FROM CANDIDATES FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.

Every candidate born in the United Kingdom should be prepared to produce, when required, a certificate from the Registrar-General of Births, Marriages, and Deaths, or from one of his provincial officers. This certificate may be obtained from the Registrar-General in London, Dublin, or Edinburgh, or from the Superintendent Registrar of the district in which the birth took place.

No other certificates will be accepted for this competition.

If open competitive examinations for the following services—*viz.*, Eastern cadetships in the colonial service; clerkships (Class I) in the Home Civil Service—should be held in 1914 concurrently with the open competitive examination for the Civil Service of India, candidates, duly eligible in respect of age, will be admitted to compete for any two or all three of these services, subject to the following conditions :—

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for Eastern cadetships.

(4.) All declarations of choice are irrevocable.

(5.) Candidates for all three or any two of the above-mentioned services will be required to pay a consolidated fee of £6.

* For the practical examination in chemistry candidates may bring any standard books on analysis, and for the practical examination in botany any standard flora. All books brought must be submitted to the presiding examiner for his approval. No written notes of any kind will be allowed.

† Candidates who may desire to enter the competitions for the Home and Colonial services should apply, about Easter next, to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London W., for the prescribed forms of application. The forms must reach the Secretary on or before the 1st June.

Te Makarini Scholarships, held at Te Aute College, Hawke's Bay.

TWO scholarships of the yearly value of £35, tenable for two years, are offered for competition. One of these scholarships, to be called the senior scholarship, is open to all Maori boys not over sixteen years of age at the end of the month preceding the date of the examination; the other, to be called the junior scholarship, is open to all Maori boys under fourteen years of age at the end of the month preceding the date of the examination who have attended a Native school or schools under the control of the Education Department, and whose attendance at school during the previous year is considered by the Inspector of Native Schools to have been satisfactory. The scholarships are open to Maori boys on the conditions laid down in the regulations of the Trustees of the Te Makarini Scholarships Fund, as printed in the Appendix to the Native Schools Code, 1908. The examination will be held at convenient centres on the 8th and 9th of December, 1913.

Candidates must, either directly or through their teachers, send notice to the Inspector of Native Schools, Education Department, Wellington, of their intention to present themselves for examination. Such notice must be posted so as to reach the Department not later than the 30th of September, 1913.

SUMMARY FOR SEPTEMBER.

Frequent westerly depressions passed in the south between the 1st and 13th of the month, on account of which very unsettled weather prevailed. Most of the rainfall occurred during this period, but except in the western districts of the South Island, and especially in the high country, no exceptional falls were recorded. On the 10th and 11th very boisterous conditions were experienced.

Between the 11th and 13th barometric pressure increased, and on the 14th extremely high pressure ruled over the North Island, a condition of affairs which persisted until the close of the month.

The passage of three slight disturbances to the southward was responsible for changeable and squally conditions in parts about the 17th, 21st, and 28th, but generally during the latter half of the month fair weather was the prevailing feature, although a considerable amount of haze and cloudiness was experienced.

The west coast and portions of the south-west districts of the South Island had an excessive rainfall, but in all other parts of the Dominion the total for the month was below normal. In the Hawke's Bay and Gisborne districts this deficiency was greatest, most stations here recording a little over half an inch, equal to only one-fifth of the average.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

All the sections are situated at the edge of the foot-hills lying to the west of the Piako River. The road access is from Morrinsville Railway-station, distant about twenty-four miles by the Morrinsville-Waitakaruru Road, which is formed for dray traffic for the whole distance. The Waikaka Tramway Road, which is at the present time under construction, leads to the Piako River, one mile and thirty chains from the eastern boundary of the block. At this point on the river there is a wharf, to which launches from Thames (about twenty-three miles down the river) deliver goods at regular intervals. The road to Waitakaruru, twenty miles from the Waikaka Tramway Road, is formed for dray traffic for about eight miles, after which there is a riding-track for about four miles, the balance being formed dray-road. The gap of four miles of unformed road is at the present time under construction, and the major part will probably be completed during the year.

The land consists of partially drained swamp land and several dry spurs. The spurs are situated along the Morrinsville-Waitakaruru Road, and have a light soil, resting on a clay subsoil. Adjacent to the spurs are several rich alluvial flats, which are covered with cabbage-trees, manuka, and flax; but the majority of the sections consist of good and inferior peaty swamp, varying in depth at the present time from a few inches to several feet, and resting on timber and a clay subsoil. The sections are all situated above flood-level, and average from 10 ft. to 80 ft. above sea-level.

Sections 31 and 32 are covered with flax, rushes, and small manuka, the formation being rich peat on Section 31 and inferior on the frontage of Section 32. Sections 33 to 36 and 23 to 30 are covered with flax, manuka, kamaka, cabbage-trees, and scrub, the soil being of a rich peaty nature, resting on a clay subsoil on timber. On Sections 33, 34, and 35 there is a small patch of kahikatea and pukatea bush. The frontage to the Patetonga Road of Sections 37 to 41 is good, consisting of shallow peat, resting on clay and timber, whilst the back of these sections runs into deeper peat country. The vegetation on these sections consists of flax, raupo rushes, and scrub. Sections 42 to 50 are of excellent quality, the frontages to the Patetonga Road being all shallow peaty soil, resting on a clay subsoil and timber. Further back the country is alluvial, whilst the frontage to the main Morrinsville Road consists of several low-lying easy spurs, covered with fern and manuka, the soil being light, on a clay subsoil. With the exception of Sections 46 and 50, all the sections have a small area of kahikatea and pukatea bush, the balance of the sections, except the spurs, being covered with manuka, flax, cabbage-trees, makaka, and rushes.

All the necessary main drains and roads to sections have either been constructed or are under construction, and the same applies to all necessary bridges and culverts. There are main outlet drains along each road, whilst in addition there are two large outlet drains, one being situated on the reserve along northern boundary of Section 37, and the other along the southern boundary of Section 41. In addition there is a small drain along the southern boundaries of Sections 42 and 43 and 44 and 45; also along the western and southern boundaries of Section 50. It is intended to construct drains on the southern boundaries of Sections 38 and 40.

The Waikaka Outlet Drain, on the reserve between Sections 36, 31, 32, and 37, carries good water from the Waikaka Stream all the year round; consequently a good supply of water can be obtained for stock. In addition, good water can also be obtained from the subdivisional drain on the southern boundary of Section 50, as this drain taps a creek rising in the hills.

At Waikaka there is a store and post-office, known as Patetonga, which has telegraphic communication with Thames over a private line. The nearest school and creamery is at Tahuna, some eight miles distant by formed road. A village (to be known as Patetonga) is now being laid out in the vicinity of the lands to be offered, and in due course will be put up for public auction. Creamery and school sites are laid off in this vicinity.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS.

The lands are offered for selection subject to the following special conditions:—

(3.) The Department reserves the right from time to time to take any timber necessary for culverts, tram-lines, &c., from any section, and also to take any manuka, &c., for fascines.

SPECIAL ORDER MAKING BY-LAW CONTROLLING MOTOR TRAFFIC AND TRACTION-ENGINE TRAFFIC ON A CERTAIN PORTION OF THE WHATAWHTA TO RAGLAN ROAD (KNOWN AS THE DEVIATION ROAD).—No. 9.

WHEREAS the body corporate called the Chairman, Councillors, and Inhabitants of the County of Raglan is satisfied that the use of motor-cars and traction-engines (as herein defined) upon the portion of road hereinafter referred to is or will be attendant with risk of danger to the public:

Now, therefore, the Council of the County of Raglan, in pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred upon it by the Counties Act, 1908, the Public Works Act, 1908, the Motor Regulation Act, 1908, and the respective amendments to the said Acts, and all other Acts and powers whatsoever it in this behalf enabling, doth hereby make and ordain by special order the by-law following, to come into force on the first day of December, 1913.

This by-law shall only apply to the following portion of the Whatawhtata to Raglan Road (known as the Deviation Road): From a point on such Deviation Road where it junctions with Heddons Road to the Waitetuna Bridge on the said Deviation Road.

1. No person or persons shall, from and after the first day of December, 1913, engage, use, employ, or drive, or cause to be engaged, used, employed, or driven, any motor-car or traction-engine on the portion of the road between Whatawhtata and Raglan (known as the Deviation Road) set out herein at a greater speed than five miles per hour.

2. Any person driving a motor-car or traction-engine upon the said portion of the said road shall, upon meeting any person riding or driving any horse or horses, or driving stock, take or drive such motor-car or traction-engine to the outer edge of such road, and stop such motor-car or traction-engine,

and shall also stop the engine of such motor-car or traction-engine till such time as the person with the horse or horses has completely passed such motor-car or traction-engine, or, in the case of a person driving stock, till all the stock have completely passed such motor-car or traction-engine. If on meeting a person with horse or horses or with stock there is not sufficient room for the person with such animals to pass on the inner side of such road from the motor-car or traction-engine, then the driver of such motor-car or traction-engine shall back his motor-car or traction-engine, or cause the same to be driven backwards, to such a place and at such a distance away as will enable the person with such horse or horses or stock to pass on such inner side of such road.

3. Every person driving a motor-car or traction-engine on the said portion of the said road shall sound his horn or other mechanical warning at least twice when approaching any corner.

4. Every person driving a motor-car or traction-engine, or riding a bicycle, motor-cycle, triocycle, or similar vehicle upon any road or place within the county shall, on meeting or overtaking any person either on foot or riding any horse or driving any vehicle, ring his bell or give other warning before approaching within one chain of such person.

5. Every rider or driver of a horse, vehicle, motor-car, motor-cycle, bicycle, triocycle, or traction-engine or similar vehicle overtaking any stock being driven on any road shall, if so requested by the person in charge of such stock, wait before passing the said stock until the formation of the road will allow him to do so with safety to the stock being driven, and such rider or driver shall not pass them at other than a walking-pace if so requested by the person.

6. No person shall drive a motor-car or traction-engine over the said portion of the said road unless he or she has driven in ordinary use a motor-car or traction-engine for a period of at least twelve months.

7. A motor-car for the purpose of this by-law is hereby defined as: "Any vehicle propelled by mechanical power if it does not exceed four tons in weight unladen, whether such vehicle is used alone or in order to propel or draw one or more vehicles whose weight together with that of the motor vehicle does not exceed five tons unladen. In calculating for the purposes of this Act the weight of a vehicle unladen, the weight of any water, fuel, or accumulators used for the purpose of propulsion shall not be included."

"Traction-engine" shall include a motor of any description mounted on wheels, and having attached to it or drawn or propelled by it one or more wagons or vehicles to carry material of any description, and exceeding the weights hereinbefore mentioned as applying to the definition of motor-car.

8. Any person committing a breach of this by-law shall be deemed guilty of an offence, and shall be liable upon conviction to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

TE KUITI BOROUGH COUNCIL.

RESOLUTION MAKING SPECIAL RATE FOR TE KUITI BOROUGH SEWERAGE CONNECTIONS LOAN OF £1,000.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in it by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1908, the Local Bodies' Loans Act, 1908, and the several amendments thereof respectively, and of every other power in that behalf enabling it, the Te Kuiti Borough Council hereby resolves as follows:—

“That, for the purpose of providing the interest, sinking fund, and other charges on a loan of £1,000, authorized to be raised by the said Te Kuiti Borough Council, under the above-mentioned Acts, for the purpose of making advances to assist those owners of property within the sewerage area to connect their premises with the borough sewerage system, the said Te Kuiti Borough Council hereby makes and levies a special rate of one-twelfth of a penny in the pound upon the rateable value (being the capital value) of all rateable property within the Borough of Te Kuiti; and that such special rate shall be an annual-recurring rate during the currency of such loan, and be payable half-yearly on the fourth day of February and the fourth day of August in each and every year during the currency of such loan, being a period of fifteen years, or until the loan is fully paid off.”
