ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government Buildings, at Wellington, this thirteenth day of March, 1914.

Present :

THE HONOURABLE W. H. HERRIES PRESIDING IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the Judicature Amendment Act, 1913, it is enacted that the Court of Appeal shall hold its sittings at such times and places as are from time to time appointed by the Governor in Council, and notified in the *Gazette* twenty-one days at least before the times so fixed respectively; and shall determine the division by which such sittings shall be held :

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby revoke the Order in Council of the eighth day of December, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, and published in the *Gazette* of the eleventh day of December, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, fixing sittings of the Court of Appeal, and doth hereby appoint and declare that a sitting of the Court of Appeal of New Zealand shall be held within the Supreme Court House, in the City of Wellington, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, on Monday, the sixth day of April, one thousand nine hundred and fourteen; and doth hereby determine that such sitting shall be held by the First Division of the said Court.

Regulations for Deer-shooting, South Canterbury.

LIVERPOOL, Governor.

IN exercise of the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908 (hereinafter called "the said Act"), I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby make the following regulations prescribing the deer-shooting season in the South Canterbury Acclimatization District (as defined in the *New Zealand Gazette* of the sixteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, comprising the

Counties of Geraldine and Levels and part of the County of Mackenzie), and the conditions affecting the same, and also the form of license and the fee payable therefor.

REGULATIONS.

1. FALLOW-DEER bucks may be taken or killed within the South Canterbury Acclimatization District from the 1st day of April, 1914, to the 31st day of May, 1914, both days inclusive.
2. Licenses to take or kill such deer may be issued by the Postmaster at Temuka, upon the recommendation of the secretary of the South Canterbury Acclimatization Society, on payment of a license fee of £2, in the form prescribed in the Schedule hereto, and subject to the said Act and these regulations. The number of such licenses to be issued by the said Postmaster shall not exceed twenty provided that not more than one such license shall be issued to the same person.
3. No licensee shall take or kill more than three fallow-deer bucks.
4. No doe or fawn shall be taken or killed on any pretext whatever; and no licensee shall allow any dog to accompany either himself or any attendant he may have with him.
5. Nothing herein contained shall extend to authorizing any person to sell any deer or portion thereof.
6. Any person committing a breach of any of these regulations shall be liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding £20.

Regulations for Deer-shooting, Otago.

LIVERPOOL, Governor.

IN exercise of the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908 (hereinafter called "the said Act"), I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby make the following regulations prescribing the deer-shooting season in the Otago Acclimatization District, and the conditions affecting the same, and also the form of license and the fee payable therefor.

REGULATIONS.

1. RED-DEER stags may be taken or killed within the Otago Acclimatization District, except in the areas described in the First and Second Schedules hereto, from the 1st day of April, 1914, to the 20th day of May, 1914 (both days inclusive).
2. Fallow-deer bucks may be taken or killed within the said district, except in the areas described in the First and Second Schedules hereto, from the 10th day of April, 1914, to the 15th day of May, 1914 (both days inclusive).
3. Red-deer stags may be taken or killed within that part of the said district described in the First Schedule hereto from the 1st day of April, 1914, to the 20th day of May, 1914 (both days inclusive), and in all that area described in the Second Schedule hereto from the 1st to the 15th day of April, 1914 (both days inclusive).
4. Licenses to take or kill red-deer stags may be issued by the Chief Postmaster, Dunedin, on the recommendation of the secretary of the Otago Acclimatization Society, on payment of a license fee of £4, and licenses to take or kill fallow-deer bucks may be issued by the said Chief Postmaster, upon a like recommendation, on payment of a license fee of £2; such licenses to be issued in the form prescribed in the Third Schedule hereto, and subject to the said Act and these regulations.
5. No licensee shall take or kill more than four red-deer stags or two fallow-deer bucks, and no red-deer stag shall be killed carrying antlers with less than ten points, and no fallow-deer buck shall be killed carrying antlers with less than fourteen points (on a palmate of less than 4 in.). Ball cartridge only to be used: Provided that not more than four red-deer stags shall be killed in the area described in the First Schedule hereto, and not more than two red-deer stags in the area described in the Second Schedule hereto.
6. The licensee must give notice to the said Chief Postmaster of the date on which it is his intention to stalk deer; such notice to be posted, or delivered, or telegraphed three clear days before such date.

7. No doe, hind, or fawn shall be taken or killed on any pretext whatever; and no licensee shall allow any dog to accompany either himself or any attendant he may have with him.

8. Nothing herein contained shall extend to authorizing any person to sell any deer or any portion thereof.

9. Regulations as to deer "tags," per *New Zealand Gazette* No. 40, Vol. I, of 20th May, 1909, page 1408, shall be strictly adhered to by each licensee, who, in addition thereto, shall return all unused "tags" to the Secretary of the Otago Acclimatization Society immediately he has finished stalking for the season for which such "tags" have been issued.

10. Any person committing a breach of any of these regulations shall be liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding £20.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

All that area lying to the north of a line from Mount Pisa to the Town of St. Bathans; thence bounded towards the west and north by the Lake and Westland Counties; thence towards the east by the Waitaki County to Dunstan Creek; thence by said creek to the Town of St. Bathans.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

All that area known as the Greenvale, Wart Hill, and Whitecomb Districts.

THIRD SCHEDULE.

License to take or kill Game (Deer).

£ , of , having this day paid the sum , is hereby authorized to take or kill deer (bucks or stags), of not less than ten points for red-deer stags, and fourteen points on palmate of not less than 4 in. for fallow-deer bucks, within the Otago Acclimatization District, upon Block No. , from the day of , 1914, to the day of , 1914 (both days inclusive), subject to the provisions of the Animals Protection Act, 1908, and all regulations thereunder in force within the said district.
