A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS the Board of the Road District of Akaroa-Wainui has, by resolution adopted at an ordinary meeting thereof, requested that the name of the locality situated in the Road District of Akaroa-Wainui and known as "German Bay" be altered to "Takamatua":

Now, therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred on me by the Designation of Districts Act, 1908, and of all other powers and authorities enabling me in this behalf, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby proclaim and declare that the name of the locality now known as "German Bay" shall be and the same is hereby altered to "Takamatua," and do assign the last-mentioned name to such locality accordingly; and also do hereby proclaim and declare that the name of the bay now known as "German Bay" shall be and the same is hereby altered to "Takamatua Bay," and do assign the last-mentioned name to such bay accordingly; and also do hereby proclaim and declare that this Proclamation shall take effect on and after the first day of November, one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, not being earlier than six months after the first publication thereof in the *Gazette*.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by section twenty-six, subsection one, of the Appropriation Act, 1915, it is provided that, notwithstanding any Act to the contrary, it shall not be lawful or competent for any local authority or for any Harbour Board, during the present war with Germany, to borrow or contract to borrow any money (otherwise than by way of bank overdraft within the limit of its powers, if any, in that behalf) whether from the State Advances Office or from any other source whatever, and whether in pursuance of a special Act or under any other authority whatever, without the precedent consent of the Governor in Council:

And whereas application has been made for the consent of the Governor in Council to enable the several local authorities mentioned in the Schedule hereto to borrow the loans set out in column B therein from the State Advances Office:

And whereas it is expedient that the precedent consent of the Governor in Council should issue:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby consent to the borrowing from the State Advances Department of the loans hereinafter mentioned by the several local authorities set out in the Schedule hereto; and it is hereby declared that this Order in Council is made under the provisions in that behalf of the Appropriation Act, 1915, and shall operate accordingly as a consent of the Governor in Council to the raising of the loans hereby authorized.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by section two of the Public Works Amendment Act, 1911, it is provided that no person shall lay, construct, put up, place, or use any electric line except under the authority of a license issued to him by the Governor in Council under that Act :

And whereas the Wellington City Council (hereinafter referred to as "the licensee") desires to erect electric lines from the tramway trolley-wire and rail in Hopper Street, Wellington, to the adjoining premises of the Welbilt Heel Company, situated on Section 10, Town Acre 74, D.P. 149, City of Wellington (hereinafter referred to as "the said electric lines"), and it is expedient accordingly to issue a license in respect thereof under the said section :

Now, therefore, in pursuance and in exercise of the powers conferred on him by the said section, and of all other powers in anywise enabling him in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth, subject to the conditions set forth in the Schedule hereto, hereby authorize the said licensee to erect and maintain the said electric lines for the purpose of supplying power to motors having an aggregate capacity of fifteen horse-power, such electric lines and the position of the premises being indicated by black and broken black lines on the plan marked P.W.D. 40374, deposited in the office of the Minister of Public Works at Wellington, in the Wellington Provincial District.

SCHEDULE.

CONDITIONS.

1. In this license the following words and phrases shall have the meanings hereby attached to them respectively :—

"Earthed" means connected to the general mass of earth in such a manner as to ensure at all times an immediate and safe discharge to earth of electric energy.

"Electric line" means any wire, wires, conductor, or other means used for conveying, transmitting, or distributing electricity for power, lighting, or heating purposes; and includes any instrument, insulator, casing, tubing, pipe-covering, or post enclosing or supporting an electric line, or anything connected therewith.

"Inspecting Engineer" means and includes any Inspecting Engineer appointed by the Minister to inspect the works to be constructed or maintained by virtue of electric-line licenses issued under the Public Works Act, 1908, and any or all of its amendments, or under any one or more of such amendments only, or any Act or Acts passed in amendment thereof or substitution therefor.

"Minister" means Minister of Public Works.

"Telegraph" includes telephone.

"Telegraph line" has the same meaning as "electric line" in the Post and Telegraph Act, 1908, and also includes all telegraph, telephone, and electric signalling wires belonging to the Government Railways Department.

2. The conductors shall not be less than 7/20 S.W.G. hard-drawn copper wires, firmly attached to porcelain insulators, and erected on supports placed not more than 150 ft. apart. The positive conductor shall be covered throughout, and the covering may consist of vulcanized indiarubber or of triple braiding thoroughly impregnated with weatherproof compound. The negative conductor may be bare.

3. The conductors shall be carried on substantial and durable supports, which shall be designed to have a factor of safety of four in the case of steel, iron, or ferro-concrete, and five in the case of wood, calculated upon the ultimate strength of the material, assuming the wind-pressure to be 20 lb. per square foot upon a plane surface, and 12 lb. per square foot upon a diametral plane upon a cylindrical surface.

4. The conductors shall not in any part thereof be at a less height than 18 ft. from the surface of the ground.

5. A single-pole fuse cut-out shall be inserted in the positive conductor, and arranged to operate with an overload of 100



per cent. above the rated full load of the circuit. Such fuse out-out shall be placed in a suitable locked or sealed receptacle of fireproof construction fixed at a convenient height on the pole nearest the point where the positive conductor leaves the trolley-wire or feeder. At the distributing-point of a lighting circuit there shall be inserted in the positive conductor a single-pole switch, together with a fuse arranged to operate with an overload of 50 per cent. above the rated full load of such circuit. In a motor circuit there shall be provided, in the immediate vicinity of each motor connected thereto, a double-pole switch and fuse cut-out or circuit-breaker arranged to operate with an overload of 50 per cent. above the rated full load of the motor so controlled. Each motor shall be fitted with a no-volt release and a series resistance.

6. The negative conductor shall, in a lighting circuit, be continuous throughout its length from the lamps to the tramway-rail, to which it shall be effectively bonded, and in a motor circuit from the switch terminal to the tramway-rail, to which it shall be effectively bonded.

7. At telegraph-line crossings the conductors shall pass over or under, as may be decided by the Minister of Telegraphs. In every crossing-span the maximum tension in any conductor shall not exceed one-half the elastic limit of the conductor under the conditions of a minimum temperature of 20° F. and wind-pressure as specified in clause 3 occurring simultaneously. Efficiently earthed guard-wires, to the satisfaction of the Minister of Telegraphs, shall be erected where such protection may be considered necessary by the Minister of Telegraphs, and earth-wires where led down poles shall be protected by a casing for a distance of 8 ft. from the ground. Guard-wires shall be carried on substantial supports at a height of 2 ft. above the said electric lines if the telegraph lines pass over the said electric lines, or 2 ft. above the telegraph lines if they pass under the said electric lines. In addition to the above precautions, telegraph lines shall be suitably insulated if deemed necessary by the Minister of Telegraphs. The cost of all necessary guard-wires and special provisions required to comply with this clause, or deemed to be necessary as a protection to telegraph lines generally, shall be borne by the licensee when the telegraph lines are erected before the said electric lines. In cases where the said electric lines are erected before the telegraph lines, the licensee, on receipt of notice from the District Telegraph Engineer of the Post and Telegraph Department, or his deputy, that it is proposed to run a telegraph line along the route, shall forthwith make the necessary changes required to comply with this clause at any points at which the said electric lines already cross such routes, the cost of such changes being borne by the Post and Telegraph Department.

8. No work of any nature shall be erected or constructed upon, over, or under any part of the New Zealand Government Railways until the licensee has obtained the consent of the Minister of Railways thereto, as required by section 4 of the Government Railways Amendment Act, 1910 (No. 2).

9. The construction of the works hereby authorized shall be substantially commenced on or before the 1st day of July, 1916, and shall be completed on or before the 1st day of August, 1916.

10. The licensee shall, prior to the completion of the said works, give to the Minister at least seven days' notice in writing of the estimated date of such completion.

11. The licensee shall not use the said electric lines, or permit the same to be used, until the Minister has given notice in writing to the licensee that he has received from the Inspecting Engineer a certificate that the work hereby authorized has been satisfactorily carried out.

12. The said electric lines shall be duly and efficiently supervised and maintained by the licensee as regards both electrical and mechanical conditions, and shall not be permitted by the licensee to remain erected after they have ceased to be used for the supply of electricity.

13. This license, and the benefits and obligations hereunder, shall not be assigned by the licensee without the expressed consent in writing of the Minister first had and obtained; but such consent shall not be withheld if it is proved to the satisfaction of the Minister that the transferee is financially and otherwise able to carry out the obligations specified in this license.

14. The Minister may at any time order an inspection to be made of the said electric lines. If any defect is found to exist it must be remedied forthwith; and if, in the opinion of the officer or person inspecting, such defect is serious the Minister may, on receipt of the report, direct the licensee to at once cease transmitting energy either over the whole of the said electric lines or over any specified part thereof until such defect is repaired or remedied. In default of the licensee remedying the defect or ceasing to transmit energy the licensee shall be liable to a penalty of £20 for each day during which the defect remains if energy is transmitted, such penalty to be recoverable by or on behalf of the Minister as a debt due to the Crown. The cost of such inspection shall be borne by the licensee.

15. If the licensee fails to comply with any of the conditions of this license the Minister may, by notice in writing, require the licensee within thirty days to remedy the default specified in that notice; and if the licensee fails to comply with the terms of the notice within the said period, the licensee shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20, to be recoverable by or on behalf of the Minister as a debt due to the Crown.

16. Notwithstanding anything in the last preceding clause of these conditions, if the licensee fails to comply with the terms of any such notice for ninety days after the receipt thereof, the Governor in Council may thereupon revoke this license without further notice.

17. For the purpose of ascertaining whether the conditions of this license are being faithfully complied with by the licensee, the Minister, or any person appointed by him in that behalf, may at all reasonable times enter on the lands and works and inspect the said works.

18. Nothing in this license shall be deemed in any way to interfere with, affect, or abridge any rights or powers vested in His Majesty the King, or in the Governor on his behalf authorizing the construction, management, or working of any public works; nor shall any compensation be payable to or on behalf of the licensee for injury done to the works herein authorized by the construction, management, or working of any such public works as aforesaid, or for the loss occasioned thereby, or for the exercise of any such right or power as aforesaid.

19. The regulations made under section two of the Public Works Amendment Act, 1911, and published in the *New Zealand Gazette* dated 29th day of April, 1915, shall not apply to this license.

20. This license shall, unless sooner determined in accordance with the provisions hereinafter expressed, continue in force for a period of forty-two years from the date hereof. Upon expiry of the said term, or upon sooner determination of this license by revocation or otherwise, all rights hereby granted to the licensee shall thereupon cease and determine; but such expiration or determination shall not relieve the licensee of any liability theretofore incurred under this license.

*Regulations for the Administration and Equipment of Camps and Barracks.*

LIVERPOOL, Governor.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers and authority conferred on me by the Defence Act, 1909, and its amendments, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby make the following regulations for the administration and equipment of camps and barracks, and I do hereby declare that the regulations hereby made shall take effect as from the date of publication thereof in the *Gazette*.

Introductory.

1. The following regulations for barrack and camp services are promulgated for the information and guidance of officers concerned. The schedules of furniture, stores, and other details issued in accordance with these regulations will be strictly adhered to.

2. In describing stores in ledger, indents, &c., the designations and sections of the Vocabulary of Stores will be strictly followed. Articles not included in the Vocabulary will be headed N.I.V. (not in Vocabulary), and grouped under the several sections to which, from the nature of the articles or their intended use, they would properly apply. They will also be described by drawings or otherwise where requisite, in order to obviate the necessity of making further reference.

Administration.

3. Officers Commanding Districts, and Camp Commandants, Trentham and Featherston, will keep themselves informed as to the condition of furniture, stores, and equipment, and will satisfy themselves that the articles are at all times maintained in a serviceable and complete condition.

4. Will be responsible that equipment of all kinds is issued for service purpose in accordance with the authorized schedules, but in cases in which it is found necessary that these should be exceeded, in districts authority will be given in writing to the A.D. of E and O.S., and in camps to the C.Q.M., to provide for the requirements of the services according to circumstances.

5. In any case in which stores or equipment are drawn in excess of the authorized schedules without written authority, the case must be submitted without delay to the G.O.C., who will deal with it as a matter of discipline, and when consumable stores are concerned, the excess issues will be treated as losses and dealt with under King's Regulations.

6. Will, when excess issues under para. 4 are made, report full details quarterly to the Q.M.G., stating whether the issues are of a temporary nature or are proposed as a permanent addition to the establishment.

7. All communications connected with the supply of furniture, stores, and equipment, whether by or in excess of regulation, will be addressed to the D.E.O.S., who will, if necessary, take the orders of the Q.M.G. on the subject.

8. All unforeseen and unusual services not exceeding £25 in cost will be approved by the O.C.D. and C.C., and reported quarterly to the Q.M.G. with an explanation as to the necessity for the expenditure.

9. All unforeseen and unusual services exceeding £25 in cost must be approved by Headquarters before the expenditure is incurred.

10. The authority for expenditure must be quoted on all vouchers, and the original orders attached to the bills,

Executive Duties.

11. The following will perform the duties of officers in charge of barracks as herein laid down:—

12. Officers placed in charge of barrack duties are responsible for the satisfactory performance of their duties as follows:—

They will be liable for any losses that may occur through want of proper supervision on their part, and to enable them to ascertain that the duties they are charged with are regularly conducted they will visit the out-stations of their district or subdistricts (sometimes without previous notice) as frequently as may be necessary.

13. Every care will be taken to ensure contracts being in all respects satisfactorily carried out, and contractors' accounts being settled with promptitude. All accounts and bills will, whenever practicable, be prepared by the claimants or their agents, and not by any person connected with the barrack services. No communication, unless specially authorized by a responsible officer, will be made by the barrack services to contractors in relation to particulars of their accounts. All orders on contractors will be signed by an officer.

14. Testimonials or other acknowledgment of services performed are not under any circumstances to be given to any contractors, nor will any social intercourse with contractors or their agents be permitted.

15. When articles are purchased, or services performed, in consequence of the default of the contractor, he will be informed immediately, in writing, of the particulars of the purchase made in his default, and the actual and necessary expense incurred will be credited separately in a manuscript book kept for the purpose, and will be paid for in the same manner as purchases under contract. Upon the voucher for payment will be stated "Purchase [or Service] in default of contractor for .." and any excess of cost to be recovered from the contractor will be noted on the voucher upon which the amount is recovered. Should the excess cost be more than the amount of the contractor's current account, the difference will be recovered and credited to the public.

16. A correct record will be kept in a Bill-book, under the various estimate headings, of all bills received and passed for payment. Every entry in this book, as well as the corresponding entry in the manuscript book referred to in paragraph 15, or account, will be initialled by the officer who certifies the bill.

17. Officers will be particularly careful to preserve all articles which may be placed in their charge, and for which they are accountable.

18. Officers in charge of barracks will be held responsible for obtaining the written authority of the C.C. or O.C.D. for any special issues or loans contemplated by regulations in exceptional circumstances.

19. Surpluses of all descriptions will be taken on charge immediately they are discovered. Deficiencies will be at once reported.

20. If any stores be deficient from loss, theft, or other causes, the circumstance will be at once reported to the O.C.D. or C.C., who will cause the matter to be dealt with in the manner laid down in the King's Regulations, para. 668.

21. Observations on accounts will be carefully inquired into, and the replies given will embody the result of such inquiry, and not be mere transcripts of those received from the corps concerned. In all cases where errors in account are admitted the replies should state how adjustment will be made. Replies should be rendered with as little delay as possible. If, owing to the absence of an officer from the station, or other sufficient cause, a reply to any specific inquiry cannot be furnished within a reasonable time, the answers to the other questions in the general abstract should not be kept back on that account, but a note should be made against the specific query in question to the effect that a further reply will follow as early as possible.

22. Books and documents relating to public accounts and transactions will be carefully kept and classified, free from erasures (see para. 147), and their indices completed to date; they will be available for reference or inspection at any moment. The books or documents will not be withdrawn from the possession of the officer or accountant in charge of the duties, except by competent autho-

city, and on a transfer they will be handed over to the relieving officer or accountant.

23. The following will perform the duties of barrack accountants and accountants for expense stores as herein laid down:—

**General Regulations.**

24. Officers in charge of barracks will not be accountants for expense stores, fuel, light, &c., but will be responsible for the proper conduct of all the duties in connection with the receipt, custody, issue, and accounts of water, disinfectants, cleaning-articles, furniture, barrack, detention-barrack, and other stores required for the use of the troops in the barracks, hospitals, drill-halls, offices, and standing camps in their respective districts.

25. Officers in charge of barracks will frequently take stock of the most important items of expense stores. For this purpose the number of the particular articles found in store, on inventory, at the wash or repair, &c., will be noted, and the whole totalled and compared with the total ledger charge. Discrepancies will be adjusted in accordance with the regulations. A record of each of these stock-takings will be kept.

26. Subordinates of the Defence Forces will be the accountants for expense stores. Officers in charge of barracks will at all times give these accountants advice and assistance in the performance of their duties; they will see that all services are satisfactorily carried out, and that accountants and others are thoroughly acquainted with the regulations. Accountants will render monthly to officers in charge of barracks the certificate shown in Appendix 1.

27. Officers in charge of barracks will audit all accounts rendered by subordinates, and will carefully examine and certify them before submitting them to the Assistant Director of Equipment and Ordnance Stores for transmission to the Director of Equipment and Ordnance Stores.

28. Officers in charge of barracks will examine (not less frequently than once in each six months) the books and records kept by accountants, and will, on the occasion of the examination, make an entry in each book or record in red ink to the effect that this has been done. These entries will be signed and dated.

29. If an accountant is suspected of any irregularities in connection with his charge he should be suspended from duty, and an immediate stock will be taken in order to ascertain whether there are any deficiencies.

30. Every facility will be given to a subordinate to become fully acquainted with the details of his work.

31. Expense-store accountants will make themselves acquainted with the number, condition, and use of every article in their stores. They will keep their storerooms clean, properly aired, and arranged. Where there is no labourer the accountant will perform these duties himself.

32. Accountants will make all issues and exchanges strictly in accordance with the regulations, and will, in case of any difficulty in connection with these duties, apply to the officer in charge of barracks for instructions.

**Charge and Allotment of Barracks.**

33. The custody of barracks, and the duty of handing over the requisite accommodation to the troops, will rest with the officer in charge of barracks.

34. The responsibility for the maintenance of the fabric of the buildings, for their repair and for any structural alterations, will rest with the Barrack Construction Department. Quarters will be allotted in accordance with the King's Regulations (para. 1049).

35. Whenever it is known that a barrack is about to be vacated for a period of over six months the G.O.C. will issue instructions for it to be dismantled, all furniture, &c., being removed from the barrack-rooms, quarters, and other accessories, to barrack stores.

Should there not be sufficient storage accommodation available, any additional storage necessary will be met by the temporary misappropriation of other rooms (see also Regulations for Engineer Services, Part I).

Barracks and quarters when dismantled will be in the custody of the B.C.D., but unoccupied barracks and quarters, when dismantled of furniture and stores, will be in the custody of the officer in charge of barracks. Reappropriation will be dealt with as directed in the King's Regulations (paras. 1035 and 1042).

36. Before a barrack is occupied, the time when the troops will arrive and the number of troops for which accommodation is required will be notified to the officer in charge of barracks by the C.C.; in places other than camps by the O.C. troops for whom accommodation

37. When any change of troops is to take place in a barrack the officer in charge of barracks will arrange with the officer commanding the troops in occupation as to the most convenient time and manner

for taking over the stores in his charge, having regard, in the event of a relieving corps being expected, to the time fixed for the arrival of the officer nominated to take over charge. It is desirable when one corps relieves another that the taking-over from the one and the giving-over to the other should be simultaneous, the officers nominated on behalf of each corps and the officer in charge of barracks being present.

38. The officer in charge of barracks, or his representative, will assign the regulated barrack accommodation to the officer detailed to take over on the part of the incoming troops, and will give over, on a signed inventory for each room and building, the necessary barrack furniture and utensils in accordance with the Regulations and instructions hereinafter laid down. He will also receive over all buildings and quarters with their equipment at marching-out inspections or when no longer required for occupation.

39. All available quarters and accessories will be kept in good order, properly aired, and ready for occupation at short notice.

40. Barracks and quarters will be occupied according to their authorized appropriation, and any irregular occupation or alteration in barrack buildings will be brought to the notice of the O.C. with a view to the irregularity being stopped.

41. In exceptional circumstances, and as a temporary measure, G.O.C. may sanction the use of spare accommodation for army purposes by persons not ordinarily entitled to such accommodation, provided that no expense or loss to the public is involved. Such sanction should not be given when any rent or other revenue can be obtained for the accommodation.

42. Officers in charge of barracks will not be responsible for the following buildings: Electric-light buildings (other than quarters, class-rooms, and offices) which come under the charge of the B.C.D.

43. Officers may be permitted to store motor or other vehicles when suitable accommodation is temporarily available in equipped barracks at a uniform charge of 5s. per month per vehicle. Such accommodation, however, is subject to the following conditions:—

- (1.) Vehicles to be stored at the sole risk of owners.
- (2.) Buildings to be kept clean, and any damage done thereto by occupiers or their employees to be made good.
- (3.) Accommodation to be vacated at any time if required for military purposes.

The arrangements will be made by the officer in charge of barracks.

44. New buildings, when completed and reported on by a Board of officers as fit for occupation, will be taken over by the officer in charge of barracks upon the receipt of the necessary authority, and will be equipped as required for occupation.

45. If any new buildings should require drying before they are considered fit for occupation the officer in charge of barracks will defer taking them over until they are sufficiently dry for use, and such fuel as may be necessary for drying the buildings will be demanded by the officer or official who supervises the building operations.

46. New accommodation will be brought on the returns of barrack accommodation as soon as handed over for use, and the authority for such handing-over being quoted on the returns.

47. All alterations in the appropriation of barracks will be noted on the returns as soon as the necessary authority is received.

48. When buildings are completed and handed over, the officer in charge of barracks will sign for the inventory of fixtures, and will, so long as the building remains in his charge unoccupied, be responsible for the safe custody of the fixtures contained therein.

49. Whenever barrack accommodation may be required to be handed over for the execution of works or repair, the officer in charge of barracks will be referred to with reference to the quartering of troops to be displaced. When the proposed arrangements for vacating the premises have been approved by the G.O.C. the officer or official concerned will furnish the officer in charge of barracks with a return of the accommodation required by him. The officer in charge of barracks will then dismantle and hand over the buildings.

50. When only a very limited amount of barrack accommodation is so required, and no expense to the public for lodging-money or hiring is involved, the officer in charge of barracks and the officer or official concerned can make the necessary arrangements with the corps, department, or officer in occupation. When a reappropriation is involved the accommodation will not be handed over for structural alteration until the necessary approval to the reappropriation has been obtained.

**Gas-supply.**

51. Whenever any escape of gas is detected the occupant will immediately inform the gas company, and request that the defect be remedied at once.

52. If at any time there is an excessive consumption of gas, suspected to be due to improper use or to escape which cannot be localized, the officer in charge of barracks will at once call for a report from the accountant as to the cause thereof.

**Electric Lighting.**

The regulations governing lighting by gas will be applicable generally to electric lighting.

53. Where electric light is in use in buildings which are on charge, the officer in charge of barracks will exercise the same careful supervision over the consumption of electric current as in

the case of gas-supply. As soon as the system is installed the lamps will be brought on barrack expense store charge, but the shades will be treated as Engineer fixtures. The officer in charge of barracks will maintain the necessary supply of incandescent lamps, and will take every precaution to ensure that only those of the description and candle-power authorized are being used, and will also guard against such lamps being replaced by lamps of higher candle-power.

#### Electric Lamps.

54. Carbon filament: The useful life of such lamps is about 400 hours actual burning. They are for use in portable lamps or in positions liable to excessive vibration only.

Metallic filament: These lamps should not be replaced till the filament breaks. For estimate purposes the average life may be taken as 750 hours actual burning.

55. O.C.s will be responsible that breakage due to wilful damage or carelessness is charged to the individuals concerned.

56. Officers in charge of barracks may issue incandescent electric lamps up to the scales indicated. They will certify on the expenditure voucher, by which articles so issued are struck off charge in the barrack expense store account, that the lamps, &c., shown therein do not exceed the numbers allowed by the authorized scales.

Excess issues will be charged to the troops as barrack damages.

57. The barrack accountant will examine all gas-burners and electric lamps throughout the barracks once a month, at night, and will send a statement to the officer in charge of barracks showing how many burners or electric lamps he found wilfully damaged, and how many replaced by non-regulation articles. He will at once put in the proper lamp or burner (or component part), which will be charged against troops occupying the room.

58. At stations where oil is the illuminant the quantity as under will be admissible per lamp:—

Summer period (October to March), 1½ pints per week.

Winter period (April to September), 3 pints per week.

#### Barrack Expense Stores.

59. Expense stores include all articles of barrack, office, and drill-hall equipment, except fixtures supplied by B.C.D., a list of which will be found in the Regulations for Engineer Services, Part I.

60. For the purpose of facilitating inspections and stock-takings, and with a view to a more ready detection of loss or injury, officers in charge of barracks will see that all stores are at all times arranged—

(a.) As far as possible in the order in which they are entered on the ledger (Book G. 51).

(b.) Every article of the same description together, unserviceable stores alone excepted.

(c.) All articles, in bundles or rows of equal numbers, so far as the space will permit.

61. To prevent embezzlement of public stores and to assist in the detection of persons concerned therein, the accountant will see that all stores are properly marked; and whenever the marks on the articles become faint from washing or from long use such articles will be restamped.

62. In the event of barrack stores being destroyed by a fire occurring in any barracks, storehouses, or other public buildings, the officer in charge of barracks will as soon as possible prepare a detailed statement of the stores or equipment destroyed in each room, and their value. This statement will be forwarded to the G.O.C., with the proceedings of the Board assembled to inquire into the origin of the fire, in order that sanction may be obtained for striking the articles in question off charge when necessary under the King's Regulations (paras. 668 and 1030).

If the stores lost were held on inventory, the officer who held them on charge will render the statement through the officer in charge of barracks, who will verify it from the records in his possession.

63. Any excessive consumption of stores by the troops will be brought by the accountant to the notice of the officer in charge of barracks.

64. On all occasions of stores being received the accountants will ascertain whether the packages have been damaged in transit by wet, by being opened, or in any other way. Should any suspicion arise as to their having been tampered with, the circumstances will at once be pointed out to the person conveying the stores, and the package will be opened, if requisite, in his presence and in that of a third person; a note of the circumstances will be made on the bill of lading or waybill. (See King's Regulations, para. 1480, as to the form of receipt to be given to a carrier.) All consignments from stations to ordnance depots or elsewhere must be weighed and the weight marked on the outside of the package, a packing-note being put inside each parcel.

65. The wrappers and cords which are on bales and other packages will not be brought on ledger charge when received, but when removed from the packages will be accounted for periodically by weight on a certificate voucher according to the description of their material—viz., old canvas and cordage—and will be used as far as possible in the repacking of stores, or returned to Ordnance Stores as opportunity offers.

66. When packages of glass or earthenware articles are received a witness will, when practicable, be present at the opening to certify to the number of articles found broken. The certificate will state the number and description of each package and the articles contained in each. After approval by the G.O.C. the certificate will form the voucher for striking the broken articles off charge. When the number of broken articles is large, a special report will be made giving the name of the packer and of the station from which the consignment was received.

67. All stores expended will be entered monthly on book, to which will be attached the indent showing the purpose for which the stores were demanded, and, in the case of periodical issues, the date of last issue. The voucher will be countersigned by the officer in charge of barracks before being attached to the account. No articles will be shown as expended except such as are of a strictly consumable nature, as nails, cotton-waste, dubbing, &c.

68. The officer in charge of barracks will be held responsible that every precaution is taken to prevent stores suffering damage from vermin or in any other way. He will cause all issues of unused articles to be made from those consignments which have been longest in store, and will not allow stores of new pattern to be issued so long as those of old pattern are available.

69. Should the accountant, owing to the exigencies of the service, be required to take temporary charge of articles of public property not appertaining to barracks, he will not bring them on his ledger charge, but will obtain a correct list from the officer or other person handing them over; and, pending receipt of instructions as to their disposal, he will adopt all necessary measures for the safe custody of the articles.

#### Equipment of Barracks.

70. Each expense-store accountant will, under the officer in charge of barracks, be responsible for the charge of the expense stores required for the complete equipment of the barracks, hospitals, military detention-barracks, offices, drill-halls, &c., allotted to him, subject to the detailed instructions in paras. 71 and 72 in respect to the use of such stores.

71. The schedule of barrack and hospital furniture issued with General Orders from time to time are the authorities for the issue of equipment, and no articles will be issued in excess of those allowed by schedules without the written approval of the G.O.C., who will only give such approval in cases of real necessity and when they are available locally.

Officers in charge of barracks will keep a record of all issues in excess of schedules in their district. This record will be reviewed annually on the 1st December, each case inquired into, and articles in excess of schedules no longer required withdrawn. A revised list showing the articles still required will then be submitted to the G.O.C. for authority to continue the issue for another year. (Appendix 2.)

72. Inventories (see Appendix 3) detailing the various articles of stores in officers' quarters, soldiers' rooms, offices, stables, and other buildings, will be supplied to corps on arrival at a station. These inventories, in duplicate—one copy pasted on a millboard, the other copy to be retained by barrack accountant—will be signed and dated by the accountant, the officer in charge of barracks, and the officer who takes over the rooms, and will not be altered except by direction of the officer in charge of barracks, whose initials (at the first opportunity), as well as those of the accountant, will be attached to any such alterations. Should one of these inventories be lost or destroyed by the troops a new one will be made out by the accountant from his records.

73. As the loss or defacement of inventories causes much trouble, officers in charge of barracks will be careful at all inspections to see that they are safeguarded as directed in the King's Regulations, and will draw the attention of the O.C. to any cases where the regulation is not strictly carried out.

74. Office records of the various inventories, on the Army form shown on form G. 67, in separate sets for each barrack or station, will be compiled by the accountant, who will be responsible for their custody. These records must be most carefully kept up to date so as to agree in every particular with the room inventories, and they will be open at all times to the inspection of the C.O.

75. The records will be taken round at half-yearly and marching-out inspections for the purpose of comparing them with the room inventories.

76. At each monthly inspection under para. 80 the officer in charge of barracks will check the figures in the records with the entries in the general abstract of inventories referred to in para. 77, and will initial and date the abstract to show that this has been done.

77. A general abstract of all stores on inventory, compiled from the records referred to in para. 74 and from the hospital and other inventories, will be kept by each accountant in book G. 52. The entries in this book will be in pencil only, so that the necessary alterations can be made in case of a change in inventory.

78. The abstract is intended to show the general total of stores issued on inventory by the accountant, and will be made out in original only; it will be kept under lock and key by the accountant, who will make the necessary alterations from time to time to

correspond with any alteration in the room inventories and records, and will produce it to the officer in charge of barracks at his inspections, who will see that it is correctly kept up.

79. Articles will, as a rule, be entered in as well as in the ledgers, under their component parts, and not as "complete"; but in the room inventories and the office record they may be inserted as "complete" for convenience.

80. The officer in charge of barracks will make an inspection of stores in possession of the permanent troops in barracks, military detention-room, guard-rooms, latrines, and cookhouses once a month; inventories will be compared as laid down, and any articles found in possession in excess of schedule will be forthwith withdrawn, and an explanation of the circumstances under which the issue was made called for.

**Charges for Loss, &c.**

81. Immediately after all inspections of stores in the possession of troops, charges will be made out by each accountant on form M. 19 for any stores lost or damaged. These charges will be regulated by the prices laid down in the priced vocabulary of stores, subject to the provisions of para. 82.

82. When charges are made for articles so damaged as to be rendered unfit for further use by the troops, every reasonable and just allowance will be made for fair wear-and-tear. Charges for articles lost or damaged (culpably or through contributory neglect) will be assessed as follows:—

(a.) Repairable damage: Actual cost of repair, including both cost of wages and materials or components.

(b.) Loss or damage beyond repair: The amount to be charged will be assessed locally by the officer in charge of barracks from the best evidence available as to the condition of the article at the time of the loss or damage; but the amount chargeable must not be less than one-fourth of the new value of the article, unless it is established by evidence that the actual value (which will then be charged) is less.

Whenever less than the full value is so charged, the article, if forthcoming, will be taken into store and condemned at the next survey, instead of being at once destroyed as when full value is charged under para. 93. In such cases a ticket will be attached to the articles showing the amount of the charge and giving a reference to the voucher on which it was made.

83. For deficient or damaged articles of obsolete pattern, superseded in the service by less-expensive articles, the charge will be based on the price of the current service pattern. When the current service article is more expensive the charge will be based on the price of the obsolete article deficient, whether a new pattern article is to be issued instead or not, and will be supported by a certificate from the officer in charge of barracks giving the nature, description, and price of the obsolete article deficient.

84. The charges against each unit, &c., will be notified by the officer in charge of barracks on separate form (in duplicate) to the O.C., who will acknowledge its receipt, and at once take the necessary steps for the settlement of same with the paymaster, the duplicate accompanying the remittance. In forwarding vouchers to paymasters for recovery of amounts due, an abstract (form 19A) of the total charges will be attached to vouchers. This settlement must be effected within seven days of date of certificate of officer in charge of barracks at foot of form, and if not paid within seven days an explanation must be called for.

85. On receipt of written notice of appeal against any damage assessed the officer in charge of barracks will forward the same, with his observations thereon, for the information of the G.O.C. (see para. 94).

86. Should any deficient article for which a charge has been made be subsequently recovered, a refund of the money will be made if authorized by the G.O.C. The refund should be supported by a reference to the cash credit and to the voucher and account by which the returned article has been brought on store charge.

87. Only such parts of mops as are actually deficient will be charged to the troops. A mop-head will be struck off charge when a mop-nail is charged for, as thrums are not to be stored. All nails and leathers of mops brought for exchange will be kept and brought forward at surveys for condemnation.

88. Damages to stores committed by lunatics or patients temporarily insane (except in case of men suffering from delirium tremens) will not be charged against the troops. In the event of articles being lost, burnt, or so damaged by lunatics as not to be repairable, such articles will not be struck off charge unless a certificate be given by the medical officer in charge that no blame is attributable to a hospital attendant. A certificate stating in what way the damaged articles have been disposed of will be annexed to the voucher striking the articles off charge.

89. The full cost of making good all breakages to chaffcutting-machines will be charged against the troops unless the breakage is clearly shown to be due to accident or other circumstances beyond the control of the corps using the machine.

90. One-third of the value of the lamp-globes or of the chimneys broken when in use by the troops will be allowed as a charge against the public, unless the breakage be the result of wilful damage, when the full cost will be charged against the troops.

91. The value of chipped or cracked articles will not be charged against officers or soldiers, nor will such articles be exchanged unless they are either unserviceable, dangerous in use, or, in the opinion of the officer in charge of barracks, unsightly by reason of their depreciated condition.

Chipped or cracked articles regarded by the officer in charge of barracks as still serviceable, in the sense of the foregoing, may be taken into store and reissued without the individuals to whom they are supplied having the option to reject them.

92. Breakages of or damage to crockery and glassware in offices, hospitals, quarters of members of Military Nursing Service, military detention-barracks, furnished under the hospital and barrack schedules, when shown to have been caused by accident, will be charged against the public on a certificate obtained from the officer in charge showing that the injury has not been caused either wilfully or through the neglect of reasonable precautions.

93. All articles charged at full value against the troops in consequence of having been so injured as to render them unfit for further service will be at once effectually destroyed in the presence of an officer, so as to prevent their being again brought into use, or being afterwards produced for condemnation as articles worn out by fair wear.

94. When notice of objection and appeal on the part of the troops against an assessment has been given, the articles will not be destroyed or repaired until such objection or appeal has been inquired into and decided upon as provided for in King's Regulations. (See para. 85 hereof.)

95. When articles are sent to the barrack stores for exchange it will be the duty of the accountant to call the attention of the troops to any article which he considers does not require to be exchanged, or which, where no assessment has been made by the inspecting officer, should be charged as a damage; in the former case the articles will be returned to the troops for further use. These exchanges may be made by the accountant, but in case of any disagreement reference will be made to the officer in charge of barracks.

**Marching-out Inspections.**

96. The regulations for conducting marching-out inspections will be found in the King's Regulations, paras. 998 and 1003.

97. The reports of charges at marching-out inspections will be made out in triplicate (form M. 19) for each corps separately: one copy will be sent to the O.C., who will acknowledge the receipt; the abstract (form M. 19A) and the other two to the paymaster.

98. The officer in charge of barracks will certify on all reports of charges at marching-out inspections that the items have been compared with the note-book (book G. 53) signed by the regimental officer present at the inspection.

99. When no officer is left behind to give over charge, the officer in charge of barracks will himself make a careful inspection, and will deal with the inspection reports as laid down in para. 97. A statement of the circumstances should be attached to the copy forwarded to the C.O., and a duplicate of the statement should be attached to the store-issue voucher.

**Fire-engines.**

(See also Instructions, "Precautions against Fire," in King's Regulations.)

100. Fire-engines, standpipes for hydrants, hose-reels and their appurtenances for barracks and hospitals will be demanded from the Director of Camp and Barrack Construction by the officer in charge of barracks.

101. In barracks, hospitals, or premises in charge of departments to which engines are allotted, they will be held on inventory by the troops or the department in occupation, who will exercise them once a month, care being taken to use fresh water for this purpose.

102. After an engine has been used the hose will be hung up by the middle to dry and to allow the water to be run out at both sides.

103. The attention of the O.C. should be drawn to any case in which the fire-engine or its appurtenances appear to have been neglected by the troops. In order to preserve the flexibility of the hose and to keep the engine clean, the articles laid down in the barrack schedules will be supplied to the troops on indent.

104. When barracks remain unoccupied and a fatigue party cannot be obtained the officer in charge of barracks will apply for permission to hire men to exercise the engine once in every six months. In unoccupied barracks it will be the duty of the subordinate in charge to keep the engines and appurtenances clean. Leather hose should be dubbed at least six times a year.

105. When an engine is found to be out of repair, notice thereof will at once be given to the officer in charge of barracks, who will make an indent on the D.E.O.S. for the completion of the service.

106. Should the troops be employed under the orders of the O.C. in extinguishing conflagrations in the neighbourhood of barracks, an endeavour should be made to recover from the insurance company or other persons interested the value of any damage to, or loss of, public or personal property occasioned thereby. If no claim is admitted the matter should be dealt with as a loss under the King's Regulations, or reported to the G.O.C. if necessary.



107. Whenever it is necessary to demand a new fire-engine from the Director of Camp and Barrack Construction the following information will be given:—

- (a.) The distance of the nearest fire-engine from the barrack or building for which an engine is required;
- (b.) The greatest height of the buildings for which the engine is required, and their extent;
- (c.) The present arrangements to guard against fire;
- (d.) Whether the water is laid on direct from the water company's main, and whether the pressure is sufficient to force the water to the top of the highest building without the use of a fire-engine.
- (e.) Any further remarks which may be desirable to explain the necessity for the supply.

108. The demands will always state in detail the appurtenances that are required. When appurtenances are required to complete the equipment of an engine, the size of the latter will invariably be stated.

#### Repair of Stores, &c.

109. The officer in charge of barracks will, when convenient, inspect the stores before they are sent for repair and after they are returned.

110. Repairs of barrack stores, &c., will be done in the most economical way possible, care being taken in all cases that the articles are worth the expenditure. Barrack and hospital stores requiring repairs will be sent to the camp workshops whenever possible. When this cannot be done by camp workshops instructions should be asked from D.E.O.S.; at out-stations where no Defence workshop exists offers are to be obtained at reasonable rates before authority is given for the execution of the work.

#### Demands for Expense Stores.

111. Expense-store accountants will prepare annually on form G. 62, in triplicate, by a carbon process, a demand for stores for barracks, hospitals, offices, drill-halls, and military detention-barracks, based on their probable requirements, in accordance with the approved schedule, as regards stores, during the ensuing financial year.

112. When form G. 62 is about to be compiled, steps must be taken to ascertain whether any new barracks, offices, drill-halls, or hospital buildings are to be acquired, or extensive reappropriations will be completed, during the ensuing year. When such is the case a separate demand showing the probable date on which the stores will be required must be put forward with the annual demands.

113. These demands will be most carefully examined by the officer in charge of barracks with a view to ensuring that only such stores as are authorized and as may be really necessary are included. They will then be forwarded with a covering schedule to the A.D. of E. and O.S., who will, after examining and arranging to transfer surpluses as may be necessary from one subdistrict to another, and after amending the demands to agree with the transfers ordered, countersign and forward them through the O.C.D. to the G.O.C. for consideration and approval. When approved, one copy of each demand will be returned to the officer in charge of barracks, and the others will be for the D.E.O.S. and A.D. of E. and O.S., who will supply the district.

114. The demands will be submitted to the G.O.C. not later than the 1st February in each year.

115. Special indents for equipment for new or reappropriated buildings, the requirements for which could not be foreseen at the time of the preparation of the demands referred to in the preceding paragraph, will be put forward as soon as it is known that construction or reappropriation has been approved. The date by which it is anticipated that the buildings will be handed over for occupation will be quoted on the indents.

116. Office copies of all demands will be retained in the sub-districts for reference.

117. The stores asked for in these annual indents will be forwarded by the D.E.O.S. or A.D. of E. and O.S. to the expense-store accountants in proportional consignments, each consignment being as large as the storage accommodation at the station will allow. These consignments will begin as soon after the 1st May of each year for which the stores are demanded as may be most convenient in the district concerned. In the accountant's office copy of the annual demand of each consignment of expense stores received will be marked off (in a column to be made for the purpose) so as to show at a glance how far the demand has been complied with.

118. Officers in charge of barracks will at once notify the A.D. of E. and O.S. in any case when, owing to the reduction of strength or any other cause, it may be found unnecessary to comply fully with the demand.

119. When stores are required at a station, the necessity for which could not have been foreseen at the time of preparing the annual demand, a special indent will be prepared on form G. 64, in duplicate, in copying-ink, and, as regard stores, forwarded through the A.D. of E. and O.S. for approval of the G.O.C., with a full explanation of the circumstances. Accountants will keep copies of these special indents, and will mark off the stores as "received" as provided for in para. 117.

Every effort must be made to prevent the necessity for such demands, and they should only be put forward in cases of real need.

#### Surveys of Unserviceable Stores.

120. Surveys will be held on the authority of the G.O.C. half-yearly, or oftener if necessary, and will ordinarily be carried out by a Board of officers, the president of which should be an officer of experience; or, should the quantity of unserviceable stores brought forward for condemnation be small, by the officer in charge of barracks.

121. The accountant will prepare a return on form (in duplicate) of the several articles intended to be brought forward for condemnation. Articles that have deteriorated or become damaged in store will be shown in the return in a separate group. These forms will be transmitted to the D.E.O.S. to enable him to decide what course is to be pursued with regard to the survey.

122. In the selection of stores for survey the accountant will be responsible that no articles, other than those which have become unfit for service through fair wear, or those of minor value or importance which have become damaged or have deteriorated in store, are produced, and that nothing is brought for condemnation which has already been charged to the troops as having been destroyed by them.

123. Officers conducting the surveys will inspect and count all articles minutely, and satisfy themselves as to their unserviceability before they are condemned. Should any be considered fit for further use they will be shown either as "repairable" or "serviceable" in the column in form G. 65 headed "Condition of Stores as found after Survey."

124. Utensils condemned will be immediately broken, marked, or mutilated in the presence of the officers conducting the survey, so as to prevent the possibility of their again being brought into use, and a certificate to this effect will appear on the proceedings.

125. Copper articles, old brass, lead, zinc, pewter, and cast and wrought iron will be forwarded to the ordnance stores.

126. Broom and brush heads and brushes will be burned in the presence of the officers. Wooden articles will, if suitable, be converted into firewood, and, together with the ironwork (when it cannot be advantageously disposed of as directed in para. 125), tin, and other produce not already specified, will be separated into lots and weighed, the produce being entered in the columns set apart for the purpose at the end of the report of survey. The proceedings on form G. 65 will then be forwarded to the D.E.O.S. for the authority of the G.O.C. for the disposal of the produce by public sale or otherwise. The sale will be supervised by an officer, who will also be present at the transfer of stores to the purchaser.

127. The regulations to be observed in all cases of sales are laid down in Appendix 5.

128. The report of the survey on stores will be forwarded, in duplicate, to the D.E.O.S. for the covering approval of the G.O.C.

129. One copy of the report will be returned to the accountant: this will form the voucher by which he will strike the stores off charge, and their disposal will be accounted for by certificates or sub-vouchers as follows:—

- (a.) If directed to be forwarded to store, by the receipt of the consignee.
- (b.) If retained for future disposal, by being rebrought on charge by weight.

Care will be taken that none of these stores are struck off in the ledgers until the whole have been disposed of according to the directions of the G.O.C., or accounted for as directed above.

#### Expense-store Accounts; Accountants.

130. Expense-store accountants at the various stations will render their accounts to the officer in charge of barracks, who will audit them. Should an accountant be responsible for the equipment of more than one area, he will not render separate accounts for each, but will render one account for all the stores in his charge.

131. The officer in charge of barracks will keep a record in book G. 51A of the remain with each accountant at the date of the transmission of the account, in order that he may be able to check the state of the next account.

132. In addition to the records of inventories and other documents already referred to, the accountant will keep the following books: Ledger (book G. 51); balance-sheet (book G. 51A); Furniture and Utensils Repair-book (book G. 54).

#### Ledger-book.

133. The ledger will be a group record of the final transactions connected with the expense stores required for the equipment of offices, drill-halls, barracks, hospitals, detention-barracks, and departmental establishments at the stations. Issues to and receipts from inventory will not be entered in the ledger.

134. The vouchers for all consignments of stores will be sent to the officer in charge of barracks in the subdistrict, who, having obtained the acknowledgment of the accountant, will countersign the receipt voucher and return it to the consignor. He will keep a careful record of all such vouchers, and of all other vouchers affecting the ledger charge of accountants which pass through his hands in

135. Vouchers will be entered in the ledger as received, and will be numbered consecutively, in separate series for receipts and issues for each half-year.

In the event of its being necessary to put up with the account blank vouchers to account for missing vouchers, a brief explanation of the circumstances, signed by an officer, should be given on the blank vouchers. The addition of letters or sub-numbers to the voucher numbers is prohibited.

136. Should the stores not agree with the voucher, the actual number of the stores received will be entered in the ledger, and in returning the voucher the accountant will report the discrepancies to the officer in charge of barracks, who will communicate with the consignor in order that they may be adjusted; should any alterations in the vouchers be necessary, they will be made and initialled by the officer in charge of barracks, one copy of the correspondence being attached in support.

137. In any case in which the consignor and consignee cannot come to an agreement as to what numbers and descriptions of stores were actually sent, the former will forward the correspondence to the D.E.O.S. for disposal in accordance with the King's Regulations, para. 1852.

138. No alterations are to be made in the figures on the vouchers, nor any remarks entered thereon, except as directed in para. 136.

139. On return of receipted vouchers for stores issued to another accountant, should the date and number of the voucher bringing the stores on charge not have been entered thereon, the accountant will at once take the necessary steps to have the required information inserted.

140. The ledger will be balanced and closed on the 30th April and 31st October in each year, and at a transfer of stores from one accountant to another.

#### Accounts.

141. When closed, book G. 51, together with the balance-sheet (book 51A) and the supporting vouchers, will be forwarded to the officer in charge of barracks, who will, after auditing and signing the account, forward the ledger to the A.D. of E. and O.S. for audit, after which the ledger will be returned to the officer in charge of barracks for transmission to the accountant, together with the vouchers and balance-sheet (book G. 51A). The actual number of articles found in store, the number representing the total charge, and any surpluses or deficiencies will be entered on the lines specially provided for transfers in the balance-sheet.

142. When expense-store ledgers (G. 51) or balance-sheet (G. 51A) are transmitted to the A.D. of E. and O.S. they will be accompanied by a statement showing the necessity for retention where the stocks of any items are considerably in excess of numbers on inventory, authority being quoted when such exists.

#### Furniture and Utensils Repair Account (G. 54).

143. Articles requiring repair, either by regimental artificer, by a contractor, or local tradesmen, or at ordnance workshops, will be entered in book G. 54 and signed for by the person receiving the same.

144. Before forwarding vouchers for payment the officer will satisfy himself that the numbers of articles returned agree with the entries in book G. 54, and that the work has been properly performed.

145. The accountant will use every endeavour to obtain the return of the stores sent for repair as soon as possible after they have been given out, and will bring any delay to the notice of the officer in charge of barracks.

#### Erasures.

146. No erasures will be permitted in any of the before-mentioned books, but should it be necessary to make any alteration, the figures will be ruled through in ink, and the correct figures inserted above, each alteration being duly initialled. Should any dispute arise owing to erasures having been made in the figures, the accountant will be held strictly responsible for any loss which may occur. All blank spaces will be ruled through.

#### Transfer of Expense Stores (Forts, &c., and Standing Camps).

147. When a transfer of the charge of expense stores from one accountant to another takes place, a complete stock-taking of all stores in charge of the accountant to be relieved will be held, in order that his responsibility may be determined, and that the stock for which the accountant taking over charge will be responsible may be ascertained.

148. The accountant about to be relieved, on receiving notification that a transfer is to be made, will at once cause all stores out for repair, &c., to be returned to store by the contractors. He will also arrange for all statements of rooms in occupation and inventories of hospitals, &c., to be verified and redated by the responsible officers.

149. When the officer in charge of barracks has satisfied himself that the instructions in paras. 147 and 148 have been complied with, he will make arrangements with the various C.O.s as for an annual inspection and stock-taking, and will stop all expense-stores

transactions at the station during the transfer. He will then make an inspection of all stores in possession of the troops in barracks, hospitals, &c., and for this purpose will visit every room affected and check such inventory with the office records of inventories and make all necessary amendments. When this has been duly completed he will compare the office records with the pencil abstract referred to in para. 77, and, after it has been duly verified, will make a copy of it, which will be completed and totalled in ink before the commencement of the stock-taking.

150. The ledger G. 51 will then be closed and the remains carried out in the balance-sheet (G. 51A), which will serve as the transfer return, and underneath the ledger remain in the transfer return will be entered the total of the abstract of inventories.

151. Another copy of the balance-sheet will be used for stock-taking purposes, a separate line being used for each store, &c. The incoming accountant will count the different articles in the presence of the officer, who will himself enter the figures in the book in indelible pencil or ink. Under no circumstances should entries be made in this book by the accountant. The articles in each store will be counted by both outgoing and incoming accountants in the presence of the officer.

152. The totals of the actual number of articles as counted and shown in the balance-sheet (G. 51A) will be entered in one line in the transfer return mentioned in para. 150, underneath the total of the abstract of inventories on the line "Totals in store." The totals in this line, together with the totals of the abstract of inventories, will form the charge of the new accountant, who will certify at the end of the document that he has been placed in possession of all the stores shown on the line on which that total is entered (line 4 of transfer return).

153. Should the counting occupy more than one day, the officer in charge of barracks will at the close of each day receive over and take charge of the keys of the storerooms until the counting is finished. The keys will not, however, be removed from the barracks, but will be placed under seal in charge of the nearest guard, so as to be available in case of fire.

154. The officer in charge of barracks will then cause this "charge" to be entered in the station ledger (G. 51) of the new accountant, who will certify at the end of the ledger that he has been placed in possession of all the stores entered therein.

155. In the transfer return will then be entered, on the next two lines to the "charge" of the new accountant, the stores surplus and deficient, which will be found by a comparison with the "charge" of the new accountant and the "remain" shown on the closing of the old account.

156. The officer in charge of barracks will make out a list of the stores so found surplus and deficient, which he will hand over to the outgoing accountant for his explanations.

157. The transfer returns will then be finally completed by being signed by the outgoing accountant and by the officer in charge of barracks, who will immediately audit the account and forward it with his observations to the A.D. of E. and O.S. In transmitting the documents a reference should be given in the letter to the G.O.C. reporting the steps taken with regard to any deficiencies (see para. 161, and King's Regulations, para 668). The explanations of the outgoing accountant, referred to in para. 156, will be similarly transmitted when received. The accountant will be responsible for the deficiencies, and will be dealt with as laid down in King's Regulations.

The A.D. of E. and O.S., after auditing, will forward the transfers through the O.C. District to the G.O.C.

#### Groups.

158. When a transfer of the charge of expense stores from one accountant to another takes place, the accountant about to be relieved will—

- (a.) At once obtain from the officer or N.C.O. in charge of out-station a certificate to the effect that he is or is not in possession of articles shown on the inventories at his station.
- (b.) The certificate will be attached to \_\_\_\_\_ in support of stores shown on inventory at the particular station.
- (c.) At accountant's headquarters, the articles in each store buildings, &c., will be counted by both outgoing and incoming accountants in the presence of an officer, and the transfer carried out as laid down for forts, barracks, &c.

159. In no case will the transmission to the G.O.C. of the transfer documents be delayed beyond twenty-one days from the date of completion of transfer. When the outgoing accountant is about to be discharged the documents will be transmitted earlier if possible, in order that his responsibility may be at once determined.

160. No erasure of any description will be permitted in any of the documents connected with the transfer; should any alteration be necessary, the figures will be ruled through, and the correct figures inserted above, each alteration being initialled by the officer in charge of barracks and by the incoming accountant.

161. At all transfers the officer in charge of barracks should satisfy himself that there are no claims of contractors or others remaining unsettled, and a certificate that this has been done will be appended to the report referred to in para. 157.



**Camps.**

162. Indents for camp equipment will be prepared by units or individuals to whom issues are authorized by regulations, and transmitted to the A.D. of E. and O.S. of the district in which the encampment is to take place.

Officers authorized to indent for camp equipment will ensure that the whole of the information required by the forms is fully detailed upon them, that the quantities of equipment included are in accord with the authorized scales for the number of officers and men to be encamped, and that the indents are transmitted in ample time to allow the A.D. of E. and O.S. to arrange for delivery of the equipment by the date desired.

163. Camp equipment, other than that supplied to units as permanent equipment for instructional purposes, will not be brought on charge in equipment ledgers.

At the termination of the encampment the accounts, with the whole of their supporting vouchers, will be transmitted to the A.D. of E. and O.S. of the district in which the issues were made.

164. Charges for deficient camp equipment will be assessed in accordance with the instructions contained in para. 82, except that a reduction from full vocabulary rates will only be made upon the certificate of the A.D. of E. and O.S. who made the issue that the rates charged are the actual or fair proportionate value of the articles deficient.

165. When the issue of tentage to supplement barrack accommodation is authorized, tents, and if necessary tent-bottoms, bed-boards, and trestles, will be obtained from the A.D. of E. and O.S. All barrack stores will be obtained from the officer in charge of barracks.

166. Prior to leaving the camp, or at the termination of the service, accounting officers will see that all the articles taken on charge are duly accounted for in book G. 59 (Account of Equipment for Camp Service) as either returned into store or deficient. Any deficiencies will be charged against the unit or individual officer to whom the equipment has been issued, except in the case of wooden tent-pins, of which 5 per cent. may be written off charge as expended by fair wear. In the event of lost stores being subsequently found, the procedure laid down in para. 86 will be followed.

167. At encampments where local conditions or circumstances render it impossible, or, in the opinion of the G.O.C., undesirable, to dig trenches for latrine purposes, and the dry earth-closet system has to be specially resorted to, latrine buckets may be issued in the following proportions:—

- For officers: 20 per cent. of number of officers encamped.
- For other ranks: 10 per cent. of number of other ranks encamped.

168. To prevent the injury caused by damp and mildew, all tents, blankets, nosebags, sheep-skins, canvas and leather buckets, and other canvas, linen, cotton, woollen, or leather articles which have become wet while in use, will be thoroughly dried and cleaned as far as possible by the troops before return to store.

Camp kettles and other articles liable to injury from rust will also be dried and cleaned by the troops before return to store.

169. When troops under canvas have to march on immediate orders, the Q.M. will confer with the O.C. troops as to the steps which should be taken for the drying and cleaning of the camp equipment prior to its being returned into store on the breaking-up of the camp.

170. The A.D. of E. and O.S. will bring to the notice of the O.C.D. any instances in which the camp equipment is not returned into store in a proper state, due allowance being made for fair wear-and-tear.

4. Articles not found in their proper place according to inventory will be shown as "D"—deficient; articles found out of their proper place will be shown as "S"—surplus; and on completion of the inspection the balance can be made as shown in the case of the meat-dish above; the surplus cancels an article of the same description.

5. Each book will be given an office number, and the period during which it has been in use will be written on the cover. The books will be preserved and handed over as office records.

APPENDIX 5.

Sales.

(Referred to in para. 127.)

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1. THE only circumstances in which it is permissible to dispose of Army stores without previous reference to the G.O.C. are specifically laid down in regulations. Warlike stores or serviceable uniform clothing will not in any case be disposed of without previous sanction.

2. The utmost vigilance will be exercised by all officers concerned in the question of sales, with a view to securing the greatest advantage to the Government in dealing with the goods, a reserve price being fixed in all cases of auction sales and in other cases when necessary.

3. Public advertisement to a reasonable extent should be made of the goods for disposal by the officer responsible for the sale.

4. In every case of sale, before parting with goods sold, the officer concerned will take steps to ensure that they have been paid for. This certificate will support the write-off of the stores in the accounts.

5. The cash debit voucher will in every case show the nature of sale, whether by auction, tender, or private treaty, and will be supported by a certificate from the responsible officer that the method of disposal was the most advantageous in the circumstances, and that the best prices obtainable were realized.

6. No officer or other person in the services of the Crown or in the departments of the Army will be permitted to purchase Army stores except as provided for in regulations.

SALES BY TENDER.

7. Forms of tender should be issued to likely contractors. These should provide for—

- (a.) Facility to firms tendering to inspect goods for sale.
- (b.) Sale by lots, if the quantities offered for sale at one tendering are large.
- (c.) Payments before removal—the officer to whom payment is to be made and the mode of payment to be stated. Security for fulfilment of contract.
- (d.) Removal within time fixed. Any articles not so removed to be forfeited and resold and security forfeited. Loss, if any, to be recovered from first buyer.
- (e.) Goods to remain at buyers' risk until removal, and no expense to be borne by Government, except such as may be incurred in loading up when it is considered desirable that this should be carried out by the military.
- (f.) Goods to be sold duty-free.

SALES BY AUCTION.

8. Only firms of the highest standing should be employed as auctioneers. An officer should attend the sale, and certify lots sold, and report in writing how the sale was conducted, such report to be attached to the cash debit voucher.

9. When stores are few and of small value, they may be disposed of by a subordinate in the presence of an officer who will certify the debit voucher. The subordinate will not be entitled to any remuneration.

10. When an auctioneer is employed, the officer in charge of the stores will (in conjunction with the auctioneer, if necessary) prepare an inventory or catalogue of the stores to be sold. The conditions of sale will be plainly stated thereon.

11. The auctioneer will recover the amounts due from purchasers and pay them over, less his agreed commission, to the officer supervising the sale, who will credit the amount in his accounts.

SALES TO PUBLIC BODIES.

12. Sales to Government, municipal, and local authorities may be made by special negotiation if circumstances justify this course, and the prices agreed on are advantageous.

SALES BY PRIVATE TREATY.

13. Sales by private treaty will not be made without the express sanction of the General Officer, and a special report of the circumstances attending each transaction will be attached to the accounts.

If in any case it is considered necessary in the public interest, on grounds of very special urgency, to depart from this rule, an immediate application for the covering sanction of the G.O.C. will be made.

10. Are the instructions as to surveys of stores and the disposal of condemned articles properly carried out?
11. Are office records of inventories made out by "barrack accountant," not "by units," and kept correctly?
12. Are all indents on contractors signed by an officer?

The total births in the four chief cities and their suburban boroughs amounted to 526, against 660 in June—a decrease of 134. The deaths in July were 238—a decrease of 422 as compared with the previous month. Of the total deaths males contributed 127, females 111. Thirty-eight of the deaths were of children under five years of age, being 15.96 per cent. of the whole number; 30 of these were under one year of age.

There were 93 deaths of persons of 65 years and upwards in the four chief cities and their suburban boroughs, as against 101 in June. The following table shows the classification:—

SUMMARY FOR THE MONTH OF JUNE, 1916.

With the exception of a small westerly depression which passed in the south, and brought some heavy rain in the West Coast and southernmost districts on the 5th, an anticyclone ruled during the first half of the month. Observers in various parts of the Dominion reported mild, spring-like weather during this period.

After the 17th the barometer fell steadily, and a succession of low-pressure systems passed over the country until the 26th, accounting for very unsettled and wet weather.

On the 27th and 28th a small anticyclone prevailed, but this was quickly followed by a disturbance passing somewhat south of Cook Strait on the 29th, when general rain fell.

Precipitation was considerably above the average in the southern half of the South Island and in parts of Hawke's Bay and Auckland districts, but elsewhere it was below.

## GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

This block, known as Dolbel's Kaiwaka Station, lies to the north of Napier, from fifteen to thirty-two miles between the Esk River on the west and the Waikoau Stream and the Tongio Settlement on the east.

Having been held under Native lease for the past thirty years, with no valuation for improvements, it has been allowed to go back, the fences being old and of little value; and all the sections are capable of great improvement by clearing, ploughing, and sowing.

The southern or improved portion now about to be offered is about two-thirds of the whole block, and may be said to comprise a tipped tableland from 1,000 ft. to 2,000 ft. above sea-level, the general contour of which is intersected by big deep and broad valleys, falling to within 200 ft. of sea-level, affording excellent shelter for stock. Well watered and grassed, mostly native. Generally good soil, on clay or pumice, with outcrop of limestone; with patches of manuka scrub and light bush; blackberry along the Wairoa Road face. The proposed East Coast Railway traverses the block, though, running along the Esk River face, it is not accessible to most of the sections. The right is reserved to take all the land required for the line without paying compensation.

Last year this block wintered 27,000 sheep and 3,000 lambs; 2,000 being carried on the unimproved portion of about 8,000 acres at present withheld from sale, and the remainder on the area of 15,669 acres now being offered.

Suitable ploughable land for root crops will be found on most of the sections, and homestead-sites on all.

The boundaries and areas of sections shown on the plan are only approximate, and are subject to revision, as the survey is incomplete. The boundaries, however, are marked on the ground. All existing tracks throughout the block must be kept open until such time as the surveyed roads are formed.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers in that behalf contained in section 33 of the Gaming Act, 1908, and of all other powers and authorities it enabling in that behalf, the Kurow Jockey Club, a racing club within the meaning of the said Act (hereinafter referred to as “the said club”), doth hereby make the following regulations controlling the admission of persons to that part of the racecourse situate in the District of Kurow, and known as the Kurow Jockey Club's Racecourse, while the said racecourse is used or occupied by the said club for race meetings.

(c.) Common prostitutes, and persons who habitually consort with thieves or with persons who have no lawful visible means of support.

**F**OR Deaf Children of sound intellect. The pupils are taught to understand and use ordinary speech. The full charge for board and education is £40 a year, but less is accepted from parents who cannot afford to pay this amount. In case of necessity admission is free.

By the Education Act it is compulsory for deaf children to come under instruction at the age of six, and to continue until the age of twenty-one unless the Education Department previously grants exemption. Though a child is, as a rule, best fitted to begin the school course at the age of six, advice should be obtained as soon as any sign of deafness is observed.

The following classes of deaf children are admitted to the School for the Deaf (sound intellect being always a necessity):—

1. Children born deaf, or who have lost their hearing before learning to speak.
2. Children who can hear a little, but are too deaf to be taught in a public school.
3. Children who have lost their hearing after having learned to speak.

The Act imposes upon every parent, teacher of a school (either public or private), constable, or officer of a charitable or kindred institution who is aware of the place of residence (either temporary or permanent) of a deaf child and the householder in whose house any such child resides, an obligation to send notification of the fact to the Minister of Education, giving the name, age, and address of the child: and any neglect or failure to comply with this provision involves liability to a fine.
