

IN pursuance and exercise of the power and authority con-ferred upon him by the National Provident Fund Act, 1910 (hereinafter referred to as "the said Act"), His Excel-1910 (hereinafter referred to as "the said Act"), His Excel-lency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby amend in the manner hereinafter set forth the regulations made under the said Act on the ninth day of January, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, and published in the *Gazette* of the nineteenth day of the same month.

REGULATION.

REGULATION 24 of the said regulations is hereby revoked, and the following is substituted therefor :-

PAYMENT OF CONTRIBUTIONS AND CLAIMS.

24. Contributions to the fund may be paid at any postal money-order office or at the district offices of the Superin-tendent at Auckland, Wellington, Christchurch, and Dunedin. (a.) Accounts of all moneys received by Postmasters shall be rendered periodically to the Superintendent by the General Post Office. Contributions received at any district office of

Post Office. Contributions received at any district office of the Superintendent shall be accounted for as hereunder. (b.) The receiver of contributions attached to any such district office must in all cases give a receipt for moneys received.-

(1.) In the contributor's book; or

(2.) In the special receipt-book, in case contributor does not produce his own book.

Under (1), when the pay-in slip and the butt have been filled in, signed, and date-stamped, the pay-in slip is to be detached by the receiving officer and kept by him for use in accounting to the accounting officer for the sum, and the contributor's book handed back to the contributor. Each contribution received direct from a contributor at the district office must be entered by the accounting officer in the cashbook.

Under (2), after the receipt has been filled in with carbon copy, the original receipt is to be detached from the book and handed to the contributor. The receiving officer will thereupon detach the pay-in slip of the same number, which must accompany the amount when accounted for. The butt

must accompany the amount when accounted for. The butt will remain in the special receipt-book to show the transaction. (c.) Officers or employees receiving any contribution must account for it to the accounting officer not later than the day following the date of receipt, except where a Sunday or a holiday intervenes. The "accounting officer" is the permanent officer employed on clerical work in the Superintendent's district office.

(d.) A pay-in book is to be issued to each collecting officer. (d.) A pay-in book is to be issued to each collecting oncer. The particulars of the contributions received are to be entered on the back of the pay-in slip in this book (or on schedule form N.P.F. 75 where necessary) by the person holding the book. The accounting officer must check the particulars on the slips from each collector's pay-in book against the indi-vidual slips from contributors' or special receipt-books in support thereof, then check the cash, duly stamp and initial the book and retain the collector's pay-in slip (and schedule the book, and retain the collector's pay-in slip (and schedule if used) for the local office record.

(e.) The accounting officer shall on receipt of these moneys immediately enter the amounts in the cash-book provided for the purpose. An amount not exceeding £20 may be held to pay such claims as are authorized under subsection (i) of

to pay such claims as are authorized under subsection (i) of this regulation. All moneys in excess of this amount must be at once paid in at a postal money-order office. (f.) All white pay-in slips or group slips which go to make up the gross daily total received by the accounting officer must be sent direct to the Superintendent each day. (g.) The Supervisor shall daily check the pay-in slips re-bins the contributions provided at the counter series the

lating to contributions received at the counter against the entries in the cash book before sending the slips to Welling-ton, and each week check the office cash book entries against the collector's pay-in book, and against the accounting officer's pay-in book, and initial the latter. He shall forward a certified copy of the cash-book to the Superintendent every week.

(h.) The Supervisor shall from time to time examine the receipt book used where contributors' books are not presented, in order to ascertain that the sequence of numbers has been duly observed in issuing receipts, and that the amounts shown therein have been duly accounted for.

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(i.) Payments in respect of claims for benefits as approved in each case by the Superintendent in terms of the said Act may be made at any postal money-order office, or at the district offices of the Superintendent at Auckland, Welling-ton, Christchurch, and Dunedin, out of the cash in hand. (j.) Paying officers must take reasonable steps to satisfy themselves as to the identity of the parene delaying respective.

themselves as to the identity of the person claiming payment, such person being required to produce the Superintendent's notice of payment, and to furnish such other proof of identity

The paying officer must certify on the voucher that the identification is satisfactory, and see that the receipt is properly signed in accordance with law. When payment is completed, the voucher must be date-stamped at the right foot and initialled by the paying officer.

Regulations governing the Importation into the United States of America of Live-stock and of Hides and other Animal By-products.—Notice No. 1905.

Department of Agriculture, Industries, and Commerce, Wellington, 4th December, 1917. THE following extracts from regulations issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, governing the importation into the United States of America of live-stock and of hides and other animal by-products, are pub-lished for general information.

W. D. S. MACDONALD, Minister of Agriculture

LIVE-STOCK.

Certificate for Ruminants.

Regulation 4. All ruminants imported into the United States from any part of the world except North America shall be accompanied by a certificate from the local authority of the district in which the said animals have been continuously located for six months next preceding the date of shipment, stating that no tuberculosis has existed on the premises, and

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no contagious pleuro-pneumonia, foot-and-mouth disease, anthrax, rinderpest, or any other disease contagious to cattle, except tuberculosis, has existed in said district for six months preceding.

Certificate for Swine.

Regulation 6. All swine imported into the United States from any part of the world except North America shall be accompanied by a certificate similar to the one required for cattle, sheep, and other ruminants, but relating to the existence of foot-and mouth disease, hog cholera, swine plague, and erysipelas.

Affidavits for Ruminants and Swine.

Regulation 7. All ruminants and swine imported into the United States from any part of the world except North America shall also be accompanied by an affidavit of the owner stating that said animals have been continuously located in the district whence shipped for six months next preceding the date of shipment, that no contagious disease affecting the species of animals imported has existed among them nor among any animals of their kind with which they have come in contact for six months last past, and that no inoculation has been practised among said animals during the preceding year; also by an affidavit from the importer or his agent supervising the shipment, stating that they have not passed through any district infected with contagious diseases affecting said kind of animals, that they have not been exposed in any possible manner to the contagion of any of the said contagious' diseases, and that the animals, when not trailed or driven, have been shipped in clean and disinfected cars and vessels direct from the farm where purchased.

Presentation of Papers to Collector of Customs.

Regulation 8. The certificates and affidavits hereinabove required must accompany said animals and be presented to the Collector of Customs at the port of entry, and be by him delivered to the Inspector of the Bureau of Animal Industry stationed at said port, to allow the animals to be imported into the United States.

Period of Quarantine.

Regulation 9. All cattle imported into the United States from any part of the world except North America, Great Britain, Ireland, and the Channel Islands shall be subject to a quarantine of not less than ninety days counting from the date of shipment, this date of shipment to be the date of clearance of the vessel bringing the animals to the United States. Sheep and other ruminants and swine from any part of the world except North America shall be subject to a quarantine of not less than fifteen days, counting from the date of arrival at the quarantine station:

Provided that cattle and sheep imported for immediate slaughter at the port of landing may be imported without quarantine, but shall be subject to such restrictions as the Chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry, after causing an inspection to be made, may consider necessary in each case for guarding the domestic animals of the United States from contagion.

Tuberculin Test for Cattle.

Regulation 10. All cattle six months old or over imported into the United States from Great Britain, Ireland, and the Channel Islands, and which are subject to quarantine, shall be tested with tuberculin by an Inspector of the Bureau of Animal Industry either before being shipped or after arrival at the animal quarantine station at the port of entry; and, when considered necessary, a subsequent tuberculin test of imported cattle shall be made during the last two weeks of their quarantine period. Cattle from countries not otherwise provided for shall be tested in the said quarantine stations. All cattle so tested which show a reaction shall be prohibited from entry into the United States or be disposed of as provided in these regulations.

Permits for Import Animals.

Regulation 11. Any person contemplating the importation of cattle, sheep, and other ruminants, and swine, from any part of the world except North America must first obtain from the Secretary of Agriculture two permits, one stating the number and kind of animals to be imported, the port, and probable date of shipment, which will on presentation to the American Consul at the said port of shipment entitle them to a clearance; the other stating the port at which said animals are to be landed and quarantined, and the approximate date of their arrival, and this will assure their reception at the port and quarantine station on the date prescribed for their arrival or at any time during three weeks immediately following, after which the permit will be void.

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These permits shall in no case be available at any port other than the one mentioned therein.

Permits must be in the name of the owner of or agent for each separate lot of animals. Permits will be issued to quarantine at such port as the importer may elect, so far as facilities exist at such port, but in no case will permits for importation at any port be granted in excess of the accommodation of the Government quarantine station at such port.

Papers by United States Consuls.

Regulation 12. United States Consuls should give clearance papers or certificates for animals from their districts intended for exportation to the United States only upon presentation of permits as above provided, with dates of probable arrival and destination corresponding with said permits, and in no case for a number in excess of that mentioned therein. When such shipments originate in the interior of a foreign country these permits should be submitted to the Consul of that district, and through the forwarding agent to the Consul at the port of embarkation.

HIDES AND OTHER ANIMAL BY-PRODUCTS.

Regulation I.—Hides and Skins.

Section 1. All hides of neat cattle, calf-skins, buffalo-hides, sheep-skins, goat-skins, and deer-skins offered for entry into the United States from any foreign country (except abattoir and hard sun-dried hides and skins as hereinafter provided) must be accompanied by a certificate signed by the United States consular officer of the district from which such hides or skins are shipped, or by a certificate issued by the chief of the veterinary service or the duly authorized sanitary inspector of the country from which such hides or skins are shipped, authenticated by the said United States consular officer, stating that anthrax is not prevalent and that neither foot-and-mouth disease nor rinderpest exists in such district, or by a certificate signed by the said consular officer showing that such hides or skins have been disinfected by immersion for not less than twenty-four hours in a 1 to 1,000 bichlorideof-mercury solution.

of-mercury solution. Section 2. If such hides or skins (other than abattoir and hard sun-dried hides and skins) offered for entry into the United States are certified, as required by section 1, to be from a district where anthrax is not prevalent, but in which either foot-and-mouth disease or rinderpest exists, they will be admitted if certified by the United States consular officer of the district from which shipped to have been disinfected by immersion, for not less than thirty minutes, either in a 1 to 1,000 bichloride-of-mercury solution or in a 5-per-cent solution of carbolic acid. Section 3. Such hides or skins (other than abattoir and hard sun-dried hides and skins), if packed in bales the exterior surface of each of which is thoroughly whitewashed under consular supervision prior to shipment, may be im-

Section 3. Such hides or skins (other than abattoir and hard sun-dried hides and skins), if packed in bales the exterior surface of each of which is thoroughly white washed under consular supervision prior to shipment, may be imported without previous disinfection upon the conditions that they will be disinfected at the owner's expense after arrival at destination in the United States, that the destination is a tannery having proper facilities for disinfecting the same, that they will move from the port of entry only under Customs seal, and that they will be disinfected at destination under the supervision of the Bureau of Animal Industry—(a) when certified as required by section 1 to be from a district where anthrax is not prevalent, by immersion in a 5-per-cent. solution of carbolic acid, or a 2-per-cent. 'solution of chloride of lime, or a 1 to 5,000 solution of bichloride of mercury, with not less than twentyfour hours' exposure; or (b) when not certified in any of the forms aforesaid, by immersion in a 1 to 1,000 bichlorideof-mercury solution with not less than forty-eight hours' exposure, or in a 1 to 5,000 bichloride-of mercury solution with not less than six days' exposure plus not less than five days in lime of the usual strength for dehairing. Section 4. Hard sun-dried hides and skins may be imported without disinfection if certified as required in Section 1 to be from a district or districts where anthrax is not prevalent if each hale or hide is distinctly marked for

Section 4. Hard sun-dried hides and skins may be imported without disinfection if certified as required in Section 1 to be from a district or districts where anthrax is not prevalent, if each bale or hide is distinctly marked for identification, each shipment showing invoice number, names and addresses of consignees and consignor, as such hard sundried hides and skins so certified showing freedom from anthrax can be considered as having been disinfected by the process of curing, and need not be submitted to any further treatment; or such hides or skins may be imported without being certified to be from a district where anthrax is not prevalent if accompanied by a consular certificate showing them to have been disinfected, prior to shipment, by immersion for not less than twenty-four hours in a 1 to 1,000 bichloride-of-mercury solution; or such hides and skins may be imported without any certification upon the conditions prescribed in section 3 for importations to be disinfected at destination in the United States by immer-

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sion in a 1 to 1,000 bichloride-of-mercury solution with not less than forty-eight hours' exposure, or in a 1 to 5,000bichloride-of-mercury solution with not less than six days' exposure plus not less than five days in lime of the usual strength for dehairing.

Regulation II.-Abattoir Hides and Skins.

Abattoir hides and skins taken from animals slaughtered in Sweden, Norway, Australia, New Zealand, Great Britain, Uruguay, and Argentine, when accompanied by a certificate of an official veterinarian of the country where such animals were slaughtered, showing that such hides or skins were taken from animals free from disease at the time of slaughter, may be imported into the United States without disinfection.

Regulation III.—Glue Stock.

Fleshings, hide cuttings and parings, or glue stock shall be subject to disinfection and certification under the requirements of these regulations the same as hides and skins, except that such fleshings, hide cuttings and parings, or glue stock may be imported without disinfection if shown by a consular invoice used upon entry, or by a consular certificate, to have been sterilized by heat (not less than 200° F.) or by acidulation, or to have been lime-dried after working for not here then show a strong lime work 200° F.) or by acidulation, or to have been lime-dried after soaking for not less than seven days in a strong lime-wash made by slacking quicklime in water in such proportion as to be of, a creamy consistency, or to have been dried by exposure to the action of the sun and air for a sufficient time to render each piece of the hardness of a sun-dried hide; provided the consignee or his agent files a satisfactory bond or agreement that said materials and containers will be handled or sterilized in a manner acceptable to the Bureau of Animal Industry before distribution from the factory or establishment to which consigned.

Regulation IV.-Bones, Hoofs, and Horns.

Section 1. Bones, hoofs, and horns which are clean, dry, and free from pieces of hide, flesh, or sinews may be imported without restrictions other than a satisfactory agreement on

without restrictions other than a satisfactory agreement on the part of the consignee or his agent to destroy or sterilize the bags or containers thereof at destination. Section 2. Bones, hoofs, and horns with pieces of hides or tendons attached, and also horn piths, either will be sub-ject to the requirements of Regulation 3 or may be forwarded to a factory or other establishment in sealed cars warded to a factory or other establishment in sealed cars after the bags or containers have been sprayed with lime-wash under the supervision of an Inspector of the Bureau of Animal Industry; provided the consignee or his agent files a satisfactory bond or agreement that such materials will be sterilized in an acceptable manner before distribution from the factory or other establishment to which shipped, and that the bags or containers thereof will be sterilized or destroyed destroyed.

Regulation V.-Wool and Hair.

Section 1. Raw wool or hair clipped from live animals, wool or hair which has been properly scoured, and noils of wool and hair which have been similarly processed may be imported without disinfection or certification.

Section 2. Picked or pulled wool or hair may be imported Section 2. Ficked or pulled wool or hair may be imported if accompanied by a declaration of the exporter, authenticated by the United States Consul at the port of shipment, desig-nating the bales or packages thereof by their markings, indi-cating the consignor, consignee, and number of the invoice, and stating that all the wool or hair contained in the bales or packages came from animals free from anthrax. The consigner or prime of the med to hair or his agent, shell he consignee or owner of the wool or hair, or his agent, shall be required to file a satisfactory bond or agreement assuring proper facilities of disinfection at the establishment to which proper facilities of disinfection at the establishment to which the shipment is consigned, and that such wool or hair will be disinfected or sterilized by proper exposure to a temperature of not less than 165° F. prior to any transfer or reshipment from such establishment. If such wool or hair when offered for entry is unaccompanied by the above-mentioned decla-ration, its entry will be permitted upon condition that the consignee or owner thereof or his agent files a satisfactory bond or agreement assuring proper facilities for disinfection at the establishment to which the shipment is consigned, and that all of such wool or hair will be disinfected or sterilized by proper exposure to a temperature of not less than 200° F. for at least fifteen minutes prior to any transfer or reshipment from such establishment. from such establishment.

Section 3. Importation of abattoir pulled wool will be permitted without restrictions from any country maintaining a veterinary inspection system ascertained by the Secretary of Agriculture, and certified by him to the Secretary of the Treasury from time to time, to be the substantial equivalent of the veterinary inspection system maintained by the United States, when accompanied by a certificate signed by an

official veterinary inspector of such country to the effect that said wool was procured from sheep slaughtered therein under Government inspection, and that in the process of wet pulling and drying it has been subjected to a temperature of not less than 165° F. Such certificate must indicate the number of bales, marks, names and addresses of consignor and consignee, district of origin, date of shipment, invoice number. and vessel transporting.

and consignee, district of origin, date of shipment, invoice number, and vessel transporting. Section 4. Wool or hair not otherwise provided for in these regulations or not complying with the provisions thereof may be imported upon the condition that such articles will be shipped from port of entry to destination in sealed cars or satisfactory sealed containers after the bales have been whitewashed at the port of entry under the supervision of an Inspector of the Bureau of Animal Industry, that the destina-tion be a factory or establishment having satisfactory facilities for sterilizing or disinfecting the same, and that they will there be sterilized or disinfected by proper exposure to a temperature of not less than 200° F. for at least fifteen minutes or in such manner as may be directed by the Chief of the or in such manner as may be directed by the Chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry prior to any transfer or reship-ment therefrom. Such wool or hair may be stored in bond at the port of entry, subject to shipment and sterilization or disinfection, as herein provided, on being released from bond. The consignee, owner, or his agent will be required to file a satisfactory bond or agreement to fulfil all requirements as to shipments or disinfection.

Regulation X.—Certificates from other than Consular Officers. Section 1. Whenever it shall be determined by the Secretary of Agriculture, after investigation, that in any foreign country or district thereof in which no United States consular officer is located there is a satisfactory qualified official, authorized by the Government of such foreign country to sign and issue certificates stating that anthrax is not prevalent and that neither foot-and-mouth disease nor rinderpest exists in the district from which articles enumerated in these regulations are shipped, to sign and issue other certifithese regulations are shipped, to sign and issue other certifi-cates, to authenticate certificates, affidavits, and other decla-rations, and to supervise the whitewashing of hides and skins, as specified in the regulations, due notice will be given of such determination, and thereafter such official may sign and issue the said certificates, authenticate the said certificates, affi-davits, and declarations, and supervise the whitewashing of hides and skins in manner and form prescribed in the regu-lations, and such acts performed by the said official shall have the same force and effect as if performed by any United States consular officer. Section 2. The name of each foreign official authorized to Section 2. The name of each foreign official authorized to do and perform the acts specified in section 1 of this regu-lation, when submitted to and approved by the Secretary of Agriculture, will be published, and the Chief of the Bureau of Anirhal Industry shall file with each official a copy of these regulations, and copies of amendments which may hereafter be made thereto. No act specified in section 1 performed by a foreign official shall be recognized unless performed by an official whose name has been published as required herein, and whose authority to do such acts has not been evoked. evoked.





Owing, however, to the uncertain movements of typhoons and to insufficient telegraphic observations, it will occasion-ally happen that signals 2 to 5 may be displayed without a gale occurring at Hong Kong, or even Gap Rock; but the reverse is not likely to happen, except in the case of typhoons forming in the vicinity and travelling rapidly towards Hong Kong, or of a located typhoon increasing its rate of progres-sion abnormally. Signal No. 1 is intended as a warning to "Stand By" and







Ingitude 109⁻ E. The upper symbol of group (b) indicates the direction in which the typhoon or depression is travelling (Table 1). The middle symbol of group (b) indicates the velocity at which the centre of the typhoon is travelling. Alternatively it may indicate certain conditions, or a continental depres-sion. In such cases no velocity is given


it may indicate certain conditions, or a continental depres-sion. In such cases no velocity is given. The lowest symbol of group (b) indicates the time at which the centre was in the position signalled. The upper symbol of group (c) indicates the region threatened; the middle symbol the direction from which the gale is expected, and the lowest symbol the time at which gale conditions were first indicated. *Caution*.—Under the most favourable circumstances the position signal indicates only the degree of latitude and longi-tude nearest to the estimated position of the centre. When the centre is far from any reporting station, or when telethe centre is far from any reporting station, or when tele-graphic reports are lacking, the position signalled may be a much as 2° in error, both in latitude and longitude, and the velocity and direction of motion will then be in error by

corresponding amounts. It should be particularly noted that the velocity signalled is the mean for the previous 16 or 24 hours.



PANAMA CANAL.

EXECUTIVE ORDER.-DEFENSIVE SEA AREAS FOR CANAL TERMINAL PORTS.*

* Superseding Circular No. 643-37.

The Executive Order quoted below is published for the information of all concerned.

CHESTER HARDING, GOVERNOR.

Establishing Defensive Sea Areas for Terminal Ports of the Panama Canal, and providing Regulations for the Govern-ment of Persons and Vessels within said Areas.

By virtue of the authority vested in me by law, the follow-ing described defensive sea areas for the terminal ports of the Panama Canal are hereby established, to be maintained until further notification, at the places and within the limits pre-scribed as follows, that is to say :--

Atlantic Entrance.

Outer Limit .- From the northern end of Naranjos Cays to Outer Limit.—From the northern end of Naranjos cays to a point two miles due north of the breakwater entrance, thence tangent to the arc of a circle with one mile radius, having the mouth of the Chagres River as a centre, thence along the arc of this circle to the beach.

Inner Limit.—Line joining east end of west breakwater and west end of east breakwater.

Pacific Entrance.

Outer Limit .- Line joining Venado Island with north end of Taboguilla Island; thence north 53° east, true, for five miles; thence north 39° west to a point with San Jose Rock bearing north 53° west, true, distant two nautical miles; thence to Tres Hermanos Beacon; thence to Punta Mala. Inner Limit.—Line joining Guinea Point with inner end of

The following orders and regulations for the government of persons and vessels within the limits of said defensive sea areas, which orders and regulations are necessary for the purposes of defence of the Canal Zone, are hereby promulgated :-

I. In the neighbourhood of each defensive area the following entrances are designated for incoming and outgoing vessels :----

Atlantic.

Designated Entrance for Incoming Vessels.—A patrol boat stationed with end of west breakwater bearing south, true, distant two nautical miles.

Designated Entrance for Outgoing Vessels.—The main entrance to the Panama Canal, between the breakwaters.

Pacific

Designated Entrance for Incoming Vessels.—Patrol boat stationed with north end of Taboguilla Island bearing due west, distant one nautical mile.

west, distant one nautical mile. Designated Entrance for Outgoing Vessels.—Canal prism. II. A vessel desiring to cross a defensive sea area shall proceed to the vicinity of the entrance, flying her national colours, together with International Code number and pilot signal, and there await communication with the Harbour Entrance Patrol. It is expressly prohibited for any vessel to enter the limits of a defensive sea area otherwise than at a designated entrance and after authorization by the Harbour Entrance Patrol. Entrance Patrol.

III. Boats and other craft employed in the Harbour En-trance Patrol will be distinguished by the Union Jack, which will be shown from a position forward. At night they may show a vertical hoist of three lights—white, red, and white, in the order named.

IV. On receiving permission from the Harbour Entrance Patrol to enter a defensive sea area, a vessel must comply with all instructions as to pilotage and other matters that she may receive from proper authority, either before or during her passage across the area; it is understood that only upon condition of such compliance is the said permission granted.

V. No permission will be granted to other than a public vessel of the United States or a Canal craft to cross a defensive sea area between sunset and sunrise, nor during the preval-ence of weather conditions that render navigation difficult or

A vessel arriving off a defensive sea area after sunset shall anchor or lie-to at a distance of at least a mile outside its limits until the following sunrise; vessels dis-covered near the limits of the areas at night may be fired

upon. VI. No vessel shall be permitted to proceed within the limits of a defensive sea area at a greater speed than six (6)

knots per hour. VII. All matters pertaining to fishery and the passage of small crafts within a defensive sea area shall be regulated by the senior officer of the Harbour Entrance Patrol.

VIII. These regulations are subject to modification by the senior officer of the Harbour Entrance Patrol when the public interest may require; and such notification as circum-stances may permit will be issued regarding modifications

thus made. IX. Any master of a vessel or other person within the vicinity of a defensive sea area who shall violate these reguvicinity of a defensive sea area who shall violate these regu-lations, or shall fail to obey an order to stop and heave to, or shall perform any act threatening the efficiency of mine or other defences or the safety of navigation, or shall take any action inimical to the interests of the United States in its prosecution of war, may be detained therein by force of arms and renders himself liable to prosecution. X. The responsibility of the United States of America for any damage inflicted by force of arms with the object of detaining any person or vessel proceeding in contravention to regulations duly promulgated in accordance with this execu-tive order shall cease from this date. XI.--This order shall take effect from and after this date.
