1. No cross-line fishing, stroke hauling, or any other unsports-manlike device shall be used for the purpose of taking, catching, or killing salmon, trout, or perch, nor shall any bait be used with any medicated or chemical preparation what-

ever.

2. It shall be unlawful for any person to fish with more than two flies, or one fly and one minnow, or one fly and one natural bait, or two natural baits affixed to any trace. No fly shall have more than one hook, and it shall not be lawful

fly shall have more than one hook, and it shall not be lawful to use more than one lead or sinker, and such lead or sinker must be tied above all flies, minnow, or natural bait used.

3. It shall be unlawful to use any wire, either plain or twisted, or gymp trace of a greater gauge than 21 standard wire gauge. It shall be unlawful to use any wire or gymp trace of a greater length than 6 ft.

4. Provided that these regulations shall not apply to single-hooked flies size 10 old numbers or smaller, or to wire traces not exceeding 28 standard wire gauge.

5. The penalty for breach of any of these regulations shall not be less than £2 nor more than £50.

AVONDALE ROAD BOARD.

BY-LAWS No. 3.

By-LAWS of the Inhabitants of the Avondale Road District made by special order of the Avondale Road Board passed at a special meeting of the said Road Board held on the 28th day of August, 1918, and confirmed at a meeting of the said Road Board held on the 2nd day of October, 1918.

WHEREAS the Avondale Road District is situate within the

Whereas the Avondale Road District is situate within the County of Eden, wherein the Counties Act, 1908, is suspended, now, the Avondale Road Board hereby ordain as follows:—
By-laws No. 3 made by the Avondale Road Board on the 1st day of November, 1911, are, from and immediately after the date on which these by-laws shall come into operation, repealed, but shall, notwithstanding, remain in force so far only as relates to any offence committed, penalty incurred, prosecution or proceeding commenced, license issued, or notice given under or against any of the provisions thereof before the coming into force of these by-laws; and in substitution and lieu thereof the Avondale Road Board hereby, by special order, makes or ordains these by-laws. by special order, makes or ordains these by-laws.

INTRODUCTORY.

In these by-laws, if not inconsistent with the context, "Board" shall mean the Avondale Road Board; "Clerk" shall mean the Avondale Road Board; Clerk shall mean the person for the time being acting as Clerk of the Avondale Road Board; "Inspector" shall mean such officer appointed by the Board to act for the purpose of carrying out or enforcing the provisions of these or any bylaws or Act relating to the construction or erection of buildings or the alteration thereof; "District" shall mean the Avondale Road District.

PART I.

(a.) No owner or occupier of land shall allow trees or shrubs growing thereon to overhang or encroach on any street, private street, or footway; and it shall be lawful for the Board to cause all trees or shrubs so overhanging or encroaching to be lopped, or the encroaching part thereof to be removed, at the discretion of the Board.

(b.) No person shall destroy, pull down, obliterate, or deface the name or name-plate on any house or building in any such street.
(c.) Every owner or occupier of land fronting, adjoining, or near any street, if such land shall be so situated that surface or storm water from or upon the same overflows, or tends naturally, if not otherwise dis-charged, to overflow any footway of such street, shall, within seven days next after the service of notice by the Inspector requiring him so to do, connotice by the Inspector requiring him so to do, construct and lay from such point upon such land, being near to the footway, as shall be specified in such notice by plan appended, or otherwise, and higher in level than the bottom of the channel at the outer edge of the footway, and keep in good condition, such pipe, covered drain, or appliance, subject to the approval and inspection of the Board.

2. All drains under footways, discharging into channels, shall be constructed in the following manner, and subject to the following conditions:

to the following conditions:—

(a.) All such drains shall be constructed with cast-iron or (a.) All such drains shall be constructed with cast-iron or glazed-earthenware pipes not exceeding 4 in. in diameter where footpath is kerbed and channelled, and shall be laid with a fall of not less than 3 in. in the whole width of the footway, the level at the discharge mouth being the level of the water-channel.
(b.) No such drain shall be laid or used for any other purpose than for carrying of surface-water, whether from roofs or yards.
(c.) The work of overland up the footway and cutting the

from roofs or yards.

(c.) The work of opening up the footway and cutting the kerbstone for the reception of such drain-pipes, and making good the said footway, and relaying the said kerbstone, shall be done by the Board at the expense of the person requiring such drain.

(d.) The person desiring to have such drain constructed shall make written application in that behalf to the Clerk, and together with such application shall prepay the cost of the work.

3. All crossings shall be constructed by the Board, but at

3. All crossings shall be constructed by the Board, but at the expense of the person requiring the same to be made, and such crossings shall consist of such material as the Board

shall from time to time approve.

4. No person shall take, conduct, or drive any vehicle across any footpath except at some properly constructed crossing; provided that this clause shall not apply to any vehicle taken, conducted, or driven across a footpath at other than some properly constructed crossing if such vehicle be led, conducted, or driven across or along timber laid down upon such footpath, and in or across the watercourse adjoining the same, in such manner that the said footpath and watercourse will not suffer any injury.

watercourse will not suffer any injury.

5. The person applying for a permit to build shall, at the time of making application, deposit with the Board the sum of £1 sterling to cover the cost of repairing any footpath, kerb, or channel which may be damaged during the building operation, or by any matter or thing connected therewith. Such deposit shall be retained for thirty days after completion of the building. If at the end of the period of thirty days the footpath, kerb, and channel are repaired and put in a thoroughly satisfactory condition, the deposit shall be returned, otherwise it shall be absolutely forfeited to the Board.

6. No person shall ride or use any bicycle in any street or private street unless such bicycle shall have attached to it a proper and sufficient bell for the purpose of giving warning

proper and sufficient bell for the purpose of giving warning to any person if and when necessary.

7. Every person riding any bicycle along, or being upon a bicycle on, any street or private street during the period between sunset and sunrise shall carry attached to the bicycle a lamp, which shall be so constructed and placed as to exhibit a light in the direction in which he is proceeding, and shall cause such lamp to be so lighted as to afford adequate means of signalling the approach and position of the bicycle. The person and each of the persons for the time being in charge of any bicycle that shall be standing or left upon any part of any street or private street within the period aforesaid shall cause such bicycle to exhibit a light adequately showing its position. showing its position.

8. No person shall ride a bicycle on or upon any footpath. 9. No person shall ride a bicycle or drive a motor-car or motor-cycle on any street or private street at a greater speed than at the rate of twelve miles per hour, nor round any corner, angle, or intersection of any street at more than

four miles per hour.

10. Every person driving any vehicle through any street or private street shall, except in crossing for the purpose of setting down or taking up goods or passengers, keep such vehicle as near as practicable to the left-hand or near side of the street.

11. No person shall use, drive, or conduct any vehicle in or along any street or private street between sunset and sunrise, unless such vehicle shall have two proper and sufficient lights, one on each side thereof, kept well lighted for the whole time during which such vehicle shall be so driven; and no person shall, between sunset and sunrise, drive any vehicle at a walking-pace or suffer any vehicle to drive any venicle at a waiking-pace or suner any venicle to stand in any street or private street, unless such vehicle shall have one proper and sufficient light on one side thereof, kept well lighted for the whole time during which such vehicle shall be so driven or suffered to stand, as the case may be. Each light shall be so fixed as to show a red light at the back, and be distinctly visible to any one approaching from the mach light shall be so fixed as to show a red light at the back, and be distinctly visible to any one approaching from the rear, provided that in the case of a heavily laden vehicle, where it would be impracticable to have such lights so fixed, then an additional light showing a red light must be fixed or suspended at the rear of such vehicle.

12. The driver of every vehicle shall give way to any other vehicle during the taking-up or setting-down of any person into or from such vehicle.

13. The driver of any vehicle stopping the same in any 13. The driver of any vehicle stopping the same in any street or private street for any purpose whatever shall give notice of his intention so to do by holding up his whip so that the same may be visible to the driver of any vehicle immediately following, and upon stopping he shall so place his vehicle as to cause as little obstruction as possible to the nis ventile as to cause as inter obstruction as positive to the traffic; and if the stoppage of such vehicle prevents the passing of any other vehicle, such driver shall, upon being thereto requested by the driver of such other vehicle, or by any servant or officer of the Board, or police officer, remove his vehicle so as to permit such other vehicle to pass.

14. No person shall in any street or private street

(a.) While acting as the driver, ride on any vehicle without having and holding proper and sufficient reins, unless some other competent person has charge of the animal drawing the same, or be away from such animal so as to be unable to have full control thereof, without passing through the near wheel thereof a suitable chain or strap so as effectively to prevent the rotation of such wheel or wheels, whether

in any case such vehicle be hired or not.

(b.) Act as driver to have the sole charge of more than one vehicle, unless in cases where two of such vehicles, and no more, are drawn each by one horse only, and the horse of the hinder of such vehicles is attached by a sufficient rein to the back of the fore-

attached by a sufficient rein to the back of the foremost of such vehicles.

(c.) Drive any vehicle whatever, or ride any animal or bicycle, and when meeting any other vehicle, animal, or bicycle, neglect or fail to keep on the left or near side of the road or street, or when passing any other vehicle, animal, or bicycle going in the same direction, fail to pass the same on the right or off side thereof, or when any person driving any vehicle or riding any animal or bicycle in the same direction is desirous of passing, fail to allow any such vehicle, animal, or bicycle to pass on the right or off side of his animal or vehicle.

(d.) Furiously, negligently, wantonly, or carelessly ride or drive any animal or vehicle, or any engine, carriage, or conveyance of any kind.

or conveyance of any kind.

(e.) Ride or drive any animal or vehicle of any kind round (e.) More or curve any animal or venicle of any kind round an angle or corner thereof within 2 ft. of the edge or kerb of such angle or corner, or ride or drive any animal or vehicle of any kind along any such street within 2 ft. of the edge or kerb of the footway.

(f.) Ride or drive any animal or vehicle of any kind round an angle or corner thereof at other than a walking-

pace.

(g.) Drive any vehicle laden with any goods or material which project on either side more than 5 ft. from the centre of such vehicle.

(h.) Drive or allow to stand any vehicle with the curtains, coverings, or awnings thereof unfastened and liable to be flapped about by the wind so as to frighten or to be calculated to frighten horses.

(i) Drive or lead any four-wheeled vehicle taking a load down hill unless the same be fitted with a suitable

and effective brake.

(j.) Feed any horse in any street or public place save by means of a nosebag attached to the head of such horse, or remove the winkers or bridle of any such horse, or allow any vicious horse to stand in any street or public place unless properly and securely muzzled.

(k.) While acting as the driver of any cart, dray, or wagon, or such other vehicle, suffer the same to remain standing longer thereon than the time reasonably necessary for loading or unloading goods.
(l.) Leave thereon any vehicle without any horse or other

animal harnessed thereto, except in the case of some

animal harnessed thereto, except in the case of some accident having recently occurred.

(m.) Ride, lead, or drive any horse or other animal, or lead, drive, or wheel any carriage or cart, upon, along, or across any footpath or water-channel except upon and by means of a crossing properly constructed under the provisions of these by-laws or any by-laws heretofore in force.

(n.) Lead, drive, or wheel any wheelbarrow, handcart, or other similar vehicle along any footpath or water-channel.

channel.

(c.) Cause any animal or any carriage, cart, wheelbarrow, handcart, or other similar vehicle to stand or rest upon or along any footpath or crossing, or any water-channel, save as is permitted in these by-laws.

15. No person shall loiter, stand, or remain in or upon or use any street, private street, footpath, or footway for such time or in such manner as shall have the effect of obstructing or disturbing the free use thereof or the access to any house or building in or near thereto.

or building in or near thereto.

16. No person shall in or near any street, private street, footpath, footway, or public place, by singing, playing any musical instrument, preaching, reading, speaking, lecturing, selling or crying wares, exhibiting any object or thing, or causing or allowing the doing of any of the aforesaid things, or by any other means whatever, cause the collection or assembling of persons whereby such street or public place, or any neighbouring street, private street, footpath, footway, or public place, or the traffic thereof, is obstructed, disturbed, or hindered, or whereby access to any house or building in or near any street, private street, or public place is obstructed.

17. No person shall in any street, private street, footpath, footway, or public place sing, play any musical instrument, preach, read, lecture, sell or cry wares, or exhibit any object or thing, or make any noise or loud sounds, or cause or by conduct invite others to do any of the aforesaid acts, whereby the peace and quiet of any persons residing in or using or

the peace and quiet of any persons residing in or using or being in any neighbouring house or building are disturbed, or whereby the proceedings of any congregation, assemblage, or meeting are disturbed, or annoyance caused to any person

or meeting are disturbed, or annoyance caused to any person attending such congregation, assemblage, or meeting.

18. So much of the foregoing provisions of paragraph 17 as relates to the obstruction of public places shall be deemed to apply only to such public places and such parts of public places as are commonly used as thoroughfares.

19. No person shall frequent or use any street, private street, or other public place within the district, either on behalf of himself or any other person, for the purpose of bookmaking, or transacting or entering into any part of the business of a bookmaker or of a betting agent, or betting, or wagering, or agreeing or proposing to bet or wager with any person.

any person.

20. No person shall spit or expectorate or otherwise cast or place his saliva on to or upon any footpath or footway.

PART II.

Licensed Billiard and Bagatelle Rooms.

1. No person shall use any building, part of a building, or enclosure for purposes of a billiard or bagatelle room wherein enclosure for purposes of a billiard or bagatelle room wherein billiards or any similar games are played for payment, and to which the public have admission, until he shall have obtained from the Board a license so to do, and shall have paid to the Clerk of the Board a fee of £2 sterling for such license, and every such license shall be in force for one year from the date thereof. The owner or occupier of any such building shall apply in writing to the Board for a license, stating the situation and description of the building, the names of the owner and occupier, and the purpose for which it is to be used. to be used.

2. Every owner or occupier of any billiard-room wherein

2. Every owner or occupier of any billiards or any similar games are played for payment, and to which the public have admission, shall close the same on all week-days at half past ten o'clock at night.

3. The Board may cancel or suspend the license issued to the owner or occupier of any billiard-room or bagatelleroom in the district, if the same is conducted in a noisy or disorded the property as a cover approximate to the reighbour room in the district, if the same is conducted in a noisy or disorderly manner so as to cause annoyance to the neighbouring inhabitants or to the public, and in such case the license of such billiard-room shall not be entitled to any refund of any part of the fee paid for the license thereof; provided that the Board shall, before exercising the power hereby conferred, give the licensee of such billiard-room an opportunity of showing cause why the license thereof should not be cancelled or suspended. be cancelled or suspended,

PART III.

Building and Overcrowding By-law.

1. No person shall erect a new building within the district,

except in conformity with the following provisions:—

(a.) Definition of Site.—The ground upon which any building is erected, together with the whole curtilage thereof enclosed within the boundary fences, walls, or lines of the premises, shall be deemed to be the site of such building within the meaning of these

- ste of such building within the meaning of these by-laws.

 (b.) Definition of New Dwellinghouse.—The erection of a dwellinghouse upon vacant land, or upon a site previously occupied by any building, or the re-erection of any house pulled down to within 5 ft. of the ground floor, or the conversion into a dwellinghouse of any building not originally constructed for human habitation of the second property of the building not originally constructed for human habita-tion, or the conversion into more than one dwelling-house of a building originally constructed as one dwellinghouse only, or an addition to or raising of a house (so far as such addition or raising is con-cerned), or the procuring of an existing dwellinghouse or of any other building or part of a building in-tended to be re-erected and used as a dwellinghouse or part of a dwellinghouse, and placing the same upon a site in the district, shall be deemed to be
- or part of a dwellinghouse, and placing the same upon a site in the district, shall be deemed to be the erection of a new dwellinghouse within the meaning of this Part of these by-laws.

 (c.) Notice of Intention to build.—Every person who shall intend to erect, add to, or renew a building of any description whatsoever shall give to the Board notice in writing of such intention, and at the same time deposit with the Board complete plans and specifications in duplicate (whereof one set shall be retained by the Board) of such intended work, the position, form, and dimensions of such building, and every water-closet, earth-closet, privy, ashpit, cesspool, and all other appurtenances, and of the yard or ground belonging thereto, and of the open space in the front and in the rear and on each side; and the building shall be so described as to show whether it is intended to be used as a dwellinghouse or dwellinghouses, or otherwise, and shall give such further particulars as may be required; and no such work shall be commenced until such plans and specifications have been inspected by the proper specifications have been inspected by the proper officer of the Board, and a certificate given by him

officer of the Board, and a certificate given by him that the work may be commenced.

(d.) Building-site Area.—Except as hereinafter provided, no person shall erect a new dwellinghouse in the district upon a site of less area than one-quarter of an acre, and unless such site shall have a frontage of at least 50 ft. to a public road; provided that nothing in this clause shall be deemed to prevent the erection of a new dwellinghouse upon any land which has a frontage of less than 50 ft. to a public road if—

road if-

(1.) The said dwellinghouse shall have an uninterrupted and unbroken frontage for its full width to a public road; and
(2.) The area of such land shall be as follows:—

(i.) Not less than three-eighths of an acre, if the frontage thereof to a public road is less than 50 ft. but not less than 40 ft.

(ii.) Not less than four-eighths of an acre, if the frontage thereof to a public road is less

frontage thereof to a public road is less than 40 ft.

(iii.) Not less than five-eighths of an acre, if the frontage thereof to a public road is less than 30 ft. but not less than 20 ft.

(e.) Where a new dwellinghouse shall be erected upon any land in conformity with these by-laws, no person shall reduce or cause to be reduced the area provided for thereby so as or in such manner that such area. for thereby so as or in such manner that such area shall become less than the minimum area hereby provided for, and such area shall be maintained as the exclusive curtilage of and shall solely appropriate to every such new dwellinghouse,

(f.) Where any new dwellinghouse shall be erected in con-

formity with these by-laws upon any land, no person shall sell or dispose of, or purchase or acquire, any estate or interest less than the whole of the minimum

area provided for by these by-laws.

(g.) Clause (f) of paragraph 1 of this Part of these by-laws shall not apply if no house shall be upon the land at the time of such sale, disposition, purchase, or acquisition.
(h.) Site Formation.

acquisition.—The ground on which any new dwell-inghouse is to be erected, and the ground immedi-ately adjoining any such new dwellinghouse, shall be so formed and graded by the person erecting the

same that no water can lodge thereon or under such house, or run under such house; and no per-son shall commence the erection of any building on any site having matter thereon which may prove injurious to the health of the occupants of such

- (i.) No person shall erect a new dwellinghouse in the district unless he provide at the side or in the rear thereof an open space exclusively belonging to such house and of an aggregate area of not less than 600 square feet: Provided that the open space shall extend throughout the entire width or, in the alternative, throughout the entire depth of the site, and shall be free from any erection thereon above the level of the ground, and shall be so maintained while the site is occupied by the house: Provided also that it shall be sufficient if an open space provided at the rear and side of any dwellinghouse is equal to one and a half times that hereinbefore required to be provided, even though the open space does not extend throughout the entire width or, in the alternative, throughout the entire depth of the site: Provided also that the minimum distance across such open space from every part of any dwelling-house and from every part of any washhouse, shed, convenience, or other erection attached thereto shall be as follows:
 - (1.) If the height of the house does not
 - exceed 15 ft. (2.) If the height of the house exceeds 15 ft.
 - 20 ft.
 - 15 ft., but does not exceed 25 ft.. (3.) If the height of the house exceeds 25 ft., but does not exceed 35 ft. . . . 25 ft.
 - (4.) If the height of the house exceeds 35 ft. . . . 25 ft.

 For the purposes of these by-laws, where the side boundaries of any site are not of the same length, the mean length of such side boundaries shall be taken as the depth of the site for the purpose of defining the distance across such open space; and the height of a dwellinghouse shall for the purposes the height of a dwellinghouse shall, for the purposes of these by-laws, be measured from the average level of the ground immediately adjoining the side or the rear of such dwellinghouse, as the case may be, to the level of half of the vertical height of the roof
- to the level of half of the vertical height of the roof or to the top of the parapet, whichever is the higher.

 (j.) Preventing Reduction of Space.—No person shall make any alteration or addition to any building (whether erected before the coming into operation of these by-laws or not) whereby the open space attached to such dwellinghouse shall be diminished by such alteration or addition so as to leave a less open space than is required by these by-laws to be provided, or whereby the open space existing at the time these by-laws come into force, being less (computed as aforesaid) than that provided for in these by-laws, shall be diminished or reduced.

 (k.) Foundations of Concrete.—In any foundation-wall, either

by-laws, shall be diminished or reduced.

(k.) Foundations of Concrete.—In any foundation-wall, either of concrete, bricks, or stone, either separate or conjoined, a proper damp-proof course of sheet 4 lb. lead, asphalt, slates, or other approved material shall be laid beneath the level of the lowest timbers, and at a height of not less than 6 in. above the surface of the ground adjoining such wall.

(l.) Plates and Joists above Ground.—No part of any plate or joist of any house shall be at a less distance in case of a plate than 6 in., and in case of a joist than 9 in., from any portions of the ground below or immediately adjoining such plate or joist, and the ground shall in all cases have sufficient and proper communication with the external air for the purpose of ventilation. of ventilation.

(m.) Walls of Living-rooms.—No room in any house other than a bathhouse, closet, or storeroom shall have a less average height than 9 ft. between the floor and

less average height than 9 ft. between the floor and the ceiling throughout an area equal to at least two-thirds of the floor-space.

(n.) Unsuitable Material.—No person shall use any old materials in the erection of any building unless the same shall be sound, have been cleaned, and certified by the Department of Public Health as suitable for such use.

No person shall use any metosicle which shall be

No person shall use any materials which shall be, in the opinion of the Inspector or the District Health Officer, unsuitable for any cause whatsoever for use in any building; and any materials which may be so declared unsuitable shall, within twenty-four hours be removed by the person in charge of

four hours, be removed by the person in charge of the works from the site of the proposed building.

(o.) Materials.—No person shall use any materials in the construction, alteration, or repairs to any one-

story building within the Avondale Road District of less dimensions than are specified in the following

Blocks: Sawn or split, heart of totara or puriri, 8 in. by 5 in., and such blocks shall be spaced at a distance of not more than 4 ft. apart.

Bottom Plates and Sleepers: 4 in. by 3 in., heart of totara, kauri, or rimu.

Jack-studs: 4 in. by 3 in., heart of totara, kauri,

or rimu; in every case where the height of jack-studs exceeds 6 ft. the same shall be braced as is hereinafter specified for external walls.

Ground-floor Joists: 6 in. by 2 in., heart of totara, rimu, or kauri, spaced not more than 20 in.

Vermin - plates: External walls, 4 in. by 2 in.,

Vermin - plates: External walls, 4 in. by 2 in., partition-walls 3 in. by 2 in.

Top Plates: 4 in. by 2 in. external walls, 3 in. by 2 in. partitions; provided, however, that in the case of a building of more than one story the upper floor-plate shall not be less than 4 in. by 3 in.

Studs for External Walls: 4 in. by 2 in., spaced out (by 2 in.) not more than 20 in. centres, kauri, rimu, totara, oregon, or matai; provided, however, that in the case of a building of more than one story the studs for the walls shall not be less than 4 in. by 3 in.

Studs for Partition-walls: 3 in. by 2 in., spaced out not more than 20 in. centre, kauri, rimu, totara,

out not more than 20 in. centre, kauri, rimu, totara, oregon, or matai; provided, however, that in the case of a building of more than one story the studs for the partition-walls shall not be less than 4 in. by 3 in.

Braces on Studding: 4 in. by 1 in., kauri, rimu, totara, or oregon; not less than two braces for each external wall.

Ceiling-joists: 4 in. by 2 in., spaced 20 in. centres,

kauri, rimu, totara, oregon, or matai.
Rafters: 4 in. by 2 in., spaced not more than 3 ft.

apart, kauri, rimu, totara, oregon, or matai.

Collar-ties: 6 in. by 1 in., ordinary building

kauri or rimu.
Purlins: 3 in. by 2 in., kauri, rimu, totara, oregon,

or matai. Hips, Valleys, and Ridges: None but 1 in. kauri, rimu, oregon, or matai.

Weatherboarding and all External Timber: To be heart of kauri, rimu, totara, or matai. All weatherboarding shall not be less than $\frac{3}{4}$ in. in

Flooring: Not less than 1 in. thickness, tongued and grooved, medium kauri, ordinary building rimu, matai, or totara.

Rough Lining: Not less than ½ in. in thickness, all close-jointed from floor to ceiling.

Bridging: Joists for a span not exceeding 12 ft., 9 in. by 2 in.; joists for a span exceeding 12 ft., 10 in. by 2 in.; upper floors having a span exceeding 14 in. shall be strengthened by a herring-boning of 2 in. by 2 in.

Any timber not otherwise specified shall be at least ordinary building rimu, matai, totara, or building rimu, matai, totara, or medium kauri.

- medium kauri.

 (p.) No person shall erect, alter, add to, or renew the external walls, party walls, or chimneys of any buildings at a less distance than 4 ft. from the boundary (other than a road or a street boundary) of the property upon which such erection, alteration, addition, or renewal shall be made; provided that nothing in this clause contained shall prevent the erection, alteration, addition, or renewal of such walls or chimneys at a less distance than 4 ft. such walls or chimneys at a less distance than 4 ft. from such boundary if the material employed in the erection, alteration, addition to, or renewal of such walls or chimneys be not metal, wood, or other combustible substance.
- (q.) Any Inspector appointed by the Board may from time to time enter upon any land during daylight and inspect any building or material proposed to be used in the construction of a new dwellinghouse, and no person shall obstruct any such inspector or prevent him from making any such inspection.
- (r.) No person shall, after these by-laws shall come into force, erect, alter, add to, or renew with wood, metal, or other combustible material the external walls, party walls, or chimneys of any building within 8 ft. from any other building.
- 2. If any dwellinghouse or part of a dwellinghouse be erected, altered, or repaired contrary in any particular to the provisions of this Part of these by-laws, it shall be lawful

for the Board to give notice in writing to the owner of such dwellinghouse, within a time to be mentioned in such notice, to take down, remove, or alter such dwellinghouse or part of such dwellinghouse in such a manner that the provisions of this Part of these by-laws shall be accurately fulfilled. Non-compliance with any such notice shall be deemed an offence

The penalty for any breach of this Part of these by-laws shall be a fine not exceeding £5; and in the case of a continuous breach an additional fine not exceeding £5 for every day on which the breach is continued after the first day.

PART IV .- SANITARY BY-LAWS.

Drainage.

1. From and after the coming into force of these by-laws every person on whose behalf any underground drain, or on whose behalf any water-closet or septic tank is laid or con-structed, shall cause all the provisions of this Part of these

by-laws to be complied with.

(a.) It shall not be lawful for any person hereafter in any manner to erect, make, or establish a water-closet or drain, or drain connection, or to construct or alter any sanitary appliance or work, without having first obtained a permit from the Board. Application for such permit to be accompanied by a plan of such proposed drainage.

proposed drainage.

(b.) Every person to whom a permit has been granted shall give twenty-four hours' notice in writing to the Sanitary Inspector for the time being, or the Board, by leaving the same at the Board's office, that the underground work in connection with the laying, alteration of, opening-up, cleansing, or removal of drains will be open and ready for inspection; and no such work shall be covered up until it shall have been inspected, tested, and approved by the Sanitary been inspected, tested, and approved by the Sanitary Inspector.

Inspector.

(c.) All underground drains used or intended to be used to carry away sewage or household waste waters or matters from any house or dwelling, and all sanitary connections therewith, shall in every case be constructed, adapted, and maintained in such manner as to sufficiently and efficiently carry away such sewage or household waste waters or matters.

(d.) No person shall allow any household waste or offensive matters to remain on or flow from any dwelling or land in his occupation on to a road or into a ditch

land in his occupation on to a road or into a ditch or open drain.

(c.) Every sink, lavatory-basin, closet-basin, or bath shall be placed so that the outlet thereof is as near as possible to the external wall of the room containing possible to the external wall of the room containing any such sanitary fittings, and the gully-trap over which the waste-pipes from such fittings discharge shall be so placed as to enable such waste-pipes to be of the shortest possible length.

(f.) No person shall lead the waste matters from any water-closet into any drain or sewer not being a

water-closet into any drain or sewer not being a brick, concrete, ferro-concrete, iron, or earthenware-pipe drain or sewer. No person shall erect any water-closet under subsection (a) hereof unless all the drains and sewers through which the waste matters from such water-closet would pass are closed drains and sewers, connected to a final sewer outfall or septic tank so constructed and maintained as when used not to be offensive or injurious to health.

(g.) No inlet connected with a drain shall be laid or maintained within or under a building. For every house where drainage is provided a gully-trap must be provided in the yard placed where most convenient for kitchen waste waters.

(h.) For household slops and discharge from the wasteor household slops and discharge from the wastepipes of baths, sinks, and lavatories, self-cleansing
gully-traps shall be used, such traps to be not less
than 6 in. diameter at the inlet and 4 in. at the
outlet, and fitted with dished tops and movable
gratings. The dish must be joined to the trap by
means of a socket and spigot joint properly finished
with cement, or may be of one piece with the trap,
and the depth of the dish to the top of the grating
must not be less than 3 in. Gully-traps must have
a water seal of not less than $2\frac{1}{2}$ in., with openings
of suitable outlet capacity. of suitable outlet capacity.

of suitable outlet capacity.

(i.) All bath, lavatory, sink, wash-tub, rain-water, or other waste-pipes shall discharge into the open air either directly over a trapped gully at a height of not less than 3 in. nor more than 6 in. above the grating thereof, or over (and at a height of 3 in. above) a watertight concrete channel led to a gully-trap, and not being distant therefrom more than 6 ft.

The waste-pipe from the kitchen and scullery sinks of hotels, boardinghouses, clubs, and restaurants shall discharge over a grease-trap of approved pattern and material. pattern and material.

(j.) The waste-pipes of baths, lavatories, and sinks shal be provided directly under their intakes with ap-proved siphon traps of equal bore, and having a seal

of not less than 2 in.

(k.) Kitchen sinks must be constructed of impervious materials. The following will be considered impervious materials: Lead, galvanized iron, copper, enamelled or plain cast iron, glazed fireclay or

earthenware.

(l.) No water-closet shall be placed in any bathroom or in any room or closet used for any other purpose than that of a water-closet, lavatory, privy, or urinal, or in any room, unless at least one of its walls is an outer wall.

(m.) When for any reason any sanitary convenience, or any portion of a drain or any fittings in connection therewith, are no longer required for use, such sanitary convenience shall be removed, and such portion of the drain or fittings shall be disconnected and removed, and any openings or connections with existing drains and sewers shall be properly closed and made good.

(n.) Where a drain is used to make a connection to a sewer or septic tank, or where a water-closet is connected with a drain, such drain shall be provided at its highest point with a ventilation shaft, whose diameter shall not be less than 4 in., and constructed of such material and carried to such height above the eaves as the Board's Sanitary Inspector may

2. No person shall construct any privy or closet other than a water-closet except in accordance with the following conditions, and the owner and occupier of any premises upon which any privy or closet exists, and which does not conform to these by-laws, shall, at any time after two months from the coming into force of these by-laws, cause such privy or closet to conform in every respect thereto:—

(a.) No part of any privy shall be at less than 15 ft. diso part of any privy shall be at less than 15 ft. distance from any road, street, or footpath, or any dwellinghouse, or other erection attached to such dwellinghouse, or from any building, shop, or office in which any person may or may be intended to be employed in any manufacture, trade, or business (other than a detached washhouse used exclusively for domestic purposes), or from any place of public worship or any public hall or school. Every privy shall be so situated that the pan can be removed and the contents disposed of without the same having to be carried through any house, shop, factory, or workshop.

workshop.

(b.) Every privy other than a water-closet shall be so constructed that at least one of its side shall be an external wall. The floor, including the space under the seat, shall be of good sound timber, planed, tongued and grooved, or of brick or cement, and shall be at least 6 in. above the level of the ground impredictly adjoining theorem. It shall be proved shall be at least 6 in. above the level of the ground immediately adjoining thereto. It shall be properly lighted and ventilated, and the door shall be in the best position adapted to conceal the interior from the public view. The seat shall be capable of being opened or removed for its full width for the purpose of cleaning the space beneath, and fitted with a hinged cover. Battens shall be so placed on the floor beneath the seat as to secure that the pan shall be so placed that all excreta shall fall therein.

(c.) All privies for the reception of nightsoil (not being water-closets) shall be pan privies with movable receptacles for the nightsoil. Such receptacles shall be watertight metal pans of a size and pattern approved by the Board.

(d.) The occupier of any shop, house, factory, workshop, or any other premises provided with a pan privy, shall cause the pans thereof to be emptied and properly cleaned at least once in each week, and in any case so frequently as to prevent of overflow.

(c.) The occupier, and where the premises are not occupied the owner, of the premises on which any pan privy is situated shall keep such privy in a good state of repair and in a clean and sanitary condition.

of repair and in a clean and sanitary condition.

3. No person shall place or deposit nightsoil in a pit or other fixed receptacle in the ground, or spread nightsoil upon the surface of the ground, or bury nightsoil, within 33 ft. of any church, hall, house, shop, factory, or workshop, or within 20 ft. of the boundary of any adjoining land. No person shall dispose of nightsoil so as to create a nuisance. No person shall bury nightsoil otherwise than in the following manner: A V-shaped furrow or trench shall be formed of not more than 18 in, in death, and the nightsoil shall be nature: A V-snaped furrow of trench shan be foliated by not more than 18 in. in depth, and the nightsoil shall be placed along the bottom of such furrow or trench and covered with earth level with the surface, and so that the nightsoil shall be forthwith covered with at least 6 in. of earth.

shall be forthwith covered with at least 6 in. of earth.

4. No person shall keep, or allow, suffer, or permit to be kept, any pig within the district on any holding of less than 1 acre in area, or shall in any case so keep any pig as to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or keep, or suffer, permit, or allow to be kept, any pig in any pigsty at a less distance than 100 ft. from any house or from any road. The owner or occupier of any land upon which pigs shall be kept shall appeared to the constructed of cause the floor of every pigsty thereon to be constructed of concrete or other impervious material, and to be so maintained that there shall be no soakage of the soil with the pigs' food, urine, or drainage from the sty. The owner of or occupier of any land upon which there shall be a pigsty shall keep such sty at all times in a clean and wholesome condition.

5. No person shall erect, or cause to be erected, any stable at less distance than 15 ft. from any boundary of neighbouring property, dwellinghouse, public building, or church. The floor of any stable now or hereafter erected shall be constructed of concrete or other impervious material, and shall be laid with a proper fall into a trapped drain, and such floor and drain be kept in a thorough state of repair.

such floor and drain be kept in a thorough state of repair. No person shall allow an accumulation of animal excreta or manure to remain on any property so as to cause a nuisance.

6. Should any stable existing at the coming into force of this by-law, and not constructed in accordance with the foregoing provisions, cause a nuisance or an injury to health owing to its mode of construction, or to the absence of any structural convenience therein or thereto, or by reason of any matter or thing whatsoever, it shall be the duty of the owner or occupier of such stable, upon notice being served upon him by the Clerk so to do, and within a time by such notice limited, to execute and do such works and things as may be necessary to abate such nuisance as may be specified may be necessary to abate such nuisance as may be specified in such notice.

in such notice.

7. Every occupier of a building or premises wherein or whereon any horse or other beast of draught or burden, or any cattle or swine, may be kept shall provide in connection with such building or premises a suitable covered receptacle for dung, manure, soil, filth, or other offensive or noxious matter which may from time to time be produced in the keeping of any such animal in such building or upon such premises. Such receptacle shall not be erected within 15 ft. of any dwellinghouse or place in which any person is employed in any manufacture, trade, or business, or in which any food intended for human consumption is stored, or within 20 ft. from any public road. He shall at least once in every week remove, or cause to be removed, from the receptacle week remove, or cause to be removed, from the receptacle provided in accordance with the requirements of this by-law, all dung, manure, soil, filth, or other offensive or noxious matter produced in or upon such building or premises and deposited in such receptacle.
8. No live animal shall be kept in the district so as or in

8. No live animal shall be kept in the district so as or in such manner as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

9. No poultry shall be kept in any part of the district; except in properly constructed poultry-houses, or in a suitably enclosed run attached thereto; and no such poultry-houses shall be built less than 16 ft. from any dwelling, or from any public or private street or public place or boundary-fence. No such run shall have its outer fence at a less distance than 3 ft. from any boundary of adjoining premises, or 6 ft. from any public or private street or public place; and all poultry-houses shall be well lime-washed inside at

least once in every six months by the occupier of the premises,

and all runs be clean and free from filth.

10. The penalty for any breach of these by-laws shall be a fine not exceeding £5, and in the case of a continuous breach

an additional fine not exceeding £5 for every day on which the breach is continued after the first day.

11. If, in the opinion of the Board, a full compliance with any provision of these by-laws would needlessly injuriously affect the course and operation of business, or be attended affect the course and operation of business, or be attended with great loss, hardship, or inconvenience to any person without a corresponding benefit to the community, the Board may on special application relax the strict observance of any provision, or modify the same, provided that such other terms and conditions as the Board may impose be complied with by the applicant.

12. The by-laws shall apply to the whole district. They shall come into force on their being gazetted.

The foregoing by laws were duly made by the Avondale Road Board by special order passed and adopted at a special meeting of the said Board convened for that purpose on the 28th day of August. 1918, publicly notified in the Avondale News on the 31st day of August, 1918, on the 7th day of September, 1918, on the 14th day of September, 1918, and on the 21st day of September, 1918; confirmed on the 2nd day of October, 1918, and ordered to come into force on being gazetted. being gazetted.

The common seal of the Inhabitants of the Avondale Road District was affixed hereto at a meeting and by order of the Avondale Road Board on the 9th day of October, 1918.

The Act imposes upon every parent, teacher of a school (either public or private), constable, or officer of a charitable or kindred institution who is aware of the place of residence (either temporary or permanent) of a deaf child, and the householder in whose house any such child resides, an obligation to send notification of the fact to the Minister of Education, giving the name, age, and address of the child; and any neglect or failure to comply with this provision involves liability to a fine.

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
