I N pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities In pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred on me by the Defence Act, 1909, and its amendments, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby amend, in the manner and to the extent set forth in the Schedule hereto, the Regulations for the Military Forces of New Zealand made on the twenty-second day of December, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, and published in the New Zealand Gazette of the twenty-seventh day of January, one thousand nine hundred. seventh day of January, one thousand nine hundred and fourteen; and I do hereby declare that the amendments hereby made shall take effect as from the date of publication thereof in the Gazette.

#### SECTION XVI: NEW ZEALAND ARMY PAY DEPARTMENT. Organization and General Duties

Organization and General Duties.

307. The duties of the New Zealand Army Pay Department include the receipt and disbursement of all moneys receivable and payable for services connected with the Department of Defence or the New Zealand Military Forces, and for the compilation of accounts connected therewith.

308. For these duties the Director of Financial Services shall be responsible under the Quartermaster-General. He will act as financial adviser to the Quartermaster-General in all questions of pay and allowances, and in such other matters as that officer may refer to him. He will command the New Zealand Army Pay Department and New Zealand Army Pay Corps, and exercise supervision and control over the personnel and organization of all New Zealand Army Pay Offices.

309. District or Command Paymasters will be appointed for duties at such places as may from time to time be decided upon, and will carry out, under the general instructions of the Director of Financial Services, accounting duties in respect to New Zealand military services.

310. Questions relating to a soldier's pay and emoluments will be dealt with by the Officer Commanding the District in which the soldier is serving. Pending receipt of the decision the Command Paymaster will defer payment. In a case of emergency at a station abroad, where the Officer Commanding the Troops, after taking into consideration the Staff or Command Paymaster's objection, may order in writing that the payment be made, and shall apply New Zealand Headquarters for the covering sanction of the Hon. the Minister of Defence. The Staff or Command Paymaster in that event will comply with the order and report the case departmentally to the Director of Financial Services. The personal liability attaching to all officers who order disbursements of public moneys will then rest upon the Officer Commanding the Troops.

If a Paymaster is desired by military authority to make a payment or accept a charge or credit which in his opinion is not authorized by regulations, or is otherwis

Paymaster.

311. Appeals by the military authorities against the objections or disallow-ances of a Paymaster will be made to the Assistant Quartermaster-General of the command in which the troops concerned are serving, who, if unable to concur with the Paymaster (or the Command Paymaster as provided in Regulation 310), will submit the case to the Director of Financial Services

Regulation 310), will submit the case to the Director of Financial Services for decision, attaching the original correspondence.

312. A Paymaster will be held responsible that no arrear occurs in the work of his office, and that the books are posted up daily and are at all times ready for inspection.

313. Offices, records, and accounts will be open to the inspection of superior authority and of such officers as may be appointed for the purpose.

314. A Paymaster who may be involved in pecuniary difficulties will, pending investigation and decision of superior authority, be suspended from duty.

315. A Paymaster will not take charge of any regimental or other funds not belonging to the public, nor shall he act as auditor, or on the committee controlling the expenditure of the same.

316. All offices of the Department will be open for the transmission of public business from 9 o'clock a.m. to 1 o'clock p.m. and from 2 o'clock p.m. to 5 o'clock p.m., except on Saturdays, when the hours shall be from 9 o'clock a.m. to noon; but the services of Paymasters and clerks will be

available at all times if required, independently of the hours an office may

be open.
317. It is the duty of every member of the New Zealand Military Forces to assist the Commandant in carrying out these regulations.

He shall be responsible that all accounts in the Command Pay Office are kept strictly in accordance with the Public Revenues Act and Treasury Regulations. He shall take such steps as will ensure that the accounts of sub-accountants and imprestees are properly kept, and that no excessive balance is held.

He shall inspect such accounts at least once monthly, and at each inspection will obtain and have the bank pass-book made up by the bank for the purpose of checking transactions and verifying the balance.

#### SUMMARY FOR THE MONTH OF DECEMBER, 1918.

The weather during December proved very changeable owing to the unusual number of westerly low-pressure areas which

passed in the south.

The only settled weather was experienced generally between the 14th and 20th, when anticyclonic conditions ruled. Some heavy rainfall accompanied electrical conditions in different parts of the North Island on the 8th and 28th, and on this account the middle districts of the North Island had a total rainfall above the average. Generally, however, the rainfall was of a showery nature, and the aggregate fall for the month was less than the mean.

The total births registered for the four metropolitan areas amounted to 724, as against 597 in November—an increase of 127. The deaths registered in December were 1,137—a decrease of 666 as compared with the previous month. Of the total deaths, males contributed 673, females 464. One hundred and one of the deaths were of children under five years of age, being 8.88 per cent. of the whole number. Fifty-two of these were under one year of age.

it may concern, to take notice of the said Order and govern themselves accordingly, and to punctually observe and obey

And whereas the said Order was served upon the Chief Judge of the Native Land Court of New Zealand on the 24th day of January, 1919:

And whereas the said Chief Judge in conformity with the said Order has directed a sitting of the Native Appellate Court aforesaid to be held at Wellington on the 7th day of February, 1919, to conform with and to carry out the directions in the said Order:

And whereas the Honourable William Herbert Herries, His Majesty's Minister for Native Affairs in this Dominion, has

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a report from the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council dated the 22nd day of October, 1918, in the words follow-

ing, viz.:—
"Whereas by virtue of His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh's Order in Council of the 18th day of October, 1909, there was referred unto this Committee a humble petition of Hineiti Rirerire Arani in the matter of an appeal from the Native Appellate Court of New Zealand between the petitioner appellant and the Public Trustee of New Zealand, respondent, setting forth that in 1896 Erueti Arani, a Native Chief residing with his wife, Mariana Pine, at Moawhango, in New Zealand, took into their care and control the petitioner soon after she was born and named her Hineiti Rirerire Arani: That the petitioner's parents were both of the Maori race: That in 1897 Erueti Arani and his wife also took into their care and control a second female infant, whom they named Hurihuri Matilda Arani: That this infant was of European parentage: That on the 11th January, 1900, Erueti Arani applied for and obtained an Order of Adoption under the Adoption of Children Act, 1895, in favour of Hurihuri Matilda Arani: That as to this form of adoption the petitioner submits that proceedings under this Act could have no force or effect as regards succession to Native lands according to Native custom: That in 1900 Erueti Arani and his wife also took into their care and control a brother of the petitioner, and named him Whatitketike Arani: That his parents were also of the Maori race. That soon after Erueti Arani evinced a design to adopt whattheethe Aram: I hat his parents were also of the Maori race: That soon after Erueti Arani evinced a desire to adopt another infant, afterwards named Te Oiroa Arani Patare, a daughter of Robert Thompson Batley and Emily Batley, European settlers residing at Moawhango: That in 1901 the Native Land Claims Adjustment and Laws Amendment Act (No. 65L) was passed, by which it was enacted by section 50 that no claim by adoption to the estate of any Native dying after the 31st March, 1902, should be recognized unless such adoption should have been registered in the Native Land Court in accordance with regulations to be made as therein provided: That on the 23rd October, 1903, Erueti Arani and his wife made application for the registration under section 50 of the adoption of each of the three children (1) the petitioner, (2) Hurihuri Matilda Arani, and (3) Whaitiketike Arani and Erueti Arani himself also at the same time made. Arani, and Erueti Arani himself also at the same time made application for the registration of the adoption of Te Oiroa Arani Patare: That accordingly notices were in respect of the four children gazetted on the 19th November, 1903: That Erueti Arani died on the 21st November, 1907: That up to the date of his death the three children had continued under his care and control: That Te Oiroa Arani Patare remained under the care and control of her own parents, and was never taken into the care and control of the deceased: in 1908 the Public Trustee applied to the Native Land Court for succession orders in favour of all of the four children for succession orders in favour of all of the four children in respect of freehold interests of the deceased in certain Native lands: That the Native Land Court on the 30th April, 1908, decided in effect that only the two children—namely, the petitioner and Whaitiketike Arani, both of Maori parentage, were entitled to succeed: That against this decision the Public Trustee appealed to the Native Appellate Court, and that Court on the 8th October 1908, varied the judgment of the Native Land Court by 1908, varied the judgment of the Native Land Court by admitting Huruhuri Matilda Arani, although she was of European parentage: And humbly praying Your Majesty in Council for special leave to appeal from the judgment of the

Native Appellate Court dated the 8th October, 1908, or for such further or other Order as to Your Majesty in Council

And whereas by virtue of the aforesaid Order in Council there was also referred unto this Committee the matter of a potition of the same petitioner in the matter of an appeal from the Native Appellate Court of New Zealand between the petitioner appellant and the Public Trustee of New Zealand, respondent, setting forth that in 1896 Mariana Pine, a Native woman, the wife of Erueti Arani (along with her husband), took the petitioner into their household soon after she wa born: That in 1897 Mariana Pine (along with her husband) took another female child into their household: That her name was Matilda Lindsay, and both her parents were Europeans: That this child was given the name of Hurihuri Matilda Lindsay Arani: That on the 11th January, 1900, Mariana Pine (along with her husband) obtained an order under the Adoption of Children Act (New Zealand), 1895, adopting Hurihuri Matilda Lindsay Arani in terms of that Act: That the petitioner is advised that this Order of Adoption could have no force or effect as regards the right of succession according to Native custom: That by Notice of Adoption dated the 23rd October, 1903, gazetted on the 19th November, 1903, in accordance with the regulations made in that behalf under section 50 of the Native Land Claims Adjustment and Laws Amendment Act (New Zealand), 1901, Adjustment and Laws Amendment Act (New Zealand), 1901, Mariana Pine notified that she along with her husband had taken the petitioner and Whaitiketike Arani to be their adopted children according to Native custom (New Zealand Gazette, 1903, Vol. 2, p. 2439): That the petitioner is advised there could be no adoption 'according to Native custom' in the case of Hurihuri Matilda Lindsay Arani, she being a pure blooded European child: That the petitioner and Hurihuri Matilda Lindsay Arani and Whaitiketike Arani continued under the care and control of Mariana Pine and her husband until his death in 1907, and thereafter under the care and until his death in 1907, and thereafter under the care and control of Mariana Pine until her death: That Mariana Pine died in 1908, and the respondent was appointed by the Native Land Court as the administrator of her estate: That shortly afterwards, following the decision of the Native Appellate Court in the matter of the lands of Erueti Arani, deceased, as already recited, the respondent obtained succession orders from the Native Land Court in favour of (1) the petitioner, (2) Hurihuri Matilda Lindsay Arani, and (3) Whai-tiketike Arani in respect of the lands of the deceased: That one of the next-of-kin of the deceased appealed against these one of the next-of-kin of the deceased appealed against these orders: That on the hearing of the appeal the respondent appeared to support the orders, and on the 18th July, 1910, the Appellate Court dismissed the appeal: That the petitioner attained the age of twenty-one years on the 1st October, 1917, and soon after sought legal advice as to the right of herself and Whaitiketike Arani as the two Maori children adopted by the deceased to be her only two successors 'according to Native custom': That after investigation and consideration of the records and facts the petitioner has been advised that the judgment of the Native Appellate Court in advised that the judgment of the Native Appellate Court in confirming the succession orders issued by the Native Land Court by including Hurihuri Matilda Lindsay Arani is bad law: That until recently the petitioner was under the belief that Whaitiketike Arani would attain the age of twenty-one years during June, 1918, when the petitioner and Whaitiketike Arani intended to join in one petition for special leave to appeal against the judgment of the Native Appellate Court of the 18th July, 1910, but now it has been ascertained that Whaitiketike will not attain the age of twenty-one years for about

tiketike will not attain the age of twenty-one years for about three years: And humbly praying Your Majesty in Council for special leave to appeal against the judgment of the Native Appellate Court dated the 18th July, 1910, or for such further or other order as to your Majesty in Council may seem proper. "The Lords of the Committee in obedience to His late Majesty's said Order in Council have taken the humble petitions into consideration, and having heard counsel in support thereof their Lordships do this day agree humbly to be granted to the petitioner to enter and prosecute her report to Your Majesty as their opinion (1) that heave ought to be granted to the petitioner to enter and prosecute her appeals against the judgments of the Native Appellate Court of New Zealand respectively dated the 8th day of October, 1908, and the 18th day of July, 1910, upon depositing in the Registry of the Privy Council the sum of £300 as security for costs; (2) that the two appeals ought to be consolidated and heard together upon one printed case on each side: for costs; (2) that the two appeals ought to be consolidated and heard together upon one printed case on each side; (3) that liberty ought to be granted to the said Hurihuri Matilda Arani and Whaitiketike Arani to intervene in the appeals to lodge printed cases and to appear by counsel at the hearing if they should be so advised; (4) that the matter ought to be referred to the Native Appellate Court in order that that Court may direct advertisements to be published in suitable newspapers within the Dominion of New Zealand in suitable newspapers within the Dominion of New Zealand for any persons claiming to be the next-of-kin according to the Maori law or custom of Eructi Arani, deceased, and of

Mariana Pine, deceased, living at the time of their respective deaths, or claiming to be the legal representatives of such of the next-of-kin as are now dead, or claiming to be otherwise interested in the estates of Erueti Arani, deceased, and Mariana Pine, deceased, such claims to be entered in the Native Appellate Court by a date to be fixed by that Court; (5) that the proper officer of the Native Appellate Court ought to be directed to transmit to the Registrar of the Privy Council, with the record hereinafter referred to, the names of any such persons claiming to be such next-of-kin or otherwise interested as aforesaid, and liberty ought to be granted to such persons (if any) to intervene in the appeals to lodge printed cases and to appear by counsel at the hearing if they should be so advised; and (6) that the proper officer of the Native Appel-late Court ought to be directed to transmit to the Registrar

of the Privy Council an authenticated copy under seal of the record proper to be laid before Your Majesty on the hearing of the appeals upon payment by the petitioner of the usual

His Majesty having taken the said report into consideration was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order as it is hereby ordered that the same be punctually observed, obeyed, and carried into execution.

Whereof the Governor-General, Lieutenant-Governor, or Officer administering the Government of the Dominion of New Zealand and its Dependencies for the time being, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.
